



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LOCAL **ARTISTS** Robin Ade



Pancake Lunches have developed into an annual event in New Galloway. It is now several years since Balmaclellan and Kells Guild first ran a Pancake Lunch, on Shrove Tuesday, to make funds for a nominated charity. The first two years it was held in the Lower Town Hall until the Guild discovered its popularity and had to move 'upstairs'. Each year the ladies of the Guild are overwhelmed by the support received from everyone, far and near. Now, to our astonishment, there is often a queue stretching back down the stairs!

This year, the nominated charity was Macmillan Cancer Relief. A cheque was presented at the Guild's March meeting, for £300, to Ms Jane Watson, who spoke that afternoon on Macmillan Nurses.

It is no mean feat, as the Guild ladies are few in number. However, it is thanks to co-opted members for the day, that we are able to achieve such a great success year by year. This year 240 pancakes were consumed in no time at all. Four savoury and four sweet fillings were on offer, ranging from curried turkey to the traditional lemon pancake.

THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Since the last news about the Town Hall several officials from Dumfries have been to survey the work to be done on it. The work that has to be seen to is the repairs to the roof or the wall to stop the water coming in. The building has to be repainted and issues regarding disabled access have to be resolved. The Lower Town Hall has been partly refloored with new planking as it was in need of repair. The painting of the lower road, "New Galloway in Autumn" by Anna Hotchkis that used to be displayed in the lower hall has now been returned. It was away at Kirkcudbright Museum being restored and reframed and is now on display in the main hall.

No council meeting was held in March due to the adverse weather conditions. Our next monthly meeting will be held on the 10^{th} April at 7.30pm. Please see the notice board for the agenda.

Years ago we were informed that a bid would be made on our behalf to have the lower road widened and resurfaced. It appears at last that there is a wee bit left in the kitty at the end of the financial year so they have come up to patch the holes and resurface the worst of the damage to tide us over till next year.

The proprietors of the Cross Keys Hotel, Mr and Mrs D Roberts, held and organised another very successful race night in aid of the local fire brigade, where a sum of over £600 was raised. This is the third time that this event has taken place.

CARSPHAIRN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Day time break-ins - There have been several day time break-ins reported. The thieves seem to be targeting properties, stealing antiques and jewellery. If anyone sees anything suspicious, eg unknown vehicle parked, they should report it to the police immediately.

Rural Housing - It has been suggested that a Community Fund be set up to purchase land for affordable housing in Carsphairn. This will duplicate the work of the Housing Trust, which is still waiting for charitable status to be confirmed. It was decided to delay setting up a Community Fund until the position with the Trust was established. Loreburn is building in New Galloway and Dalry over the next year. Some discussion took place about trying to get them interested in building in Carsphairn. It was decided that it would be preferable for the Glenkens Housing Trust to have ownership of the houses as we would have more influence on who became tenants.

There is a meeting of the Glenkens Affordable Housing Trust in New Galloway Town Hall on Thursday 16 February at 8pm. Everyone is welcome to attend.

A representative has attended several seminars. He commented on the unhelpful negative attitudes of some Council officials towards attracting more people to live in rural areas.

Community Garden - A quote for dyking has been accepted. It is hoped that the dykes will be built in March. A letter is to be sent to landowners asking for donations of suitable stone. The Community Council will arrange for transport to the site. A working party to cut the banking and clear weed, trees and shrubs will meet on Saturday 18 February at 10am. Volunteers are to bring suitable tools.

Portable Defibrillator - Iain Howie, of the Stewartry Community Safety Forum will approach the Galloway Mountain Rescue Team about demonstrating the portable defibrillator next time they have a meeting in Lagwyne Hall. The demonstration to be widely promoted by means of leaflets and posters.

Boundaries Commission - Objections to the wards proposed have been upheld. A letter in support of the readjusted boundaries has been sent to the Boundaries Commission.


SEARCH FOR LOCAL STAMPS

I have a small request directed to those folk who have lived here in the Glenkens for at least the past half century, or who have had close connections with this area. As a boy growing up in New Galloway I remember seeing an envelope containing large stamps sitting in a bureau in the family home. As I recall the stamps were not legal postage but consisted of simple stylised designs of hills, trees and lochs created to advertise this area. Whether this was just the Glenkens or Galloway as a whole I cannot remember. On the envelope was the instruction to affix the stamps to any correspondence being sent out of the immediate vicinity and especially overseas. I suspect that the stamps dated back to the late 1940s and were an attempt at regeneration after World War II. Sadly, I cannot find any trace of our stamps now and would love to get at least a copy of one.

YOUR DOG

BORDER COLLIE

'Your Dog' is a new feature to the Gazette which will look at the Glenkens' most popular dog breeds, focusing on one breed per issue.

Breed History - a Working Dog

The Border Collie became a classified breed in the early twentieth century, although Collies worked with shepherds in The Borders for hundreds of years previous to this. These dogs were bred for the sole purpose of herding sheep. As shepherds often have to work large areas of land, the dogs have been bred to be quick witted and perceptive, often responding to a whistle or a gesture over long distances and using their initiative to negotiate any obstacles.

Main Uses in the Glenkens

The Glenkens has been a sheep farming area for many years and up until recently nearly every farm had Border Collies to help with the farm duties. But these days sheep farming is in decline and farmers who do have sheep tend to ride quad bikes to round them up rather than rely on the trusty sheepdog.

Border Collies as Pets


Border Collie Rescue recommends that only non-workers should be taken on as pets. William Wallace, who was Secretary of the Moniaive Sheepdog Trials for 33 years, has a similar view. 'They are not really for pets – although that's not to say they don't make good pets... but generally being kept indoors is not an environment they want to live in – they need the freedom, and satisfaction, that they get as a working dog'.

But Border Collies' intelligence and quick wits are being put to good use in the pet arena — if you watched Crufts this year you'll know that Border Collies and Collie-crosses topped nearly all of the active categories, from Agility to Flyball, Obedience to Heelwork to Music. So as shepherding declines, perhaps this is the new working future for the Border Collie...

Training

Larry Jones, owner of the 'top shop' in Dalry, has a seven month old Border Collie called Ben. He says he likes the breed because it is 'trainable, intelligent and biddable — and needs plenty of exercise which keeps me fit!'

This breed has an active mind and body, so needs a lot mental stimulation and exercise - a working sheepdog averages two to three miles for every mile the sheep are moved, so may cover up to 50 miles a day. A lot of the problems people experience with Border Collies as pets are due to boredom and lack of exercise which leads to frustration in the dog. At Border Collie Rescue, only 10% of the dogs they receive for re-homing



come from working backgrounds – the rest all come from pet homes.

Sheepdog trainers describe training young dogs as teaching children. Davie Mackay, who has worked and trained Border Collles for over 30 years, says 'you have to be patient with a dog and take your time — too many farmers are harsh on their dogs and then wonder why the dog doesn't work well for them. They are sensitive, intelligent animals and will work to please you, but shouting at them just confuses them'. William Wallace also says; 'If you make a friend of the dog as a pup it's the best way — then they'll do anything for you'.

Finding the Right Dog

If you are looking for a working dog, many good working lines are registered with the International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS), and many ISDS registered dogs are handed in to Border Collie Rescue(0870 444 5838), so it is worth checking there. For a pet collie, check out local rescue centres (Dumfries & Galloway Canine Rescue Centre — 01387 770 210 or SSPCA Dunragit Animal Welfare Centre — 01581 400 253) or contact Border Collie Rescue. It would be advisable to read up about the breed if you are thinking of getting a Border Collie — try the local library, or read a book like 'The Versatile Border Collie' by Janet E Larson.

CARSPHAIRN HERITAGE EXHIBITION

'The Killing Times'

The Carsphairn Heritage Group is holding an exhibition on 'The Killing Times' in the Glenkens at the Heritage Centre in Carsphairn. It will feature historical information and local tales about Covenanting sites throughout the Glenkens. The exhibition starts on Good Friday (14th April) and will run on weekends and bank holidays until May 29th, thereafter eache day except Wednesdays until the end of September.

Dr. Bartholomew has put together a very lucid introduction to the exhibition, explaining the oftentimes confusing history of the Covenanting movement. The stories include intimate details of actual events and provide a fascinating insight into the people and places of the Killing Times in the Glenkens fully illustrated with photographs and artwork.

The drawing below depicts 'The Death of James McMichael', a classic story of the time. In the



late 1600s the area around Carsphairn was very oppressed and there was much persecution - the people of the area were devoted to their Presbyterian principles and loyal to the Covenanting cause. The minister, Peter Pearson, took delight in searching out nonconformists. The inhabitants of Carsphairn decided that enough was enough and sent a group of representatives to the manse to discuss the situation with the minister - they wanted to be left in peace to worship the way they wanted. When the minister understood what they had come to discuss he refused to listen, locked the door to prevent them leaving, and produced a pistol. Some of the people who had come to discuss the Issue had waited outside and, upon hearing the commotion, James McMichael assumed his friends were in trouble and, grabbing his own gun, shot the minister. Thereafter McMichael was forced to go into hiding, where he was eventually tracked down and, after challenging Claverhouse to single combat, was killed from behind by one of Claverhouse's troopers.




Photo of the Holy Linn, a famous meeting place during the Killing Times.



NEW GALLOWAY Our Historic Burgh

The Hydro Scheme is Planned

The War was over, and the Glenkens folk were looking forward to a return to peace in every respect. But, not so fast! The Government had realised the value of an electricity supply as an essential commodity throughout the country, and ways to generate these supplies were being considered. A Hydro-electric scheme was discussed, and Galloway, with its many lochs and rivers, seemed an ideal area. Many lengthy discussions and meetings took place in 1923, with Loch Doon named as a possible main catchment area. Among those in favour of the suggestion was Mr Wellwood Maxwell of "Glenlee". Due to the sparse population of Galloway, however, the idea was shelved until May 1929, when the bill was passed by Parliament and received the Royal Assent.

But this was only a beginning. The environment had to have some form of protection, and negotiations with the local authorities began. An agreement was made between the contractors and Kirkcudbright Council regarding a road levy to assist with the cost of repairs to roads, bridges, etc. incurred by the Council as a result of the extraordinary traffic which would be using the roads. It was agreed that 6d (2½p) per ton per mile in winter, and 4½d (2p) per ton per mile in summer would be paid for the Newton Stewart New Galloway road, Gatehill road, and Garrary road. All other roads would receive payments of 4d (1½p) in winter and 3d (1¼p) in summer. A further agreement was reached regarding weight limits on all roads north of the Dumfries - Newton Stewart road, whereby all loads being transported on these roads would be limited to three tons! Occasional exceptional loads, such as machinery for the power stations, sluice gates, and so on, were unavoidable, but contractors agreed to take very special precautions, and to consult the county road surveyor before moving these items. Unfortunately, the road levy agreement, though sound in theory, failed in practice due to certain contractors failing to honour this aspect of their agreement!

Further agreements, more successful than the road levy idea, came with the forming of a scenery committee. These gentlemen were presented with the unenviable task of assuring councils and general public alike that the more unsightly parts of the scheme, such as the substation at Gienlee, would be screened with trees, shrubs, or walls of local stone. Clatteringshaws dam, however, was considered by all three members of the committee to be "extremely ugly". This unfortunate fact remained a bone of contention with



locals for many years, until the glaring white dam wall had finally weathered to a mellow grey, and the trees planted by the Forestry Commission had grown to a size which screened much of the dam from the otherwise extremely scenic road.

Last, but certainly not least, was the question of the preservation of the salmon fishing in the rivers Dee, Ken, Deugh and Doon. Fish passes were incorporated into the plans for the dams at Tongland, Earlstoun and Carsfad, as well as a pass for the descending salmon smolts at Kendoon. The height of the passes was a constant source of concern for the planners with Carsfad pass at 74 feet high and Earlstoun at 70½ feet high being the highest ever to be constructed.

Glenlee power station did not present the same problems, as the water for this station was to come from the man-made Clatteringshaws. Such major environmental changes always meet with a certain amount of

disapproval. One poetic gentleman put into verse his feelings, and probably those of many others, particularly in the early days of the Galloway Hydroelectric Scheme.





Lawson is the best "collector" in the business, operating in the seedy world of debt collection; he is at the top of his "profession".


However when one of his "clients" commits suicide Lawson's life is shattered irrevocably.





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

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KNOCKENGORROCH WORLD CEILIDH


