Video Artists Chris Helson and Sarah Jackets have launched a new website at www.glenkens.net. Chris and Sarah have been working as Digital Artists in Residence with GCAT since November. They have spent the past few months exploring life in the Glenkens as part of their research for a new artwork. They have been meeting lots of people, filming interviews, collecting stories and taking photographs. The result is a fascinating portrait of the Glenkens, presented as a video website.

And they haven't finished yet. They are now planning to create a new video artwork for CGAT exploring James Clerk Maxwell's Demon. Maxwell's Demon is an imaginary creature at the centre of his 1867 thought experiment, created to explore the possibility of contradicting the second law of thermodynamics.

"Maxwell's Demon is an icon for our times, sitting at the crossroads of information and the physical universe".

Thought experiments are often used in physics, philosophy and history to explore ideas a priori, using techniques such as 'reduction to the absurd'.

"Maxwell's Demon and the structure of the thought experiment provides us with a conceptual framework from which to explore some of the complex subjects revealed through our research and as a basis for the construction of the video work/s. For example; the relationships between people and place, allegory within storytelling or defining territory through dialogue."

LOCAL ARTISTS: Jim Gourlay - Sculptor



Driving along the Throughgate in Dalry you may well have noticed Jim Gourlay's unusual slate sculptures which decorate his garden. Jim, a former builder, took up his unique form of sculpting only five or so years ago after he retired. With a working knowledge of slate and stone through his profession, he decided to put his practical skills to a more creative use. The sculptures range from giant urns made from thick slate, which Jim calls stone rather than slate, to an obelisk of very fine slate and beautiful water features of alternating red Welsh slate and grey Lancashire slate. There are even purpose built cavities in some sculptures to act as nesting spaces for birds.

Some of the water features have a marble ball which balances in a concave top stone and spins gently under the pressure of water piped up from the pond below, creating a beautiful fountain illustrating the strength of water - it only takes a little water pressure to keep the relatively heavy marble ball floating.

Jim feels he has probably made as many sculptures as their garden can hold, and is finding it more difficult to make them due to health reasons, so we'll have to wait and see what his next creative avenue will be.



SPRING IN THE GLENKENS

Yesterday (Saturday 28 April), I sat amongst flowering gorse on Mulloch Hill, Dalry, overlooking the Ken valley in the hope of seeing nesting red kites. We have found 22 nests already this year, including a sprinkling in the Glenkens, but we know there is at least one other female of breeding age out there - but where? In recent weeks, Red Kite Officer George Christie, who lives in New Galloway, and myself, have seen considerable kite activity in this area, including courtship, but as yet nothing concrete has resulted. With so much afterbirth etc around following lambing, kites are appearing everywhere and it is sometimes difficult to interpret their behaviour when they meet up and interact together. However, although happy with our tally so far, a significant increase on the 17 nests found last year, we will continue to keep our eyes open for new sites and would be grateful to hear from anyone who sees a kite going into a wood over the next couple of months.

If the weather stays fine, we can perhaps expect to have another fine breeding season for many birds, although spare a thought for whaups (curlew), peasies (lapwing) and other birds that rely on wet areas to find insects and worms. The ground is so dry at present that they are having trouble, and this is borne out by the lack of waders and thrushes in many of the drier areas. A bird that has benefited from last year's fine weather is the black grouse, and I'm pleased to report that numbers at several leks (display areas) in the Glenkens are slightly up on recent years. Last week I visited a lek in a forest near Carsphairn, in early morning, and was enthralled by the antics of at least 6 dancing and jousting males. Numbers of these magnificent birds have declined over the last twenty years due largely to the closure of the forest canopy over much of the region. However, we are working very closely with Forestry Commission

Scotland and private woodland owners to ensure that future woodland management benefits black grouse.

Most of our summer migrant birds are with us now, and I saw my earliest ever (Scottish) swifts at Ken Bridge on 27 April. Swallows have been around the houses, and wheatears around the hill dykes, for several weeks now, whilst the descending cadence of the ubiquitous willow warbler, or weety', is seemingly everywhere. This latter species is decreasing rapidly in southern England, but increasing and pushing further north in Scotland. Whilst climate change is undoubtedly affecting the pattern of things in the countryside overall, regional weather can also have a huge impact in any given year. So, for example, the same high pressure causing the wonderful sunshine that has brought our oaks and hawthorns into leaf three weeks early, has pushed rain and cold down into Spain and southern France - holding up millions of these migrants and initially leading to a dearth of birdsong despite the fine weather. However, they are all here now and what wonderful music they make.

Anyway, all of this was ambling through my head as I sat on the Mulloch, looking in vain for elusive breeding kites, but listening to relaxing songs of willow warblers amidst the heady coconut aroma of blooming gorse. Presently, I spotted a dessicated puff ball fungus and idly tapped it gently with the tip of my stick to send up tiny wee puffs of brown spores. Just then, a big bumblebee arrived and flew low over it, the down-draft of its wings sending up a wee puff of its own. This made my day and again made me realise that there's always something new to see in the countryside, and how lucky we all are to be alive and living in the Glenkens in such a wonderful spring, or at any other time.

NEW GALLOWAY -Our Historic Burgh

by Helen Bolton - PART XXXV Tradesmen in the Thirties

Having had a peep into the lives of the folk of New Galloway in the mid 19th century, it is interesting to compare that with life in the 20th century. By the 1950's some of the old trades had vanished. No longer did we have a mill in the village, although the "Mill House" is still standing in the High Street today. The old mill buildings were used as workshops and stores by local tradesmen.

We could no longer boast the straw-hat maker, the stocking maker, the many handloom weavers or the coopers, all these old trades having gradually died out over the intervening years. However, there were two tailors in the village, three dressmakers, and Alexander Bell the upholsterer, cabinet maker, furniture dealer, and dealer in loose covers, curtains and all manner of soft furnishings. Mr Bell's workshop and shop premises were in Sunnyside, and he and his wife lived at "The Gables" up the High Street on the corner of Greenhead Brae.

The Smithy, run by George Walker, was always an important part of village life. In the 1930's there were still a great many horses used on the farms, and some people used horse-drawn transport in preference to motor vehicles. Farm machinery was made and maintained by George Walker, as were many household tools and implements.

Robert Johnstone, the builder, who lived on the corner of Greenhead Brae, opposite to "The Gables", employed a large number of tradesmen, and in the early years of the century had built St. Margaret's Church, The Rectory, and many houses in the village, including "Ardlaggan", opposite to the Golf Club. Mr Johnstone was a fine tradesman with a good reputation in the neighbourhood. He was also the undertaker for the village.

Up on the Newton Stewart road Mr McWilliam had his garage and haulage business, and his horses were kept in the fields beyond the garage, where the houses of Braeside are now situated. Lewis Milligan ran his motor agents and car hire business, together with a radio and electrical specialists and repairs workshop. James Robertson was the local plumber, and John Martin was a carrier and cartage contractor.

In the 1930's New Galloway was served by a goodly number of shops. The Post Office was up at the top of the High Street where later many will remember the dress shop called "The Pillar Box". The Postmaster was James Mitchell, a versatile gentleman who was also the Registrar for the Burgh, the assistant Secretary at the Golf Club, hirer of bicycles, golf clubs, and the publisher of many local picture post cards!

John Paterson ran the butcher's shop at the corner of Wylies Brae and the High Street, and he also delivered meat to Dalry, Balmaclellan and many out-lying houses and farms. Miss Lansborough had a bakery where our present Post Office is now situated, and was famous for her delicious home-made cakes and pastries.

Robert Cowan's grocery shop, at "Alexandra House" on the corner of the West Port, was famed for a special blend of tea known as "The Raiders". This shop was later bought by Miss Agnes Thomson, formerly the manageress of The Stewartry Dairy Association Ltd, at their premises now known to us as Williamson and Henry, Estate Agents, in the High Street. Miss Thomson later became Mrs Lewis Milligan.

McKnight's grocery shop, Grain and General Merchants, was "bought by Mrs Kay and run as a very successful business with a mobile shop which served the remote farms and houses in the area. Today we know the shop as Jim Hopkins' most valuable "Village Shop". Up beyond the West Port, almost opposite to James Mitchell's Post Office, was Miss McJanet's sweets and groceries shop. She sold special home-made lemonade, a great favourite with the younger generation, and she also sold clogs obviously a most useful and versatile shop! Miss Hobison's drapery store was in the High Street, and that just about rounds up the retail premises in the village. There was, of course, the Clydesdale Bank on the corner of the Kirk Road.

Two hotels, the Cross Keys and the Kenmure Arms, catered for the needs of the holiday-makers who came to sample the peace and quiet of the Glenkens, and to enjoy our somewhat strenuous but beautifully situated Golf Course. Locals and visitors alike would gather in the bars of an evening to exchange news and discuss local events. In the fishing season, no doubt many tales would be told over a dram or two, and many a good salmon would assume wondrous proportions! Perhaps it is appropriate here to quote the Fisherman's Prayer

"Lord, grant that I may catch a fish"
So great that even I,
When telling of it afterwards
Will have no need to lie!"

CARSPHAIRN – THE SPORTING LIFE



The exhibition opened at the Heritage Centre on 6th April. During the following week a private viewing was held for all those who had contributed to the exhibition. On that occasion we were able to view the valuable Berbeth Gold Medal awarded to the club winning the annual curling competition between the parishes of Carsphairn, Dalmellington and Straiton.

In the exhibition there are 54 photographs and illustrations, some of people who participated in a sport in the past, some of those who have given us their memories of their involvement as well as some of sporting events and others of buildings and places where the sport took place.

Newspaper reports of matches and memories are displayed as well as an account of a murder which took place after a game of quoits in around 1850 at a site very close to the Heritage Centre.

Artefacts include many of the trophies so keenly played for between the parishes, old skates, carpet bowls, minute books, game books and a magnificent set of antlers.

We hope that by the end of the season we may have some answers to the questions we still have. Already, one month after the exhibition has started, additional material has been handed in and we look forward to more.

CATSTRAND PROGRESS

The project to convert The Old School in New Galloway is progressing well and the new Arts, Business and Community Centre – to be called The CatStrand after the original small stream under the building – is due to open in the autumn. The project is both on time and on budget. Contractors T.G. Graham and Sons from Langholm are determined that all will be completed in time for the Launch Festival in September.

A general leaflet is soon to be distributed to all households in the Glenkens giving more details of the building project and the planned uses of the building. But in the meantime you might be interested to know that the building is to be heated by green renewable energy in the form of a wood pellet boiler. This boiler, sourced from a specialist Austrian company, is now on site and all the underfloor heating pipes which it feeds, are now in place.



A mechanical ventilation system with heat exchange, which will maintain the auditorium atmosphere at a fresh and comfortable temperature, has now been installed; the plasterwork is complete and the painters have started. So the end is definitely in sight.



But all has not been plain sailing. As New Galloway residents will be aware, the main road opposite the CatStrand had to be dug up. The reason for this unforeseen disruption was that it became necessary to replace the connection to the main sewer. A camera had been sent down the original pipe only to discover that it had collapsed right under the middle of the road. Many apologies from GCAT to anyone who was inconvenienced by this.

THERE'S NO STOPPING THE HISTORY STOP!

GCAT's History Stop Project continues apace as research volunteers reach into the past. Since the project began in the autumn of 2006 a variety of subjects have been studied including: The Galloway Hydro-Electric Scheme; Covenanters; Robert the Bruce's Wars of Independence; Sheep Farming; The Gordon Family and 'the Pathfinder of Modern Science' James Clerk Maxwell (Albert Einstein, the godfather of Relativity, called him "a genius"). Whilst the overall topic list for the project is wide and varied, some researchers have concentrated on



particular subjects and have already managed to gather together enough material to produce studies which are suitable for making into booklets.

Alan and Phillipa Pallister are studying mottes in the Glenkens. A motte is an early strongpoint formed by erecting a wooden fortification on top of a man-made hill then surrounding it with a wooden stockade and/or a defensive ditch. These primitive castles were the means by which areas of countryside could be dominated, as they provided a base from which troops could sally forth or a defensive stronghold in times of attack. One of the important mottes in Galloway is at Balmaclellan, dating from around the beginning of the 13th Century and attributed to Roland, grandson of Fergus of Galloway. Alan and Phillipa have completed a


survey of Balmaclellan motte including its history and architecture. They provide a fascinating look at the construction and destruction of this remarkable historical structure.

Keith Wilson used his research to build on his knowledge of a family affair. Keith had long been interested in a poem produced by his grandfather to commemorate the Carsphad Murder of 1862 (see article opposite). Keith has produced a booklet of the poem, with illustrations, which is now on sale in outlets such as Carsphairn Heritage Centre.

POEM HIGHLIGHTS TRAGEDY AT CARSPHAD

IN APRIL 1862 the last public hanging of a woman in Scotland took place in Dumfries. Mary Timney was hanged after being convicted of murdering Ann Hannah at Carsphad farmhouse in the Glenkens in January of that year. A poem describing both occasions has recently been released. 'Carsphad Tragedy' was written by Alexander Wilson in the 1930s and has only recently been put into publication by his grandson Keith. Keith said: "He wrote it in 1932 during the building of the dams. He was interested in poetry and had this wee black book where he had written the poem. That's how we knew how he did it. I originally had 50 printed and they've all been sold, so I'm going to get some more printed.'

The poem may have been written 75 years ago and remained in the family ever since, but Keith has only discovered in the past few years why his grandfather wrote it. He explained: "I've realised all this recently through doing my family history. I discovered he was interested in the farm, Greenloop, because his grandfather used to work there as an agricultural labourer in the 1840s. His mother was also born there. It was mentioned during the trial that Ann Hannah's brothers were working on the farm the morning she was killed. That's why Greenloop is so important from my grandfather's point of view. I think that's why he was so interested in the case, because in the whole area there was a lot of talk about it at the time. It's not the sort of thing you'd expect to be happening in the middle of nowhere."

The cottage where Mary Timney lived is still standing by the roadside, across from Carsfad Power Station just outside Dalry. People can also walk through the meadow where the brothers were working the morning of the murder, as it is now part of the Southern Upland Way.

DALRY S3 HISTORY TRIP



In March the standard grade history class set off for the People's Palace and Winter Gardens in Glasgow to find out more about the brave women who fought to win the vote. We had the distinction of being the first school to take part in this new venture for The People's Palace so we felt quite special in that sense. The pupils were greeted by an eager and enthusiastic member of the Glasgow branch of the Women's Social and Political Union. The pupils changed into period costume from the early 1900s and set off to the local rally to hear what the women had to say in an attempt to convince all, including the government of the day, that women should have the vote. This was a difficult exercise since most men believed that a woman's place was in the home and not in the turmoil of politics. The pupils heard about the escapades of these women as the movement became increasingly militant.

The other aspect of the standard grade curriculum that was touched on was that of Housing, and the various stages through which housing evolved in Glasgow as the authorities tried to provide adequate housing for the ever increasing urban population. Glasgow was famous for its "single end" and the pupils had first hand experience of just how small these homes were. Apart from experiencing life in a "single end" they also had access to a wealth of pictures, artefacts sound and smells related to Glasgow's living conditions in the early 20th century which they had fun identifying. This is history at its best where pupils have "hands on" experiences, sampling life as it really was and being allowed to empathise with the people from that time.






