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### THE BATTLE OF THE BANDS


Balmaclellan Village Hall was a hive of activity at The Battle of the Bands on Friday 16 March. And what a success it was! With over 100 people through the door, it was wonderful to see so many young people having such a great time, bringing the hall to life. I don't think I have ever seen so many young people at an event held in the Glenkens, and the sound engineer, Billy Milligan, who works with many youth music events in Dumfries, said "you'd be pushed to get this many people to a youth event in Dumfries!" Now that's impressive.

Three bands featured at the event - The Jam Squad, Crazy Paving and Syphon Plane - with band members ranging in age from 14 to 18. They performed like pros, illuminated by the atmospheric red glow of the hall's overhead electric heaters while young fans danced and cheered them on. The standard of the musicians was very high, impressing everyone there I think — except of course the die-hard fans who all knew how good they would be! The judges of the competition, Simon and Liz Holmes who run the Knockengorroch Festivals, said that "the standard of the bands was outstanding" and showed a dedication to their music and a keen desire to perform.

The event was organised by the Glenkens Community and Arts Trust GYROscope youth committee. Ben Truman, who organised the event, says: "I've always been very interested in local bands and looking for new, interesting types of music, and when I got involved in the GYRO-scope committee and we were asked to suggest events for young people, I suggested a band night and the idea grew from there." He goes on to explain how they organised funding for the event, "there are so many grants available out there, especially for young people who are looking for ways to provide entertainment aimed at the younger generation." But it was hard work too, as Ben explains: "The idea was first thrown up in October and developed from there. I have had to conquer many obstacles I have never encountered before, as this is the first time I have organised an like this. But with the help of GCAT staff, and a lot of hard work, I think that the juice was very much worth the squeeze!"

With this first achievement under its belt, the GYRO-scope committee will hopefully make youth events in the area a regular occurrence. Ben says: "based on the success of this band night, there is no reason not to make this a regular event. I am also looking into other events showcasing young local talent in the future so keep your eyes open!"





#### WHIZZ-BANG WIZARDS



Local boys Joe Patterson and Edmund Wise became TV celebrities recently when they featured on prime time TV on the BBC1 programme Whizz Whizz Bang Bang. Joe and Edmund, aged 11, featured in the final episode of the three week series on Friday 23 March. The premise of the show, says Series Producer Brendan McCaul, is to "inspire invention in a creative way — the ideas are whimsical, not practical solutions for everyday life. We aim to inspire a creative mind in young people — the show aims to entertain first and foremost, but also to educate and inspire."

Joe and Edmund were chosen when they attended a workshop for inventive children held in Glasgow. The producers of the show found both boys to be creative in their own right, but they "worked well together, with good dynamics between them - sort of like 'Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure' - their individuality and unique ways of thinking combined with inventiveness and personality really caught our attention."



The boys' invention was 'A Gig in a Box', which is a virtual air guitar system where they create an audio-visual performance using virtual air guitars that actually play music. For the programme they recreate the theme tune for Whizz Whizz Bang Bang using virtual air guitars. The invention works with sound beams, and visuals are also created. "We take them on a journey where they learn how the sound beam machines work, to a dubbing suite where we take the music apart for them, and at the end of the adventure they have created their invention" says Brendan.

#### **LOCAL ARTISTS** Martyn Wheeler - Harpist



Martyn got his first harp in about 1992, just after he moved to the Glenkens, but didn't start to play it until six years ago. "The reason I decided to play the harp" says Martin, "is that I realized my memory wasn't as good as it was when I was younger, and I felt that it was time to slow the descent into rapid senility. So I decided to learn a musical instrument, and the harp appealed."

The harp is a fairly unusual instrument to choose, and Martyn gives me a better understanding of the capabilities of the harp when he states; "a piano is just a harp on its side – the piano-forte (soft-loud) was created to allow what became the harpsichord (literally a harp on its side) to have more tonal quality." Apparently the harp was invented around Scotland or Ireland as late back as Pictish times, and so Scottish culture must actually have been fairly civilized before the Romans ploughed their way through the country.

"After having had the harp sitting around for years, I was on

the verge of giving up when I spoke to a harp manufacturer who suggested I take lessons from Wendy Stewart. Wendy is a world renowned harpist, in my opinion in the top six in the world, and luckily for me she lives locally!"

Martyn plays regularly at the Knockengorroch festivals where you will find him again this year, usually performing in the atmospheric Long House. He also featured at the Wickerman last year, and has played at The Arches in Glasgow and The Fairfield Halls in Croyden. ## **DALRY FARMERS MARKET** A GREAT SUCCESS

On Saturday, March 10th, an impressive turnout of over 250 people enjoyed the first of the bi-monthly Glenkens Farmers Markets at Dalry Town Hall. Ten organic and home produce traders from the region exhibited a wide range of produce - veal, pork, lamb and other meats, smoked cheese, organically produced eggs, honey, chutney and jams, bread and other tasty produce.

So popular was the event and the produce on display, that two producers sold out within an hour of the market opening, and others were making frantic phone calls to re-order and re-stock their stands. In fact the market closed two hours early as most traders had so little stock left. Also on sale were home-made

scones, cakes and other home bakes, as well as tasty home-made soup.

The Farmers Market was the second in a regular series of monthly markets. Last month a very successful Craft Fair took place featuring local crafts, gifts, photographs and other speciality goods made by local craftspeople from the Glenkens and around Galloway. The Markets are part of a series of regular monthly markets, held every second Saturday of the month, to help raise funds for the Town Hall Refurbishment Fund. In total, over £350 was raised at this months Farmers Market, and last month's Craft Fair raised over £250.

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#### DALRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

It was reported that last week bins appeared at the lay-by on the higher Carsphairn Road, B7000 opposite Tom Scott's. G Bell contacted the relevant department and spoke to Mr Charles Clemie who is the Principle Road Services officer for the Stewartry. He was unaware of their arrival particularly in view of his recent report advising members that this site was inappropriate due to road safety issues. He confirmed the bins would be uplifted immediately. It would appear that a misunderstanding took place between one of his officers and Ms J Hay. After a lengthy and, at times, a heated discussion it was agreed that Clir. Prentice will arrange for Mr C Clemie to visit Dalry next week and meet with Ms J Hay, Mrs M Jones and two members of the community to view possible alternative sites and his report should be available for the next Community Council meeting. It was agreed by members that no final decision should be made without the CC's approval.

Ms Hay proposed the following 5 alternative sites: The lay-by on the B7000, behind the Library, car park at Kirkland St, by the storage shed at the Town Hall and the land at the back of the Town Hall. N.B. Charles Clemie and Cllr. George Prentice will be in Dalry on Thursday March 15th at 2pm to meet with Mr McKay and Mr Fenner. Ms Hay and Mrs Jones have also been invited.

#### **GLENKENS '73 CLUB**

The two club entries for this year's Stewartry Drama Festival were greatly appreciated by the capacity audiences at Lochside Theatre.

'Cruise Missile' by Jean McConnell was staged on the opening night of the festival and featured Kathy Polkinghorne and Christine Rae as holidaymakers on a cruise ship. The play was directed by Ewan McIntyre and is a gentle comedy highlighting the clash of personalities between the rather loud and brash experienced cruiser and the quieter first time cruiser who just wants to be left alone. The adjudicator praised the characterisation and the set which captured the feeling of being at sea. A good choice of music and sound effects also helped to set the atmosphere. He felt that there could have been a little more variation of movement and pace within the piece but otherwise thoroughly enjoyed the play which brought the first evening to a close.

The other entry 'Wha's Laird' by George S. Carruthers was the final production of the festival on the Saturday evening. Described by the author as a 'rumbustious romp in Scots' it was destined to close the festival in style. The play demands a rather complex set with no less than five different entrances and the club members pulled out all the stops to create a full box set with suitable period furniture and stage dressings sourced from far and wide. The adjudicator described the set as magnificent with great attention to detail, complemented by excellent costuming and make up. He awarded the trophy for the Best Stage Presentation to the production, the second year in a row that the club has won this trophy.

The play was directed by Marie Davie and tells the hilarious story of twin brothers who are fighting over the right to be the laird and featured a large cast — Brian Edgar, Rosie Kneeshaw, Ewan McIntyre, Marie Davie, Callum McIntyre, Emma Thomson, Aaron Edgar and Shella Little. The audience laughed virtually from the opening line as the comedy raged and the plot thickened. Although the pace romped along for most of the play, the adjudicator felt that it flagged a bit at times towards the end and this reduced the impact of some of the comedy scenes. However, he praised the acting in general and highlighted some excellent characterisation, teamwork and comedy timing amongst the cast. The play also won the trophy for the Best Scottish Play.

The club are intending to present the plays in Dalry Town Hall when a suitable date can be agreed, probably during April.

The Open Festival was won by Lochside Theatre's production of 'King of the Castle' by Mark Rees which will represent the Stewartry District at the Western Divisional Final in East Kilbride at the end of March.

#### **Glenkens Business Association**

Talk by Damien Wilson, Operations Manager for Countryside and Environment, Regeneration and Europe for D&G Council, to Glenkens Business Association.

Damien began his talk by describing what he and his staff did, supporting regeneration projects in the region, for example in major projects, helping to replace jobs lost at Chapelcross following decommission, improving the environment and vibrancy of Dumfries to make it the regional capital, regenerate the waterfront at Stranraer and others. He also mentioned his role in community area regeneration, encouraging local people to take control and supporting local communities to bring forward new employment and projects that will show an economic return; e.g. GCAT, the Dalbeattie Initiative, Upper Nithsdale Forum, Kirkcudbright 2000 etc.

There is an idea that Dumfries and Galloway could become the Events and Festivals area of Scotland and each year the council promote and support particular festivals.

Scotland is the Number 1 mountain bike capital of the world, and the south is a very important part of that, providing a number of excellent trails, like the 7 Stanes. Provision of locations for film and TV programmes, supporting theme towns, matching council aspirations with redevelopment plans and co-ordination significant building enquiries are all part of their remit.

Scottish Enterprise Dumfries and Galloway will be reviewing their strategy very soon and it is important that the business community get involved and make their needs known before the new strategy is decided.

On the Countryside and Environment side, they aim to give more publicity to and improve the maintenance of the footpath networks in the region, working with the Forestry Commission and other bodies and help publicise areas like Wigtown Bay and Loch Ken.

All the members who attended agreed that it was an excellent talk and it was a shame that a number of members were unable to attend.

The next presentation is on April 24th - a talk by Andrew Bielinski of SNH on Galloway & S Ayrshire Biosphere Reserve.

He will give a bit of background to what a Biosphere Reserve is and then look more closely at the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere Reserve proposals.

## Nature & Wildlife

## CARSPHAIRN SALMON INITIATIVE

Bringing the salmon back - that's the ambitious aim of the Carsphairn Salmon Initiative, a local group who are working to stock the Deugh & Upper Ken rivers which are currently inaccessible to salmon due to the impassable Kendoon dams.


Experimental stockings have proven the viability of young salmon to thrive in these headwaters and in 2003 the group put 60,000 salmon eggs in batches of 100 into man-made gravel nests throughout the Carsphairn parish area. Survivors of this stocking were due back from the sea in late 2006. More may arrive in late 2007 and the group would like to hear from anyone who sees salmon jumping in the Kendoon - Polmaddie area below the dams.

The historical salmon map opposite highlights the significance this fish played in the area prior to the power scheme and afforestation and highlights the scope for recreating the great salmon runs of the past. The Deugh and Upper Ken comprise some 40% of the whole Ken-Dee catchment and have the potential to greatly increase total salmon numbers. These have now fallen to an all time low of only 300-400 fish per year - the runs of the past were counted in many thousands. The new Scottish Power-funded hatchery at Shirmers is vital to current enhancement efforts. The next step is planned in association with the Galloway Fisheries Trust and involves stocking a major tributary in the Carsphairn area. In order to ensure maximum survival the young fish will be trapped when they migrate down towards the sea and then released down the Dee below the dam system.

It is hoped that by the time these fish return from the sea in 3 or 4 years time there will be a trap in place below the Kendoon dams so they can be caught and transferred above the dams to continue their way upstream to breed.

The Carsphairn Salmon Initiative is working in cooperation with the Dee District Salmon Fishery Board, the Galloway Fisheries Trust, Scottish Power and other bodies involved in current efforts to enhance salmon on the Ken-Dee rivers system.

#### CARSPHAIRN SCHOOL VISITS WATER COURSE PROJECT

Carsphairn School pupils recently had an outing to a local forest burn where they learned about how land use has affected our water courses, and how we can help. Robin Ade, local expert in this field, is working on a project to stabilise burns in the Carsphairn area which have been damaged by 1970s forestry. The burn at Smittons which was visited is the first to be worked with, and the idea is to show the school children what the burn looks like before any improvements have been made, and to explain the issues effecting



the water course. Then the pupils will visit again once the Sitka Spruce trees which border the burn have been thinned out, pools have been created to slow the flow of the water during flood times, and some native trees have been planted along the banks to allow more life to develop in and around the water. It is hoped that this is the first of many burns which will receive such help with the support of local forest managers and the Galloway Fisheries Trust.

## FUNDRAISING NEWS

#### SPONSORED BIKE RIDE IN MALAWI



Glenkens minister David Bartholomew has registered to take part in a Bike Ride in Malawi from 12-21 May, organised by the Edinburgh Medical Missionary Society.

The ride will cover more than 280 miles in six days, starting in the capital, Lilongwe, and ending at Mulanje Mission Hospital in southern Malawi. Funds raised from the event will help improve services at Mulanje Mission Hospital and support other health projects in southern Malawi. The hospital was founded in the 1870s by the Church of Scotland and is now under the auspices of the Church of Central Africa, Presbyterian.

The largest orphan centre of Abbas Rest Orphans, the Glenkens based charity which local congregations seek to support, is located not far from the hospital; and he has come to an agreement that half of the sponsorship money that he raises will go to Abbas Rest Orphans and half to the hospital and related health projects. After the bike ride he plans to visit at least some of the orphan centres.

He has committed himself to raise at least £2300 in sponsorship.

#### PANCAKE LUNCH

Balmaclellan & Kells Guild held their 10th annual Pancake Lunch on Tuesday 20th February in New Galloway Town Hall. Since its inception in 1998 the event has raised almost £2,500 for different charities, most of which have had a local connection. This year was no exception as £400 was raised for the chosen charity, "Maximum Attack" - Gordon Clendinning's Fundraising Appeal for The Paul O'Gorman Leukaemia Research Centre, Glasgow.

Around a hundred people came to enjoy the pancakes, each having a savoury and a sweet filling followed by tea or coffee. Background piano music provided by Jim McPhee added to the pleasant atmosphere. A stall with some lovely home baking and a raffle helped to boost Guild funds.

Balmaclellan & Kells is a small Guild with only 14 members but they were helped by many friends who came along to serve pancakes, fetch and carry, and wash dishes!

Soon several groups were meeting in the Glenkens. The aims of the SWRI were to promote rural life, educational opportunities and to socialise and these are still the same today. ### NEW GALLOWAY -Our Historic Burgh

Reading through the 1841 Census Records of New Galloway Burgh one cannot help noticing the amazing number of tradespeople who were resident in the village, and also how well-served was the community with shops and other amenities. The wee Burgh must have been almost totally self-sufficient, especially as all the cottages seemed to have extremely productive gardens where most people kept hens, and either a pig or a cow.

The school was well established under the guidance of Schoolmaster Mr John Muir and two other teachers. The Post Office was also in the capable hands of Mr John Muir, a man of many parts! The village boasted a surgeon, Dr Hugh Douglas, who had been in partnership with his father, Dr Archibald Douglas until the latter's retirement in 1840. Their residence was at No 17 High Street.

The Smithy, run by two brothers, William and Matthew Turner, was a very important establishment in the village, as not only did the blacksmith keep all the many horses in the area well shod, he also made and repaired all types of farm implements. He made gates, hinges, latches, household items of many kinds, and he could repair iron cooking pots and make the special chains for hanging pots over the fire on the "swee".

The mill, next to the Smithy, was run by Samuel Martin, and was another vital part of village life. All the wheat and barley meal used locally would be ground at the village mill. Water to drive the mill-wheel was gathered in the dam, now long weeded over and almost invisible, just outside New Galloway on the north side of the Newton Stewart road. The Mill Burn is still a busy, hurrying little waterway following the line of the road towards the village.

Boot and shoe making must have been a very lucrative trade, as New Galloway supported no less than seven of these useful tradesmen, with two apprentices, and four journeyman shoemakers also lived in the village, and they would ply their trade around the outlying farms and houses. Joiners were plentiful, with three plus five apprentices in the village, and five journeyman joiners working in the local area.

There was Mr McCandlish the well known builder, five stonemasons, one journeyman mason, an apprentice, and Mr Hutcheson the plasterer to keep all the buildings in the Burgh in a good state of repair.

Other trades represented in New Galloway were the saddler, the stocking maker, the straw hat maker, five dressmakers, six tailors and an apprentice, five handloom weavers including one who was a linen weaver, a sawyer, and two coopers!

The shopkeepers were interesting, as apart from two bakers and two butchers there was William Candlish who was a spirit dealer and ironmonger, John McKay who combined his grocery trade with a drapery business, while James Smith was a grocer and nail maker. One hopes the nails were kept well away from the food - modern day Health and Safety Officials would not be amused! A merchant and four tea dealers appear to complete the shopkeepers and suppliers of the village.

Three inns catered for the needs of thirsty locals and travellers, and provided accommodation. Thomas McKelvie ran the "Cross Keys" William Turner had the "Town's Arms", and Isabella Wilson was mine hostess at the "Kenmure Arms" following her husband's death, and her son, John drove the chaise for conveying their visitors.

There was William McKellip, the busy man who kept the roads tidy and in reasonable repair, and last but by no means least, we must not forget the village Constable, Henry Clinton, whose job it was to keep the villagers of New Galloway in order. This was probably fairly easy, but disturbances may well have occurred when visiting drovers shepherds got a few drams inside them after successful sales of sheep or cattle.

What a busy wee place "Our Historic Burgh" appears to have been in those faroff days, with work for everyone, and no paupers, so the census tells us. There was no need for folk to commute, as so many are forced to do today. Maybe there was a lot to be said for the "Good Old Days", I certainly think there was!



#### CARSPHAIRN - THE SPORTING LIFE

This exhibition at the Heritage Centre covers the period from the 1850s until recently. Lots of newspaper extracts, incidents and sporting memories have come to light as well as many of the cups and medals so keenly played for.

Many of the inter village matches were reported in detail in the local papers so we have a wealth of names of those who took part in the various sports from our local clubs.

Curling matches took place with Dalmellington, Dalry and New Galloway, cricket with Dalmellington, Glencairn and Kirroughtrie and carpet bowling with the local clubs at New Galloway, Dalry, Balmaclellan, Polharrow, Stroanfreggan and Holm of Dalquhairn.

We've learnt over the years that our exhibitions change and grow throughout the season as memories and objects are added. We are always pleased when this happens as it means that the exhibition is enriched by the interest of those who come and see or hear about it.

The exhibition will be open weekends and bank holidays only until the end of May and then daily except Wednesdays until the end of September.



#### THE GLENKENS COMMUNITY AND ARTS TRUST - A PROGRESS REPORT

Time marches on, evidenced by the progress being made by 'Grahams', the building company tasked with converting New Galloway's old school building into a 'state of the art' community and arts centre. It will be known as 'The CatStrand', and its purpose will be to serve the Glenkens community and to attract visitors from outwith the area whom we hope will spread the 'good news' and return time and time again. Why CatStrand? Regular readers of this gazette will know the answer, but for those who are not, then simply, CatStrand is the name of the burn whose course has had to be slightly adjusted in order to avoid running through the middle of the site of our new centre. In spite of this unforeseen difficulty, together with the excessive amount of rain experienced during the autumn and winter months, conversion work is broadly on track for completion in the summer.

Meanwhile, and in parallel, much work is underway by the 'GCAT Team' to identify and determine the fittings, furniture and decoration of the centre. Anyone who has moved into a recently constructed house or office block will be aware of the vast amount of detail that must be reviewed and considered when determining style and decoration and in deciding on how best to equip the rooms and spaces. Floor tiles, carpets, colour schemes, notice boards, display areas, public facilities; the list is huge although the task of determining what should and can be provided is both fun and very rewarding when at last it all begins to come together.

In addition to the interior decoration, there remains a question of access to the centre, footpaths and hard standing and finally the outstanding question of how best to landscape the grounds to ensure that they are in sympathy with the aims of the centre and is likely to appeal to a broad span of the intended target population. This work is underway; consultations are taking place between the Board of Directors and local landscape gardeners to create a garden that will be in harmony with the purpose and aspirations of CatStrand.

So much then for the construction and landscape work; what else is currently receiving attention? Clearly, if the CatStrand is to succeed with its aim of

developing into an epi-centre of cultural interest and entertainment for the Glenkens Community and importantly, visitors, then CatStrand's programme of activities must have broad appeal. With this in mind therefore the Board of Directors, most ably assisted by the staff, are presently conducting an audience development audit that seeks to target groups with a developing or ongoing interest in 'The Arts' from within and without the area. Specifically the aim is to target residents of the Glenkens and the business community and of course tourists and visitors to the region, whom we hope will enjoy the cultural experience and spread the good news.

Finally it is important to address the question of what is it that we believe will attract people of all ages from within and without the region to visit and importantly, to return to the CatStrand? It will be the programme of events. As you will expect therefore, the management team is very much involved in discussions with the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama (RSAMD), and with a number of youth organisations to determine a schedule of events that will appeal to a broad spectrum of interest groups. For example, there are plans in hand for 8 visual arts exhibitions per year that will support a full programme of drama, music and local exhibitions of historic and cultural interest catering for a broad spectrum of interests - something for all - both within the Community and importantly, for our visitors too. In addressing CatStrand's target population it will also be important to consider those residents in the Glenkens who are interested in participating in the programme and to make use of the many other facilities that CatStrand will provide but who may find transportation to and from New Galloway difficult. In recognition of this, management is investigating ways of making increased use of the Glenkens community bus facility.

#### THE MOSSDALE PAINTERS

'I wish I could paint, but I can't draw a straight line.' It was this comment, heard a number of times around the Glenkens that set three local painters thinking. The result was the formation of an informal group, based in Mossdale Village Hall, who met once a week, initially, for six weeks, to paint and enjoy the painting. The group contained complete beginners as well as people who had a varying amount of experience. The only limitation was that everyone had to live in the 01644 telephone area, in other words, the Glenkens.

The group were encouraged to have their work framed and some exhibited in the Glenkens Art Exhibition in the summer of 2006.

New people have joined the group in 2007 and new and different media have been introduced, so that there is something to suit everyone. The Mossdale Painters are going from strength to strength. Their work is getting more exciting by the week. Challenges abound.

#### MUGA TENNIS CLUB

The MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) which was built last year at Dalry school is a wonderful space for sports such as tennis, badminton, volleyball, football and more.

The school makes good use of the facility during weekdays, but it is also open in the evenings and at weekends to members of the public. #### ROMANS AT CARSPHAIRN PRIMARY

On the afternoon of Monday 26th February a Roman centurion came to Carsphairn Primary School to tell us about his life in the Roman Army. His name was Jefficus Romeus Flavius. He told us about different kinds of soldier.

A Roman citizen could join the army as a legionary. A legionary soldier wore the lorica (body armour) which is made of metal strips held together by leather straps. It was noisy, sharp and heavy to wear. Skye tried on the big one and Amber, Lucy and Daisy tried on a small one.

If you were not a Roman citizen you joined the army as an auxiliary. An auxiliary soldier wore chain mail. It was made of metal rings joined together. It was spiky and cold to wear. Kieron tried on the full size chain mail and Jenny, James O and James B tried on the small one.

The soldiers' shoes had metal studs on them. When they marched, the shoes made a loud noise. They hoped that the noise of the armour clanking and the sound of the shoes on the road would scare the enemy. Underneath their armour, soldiers wore warm underwear and a woollen tunic.

The Roman legionaries had weapons such as javelins, swords and daggers. In Latin the sword is a gladius, javelin is a pilum and a dagger is a pugio. Each unit carried its own standard. If a small patrol went out, they carried a standard in the shape of a flag, called a vexillum. The legion had a standard called the Aquila. The Aquila was in the shape of a golden eagle and only left the camp if the whole legion was

An auxiliary soldier has a bow and arrows, a stabbing sword and a sword. You might see in a book about Romans that the soldiers hold their swords vertically but they actually held it horizontally so that it went between their enemies' ribs easily.

Jefficus also told us about how they got washed. Roman soldiers went to a bathhouse to clean themselves. There were several rooms in a themselves. There were several rooms in a bathhouse. They started in a hot room to make them sweat. The sweat was scraped off with a strigil and the dirt came off with it. Then they went into a warm pool to rinse the sweat and dirt away. Last they went into the cold pool to refresh themselves. When soldiers went to get a bath they sometimes had to take a guard to watch their clothes because they might get stolen.

When Romans went to the toilet there were several toilets in the same room. Seats were cut out of a long plank of wood above a trough full of running water. There was no tollet paper – they used a sponge on a stick to wash their bottoms and then they washed the sponge in another trough of water. The sponge was put in vinegar to kill the bacteria so that the next person could use it. We're glad that we have toilet paper and privacy!
