GLENKENS ARTS AND COMMUNITY TRUST LAUNCHED

The Trust is made up of people from the four parishes and is working with Solway Heritage to develop the property. They have been awarded £4,000 towards the feasibility study by the council's Stewartry Area Committee.

Trust Chair Cathy Agnew said, "This is a very ambitious and exciting project for the Glenkens and a fundraising campaign will soon be under way. Anyone who would

TOP MARKS FOR LOCAL SCHOOL

Galloway and Upper Nithsdale representative in the Scottish Parliament, Alasdair Morgan, has welcomed the results of a Sunday Times survey of all Scottish secondary schools. The survey which ranked schools according to their examination performance between 1996 and 1999, found that closure-threatened Dalry Secondary School was the seventh-best secondary school in the country.


The local Scottish National Party MSP also welcomed the good placings achieved by other secondary schools within the Galloway & Upper Nithsdale constituency, as Castle Douglas came in eighth with Dalbeattie High and Wallace Hall Academy, Thornhill also in the top fifty.

It is hoped it will ink the four parishes of the Glenkens for the benefit of residents and tourists. The fact that it will link the communities is important because we have got to market ourselves as "the Glenkens" and in the wake of the foot and mouth crisis we have to be seen as helping ourselves." The Community Horizons survey and open days found a need for a focal point for the village which was accessible to all the community. The old school building was identified as a possible venue for developing as an arts centre and a focal point for tourism in the area. The building came on to the open market for sale and the community council felt that all efforts should be made to purchase the building. The trust hopes to nurture and encourage local arts and crafts talent. Its visitor centre would provide a focal point for the Glenkens and surrounding area as well as providing links to existing tourist and leisure attractions.

The information technology business centre would provide computer and internet access, good quality copying facilities and offer space for small business units.

Commenting on the survey, Mr. Morgan said; "It is very rewarding to see local secondary schools performing so well in this survey and this serves to confirm what many of us have known for some time—that Dumfries & Galloway contains some of the best schools in Scotland. Congratulations must go to all the staff, pupils and parents at the schools that have won these plaudits. Of course, the school that performed the best of all our schools was Dalry Secondary, which by some quirk of logic, is also the Galloway secondary school to find itself on the closure list put forward by Turner & Townsend. I am sceptical of the thinking behind the whole school closure process that the council is currently embarking upon, but the Sunday Times survey really brings home the extent of the massive foolishness that is being proposed.

As a community, the people of South-West Scotland must tell the council, at every available opportunity, that we want them to build educational success in Dumfries & Galloway, not destroy it."

NEW GALLOWAY, OUR HISTORIC BURGH PART VI THE LOCAL COVENANTERS

Much has been written about the Covenanters in Galloway but little is known of New Galloway's connections with these cruel times.

The minister of Kells Parish in the early 1660's was Rev. John Cant and when in 1662 the Drunken Parliament, (so called because the only sober member of the Privy Council at that meeting was Sir James Lockhart of Lee) passed the Middleton Act, which removed all non-conformist ministers, Rev. Cant refused to conform. So he was ejected from his church and replaced by a "curate". However, he refused to leave his parish, remained at the manse, conducted services in the houses of his followers and carried out marriage and baptismal services in Kells.

In February 1663 a further Act was passed against some ministers in Galloway, Rev. Cant among them, for being the chief instruments in carrying on the wicked course of preaching and holding conventicles within their parishes, thus causing the newly placed "curates" to preach to an empty church. Rev. Cant was therefore ordered to remove himself, his family, servants and goods from the manse and out of the parish before 20th March 1663. He was ordered not to exercise any part of the ministerial function and charged to appear before the Privy Council to answer for his disobedience!

Yet another Act passed in 1663 ruled that anyone absent from church without good reason would be fined up to one quarter of his money and possessions and in some cases imprisoned. To enforce the Act, troops were placed in every town, village and hamlet in Galloway. With no responsible officers in charge, the troops ran amok, terrorising the poor country-folk and eating them out of house and home. Drunkenness and brutality were the order of the day. Between 1663 and 1666 the poor people of Kells were fined a total of £466 13s 6d (Scots), a lot of money in those days.

There were many uprisings against these cruel laws and in the late 1666 perhaps the best known, the Pentland Rising, led by the men of Dalry, took place. At Rullion Green in the Pentland Hills they were met by 3,000 government troops, all well armed and ready for battle. Many Covenanters were slaughtered and those who survived realised the battle was lost and headed for home. John Gordon from "Largmore" in Kells parish was seriously wounded but managed to reach home. He was ordered to be brought to Edinburgh but on hearing this, Gordon said he defied his persecutors, but forgave them. He added that he would soon be in better company and died shortly after. His son, Roger, was persecuted and hounded but managed to survive to return to "Largmore". He enjoyed a long and peaceful life after the Killing Times, and in 1714 he presented a bell and communion cups to Kells Church.



THE END OF AN ERA

The closure of the former police station and house in Ayr Road, Dalry, marks the end of an era of policing in the Glenkens. Most in the area still remember when New Galloway had its police station (closed 1977) but perhaps not so many will recall that Carsphairn once had its own station. Changes in the police regulations now give officers the right to choose where they live and they can no longer be compelled to live in police houses. Many officers wish to buy their own property and pay off their mortgage as quickly as possible which has resulted in a reluctance to move into police houses. This is the situation which arose in Dalry; despite being advertised throughout the force area, no suitable candidate was found to occupy the house. The Chief Constable was then faced with the dilemma regarding



The most cost-effective solution would have been to sell off the police station and house and police the area from Castle Douglas. Whilst this may have been financially attractive, the Chief Constable decided that such an option would not be acceptable to the public and would run contrary to the force's commitment to Community Policing. Accordingly the Chief Constable directed that efforts be made to identify other property in the area which could be converted to use as a police office, and act as a centre of operations for the Glenkens community officer. What was not an option, on grounds of cost, was maintaining the existing property.

As a result a new police office will soon open at The Mottehouse, Ayr Road, Dalry. A substantial part of the ground floor of the property has been leased to the Police who have spent a considerable sum in converting it for their use. The office will be fitted with the latest IT equipment linking it to the force's main computer system and have the capability to run a major incident room. It will also be used as a base for the Galloway Mountain Rescue Team as well as Police during any major hill searches in the surrounding hills.

The public can be reassured that the police are committed to maintaining a presence in the Glenkens and indeed further reassured that there will be no reduction in services as a result.

GLENKENS WEATHER REPORT

August Rainfall 83.8 mm 3.3in.

Wettest Day 20th with 26.3 mm

Warmest Day 24th 21C (70F)

Sunniest Day 21st with 9.8 hr/sun

Last August we had 193.2 mm of rain (48.7 mm fell on the 27th) and the warmest day was the 25th at 23.7C (74F)

September Rainfall 12.3 mm 5.09 in. (note: 3.4 in. fell in the last 4 days!)

Wettest Day 30th with 34.2 mm

Warmest Day

19th 19.5C (67F)

Sunniest Day

16th 10.5 hr/sun

Last September had 197.9 mm of rain (27.8 mm fell on the 27th) and the warmest day was the 2nd at 19.8C.

With regard to why we report so much rainfall and not enough sunshine, the reasons are two fold:

The sunshine recorder that now sits on the roof of the Glenlee Power Station has only been there a short while, having been removed from Clatteringshaws site and resituated here. Glenlee keep no records for sunshine and any data we do collect is sent to the Met. Office at their request.

2 Rainfall has obviously always been an important part of the scheme here; records go back as far as 1937 and this is why we can give such accurate reports on how much has fallen over the years.

It is with regret that I cannot give much information on sunshine. Maybe back in 1923, if Messrs Maxwell, Elliot and McClellan had discussed the possibility of solar power instead of Hydro power in this area, these reports would have been a lot different and sunnier!



WIND ENERGY PLANS FOR THE GALLOWAY HILLS



Pictured above are Giles Dearden, Project Manager and Neil Douglas, Wind Farm Engineer at a recent public exhibition held in Carsphairn Community Village Hall. Plans have been announced by Natural Power Consultants for a 36 turbine extension to the existing wind farm at Windy Standard in the Galloway Hills close to the East Ayrshire border.


The extended site would be capable of an additional 72 megawatts of green electricity, enough to satisfy the domestic electricity demand of 85% of households in Dumfries and Galloway. The existing 36 turbine wind farm at Windy Standard generates approximately 22 megawatts of power. The extension would double the number of turbines on the site and through improved efficiency in the technology used, the new site would provide an increase in power of 330%!

As well as providing substantial environmental benefits, the Windy Standard extension could provide up to 50 construction jobs and around £7 million of sub-contract opportunities for local contractors, during its 7 to 12 month construction period.

All members of the public were invited to the exhibitions to give members of the team their views on the proposals before the plans are finalised. Following consultation any planning application would be submitted to the Scottish Executive. All wind farm proposals that would generate more than 50 megawatts of electricity are obliged to go to the Scottish Executive for determination. Dumfries & Galloway Council and East Ayrshire Council would remain as statutory consultees.

The extended site is located in the hills above Carsphairn Forest, 8 km north east of the village and 10 km south of New Cumnock. The site consists of open hill land within an area of commercial forestry and forms a natural extension to the existing wind farm. There are no views of the extended wind farm from Carsphairn and minimal views from New Cumnock. The closest property lies 2 km from the site and there are only a handful of other properties in the immediate locale.

Director Stuart Hall of Natural Power Consultants, said "The site was originally chosen for the existing Windy Standard wind farm in the mid nineties and benefits from minimal visual and ecological impact. Since its construction in October 1996, there has been excellent feedback about Windy Standard from the local community and the site itself is ideally suited for the proposed extension". The extended Windy Standard wind farm will make significant contributions towards the Governments targets for ten per cent of all UK electricity production to come from renewable energy by 2010, to help combat climate change. To date, only two percent of the UK's electricity is generated by renewable resources. For Scotland, the proposed extension would contribute some 13.4% towards the Scottish Supplies Obligation.



PLAYPARK PROGRESSES

Good news came recently when Dahy Playpark Association were awarded £55,000 by the Community Fund. The award will form part of the funding package totalling £77,000, which will allow the association to complete its plans for a substantial landscaped park with picnic facilities on the edge of the village near the school.


