Roads were blocked by water and fallen trees, power cables were brought down by the gale force winds, and on Hogmanay power to much of the area was cut off, lasting up to three days in some cases. Then of course there was the earthquake on Boxing Day whose epicentre was found to be near Newbridge, Dumfries and measured 3.5 on the Richter Scale, the effects of which were felt as far North as Paisley. More recently the country was rocked by yet more gale force winds and stormy weather - luckily this time the Glenkens didn't suffer too much, but we did get our first real snow of the season - and more power cuts.

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Carsphairn - 38th annual Burns Supper



The Burns season started slightly early this year with Carsphairn hosting their 38th Annual Burns Supper on Thursday 18th January. Visiting speakers entertained a packed Lagwyne Hall and were much appreciated by the knowledgeable local audience.

It was explained by Neale, how he saw the Lassie's role in Burns time and how really, it had not changed much now ie – they were still in charge!



AFGHAN SCHOOLS TRUST - UPDATE



The initial aim of the Afghan Schools programme was to respond to local demand by funding the first secular schools in Nuristan, an isolated highland province where international agencies have been unable to operate.

The first two schools were

established in Katigal, and kept running in spite of a legacy of 23 years of war and continuing disturbances nearby. This was in 2001, and they are still flourishing. Now two more have also been opened, and the Afghan government has recognised the success of the schools and has taken over the running costs, allowing the Trust to put funds into other necessary areas.

Good progress has been made with the much needed mother and child health care programme, through which a local female doctor is running courses for women so that they can perform health care duties in their own villages. Many fund raising events have been held, such as sponsored hill walks, a sponsored zip-slide across the Clyde, attendance at local festivals, fundraising talks and various supportive groups have raised funds in aid of the Trust, and of course the main reason all this has been able to come about is through the generous and continuous support of local people. Let's see what can be achieved in 2007!



CARSPHAIRN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The Community Council met on December 4th when a large number of relevant community matters were discussed and action taken where appropriate.

Traffic calming measures are due to be installed shortly. PC Wilson noted that the traffic police have been in the area on a regular basis.

Jeff Dawson from the Scottish Ambulance Service gave a presentation about the process of setting up a First Responder Group. It was agreed to engage the community by holding a public meeting. Later, in the meeting, it was agreed to write to the Health Minister to object to the closure of the Accident and Emergency Unit at Ayr Hospital.

Discussion took place on how to engage young people to take an active part in the Community Council.

A member of the community circulated a paper he had written making a proposal linking possible developments of tourist facilities in Carsphairn with economic development and the affordable housing project in the area. It was agreed to consider these proposals for the next meeting which will be held on February 5th.

A successful Christmas Lunch was held for the Senior Citizens of the Parish in the Kenmure Arms Hotel on December 11th. Thanks were expressed to Mr & Mrs Brannock and staff and to Tommy Edgar for providing the entertainment.

The Christmas Tree at the Burgh Sign was much admired and accepted as one of the best ever. New cables were purchased this year as the old ones no longer met the safety standards. The Community Council greatly appreciate the cooperation of Mr & Mrs Vincent for allowing the lights to be powered from their electricity supply. Plans have been agreed to install a permanent electricity supply to the Burgh Sign which will enable it to be illuminated throughout the year and also include a safe connection for the Christmas Tree. Thanks are also due to Forrest Estate who kindly supply the trees for New Galloway and for Mossdale every year. It is hoped that more decorations would be available for decorating the Town Hall for Christmas 2007.

A small amount of money is to be made available to each community in the Stewartry District to be used for general clean up work and repairs. Several urgent jobs were identified including cleaning and repainting the Town Hall exterior, repair of several summer seats and refurbishment of the Burgh Sign.

Continued efforts are being made to progress the provision of additional lay-bys on the west bank of Loch Ken.

The February meeting is to be delayed by one week until Monday 19th to avoid the school half term holiday.

Glenkens Business Association

We had a very successful, informative and enjoyable evening on Wednesday 15 November with nearly 40 people attending despite the attrocious weather. It was an evening of talks of interest to all small businesses.

The Annual General Meeting of the Glenkens Business Association was held on Tuesday 16th January 2007, at 7pm in the Kenbridge Hotel, New Galloway.

The evening began with a very interesting talk from Keith Muir, who is Head of Recreation and Environment for the Galloway Forest Park. He gave an overview of the size of the Park in relation to other forest areas in Scotland, highlighting some of the recent improvements they have made. He went on to outline some of the plans to attract more visitors to the Park areas, including creating more routes for mountain biking and other cycling together with other schemes aimed at drawing visitors right through the Park area.

This was followed by the business part of the meeting with reports from the various office bearers. The chairman reported on what had been happening in the Association over the last year, beginning with a brief summary of a meeting in Castle Douglas about plans to set up a region wide Chamber of Commerce for Dumfries and Galloway, followed by news of the Business Directory. It is planned to produce a new Directory in April, so it is vital that members renew their subscriptions (£20) by contacting the Treasurer at bobandnette@waitrose.com, or on 01644 420226, or the secretary at secretary@glenkens-business-association.org.uk, or on 01644 430162 before the end of February if they wish to be included in the updated version.

Finally the Chair reported on a recent meeting with Business Gateway and Company Training solutions and provided details of upcoming talks which will include Damien Wilson, Operations Manager for Regeneration and Europe with Dumfries and Galloway Council, who will talk about Economic Regeneration on February 20th at the Kenbridge Hotel at 7pm. On March 20th Jeremy Sainsbury will speak about changes to the planning laws and how this may impact on businesses, and on April 24th Andrew Bielinski from SNH will talk on the subject of changes to the Galloway & S Ayrshire Biosphere Reserve. It is planned that all these meetings will be held at the Kenbridge Hotel beginning at 7pm.

This was followed by the Treasurer's report that detailed the financial situation of the Association and reiterated the reminder that subscriptions are now due. The Secretary then gave a presentation on proposed changes to the Association's Constitution. This was discussed at length. It was subsequently decided to print up copies of the Constitution with the changes for the next meeting in February, which will also be an Extraordinary General Meeting in order that members may agree the final draft.

DALRY TOWN HALL GRANTED A FARMERS & CRAFT MARKET LICENCE

Through a generous donation which covers the cost of a three year licence, Dalry Town Hall Committee is able legally to stage a series of farmers Produce and Craft markets. The application to Dumfries & Galloway Council was completed in November 2006 and in late December we were informed we had been successful. The health & safety requirements and legal definitions are quite extensive, and as part of the licence conditions a Market Manager needed to be appointed as the licence representative, on behalf of the Committee. YOUR DOG - Rottweiler

Breed History

Rottwellers get their name as they come from a town in Germany called Rotwell. But their ancestry actually goes back to Roman times. The Romans brought the dogs with them as cattle dogs for driving the cattle which fed the troops. In Rome, the Rottwellers' ancestors, though very different from the dog we know today, were used to fight big cats in amphitheatres, usually two or three dogs fighting one lion.

After the Romans had been driven out of Rottweil, some of their dogs were left behind and over time the locals began using these dogs for various purposes. Their most popular use was by butchers and cattle farmers, as the dogs could tend their stock and also carry their money around their neck, safe from thieves. The dog became known as the 'metzgerhund', or 'butcher's dog', before it developed the name we know it by today — the Rottweiler.

Breed Characteristics

Rottwellers are large, heavily built dogs with a short black and tan coat. They used to always have a docked tail but this practice is generally frowned upon now, so it is becoming more common to see Rottwellers with normal tails. As you can see from their breed history, they have had both herding and guarding instincts bred into them. This means that:

- You must make sure that you are the boss don't get a Rottweiler if you have little self-confidence and find it hard to assert yourself, as the dog will soon take advantage of this and become the 'pack leader'. The dog has been bred to protect its 'pack' (you and your family) and home, so good training is needed to make sure the dog is well and truly under your control you don't want your dog taking matters into its own paws, as it were, and deciding, for example, that old Mrs McTavish from next door is a threat to his pack and as he is the leader he has to deal with the situation...It is dangerous to get a big dog with guarding instincts and not spend the necessary time on initial training and socialisation, and also keeping on top of training throughout the dog's life. Better breeds of dog for the less assertive person would be a Shetland Sheep Dog or a Golden Retriever, as these breeds have a more socially subordinate disposition and are not bred to guard.
- Never let a Rottweiler roam free (this goes for any breed) as their herd instinct will most probably kick in and they are likely to end up trying out their chase on the nearest sheep/cat/cyclist/car and injuring either themselves or something else. Also, if you are going to let your dog off-leash, even in your company, you must be sure that he will respond to your call, even if he has seen something he would like very much to investigate. Otherwise your dog is out of control, and this is a dangerous and irresponsible situation.

But it also means that:

- The Rottweiler is a natural guard dog, and doesn't need to be trained to keep an eye open for prowlers. Also, they have a good sense of what you are feeling so if you are in a situation where you feel threatened, it's most likely that your dog has picked up on your fear and will move closer to you, perhaps in between you and the threat, and be ready to defend you if need be. Rottweilers also work as a great deterrent they are large and dark and ominous looking, so anyone thinking about doing something nasty to you or your property might well think again if there is a Rottie in the vicinity.
- Dogs bred for herding tend to have a caring, patient side to them they are good family dogs (of course, never leave children alone with a dog), keeping strangers at bay and warning of intruders. Rottwellers are affectionate, caring dogs who crave physical contact and love to be with you. They are not happy to be left alone for long periods of time, and can develop stress-related habits such as chewing, digging and barking if they are alone and unhappy. They are happy lying about for long periods of time, but beware of the tendency to laziness your Rottie will take as much exercise as you can give, but if you don't give it much, it will probably not remind you as much as other breeds may, which can lead to health problems such as obesity.

Rottweilers as Pets







These dogs make wonderful, rewarding pets — if you have the time and energy to put into them. They do need a large amount of training and socialisation, and are happiest when they are with you so the more time you spend on them the better. Mary MacPhail, rottweiler representative on the Kennel Club Breeds Liaison Council, who has bred rotties for over 30 years, says: "They are very intelligent, loyal and responsive." However, she stresses the need for good handling: "Any dog requires training, but, because they're large, they do require direction. Unfortunately, rottwellers became popular with the macho section of the public." A dog's behaviour is usually the result of the way it has been treated by people. And the Rottwellers' background is testimony to this — with their loyal temperament and big heart, it was no wonder the butchers of Rottweil would trust them with their livelihood. They respected their dogs, and their dogs understood the special place they held in their owner's lives.



THE STORY OF THE GLENKENS '73 CLUB

The club was formed, as the name suggests, in 1973 by a group of amateur drama enthusiasts from around the Glenkens. The first ever production was a variety show entitled 'The Clachan Capers' staged in Dalry Town Hall. In 1974 the first Pantomime, 'Mother Goose', was so popular that an extra matinee performance had to be added on the Saturday afternoon to meet the demand for tickets! The annual panto went on to become an institution, selling out a four night run at it's peak in the 70's, 80's & 90's. Since the late 90's, for various reasons there has not been a panto every year but after a two year break the tradition was revived at Christmas 2006 with a very successful and well received production of 'Little Bo Peep' (see separate report).

The other main regular club activity is to compete in the Stewartry Round of the Scottish Community Drama Association One Act Play Festival, the club have entered at least one play every year since the first production of 'The Masterfu' Wife' by Agnes Adam in 1974. Although the club have never won the festival outright and represented the Stewartry at the next round, over the years a steady stream of trophies have found their way to the mantelpieces of the Glenkens – 2nd Place, 3nd Place, Best Scottish Play, Best Stage Presentation and The Audience Choice which is perhaps the most satisfying one to win, after all, the other trophies are awarded purely based on one person's opinion – the dreaded adjudicator! Last year the members were pleased to take 3nd Place and also win the trophy for Best Stage Presentation with a production of 'Cupboard Love' by Jean McConnell.

The club are always pleased to welcome new members, whether you would like to tread the boards, direct plays, produce pantomimes, play music, make costumes, sell raffle tickets or even make cups of teal

Tommy Tucker (Kathy Polkinghorne) contributed to the comedy particularly in the schoolroom scene and at other times led the chorus of villagers. The villagers, ghosts, lambs and spiders were played by Elizabeth Tripptree, Henry Sainsbury, Sheila Little, Rachel McCreath, Sarah McCreath, Irene McCreath, Mitchell, Jackie Excell. Other cameo roles were played by Brian Edgar as the Toon Crier and Elizabeth Tripptree as The Child. Tika, Daisy and Jasmin Adam were ever so cute as Fairy Bluebell's dancing fairy troupe. Then last but not least, the star of any pantomime - the pantomime cow, in this case Mildred the Dancing Coo who was energetically and endearingly played by Trudie Mitchell and Jackie Excell.

The production was very ably supported by an army of expertise behind the scenes, Stage Manager was lain Offin assisted by Gordon Johnston and Robert Little; Sound and Music Technician was Nick Robson; Lighting Technician was Mark Stoves; Prompt was Rhoda Rugg; Costumes were by Sheila Little and other club members; and Scenery by Roy Hooker.

The club are very grateful to the Dumfries and Galloway Arts Association who supported the production through their Area Development Grant Scheme and also to all the local businesses who gave support by advertising in the programme.

ONE ACT PLAY FESTIVAL 2007

The Glenkens '73 Club have again entered two plays in the Stewartry round of the Scottish Community Drama Association One Act Play Festival to be held at Lochside Theatre on 22nd,23rd and 24th February 2007.

One entry is 'Cruise Missile' from the pen of Jean McConnell who wrote the play 'Cupboard Love' with which we came third last year and also won the Best Stage Presentation. It is a comedy set on a cruise ship and follows the fortunes of a 'first time' cruiser who meets up on the first day on board with an experienced cruiser who promises to show her the ropes.

The other entry is 'Wha's Laird' by George S. Carruthers, a traditional Scots Comedy. Once the staple diet of SCDA Festivals, traditional Scots comedies have become a rare sight in recent years but always go down well with audiences. 'Wha's Laird' is one of the 'standards' and tells the story of two twin brothers who are constantly fighting over who is the rightful laird and are continually stealing the family crest from each other, usually just before rent day! Finally, one of the wife's engages a lawyer to find out who is the laird once and for all.

However, as the truth hilariously unfolds it is not nearly as straightforward as everyone expected!

At the time of going to press the performance nights had not been allocated but please look out for the draw in the local press and if you would like to come along to support us at the festival it would be very much appreciated. Please get your tickets early as the festival is always a sell out.

The plays will also be staged in Dalry Town Hall after the Festival.

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TAI CHI.... THE KEY TO A <u>BALANCED</u> HEALTHY LIFESTYLE!

Liz Cole, Community Project Worker, GCAT, is bringing Tai Chi for the over 50s to the Glenkens. There will be a free taster session on Thursday $8^{\rm th}$ March from 10.30 am - 12 noon at The Lochinvar, St. John's Town of Dalry. Starting on Thursday 19th April, there will be weekly morning sessions from 10.30am - 11.30am which will run for six weeks at The Lochinvar, St. John's Town of Dalry. The fee per session will be £3/£2 concession.

These sessions will be taught by Elaine Cameron, a local Tai Chi and Pilates instructor. Classes will focus on the health aspect of Tai Chi, not the martial arts aspect. They will be less challenging and will be about repetitive breathing techniques; loosening up; repetitive movements and exercises, and focusing on different aspects of the body and balance, helping you find your 'centre of gravity' and assume good posture. The classes will not be concerned with learning a long series of 'forms', but rather they will offer little sequences that can be taken home. Neither will the classes be progressive, meaning that if you miss a class it does not matter - you will be able to return to the group very easily. All of these exercises will be possible in the seated position.

Although the moves will be simple, many Tai Chi experts believe that most of the practice's benefits are covered in the basics. 'Loosening up' exercises help with arthritis and also with bad balance, reducing the risk of falls. Practising Tai Chi brings with it a tremendous sense of personal achievement and IT IS FUN!

"Falls are the biggest cause of accidental deaths in older people in Britain, but gentle Tai Chi movements can save lives.

"Human beings fall over a lot. Government figures show that Britons can't get dressed safely: as many as 17,000 people a year are injured by overbalancing while trying to put on trousers, socks and tights. That can be comic among youngsters but with frail older people whose sense of balance is weak, it often

proves fatal. Falling is the most common cause of accidental death among the elderly, with one person dying every five hours from a fall in the home. (John Naish, 'Body and Soul', The Times, 2005)


Several reputable studies have backed the benefits of Tai Chi for preventing elderly falls. In 2005, a six-month study of 256 people, aged 70-92, published by the Oregon Research Institute in the Journals of Gerontology Series A: Biological Sciences and Medical Sciences, found that weekly Tai Chi classes more than halved the number of injurious falls experienced by older people who were taught stretching exercises. They also performed much better in balance tests.

Tai Chi helps to improve balance, suppleness and tissue strength. It originally descended from Chinese unarmed combat techniques as a secret way of optimising health by combining mind and body through a series of slow meditative movements based on pulls and pushes, kicks, blocks arm-locks and twists. These are designed to promote the flow of energy or 'chi', along the body's meridian lines, the same channels used by acupuncturists. Even today, Tai Chi can still be used as a combat style, though its intricately choreographed movements are used mostly to promote well-being.

In the West we often tend to hold ourselves in a stressed and tense manner which causes tension and headaches. Most people tend not to remember to breathe correctly and spend much of the day holding their breath. Tal Chi encourages people to breathe and relax their upper bodies - wonderful for a healthy blood pressure. Feeling the energy flowing around the body and opening up the channels through postures gives people the sense that they are doing something really positive for their health.



GALLOWAY KITES UPDATE



Newcastle; this dispersal of young is common in kite populations. Two of last year's young have also been identified in other areas of the country; one at a roost in Perthshire and the other at a feeding station in Wales. This gives us Galloway kites at all points of the compass. It will be interesting in the future to see if these young kites return to their natal area as can be expected.

The Galloway Kite Trail continues to be a great draw for visitors and locals alike, all hoping to observe these beautiful birds around our equally beautiful countryside. Motorists in the area have been lucky to escape from the icy roads and wintry weather this year, but don't be caught out!

Make sure your tyres are legal, your wipers don't let you down and don't set off before the whole window is clear of frost or condensation. Two headlights also help, but don't use your fog lights unless necessary - it is an offence to use these additional lights when not needed!

In the Glenkens many thefts are what we call 'opportunist crimes'; in other words, one of you out there leaves something lying around or unlocked and when you come back, someone has helped themselves to your property. It's very frustrating for you and the police. So my new year wish this year is: please try this year NOT to help the thieves out there! Take care of your property!

COMMUNITY FIRE SAFETY MESSAGE

Dumfries & Galloway Fire & Rescue Service recommends that 10 year approved, battery type smoke alarms are the minimum standard you should provide for your home. At least one smoke alarm should be fitted on each floor of smoke alarms and the provider when the provi smoke alarm should be fitted on each floor of your home. If you do not have a working smoke alarm in your home call 01387 252222 and ask for the Community fire Safety Department and a firefighter will call at a mutually convenient, pre-arranged time to fit one for you. If you have children we can also fit a free 10 year alarm in your children's bedroom[s] for extra safety. extra safety.

Home Fire Safety Checks are available for those over 60, or with a disability and can also be arranged by calling the above number.

The Fire & Rescue Service would like to remind those who have open fires to remember to have their chimneys swept regularly — at least twice a year and more often if you burn wood, etc. A clean chimney reduces the risk of chimney fires and the risk of Carbon Monoxide poisoning.

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WHAT IS EB?

Epidermolysis Bullosa (EB) is a very rare genetic condition in which the skin and body linings blister at the slightest knock or rub, causing painful, open wounds. At its mildest, the condition is confined to the hands and feet making holding things and walking extremely painful. In more severe forms all the body is affected and the wounds heal very slowly, giving rise to scarring, physical deformity and significant disability. People with the more severe types of EB also have an exceptionally high risk of developing skin cancers, shortening their lives by approximately 30-40 years. In its most severe form, the condition is fatal in infancy. For many sufferers the blistering is not limited to the outer body surfaces, but also affects the inner body linings, such as the mouth and oesophagus. The eating of solids is, in these cases, almost impossible, and the disposal of the body waste incredibly painful. Malnutrition is often a consequence when this occurs. Whilst considerable progress has been made in recent years in understanding EB and identifying the genes that cause the condition, there is as yet no effective treatment or cure.

About DebRA

Established in 1978, DebRA is the only medical research and patient support charity in the UK working on behalf of people living with EB. DebRA Scotland was started in March 1994.

- Leading the world in identifying and funding specific research projects likely to lead to a cure and successful treatment for the condition
- Providing specialist services not available through the NHS, to ease the pain and suffering of all children and adults affected by the condition.
- Making skilled counselling and expert guidance on current legislation and governmental services available to EB families, to improve their quality of life
- Raising awareness of the issues surrounding EB to the general public, healthcare professionals, schools and other interested parties.

In Scotland there are no NHS funded treatment facilities at national or regional level. People affected by EB therefore not only rely very heavily on DebRA funded research to provide a long term answer to the illness, but are also almost entirely dependant on the range of specialist support services provided by the charity. These include travelling nurses able to visit children and adults in their homes, clinics, physiotherapy and dietetic services, equipment provision and respite holiday accommodation for families under severe pressure.

Current activities - Research

DebRA has an international reputation in funding high quality research into EB. Most of the major developments in knowledge have been initiated by DebRA funded research groups. Expenditure is guided by the International Medical and Scientific Advisory panel whose members include eminent scientists from Europe and the USA. DebRA UK manages the peer review process for all the EB research worldwide, enabling a strong focus to be maintained. Due to the development of genetic therapies over the last decade great advances in research into the Human Genome have been made. The genes for all main forms of EB are now known and, in the laboratory, the defects can be corrected at cellular level. Genetic therapies will continue to be a key element of DebRA research, but in addition, a major programme of research into cancers in EB (a significant cause of early death in some forms of EB) is also being investigated.

Scotland

Scotland now boasts the largest health care team in the world per head of population of those affected by EB however, with only one specialist per hundred patients, this is still not enough.

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
