
Next year, Ted is looking to add a more local element to his work.


How many times have you passed that new glass-fronted shop/office where the Garden Centre used to be on Dalry's Main Street, and wondered what they really do in there? Well, behind the slick glass front, Andrew Case and Ronnie Bradford are working hard at promoting our local area. For the first time in its history the Southern Upland Way and the Glenkens now has it very own information centre providing useful information, including broadband internet access, and services to walkers and visitors alike.

"The Southern Upland Way has been going for over 21 years" says Andrew "and during that time it has never had a base along the route where people can get information or walking supplies. It is also coincidental that for the first time in 21 years, the Regional Council has recently appointed a Promotion and Business Development Officer for the Southern Upland Way, Tabitha Mudalair, which makes the next few years even more encouraging for walking in the area".

But the main way they are getting the message of what there is to do around here is through the websites they have created. They have a number of websites up and running to promote the region, all of which are proving to be very successful - two of them, www.visitsouthernscotland.com and www southernuplandway.com, currently attract over 70,000 visitors per month. With the other sites (see below) this then creates a network of 5 web portals with anticipated visitor numbers of 200,000 per month aimed at promoting the Glenkens and the whole of our region to a world wide audience.

They are also involved In the initiative to name Dalry as 'The Walking Town', and to celebrate this with a week-long walking festival each year. They would like to see the local community reaping the benefits of a higher number of walking related visitors. The success of this kind of branding is

It was proposed that the Senior Citizen's Christmas Lunch would be held on Sunday 10th December at the Kenmure Arms Hotel at 12.30 for 1.00pm. Provided that this was suitable to the hotel, full details would be circulated in due course.

The Community Bus would again be available to provide transport for those who required it.

The councillors were disappointed to note that another long standing annual event which was also assisted by community council donations in the past, the Bonfire and Fireworks Display organised by the Glenkens Cubs, would not be taking place this year mainly due to new safety legislation for licensing public fireworks events.

The members were pleased to note that despite the wet start to this year's Alternative Games and the resultant smaller crowd than usual, it was still anticipated that a total of around £1,200 would be donated to charity. However, spiralling costs particularly for insurance and for advertising had not helped either and this would need to be carefully considered for future years.

Will Levi Marshall is developing a permanent installation for The Long Gallery, which runs the length of the building, dividing the existing conversion from the new build. It is also the approximate course of the underground watercourse (the CatStrand) beneath the building. The floor will be predominantly of Calthness stone, Inset with specially crafted panels of ceramic tiles. Also set into the floor will be three water features, glassed over and lit from



within, containing natural pebbles and flowing water from the CatStrand itself.

The walls will feature a series of ceramic panels extending the floor designs. The ceiling of the corridor will be glazed over its entire length and include a simple design etched onto the glass, casting shifting shadows onto the walls and floor below.

Chris Helson and Sarah Jackets are starting a year-long residency project called Looking Back, Looking Forward, researching and filming within the Glenkens area. They will be working with two groups from the younger and older communities, to make two short artists' films about how local residents see the past and the future of the area. The films will be shown at the official launch of the new CatStrand Centre in the autumn of 2007, and the background research material will be available as part of the archive resources at the centre.

DALRY TOWN HALL -MUSIC EVENTS & FARMERS' MARKET

Dalry Town Hall Management Committee has completed the first phase in an ambitious programme of upgrades and improvements to the Town Hall. In July, after a successful application to the Dumfries & Galloway Event Challenge Fund, the committee purchased a new portable staging system from Maltbury Staging, a leading company in the event production industry. The Metrodeck system now allows users of the hall to set up a variety of new and improved staging options. The new system can provide a bigger, more flexible stage than before, and it can be set up at a variety of different heights and configurations, including tiered seating, catwalks, theatre-in-the-round, etc.

One innovation is to use the decks to provide tables for a series of monthly Craft Fairs and Farmers Markets, which are planned to start in 2007. This unique use of the staging system has been successfully tried out on a recent table top sale, organised by new committee member Andi Holmes, and held at the end of October. This event alone netted over £250 for Hall funds.

YOUR DOG

German Shepherd Dog

Breed History & Characteristics

The German Shepherd's name was changed to Alsation after World War I as it was thought that to have the title 'German' in the breed name would make the dog unpopular. In 1977, however, the name was changed back to German Shepherd Dog (GSD), which is the breed title today. The breed was originally created by cross-breeding various shepherding dogs in and around Germany during the 1800s. The qualities which were focused on were utility, intelligence and adaptability, and these characteristics allowed the dog to progress from a shepherding role to its characteristics allowed the dog to progress from a shepherding role to its much more varied role in the twentieth century. The German Shepherd has continued to be a working dog, playing its part in the Wars as a messenger dog, rescue dog, sentry dog and personal guard dog, then progressing into the fields of police work, as seeing eye dogs before the Labrador began to be used in this role, and as guard dogs. The German Shepherd Dog is an all-round breed — other breeds may surpass it on certain areas, but no other breed has been able to master such a wide range of skills.

Main Uses in the Glenkens

German Shepherds are seen in the Glenkens mainly as pets, but owners often work them in obedience and working trials, which allows the dogs to use their physical and mental abilities to the maximum. also see these dogs working with local police and as guard dogs - two of their main roles in today's society. Eric Roberts, who runs Callanway Dog Training School by Crocketford, says 'the difference between what is classically called a guard dog and a trained protection dog is that a guard dog is often of a nervous disposition, left in a yard on a chain to bark, given very little socialisation, and so can be extremely unreliable. A trained protection dog, on the other hand, such as the police use, is kept at home with the family and is well trained, safe and reliable.'

German Shepherd Dogs as Pets

These dogs do not tend to take to people straight away but when they do, they form a strong bond to their owner or family. One of their roles is as a guard dog, so they have a strong instinct to bark, and also to protect the people they view as their pack, and their territory. This does not mean that they are going to attack anyone, but you must be aware that they have these instincts. They are loyal and very trainable, with the uncanny ability to reason when given a new situation to work out. German Shepherds love to work, and they also love to be with you. In general, they are happy if you are happy — they can run all day if that's what you want to do, or they can just as easily sleep all day. But they do love to learn, and to challenge themselves physically. And it is best to keep their mind entertained so they don't decide to go and entertain themselves as this is when they get into trouble - it is sensible to NEVER let your dog roam on their own or with other dogs when you are not there (this goes for all breeds of dog). It is irresponsible to do

so as you have no control over what your dog does - it may run into the road and cause an accident, worry sheep or worse.

Training

As I am sure you are aware, there has been some bad press locally for German Shepherds lately – there have been some incidents of German Shepherds biting people and chasing sheep around Carsphairn. any dog, these dogs need a responsible attitude to ownership and must to be trained properly. This does not mean you have to go regularly to a training class, it just means that your dog does as you say when you say it - you need to know that your dog is




under your control in any situation. Eric Roberts, who has over 30 years of professional dog training experience, says 'when a dog is not trained properly or out of control its 'prey drive' will often kick in...owners have a responsibility to keep their dog under control.' German Shepherds are not any more vicious or dangerous than other dog breeds, despite what the media portrays at times. They are, however, big dogs. With big teeth. So if they do decide to bite something, they are going to do more serious damage than say a Jack Russell Terrier. So if you are looking for a dog but don't have sufficient time to spend training it properly, don't choose a German Shepherd.

Finding the Right Dog
Unfortunately, due to the popularity of the breed over the last few decades, unscrupulous breeders have cashed in on this trend and created many dogs which do not come up to breed standards physically or psychologically. It is very important to consider what traits will carry into the next generation when breeding dogs, and if a dog has weak hips or an overly aggressive temperament, they should not be used to breed from. Many breeders who are just out to make money take no heed of this. So be careful to buy a dog from a reputable breeder - ask to see both parents if possible, and to see the pupples interacting with each other and the mother. And as with all large breeds, it is best to get a puppy whose parents have both been hip scored as hip displasia is most common in bigger dog breeds.



NEW GALLOWAY -Our Historic Burgh

by Helen Bolton - PART XXXIII **An Orkney Connection**

Any historical connection between the Glenkens and Orkney might at first appear singularly improbable, but there is a strong link between these geographically well separated areas, dating back to the Covenanting times of the late 17th Century.

The Battle of Bothwell Bridge took place on 22nd June 1679 following the success of the Covenanters at Drumclog, where they had managed to defeat Graham of Claverhouse and his dragoons. However, whereas Drumclog had been a success, Bothwell Bridge was a total disaster, with the Covenanters being soundly defeated by Tam Dalyell and his army. More than 400 men were killed in the field and a further 1,200 or so were rounded up and taken to Edinburgh, where they were imprisoned in Greyfriars Kirkyard.

Five months later, after some had escaped and some had died from hunger and disease, others were tried, found guilty of rebellion and hanged. On 15th November the remaining 257 Covenanters were taken from the Kirkyard and herded to Leith. There a small ship lay out at Leith Roads. William Paterson, an Edinburgh merchant, had chartered a ship, "The Crown" of London (Captain - Thomas Teddico), to convey the prisoners across the Atlantic.

The Covenanters were duly ferried out to the ship. So small was "The Crown" that when all 257 men were aboard, those who were in reasonably good condition had to remain standing to allow the sick to lie down! For twelve days the ship lay at Leith Roads, and during that time the good folk of Edinburgh, learning that these men were to be sold in Barbados as slaves, had a collection and were able to give the Covenanters £1,000 sterling to help them when they reached the colonies.

On 27th November "The Crown" eventually set sail and headed up the east coast of Scotland. Storms accompanied them on their voyage. On

Tel: 01644 470370 Email: vegas@btconnect.com www.cast.org.uk/gospel.htm 10th December they reached Orkney and a particularly savage storm and mountainous seas greeted the ship as she rounded Mull Head, East Mainland, and Captain Teddico decided to drop anchor in Deer Sound. drop However, during the

night the strong winds and heavy seas caused "The Crown" to drag her anchor and drift towards the coast. In the moonlight the wild cliffs of Deerness could be seen with the angry sea breaking against the rocks.

The Covenanters tried to make a bid for freedom, but Captain Teddico ordered the hatches to be locked. However, just before the crew took to the small boat the mate is said to have given someone the key. The crew landed with difficulty on the barren coast, and "The Crown" was driven ashore where she broke in two on the rocks. Those Covenanters who were able escaped from the foundering ship and got ashore clinging to broken planks, but the heartless captain and his crew forced them back into the wild sea to their deaths. 209 men were drowned at Deerness on that fearful night, and when their bodies were washed ashore later, the local people buried them on the cliff top at Scarva Taing.

Of those who managed to survive the shipwreck, some settled on Orkney, and others made their way home where they continued to fight for the cause. Among these were three men from the Glenkens, John Edgar from Balmaclellan, and John Smith, and John Malcolm, both from Dalry. Sadly, John Malcolm was unfortunately captured at Airds Moss, Ayrshire, and was hanged at the Grassmarket, Edinburgh on 1st August 1680. No Covenanters from the Glenkens were drowned at Deemess.

Over 200 years later a Galloway man, Dr Robert Halliday Gunning, who was born at Ruthwell, and brought up in Kirkbean, New Abbey and Dumfries, visited Orkney and was moved to support the erecting of a suitable memorial to those Covenanters who had lost their lives at Deerness. He promised a donation of at least £50, and an appeal was launched at a public meeting in the Old Town Hall, Kirkwall, in August 1886. Just over £100 was raised and on 22nd August 1888 an inauguration ceremony took place.

On a fine breezy afternoon over 500 enthusiastic people gathered at Deerness where the memorial, a 40 foot obelisk in Orkney stone, surmounted by a crown, had been built. A history of the movement for the erecting of the monument, a copy of the appeal, a list of subscribers, a Bible, a set of Jubilee coins, and copies of the newspapers from Orkney, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh were

set into a recess in the side of the monument, and a granite slab was placed over it, On the slab is the following inscription-

For Christ, His Crown and Covenant. Erected by Public Subscription To the memory of 200 Covenanters Who were taken prisoner at Bothwell Bridge And sentenced to transportation for life, but who perished by shipwreck near this spot on 10th December 1679"

It seemed very strange to stand on a remote headland on East Mainland, Orkney, beside a memorial to men from so close to home who had perished over 300 years ago for their religious beliefs.

The erecting of the memorial at Deerness did not use all the money which had been donated, and a further monument, in the form of a polished red and grey Aberdeenshire granite fountain was erected almost immediately in front of St Magnus Cathedral in the centre of Kirkwall, This was put up in 1890 on the site of the Old Town Hall where the initial meetings to discuss the Deerness memorial had been held.

CARSPHAIRN HERITAGE GROUP

The Heritage Centre officially closed on Sunday 1st October but several private visits have taken place in October with a surprising number of other people calling in because they saw that the curtains were open. The last visitor on 23 October was an elderly gentleman who had been born in the police house in the village in 1922. The last visitor on the last day of the official season was born at the Eriff and has already offered us some material for the 2007 exhibition which will be about sports in the parish.

The final tally of visitors for 2006 was just over 1450, about 100 less than 2005 which is slightly disappointing but understandable when one notices that the drop was nearly all in July, a month that we will all remember for its wonderful weather.

THE HISTORY STOP - UPDATE

The idea of the History Stop is for it to be a central reference point, or hub, where people can access information on local history for the whole of the Glenkens. Members of the public will be able to find information in a variety of ways – there will be a touch screen computer, leaflets, maps and guide books, so people can 'mix and match'. They can then choose to focus on an area and visit sites around it, or to focus on a particular topic and visit sites related to that topic over a larger area.

The Glenkens has been called the 'heart of Galloway' for its richness of historical information and events, and has also been referred to as the 'cradle of Scottish independence' due to Robert the Bruce's early activities here. It would be nice to think that the new centre will become known for, among other things, its historical research. If I were trying to sell the History Stop like I would sell a car, I would say zero to sixty in two thousand years!'

The only reason that we have access to local history is through the interest, research and hard work of local people. At the History Stop 'we would really like to make the information gained by so many dedicated people available to the general public' says Bob Martin, project coordinator. And to do that they need volunteers. As a trained historian, Bob Martin is more than willing to help local volunteers to follow a topic in which they have an interest — to point them in the right direction and help them to put their findings in order.

Bob states that 'we would like to allow people to share in the excitement of discovery, and to get the pleasure of the little known facts of the area in which they live — to enjoy the passion local history can involve!'




DALRY PUPILS PRIZE WINNERS

THE HERETIC'S TALE REVIEW

Dogstar Theatre returned to the Glenkens on October 7th with 'The Heretic's Tale", Hamish MacDonald's masterly account of Elspeth Buchan who, in the 18th century, believed she was "the woman clothed with the sun and crowned with twelve stars", come to fulfill the prophesy in Revelations as the Saviour of the World. The Buchanites first came to prominence in Irvine but from there they travelled to Closeburn, then Auchengibbert and Kirkgunzeon before trying to settle in Crocketford. They believed that they were the chosen few; that they would be carried to Heaven by angels when the world came to a flery end, leaving Crocketford as "the last island in a sea of brimstone".

Taken from the account of Andrew Innes, whose devotion to 'Mother Buchan' caused him to keep her corpse in his home for fifty years, the themes of the play had a contemporary resonance: they touched on religious division and the waging of war in the name of God; the ordination of women; Marxist feminism; the politics of sexuality; personal and economic freedom; the paradigm of belief and liberation theology.

Brilliant performances by Annie Grace as Elspeth Buchan and Matthew Zajac as Andrew Innes (and a host of other characters) held the audience throughout as they conjured up a world of death, despair and delusion in Scotland following the failure of Bonnie Prince Charlle's rebellion and the rise of the roman Anti-Christ. Designer David Ramsay's set allowed only

one prop: a masterly multi-functional chest skillfully used by the actors to create coffins, doorways, prison cells, churches, houses, furniture and architectural features. Between them they populated their world with followers, churchmen, officers of the law, 18th century neds and, in an hilarious aside, two irreverent tartan-clad stick puppets from Irvine.

It was easy to forget that there were only two actors in the cast; a suspension of disbelief helped by the complementary fiddle playing of Galloway-raised Amy Geddes, whose live music added layers of atmosphere to an already dark and brooding tale. Cara Wiseman's lighting showed off Angelina Gerrard's elegantly simple costumes to great effect and gelled with Andy Thorburn's evocative sound design. The whole package was neatly held together by Sholto Bruce and Karen Sutherland on stage management and publicity.

This was an excellent example of inspirational small scale touring theatre. A powerful story exploded Inis was an excellent example of inspirational small scale touring theatre. A powerful story exploded on to the stage in the hall of Dalry School in the hands of two actors armed only with a folding box, a few lights, some sticky tape and a small technical crew. But, like the swan, the smooth movement on the surface belies the frantic activity beneath. What the audience don't see is the paddling by the theatre company, the Scottish Arts Council, Dumfries and Galloway Arts Association and the Glenkens Community and Arts Trust who all played their part in bringing "The Heretic's Tale" to the Stewartry. If this fine quality can be maintained then long may they continue to do so. Robert Martin

SEWING MATERIALS SENT TO BOSNIA

Thank you everyone who contacted me with donations of buttons, zips, needles and thread for a new sewing project that we had been asked to support in Sarajevo. There was a wonderful response and 'Hazel's' even scoured through boxes and donated items at the request of one enterprising Glenkens resident.

On the first Thursday that we were there Nadija, our receptionist and interpreter at the Healing Hands Clinic, explained that she had arranged for someone from the CCV (Concentration Camp Victims) Association to come and collect all the bags.

It had been a demanding day, and my final client that afternoon was sitting in the office chatting to Nadija. "Do you remember Jasmina?" Nadija asked. I didn't but as she had been a victim herself she was booked in for a treatment with me. Jasmina had started the sewing school and she thanked me very much for all the haberdashery that I had brought. Nadija then went on to translate that Jasmina had not been feeling very good, that she had headaches and a lot of pressures and was working many hours for the CCV.



Jasmina is a Muslim and when the Serbs attacked she had been living in East Bosnia (they often avoid saying Srebrenika because the memories of the massacre there are still so raw, Jasmina's father's body was only found last year.) A Serb neighbour handed the sixteen year old Jasmina her baby sister as she fled. Neither of them saw their mother again for five years, and the child looked upon Jasmina as her mother. Their mother had no idea whether they had survived. As well as her Father, Jasmina lost a brother and a sister, one other brother and one other sister survived. None of them have returned to their original home.

Bosnia is still recovering from the War and there are still many problems economically and emotionally and physically. Healing Hands is a small charity that sends out therapists for six months every year who try to alleviate some of the traumas resulting from the conflict. At least four therapists have volunteered from Kirkcudbrightshire over the years. Anyone wanting to know more about the organisation can visit www.healinghandsnetwork.org.uk

39TH ORIGINAL MOUNTAIN MARATHON

3,000 runners and mountaineers competed in the 39th Original Mountain Marathon (formerly known as the KIMM) in the Galloway Forest Park. All carried tent equipment and food spent an overnight camp in one of two locations, either Caldons or Burnhead. The athletes were awakened in their dark tents at 6am on Sunday by the pipes of award winning piper George Whan of Kirkcudbright. The winners Al and Ifor Powell covered almost 2 marathon lengths in the 2 days. The OMM remains one of the toughest events on the outdoor athletes calendar.



ACUPUNCTURE

Few people these days have not heard of acupuncture. Although practised in China for over 3000 years and introduced to Europe in the 17th century by the Jesuits, it has only become accepted and popular in Britain for the last 10 years. It is now taught to degree level in western universities and practised in clinics and hospitals worldwide. Television shows such as the Alternative Therapy series by the scientist Kathy Sykes further advanced awareness of the efficacy of acupuncture and its scientific validity.

Her programme showed tests using the country's most powerful MRI scanner assessing changes in the brain of a test subject before, during and after an acupuncture needle was inserted. To the surprise of researchers an area of the brain called the limbic system that deals with the control of pain was activated. This was an early indication of one of the mechanisms of acupuncture.

For those who have experienced its benefits this information only confirms what they already know. The view of sceptics who attribute the benefits of acupuncture to the placebo effect has also been addressed in several trials where knee pain has been treated with either real acupuncture or sham acupuncture. The patients were unaware whether they were receiving the real thing or not. Results showed definitively that the real acupuncture worked while the sham acupuncture had only a marginal response.

There is some joy in having one's beliefs validated with western scientific methodology but the real joy of an acupuncture treatment is in the experience.

The Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) approach to treatment allows time to discuss the history of a patient's health problems and uses the constructs of TCM to make a diagnosis. Practitioners will take

the patient's pulse at three positions and at three depths on both wrists, examine the tongue, feel for tender spots along acquincture meridians and note changes of skin tone and colour. Those skilled in auricular therapy (a form of ear acupuncture) will also examine the ears. Then, the magic.

I call it magic even though there are rational explanations of the mechanism of acupuncture; the experience for the patient is often 'like magic.' The pain that was there melted away, the tight shoulders loosen and the heavy heart floats like a free and easy wanderer. These are the drug free pleasures of Traditional Chinese acupuncture. Patients leave with a renewed feeling of well-being.

Acupuncture is not limited to the treatment of pain. In China it is the first port of call for most patients entering a typical Chinese hospital. It is used to treat everything from acne to tinnitis.

In Australia IVF clinics advocate adjunctive acupuncture to enhance fertility and reduce the risk of miscarriage. It also helps with morning sickness and the pain of labour.

Immediately upon admission to the Chinese Hospital stroke ward, patients are treated with acupuncture. The recovery rate is impressive. Patients regain the ability to speak, are able to walk again and can even regain the ability to swallow. Can you imagine the joy of being able to eat again after having your meals fed into your stomach though a valve inserted in your abdomen?

As an acupuncturist, my greatest joy is to see patients adopt changes in their lives and lifestyles that facilitate personal growth and goal fulfilment. For the researchers, understanding how that comes about through acupuncture is a challenge. For the patients it is irrelevant.



GYRO-SCOPE COMMITTEE

It was always the intention, when setting up GCAT, to provide an organisation, which would facilitate for all aspects of the community. With this in mind, our GYRO-scope project, "Glenkens Youth and Recreational Opportunities" kicked off recently. We held one meeting for primary age range along with their mums and one for the secondary age range.

The purpose of the meetings was to make young people aware of the work Glenkens Community & Arts Trust was doing and to inspire them to start to think about what they want from the new centre.

- 1 What facilities are needed in the Glenkens that aren't already provided?
- 2 What interests local young people?
- 3 How can the new centre help young people achieve their aspirations and goals?

The Secondary meeting was very productive and lots of ideas were discussed. Popular threads of thought included holding regular band nights for young people, as there are lots of young people involved with band projects who would appreciate the opportunity to perform live. Continuing with the idea of performance, it was proposed that youth should take responsibility in not only organising the event, but also taking care of the technical side of things. Perhaps to train some young people to control lighting and sound systems, particularly if there are any individuals interested in following in the field as a career.

Sarah Ade, the coordinator of the "Glenkens Gazette" expressed interest in finding new sources for contributions for the new Youth Page. This means an opportunity for young people to have the freedom to write about matters, which they feel are important and also gain experience in journalism.

Sports was talked about with lots of different possibilities suggested, such as inviting a sports was taked about with los of uniferit possibilities suggested, such as initially a sports personality to talk and coach local young people and setting up a class for indoor sports such as boxing. Finally, a youth club was also a popular idea for the new centre. It could provide information on life skills for example, C.V writing, money management, cooking skills, job opportunities and stress management.

It was decided that the first Wednesday evening of every month at 4:30pm was when this group would meet in the GCAT office, anyone is welcome to come along or if you wish to contribute the Gazette, phone the GCAT office on 420374.

The primary age range meeting was also constructive as parents were accompanied by their children who had equally as much input. A few of the mums expressed an interest in using the new centre on school holidays for organised activities. This would provide an aim for attending children to aspire to if incorporating with RSAMD or YDance links, as time spent rehearsing could result in performance. The possibility of RSAMD tutors visiting the new centre every three weeks was mentioned which would mean the advantage of additional instruction for children already receiving lessons or if there was a specific demand, for individuals to be taught teaching skills.

Another popular idea discussed was the possibility of forming a GCAT membership scheme for young people. This would mean young people feeling more independent and more predominant in youth matters of GCAT.

Film in the new centre could mean a regular club, which could include classic films, Children would then get "the cinema experience" as apposed to watching a DVD at home. The garden of the new centre was also discussed, with the consensus being the need to seek out volunteers for the community garden project. A rockery and herb plants would optimise the advantage of a low maintenance yet colourful garden as well as linking in with nature and any cookery training.

The Kirkcudbright Performing Arts Project (KPAP) is starting a new project based on memories and experiences of life in the Stewartry during World War II. Adam Mitchell of the Community Learning and Development Service said "Young people want to learn what happened in these times and what better way to learn than by using these memories in a way that should bring a smile to everyone's face". They are hoping to create a play using the information they find which will tour local venues in Spring 2007 so look out for further details!

DRAMA & MUSIC - COME AND TRY

On Saturday 10th of February, the RSAMD will return to the Glenkens to provide a "Come and Try" day for traditional music and drama at Dalry Secondary School from 1pm until 5pm. THE STORY OF JAMES MCMICHAEL - PART III

A dramatised interpretation by Angela Miller

I woke long before dawn, and determined not to disturb Mother or my siblings, I slipped as quietly from the bed room as possible. Since the raid in Kirkcudbright two nights before, I had been jumping at shadows, terrified that Claverhouse would know that I had been involved and bring his wrath down on my family. I could stand it no longer, so last night I determined that I would take a bag of supplies and disappear off into the hills after my father. One of the men involved in the raid had let it slip that father was hiding out at Auchenloy, by the Black Water of Dee.

So it was that half an hour later I was on the road with a backpack of food, heading in that general direction. The first rays of sunlight were peaking over the hills, but all around there was a thick, icy fog which crept up the river basin on tendril fingers. I could only barely see where I was going or what lay ahead of me. I nearly jumped clean out of my skin when I heard a sudden whisper in my ear.

"You should be careful out here lad, Claverhouse is upon the roads with his men," I turned, afraid of what I might find and saw that it was Robert Ferguson who stooped down to speak in my ear.

"I was going to my father," I told him in my defence. "And ye could have led a dragoon to him unknowing walking is such a dwam along these roads."

My mouth dropped open and I stuttered, trying in vain to explain myself, but Ferguson simply smiled and shook his head. He took me by the arm and lead me off the road and into the field.

"I'll guide you there boy," he began "By a safer road, although you must stay close to me in this fog." How thankful I was that he found me, for less than two minutes later we heard the sound of many horses hooves upon the road and looked to see soldlers on it, their shadowy shapes picked out in the fog by the lamps they carried to see by.

We walked the many miles to the Black Water, the icy fog lifting slowly under the sluggish winter sun. We crossed bogs and burns and followed deer tracks through the forests, always wary that we might be followed or seen by Claverhouse's men as they combed the countryside.

Finally, with the fog still rolling about the feet of the trees though the day was almost half gone, we came to Auchenloy, where my father and his companions had made camp. Though they were hardy men, the bitter cold and privation seemed to be beginning to take their toll. Wariness of being found prevented them from lighting a fire that might have otherwise improved their lot. They fell gratefully on the bannocks, cheese and cold meat that I had brought and my father praised me highly for my thoughtfulness.

To see him alive when I had feared him dead until 2 days before cheered me greatly, and for a while I forgot my fears and sat and listened to the chatter of the men as I had done many times throughout my childhood.

That it would be the last time I would do this, the last time I would speak with them, the last time I would see my father alive and without care I did not realise at the time. Now the laughter rings hollow in my mind for it was that sound that brought the dragoons down upon us.

They came on foot, silent as foxes, hidden by the fog and caught us all by surprise. A shot rang out and Ferguson fell dead to the ground. I felt my feet rooted to the ground in shock as I stared at the corpse of a man who had been alive bare seconds before.

"Run lad!" my father bellowed, tearing me from my frozen state. He leaped to his feet, pistol and sword drawn already. I needed no second telling and flew headlong for the tree-line, but there I stopped, not wanting to leave my father again. Now, in some ways, I wish I had not.

Graham of Claverhouse and his bloody band of Dragoons stepped out of the fog, muskets trained on my father and his cronles. "James Mc Michael!" he roared and I saw my father step forward, his head held high. "That is I" he told

With a wave of his hand, Claverhouse halted his men and strode forward to face my father, giving no heed to the weapons my father had drawn.

"You are under arrest for the murder of Pierson of Carsphalrn and treason against his majesty, Charles II. I advise you to come quietly," he said in a voice as cold as the fog.

"You know I will not," my father replied. Claverhouse turned to his men and pointed at where my father's friends stood behind him. "Shoot them," he ordered.

Gunshot tore the air like a thunderstorm broken right overhead. Robert Stewart and John Grierson fell dead. In the forest I stood aghast, unable to tear my eyes away.

"I'll not be your trophy catch, Claverhouse. You'll either have to kill me or be killed trying to take

me," My father told him, without a waver in his voice. "You think you're a match for me McMichael?" Claverhouse asked, his coloured with scorn. He drew his , "Let's see how much of a fool you sword, "Let's see how much of a 100, years," My father tossed his pistol to the ground are." My father tossed his pistol to the ground and grinned. "Single combat, Sheriff," he said, issuing the challenge.

Claverhouse replied by crossing swords with my father and the ring of steel echoed in the frigid air. Father roared like an angered bull and rained blows on Claverhouse, forcing him backwards. But Claverhouse's skill with the blade was not small and after his initial surprise at Father's fury he fought back. They went to and fro several times and Claverhouse began to be frustrated as my fathers skill was more than he had imagined. Again father fought him back with a furious volley of blows and Claverhouse missed his footing on the wet ground. Father lunged and there was a dull clang as his sword met the metal of Claverhouse's helm. Claverhouse staggered back, his pride as stung as his crown.

"Had your helmet been like mine," my father snarled, pointing to the soft bonnet on his head," Your carcass had now found a bed upon the heath!"

There was triumph in father's voice, but alas, it was to be short lived! For as he they fought I had spied that one of Claverhouse's dragoons had moved away from the rest and he stooped to take a large stone. I was frozen and made dumb with fear, something of which I am not proud to this day, and I could not find my voice when I saw the dragoon slip silently up behind my father as he spoke. saw him raise the rock up high, and still the cry I longed to utter remained caught within my throat. Then the dragoon dashed it down up on my father's skull, cleaving it open.

In my horror my knees went from under me, bile rising fast in my gullet. I was aware of more shots ringing through the air and somehow a sense of self-preservation took over and I stumbled back to my feet and fled.

In life, as well as death my father was a man of indomitable spirit and somewhat reckless character, yet not a day goes by that I do not mourn his loss or wish that I had a little more of his strength of will. The Killing Times are long behind us, and graves erected for many of the Martyrs who died in those days. Often I sit by the stone that marks the final rest of Robert Stewart and John Grierson and ponder their cruel fate. But never far from my mind is the martyr who isn't buried there, the Martyr who knows no true rest. My father, James Mc Michael.

WHAT IS EB?

Epidermolysis Bullosa (EB) is a very rare genetic condition in which the skin and body linings blister at the slightest knock or rub, causing painful, open wounds. At its mildest, the condition is confined to the hands and feet making holding things and walking extremely painful. In more severe forms all the body is affected and the wounds heal very slowly, giving rise to scarring, physical deformity and significant disability. People with the more severe types of EB also have an exceptionally high risk of developing skin cancers, shortening their lives by approximately 30-40 years. In its most severe form, the condition is fatal in infancy. For many sufferers the blistering is not limited to the outer body surfaces, but also affects the inner body linings, such as the mouth and oesophagus. The eating of solids is, in these cases, almost impossible, and the disposal of the body waste incredibly painful. Malnutrition is often a consequence when this occurs. Whilst considerable progress has been made in recent years in understanding EB and identifying the genes that cause the condition, there is as yet no effective treatment or cure.

About DebRA

Established in 1978, DebRA is the only medical research and patient support charity in the UK working on behalf of people living with EB. DebRA Scotland was started in March 1994.

- Leading the world in identifying and funding specific research projects likely to lead to a cure and successful treatment for the condition
- Providing specialist services not available through the NHS, to ease the pain and suffering of all children and adults affected by the condition.
- Making skilled counselling and expert guidance on current legislation and governmental services available to EB families, to improve their quality of life
- Raising awareness of the issues surrounding EB to the general public, healthcare professionals, schools and other interested parties.

In Scotland there are no NHS funded treatment facilities at national or regional level. People affected by EB therefore not only rely very heavily on DebRA funded research to provide a long term answer to the illness, but are also almost entirely dependant on the range of specialist support services provided by the charity. These include travelling nurses able to visit children and adults in their homes, clinics, physiotherapy and dietetic services, equipment provision and respite holiday accommodation for families under severe pressure.

Current activities - Research

DebRA has an international reputation in funding high quality research into EB. Most of the major developments in knowledge have been initiated by DebRA funded research groups. Expenditure is guided by the International Medical and Scientific Advisory panel whose members include eminent scientists from Europe and the USA. DebRA UK manages the peer review process for all the EB research worldwide, enabling a strong focus to be maintained. Due to the development of genetic therapies over the last decade great advances in research into the Human Genome have been made. The genes for all main forms of EB are now known and, in the laboratory, the defects can be corrected at cellular level. Genetic therapies will continue to be a key element of DebRA research, but in addition, a major programme of research into cancers in EB (a significant cause of early death in some forms of EB) is also being investigated.

Scotland

Scotland now boasts the largest health care team in the world per head of population of those affected by EB however, with only one specialist per hundred patients, this is still not enough.
