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








NEW BOOKS FROM LOCAL AUTHORS




coming along to get their books signed were invited to eat strawberries, make a friendship bracelet and have their faces painted. It was a lot of fun!'

CARSPHAIRN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The AGM of the Community Council was held on 29 May 2006 during which the chairman Mrs Sylvia Sinclair gave a summary of issues and achievements from the previous year. It was followed by an ordinary meeting,

Following on from the April meeting P.C.Wilson reported that the police traffic car has been and will be in the area shortly. The Council is investigating the possibility of introducing rumble strips on the approaches to the village and it is likely that the 20mph zone outside the school will be in place by the end of the summer.

Funding has been awarded to complete the community garden in the next few months.

A summary was given of the meeting between Councillor George Prentice, Mr Charles Clemie (Roads Department) and Mrs Sylvia Sinclair. Various issues arising from Community Council meetings were discussed and a subsequent action plan was formulated. Most matters related to roads issues within the parish. Action will be taken on the uneven footpaths on both sides of the village street, a salt bin will be provided at the start of the winter season, faulty street and beacon lighting will be repaired and improvements will be made to the site of the recycling bins.

During the meeting a demonstration of a portable defibrillator was given by members of the Stewartry Safety Forum and the Galloway Mountain Rescue team. It was agreed that the machine was easy to operate and that the Community Council would contact other groups to see how they operate and establish a list of people locally who may be willing to be "on call" on a rota basis as well as apply for funding to purchase a machine.

THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH Community Council Chairman's Report 2005-06

Town Hall

After much delay and several complaints the town half clock has been repaired. The stairway was re-decorated due to damp seeping through the wall and damaging the wallpaper; however, the root cause of the damp (a leak in the roof) has not been addressed. The costs of renting the town hall need to be looked at - local organisations such as the Fire Brigade and Gold Club are finding it too expensive to use our facilities. Disabled facilities need to be upgraded - there is

no way for a person in a wheelchair to get into the upper hall and no disabled toilet facilities.

Old Edinburgh Road

The road is part of the bus route and, due to the width of the road when a bus meets a lorry, one of the vehicles has to reverse to a suitable place so the two vehicles can pass. We were informed that the road would be upgraded but, apart from necessary maintenance, nothing has been done.

Parking

Parking has always been an issue in New Galloway. It has been submitted to the Council, primarily for safety reasons, that there should be better parking facilities available for the fisherman and tourists along side Loch Ken. This work will be carried out by the Forestry Commission If a grant is approved by the Tourist Board.

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Maintenance

After the Alternative Games were completed all the rubbish in the park was collected and bagged very efficiently. The park and village benefits from people taking the time and care to help keep our community clean and tidy.

Social Events

A collection was held for Mrs Mary (Myra) Walker who worked for many years at the Glenkens Medical Practice. On the same evening as her retirement party a cheque for the sum of £1500 was presented to the local branch of the MacMillan Cancer Fund - this money is to be used at Dumfries Hospital. Part of the money was raised at the Alternative Games.

A Burns supper and Ceilidh were held with great success - they are now more or less annual events which we hope will continue to grow.

The Cross Keys Hotel hosted the Senior Citizens Christmas Lunch, with a turnout of 44 people. Kells School children provided the entertainment and afterwards a free raffle was held.

General

The Youth Shelter has been completed and seems a popular meeting point.

UPGRADES TO DALRY TOWN HALL

In the next few weeks major upgrade work is due to start on the Hall. There will be upgrades to electrics (including new sockets in the Hall, emergency lighting and consumer units), a new event poster board, new portable staging system and replacement of sash and case windows to the Hall.

Two of the above changes are the result of successful grant funding applications - the stage improvements through the Event Challenge Fund and the window replacement through the Village Hall Improvement

The electrics upgrade will bring the venue into the 21st century, making it much easier to stage modern events - currently there are only three sockets in the Hall which makes it difficult to accommodate all the high-tech equipment necessary for modern performances. And hopefully the new poster board will help to advertise events at the Hall, ensuring larger audiences.

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YOUR DOG JACK RUSSELL TERRIER

Breed History & Characteristics

The term 'terrier' refers to a group of dog breeds that were originally bred for killing vermin. Terriers are small in stature, but don't let this fool you – they are tough, energetic dogs that tend to bite off more than they can chew.

The Jack Russell Terrier is a feisty little character originally bred for fox hunting. The Reverend John 'Jack' Russell was a renowned fox hunter of the 19th century. It is said that while he was studying, the milkman in the local area had a little white bitch with black and tan spots that Russell took a liking to. He bought her, and she became the foundation for the breed we now know as the Jack Russell Terrier.

Jack Russells are small dogs, standing around 25-30 cm at the shoulder (Parson Russell Terriers are very similar and easily confused with the Jack Russell they stand a little taller at 32-38cm). The colouring is mainly white with black or tan patches particularly on the face and at the base of the tail. Jack Russells can be smooth or rough coated.

Traditionally their tails were docked to a 'hand's length', to make it easy to pull them out of fox holes, but this practice is now nearly banned, and certainly frowned upon, in the UK and many other countries.


Main Uses in the Glenkens

In the Glenkens Jack Russells are a popular breed of dog, mainly as pets. Some people do still use them to deter vermin such as rats and mice around the farm as they have a natural instinct to chase nearly anything, especially small, fast, furry things. Unfortunately these days this often means cats are the focus of overly enthusiastic Jack Russell Terriers' attentions...

Jack Russell Terriers as Pets

Jack Russells are a very popular pet breed, often because people think that a small dog is cute and easier to manage than a bigger dog as it needs less exercise, feeding and training. Not so! Just because they are small does not mean that terriers are any less 'dog' than their bigger relatives. Often bigger breeds, such as the Greyhound or Mastiff, are much more suited to a relaxed, quiet life than Jack Russells and other terriers. If you want a dog who is full of energy and has a lot of character, go ahead and choose a Jack Russell. Just don't be deceived by size!

Tika Adam-McTaggart, aged 10, says "people often think Jack Russells are yappy, nippy dogs. But if you look after them well, and spend lots of time with them, they make lovely pets. And great guard dogs. And they are good with kids too, if they are brought up with them. Sweet-Pea, my dog Scampi's puppy, loves to play with children even though she has her tail pulled all the time when they are playing together - she is very

patient and good natured with children, and with everyone really".

Training

Small dogs need just as much training as big dogs. Jack Russells were originally bred to kill vermin, so their bite is often their first reaction In a situation - this used to be their advantage as a working dog, but today is no longer a positive trait and has lead to their reputation as snappy dogs. It is said that the most bites from dogs in the UK which need stitches are caused by Jack Russell Terriers. Often people seem to think that a little dog is cute when it barks/growls/ chases things/latches on to someone's foot - but this is a very dangerous attitude. With good training and enough time and attention, Jack Russell Terriers can make great pets with their endless energy and up-for-it attitude - but they are no less work than their bigger relatives and training is just as essential.

The letter, posted in the Kirkcudbrightshire Advertiser of 26th October 1888, was written by a Dairy resident - does anyone know this dog...?

Sir


Perhaps you will kindly permit me to say a few words in your newspaper - although I am only a dog - especially as I can refer you to a good precedent in the poems of Robble Burns, who was sufficiently interested in the canine race as to publish the conversation of Caesar and Luath in the well known poetical satire of 'The Twa Dogs'.

Now, Mr Editor, Sir, the dogs at Dalry - more particularly the collie dogs - held a meeting a few nights since, just opposite the Lochinvar Hotel in our town, and the meeting was conducted in the most business-like manner, and with the greatest decorum. There were few interruptions and not more than one dog attempted to address the meeting at the same time, and the conclusions were unanimous. We did not have a vote of thanks to our Chairman as we are busy dogs and cannot afford to waste time in passing useless and generally ill-deserved compliments, like our superior masters.

Well, Sir, we are all much in favour of the rallway, and the collies are sure that it will save them many a sore paw in driving cattle and sheep to Castle Douglas Market as most of the stock will, in future, no doubt, go by rail and arrive in much better condition. Then, Sir, we were very sorry to come to another conclusion, viz. - that many of the so-called superior race of human beings connected with the Glenkens Rallway have rendered themselves liable to some uncompilmentary remarks - they display no desire to help our railway and to send in their subscriptions. Whether their motives are to be attributed to an exceeding love of their own siller (silver / money) or a disinclination to part with it, even for their own advantage, or whether it arises from what our masters untruly and incorrectly refer to as 'doggedness', we do not pretend to say.

We have all been taught from our earliest days that 'a cat may look at a queen': it seems only justice that 'a dog may bark at a demagogue'. This is not a political allusion - we consider that any human being who addresses the public or his friends, on any subject either from the platform of a railway station or a Town Hall, or even when walking along a public road, is a demagogue.

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
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NEW GALLOWAY -Our Historic Burgh

The Glenlee Tunnel


The most expensive, and arguably the most impressive contract in the whole Galloway Power Scheme was that for the Glenlee Tunnel, let to Messrs A M Carmichael of Edinburgh, and signed in March 1932. This was a massive project, consisting of cutting a tunnel 3½ miles long and 11½ feet in diameter through solid rock. Excavations were carried out simultaneously from six faces, one at Glenlee, two at an adit close to the foot of Glenlee Hill, two from the Craigshinnie shaft and one from the intake at Clatteringshaws. The Craigshinnie shaft was chosen solely to divide the distance equally between the adit and the intake, but due to its position, after the tunnel was completed, the shaft was used to bring in extra water to the system from two adjacent burns.


Electricity for running the ventilation system, lighting and other essential equipment was obtained from a temporary substation at Glenlee, a single circuit line on wooden poles being extended along the line of the tunnel. One of the last of these poles, near the Craigshinnie shaft, has recently been cut down and lies in pieces nearbyl

On 27th, December 1932 the first section of the tunnel between Glenlee Portal and the adit was completed. Captain Wickham Weekes, Convenor of Kirkcudbrightshire Council, fired the final shot to link the two faces, "Passing slowly along the electric lit way into the depths of the age-worn hill the party was most impressed by this feat of engineering science which has mastered nature," So said The Galloway News on this historic occasion.

On 10th October 1933 the tunnel was completed, and in the presence of around two hundred invited guests Sir Andrew Duncan, chairman of the Central Electricity Board, fired the final shot which linked up the last two sections, at the Craigshinnie shaft.

The next stage was to line the whole length of this remarkable tunnel with concrete, a job which required much skill. A unique gantry was used, made of steel, a collapsible, self-supporting unit, 150 feet in length, so constructed as to allow roof and walls to be lined in one operation. It was possible to complete the 150 foot length in 24 hours, but a further 18 hours had to elapse before the





unit could be eased away and moved along on its rails to the next section. Average progress during this stage of operations was 1,300 feet per month.

As the scheme progressed large pieces of machinery, such as huge generating units and transformers, were brought up on the railway to New Galloway station at Mossdale. From there they made their laborious way to Gienlee, Earlstoun, Carsfad, and Kendoon Power Stations. The inhabitants of New Galloway would come to their doors to watch Pickfords' giant traction engines hauling their unwieldy burdens along the High Street! The railway company undertook entire responsibility for the transporting of all machinery for the scheme, whether by rail or road, and the providing of cranes for transferring and off-loading all the equipment.

On the completion of the Glenlee tunnel New Galloway was able to augment its water supply, at a cost of 6d. (2½p) per 1,000 gallons, by drawing on the water from the tunnel. This must have been a blessing for the Burgh, as up to that time the water supply had been doubtful, to say the least!

Glenlee Power Station commenced supplying power to the National Grid at midday on Wednesday, 6th. March 1935 and on Tuesday, 27th October 1936 the entire Galloway Hydro-scheme was completed. However, although it was the largest integrated hydro-electric scheme in the U.K. it started work quietly and unobtrusively. It was not until 11th March 1938 that a large number of invited guests witnessed a dual ceremony commemorating the opening of the scheme, and the contribution made to its success by the late Col. William McLellan, whose involvement with the Galloway scheme began with the first investigations in 1923, and continued until his death in December 1934, just a few months before Glenlee became operational. A memorial to Col. McLellan was unveiled by Captain Wickham Weekes.

Lord Meston, Chairman of the Galloway Water Power Company, at the unveiling of the McLellan memorial, made the following comments. "In the execution of this work, hands have been laid upon the beauties of the country. Power houses, dams, aqueducts, surge towers now dot the valley, and it will take time for them to merge into the hues and contours of the landscape, but in partial compensation a whole series of new lochs have been created which will grow in attractiveness as nature takes them into its care."

Few of us, I would suggest, can argue with Lord Meston's profound statement.

CHILDREN'S FESTIVAL



GLENKENS CENTRE YOUTH COMMITTEE


Are you aged between 13 and 21 and living in the Glenkens? Do you want to see more things happening in the local area for people of your age?

TOUR OF BRITAIN



The Tour of Britain professional cycling race will return to Dumfries and Galloway this year with the Scottish stage finish in Castle Douglas on Tuesday the 29th August. The 2006 route for the Tour will run from Glasgow to Castle Douglas with the one key difference to 2005 being that when the Tour enters Dumfries and Galloway (on the A713, north of Carsphairn) it takes place wholly within the Stewartry.

The Scottish Stage this year will be marketed by VisitScotland Dumfries and Galloway and their Glasgow counterparts. The aim of the marketing effort will be to promote the Tour of Britain as an exciting day out for visitors to the region and to attract weekend visitors to the Stewartry using the Tour as the basis for a cycling themed short break.

The race route comes into Carsphairn along the A713, then goes along the back road from Carsphalrn to Dalry, through Dalry, back onto the A713 and then off again into New Galloway at the Kenbridge and down the west side of Loch Ken past Laurieston and into Castle Douglas for the finish.



GLENKENS TRANSPORT INITIATIVE HELP URGENTLY NEEDED

We URGENTLY need Drivers to help operate the New Registered Route on Wednesday evenings. FREE training for new drivers can be arranged, but we also need existing drivers of 'user-groups' to do their bit - it only means driving the Mini-Bus for about 2 hours from Dalry into Castle Douglas via Parton and returning via Laurieston and New Galloway.

If everyone does their turn, it will only mean helping three or four times a yearl We do need to keep this route going for the sake of the user-groups, GTI trips and income to help the cost of running the bus.

COMMUNITY FIRE SAFETY MESSAGE

Dumfries and Galloway Fire & Rescue Service recommend that 10-year approved, battery type smoke alarms are the minimum standard you should provide for your home. At least one alarm should be fitted on each floor of your home. If you do not have a working smoke alarm in your home call 01387 252222 and fire fighters will attend at a mutually agreeable time to fit a free 10-year smoke alarm. You are entitled to a free one regardless of your age.

If you are 60 or over, or have a disability you may request a free Home Fire Safety Check, and a free smoke alarm will be fitted to your house at that time. The Fire & Rescue Service would like to remind people who burn coal or logs to ensure that their chimneys are regularly swept, at least twice a year.



THE STORY OF JAMES MC MICHAEL - PART I A dramatised interpretation by Angela Miller

My name is James Mc Michael, which was also the name of my father, although now they call him "Black" James Mc Michael. The law says that my father was a murderer, and after he died they put his body in a gibbet and left it to rot where all the Clachan could see it. Yet the people of the Clachan cried to see it, and in secret they whispered behind their hands that my father was a Martyr, not a murderer. It was the Killing Times, and fear stalked the quiet streets and country lanes of the Glenkens, while the law was turned on its head by the anger of the King at what he believed was our insurrection.

My father was a man of conviction and my mother always said that none but God himself could change my father's mind once he had made it up. It was certainly the case when he joined the Solemn League, and he declared that no Royal proclamation was going to make him give it up. Then the King set out the fines and punishments for not attending the Kirk, and still Father would not change his mind. He refused to let us go, saying he would never bow his head in prayer to the King when Jesus alone deserved our praise. So strong was his belief, that when I was but a small child, Father marched with many other Covenanters to fight against the King's men, unafraid of what might happen as he believed he was in God's hands. They were defeated, horribly, for they were armed with not much more than farm tools and handmade weapons, but defeat did not dent my father's belief one bit either. He simply came back home and bided his time.

It was in the year 1684, when I was 14 years old, that things became very black indeed. The King sent Graham of Claverhouse and his Dragoons to hunt down the Covenanters and force us back to the Kirk. Violence and death followed in his wake as he ruthlessly went about weeding out the Covenanters from the local folk. Soon, because of the fear that Claverhouse brought amongst us, once trusted men became informers and there were sples among our ranks. Father became suspicious of all but a few of his fellows. Often, I would lie awake to listen as Father sat up late at night with his closest friends, Robert Stewart, John Grierson and Robert Ferguson, talking in soft voices. I knew in my heart they were plotting.

The day that my father earned the name "Black" James is burned deeply into my memory, and I can think of nothing that will remove it so long as I live. The Curate of Carsphairn, Peter Pierson, had been giving away the names of Covenanters freely, buying the favour of Grierson of Lag, who was stationed within a stone's throw of the Kirk at Carsphairn. Father had me drive him and the other men to Carsphairn, where they planned to plead the Covenanters case with the Curate, hoping to silence him with reason. It was December and dark already as we trundled slowly up the road. Frost was in the air, for Winter's bite was hard upon us. Father told me to wait outside when we came to the Manse and to be prepared to leave as fast as I could should anything go wrong.

I waited, shivering in the cold outside, sick to the stomach with a sense of foreboding. Then, with a crack as deafening as thunder, a shot resounded from within the Manse. Forgetting my father's instructions I rushed inside, to hear my father's voice booming in the parlour. Before him, lying in a pool of crimson, was the Curate, clutching feebly at his chest. The stench of gunpowder was in the air and I felt bile rise in my throat when I saw that my Father held a Musket in his hands which he pointed still at the Curate as he

"Let the Lord judge you now, for you have sinned against him. You adhere to the King's blasphemy, and I have given you justice for it!"

My father stood surrounded by his friends, all of whom wore grim expressions that spoke of their solidarity. My heart was thumping and my knees turned to water, for I was afraid of the soldiers I was sure would come at the sound of the shot. Then, as I had dreaded, the thunder of horses hooves came echolng through the night, rousing me from my stupor. My father would be killed if he were caught as he was. "Flee Father! The Dragoons are coming!" I cried.

Stewart and Grierson turned at once to go, Ferguson made to follow them but stopped and put a hand to my father's shoulder when it seemed he would not move."Walt," I heard my father say, and he walked to where the Curate lay, his lifeblood ebbing away onto the floor of the Manse. There, my father stood and walted until the last light of life had disappeared from Curate's eyes. He whispered a soft prayer under his breath before finally reaching down to gently draw the Curate's eyelids closed.

"Please Father!" I cried, for I could see the Dragoons leaping from their horses in the yard outside. My father looked up at me and nodded, then he and Ferguson fled out of the Kirk by the back door. The Dragoons came pouring in the front door, yelling in the King's name. I threw myself behind a curtain, praying to God that they would not see me. They rushed passed the Curate's body, giving it not a single glance, and poured out again by the same door my father had taken. At that moment, I was afraid that I would never see my father alive again.
