

LOCAL ARTISTS Isobel Lundie, Balmaclellan

Isobel Lundie is an artist with a particular interest in the practice of printmaking. She works from her home in Balmaclellan where she is in the process of developing a studio. She works in a variety of mediums, including drypoint, mono-print and lino-etch.



"Most of my work is influenced by change," says Isobel. "For example, cliffs and rock formations that have been eroded by wind, rain and sea, creating new forms. Similarly, tree stumps, gradually rotting and destroyed by woodlice, displaying a more rapid form of alteration"

GORSE

Gorse, also known as whin, is a spiny, much branched, evergreen shrub of the pea family. It is most noticeable on hillsides in spring and early summer as patches of bright yellow.

Gorse will tolerate a wide range of conditions, but prefers a sheltered position on sloping ground with adequate drainage. Being a member of the pea family it can improve its growth prospects by fixing atmospheric nitrogen, allowing it to colonise areas of nutritionally poor soil, but the process will be restricted in cold wet soil. Where it does find the right conditions it can become an invasive weed, increasing mainly by seed to form dense and prickly clumps. Left alone it can grow to 2 metres high. Gorse, native to western and central Europe, has been spread far and wide and is now a classed as a weed in more than 30 countries.

The shiny intensely coloured flowers, attractive to bees, are 12-18mm long on 3-5mm stalks. Seed pods, 10-20mm long, turn black and ripen in July. Seeds are heat-tolerant, have hard water-impermeable coats and remain capable of germination for 30 years. Soil disturbance encourages germination.

The dense structure of gorse is ideal for nesting and sheltering birds.

BALMACLELLAN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

After the Christmas break, monthly meetings were held in January and February. There was a sparse response to the request for information about the working of the Out of Hours Healthcare Service. One critical written submission had been received, and two verbal comments, one favourable and one critical. All the area feed-back will be collated by the Convention of Galloway Community Councils and passed to the Stewartry Area Committee.

Dumfries and Galloway Council's plans for recycling bins in every village has been a subject of discussion, with a surprising number of aspects emerging to be considered. The final decision was to accept the proposed scheme, utilising space available at the side of the village hall, which has good access without being unsightly.

There were no significant developments in respect of the proposed Blackcraig Windfarm. The scoping report is now available, setting out what is expected to be covered in the environmental impact assessment now being prepared by the developers. The initial proposals included alternative arrangements of 45 and 29 turbines. In the scoping report the maximum number is given as 31. Finalised proposals are now awaited before seeking community views. The desirability of lialson within the Glenkens communities is recognised.

It was agreed to raise no objection to a further development of three houses near to Ken Bridge. It was, however, noted that there had been complaint about the alleged excessive level of lighting at the recently completed nearby site.

A report in the Galloway News noted a proposal to alter community council boundaries to transfer part of Balmaclellan into Corsock. No official notification has been received.

The March meeting, which would have fallen on Easter Monday has been cancelled. The next meeting on 25 April will be preceded by the A.G.M. It is hoped that members of the community will take the opportunity to receive the annual reports, to elect a chairman and to participate in any discussion.

THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Adam Mitchell, Youth Development Worker, attended the February meeting to discuss progressing the Youth Shelter. The plans had been drawn up and passed some time ago and the funding agreed by Dumfries and Galloway Council. The site was decided on after consultation with the young people of the area, the police and the council. Our shelter is based on the design of the one in Kirkcudbright and it is hoped that it will be as popular and successful as the Youth Shelters have proved to be in the other Stewartry towns.

The printed commemorative bags had been received and presented to Kells School Choir before their trip to the BBC Songs of Praise Finals in Birmingham. The choir were runners up in the competition and had thoroughly enjoyed the experience of singing in the Symphony Hall and were preparing to enter the competition again next year. In recognition of the schools tremendous achievement the Community Council have arranged a Civic Reception on March 30th in New Galloway Town Hall. They will perform their choir pieces at 6.30pm for anyone who would like to come along, admission free. The civic reception will be at 7.30pm for choir members, their parents, the school staff and their invited guests. The choir will then sing again for the guests at 8.15pm.

The Issue of car parking along the west bank of Loch Ken during fishing competitions was raised again as there are several more competitions coming up shortly. It was felt that we should try to progress this long-standing issue through the Loch Ken Management Committee as they have ongoing contact with relevant landowners and have already looked at the problem in the past, leading to some improvements mainly on the east bank. The matter would be raised at their March meeting.

It was noted at our February and March meetings that there had very little feedback at all on the new out of hours medical service. As a result of the public meetings and concern expressed prior to the service being introduced, all Comminity Councils in the area had been asked to gather any experiences, positive and negative, of the new service. A collection had been arranged for Mr. Eric Taylor on his retirement from

the Post Office after 17 years, Mr. and Mrs. Taylor have been invited as special guests to the Kelis School concert and reception on 30th March when the presentation will be made.

DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Discussions at the February meeting included the progress of various issues continued from previous meetings: members of the Playpark Association are to meet to finalise their view on the location of the Youth Shelter; feedback from users of the new out-of-hours medical cover facility is still required; arrangements for the tidy up of the Motte are in hand and this will take place with the arrival of better weather; repair and maintenance issues regarding pavements, roads and lighting were reported.

The views of various groups and individuals within the community are being sought regarding a possible entry into the Britain in Bloom contest. Members will discuss residents' views and the setting up of an organising committee at their next meeting.

The Chairman reported his on-going discussions with the Chairman of Balmaclelian Community Council regarding proposed wind farm development in the area. Details of relevant meetings were circulated to the group.

Phase 1 of the Glenkens Walking Initiative developments are still on target to be completed within the current financial year.

Members were interested to see a map delineating the new proposed boundary of the Planning Relaxation Scheme.

A location within the village is being sought for the installation of bottle banks.

RENEWABLE ENERGY DISCUSSION AT DALRY

Dairy Town Hall hosted a Renewable Energy Information Event in March with guest speakers Labour MP Russell Brown and Professor David Bellamy. Over a hundred and fifty people packed into the hall and a number of issues were raised and debated.

Russell Brown is Labour MP for Dumfries but under the new boundary changes he is also Prospective Candidate for the new seat of Dumfries and Galloway. He joined David Bellamy on the platform on Saturday at the Renewable Energy Coffee Morning hosted by GLARE, Galloway Landscape And Renewable Energy. Mr Brown agreed with Professor Bellamy's opinion that building a windfarm on Blackcraig near Balmaclellan would be inappropriate, although he did not support Professor Bellamy's call for an end to all windfarm development.


Looking at presentations from pupils at Dalry High School on the subject 'What makes a low energy light bulb different from any other kind' both Professor Bellamy and Russell Brown congratulated the teenagers on their excellent grasp of the facts. 'Though they may seem a bit more expensive low energy light bulbs save money, energy and CO2 emissions and consequently our precious environment,' commented Professor Bellamy, who handed out Easter eggs and a low energy bulb to Billy Harwood, one of the prize winners.

In his address Russell Brown MP reminded the audience we have a lot to learn from our children who are getting the message about helping the environment as he had seen for himself on a recent trip to Dairy School. If think we should begin to educate ourselves as well. There is no doubt the issue of energy supply in the long term needs to be addressed. Wind technology has a part to play in the solution but we also need to invest in other technologies such as photovoltaic and tidal.'

Commenting on the success of the renewable energy information event, GLARE Co-ordinator Alison Chapman said: 'Increasingly people are coming to the realisation that they can save money, help themselves and the environment by investing in small-scale renewables for which there are grants, such as solar tubes. They can buy low energy light bulbs, switch off the stand-by button and get up to work the tv instead of using almost as much power as it takes to have it on stand-by. Anyone wanting information about local, sustainable renewable energy technology and grants available to support its installation is very welcome to contact GLARE at PO Box 7479, Castle Douglas DG7 3WX.'

DUMFRIES AND GALLOWAY BEFRIENDING PROJECT

Galloway Dumfries and Befriending Project, a voluntary organisation set up in 1997. has as its main objective 'to recruit, train and match adult with vulnerable volunteers young people as a means of making a positive difference in a young person's life'. The young people may be experiencing problems at home, school or in the community and having time with a befriender gives young person individual attention and release from dayto-day pressures. In tandem, Befrienders too say they have a chance to "enjoy good fun, share experiences and learn with the child they are matched



with" as well as meeting other people and knowing they are doing some good.

Befrienders meet their young person once a week to share a variety of activities, e.g. swimming, arts and crafts, walking the dog, going to the local theatre, enjoying a snack together or simply just window shopping. One befriender says of her young person "she is a very talkative person, amusing and is really good company. In the short time I have known her, she has told me of her past — in small pleces, and her hopes and dreams for the future. She brings me her report card from school, and photographs of activities she has done with her family".

Befrienders come from all walks of life and generally have an interest in young people. They don't need to have previous experience of voluntary work, as training is given in a variety of topics such as: What is Befriending?, Health and Safety and Child Protection. All a befriender has to give is his/her time — a couple of hours each week with a young person and attendance at 6-8 week review meetings — as all travel and out-of-pocket expenses are paid.



NEW GALLOWAY -Our Historic Burgh

More Customs And Superstitions

Eastern's E'en, or Shrove Tuesday, was the day when cockfights were organised at the schools in the Glenkens. The best cocks were found in this area, and New Galloway was always famous for its cockfights. Each scholar who brought a cock paid 12 pence Scots, and those who did not bring one paid 2/- Scots by way of compensation! No other persons were allowed into the school, on that day except for "Gentlemen and Persons of note", from whom no money was demanded!

One Baillie in New Galloway owned a very special cock, said to be absolutely unbeatable. It was apparently covered in oil before every fight, making it a very "slippery customer"! However, its end came when it finally met up with a rival cock which had been fitted with small steel spurs - "made expressly for the purpose"! Many of the cockfights in Hew Galloway took place on the Washing Green, and another favourite venue was across the Water of Ken at, Dalarran Holm.

Farmers in Kells parish and other parts of the Glenkens believed that eggs laid on Good Friday would keep their freshness much longer than normal eggs. Also, butter churned on that day was said to have special magical and medicinal properties. The well-known practice of children rolling eggs down the hillsides at Easter originated from the pagan belief that this brought fertility to the land. It was considered lucky in olden times for the ploughman to place an egg below the ploughshare before he cut the first furrow. Good crops were guaranteed for that year.

Bread "baked on Good Friday held great luck for the house, and from this came the hot cross bun, keep one through the whole year and resist the temptation to eat it and good fortune will be yours!


The 1st of May was the festival of Beltane, a relic of the pagan ceremony of fire worshipping, to celebrate the coming of the spring. Great bonfires were lit on hilltops in many Kirkcudbrightshire parishes, fuel being collected from every household in the area, thus bringing luck to the parish and the promise of a good harvest. A similar festival was held on 24th June, St. John's Eve, no doubt a relic of the pagan Mid-Summer bonfires and sacrificial celebrations.

Hallowe'en co-incides with the old Autumnal Harvest celebrations when processions of people carrying lanterns, and feasting were part of the ceremony to thank the earth for providing food for the coming winter. Christmas or Yule as it used to be called, is all part of the winter solstice ceremony, when greenery was brought indoors to ensure the coming of spring and the return of the sun to warm the earth once more.

Some other traditions in New Galloway included the belief that both elder and rowan trees were a protection against witches and evil spirits. An elder and a rowan were planted near to the gate of the farmyard or garden. Houses in Kells parish often had rowan wood incorporated into the building, a door lintel or window frame.

It was said to be unlucky in Kelis to demolish a disused mill or kirk, and it was also "Very unlucky tae meddle wi' craws or ministers!"

The Painting in New Galloway Town Hall



In April 1892 Mr McNaught, Keeper of the New Galloway Town Hall, was cautioned by the Town Council for using strong language and told to be civil in future. He may have found this difficult when in August the following year the enormous oil painting "Kenmure Castle and Loch Ken" was delivered to the Hall. This was a gift from the artist, James Faed, jnr, and had been exhibited at the Royal Academy earlier that year. Mr McNaught and his helpers were paid £2. 10 shillings for hanging the picture, which was unveiled on August 31 by Mrs Maitland Gordon, who had succeeded to the estates of Kenmure a few years previously.

Maxwell's Guide to the Stewartry (7th edition, 1902) calls the painting 'magnificent' and describes what it shows. "Kenmure Castle stands boldly out in the middle distance, with Screel

and Bengairn in the background. The Bennan Hill is close on the right, a glimpse is caught of Boat o'Rhone, while the lands of Glenlaggan are seen on the left. There is a pretty foreground taken from a study made on Cairn Edward Hill, which brings out the heather with a fine autumnal tint. The grand old Scotch firs, a number of which still adorn the town park, are well brought out and all the minor features of the picture are well portrayed."

James Faed was a member of the highly talented Faed family from Barlay Mill, Gatehouse-of-Fleet. His father, also James, was best known as an engraver but was also a capable painter in oils. His uncles, John and Tom, were both very well-known, especially as genre painters, with Tom, the more successful, an elected member of the Royal Academy where he exhibited a total of 98 works.

The younger James, born in Mid Calder, Midlothian, in 1856, first exhibited at the Royal Scottish Academy at the age of 20. He was chiefly known as a watercolourist and 24 reproductions of his watercolours can be found in J.M. Sloan's Galloway, published by Black in 1908. In recent years his oil paintings of scenes in Galloway and the Central Highlands have attracted much interest. These pictures, most of them quite small, are notable for attention to detail and skilful composition. More than that: they are clearly the work of someone who loved what he saw. His palette was rich; he was especially successful in depicting trees and the high hills and the subtle shades of heather throughout the year.

James married Eleanor Herdman in 1897. Shortly afterwards they moved from Edinburgh to London, where two sons were born. Ronald, born 1899, joined the Navy as a midshipman in 1914, sailing with HMS Goliath to India, East Africa and Cape Town. On May 13 in the following year he lost his life in the Dardanelles campaign, when Goliath was sunk by the Turks. Ronald, then aged 15, was buried at sea. There is a fine memorial tablet to him in St Margaret's Church.

Alastair was born in 1905, educated at Sedburgh and Cirencester Agricultural College, and emigrated to Africa in 1927. He settled in Rhodesia where he farmed — naming his farm Cairnsmore. In 1933 he married his cousin, Frances. Alastair was a keen fisherman, a skilled carpenter and had some artistic talent, but his mother discouraged him from painting. He died at his farm in 1981.

James and his wife moved to a house called the Bungalow on the outskirts of New Galloway in 1910. He suffered for many years from a disabling illness yet continued painting almost to the end of his life, holding his brush in his mouth when his hands failed him. He died on February 17, 1920, aged 63, and is buried in Kells Churchyard. Eleanor moved to Africa with her younger son, returning to Edinburgh in 1933 where she died in October 1951. The Bungalow was rebuilt in 1973 and the studio was incorporated in the present kitchen of the house now known as Cairnraws.






Rapture Theatre Company BLUE/ORANGE

LET'S DO IT ~ A MUSICAL LUCKY-DIP


The Balliol Consort's programme for its spring concert in Carsphairn Church is a veritable mixed bag of popular a cappella sacred and secular music which manages to cover just about every style from the sixteenth to the twentieth centuries. From an 'X'-rated Renaissance madrigal via a well-known Victorian part-song, a beautiful English folksong arrangement and a vocal version of a popular Scots dance tune to a couple of Broadway hits, the Balliol's selection also manages to veer into imperial Vienna, the Russian Orthodox Church, Edwardian music-hall and contemporary American sacred music, with just a whiff of Paris thrown in for good measure!

Founded in Dumfries in 1992, the Balliol Consort has established itself as one of the leading mixed-voice a cappella groups working in South-West Scotland, and currently numbers sixteen singers. The choir's repertoire encompasses both the sacred and secular, ranging from mediaeval to contemporary settings. It has previously worked with Scotland's leading professional vocal group Cappella Nova and regularly appears at venues in Dumfries and Galloway and also further afield, in 2003 singing at Beauvals in Northern France. 

KELLS CHOIR AT BIRMINGHAM

Kells Choir Members had the most wonderful and unforgettable experience of their lives in Birmingham at the week-end.

The BBC treated them like Royalty and Aled Jones described all the choirs as winners just by getting to the Final of this most prestigious competition.

The Symphony Hall was a magnificent setting and Kells, in spite of being the smallest choir there, held its own in magnificent fashion. The proudest moment had to be when they sang on their own in front of a 'packed house' of 2000 – they never wavered or looked overpowered – just sang beautifully.

There were audible gasps from the audience when Mr. Douglas Coombes, Director of Music, introduced Kells by telling everyone that there were only fifty six in the whole school — half of them were on the stage and the other half was in training! One other choir was known to have seven hundred and fifty boarders, let alone day pupils! Both Primary Choirs competing with Kells had the upper limit of fifty pupils in their choirs. It was a huge challenge, but Kells were not phased. Although runners up, Mrs. Plummer is confident that the people of Dumfries & Galloway will be very proud of the Kells pupils.

The pupils are pictured with their certificate signed by the judges, Pete Waterman, Sinita, Malcolm Archer, the Choir Master in St. Paul's Cathedral, Aled Jones and the Producers of Songs of Praise. Although the official adjudication has not arrived in the school yet, Mrs. Plummer has been told that Pete Waterman described Kells as a choir who "sang with passion".

There was an incredibly happy atmosphere and all the choirs were so supportive of one another, as it should be.

Saturday was gruelling with the competition which was recorded for 20th March, starting at 9.00 a.m. and finishing for lunch at 12.30 p.m. A twenty minute lunch and straight on to the workshop which lasted until late afternoon. Another quick break, then on to the Concert in the magnificent setting of The Symphony Hall and an audience of two thousand people.

Kells hopes the Region is not too disappointed that they were not winners, but they did do their best for everyone who gave their support. If the entries in the last two years averaged the two hundred and fifty of this year, then seven hundred and fifty choirs have entered this competition since it started in 2003 and only nine have made the final of which Kells is one. It is an outstanding achievement and well deserved for a choir who gives 100% commitment.



A huge thanks to everyone from all at Kells. To our supporters and friends in this area and beyond who gave so generously to support our week-end in Birmingham — our sincere thanks.

Also, a very special thank you to MR. GLENDINNING, Kilt Specialists of Annan, who worked unstintingly to ensure all the children's kilts were ready on time. It was not an easy task to equip us with twenty five kilts – but he did so with much pride – and the children were certainly the smartest there, dressed in the Modern Douglas. The service Mr. Glendinning gave to the school was exceptional.

Finally, I highly recommend that other school choirs enter this competition. My children have had the most unforgettable experience, to say nothing of the staff, parents, grandparents and friends who came along to support us. We never dreamt that we would sing in The Symphony Hall. It was beyond our wildest dreams — It could just as easily happen to other choirs in Dumfries & Galloway.






