## TOMMY EDGAR - M.B.E.

Congratulations to Tommy Edgar who was recently awarded the honour of MBE! The ceremony was held in the Lochinvar on Sunday 30th October in the presence of over 100 family and friends. Tommy chose to have his MBE presented locally rather than at Buckingham Palace, very appropriate for a man who loves his bonnie Glenkens and rarely strays far beyond its boundaries unless he has to.

Tommy was officially appointed as a Member of the Order of the British Empire by the Lord Lieutenant of the Stewartry, Lt. Gen. Sir Norman Arthur and toasts were proposed by Mrs Marion Bone and Mr Gordon Lindsay. The proceedings were rounded off with the Lord Lieutenant's Piper, Leah Gowans, playing the pipe tune, "T D Edgar MBE", which had been specially composed by Pipe Major Ian Wemyss to mark the occasion.

Tommy was born in Dairy on 30th May 1931. He has lived and worked all his life

on the family farm (Newfield and Kirkland) and still takes as much pride as ever in his prize winning ploughing. Tommy's contributions to the communities of the Glenkens are long and varied: Over the years he has entertained thousands of people in his capacity as a talented musician both on his own and as a member of several bands including Rab Fergusson's Band (1946 50) and his own band, The Starry Nights (1950 1996). Despite retiring from the band, Tommy still performs at concerts, functions, old folks homes and charity events, often free of charge. He composes and plays his own tunes and is also a renowned and very accomplished poet. He is founder and still active member of the Glenkens 73 Club, a member of the Glenkens Lions Club and is on the committees of the Glenkens Agricultural Show and Clachan Fair. Over the years he has also served on Dalry Community Council, Dalry Town Hall Committee and Dalry School Board amongst others.

## **Mary Clare Cornwallis**


Balmaclelian artist, Mary Clare Cornwallis combines her love of nature with her love of art to produce colourful botanical watercolour paintings. Her favourite subjects are flowers and poultry: not only does her garden include a collection of flowers which she likes to paint but she keeps a stock of ducks and hens which frequently feature in her sketchbook.

Mary Clare originally learned to paint under the tutelage of the artist Valerie Saddler of Kirkcudbright before deciding to specialise in watercolours. She has exhibited at galleries in London, Brisbane and Dumfries & Galloway and welcomes private commissions.

Originally from Kent, Mary Clare owned and ran an independent school in London with her husband, the actor Ian McCulloch, and now lives permanently in the Glenkens.

## THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The guest speakers at the October meeting were Mr R Irving and Mr V Nix from Dumfries & Galloway Council Planning Dept. Mr Nix is responsible for all of the conservation areas in the region and he explained the implications of the 'conservation area' designation in relation to general planning issues. He also described the various different types of 'listed building' designations and the procedure involved in applying listed building status.

Mr Irving gave examples of the most common planning queries which arose in conservation areas and provided a list of the main restrictions which apply. He stressed however that this list was by no means exhaustive and any specific issues should be directed to the planning office in Castle Douglas for initial guidance. Plans were provided, for future reference, showing the boundaries of the conservation area and indicating the various listed buildings.

The November meeting was attended by Miss Lindsay Orr from Loreburn Housing Association. A presentation was made to the Community Council, and the members of the public present, regarding the proposed Loreburn housing development at Carson's Knowe. Provided that the purchase of the necessary land from Dumfries & Galloway Council was completed as expected, the first phase of the building work would commence in April 2006, subject to planning consent. This phase would see a total of eight houses built – four with two bedrooms and four with three bedrooms. The site would have scope for a further twelve houses in the future but this would require expansion of the sewage capacity and would therefore depend on the outcome of negotiations with Scottish Water regarding further investment in the infrastructure. The houses would be for rent and/or for shared ownership. The development was warmly welcomed by everyone at the meeting as it would help to address the long standing shortage of rented accommodation and affordable housing in the area.

The plans, however, were a pleasant surprise to the Community Council as Loreburn had stated several times in the past that they had no plans to build in New Galloway in the foreseeable future!

The other main topic was the proposed closure of the Clydesdale Bank In New Galloway. Although the branch has only been part time since the previous attempt to close it over eight years ago, it still plays a vital role in the town and would be greatly missed if the closure went ahead as planned. Many people felt that it was a foregone conclusion that it would definitely close this time but after discussion it was agreed that if we had taken that stance the last time, it would have closed then. It was only because of the intensive campaign conducted by the Community Council at that time that the management at the Clydesdale Bank backed down and agreed to keep the branch open, albeit on reduced hours. Encouragingly, they also then stated that they would never close one of their branches if it was the last bank in a town. Why should we admit defeat this time? The Community Council would write a letter to the Chief Executive of the Clydesdale Bank and would urge all local people to do the same to show support for retaining the branch. Further action would also be considered in an effort to secure the future of New Galloway's bank.

Festive plans have also been made to have Christmas Trees beside the burgh sign, on the Town Hall and in Mossdale. It is also hoped to have some additional lighting decorations at the Town Hall and at any other suitable points.

The Senior Citizen's Christmas Lunch is to be held in the Cross Keys Hotel on Sunday 18th December and transport will be available as usual on request.

The last Community Council meeting of 2005 will be on Monday 12th December at 7.30pm in New Galloway Town Hall.

#### DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At their September meeting, members of Dalry Community Council were pleased to hear that the proposal for a bus shelter at the foot of Main Street has been approved.

Discussion took place regarding a proposal to site a car park adjacent to the B7000 on the Knowe. It was generally felt that this would encourage visitors to the village (including walkers) to leave their cars in a safe environment and reduce parking problems in Main Street. It was pointed out that funding for such a venture might be problematic but Clir Prentice agreed to raise this proposed development with the appropriate Council officials.

The Community Council's response to the Boundary Commission's proposed boundary changes was discussed with a view to a finalised version being forwarded in time for the deadline.

The design of the Community Council's questionnaire to canvas views on the proposed windfarm development at Blackcraig was finalised and administrative arrangements were put in place to have these distributed once the planning proposal has been submitted.

Members were delighted to hear that the request for street lights to be installed in St John's Way had been approved and that funding was in place for this,

Balmaclellan had a very successful bonfire night party in the village. Over 80 people attended the event.

Following the results of the survey on the proposed Blackcraig Windfarm, it was decided that as the result was inconclusive the Community Council would stay neutral on the issue. A total of 297 questionnaires were sent out to the Balmaciellan community (one to every household in the parish). Of the 132 returned, 64 were against the development, 55 were in favour and 13 were neutral.

'Lighting up': we are going to light the Christmas Tree on Thursday 15th December at 7.00 pm. We will sing a couple of carols, and this will be followed by Mulled wine and Mince Pies in the village hall. All welcome.

#### CHARITY FUNDRAISING WALK THANKS GLENKENS GENEROSITY

The Spencer Dayman Meningitis UK Fundraising Walk passed through New Galloway on Wednesday 5 October. The walk, which covered a blistering 540 miles from Londonderry, Northern Ireland to Great Ormond Street Hospital, London, raised a total of £82,000 for the charity. Over 200 supporters joined Steve at various stages along the walk, helping to raise this impressive amount by being sponsored and collecting donations.

Meningitis UK's Chief Executive, Steve Dayman, who led the walk, expressed his thanks to those who supported it locally. "During the time we were in the Glenkens area we raised £533 in bucket collections alone," said Steve. "Without the help of the many local people who supported us on the day, we would not be able to continue our vital research into the prevention and treatment of meningitis and its associated diseases, which is being undertaken at various institutes across the UK."

## WR GOURLAY AND

## The Sayings Of Muhammad

W.R.Gourlay retired as financial adviser to the viceroy of Bengal in 1922 and died at Kenbank, Dalry in 1936. He was a man of letters and languages. The other day we received at Kenbank a large envelope addressed to him, which upon opening contained a book and a letter. My first thought was that this must be a record postal delay but the letter was of very recent date, 18 October 2005. The book, "The Sayings of Muhammad (S)" is a 2002 reprint of 450 sayings and stories of the Prophet Muhammad printed in English, Arabic and Bangladeshi. The accompanying letter from Mohiuddin Ahmad, ex Bangladeshi vice consul of Glasgow, explained why he was sending a copy of the book. It was originally compiled and printed in 1902 in English and Arabic by Sir Abdullah al Mamun Suhrawardy, sometime deputy president of the Bengal Legislature and secretary of the Indian Moslem Association of Bengal. In the mid 1930s his brother, Professor Hassan Suhrawardy, vice chancellor of the University of Calcutta, sought to satisfy a growing demand for a reprint but could not find a copy. Eventually he unearthed one with his friend, William Gourlay, who sent him the copy he had at Kenbank. As a result it was possible for a second edition to come out in 1936, in the preface of which the debt owed to William Gourlay is noted. There

were further reprints in 1998 and 2002, the latter of which included Bangladeshi for the first time. The idea of this being, as Mr Ahmad says in his letter, that the present community of Indian immigrants, particularly the Bengali settlers, be able to read the English and Bangladeshi scripts side by side.

Ghandi read the book in 1938 and wrote saying that this collection of the sayings of the Prophet are amongst the treasures of mankind, not merely for Muslims. They omit anything that Sir Abdullah Suhrawardy saw as being unduly dated so that the whole book is relevant to today and full of wise and profound sayings such as "humility and courtesy are acts of piety", and interlaced with a great deal of common sense, "Kill not your hearts with excess of eating and drinking". Amongst my favourites are, "Go in quest of knowledge, even unto China", "The thing that is lawful, but disliked by God is divorce", and "Trust in God, but tie your camel".

Mr Ahmad thought it was timely to send another copy to Mr Gourlay at Kenbank. In acknowledging his letter and the book I said that I hoped he would agree with my idea that the book should be lodged in the Dalry village library, which was built in William Gourlay's memory.



## NEW GALLOWAY - Our Historic Burgh by Helen Bolton PART XXVI

Alexander Murray's Centenary

A number of well known inhabitants of New Galloway journeyed up the Newton Stewart road on 16th April 1913 to join a large gathering of people from the Minnigaff and Penninghame areas at Murray's Monument. The occasion was the centenary of the death of this remarkable son of Galloway. Those present included Dr Cowan; Mr Johnston, the Town Clerk: Mr Milligan, "Kenmore Arms"; Mrs. Graig; Mr Mitchell; Miss Paterson, "Wellwood Lodge"; and Messrs. John and Gordon Milligan. Also present were Mrs McMillan of "Craig End", Balmaclellan; Mr and Misses Shaw, "High Park", Balmaclellan; and Dr McKie of Newton Stewart. The last named gentleman being a relative of Murray's, his Great Grandmother was a sister of Alexander's mother.

Murray Alexander was born "Dunkitterick", a shepherd's cottage in what was described by Murray himself as a lonely glen where there was no road, and being traversed by no strangers save smugglers! At that time the road was up in the hills above the rocky crags of Craigdews.

Proceedings at the monument opened with the singing of Psalm 121, "I to the hills will lift mine eyes" appropriate words in the wild grandeur of the countryside surrounding the company gathered on the Doon, beside the splendid granite column. Prayers were then led by the Rev W H Brown Douglas of Newton Stewart, followed by an interesting speech given by Mr G MacLeod Stewart of "Cairnsmore House", who presided over the meeting.

It was Mr Stewart's father, Mr James Stewart, who had been instrumental in the erecting of the fine monument which we see today, made from local granite. The column stands 80 feet high and sits in a prominent position above the road, a striking and fitting memorial to a remarkable man. Many private individuals donated handsomely towards the cost, and the Commissioners of Supply for both Wigtownshire and the Stewartry aided the good cause. There was still a deficiency in funds, however, and in order that the work should go on uninterrupted, Mr Stewart



very generously advanced the necessary money from his own pocket.

The Very Rev Pearson McAdam Muir. DB, from Glasgow Cathedral, who was the orator of the occasion, gave a most interesting insight into Murray's life, mostly gleaned from his father's knowledge of the man. Dr Muir was a Galloway man himself, born and brought up at the Manse of Kirkmabreck.

Murray's ancestors had been shepherds for many generations, his Great Grandfather was at "Barnkirk" in Penninghame parish, his Grandfather shepherded at "Craigencallie", and his father was at "Garrery" before moving to "Dunkitterick" before Alexander was born. From all this, some folk will be wondering what was the connection between Murray and New Galloway. This was two fold. His Mother was Mary Cochrane, a native of New Galloway, and in 1785 when Alexander was eight years old, a brother of Mary's who had made some money in England, undertook to pay for the boy to have some schooling. He came to New Galloway and was

placed at Kells School under the excellent teacher, Mr William Gordon. During this time young Alexander lodged with his grandfather in the village.

The boy had aiready learnt to read and write under his father's tuition, and soon began to excel in writing copies using paper and lnk, and was often dux of the bible classes. Although his time at school was very short due to his continued ill health, the teaching he received at our school in New Galloway no doubt set this brilliant young man on the first steps towards his career as Professor of Oriental Languages at Edinburgh.

Before the meeting at Murray's Monument closed on that memorable day several lines of Psalm 125 were sung, and the celebration concluded with the Benediction pronounced by Dr Muir.

Congratulations to Helen Bolton's mother, Helen Mawdsley, who was one hundred and five years old on 17 November.

# Community Fire Safety Message MAKING YOUR HOMES SAFER FESTIVE SEASON

The winter period is traditionally when the Fire & Rescue Service receive most calls to dwelling fires. This is due to the darker days and nights when householders use open fires and heaters which if not properly guarded can cause a fire.

Power cuts and dark evenings see more people using candles as an alternative source of light and to provide a relaxing atmosphere. The Fire & Rescue Service advise you to ensure that you prepare for power cuts by checking that your hand lamps are working or spare batteries are available, and make sure if you use candles that suitable holders are provided. Candles have, in recent times, caused fires due to being placed on Televisions and near curtains, or because household pets have knocked them over.

December in particular is the busiest month for dwelling fires and great care should be taken hanging decorations away from sources of heat and flame, xmas presents and wrapping paper should be placed safely away from harm. Ensure your xmas lights are kept away from flammables and that they are switched off at night and when you go out.

If you are celebrating this year and having a party where alcohol is present, please enjoy yourself but take extra care as many fires and injuries can be attributed to actions related to this.

If you have an open fire, make sure you sweep your chimney regularly and watch out for sparks from logs.



## Afghan Schools Trust

The Afghan Schools Trust is a unique and inspiring organisation which, through the perseverance of three individuals from the Glenkens, is bringing about much needed change to another remote region half way around the globe.

It has been a phenomenal success since its inception in 2002 four schools have been started and various other necessary projects carried out in the region. And the most impressive thing is that the Trust is a completely grass roots organisation. The trust is run voluntarily by its hard working creators and donations are given directly to the coordinator in Nuristan. The Trust states; "We purposely kept the charity small so that we don't have to become an NGO and spend all the money we receive on administration. So most donations are local – we are supported by local schools and many local people."

The initial aim of the Trust was simply to open schools, as people in this remote area had no means to the education they wanted and needed so much. Then the goal became to keep them open during the war. And now the aim is to keep creating more schools and helping with necessary projects in the area. They say; "As we have the direct connection to our coordinator in Nuristan who is himself local, we are very aware of what the feelings are in the area. Nuristan has never been opened up to the outside world until now and, for the first time, the people en masse want to be connected. What they want most are roads and education. No NGOs will work in the area where the schools are. The Afghan Schools Trust is the only working body where no one dares to go — foreign agency or government. So the people are very happy to have us providing some of the education and help the area needs." Recently, the government has taken over the running costs of the schools which is a huge success as it shows they have faith the schools will survive, even in this remote location, and this allows the Trust to continue creating more schools and working on other necessary projects in the region.

During December, The Clog and Shoe Workshop in Balmaclellan will become an Aladdin's Cave of Afghan treasures – the workshop will be filled with wonderful, affordable Christmas gifts. And you can be happy in the knowledge that the money you spend will support the Afghan Schools Trust, helping to fund more schools in Nuristan.











