There have been sightings of grey squirrels in the Glenkens recently - one was found dead on the road just outside New Galloway and another was seen at Cuckoo Bridge between Carsphairn and Dalry. The arrival of the grey squirrel has implications for the future survival of native red squirrels in the area.

The Red Squirrels In South Scotland project, funded by Scottish Natural Heritage and Leader + is working to protect red squirrel populations across Dumfries and Galloway. The good news is that this has been an excellent year for red squirrels due to the high levels of natural food available. However, the downside to the good breeding season for red squirrels is of course that it will also be good for grey squirrels. The American grey squirrel competes with red squirrels for resources and carries squirrelpox, a virus potentially lethal to the red squirrel.

Until now, Scotland, a red squirrel stronghold, has remained free from squirrelpox but last month several PHOTO: NEIL PATTINSON grey squirrels moving north from the Cumbria area into southern Scotland tested postitive for the virus. Whilst these squirrels may not be infectious at present, it is thought that seropositive grey squirrels can co-occur with red squirrels for roughly 3 years before the occurrence of an outbreak in red squirrels. Research has shown that replacement of the native red squirrel by the introduced American grey is 17-20 times faster where grey squirrels have antibodies to the squirrelpox. Pox in red squirrels causes skin ulcers, lesions and scabs with swelling and discharge around the eyes, mouth, feet and genitalia. The squirrels become increasingly lethargic as the virus progresses further resulting in death generally within 15 days.



Red Squirrel Conservation Officers have been working over the last few years to identify Priority Woodlands where red squirrels will have the most likely chance of long term survival. There are several Priority Woodlands in our area, including Castlemaddy and parts of Garcrogo and Galloway. We are concerned that grey squirrels may be moving down from Ayrshire, and that there is a possibility that they could meet grey squirrels carrying the virus. Although there have been very few grey squirrels recorded in our area, we are very keen to hear from anyone who sees a grey squirrel. We would also like to hear from anyone who is interested in being involved in surveying for red squirrels, or would like more information about red squirrel conservation. I believe that this site will be well supported and the Leisure & Sport team look forward to developing activities here."

Entries for the Glenkens Schools' Art competition were also on display at the exhibition. They, too, were of an extremely high standard.



















THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Town Hall

The Councillors were pleased to note that the Town Hall clock is once again keeping the correct time, after a new mechanism was installed. Decorating work inside the hall has also begun although it was felt that repairs to the exterior should have been carried out first. However it has been confirmed that the damp problem will be remedied before the exterior is painted.

Boundary Commission Proposals

Lengthy discussions have been ongoing, regarding the proposed new council wards. Under the proposals the Glenkens would become part of the largest ward in Dumfries and Galloway, stretching from Kirkcowan in the west to Kirkland, beyond Moniaive in the east. Three councillors would have responsibility for this ward. It was felt that the Glenkens has more affiliation with the Castle Douglas area and should have been better included in a Stewartry ward. Brian Collins is coordinating a meeting between community councillors from the areas concerned to discuss the issues further.

Loch Ken

The Community Council is once again represented on the Loch Ken management committee and a sub-committee has been set up to explore the parking issues on the west bank.

The August meeting will be held on the $8^{\rm th}$ in New Galloway Town Hall. The September meeting will be held in Mossdale Hall on 12 September.

DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The June meeting of Dalry Community Council was attended by several guests and members of the public as well as the majority of Community Council members.

Mrs Cathy Agnew and Mr Brian Edgar, Directors of GCAT, gave a presentation describing the development of GCAT to date, its successes and problems which have been encountered along the way. They gave members an insight into the future development plans and answered members' questions on a variety of issues.

Another presentation was given by Mr John Thouless (Scottish & Southern Energy) and Mr Simon De Pietro (DP Energy), who gave details on the proposed windfarm development at Blackcraig and addressed points raised by those attending, regarding the intended layout, access details, timescale of the project, employment possibilities, compensation arrangements etc.

It was decided that the most suitable location for Dalry's bottle banks would be the lay-by on the A713 near the Boat Knowe access. Clir Prentice agreed to inform officials of this decision so that the bottle banks can be placed in position as soon as possible.

Members were pleased to hear that there should be no further hold up in the siting of the Youth Shelter near to the Playpark. Information on the timescale involved would be brought to the next meeting.

Scottish Power had been informed of the dangerous state of a street light/electricity pole at Midtown.

Sgt Blacklock from Castle Douglas attended the meeting instead of PC Wilson. He reported on local incidents which had occurred in the last month. There was a request for anyone interested in becoming a Special Constable in the Glenkens area to contact Sgt Blacklock at Castle Douglas, or the Recruiting Department at Dumfries.

NEW GALLOWAY -Our Historic Burgh by Helen Bolton PART XXVI

The Conventicle and the "Whig's Hole"

Up in the far north of Dalry parish, almost at the meeting place of the three counties of Ayrshire, Dumfriesshire and Kirkcudbrightshire, is some of the wildest country in all Galloway. Farmhouses and shepherd's cottages, some now deserted and ruinous, lie hidden among the folds in the remote hills. Sparkling burns tumble down steep sided cleughs to gather in the glens below, flowing south to become the head waters of Loch Ken. Those flowing north from the water shed become the Afton, Kello and Euchan Waters, which in turn flow into the River Nith.

Back in the 17th century, during the "Killing Times", this wild and remote part of Galloway became an area in which the covenanters would gather to hold their secret conventicles high in the hills, hopefully out of reach of their persecutors. Folk from Dalry and Carsphairn parishes would no doubt be joined by worshippers from across county boundaries.

There is, to this day, a place called "The Whig's Hole" marked on the map. It sits high on the slopes of Autry Hill, some 1400 feet above sea level, and is a natural amphitheatre well hidden behind a rocky outcrop, almost invisible from prying eyes down below. The glen of the Water of Ken is narrow at this point, with Altry Hill at 1600 feet on the east side. The steep slopes of Ewe Hill to the west and Lorg to the north, both 1900 feet, almost enclose the head of the glen, making it a very secret place indeed.

The covenanters felt the "Whig's Hole" was an ideal place in which to hold their forbidden open-air services, up to a hundred people being able to gather in the hollow. They were well hidden from below, and in fact from almost any direction, and the sound of the wind as it sighed around the hillsides, would soon disguise the sound of the people singing. Many gatherings were held in this lonely spot, until Robert Canning, the laird of "Muirdrochwood", some 31/2 miles to the south west across the hills, became aware of the activities of the covenanters. To keep on the right side of the "powers that be", Canning reported his findings to the hated Grierson of Lag, who then made it his business to search the "Whig's Hole" and the surrounding hillsides whenever he was in the area. For some time he found nothing, but eventually he surprised a group of hillmen and women who had gathered together to sing psalms and to worship God.

As Grierson and his troopers climbed Altry Hill from the Water of Ken the lookouts raised the alarm, and the covenanters scattered among the hills. Two of their number, George Allan and Margaret Gracie fled to the east towards the Dumfriesshire border, but were overtaken by Grierson and Coupland, mounted on horseback, on a boggy area below Craigstewart, known as the Fans of Altry. Grierson threw the unfortunate Allan and Gracie to the ground, and when they both refused to swear the Oath of Allegiance to the King he ordered one of his troopers to shoot them. Two shots rang out among the silent hills and the other covenanters shivered in their hiding places - well aware of what had happened.

Under cover of darkness, when the troopers had returned to their garrison, the covenanters crept back to the place from where they had heard the shots. There they found the bodies of George Allan and Margaret Gracie, lying face downwards where they had fallen on the deserted hillside. Their friends carried the two bodies to the top of the nearby hill and buried them at the border between the two counties.

On the summit of the 1632 foot hill, known as Allan's Cairn, the graves were marked by a rough cairn. This was later replaced by a memorial surrounded by a railing, these being paid for from the funds raised at a sermon which was preached at the site in 1857. The Southern Upland Way now runs along the ridge of Allan's Cairn and passes close by the memorial.

* * * * * * *

This year on Sunday 12th June this lonely place was the appropriate setting for the Conventicle conducted by the Rev Dr David Batholomew, the Minister of the four parishes of the Glenkens.

The day dawned wet, windy and rather cold, not a promising prospect for an open-air service. However, about sixty brave souls made their way up the narrow moorland road which follows the course of the Water of Ken as far as the old shepherd's cottage at "Lorg". A matter of a few minutes before the service was due to begin, the clouds rolled away from the hills and the sun shone down on the congregation from a clear blue sky. Occasional dark clouds scudded down from the north but all passed by over the moors.

Beyond Lorg Bridge, beside the confluence of the Lorg Burn and the Water of Ken, an area of level ground proved an ideal place to hold the Conventicle, sheltered from the breeze, and with the gentle rippling of the water providing an accompaniment to the traditional psalms, and to Dr Bartholomew's preaching, all no doubt familiar to the covenanters of old.

After a refreshing cup of coffee, Dr Bartholomew and about 20 members of the congregation crossed the Water of Ken on some handy stepping stones and made their way up an old track which runs diagonally across the shoulder of Altry. When they reached the skyline they turned left and climbed up to the remarkable "Whig's Hole". It is a little marshy underfoot, but it was, no doubt, a perfect natural hiding-place where conventicles could be held in reasonable safety.

Clouds began to gather as the "explorers" made their way back to their cars parked at Lorg Bridge, and as the chairs were being tidled away the heavy rain returned. Surely it was not just a mere coincidence which gave the Conventicle such a remarkable break in the otherwise very stormy day?

WALK A MILE FOR MENINGITIS LONDONDERRY TO LONDON MARATHON **FUNDRAISING WALK**

This is the eighteenth time Steve has done a marathon walk and will be walking the entire route in a bid to raise in excess of £100,000 for the cause.

"Meningitis and meningococcal septicaemia are devastating diseases that can often kill within hours. Our aim is to support vital research into vaccine development to eradicate these diseases." said Steve Dayman.

"Every year hundreds of supporters join our annual fundraising walks. There is always a real spirit of camaraderie and many return year after year. Everyone who takes part receives a commemorative t-shirt. We rely solely on charitable contributions to continue our essential work and are looking for people locally who may wish to support us, either by collecting in the towns and villages we pass through or by being sponsored to walk a few miles of the route with me. It really will make a difference".



GCAT SCORES A FIRST WITH THE RSA!

GCAT is teaming up with the Royal Society of Arts for the RSA's inaugural event in southwest Scotland on Saturday 1 October, when renowned architectural historian Charles McKean will address delegates in the Town Hall, New Galloway at 11am.

Coffee will be served from 10.30am and RSA Fellows will have the option of a Fellowship Lunch after the event. Tickets, obtainable from GCAT, are £3 to cover coffee and biscuits and £1 for those under eighteen.

Charles McKean, one time Chief Executive of the Royal Incorporation of Architects in Scotland, is known for attracting capacity audiences for his lectures in Edinburgh. He is Professor of Architectural History at Dundee University. He has published widely and was architectural correspondent, The Times, 1977-83.

His talk is entitled Rural Self-Sufficiency, when, using slides, he will discuss the renaissance country house in Scotland.

"Mrs Brown, said that she'd send Mrs Brinkmann through to sort out the politicians because she does lunch duty in our school, but Mr McConnell





Cooking accounts for around one third of all house fires in Great Britain and is a frequent cause of fires in Dumfries and Galloway. HOODWINKED AT DALRY PRIMARY




