

#### THE SCOTTISH ALTERNATIVE GAMES 2007

The weekend was kicked off in fine style with the 'Alternative Ceilidh' in New Galloway Town Hall on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> August. A sell out crowd danced the night away to 'The Backroom Band'. From the minute the first note was struck the dance floor was never empty, thanks to the excellent music and to the enthusiasm of the dancers. Many people also enjoyed learning some new dances under the guidance of Kevin from the band. The 'alternative' ingredient of the evening was a Haggis Supper served in true Burns style as 'The Great Chieftain o' the Puddin' Race' arrived in the hall to the skirl of the bagpipes to be addressed by William McTurk. William won the Burns Prize at Kells School this year and he certainly showed why as he captivated the audience with an excellent rendition of the famous address. The haggis bearer was Ross Fergusson and the piper was Aaron Edgar who was playing for the first time at a Burns Supper, there is no doubt that this will be the first of many more to come in the future.

The weather forecast for Sunday was promising rain and unfortunately it proved to be correct, in keeping with the rest of the summer so far it rained practically all day with only very brief dry spells in the afternoon. However, the steady drizzle did not dampen the enthusiasm as a good crowd, considering the conditions, had gathered by the time the 30th Anniversary Games were underway. Although down in numbers on recent years there was no shortage of keen competitors for the various events and as usual the unique nature of the Games together with publicity through the local and national media and the Tourist Board had succeeded in bringing people together from all over the world in New Galloway Park. Whilst the record of 21 different nationalities was not broken, there were visitors from Germany, France, America, Australia and even Panama.

Another added interest this year was the presence of a BBC film crew who were filming the event for their 'Countryfile' programme. Presenter Ben Fogle threw himself into the spirit of the Games entering every event and although he didn't quite manage to win any of them, he showed a natural talent for Hurlin' the Curlin' Stane and Tossin' the Sheaf. After some demonstrations by former World Champion, Aaron Edgar and the eventual new champion, Hannah McKenna and a little extra coaching from Aaron, Ben had gained enough skill at the Gird n' Cleek to reach the semi final, where he was delighted to win the bronze medal — a tasty Scotch Pie. However, he thought he might prefer to wear it around his neck rather than eat it!

The soggy conditions underfoot forced abandonment of the Tractor Pull, although the tractor proved very useful later on as various vehicles needed a tow out of the gate! The Tug o' War and the Uphill Struggle unfortunately were other casualties of the weather. All of the other events went ahead as normal with the Balmaclellan Skittles reporting a record entry! The Slot Car Racing again proved a popular (and dry) venue as children and nostalgic dads competed against each other.

Archery was a new attraction this year with many people taking the chance to try their hand at the ancient skill.

The Gird n' Cleek competition was fierce and a bit tricky under foot with a virtual water feature at the first corner catching a few competitors out. Although the reigning four times World Champion, Jayde Devlin, had continued to dominate the Tossin' the Sheaf and Hurlin' the Curlin' Stane events he was not to set a new record by winning the Gird n' Cleek title for the fifth time. Although he qualified for the final again, the wet conditions did not seem to be to his liking and he was well beaten in the final by Hannah McKenna, running in her fourth consecutive final. After a very impressive third place in the last two years it was odds on that Hannah would take the title before too long and so it proved this year as soon as she took the lead in the first lap the winner never looked in any doubt. Completing an all New Galloway medal haul, Martin Wilson finished in 2<sup>nd</sup> Place and the skill must run in the family because Hannah's brother Alexander took the bronze medal. Hannah has the unique distinction of being the first female ever to win the title since it began in 1982 and on this form it looks like she could hold the title for a good few years yet!

The Community Council would like to thank everybody who worked so hard to make the Games a success despite the adverse weather. Brian Edgar

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

# Nature & Wildlife

#### NEW FACE ON THE GALLOWAY KITE TRAIL



A new RSPB Community Liaison Officer has recently begun working in the Glenkens to promote and develop the Galloway Kite Trail. His name is Calum Murray, originally from the Stewartry and he will be in post over the next three years to interpret and promote red kites and the wider environment in the picturesque landscape around Loch Ken. The Galloway Kite Trail is one of twenty landscape projects in Dumfries and Galloway, which are supported by Sulwath Connections, a partnership partfunded by Heritage Lottery Fund, which is also supported by Scottish Natural Heritage and RSPB. Calum will continue to build on the strong relationship between RSPB, local communities, businesses and schools in the surrounding area. By having Calum on the team, it is hoped that the Galloway Kite Trail will attract more visitors as well as local interest, providing a quality experience for all.

Calum is available to give talks to community groups and schools in the local area, and invites group leaders and teachers to get in touch to arrange these, or to arrange visits to the feeding station or other parts of the kite trail. He will also be arranging several guided walks throughout the year. He is also keen to take on volunteers to help him with this role, particularly at the feeding station at Bellymack Hill Farm, where he provides information to visitors about the red kites and their progress in Galloway.

If you are inspired and would like to get more involved with the red kites in Galloway then please get in touch with Calum. This is also an opening for students wishing to pursue a career in nature conservation, as the red kite project presents a great opportunity to learn about many aspects of conservation, wildlife interpretation and people engagement.

Part of Calum's job will entail taking on the role as an RSPB 'Aren't birds brilliant!' contact with the aim to attract visitors and local people to the area and bring people closer to these charismatic birds of prey. Most of Calum's afternoons are spent at the feeding station at Anne Johnstone's Bellymack Hill Farm, near Laurieston, where visitors can be entertained all year round, by up to 30 or more kites at close view from the hide. In addition to this fantastic viewing spectacle, other parts of the kite release story are revealed along the rest of the Galloway Kite Trail. Visitors can see and find out more about the life, behaviour and history of red kites in Britain as well as getting the chance to see the landscape in which they live and the cages from which they were kept prior to their release back into the wild. On the trail, there are also places to stop for refreshments, picnics and hospitality along the way and for families, the 'Wildlife Explorer Trail' and 'Mossdale Nature Trail Quiz' for children to learn about other wildlife in the area.

Another exciting aspect of Calum's role over the next three years will be to work with existing and new kite trail businesses in and around the Glenkens in order to expand and improve interpretation of the kites and related interests. For example, two new information points are planned at Parton and New Galloway, together with an audio CD of the trail and a new trail guide.

Red kites were released in Galloway between 2001 and 2005 and, despite initial losses, have gradually strengthened in numbers to around 75 birds, breeding successfully here since 2003 (21 pairs in 2007). They have since begun to spread further afield, mixing with kites from other release areas and eventually it is hoped that they will re-populate suitable areas throughout the UK. As carrion feeders, kites help to clean up afterbirth and dead animals found on farmland and roads, at the same time providing a fantastic spectacle in our skies and helping to benefit the local economy, with increasing interest in wildlife tourism.

#### 'THE HAIRTH' GAZETTE FESTIVAL OFFER

Festival Director Liz Holmes said; "this is fantastic news for Knockengorroch! Beacon status will enable us to continue to expand the work we have been doing over the last nine years — promoting quality roots music of the world and cultural diversity, whilst contributing to rural regeneration and awareness of the area by bringing visitors from all over Scotland, the UK and further afield."

The Hairth is held at Knockengorroch Farm on the banks of the river Deugh where, in nature's green amphitheatre, music from all across the globe can be heard in a unique and captivating environment.

Tickets for the festival are available to buy online from the festival website, from the Magic Broomstick in Castle Douglas, or by sending a cheque to the festival office (see below for contact details).

#### JOHN DEMPSTER

There lived at "Garryaird" on the moors in the northern part of Dalry parish a tailor by the name of John Dempster. He had taken part in the Battle of Bothwell Bridge in 1679, and as a well-known Covenanter he was continually hounded by the dragoons. So enthusiastically did they search for John Dempster that he was forced to leave his home and hide himself in a rocky cave in the rugged sides of the Blackwater, some distance from his home. His wife would take food to him under cover of darkness. During the summer John managed to continue his tailoring business from his hide-away.

Following a visit to his home one night, John was about to return to his cave the next morning when a party of troopers appeared, heading across the moor, and John at once fled to Arndarroch Wood, a thick oak plantation close to the Water of Ken, hoping to hide until the coast was clear. The troopers pursued him, and although an area of moss delayed their progress somewhat, one of them caught up with him as he climbed the dyke into the shelter of the wood. It is said that he took his tailor's scissors from his pocket and drove them as hard as he could into the forehead of the trooper's horse, causing it to rear in terror and throw its rider. This gave John a chance to dash into the thicket and conceal himself in the steep rooky side of a ravine close to the river. The troopers lost him and returned to "Garryaird" where they terrorised John's wife and children, and ate and drank all they could find in the house, destroying anything they could not use. Leaving the distraught family to think that John was dead, the villains made their way back across the moor towards Dalry.

Under cover of darkness John returned home, to the great joy of his family, but his hiding place along the Blackwater was no longer a safe one for him, so he left his home and sought safety elsewhere. After some months of persecution in the New Galloway and Balmaclellan areas he was eventually seen one evening crossing Knockgray Hill near Carsphairn, by a party of dragoons who followed him across the Water of Deuch. They lost him among some deep bogs on the far side of the river, and in the darkness John fled up the hill of Craighit, where he spent the night among the rocks and boulders. He was by this time very weak and unwell from his months of wandering and sleeping in rough places, and he was not as wary as he needed to be in a place so close to "Garryhorn" the residence of the hated Grierson of Lagg. The following morning Lagg spied a movement up on Craighit, and through his telescope he made out the figure of John Dempster crouched among the rocks. His troopers were at once divided into two companies, one moving to the south and the other to the west, aiming to cut off any chance of an escape route. John made off across the Garryhorn Burn and up the slope of the Bow, hoping to get to the wild shores of Loch Doon, but his flight was in vain. His persecutors finally caught up with him on the steep slopes of the Meaul. There John Dempster was shot, and his body was left on the lonely hilltop. A stone now marks the spot where he fell, another brave Galloway martyr.

#### THE 2007 CONVENTICLE



On Sunday, 17th June a number of enthusiastic folk, wearing raincoats and boots, were seen scrambling over the stile at the Blackwater Bridge on the high road to Carsphairn. However, the damp weather eventually gave way to a warm, dry afternoon and raincoats were cast off. A pleasant breeze kept the flies and midges at bay. A short walk along part of the Southern Upland Way led to an idyllic setting for the Conventicle. Chairs were in place and Mr Andrew Blackley set his splendid Covenanter flag to fly over the dyke above the gathering of some twenty six people. Rev Dr David Bartholomew began the service and soon the lonely moors, not too far from "Garryaird", rang to the enthusiastic singing of "All People That on Earth do Dwell" to the tune Old 100th. How the hearts of the old Covenanters would have rejoiced had they been there to hear the joyful sound.

Dr Bartholomew read the tale of John Dempster as told by Rev Robert Simpson, and this was followed by prayers and more hymns,

including "I to the Hills Will Lift Mine Eyes", most appropriate as all around were the moors and hills of Galloway and the murmur of the Blackwater was a gentle accompaniment to the service.

The collection was gathered in a blanket in the traditional way, and the Conventicle was brought to a close with the hymn "God is our Refuge and Our Strength". Later tea and biscuits were served to refresh the congregation, then Dr Bartholomew once again donned his "wellies" and led a party of hardy walkers up the course of the Blackwater to the lovely Chapel Linn, and up to the spot where John Dempster may well have had his hiding place. The sides of the burn are rocky and wild at this point, and there are spectacular falls and cataracts along the way.

Over the moor above the burn, following the Southern Upland Way, Dr Bartholomew led his party of explorers to the top of a ridge overlooking the green slopes of Culmark Hill, and the approximate location of "Garryaird". Nothing now remains of the one-time home of John Dempster, or perhaps


it is more correct to say that the site has not been found as yet. There may well be some traces of the old cottage, just waiting for someone to come across them.

Although recent rain had made the track very wet and muddy in places everyone agreed it had been a most interesting and enjoyable walk. Our thanks to Dr Bartholomew for once again finding a "special place" to hold the Conventicle. Where will next year's service be held? We look forward to it with interest.

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## LAND'S END TO JOHN O'GROATS CYCLE CHALLENGE & & & & &





The group comprised of 23 individuals, 7 women and 14 men from all over the U.K. All taking part had raised money for their chosen charity through sponsorship. The total raised must've been well into the thousands. We all met up for the first time on a cloudy Tuesday morning at Land's End. After many photos, we were given the day's route, and with fresh legs we set off at a cracking pace which slowly eased off as everyone settled into their own rthymn. We sailed through Penzance and pushed on up B roads to Redruth for a well earned coffee break and chance to begin to get to know each other. Then onto Truro, St

Austell and our final destination, Liskeard, as the weather broke. Tired and wet we had to wait around as our bags were delayed due to an accident. Once showered, we all met up for the evening meal followed by a briefing from our 2 trip Co-ordinators, Caroline and Joe. Caroline drove the support van and set up water stops and the lunch stop. Joe had a van with trailer and bought up the rear, repairing any bikes and assisting in minor emergencies. Soon after the meal and briefing we all had an early night. This was typical for most of the trip and gave sore limbs and bodies a chance to recover before the next day's onslaught. Most days we covered between 85 to 95 miles with a couple of shorter mileages at the end. In total the trip clocked up 975 miles.

Day 2: The next day saw us heading out over Dartmoor in pouring rain and thick mist. Right from the start we encountered steep climbs. We had some thrilling descents off Dartmoor wearing out the brake pads on many of the bikes. This was a testing day and after cycling through Exeter we headed North to Cullompton finishing at our hotels in Samforth Prevell. Exhausted but relieved to have come through one of the hardest sections, we shared the day's adventures over a few beers.

Day 3: After assembling as a whole group we set off soon establishing ourselves into groups of similar abilities and wending our way on B roads we passed up through Wellington, Taunton and onto Cheddar. Here we encountered a big hill just as the rain came on. At the top of the hill we had a blustery lunchstop in Shipham. Then, in appalling conditions we pushed on towards Bristol, Ben guiding us through the nightmare route across the Avonmouth cycle path and out over the Severn bridge into Gloucestershire and Wales. We continued up the beautiful Wye valley in the pouring rain. Our only relief, a long freewheel down into Tintern with its stunning Abbey. For many this was the worst day. There were punctures, wheels seizing, getting lost, heavy traffic all compounded by the incessant heavy rain. We were a bedraggled lot entering the hotel but soon warmed up and were treated royally at this hotel.

Day 4: We set off in small groups and as the sun came out enjoyed a lovely cycle up the Wye valley to Monmouth. Then up through Hereford and on through lovely rolling countryside to Shrewsbury. Unfortunately I picked up some grit in my eye and as the evening wore on my eye became very inflamed and started closing up. A doctor in the group advised me to go to A and E and this was arranged with the leader for morning. I thought how sad for my trip to end because of a spec of dust. Fortunately as soon as it was removed and checked I was fine.

Day 5: I started an hour behind the others but caught them up by the first water stop near Wem. There had been more bike problems with broken spokes and seized bearings for some of the others who had managed to stop at various bike shops for running repairs. We continued, hitting very heavy traffic and much town cycling with a few near shaves and curses from motorists we managed to get through Warrington and the outskirts of Wigan then on up to Preston. Somewhere before Preston we called into a bike shop where 1 got cleats fitted and shoes, What a difference. Though I did have a few fall offs at traffic lights, much to the amusement of the others, I soon got used to them. This bike shop was amazing he sold me my gear for half price and gave the others free brake blocks.

Day 6: This was a long day so we all started earlier than usual. Pedalling our aching legs up ever northwards through Lancaster, Kendall up to Penrith then a long beautiful climb up Shap fell, followed by a swooshing descent to Shap that got the adrenaline going. After this the weather caught us out with a really heavy shower before we could get waterproofs on. So cold and wet we pedalled through Carlisle city centre and pushed on the last never ending miles to Longtown.By now the wear and tear on bodies and bikes was showing, many of the group suffering from repetitive injury to knee joints, some with bad inflammation. So painful for one of our party that he had to go to A and E, where he had the depressing news that he would have to give up or face permanent damage to his knee joints. You can imagine the immense disappointment after all the training and effort. We were all affected and felt for him. Others continued with ice packs at every opportunity and fortunately this was our only casualty.

Day 7: I went ahead of the group as I was meeting my parents enroute. Hurray - we were in Scotland and the weather was good. Lovely run through Gretna, Cummertrees, Annan, Dumfries and onto Thornhill. After meeting my folks I cycled on to the agreed lunchstop at Sanquhar where the others caught me up. It was a day of cycling into a head wind, but all the English guys congratulated us Scots for such a lovely country. I must admit to feeling proud. It was to get better and better the further North we went. Scotland was by far the most scenic and best weather of the trip. After lunch we pressed on over more exposed country to Cumnock. Then there was then an adrenaline race to Kilmarnock with me and John fronting the group. Quite often the last few miles were a boyish race that was exhilarating - I probably ranked about 4th or 5th overall.

Day 8: We set off under an overcast sky that quickly cleared to sunshine and after cycling through a towny bit to Irvine, we hit the coast road to Largs with lovely views over to Arran/Bute. We stopped in Largs to play on the beach then cycled on up to Gourrock to take the ferry over to Dunoon. This day had a holiday feel to it and we had a relaxing picnic near the botanic gardens before heading up Loch Eck. Then over to Loch Fyne and round to Inverary with a hairy race at the end to the humped back bridge nearly ending in disaster when bikes clashed. We had comfortable accommodation and a good stroll around Inverary to watch the sunset.

Day 9: After a wee climb we crossed undulating landscape to Loch Awe and our first of many views of castles (Kilchum). We then headed West to the Connell Bridge looking out over Loch Etive to Mull, on to Ballachulish across the bridge, along Loch Linhe and into Fort William. We had excellent views of Ben Nevis with a cap of snow. Then ever onward to Spean Bridge and the climb up to the Commandos' Memorial and a long flattish descent alongside Loch Lochy to our accommodation in Invergarry.

Day 10: By now all our aches and pains were disappearing as our bodies had become fitter and adapted to the days rigours. We took off to Fort Augustus in dribs and drabs and continued along Loch Ness to Drumnadrochit. No monster! Here we had the fiercest climb of the whole trip up the hill to Beauly. I was heard to exclaim "I'm too young to die!" and had to dismount - many others with better gears succeeded. After this we had a lovely gently undulating run with a fantastic descent into Bonar Bridge our stop for the night.


Day 11: My favourite day. We set off under cloudy changeable skies stopping in Lairg for the famous coffee/cake call. Then we pedalled through magnificent moorland/forest scenery to the Crask Inn where we were served fresh scones with comb honey. We then pedalled on with mountains in front and to the left, a following wind and bright sunshine. We then had 2 of the best descents of the whole trip - long, long downhills with short ascents to Altnaharra and Loch Loyal where we had a leisurely lunch before undulating terrain into Tongue with its fantastic inlet, castle and beaches. We had a malt whisky each to celebrate our arrival.

Day 12: Another fantastic day started with Ben getting chased by a stray Highland cow. Then a picturesque very up and down journey along Scotland's northerly coast, with stunning surf beaches and inlets to Thurso where the land flattened out. After lunch we flew along the remaining miles with an near gale behind us to arrive at a pub a mile from John O' Groats, to gather as a group to cross the finishing line. There was much celebrating, champagne and relatives/ friends to greet us. We signed the pub book and took loads of photos before boarding our bus to Inverness at 2.30 for the final celebration meal.

The typography of the word CatStrand has a deliberate twist in that the two words have no space but the capital "s" of "Strand" gives the logotype a distinctive feel.

#### NINE DAY FESTIVAL


The CatStrand Launch Festival will run from Friday 21st to Sunday 30th September and will celebrate the opening of this unique community venture. During the ten day festival there will be a wide variety of events and activities to entertain visitors to the centre. Live music will keep spirits high with performances from a variety of musicians including The Chris Stout Quintet. International artist Chris Stout is considered to be one Scotland's leading fiddle players and was recently the recipient of "Musician of the Year" at the BBC Folk Awards. If comedy is more your scene then you won't be disappointed as there are a variety of great acts including Radio Scotland's own comedian Fred MacAulay taking the stage mid-week. Local writer Catriona Macpherson sees the launch of her latest crime novel, 'Bury Her Deep', at the CatStrand while there are also plans for a band night featuring local musicians, various childrens' activities, a Tea Dance, Tai Chi workshops, computer classes, keep-fit classes, cookery demonstrations and more - something to suit everyone! ### Kells Primary School Re

As part of the Local History Day celebrations, GCAT is planning a reunion of everyone who attended, or worked with, Kells Primary School when it was originally located on New Galloway High Street. Between its opening in 1743 and emptying in 1964, the Old Primary School was an integral part of life in the Glenkens, where generations of residents learned how to master their 'Three Rs' and

Many of our readers will have walked the length of the High Street during the first half of the 20th Century; measuring young lives by the turn of school days and holidays and dreaming of the future. We want to share and celebrate the lives and experiences of those involved with the Old School and want to display photographs, materials and memorabilia from the school's history. 

After the launch, there will be a talk from Anna Campbell entitled 'Gems of the Glenkens', from 2.45 – 4.00pm. Anna has studied many aspects of Glenkens' history and her talks provide an entertaining and illuminating insight into the realities of times gone by and the lives of those who went before us.





#### TAI CHI: STRESS REDUCTION, **BALANCE, AGILITY AND MORE....**

Tai chi, 'meditation in motion,' is a series of graceful movements that can bring about stress reduction, improve balance and many other health benefits.

Tai chi is a non-competitive, self-paced system of gentle physical exercise. To do Tai chi, you perform a defined series of postures or movements in a slow, graceful manner. Each movement or posture flows into the next without pausing. Tai chi is generally safe for people of all ages and levels of fitness. Studies have shown that, for older adults, tal chi can improve balance and reduce the risk of falls. Because the movements are low impact and put minimal stress on your muscles and joints, tai chi is appealing to many older adults. For these same reasons, if you have a condition such as arthritis or you're recovering from an injury, you may find it useful.

Tai chi appears to offer both physical and mental benefits no matter what your age. It is used to:

- Reduce stress
- Increase flexibility
- Improve muscle strength and definition,
- Strengthen ligaments and tendons that protect and support the joints: keeping them mobile and healthy
- Increase energy, stamina and agility
- Increase feelings of well-being

Preliminary research shows that for older adults, in particular, practicing Tai chi regularly may:

- · Reduce anxiety and stress
- Improve balance and co-ordination, reducing the number of falls
- Improve sleep quality, such as staying asleep longer at night and feeling more alert during the day
- Slow bone loss in women following menopause
- Reduce high blood pressure
- Improve cardiovascular fitness
- Relieve chronic pain
- Improve everyday physical functioning

Although Tai chi is generally safe, consider talking with your doctor before starting a new programme. This is particularly true if you have any problems with your joints, spine or heart.

Liz Cole, Community Project Worker, GCAT, has organised free 'tasters' at the CatStrand launch, and two six week courses in Tal chi at the CatStrand with local instructor Elaine Cameron. It is hoped that, with popular demand, these classes will continue throughout the year!

# YOUTH UPDATE

#### EMMA VENTURES DOWN UNDER

"So your luggage goes straight through to Sydney - you're sure?"

"Yes!" I said, without hesitation, in a manner which suggested the very idea of not knowing such a thing was absurd despite, in actual fact, not having a clue.

Glasgow airport, 6.30 in the morning, I sat in the airport cafe, hung-over as Dad and the ever more worldly wise older sister sat sipping coffee. The truth was, I was about to embark on a journey which would take me half way around the world and back again, and at that very moment all I was concentrating on was the copious amount of alcohol which had been unnecessarily consumed the night before. Little dld I know that the phrase 'copious amount of alcohol' would take on a whole new meaning upon my return..!

Checked in, with my boarding pass and passport in one hand and Australian dollars in the other, I said goodbye to the last familiar faces I would see for three weeks. To be honest I think they were more concerned than I was. How hard could it be to fly to Australia?!

Eight airline meals, five films and 40 very long hours later the huge air jet circled above the bright lights of Sydney. The familiar sight of the Sydney Opera House stood bold and beautiful, framed by the Harbour Bridge and illuminated against the darkness. The lethargic feeling due to travelling for two days soon began to merge into excitement (and maybe just a little bit of nerves!)

'WELCOME TO KINGSFORD AIRPORT SYDNEY!' proclaimed the sign in bold letters. Ha! I had made it! And so had my luggage! I got through customs with relative ease, although it is surprising how much more difficult it is to be inconspicuous when you try to be. I was down under... and wondered; "what do I do now?"

After being taken to the wrong hostel by my taxi driver I finally arrived at my first 'digs'. The hostel was not how I imagined at all - it was bright and airy and had a wonderfully unique atmosphere. I was surprised at how easy it was to talk to people. Within seconds of being allocated my room I was chatting to a complete stranger in the lift. Everyone was as open minded as each other and I had a feeling this travelling malarkey was going to suit me just fine...

The next morning, bright and early, I met the tour group that I would be spending the next three weeks with. There were 24 of us in total on one big bus called Matilda – such an original name.

I was a little worried to say the least after we had been forced to stand up and introduce ourselves one-by-one by our two tour hosts, as I am renowned for making a bad first impression. However, within a few hours most people felt like they had been friends for years.


Our tour took us hundreds of miles up the East Coast to cities like Brisbane and Cairns, as well as quaint towns like Byron Bay and off shore to the beautiful Long Island and Fraser Island which consists entirely of sand. Fraser Island is also the location where a large amount of dingos reside. Most of us took a 4x4 tour of the island and, as there are no roads, this was quite an experience - I was actually grateful that I had slept in and missed breakfast! The tour included a visit to Lake McKenzie which had the most beautiful, fine, white sand and clear blue, fresh water. Everyone who visits the lake takes a dip and exfoliates with these two natural resources and the results are quite unbelievable! We also visited the Maheno Shipwreck and The Coloured Sands which were both spectacular sights.

I would have to say that my favourite place was Byron Bay. 490 miles north of Sydney, this town is renowned for its atmosphere and individuality. Some of the locals told us that the town is protected by a law which states that no big brands or corporate firms can set up, and they are proud of the fact that the character of the town had not been compromised, no matter how profitable this may have been.

Full of individual jewellery shops and art galleries, as well as lively little cafes and bars, the town is also a perfect place for surfing as there are three different 'types of surf' spread along the never-ending stretch of golden beach. One of many special moments of the trip was spent at Byron Bay lighthouse where we witnessed a spectacular sunset overlooking the dramatic rocks which met the sea.

Another highlight for me was in Cairns when we enjoyed a trip out in a luxurious catamaran. This took us to a tiny, tiny island called Michael Bay which was inhabited only by birds! From here we got the once in a lifetime opportunity to snorkel along the Great Barrier Reef - an experience which I will always treasure. Just one metre from the shore and there was such an abundance of beauty and colour and activity, it was hard to believe what was in front of you. Fish of all descriptions, including real-life Nemos which are actually clown fish, as well as parrot fish, stingrays, angel fish, and many more - the list was endless. There were also turtles and even baby sharks, who were vegetarian... or so I was told! Massive clams, sensitive to the slightest changes in the light, lay on the sand bed, slowly closing in response to the potential threat as your shadow passed above them. And the most magnificent thing of all was the backdrop - the coral; a living breathing organism which decorated the under water world with splendour. All shapes and sizes and colours imaginable, it is hard to describe how special witnessing this natural marvel was.





Then we took a break for a spot of lunch, followed by sunbathing up on deck, while we were transported to the next snorkelling destination.

Some of the other experiences I had during my trip were kangaroo fights, hand gliding, huge spiders, bus bowling, zorfing, canoeing, sky diving, koala bears, sunshine, beaches, surfing (and surfers!): just a few of the many exciting things that Australia had to offer but, in many ways, the most valuable thing that I experienced was the lessons I learnt about myself and my perspective on the world - it often takes something drastic and dramatic in your life for you to really pin point what you want out of it.

Anyone who has any travelling experience I'm sure will agree that the people you meet is a big part of your experience and despite everyone's route being different, people's attitudes have one thing in common: superficialities are completely irrelevant. Cultural difference, appearance, wealth, politics and even religion, to a certain extent are no longer acceptable as grounds for disagreement, and are instead merely points for discussion and interest. Having people around you from such diverse backgrounds is a fantastic way to understand more about yourself - you have no other option but to rely on your individual personality, which has been moulded by your surroundings and upbringing, in order to communicate and make friends. I was proud to be Scottish and loved finding out from people what idiosyncrasies I have, and my culture has, that I hadn't recognised due to being immersed in familiarity. The experience is equally good for demolishing old -fashioned stereotypes (with a few exceptions, such as a ping pong match which proved to me that the French really are that stubborn!) and reaffirming the world's population as a number of individuals, not just a number.

For me, Australia 2007 will always bring back fond memories and will provide me with many friends for the future as well as a sense of ambition and wonder for what the rest of the world has to offer....next, it's South America!

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#### **MALAWI BIKE RIDE**

Local minister David Bartholomew is grateful for all the sponsorship support he received for his recent Bike Ride in Malawi in May. Around 260 miles were covered in just over five days along with some 30 other riders, mostly from Scotland and England. He writes, 'After a bus transfer from Lilongwe to Dedza, bikes were made ready and the ride began with an exhilarating steep

ready and the ride began with an exhilarating steep downhill stretch with hairpin bends. The encounter with Malawi roads soon had our adrenalin flowing and before we knew it we were at Mua Mission for our first overnight stop. The next two days down near Lake Malawi were long and hot (up to 35 degrees C) with an unrelenting flat gravel/earth road that seemed to go on and on. Pleasant lodges by Lake Malawi and the Shire River eased our recovery. The fourth day we had to climb back up out of the rift valley to Zomba, but it was a shorter day and didn't prove as challenging as we'd feared. The fifth day however was long and hard. We started early and made good progress in the morning under cloudy skies before the sun broke through. In the afternoon we followed a dusty road along the edge of the dramatic Mulanje mountain massif, enveloped in dust with every passing vehicle, until we hit the beautiful tea estates around Mulanje township. However at the end of our 75 mile day we still had a thousand foot climb up to our lodge where we arrived in the last light of day. The last morning was an easy six mile run down to Mulanje Mission where we were given a tumultuous welcome dominated by ladies of the local Guild in their smart outfits who blocked our path, singing and dancing, and caught us up in warm embraces. In the reception that followed it was very clear how much our fundraising was appreciated. Later I was able to make a

how much our fundraising was appreciated. Later I was able to make a tour of the hospital and see where the money raised would be spent.'

David stayed on for two further weeks in Malawi, in the first week visiting congregations and Presbyteries of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian within the Synod of Blantyre. He was called to preach before congregations of up to over a thousand people, most under 40. The Malawians love singing and it was quite normal for six choirs to take part in a service. There was a vibrant sense of faith and joy. The last week was spent visiting two of the orphan centres of Abbas Rest Orphans, Chiringa and Muona, meeting the orphans and doing some preaching in the bush.

David has so far raised £6700, which will be divided equally between Mulanje Mission Hospital and Abbas Rest Orphans. It's still not too late to sponsor him. Cheques should be made payable to EMMS Bike Ride (Malawi).


