Work is due to begin in the New Year on a major extension to the New Galloway Surgery. The single storey extension will provide an extra two consulting rooms, a much larger reception and dispensing area, and a rear vestibule for patients to wait while their prescriptions are being dispensed.

Speaking for the Glenkens Medical Practice, Dr.John Neil said, "For some time now we have been getting increasingly short of space in the New Galloway Surgery. We currently have two doctors sharing one consulting room, restricted office and dispensing space and limited space for our visiting chiropodist. The new extension will greatly improve privacy and provide a much better working environment for our staff."

The extension has been designed by architect Simon Winstanley, of Crallan & Winstanley, Architects. Mr. Winstanley, who lives in Dalry, said, "The doctors gave us the brief that the new extension had to be in sympathy with the traditional Galloway style of the building, yet be light and airy and have views of the garden. After returning to the drawing board several times we eventually came up with a design to fulfil what the doctors wanted. We believe that the design is both traditional and innovative, and allows maximum use of natural lighting".

During the building work, which will take about six months, part of the existing building will be demolished and the use of the existing rooms will be modified temporarily to allow the building to remain in use as a surgery. *Continued page 2*......

Major Extension for New Galloway Surgery continued...

"We hope that the temporary arrangements will cause a minimum of inconvenience to our patients and to the running of the practice," Dr.Neil added. "The car park at New Galloway will be temporarily out of use during building work and visitors to the surgery may have to park in the High Street during this period. The interim arrangements, however, will ensure that the surgery and dispensing services at the New Galloway and Dalry surgeries are unaffected for the duration of the building work."

The extension is being jointly funded by the three doctors in the practice and by the Primary Care Trust. "This project represents a considerable investment in the Glenkens," said Dr.Neil. "We are determined to ensure that this part of rural Scotland retains its own locally based medical practice, providing easily accessible medical and dispensing services for the local population."

WINTER WARMERS

The season of colds and flu, stiff joints and aching muscles is upon us. Wouldn't it be nice to reach into your cupboard and pull out something that would ease your symptoms and taste good too? The comfort factor increases when you've made it yourself for virtually nothing!

Here are two of my favourite winter recipes, kept on standby from year to year, ready for those gloomy grey days.

ELDERBERRY COLD REMEDY

Soak 3lbs of elderberries (blackberries or blackcurrants) lightly crushed in 2 pts. of cider vinegar for 48 hours. Strain and measure the juice into a pan. To each 2 pts. of liquid add 2lbs sugar, 4" stick of cinnamon, 2 pieces root ginger (or one level tsp. ground) and 10 cloves. If you have them also add 6 dried coltsfoot leaves and 1 tbsp. dried marshmallow leaf.

Bring gently to the boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Simmer 5 min then take off the heat and leave over-night.

The following day bring back to simmer, skim, then strain and bottle, labelling carefully.

This is very good taken neat by the teaspoonful (1-2, no more than 3 times a day or diluted with hot water as a comforting remedy for cold and flu symptoms).

HOT OIL

For muscular aches, chilblains, cold joints, improving circulation and banishing chills from the bones.

1 oz

cayenne pepper

2 Tbspns

mustard powder

1 Tbspnground ginger

2 Tspns

ground black pepper

1/2 pt.

vegetable oil

Put all the spices into a large jar with the oil and gently heat in a pan of water. Bring to a very gentle simmer for 3 hours, topping up the water if necessary.

Remove the container from the pan and strain through muslin. Bottle and label carefully.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

St.John's Town of Dalry is not a town like Castle Douglas or Kirkcudbright or Dalbeattie with a population of thousands. It would begin as a fairm toon - a farm town where there was a group of cottages for the farmers who worked on the surrounding land. St. John's Clachan of Dalry is an alternative old name. In Gaelic a clachan was a group of tall stones or stone cottages. Some people in Dalry still refer to Kirkland Street as the back Clachan.

NEW GALLOWAY. OUR HISTORIC BURGH. PART 2

By the mid 1600's Newtown of Galloway had a fairly flourishing weekly market and the three annual fairs were a great attraction for the hillmen of Glenkens and for visitors from further afield. These events were held at Carson's Knowe and the cattle were grazed on the lush meadows beside the Water of Ken.

Rules were laid down to protect the Fairs and Markets, to ensure the new Burgh need have no fear of opposition.

"No other Weekly Markets or Free Fairs are to be held within an area betwix Newtown of Galloway and Castlefairne in the east, Clauchan-pluck (Laurieston) in the south, Black Forde of Dee in the west and a hill called Larg in the north". This covered an area of about ten miles in each direction.

By 1650 an annual Cattle Show had been established, said to be the parent of all shows in Scotland. From all this it can be seen that Kells and indeed the whole Glenkens area, relied on agriculture and cattle in particular, for its very existence. However, the primitive tracks over the hills to Newtown of Galloway made it a singularly inaccessible place, and all these events must have been on a very small scale.

At about this time there was an increase in the transportation of cattle from Ireland to Scottish and English markets. Boats carrying cattle sailed from Donaghadee to Portpartrick (or Port Montgomery to give its early name), and huge droves were walked across Galloway. Many old droving routes can still be traced as they follow farm and forestry roads across the moors. One such route was the Old Edinburgh Road and it was on this road cattle were brought to Newton of Galloway, a famous halfway house between Wigtownshire and Dumfries. It was also a gathering place for Stewartry cattle bound for English markets.

Although this cattle trading was good for the Burgh in some respects, there were many people who objected to Sunday droving. The noise of enormous herds of cattle being gathered after resting over-night, the shouting and swearing of the drovers and the barking of their dogs was too much for the good folk of the area. Also the cattle damaged crops on the lands through which they passed. To stop this, people resorted to violence – riots, and even bloodshed was reported in the Glenkens!

WATER TREATMENT PLANTS DUE FOR COMPLETION

The large scale earth moving excavation to the south of Carsphairn has been a very visible sight to passers-by for some months now. The activity by West of Scotland Water has been due to a new state of the art Membrane Plant and storage tanks being installed. At a total cost of £400,000 the standard of water quality will be brought up to the new European Quality Directive, removing sediment and even particles as small as viruses. The main supply to Carsphairn is burn intake and the new plant equipment will be able to purify up to 3,000 litres per hour. Completion date is scheduled for March and an official opening ceremony is being considered.

The new Lochinvar water treatment works is being built to guarantee water quality for the future. It is strategically very important since it will supply water to communities from Dalry to the outskirts of Dumfries. With a maximum capacity of 6.5 million litres per day and a cost of £6.7 million, the three stage treatment process consists of clarification, primary and secondary filtration with onsite sludge treatment.
