A SURPRISE VISIT: Large spotted cat in Carsphairn!

On Thursday 28th October, 2004 when we came in from lunch we did our corrections and started our RE. Mrs Tamkin (our teacher) started acting all strange. A little while later Miss Rutherford came into the classroom and asked us to line up at the door in size order. When we were in order we went along to the other classroom. It turned out to be a jaguar cub called Aries!

Jaguars come from South America. They eat quite a few things like terrapins, armadillos, small deer and other small animals. Once at Dartmoor they had put some terrapins in the moat round the jaguars' enclosure and the jaguars fished them out and ate them all! They tried goldfish as well, but the jaguars ate them, too.

Robert took Aries out on a lead and we were all allowed to stroke him. He was so soft and cuddly. When we had all stroked him Robert put Aries back in the crate and told us more about jaguars.

As Aries had been in the crate for a long time Robert took him for a walk in the playground. He chased our feet and had great fun playing on the tyres. It was lucky that he was on a lead, or we might have gone home with no feet! He also got his photo taken by a photographer from the Sunday Mail.

When we went back inside Miss Rutherford found some old cardboard tubes for Aries to play with so that he would stop chewing Robert's arm. Aries loved the tubes and attacked them just like a domestic

kitten, pouncing on them and tearing them to bits. Then Robert asked us if we had any questions.

It was time to go home and some of the mums came in and took photos of Aries. We all loved the visit from Aries as it was a once in a lifetime opportunity to be so close to a wild animal.



LOCAL AUTHOR LAUNCHES A PECULIAR FIRST BOOK



Anna Neil, originally from New Galloway, has just published her first book, A Bunch of Peculiars, ISBN: 1 904827 20 9, RRP £3.99. A rainbow nose, butterfly ears, a teacup mouth...anything is possible in Anna's whimsical world of A Bunch of Peculiars. Delightfully weird and wonderfully wacky, the hardback book combines offbeat humour and stunning illustrations by Germano Ovani, to create a compact treasury of fantastical facial characteristics.

The whimsical volume of extraordinary features was recently launched in Edinburgh. The book's connection with the Glenkens, and specially with GCAT, was much in evidence at the launch. The guests included the GCAT Chairman Cathy Agnew, members of Anna's family and representatives from the publisher of the book, Keppel Publishing. An eyecatching bunch of peculiar flowers, inspired by the cover of the book, was commissioned for the event and made by Edinburgh College of Art student, Petra Pennington, whose parents also live in New Galloway.

Anna is the eldest daughter of well known local doctors, Shelagh and John Neil. She is a graduate of Edinburgh College of Art and recently completed post-graduate studies in text and performance at King's College and the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts in London. Anna is currently based in London.

Anna originally wrote and produced the book as a birthday present for a friend who happens to be very fond of noses. She sums up the book as "frivolous nonsense – in the best possible way" and thinks it will appeal "because people love a bit of good old fashioned silliness".

Anna, Germano and the book have just been featured in BBC Radio Scotland, The Arts Show (28 October 2004). Anna will be signing copies of her new book at GCAT Shop in the High Street, New Galloway on Tuesday 21st December at 4.30pm, cheese and wine will be served.





BALMACLELLAN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the October meeting, P.C. Wilson was introduced as the new community police officer for the Glenkens. He plans to spend more time in the area than has previously been the case, and this was welcomed. He explained the reason for delay in implementing the Neighbourhood Watch scheme. This is being re-vamped, and full information will be coming out to coordinators early in the New Year.

The Jubilee Walk plinth, by the war memorial, has now been completed with its information display board, and forms a matching pair with the adjacent viewfinder. Thanks are due to Mr John Hilsley for providing the building stone.

The first stage of the refurbishment work on the village hall is now finished, except for external painting, which will be carried out in the spring. The planning for the second stage, involving mostly the interior arrangements, will need to take account of the disability provisions now required by law.

The annual bonfire party on Guy Fawkes Night was again a great success. A good turn-out, on a threatening evening which however remained dry, enjoyed a splendid fireworks display and refreshments. The help of all who contributed to the event is much appreciated.

On Remembrance Sunday, the wreath was laid at the war memorial by Corporal Johrine Devlin, who is pursuing a nursing career in the army. She is already a "veteran" of the Iraq conflict, having served two tours of duty there.

THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the October meeting we welcomed our new Community Constable, P.C. Ian Wilson as he outlined his intended approach to policing our area. The councillors were pleased to note that he is very keen to spend as much of his duty time as possible in the Glenkens and will aim for a high visibility presence, on foot around the streets. He urged people to report incidents at the time so that appropriate action can be taken.

The meeting was also attended at our invitation by council official Ann Sweetin, Area Business Manager for the Stewartry Area. We particularly wanted to raise issues relating to New Galloway Town Hall, which is obviously requiring considerable work in order to make it meet the new Disabled Access requirements. The present shortcomings had already resulted in some public meetings having to change venue – the October Area Committee meeting which would normally have been in the Hall was changed to Balmaclellan Village Hall. The Council's Disabled Access Officer, Paul McCulloch would visit the Town Hall as soon as possible to carry out a full inspection and evaluation.

Other issues regarding the Hall were also brought to Ann's attention namely the lack of exterior maintenance, poor catering facilities, condition of lower hall floor, paintwork in rear stairwell, dampness at front entrance and the cost and conditions of hire. All of the points would be passed to the appropriate department for action.

The Public Toilets in the Stewartry are currently undergoing a review process with considerable improvements apparently planned for the other towns but as yet no mention of New Galloway! The 'portaloos' sited in the lower car park as a 'temporary measure' some twenty years ago are totally inadequate and the permanent tollet block on the High Street was also outdated with no disabled facility. An urgent review was therefore required and the relevant council official has arranged to make a site visit with Community Council representatives as soon as possible.

Continuing queries regarding the conservation area and the resultant planning restrictions involved would be addressed by a

future visit from a planning official but in the meantime a street plan would be provided showing the exact boundaries of the area within the town.

Ann Sweetin also drew our attention to the council's 'Quality of Life' fund, which is administered by the Area Committees and is available on application for environmental improvement projects within communities. We would consider this for possible future projects such as improving car parking, enhancing flower beds etc.

At the November meeting we welcomed Lindy Renwick and Julia Brown from the recently formed Glenkens Affordable Housing Group. We were interested to hear of the Group's encouraging progress to date and their plans for the future. We fully appreciate the need for more affordable housing in the area, an issue we have discussed many times in the past and look forward to supporting the Group in their aims. They are currently undertaking a survey and anyone who has experienced any difficulty in obtaining suitable accommodation to rent or buy is encouraged to take part.

The Festive Season is fast approaching again and Christmas Trees have been ordered, decorations organised and this year's Senior Citizens Christmas Lunch has been arranged for Sunday 12th December at 1.00pm in the Kenmure Arms Hotel. As always, all Senior Citizens of the parish are cordially invited to attend – please add your name to one of the booking lists in Hopkins Shop, The Glenkens Hair Studio, New Galloway Post Office or Mossdale Shop. Alternatively you can telephone 420288. Please come along and enjoy the Christmas Fare, good company, friendly atmosphere and musical entertainment. The Community Minibus will be available again, please let us know when you book if you would like transport.

DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Loose dogs - PC Wilson reported action was being taken to contain the dogs. This would be continued if there were further problems.

The Youth shelter will go ahead - the Community Council supports the play park site.

The Bus Shelter is now up - it has been suggested that timetables should be displayed on site.

Andrew Case reported that the undergrowth on the Motte is dying back. Volunteers will be named for clearing. This is now in hand.

Police Matters: Complaints have been made about phone calls asking for bank details, and internet phone connections being diverted to premium lines. This scam seems to be increasing, two press releases have been issued with phone contact numbers. These are:- (Bank details) Ofcom Contact Centre 0845 456 3000 and (internet) ICSTIS 0800 500 212. It was suggested that A4 posters with this information should be displayed in local shops. These will be provided by PC Wilson. The new firework regulations are now in force as to times when fireworks can be used. Complaints of inconsiderate behaviour by log lorries travelling too fast, in convoy, using mobile phones - PC Wilson explained the 'Weli Driven' scheme where the number 0800 225533 is displayed on the rear of the lorry. If this number is phoned then corrective action will be taken.

POOR HOUSE PLANK



CARSPHAIRN HERITAGE AGM

Carsphairn Heritage Group recently held its Annual General Meeting. The chairman, Mrs Campbell commented on the events of the year. The exhibition (A Carsphairn family –300 years at Knockgray) was a great success – so much so that for the first time an exhibition has been extended for another season. Knockgray was bought in December 1704 so whilst the planning of the purchase took place that year it really did not belong to the family until the very end of the year! A successful afternoon trip was made to Cralgengillan at Dalmellington and the buffet supper with the talk by Margaret Roberts of Shambellie was another highlight.

The success of an association such as Carsphairn Heritage Group depends on people. Over 1500 visitors came to the exhibition this year and their comments in the visitors book reflect their pleasure not only of an outstanding exhibition but of the welcome given by the volunteer stewards. Over 30 stewards have given their time and they have shared their local expertise and love for the area. Mrs Campbell emphasised that the group could not function without the stewards' input.

The group has 80 individual and family memberships from all over Britain and several from overseas all of whom receive a quarterly newsletter. Each one features articles about local history pertaining to Carsphairn and often the Glenkens. Number 68 has just been published – there has never been a shortage of material for the newsletter!

Mrs Campbell reflected on the amount of work done by the committee who research, prepare, mount the material and organise the very successful annual buffet supper. Few of the current committee members live in the parish and this reflects the wider interests of the Glenkens.

Mrs Agnes Holden, treasurer, presented a full statement of the accounts and highlighted the amount of donations given by visitors. Sales were up and it was also noted that local arts and crafts sold well in the Centre.

In summary this has been a good year for the Group, supported by a diverse and talented committee, backed by a team of welcoming stewards and visited in person and by internet (www.carsphairnheritage.co.uk) by people from all over the world.


BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS FOR DALRY WOMEN'S GUILD



GALLOWAY GOES TO LONDON

At the beginning of November members of GCAT's staff and Board, together with their architects and professional advisers, set foot for London to host a Reception and give a Presentation about The Glenkens Centre.

Attended by over 130 people – with strong Galloway/London links and connections – the evening was held at the Fine Art Society in New Bond Street where they were treated to wine and canapés. For the more formal part of the event, Vice-Chairman Brian Edgar set the scene by explaining where the Glenkens is, together with its geographical, environmental, and economic status, before outlining the overall context of The Glenkens Centre project. This was followed by a brief power-point presentation by architects Patrick Lorimer and Gordon Fleming of ARP Lorimer in which they were able to show greater detail of their plans for this multi-purpose building.

Cathy Agnew, GCAT's Chairman, rounded things off by explaining the main purpose of the evening. People had been invited specifically because of their links and ties with Galloway and GCAT was asking them for their help and advice in achieving their aim — that of creating an exciting and vibrant centre that would make a very real difference to the lives of those living in and visiting the Glenkens. She went on to say that the evening wasn't just about fund-raising but was looking to develop the Three 'P's — Profile, Programme and Patronage — not just for now but for the years to come and for the benefit of future generations.

As people left the Gallery, they were given a special GCAT folder containing supporting information about the project and about the Glenkens, together with a GCATalogue — a sort of shopping list giving them ideas of how they might like to contribute.

Reaction to the presentation so far has been extremely positive but it's too soon to say how much money has been raised. Heartened by such encouragement, GCAT is planning similar events in both Edinburgh and Glasgow in the New Year.

subjects and, as with all Liz's poetry, explores a variety of carefully chosen voices and captivating scenarios. The book considers issues of ownership of various forms – ownership of land and beast, people and emotions. Liz will be reading from the book and will be happy to answer questions from the audience.

There will be an opportunity for some Christmas shopping too, as Liz will be signing copies of Burning Whins which will be available to purchase!

THE GLENKENS CENTRE UPDATE

GCAT received funding last month towards the development of the centre as well as for setting up a new community project.

The Development Trust Association (DTA) awarded a grant of nearly £5000 towards the capital costs of the project. GCAT also received a grant from The Partnership Fund which is an initiative set up by the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) to assist elderly and retired people access the support and financial assistance they are entitled to and to help them to maintain their independence. This funding will allow GCAT to employ someone on a part time basis for two years to carry out this support. The post will begin in April 2005.

Progress has also been made in providing the centre with a sustainable energy system. The aim is to incorporate a heating source fuelfed by wood pellets. Although this sounds like quite a low-tech system, it is actually a highly evolved, technically advanced process which is environmentally friendly and cost-effective, and many times more efficient than wood-chip systems. In addition, the wood pellets are a renewable resource and will have a further advantage in that they will protect the centre from the unpredictability of future oil prices. There are also a number of grants currently available to encourage this type of scheme which are not available for traditional oil or electricity systems.

VIKING RAIDERS IN DALRY!



Visit of Dumfries and County Golf Professional Stuart Syme to Dalry School funded by The Kirkcudbrightshire Golfers Association on the 12th and 14th October 2004



A scheme set up by Brian Duguid of Dumfries and County Golf Club and Kirkcudbrightshire Golfers Association provided funds for professional golf coaching at Dalry School.

This process started with a meeting with Brian at The County Golf Club, where Brian, on behalf of the K.G.A. expressed a desire to support schools' golf. Brian agreed to fund 8 hours of lessons by Stuart on Tuesday 12th and Thursday 14th October 2004. Brian also agreed to purchase third distance golf balls for use in the school grounds.

My job as Sole Teacher of P.E. and Active School Co-ordinator at Dalry School was to get as many interested pupils as possible through the golf coaching process. At Dalry School we already have a tradition of golf development. Golf is taught as part of the curriculum starting with Tri-Golf in the primary school and we also have golf as one of our standard grade P.E. components in 3rd and 4th year in our secondary school. Golf is also offered to pupils on Wednesday afternoons as part of our Wednesday afternoon

activities outdoor section. New Galloway Golf Club very kindly granted the school free membership in July 2000 and we have used the golf course on a fairly regular basis since then. We also make use of The Golf Foundation coaching scheme, which helps with the cost of coaching given by a PGA Professional. In the days of The National Golf Academy our school enjoyed several free School Sport Coordinator golf coaching packages funded by The Scottish Junior Golf Partnership.

As a small rural school we were delighted to accept this opportunity to further develop our golf skills and knowledge of the game through the expert tultion of Stuart Syme the Dumfries and County Golf Club Professional. A total of 40 primary and secondary pupils benefitted from this opportunity. The pupils' ages ranged from 7 to 16 years of age. The pupils each received two hours of coaching over the two days of Stuart's visit. The progression beyond this tuition is for our pupils to join New Galloway golf club as a junior member and to continue to develop their golfing skills and knowledge of the game. My role as sole teacher of P.E. and active schools coordinator at Dalry School is to provide as many golfing experiences as I can to aid the progression of our youngsters,

On behalf of Dairy School I would like to take this opportunity to thank Brian Duguid and the Kirkcudbrightshire Golfers Association for funding this project and to Stuart Syme for his expert and patient development of our pupils over two days. I also look forward to the next opportunity of this kind for the continued golf development and progression of our pupils at Dairy School.



We were led into a large room that had different statues around it, and an amazing painting that bordered the whole balcony above us. After meeting our guide Claudia, she led us into a more modern looking room, with cream walls. This exhibit which was called "Finding Faith", featured many different people from many different faiths in a photograph standing the same way, with their place of worship behind them. 


