CHANNEL 4 FILMS SCRAPPY RACES ON RAIDERS' ROAD



Four teams of brilliant bodgers have £1,500 and six weeks to build the ultimate scrappy racer.

Filming for Channel 4's Scrappy Races took place near New Galloway over the past three weeks.

The filming centred around the "Raiders' Road" and started on September 13, and finished on Tuesday 27 September.

All six episodes of the third series of the Channel 4 show were filmed in the area, with over fifty crew and cast members staying locally.

Four teams competed against each other, each starting off with a different vehicle, which they had to modify for the different stages.

The rally was divided into five stages – Forest, Sand, Moorland, Hill and Water. Each stage presented a different engineering challenge to the teams and they had just ten hours to modify their vehicles to undertake it!

The public was invited to attend some of the filming with the final race (the challenge was to collect a "whisky" barrel from "Barney Water" without getting themselves or their cars wet, then to race to the finish over a 1mile of road, climb a steep bank between some trees and speed to the finish line) to see the final presentations.



It was all great fun even if rather wet with our wonderful SW Scotland weather playing its normal tricks of raining by the bucketful just when it was least needed.

Unfortunately only two teams actually managed to reach the finish line on the last day, one vehicle could not negotiate the climb through the trees and the other team (who were in overall lead up to this point) blew up their engine on the way to the start point.

True to form the winners had a champagne shower after the presentations, however, if you want to know who came first and second you will have to wait until the programme is broadcast early in the New Year.

DALRY PRIMARY SCHOOL ON INTERNATIONAL ROLE OF HONOUR

Five hundred schools in Great Britain have now registered on the Globe Programme, an international scientific organisation sponsored by NASA and the US Department of State. Only one of these schools has been recognised for its excellence by inclusion on the "Chief Scientist's Honor Roll!"

Dalry Primary School received the news last week that their efforts were to be recognised by Globe from the "Chief Scientist", Dr Margaret LeMone, at her headquarters in Boulder, U.S.A. The news was also posted on the Globe website, www.globe.gov which provides information on the worldwide activities undertaken by the organisation.



Dalry School was commended for providing measurements of the environment in a way that was "particularly helpful for research, for the Globe scientists and the Earth science community." Globe commented that Dalry had provided 4666 student measurements of cloud cover over a period of four months, data which is used by organisations like NASA to plan their environmental and space travel programmes.

Sandra Brown, Depute Head at Dalry, is the brains behind the project. She saw that her pupils could learn a great deal about the environment, scientific measurements and being part of a global community through their involvement in the Globe programme. "It's been great for the pupils, learning about cloud formations and

monitoring the annual changes in weather and plants. As part of our eco friendly approach to education, involvement in the Globe programme has raised their awareness of global issues and the importance of the individual. It's fantastic to be honoured in this way. We are really chuffed to be the only school in Britain on the Globe's Honour Role!"

The pupils too are really enthusiastic! Ross Smith said, "It's good fun taking the readings. We do it at lunchtimes and even at the weekends but that's ok because you know it is for a big project."

Well done Dalry Primary School and congratulations to Mrs Brown and her present and former pupils in P.6 & 7.


CATHY CASSIDY ~ DRIFTWOOD

THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The August meeting was attended by council official Mr Philip McGroggan who has the remit of looking after council properties in the region. Members appreciated that some interior decoration had taken place in New Galloway Town Hall recently but were concerned that the long standing problem with the ingress of water in the entrance hall had not been properly investigated and addressed first. It was felt that as a result, the redecoration was a waste of time and money as the dampness would soon reappear. Mr McGroggan took the point and stated that this problem was being investigated by Architectural Services and that they were also planning to replace the noticeboards at the front door. Full conditional surveys are being carried out at all council properties to determine what essential maintenance is required and any works which need to be done to meet disabled access requirements. Once this is completed they will carry out a community facilities review to prioritise and allocate the available budget to specific halls. Mr McGroggan made it clear that he felt the hall had a very strong future if that was what the community wanted and suggested that the Community Council should formulate a long term development plan and that he would be happy to help with this and also to look at different avenues of funding which may be available to pursue the plans.

The Boundary Commission's controversial proposal for the new council wards was discussed again and although the issue of multi member wards is non negotiable, the shape and coverage of the wards can be contested. It is certainly felt that the proposed new 'Kells' ward, stretching from west of Newton Stewart across the Glenkens to Moniaive, is totally impractical and unworkable. The Community Council has already written to strongly object to the proposal and to support the council's suggested alternative of reorganising the wards in the Stewartry to link the Glenkens with the Castle Douglas area instead. Other Community Councils and the Stewartry Convention of Community Councils have also objected to the proposed ward.

The September meeting was held in Mossdale Hall. The proposed draft priorities for the next Stewartry Community Plan were discussed. The plan for 2006 2008 will identify a three year vision for the Stewartry, assisting community planning partners to meet local needs and to deliver projects and programmes of action under the three community planning themes — Enterprise & Learning Communities, Inclusive Communities, Safe & Healthy Communities. Initial consultation with community planning partners has been used to produce twenty one draft strategic priorities for the next three years. Each Community Councillor was asked to complete a questionnaire in response to this draft document to help decide what the final priorities should be.

Arrangements were also made for the public presentation to Mrs Myra Walker to mark the occasion of her retirement, this would be held on Friday 7 October in New Galloway Town Hall at 7pm.

The next meeting of the Community Council will be on Monday 10 October 2005 in New Galloway Town Hall at 7.30pm.

DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At their August meeting, members of Dalry Community Council agreed to contact Dumfries & Galloway Council with regard to the siting of a bus shelter at the foot of Main Street, near the Bank.

Recycling banks are now in place in the lay by on the A713 south of the village.

Members expressed their concern about the lack of progress towards completion of the New Galloway – Dalry footpath as they had hoped to have this in operation for the start of the summer season.

Comments from members on the proposed local government boundary changes were expressed in a draft letter. The points raised in this would be finalised at the next meeting of the Community Council before the letter would be submitted to the Boundary Commission.

Further discussion took place regarding a draft questionnaire on the proposed windfarm at Blackcraig to be sent out to all those on the electoral roll in the Dalry area once a planning application has been submitted. The group agreed to finalise this questionnaire at their next meeting.

A suggestion was put forward regarding the creation of a car parking area within the village. The area labelled OPP22 on the Local Pian was identified as a possible site and members agreed to consider this and discuss it further at their next meeting.


HARVEST FESTIVAL SERVICE

KELLS PARISH CHURCH

CELEBRATION OF NEW IMPROVEMENTS

On Sunday 2rd October, commencing at 6.30 pm, there was a special Service in Kells Church. This took the form of a Harvest Songs of Praise and was primarily to dedicate the alterations that have recently been completed.

These works have been carried out within the Church building. A section

under a gallery has been partitioned off and within that area there have been built a small Hall for meetings, including a Sunday School, a Kitchen/Flower room, a storeroom and a toilet/washroom suitable for the disabled. The exterior of the building, which is listed, has not been affected.

The Service was conducted by the Minister Dr D S Bartholomew. The Moderator of Presbytery, Mrs Flora Little, made the dedication. The Glenkens Church Choir led the hymn singing and performed several anthems during the service, conducted by Jean Mason and accompanied by Geoff Keating on organ, ably assisted by Gillian Beaver on clarinet, who both

enhanced the service with a movement from Concertino by Tartini for clarinet and organ during the collection, and a Prelude and Fugue for organ by J S Bach at the end of the service.

The alterations were designed by Edgar Design Ltd of Kirkpatrick Durham and the works carried out by Alan McMorran of Castle Douglas. Approximately half of the cost amounting to £11,000 was paid out of reserves and the remainder met out of sums set aside in recent years from savings and fund raising and generous gifts from The Ferguson Bequest Fund and The Baird Trust of £3000 each and The Barscobe Heritage Trust of £2000.

The present Kells Parish Church was built in 1822 to replace an older building which stood on the same site and was probably built in the middle of the 17th Century. In 1908 it was decided to carry out much needed improvements which involved replacing the pews on the ground floor. building a new Chamber for the organ, raising the ceiling and improving the lighting and ventilation. The Church then resolved to raise the funds required before proceeding with the project and did so by seeking

contributions, a Bazaar and other fund raising events and gifts from charities which by coincidence included £250 from The Baird Trust. The total cost when the works were completed in 1911 was £970!

So ninety years on the alterations now completed should enable the Church to continue its work and meet modern requirements not contemplated years ago and its obligations to those disabled.

The original Kells Kirk stood on the lands of Achie, a little to the north of where the present West Port road Joins the A712 to Newton Stewart.

In the days before the Reformation the village of Kells, now long vanished, clustered about the Church, but, as the population shifted towards New Galloway it became obvious that a new Church, more convenient to the town, would have to be built.


It is not clear when a church was first built on the present site, but General Roy's Military Survey, compiled over the period 1742 to 1752, shows it on that site; and John Ainslie's map of 1797 also shows it on the present site with the manse already across the road from it. The Old Statistical Account of the Parish of Kells, compiled by Rev. John Gillespie in 1793, mentions the church was rebuilt in 1745 and repaired in 1788. It is likely

the first church on the present site was built not long after permission was granted in 1633 for the building of the new Royal Burgh.

The old Kirk continued in use for a short time for occasional preaching and, it is said, that during this period, the Witch of Hannayston used to appear on the roof of a night, in the guise of a lovely girl, in order to lure unwary boys to destruction. After a while, however, the church ceased to be used and its stones were taken and used in the construction of farm buildings.

in 1806 Rev. William Gillespie became sole minister of the charge after his father's death, and it was during his ministry that the present church was built. It was completed in 1822 to a design by Baillie William McCandlish of New Galloway, who also went on to build Dalry Church and enlarge Balmaclellan Church. The date is inscribed on the bell tower above the vestry door.

Some ancient gravestones are said to have been moved from their original site and placed in the new kirkyard beside the present church, where they can still be seen today.




Damages was a massive success with West End audiences in London last year and played to packed houses for an extended run. This is the first ever Scottish Tour.

YDance - The Story of the Blues

Dairy Town Hall, Tuesday 25 October, 7.30pm



Scottish Youth Dance's YDance project will be returning to Dalry in October with a public performance of their stylish, hi tech new dance / theatre production The Story of The Blues. Y Dance visited Dalry school in March when they provided a day of hip hop and street dance taster sessions for the secondary pupils. This was part of GCAT's pilot dance programme which took place in the spring. The classes by YDance were by far the most popular of all the dance types offered and now the Gaelforce Youth Festival have agreed to fund the October visit, as well as a day of street dance workshops at the school.

The Story of the Blues is an exciting, innovative and very physical production which animates the incredible journey of a pair of jeans from the cotton fields to the shops. This amazing journey translates to an exciting, captivating dance production, combining international dance styles with movement passages based on work practices, from basic cotton picking in the fields of Benin in West Africa to the mechanised dying and stitching in the factories of Italy and Tunisia. The piece culminates in a depiction of the final stage of the


journey of the blue Jeans; the stylish TV advertising and merchandising and fashion shows.

'ON THE BUS' MOBILE ADVICE WITH GCAT AND AGE CONCERN SCOTLAND


Liz Cole, Community Project Worker for the Glenkens Community and Arts Trust, funded by The Partnership Fund, the Department for Work and Pensions, has got together with the P.U.M.A. mobile bus project to host a road show throughout the Glenkens region. Liz provides information to pensioners regarding benefit entitlement and access to services that are available to the over 60s. Liz's work includes benefit maximisation; contacting relevant organisations concerning central heating installation, care and repair grants, and help with the garden; liaising with Social Services for home care assessments and installation of equipment in the home; Meals on Wheels and the Food Train, and travel passes and parking badges such as the Blue Badge. Essentially, Liz is employed by GCAT to help with any issues concerning older people.

P.U.M.A. is a mobile resource centre set in a Ford coach, which has been converted to offer a wide range of activities for all age groups. Most of the seats have been removed to provide a small seating area and a large open space for workshops. There is a lift The project provides a much needed facility for disabled access. in rural communities where access to a similar resource is hampered by distance, transport, childcare or other factors. Skilled tutors have provided a wide variety of music, arts and crafts workshops including African drumming, making masks and dream catchers, wood sculptors, water colour painting, pottery, storytelling, parachute games, circus skills and face painting. P.U.M.A. have played a part at many festivals and galas, playing host to children's workshops such as Kirkcudbright's Children's Festival and the Glenkens Children's Festival, and even having a 'baby bus' at the Solfest where a quiet space was provided for women to feed, change nappies, relax and enjoy an Indian head massage!

Liz's idea is to offer an open space on the bus to anyone who is interested in coming along and discussing issues relating to life in later years. Leaflets and benefit forms will be available on the bus and there will be a curtained section for a confidential space if required. Essentially, Liz will be there to take names and 'phone numbers of

anyone who wishes her to make a home visit. She is hoping that pensioners and younger generations will come along for a chat, a cup of tea and a biscuit to find out what community work GCAT is involved with and how P.U.M.A. operates. P.U.M.A. will have a suggestions box on the bus and welcomes any ideas regarding workshops they could offer in the future in the Glenkens region.

Age Concern Scotland is coming on board with this initiative for one day. Paula Cochrane, Community Worker, will join Liz and be available for enquiries concerning issues for older people. Her work involves a range of health, safety and well being issues, working with organisations to increase benefit uptake, promoting Age Concern Scotland's annual Winter Warmth campaign including the free logs and kindling service, offering training programmes to groups of older people 'Scottish Voice and Choice,' supporting local groups in the development of services and activities, and providing leaflets relevant to older people.

Community Fire Safety Message MAKING YOUR HOMES SAFER FIREWORKS

"Fire works are dangerous and can be lethal," is the message from Community Fire Safety officer John Templeton. The utmost care is necessary in their storage, handling and use, whether you are organising a display for the family, friends or the general public. Dumfries and Galloway Fire and Rescue Service want you to have a safe event by following some simple do's and don'ts, risks can be greatly reduced."

DO'S AND DON'TS

- * Keep fireworks in a closed metal box and take them out one at a time.
- * Follow the manufacturers instructions on each firework.
- Read them by torchlight NEVER by a naked flame.
- * Light fireworks at arm's length using a safety firework lighter or fuse wick.
- * Stand back after lighting.
- * NEVER go back to a firework once lit it may go off in your face.
- * Keep a bucket of water handy.
- * Used fireworks should be collected after the display with care. Douse with water, bury or place in a metal container.
- * Keep children under control.
- * Keep pets indoors.

BONFIRES: DO'S AND DON'TS

- * Site well away from houses, garages, sheds, fences, overhead cables, trees and shrubs AND ALWAYS AWAY FROM FIREWORKS.
- * Before lighting the fire, check that no pets or children are hiding inside it.
- *Build the stack so it is stable and will not collapse outward or to one side.
- * NEVER use flammable liquids Paraffin or petrol to light the fire.
- * Don't burn foam filled furniture, aerosols, tins of paint or bottles.
- * Keep everyone away from the fire especially children, who must be supervised all the time.
- * For an emergency keep buckets of water, the garden hose or a fire extinguisher ready.
- * Pour water on the embers before leaving.
- * Bonfires present additional hazards when it's dark.


