FUNDING FOR MOSSDALE & LAURIESTON AREA

£100,000 of funding from the Scottish Executive was recently allocated to the area of Mossdale, Laurieston, Glenlochar and Ringford, to be spent on improving services, highlighting local issues and to make a difference to people's lives. This area was one of 20 such areas in Scotland, which had been identified by the Executive as suffering from rural deprivation. There are four other areas in Dumfries and Galloway which qualify for this status although this is the only one in the Stewartry.

A meeting was held in Balmaghie Public Hall, Laurieston, on Wednesday 18th January 2006 to discuss the allocation. The meeting was chaired by George Prentice (Councillor), and was attended by Derek Crichton (Stewartry Area Manager). Ian Howie (Stewartry LRP), Kenny Eggo (Stewartry Community Planning Co-ordinator), Colin Douglas (D & G Transportation Manager), as well as a good representation from the area's Community Councils and local residents.

Initially the discussion centred on a profile of the area, current problems and how best this project could assist in improving the area. The problem with the electricity supply to the area was highlighted, and it was agreed representations could be made re this. The fact that there

was only one shop in the area, that there was only very limited public transport, and that there was a desire for night classes to be held in the area were all matters raised, as was the need to enhance parking and picnic facilities in the area. All four areas had community halls and the upgrading of these would be considered.

It was agreed there were three themes that allocated money could be used to address.

These were a) improving public transport, and explore the possibility of better use of community transport and ring and ride b) local environmental improvements and c) to improve local services, with increased community information possibly been made available. Three sub-Committees were set up for this purpose and further meetings would be arranged to move this project forward.

Joanna Gisbey




Originally from the Black Isle, Joanna Gisbey moved to Galloway in 1998 with her husband Donald following her graduation from Glasgow School of Art. After a short spell as a decorative cake maker then shoemaker at the Clog and Shoe workshop in Balmaclellan, Joanna returned to drawing and painting, producing colourful landscapes of the local area, primarily in pastel. Joanna pursues a variety of creative activities such as writing poetry and making sculptures. She is especially happy producing what she calls "fiddly things" such as paper cutting, making brooches and hats from felt and creating beautiful, delicate hand-made books.

Joanna now divides her time between teaching art part-time in primary schools around the Stewartry and working from a studio in New Galloway. WALKING FESTIVAL PROGRAMME LAUNCHED

One of the highlights of the 2006 Newton Stewart Walking Festival sees walkers explore the Rhinns of Kells west of Dalry in a challenging 13 mile high level ridge walk. The Newton Stewart area and the Glenkens have close walking links, thanks to the 212 mile long Southern Upland Way, which connects Glen Trool with Clatteringshaws before passing through the Glenkens at Dalry.

Organisers of the festival have recently released full details of their 2006 event. And despite attracting interest from across the country, including bookings from a couple in Australia, organisers are also keen to welcome local walkers and outdoor enthusiasts from the Glenkens.

Now in its forth year, the three day festival, which takes place from Friday 12 to Sunday 14 May includes 17 guided walks with something for all abilities. Challenging open moorland treks and ascents of some of the South of Scotland's highest hills are interspersed with shorter woodland walks and town trails.

Following an introductory walk and welcome cellidh on Friday 12 May, the festival's base for Saturday 13 May is Bruce's Stone overlooking Loch Trool. The location provides not only wonderful walking opportunities around the scenic Glen Trool, but also acts as the perfect starting point for an ascent of the region's highest hill, Merrick and an exploration of Galloway's wild heart.

Sunday 14 May sees the festival move to Kirroughtree Visitor Centre, south east of Newton Stewart. From there a range of guided forest walks are offered, suitable for a range of abilities. For the more active, there is an ascent of Cairnsmore of Fleet while coastal and archaeological themed walks round off the festival's offering.

Chairman of the Festival Committee, Dr Bob Simpson said: "This year's Newton Stewart Walking Festival will offer an unprecedented variety of walking opportunities. Our committee of local enthusiasts know the terrain, history and best routes through the Galloway Hills to ensure that visitors have a weekend of walking to remember. We have brought together some really cracking walks using the nearby Southern Upland Way, Wigtown Bay local nature reserve and Galloway Forest Park. Through our close working relationship with the Newton Stewart based Galloway Mountain Rescue

Team we are able to offer expert guides for our more challenging walks whilst Forestry Commission Scotland's involvement allows us to make use of their excellent facilities throughout the Galloway Forest Park."

The 2006 event also marks the first year of a link up with Lake District based independent outdoor specialists Stewart R Cunningham, who opened their first Scottish base in Newton Stewart in 2005.



DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL



The proposed closure of Dalry Library will be on the agenda at the next meeting of Dalry Community Council on 6th February. Acknowledging that there has been concern expressed within the Glenkens regarding the closure, Chairman Tom Scott reassured residents that after the discussion the Community Council will formulate its response to the proposal. At the moment Dumfries and Galloway Council insist that the library, one of four facing closure across the region, will remain open in the meantime until they have considered plans for a replacement mobile service: "Councillors decided that Dalry, Port William, Lochmaben and Eastriggs libraries will remain open until the possible introduction of an extended mobile library service," said a Dumfries and Galloway Council spokesman.

Christmas Lunch

The Annual Christmas Lunch was held in the Cross Keys Hotel in New Galloway on Sunday 17 December. The hosts were the proprietors Mr and Mrs Roberts. Approximately forty senior citizens attended. After they received their usual dram and welcome address, Mr Vincent said grace. After lunch the guests were entertained with carols by former and current pupils of Kells School which they themselves arranged. Miss Hannah McKenna played the piano for the first time before a live audience. A sub-committee of the council had made all the arrangements with the assistance from Jim Hopkins in purchasing the raffle prizes from a wholesaler in Dumfries. At the conclusion of the occasion Mr Ewart Muir, a former councillor, gave a vote of thanks.

Town Hall

Our Town Hall is badly needing to be seen to in the near future. The Community Council had a representative from the Stewartry Office at their August meeting and it was discussed at length re, the state of the building and it was pointed out to him that they were putting the cart before the horse in that they repaired the wall and the ceiling on the stairway going up to the main hall (it was plastered, papered and painted) before they tackled the source of the trouble which is the water coming in from either a crack in the wall or from a defect in the roof. The green algae on the wall of the Town Hall facing Duke Street is now very noticeable and is probably due to a gutter requiring to be cleaned out. The whole building could do with being repainted. The lady members of the council were also a bit concerned about the lack of facilities in the kitchen. There is also no sign of any progress in installing toilets and means of getting up the stairway to the main hall for the disabled.

Maintenance Issues

Mr Charles Clemmle, Area Manager for roads, Mr George Prentice, Regional Councillor and two representatives from the Community Council met in New Galloway recently and discussed a number of Issues, car parking being the priority issue. Others were: car parking at Braeside and to make the small slip road one way; the signs at the corner of High Street and the Newton Stewart road at the corner of the Doctor's surgery to be altered; Duke Street lighting in the area of the old fire station requires another pole; the pavement between GCAT and beyond the Post Office to be re-laid and

the footbridge on the right of way of Greenhead brae to have a broken step repaired. A security fence is to be installed on the right of way at Bardarroch House in the High Street as there is a large open hole there. Last but not least the repairs to the Town Hall.

Loreburn Housing Association are about to commence work on the old Bleech Green in erecting new houses. Now that this project is about to be underway perhaps we may now get something done about the Old Edinburgh Road (Bottom Road) which has been badly neglected. Over the years the Community Council have made numerous requests to have it seen to and now that the houses are to be built we may be in luck.


There was no Community Council meeting in December due to the festive break. We are presently awaiting the go ahead from Historic Scotland to remove the trees and scrub from the Motte.

CELEBRITY SURPRISE FOR SHEILA MERRILL

Mrs Sheila Merrill from Dairy had an unexpected surprise in September when she found herself in the arms of Magnus Magnusson! The occasion was the Scottish Motor Neurone Disease Association (SMNDA) AGM held at Stirling University and Magnus was there to present Shella with a certificate to acknowledge her service and fundraising for them. "I had no idea I was going to be awarded the certificate." says Shella, who has supported the association for 12 years since her husband, Harry, died of motor neurone disease in 1994, "It was a lovely surprise and I managed to express my thanks in a few words."

Over the years Shella has raised funds by the sale of a book called Dougal's Story. The book was written by Harry during the later stages of his illness and tells many humorous tales of the Merrill's beloved Labrador, Dougal. Harry wrote the story with the assistance of a specialised computer which he was able to operate by using his mouth to activate an infra red beam. Copies of the book are available to purchase at the GCAT shop, priced £3 each and all proceeds go to SMNDA.

MND is a condition which destroys the motor neurones of the body. It causes progressive paralysis, loss of speech and makes eating and drinking difficult, although intelligence and memory are usually not affected, MND can

affect anyone and unfortunately it is always fatal as there is no cure.



NEW GALLOWAY Our Historic Burgh

The First World War

4th August 1914 saw the outbreak of that terrible war which was to affect every man, woman and child in the country, and in which almost every family suffered the loss of one or more loved ones. Kells parish was no exception, and out of an adult population of 170, 25 men lost their lives, and one daughter of the parish, Nurse Jane Nodwell, Volunteer Ambulance Driver, gave her life for her country. The youngest inhabitant of New Galloway to lose his life in the Great War was Midshipman James R H Faed of The Bungalow, who was lost aboard HMS "Goliath" at the Dardanelles in May 1915 at the age of only 15 years.


Men from Kells parish served in many different regiments, and apart from our local Kings Own Scottish Borderers many seem to have joined Highland regiments, in particular the Cameron Highlanders. Others served in the Black Watch, the Argyll and Sutherlands, the Royal Scots Fusiliers, and such widely varying regiments as the North Lancashire Loyals, the Middlesex, the Lincolnshires, the Royal Field Artillery, and the New Zealand Royal Field Artillery. Also, to have two men from so far inland lost at sea seems surprising, although Midshipman Faed's family belonged to Gatehouse-of-Fleet, so maybe that accounted for his interest in the sea.

New Galloway, and indeed the whole of the Glenkens area soon began gathering up parcels of comforts for the brave men who were fighting for their country. The Glenkens Society organised knitting competitions in the schools and soon socks, scarves and other useful warm items of clothing were being collected and sent out to our boys. This continued until at last the war was over.

When hostilities finally ended the Armistice was signed at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month, 1919. Life gradually returned to normal and those who had survived the vicious fighting came home to resume their former occupations, and peace returned to the Glenkens.

Celebrations were organised to take place in New Galloway on 19th July 1919. Games were arranged for grown-ups and children alike, and plenty of good things to eat and drink were laid on by the local hotels. It may seem surprising to some to learn that the celebrations were held on the New Galloway Golf Course, but the land which had been used for the Golf Course was the original burgh common land. Here the inhabitants could gather fuel and graze their cattle and sheep. This was, therefore, the appropriate place for community celebrations to be held.

On 23rd April 1922 a ceremony was held to unveil the striking granite War Memorial to those who had given their lives. Almost the entire population of the Burgh joined the procession through



the village to the knoll near the public park where the memorial had been erected.

Another memorial, easily missed unless one knows where to find it, was erected privately by Mr John Murray of "Troquhain", Balmaclennan in memory of his son John, 2nd Lieutenant in the Kings Own Scottish Borderers, who was killed in West Flanders in 1917 aged 19. This memorial is in the form of a tall plinth surmounted by a cross, and sits high up on the side of the lovely falls on the Lowran Burn above the A762 New Galloway to Mossdale road.

As a tribute to all those who gave their lives for King and country it is appropriate to quote these poignant lines written by Laurence Binyon, and first printed in The Times, 21st September 1914. They are now used as a prayer by the Royal British Legion..

"They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

GCAT MATTERS

Much progress has been made over the last six months and here is a project update.

The Building: Planning permission was granted by Dumfries and Galloway Council in December. There were two objections to the plans on the grounds of insufficient car parking but the Director of Planning was able to reassure councillors and members of the Stewartry Area Committee that the issue had been considered and resolved satisfactorily. It was suggested that Car Parking in New Galloway should be put on the Agenda for the next meetings of both Kells Community Council and the Stewartry Area Committee in an attempt to come up with a practical solution to a problem that has been discussed for the last 10 years.

Funding: The funding for phases 1 and 2 of the redevelopment of the building has now been secured. The tender process is underway and it is hoped to appoint contractors in March and for work to start on site in April. Plans for the building are on display in the GCAT shop if anyone would like to study them more closely.

Management Structure: At the AGM in December,

- 1. Nine Directors from the community were elected to serve on the GCAT Board for a 3-year term. They are Cathy Agnew, Marion Bone, Roger Breakwell, Anna Campbell, Wendy Davis, Brian Edgar, Gill Khosla, Chris Mason and Bob Peace.
- Four separate committees have been established
 Finance and General Purposes, Property, Events and
 Marketing, and Community, Activities and Enterprise.
 Membership of these committees will be made up of
 directors and members of GCAT.

Members: A GCAT Membership scheme has been set up. There are already over 100 Members who have pledged their on-going support to the organisation. Membership is open to anyone living in the Glenkens – there is no cost – and can be applied for at any time. In the future it is planned to set up a Friends of GCAT which will, in effect, become a fund-raising group.

Activities: We have had a successful programme of events including touring theatre, folk music, self-out comedy nights and a popular series of organic cookery demonstrations. More is planned for the future with collaborations with the Puppet Animation Festival, the Dumfries and Galloway Arts Festival and the Scottish International Festival. More cookery demonstrations have been arranged and we will soon be offering IT training sessions for the over 60's. Revenue funding has been secured from Comic Relief and Lloyds TSB and we have received grants from the Scottish Arts Council, Leader + and The Holywood Trust to develop a youth project called GYROscope.

Staffing: We are looking to appoint a Financial Administrator on a 1-year contract from March 2006. Look out for details in the press or contact the GCAT Shop. As always, we welcome input from our wide network of volunteers who give as much or as little of their time as they can on an ad hoc basis.

Community Bus: Just to remind you that the GCAT Bus — Your Community Bus — is available to hire at any time. It continues to be run and managed by the Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI), a subgroup under the GCAT Umbrella. 

ROYAL SHAKESPEARE COMPANY: MINI-BUS TRIP


GCAT is running a Mini-bus trip to see the Royal Shakespeare Company perform Part 1 of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales at the Ice Bowl in Dumfries in February. This classic work follows a group of medieval pilgrims on their way from London to Canterbury, as they entertain each other with some the liveliest and best known stories in the English language. From the tragic and moral, to the comic and the downright bawdy, this new adaptation by Mike Poulton will give audiences a flavour of the original Middle English in which the Tales were written, whilst making them entirely accessible and understandable to a modern audience. Part I of this production will include the Knight's, Miller's and Nun's Priest's tales each told in different styles ranging from puppetry and shadow play to opera and farce, mirroring the many narrative voices employed by Chaucer himself.

This is the second time that the company have visited the region; last year they brought Julius Caesar and Two Gentlemen of Verona which were both sell out performances. These are large scale productions which can be quite a spectacle: not only because the company bring a large cast, costumes and all the other things associated with a touring theatre company, they also arrive complete with full stage, set and seating along with all their lighting and sound requirements. As soon as the RSC arrives in Dumfries on Monday 20 February, the technical crew will set to work erecting the RSC's unique mobile auditorium. Five 45 foot articulated lorries, carrying over 50 tonnes of equipment - including everything from the auditorium,

seating, costumes and set, to the teaurn and the washing machine — will be unloaded, and by Tuesday evening The Ice Bowl will be transformed into a fully operational professional theatre, ready for the opening performance.

WHAT IS PENSION CREDIT?

Pension Credit is an entitlement for people aged 60 and over living in Great Britain, which could top up your weekly income to a guaranteed minimum level. And, if you have saved towards your retirement you could receive extra money too.

Over 3 million people are receiving extra money. You could join them. So make sure you're not missing out.

If you qualify for Pension Credit, we may be able to backdate any money you are entitled to for up to a maximum of 12 months. Some people have received as much as £1000.

Even if you live with your grown-up family or you own your own home, you may still be eligible for Pension Credit. And it may mean that you get help with your Council Tax Benefit.

IS IT FOR ME?

If you or your partner are aged 60 or over, you are likely to be entitled to Pension Credit if your income is less than:

1 £109.45 a week for single people. 2 £167.05 a week for couples.

If either you or your partner are aged 65 and over and have modest savings investments or income (such as a second pension), you could get extra money as well, up to £16.44 a week if you are single or £21.51 for couples.

What's more, there is no fixed limit to the amount of savings and investments you can have. If you have savings and investments over £6,000 (£10,000 if you are in a care home), you will be treated as having an income from it of £1 a week for each extra £500 (or part of £500) over £6,000.

This means you still may be able to apply even if your income is

1 £151 a week for single people.

2 £221 a week for couples.

These figures would include any income you are treated as having from your savings and investments and are only a guide. If you are severely disabled or a carer, or have a mortgage or housing loan, you may be able to get Pension Credit even if your income is higher than

You do not have to pay tax on any Pension credit payments you may receive.

WHAT DO I DO?

Liz Cole can give you all the details concerning Pension Credit and she has the application forms, as well as other benefit and services forms, at the GCAT office in New Galloway. She can come to your home and assist you with form-filling.

Or, you can find out more by phoning Freephone 0800 99 1234. The line is open from 8am to 8pm Monday to Friday, and from 9am to 1pm on Saturdays. (A textphone service is also available for people who have difficulties with their hearing or speech on 0800 169 0133).

A trained operator can fill in an application form over the phone and will send it to you to check and sign. If you would prefer, you can ask someone else to call on your behalf or arrange for a member of staff from The Pension Service to visit you to help you apply.

The information you will need at hand is:

Your National Insurance number Information about any money you have coming in.

Information about your savings. Details of the account you would like to use to receive Pension Credit payments. (If you have a partner, you will need to have

COOKERY DEMONSTRATIONS

Liz Cole organised a series of free cookery demonstrations, with Catherine Braid Organic Country Cook, open to all in New Galloway, Carsphairn and Dalry in mld December. Liz gave a talk concerning her work at GCAT and then Catherine prepared several different dishes. Questions were welcomed, recipe sheets handed out, and free tasters offered to everybody. The recipes varied each day.

The three day event proved to be such a success in terms of the numbers of people who attended and the enjoyment that came from the demonstrations, that Liz is planning another for the spring. Again the recipes and ingredients used will suit the time of year! In the meantime, here are some reviews of the December demonstrations:

COOKERY AT LAGWYNE HALL

The kitchen of Lagwyne Hall, Carsphalrn, was filled to capacity when the Organic Country Cook Demonstration took place on Tuesday 6th December. Liz Cole, the Community Project Worker for GCAT, introduced Catherine Braid of The Green Tea House, Monialve, who made mushroom, celeriac and stilton soup; a pork and chestnut roll; a turkey, bacon, leek and feta quiche, and a raspberry and apple slice. A rapt audience of both men and women listened to Catherine's clear explanations and practical hints whilst she prepared the dishes which initiated questions and comments. Then conversation ceased whilst all the dishes were tasted, savoured and greatly enjoyed.

Paula Cochrane, Community Worker based in Castle Douglas for Age Concern, also came, and it was an opportunity for Liz and Paula to meet those attending and answer questions. They also provided an invaluable selection of appropriate leaflets on healthy eating for us all, but particularly for the over 60s.

The occasion was deemed to have been a great success as it gave people an opportunity to meet, to learn, to taste and to take away the recipes provided by Catherine as well as the pamphlets provided by Liz and Paula. We hope that this occasion will be repeated, but next time the word will have got around and we will have to move into the big hall to accommodate an even larger audience.

THE TASTE OF REAL COOKING

Delia Smith move over! Now I'm a fan ôf Delia but the little TV box can't compare with being there, seeing the whole thing, being able to ask questions, smelling the enticing aromas and, of course, sampling the results. So it was a great opportunity to be able to attend one of the organic cookery demonstrations set up by Liz Cole and given by Catherine Braid of the Green Tea House in Moniaive. There were three and I went to the one in Dalry Town Hall in the company of around 30 ladles. Many years ago I went to a demonstration in Edinburgh and was disappointed as the recipes were far too complicated and exotic for my simple cooking talents, but Catherine's was clearly allined at anyone who wanted to try something new but not too difficult. Of course everything was organic but I can't see any reason why good non organic ingredients wouldn't give superb results

Catherine started with the roast butternut squash soup which involves roasting the ingredients together before boiling up with some vegetable stock, then went on to the pheasants which she stuffed with venison haggis, any haggis or sausage meat would do she said, and nicely wrapped in pancetta (ordinary streaky bacon will do) with enough red wine to keep the pheasant moist. Following that we saw how to make a chocolate and mint roulade with raspberries and, oh dear, lots of cream and finally vegetable galette with aubergine, peppers, onlons, tomatoes and mozzarella cheese on a pastry base. And, OK, some of the tedious stuff had been done beforehand but that's four recipes as well as a sauce to go with the pheasant in not much more than an hour, yet clearly demonstrated and explained including where locally to buy the organic ingredients. Another great thing about these recipes is that there are many variations that you can try so that there are many different ways of doing things and you get, in effect, many recipes in one.

And wow! Did it taste good. The soup was thick and full of flavour, the haggis stuffed pheasant was juicy and just the right combination of tastes, the galette was crisp and more-ish and the roulade was, well, lets just say you couldn't finish off a tasting better!

I was surprised to be the only male present. Perhaps the thought of complicated time consuming work in the kitchen puts some off, and, yes, you can't get something for nothing but this is what I call sensible cookery. But then perhaps the men just say "let's go and eat at the Green Tea House and let Catherine do all the work!"

So what happened when I tried? I really liked the soup so dld that and that's when I found the advantage of having been there to see and understand why things were done the way they were. Fortunately I had written notes beside the recipe and, using those, could recall what I had seen. I cooked for five people and everyone enjoyed it and so decided to do it again, correcting a couple of things I hadn't quite got right and it was superb. It still took me a lot longer than Catherine but not so long as to put me off doing it again.



FIRST PUBLIC MEETING OF THE GLENKENS TRANSPORT ASSOCIATION (GTA)

The first public meeting of the Glenkens Transport Association (GTA) was held at the Ken Bridge Hotel on Friday 13 January to follow up the research carried out in the last 18 months and see how this could now lead to improvements in transport in the area, ranging from timetable changes on the regional bus service to new cycling routes.

The meeting heard that a Regional Transport Partnership (RTP) will be taking over transport functions from Dumfries and Galloway Council. Most of the people involved will be the same but the new structure will allow the opportunity for more initiatives. One initiative was to combine all the transport functions of the Council in conjunction with other statutory authorities such as the Scottish Ambulance Service in one authority. This could increase the availability of minibus transport by releasing school, hospital, social services and other transport for use when not needed for their designated purpose. The new RTP, starting work in April could be instrumental in achieving this.

Practical possibilities were discussed. One popular scheme was to have a local car / taxi service to allow both commercial and voluntary use. It could meet service buses, run trips to the airport to collect visitors and possibly be involved in hospital transport depending on developments with the existing NHS and voluntary organisations. This will be looked into by the GTA Trustees and a meeting called to discuss further actions once the practicability of such a scheme had been established.

There was some disappointment that the Council had not been able to implement many of the changes suggested at research meetings such as better links to Ayr although some adjustments had been made such as linking the early Dumfries bus to the railway station on request. The difficulty with changes, it appeared, was that services were delivered against a contract and it was difficult to make changes until tenders came up for renegotiation in 2007.


Dalry Primary Haggis Bash (continued)
