## DALRY PLAYPARK PROGRESS

The Dalry Playpark project has taken a big step forward by broadening its base within the local community.

Many (male) owners of tom cats are particularly reluctant to subject their pets to the "unkindest cut", thinking that the cat's quality of life is somehow poorer for being neutered. If only they could see some of the battered, bedraggled specimens of tomhood who end up in the care of charities such as Cats Protection. Un-neutered cats roam far and wide looking for potential mates — and remember, we are talking strictly one night stands here! Cats are simply following their instincts; tom cats are frequently involved in fights with other males and are statistically most likely of all cats to be the victims of a road traffic accident. A terrible price to pay for the short-lived joys of procreation!

As far as female cats are concerned, here are a couple of sobering facts: first, a female can have up to three litters per year, with five or six kittens per litter. Second, a female can be responsible for 20,000 descendants over five years.



#### NEW GALLOWAY COMMUNITY HORIZONS INITIATIVE UPDATE

Since the last update, Mr.Russell who was engaged as researcher for the project, has completed the content for the new tourist leaflet which will be of similar style to the one produced by Newton Stewart and will shortly be available for distribution through the Tourist Board and local outlets. The aim of the leaflet is to attract visitors to the area and once they are here enable them to find out about the local history and folkfore. Mr.Russell has also produced a leaflet outlining the history of the burgh and its buildings. All of this information will be incorporated into the new website which is being developed in conjunction with Mr. Woothouse, In the longer term a comprehensive history book will be published ( planned for 2002 ) together with a condensed booklet.

Due to the volume of interesting old photographs and artefacts that have been uncarthed, it is also planned to publish a collection of the photographs as part of the "Dumfries & Galloway Through the Lens" series of books (no.21), the target launch date being November 2001. An exhibition is planned for the summer in the Town Hall, so if you have any old photographs or books you would be willing to lend (or have copied) for use in the exhibition, please phone either R.Russell 420357 or B.Edgar 420288.

There was also a meeting held to reform the Gala Committee, and although fewer people than expected turned up on the night it was agreed to continue efforts to re-establish a working committee. A further meeting was planned for Monday 19th Merch at 7.30 pm in the Town Hall when everyone who has previously expressed an interest is asked to attend along with invited representatives from other local organisations. The Gala Committee constitution states that the New Galloway event should alternate with the Clachan Fair and it would therefore probably be next year before any major event was staged. This year's calendar is not entirely blank however as the committee have already agreed to host the famous Scottish Alternative Games, formerly held in Parton, on the first Sunday in August.



## BURNS SUPPER AT DALRY PRIMARY SCHOOL

All the preparations for P5, 6 & 7's Burns Supper came to a head on Friday, 26th January 2001 with a splendid and most professionally produced Burns Supper; a truly suitable tribute to the famous Scottish and internationally renowned Bard.

The school's "Haggis Bash Production Team" involved every member of the three classes in more than one capacity. Such was the commitment and dedication to a fine result that the preparations spanned half a day a week over four months. During that time, every element of the day had been addressed from the design and production of centre-pieces in the shape of Burns' Cottage, candle holders, Bill O' Fares and place mats to research into Robbie's life and writing in order to create the best possible celebration!

Come the day, kilted and practised to perfection, the pupils assembled with their invited guests led by Mr. Callander and Mr. Grierson in Dalry School's atmospherically decorated cafeteria. Indeed, Robbie would have been proud of the way "Tam O' Shanter" had been depicted in art form which included murals of "the dead in their last dresses" and indeed there sat "Auld Nick, in shape o' beast.... To gie them music." Actually, Dalry has their own talented piper, Euan Shaw, who supplied the pipe music with such style and vigour that it could be heard echoing in the hills around.

With the haggis piped in, Michelle Murdoch in the role of "Poussie Nancy" led Kieran Tulbure with Tamsin Tyeson to "Address The Haggis". Andrew Kirkpatrick gave a moving reading of Burns "Selkirk Grace" before the meal of cock-aleekie soup, haggis, neeps, tatties followed by bannocks and Scottish cheese. Everyone agreed that the traditional meal, produced in school with the assistance of staff and pupils alike had been a great success: notably the haggis was itself "warm, reekin' rich!" The menu and other items had been financed partly by funds raised by the children and by generous local contributions including neeps and tatties.

Tim McNaught had the pleasure of initially welcoming everyone and Kieran Tulbure continued as Chairperson. Kieran brilliantly met this challenge with suitable and witty comments along the way. Kim Wheeler delivered a really memorable "Immortal Memory" with the reminder that due to Burns we as Scots have nurtured a tradition to stay true to nature with our feet firmly on the ground and never to forget to "see ourselves as others see us"! This was followed by a very moving rendition of "My Love Is Like A Red, Red Rose" sung by Gordon Young.

"To The Lassies" by Matthew Smith and "To The Laddies" by Jennifer Comrie stood side by side in terms of both quality and originality. Robbie would have laughed at the modern day analogies and the respective sentiments of:

"Whilst you read your book And get a job I'll keep your house While you earn some bob"

And:

"If I was a football,
They'd love me most dearly
If I was a bit of hair gel,
They'd squeeze me most sincerely."

The happy celebration concluded with an eloquently expressed "Vote Of Thanks" delivered by Ben Trueman followed by songs of Burns: "Ye Banks And Braes", "Scots Wa hae" and of course "Auld Lang Syne" accompanied by Kim Wheeler on the violin with Vicky McSkimming and Matthew Smith on the clarinet.

Special thanks to Morag Thomson, who guided the project along its path, were given and floral tributes were presented to numerous guests and voluntary helpers. Mrs. Thomson made presentations of certificates to the winners of The Burns Competition: P5 Tamsin Tyeson, P6 Kim Wheeler and P7 Kieran Tulbure. The overall winner was Tamsin Tyeson who was presented with a beautiful shield.

Mr. Murdo Morrison was true to his word and warm greetings were duly received from him and the friends of Burns in America. So, once again Burns has been remembered far and wide, has succeeded in joining continents and the youth of Dalry have become more closely acquainted with their heritage upon which with pride they will grow. As past meets present and children in countries communicate, an example so excellently set by Dalry Primary School, so,an optimistic future may await.

# Do You Remember When?

# ......There was a shoemaker in Dalry, before the 2nd World War.

Robbie Dalziel, who was born in the original Underhill and celebrated his 85th birthday last December, was part of the family business of shoemakers, along with his father and brother. Robbie, who left school in 1930, was apprenticed to his father, who was a postman – a tradition continued by Robbie himself when between 1936 and 1940 he did a few hours as postman in the mornings, worked as a shoemaker in the afternoons then an hour or two more on the post before working long into the evenings back with his shoes. Robbie remembers that sometimes on Thursdays and Fridays, work might carry on 'till the wee small hours' so that folk would have new shoes for the weekends.

Much of the work done in the shop was the making of boots for the shepherds – a good pair cost about £3 in the 1930's and lasted 2-3 years, at which point they were taken back to the shop, the soles removed and the leather uppers put onto birchwood to make sturdy clogs which would then be serviceable for another couple of years. Many skills were needed – even the laces were made by hand.

In 1940 Robbie joined up and took his first train ride to Chester-le-Street, where he saw a notice asking for shoe-makers: he spent his army years at places such as Catterick, Chandlers Ford and in India at Hyderbad, making sure the men had good sound footwear to fight in, and so was able to keep his skills going even when far from the family shop.

While stationed in Kings Lynn, Robbie met his wife-to-be, "a lovely Irish lass" who was a cook in the hospital there. They returned to Dalry and were married for 53 years before she sadly died a few years ago. The shoemaking business unfortunately did not survive the economic upheaval caused by the war and Robbie worked for a while at road-building before joining Scottish Power for 33 years. Robbie has a large family of children, grandchildren (14) and great-grandchildren (3) who are all doing

well and of whom he is very proud – but not a shoemaker between them!
