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LOCAL ARTISTS : Michael Dowswell

Independent Animator/Director/Cinematographer


Michael had an interest in working with 3D art from an early age, and directed his first animation in 2003. He says; "that was the turning point in my life regarding animation and filmmaking. You tend to go along in a fog for a while and then suddenly I was out of the fog, and things were very clear. When I directed my first short animation I knew that this was what I wanted to do for the rest of my life."

Michael is currently creating his seventh animation and enjoys taking breaks for photography as he finds this an enjoyable and much-needed distraction during the intense animation process. He finds photography relaxing and therapeutic as it's a fast process, so quite the opposite of producing an animation. You also have the fact that you "go out into the landscape, walk the hills and take in the healthy country air which wakes up your brain as well as your body. You take some photos, come back, drink some tea, look at the photos, then sometimes artistically enhance the images (that part's a lot of fun), then upload them." Michael goes on to say

that one of the reasons he finds this process so satisfying is that you feel an immediate sense of achievement. When the day finishes, with a photograph, you have something 100% complete, ready for people to see; whereas with an animation, a day's work will only complete a tiny little bit of something which will take a long time before it can be appreciated by others.

"Close up photography I got into very recently - it was new to me and it's really quite an amazing thing. When you go up so near to something, you suddenly find yourself in another world. (The image below-left shows this well. This is actually a close-up of a tear in the corner of a cardboard box. If you look closely you can see the head and arm of a little figure emerging from the hole.) You think; "there's an awful lot of new photo opportunities here." I want to do a short film with the powerful magnifying lens that I've been using for taking photographs, but I want movement in the shots, and movement at that magnification is going to be tricky...' 
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THE ROYAL BURGH OF NEW GALLOWAY & KELLS PARISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A very enjoyable Christmas Lunch was held in the Cross Keys Hotel on Sunday 16th December when Provost Margaret Sainsbury welcomed over 40 of our Senior Citizens to the popular annual event. Festive entertainment was kindly provided by Jonnie Dowswell on his five row button key accordion. A free raffle was also held with most of the excellent prizes once again provided from the proceeds of a collecting tin held in Jim Hopkins Shop throughout the year. Thanks to Jim for organising the collection and for purchasing the prizes, to Jonnie for the musical entertainment and to Kevin, Susan and staff at the Cross Keys for their hospitality.

A Public Meeting was held on 3rd December to discuss the future of the Town Hall. Over forty people attended and the mood was very positive towards forming a management group to prove to Dumfries and Galloway Council that the community have the desire and the drive to manage the hall effectively and secure its future. It was agreed to meet again in January together with the appropriate council officials to discuss further and aim to put a formal structure place to allow some progress to be made with making the hall 'fit for purpose before any formal handover of control from the council to a local management group. The management group would then be able to apply for funding from various sources that would not be available if the hall remained in the control of the council. It is unfortunate that this action is necessary to enable the hall to be properly maintained and developed but it was agreed by everyone at the meeting that action should be taken as soon as possible to safeguard the hall's future. Several halls in Wigtownshire had already achieved successful handovers and were now actively pursuing further funding options and looking forward to much more hopeful futures. The next meeting has now been arranged for Thursday 31st January at 7.30pm in the Town Hall.

loe and loan Rose celebrated their Diamond Wedding in December and the Joe and Joan Rose celebrated their Diamond Wedding in December and the Community Council marked the auspicious occasion with a gift of garden vouchers and wine. Much to Joe and Joan's surprise, the Community Council's congratulations and the gifts were presented by Brian Edgar and Joan Berkley when they 'gate-crashed' the Thursday Club Christmas Party.

The building of the long awaited new houses at Carson's Knowe is due to start in January. There will be twenty houses built, some for rent and some for purchase.

It is unlikely that we will know the future of our local Post Offices until the summer. The review is being carried out on a region by region basis and it is understood that the results of the review of Post Office provision in Dumfries and Galloway will not be announced until June or July.

The installation of the traffic calming measures around Kells School under the Scottish Executive's 'Safer Routes to School' scheme has still not happened. It is understood that all funding available for the current financial year has now been used up but if more funding is made available next year, the proposed work at Kells would still be carried out.

Notice was received and placed in the Town Hall Notice Board of the application procedure for funding under the Lorimer Bequest. This is a long standing bequest fund which provides an annual amount of interest which is available on application to help male students from Kells Parish who are going on to further education or to serve an apprenticeship. Forms are distributed through the schools to eligible students and the applications are considered by the Stewartry Educational Trust at the end of March every year. As the old Town Council previously administered this process, the Community Council have asked to be more closely involved in the future.

Carsphairn community council

Changes to the Carsphairn Smallholding Policy were discussed and questions answered by Carolyn Howarth, Senior Planner in the region. Caroline Howarth explained that the new Local Plan was adopted last year. There was concern that new developments were not as envisaged when the Smallholding Policy was set up and to prevent further inappropriate developments, the Supplementary Planning Guidance was approved by the Council on 2 October. She acknowledged that there should have been some consultation with the Community Council and apologised for the omission. Following discussion and questions, it was emphasised that the Policy has not changed. A review of the development plan will begin in November 2008. The Community Council will be involved in the consultation process.

A report was given on the issues regarding timber transport researched by the steering group. Many of the agreements with forestry groups and timber haulage companies are voluntary and cannot be enforced by the Council. It was noted that road safety issues are greater on the B729 than on the C35, and this needs to be addressed. Further discussion followed and George Prentice informed the group that there would be a meeting of the Timber Transport Group West on Wed 12 Dec. A resident of the Lorg Glen had been invited as well as a member of the community council.

The police report covered complaints about timber lorries using the B7000 - offenders should be reported to the Well Driven Scheme, including the registration number (if possible) and/or other details - colour, operator, time - especially the operator. Objections are taken into consideration at Timber Transport Group meetings. It was recommended that the CC push for improved safety measures on B 729 eg improved visibility; increased passing places; warning signs.

Several members of the community have met with the intention of starting a youth club in Carsphairn. It is hoped that it will begin early in 2008.



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VETERINARY SURGERY **OAKWELL ROAD CASTLE DOUGLAS**

December saw friend George and I climb up the steep west side of the Rhinns of Kells from Craigeazle on a dim and windy Sunday morning in search of snow buntings, scarce winter visitors from Iceland and Fennoscandia. We'd seen a few on the flanks of Straverron Hill the previous year, feeding on the short fruiting heads of heath rush Juncus squarrosus. These magical little birds, with their rippling flight calls, are so evocative of cold winter days when snow on the tops can bring them to much lower altitudes. I've seen them before on the Rig of Clenrie and even as low as Lochinvar. However, this time we were out of luck and indeed the only living creatures we heard or saw in over two hours in the area were a pair of hardy ravens. Not even a lonely blue hare!

In the dearth of wildlife, we concentrated more on the physical features of the Rhinns ridge, impressive at any time but especially so on this wild day. Every blade of grass, deer sedge and rush was gilded in a thin yet rigid film of ice — probably locking up any seeds from prospective snow buntings and hence their absence. The Lochans of Auchniebut, between Milldown and Millyea, were mostly iced over, too, with the wind struggling to keep a few corners open with mini waves and flying icy foam. At this height the dimness had thickened into a fairly heavy mist, and yet a hint of brightness lured us on over the rig towards Loch Dungeon, and then 'O what a glorious sight!' The strong westerly wind, on finding the gap in the hills, was rushing over the top and scooping away the gloom, allowing the sun to descend into the corrie and bathe Loch Dungeon and its immediate surroundings in an eerie but wonderful diffuse light, whilst all else remained impenetrable. Hardly 'warm-reakin', but nonetheless rich on sic an otherwise dreich day. It was magnetic really, and only the biting cold and strengthening wind reminded one of the necessity of turning to face it and of seeking lower ground.

There must be a reason for the name Auchiebut, but it is unknown to me. Rhinns, as in Kells, or Rhins of Galloway/Islay, derives from the old Scots/Irish Gaelic for narrow strip or promontory, and is therefore most appropriate for the linear Kells range. As we descended Straverron, the Silver Flow eventually struggled into view — no mystery there regarding the name, with its bog pools evident even from this distance in the poor light. I have just finished reading the late Derek Ratcliffe's excellent New Naturalist book on Galloway and the Borders, wherein he writes of dunlin formerly breeding on this internationally important bogland. These small wading birds were always scarce in Galloway, but many of their former strongholds were enveloped in forestry since the 1940s, or became unsuitable as vegetation became rank in the unplanted, unstocked areas. Derek, former Chief Scientist of the Nature Conservancy Council, lived in Cambridge but visited the region virtually every year from 1946 until his death in 2005, and he had amazing first-hand knowledge of its flora and fauna. His book contains a wealth of information and commentary on factors affecting wildlife, and includes many excellent photographs, including some of the Glenkens.





One fairly new bird to the Glenkens for most people is the nuthatch, a very handsome, chunky little bird with slate blue back, warm fawn front, menacing black eye-stripe and piercing black bill. Not long ago one had to cross the national border to see these beauties, but now they are on the move, edging steadily northwards through Scotland, though never far from deciduous trees, especially oak. They come to peanuts in gardens, though not yet mine (I don't think). A great place to see them is on the feeders from the hides at the RSPB's Ken-Dee reserve. On Xmas day I saw my first for Dalry, and my brother's first for Scotland, on the big oak tree by the swinging bridge on the Ken at the foot of the 'boat weil'. I've known them in the Garroch Glen for a few years now, but apparently a small colony nearby has been kept secret since the 1980s!

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By some quirk of the earth's speed as it turns the corner in its passage around the sun, whilst the shortest day is the winter solstice on 21 December, the earliest sunsets occur around the 10th of that month. The differences in day lengths are almost imperceptible to us at first, during those days – formerly the 'daft days' in Scotland - between Xmas and the new year, but many of our birds notice the difference alright. Even before the old year is out, rooks, ravens, buzzards and kites, amongst others, begin to visibly fly in a slightly different way, with a wee kennin more urgency and interest in their own kind than before. On the burns, of course, white-throated dippers may have been singing since October, whilst indomitable wrens and robins sing half songs throughout the winter, whatever the weather. Come the New Year, however, they are soon joined in song by skittery felties (mistle thrushes), and not so long after by early blackies and, of course, mavis, for me the stars of the show.

By the time February arrives, much of nature is on standby and almost ready to get going, unless a cold of the prevailing conditions, consciously or otherwise. In recent months we have been following the fortunes of two red kites down near Port Logan in Wigtownshire, which are using precisely the same area. as a kite from north Scotland did last winter. From the radio and wing tags, we know that one of them is an immature bird from a release area in Aberdeen; the other is also immature, but untagged. They migrated down to the shire in the autumn and have spent the winter in that mild seaside locality, their forebears did in bygone days, as recorded in the Second Statistical Account for Portpatrick (1838) were sometimes seen in winter, but not common'. It is most likely that they will which stated that they 'were sometimes seen in winter, but not common'. It is most likely that they will return whence they came as spring returns, just as some others will hopefully find their own ways back to the Glenkens and the new spring; we'll see, but spring awaits in any case.

Entertainment and Sport in New Galloway

In this age of television and computer games and all manner of sedentary pastimes, where no-one needs to venture further than the armchair for an evening's entertainment, there will no doubt be those who wonder how folk employed their leisure hours in days gone by. "What did people do in the evenings?" is a question often asked by the younger, and not so young, generation!

New Galloway had plenty to offer in the way of entertainment in the evenings and at weekends. Dances were held regularly in the Town Hall with music provided by various talented local musicians, and people thought nothing of walking several miles to attend these very popular gatherings, Refreshments were available, of a non-alcoholic nature, and everyone enjoyed meeting friends in a happy atmosphere. Little or no trouble was experienced, but on the odd occasion when a difference of opinion flared up, the "Village Bobby" was not too far away and order was soon restored.

Football matches between the villages were always well supported and during the mid-1930s teams from the Hydro Scheme's workforce would sometimes arrange a game with one of the local teams. There was great rivalry between the local villages, and after the annual Cattle Show a football match was played between the boys of Dalry and New Galloway. Two well-known "ladies" who ran a laundry in Dalry would station themselves behind the New Galloway goal and belabour the goal-keeper with their umbrellas, thus ensuring a win for their team! All good fun, provided you were not the unfortunate "goalie"!

Golf was a popular game all over Scotland, and New Galloway "boasts a picturesque, if arduous, course, which has been a great attraction for visitors and residents alike for over a hundred years. The original plan of the course has been somewhat altered over the years, and the club house facilities are vastly improved since the early days. New Galloway is justifiably proud of its Golf Club, and long may it continue to delight those who play on the attractive and well-kept course. The wonderful views of the surrounding hills are an added bonus!

During the cold, frosty winters which were a regular occurence in days gone by, curling was a favourite pastime. The earliest matches were played on the old mill dam up

the Newton Stewart road, but as the dam became weeded over, due to the demise of nearby. Skating, also, was popular with the young and not so young, and many happy hours were spent on the curling pond, provided a match was not in progress. Mossroddick, that attractive wee lochan near Dalry, was also a venue for both skating and curling. Some hardy folk would happily walk or cycle from New Galloway to Dalry to enjoy the fun of skating with friends from the neighbouring village. Milder, wet winters have spoiled the pleasure of many folk, and "global warming" had never been heard of in those days!

Indoor entertainment included the very well attended whist drives at the Town Hall, when again, people from neighbouring villages would come to take part. Badminton was enjoyed by many of the more energetic young people, and concerts were often given in the Town Hall.

Drama in the form of a local amateur dramatic club was enjoyed for a short time. Started by Rev Cameron, the Minister who came to Kells from Edinburgh, and who was very keen on drama, the venture proved popular with both audiences and the number of talented local actors and actresses who were discovered in the village. Sadly, the Rev Cameron died very suddenly at an early age and was deeply mourned by all who knew him. No one had the heart to continue with the dramatic club following this sad event and it ceased to exist.

The Reading Room was very well patronised by the local people. Mrs Charters, the caretaker, had everywhere tidy and polished to perfection, There was a huge fire burning in the grate on colder days, and all the newspapers were laid out on the table. Many folk would spend a happy hour or two catching up with the news and having a good warm. Whispered discussions took place concerning news items of interest, and views were exchanged in quiet tones so as not to disturb fellow readers.

In the same building carpet bowls were played, in a long room next to the reading room. Another huge fire warmed that room, and teams came from all around the local area, from Carsphairn in the north to Crossmichael in the south, to play against the New Galloway team.

It is no wonder we of the older generation were never bored. There was so much to do and so many interesting pastimes in which to take part there was no time for boredom! Perhaps some of the youngsters of today should try "taking a leaf from our book" - just for a change? I think we were very fit, and happy, too!

THE GLENCAIRN MEMORIAL BOOK

During the American Civil War, General Robert E. Lee, commander of the Confederate forces, opined that "It is good that war is terrible, or else we might enjoy it too much." Whilst that may be the 19th century equivalent of a modern politician's sound-bite, it is well to be reminded of the human loss and suffering caused by war. Every nation erects memorials to those who did not return from armed conflict, but we in the United Kingdom have a long tradition of commemorating our war dead locally, as well as nationally. This personalises a memorial, making it specific to its geographical location and giving it an increased resonance in the community.

It is this personal aspect to war commemoration that inspired local historians Sandy Hall and (the late) Anthony Murray Flutter to consider a memorial book, listing those from this part of Scotland who had fallen in the two global conflicts. Their efforts have culminated in the forthcoming launch of The Glencairn Memorial Rook to be hald in Monishin Memorial larging from Book, to be held in Moniaive Memorial Institute from 5.00-8.00pm on Sunday March 16th. Refreshments will be served and everyone is welcome.

Although the Glencairn Memorial Book deals mainly with the parish of Glencairn, it also includes the names of fallen servicemen and women who hailed from the Glenkens and who are listed on memorials in this area. Carsphairn memorial contains three of the names in the book, two of the names are from Balmaclellan and there are two on the St. John's Town of Dalry memorial. This serves to remind us of the encompassing nature of war and that loss and grief pay no heed to boundaries.

The research for this book has taken several years and this is evident in the detailed information contained within it. In A4 hardback, the memorial book is handsomely bound and has a gold leaf cover title.
There are 205 pages of information about the men
and women listed within, including illustrations,
photographs and service details. Profits from the sale
of the book will be divided between Erskine Homes (an organisation set up to care for ex-service personnel with a branch in Dumfries) and Moniaive Memorial Institute (a community facility commemorating the very individuals contained in this book).





COMMUNITY FIRE SAFETY MESSAGE

HFSC (Home Fire safety checks)

Home fire safety checks are continuing within the Glenkens area, this involves Firefighters from New Galloway Fire Station fitting smoke alarms with a 10 year battery, and giving advice on fire safety in the home. If you do not have a smoke alarm at present or are concerned at the condition of your existing unit, no matter your age please contact Dumfrles and Galloway Fire and Rescue Service on 01387 252222 and leave your details, and Firefighters will contact you to arrange a mutually suitable time and date to attend and check your home and fit a smoke alarm.

Checking your Smoke Alarm

- Once a week, press the test button, to check that the alarm sounds.
- If the alarm does not work, try fitting a new battery.
- If the alarm still does not work, check the batteries are fitted correctly and, if still not working, replace the smoke alarm with a new one.
- Change the battery once a year or sooner if required. Some alarms are now mains powered or fitted with long life or sealed battery units (refer to the manufacturer's instructions in these cases). If the alarm is sounding a single regular beep this means the battery is low and needs replacing.
- Clean the alarm. The outer and inner casings of the battery operated alarms should be lightly vacuumed at least once a year, preferably when you change the battery.

REMEMBER THESE 10 KEY POINTS

- PLAN your escape route now. PRACTISE your escape route as a family.
- You only have seconds. DON'T STOP for valuables.
- SHOUT to alert your family.
- KEEP LOW if the house is full of smoke. • Remember the air is clearer and cooler near the floor.
- DON'T INVESTIGATE keep doors closed.
- If there's no safe way out, get everyone into a SAFE ROOM.
- Never jump straight out of a window. LOWER yourself onto cushions, etc.
- If necessary BREAK a window and make safe all jagged edges, before climbing out.
- WHEN YOU'RE OUT STAY OUT - DIAL 999.

GLENKENS FIRE CADETS

The Glenkens Cadets have recently recommenced their training at New Galloway Fire Station. Following on with their Module input, covering many aspects of the Fire Service, such skills as Firefighting, Road Traffic Collisions, Breathing Apparatus, Urban Search and Rescue, Decontamination. They will also receive input on Home Fire Safety and First Aid, instruction on Manual Handling and how to avoid injuring themselves. On the practical side of things they will have received training in pump operation, hose running, hydrant use and branch techniques (how to control the volume and pattern of water onto a fire). Based in New Galloway Fire Station the modules span 4 sessions of 7 weeks.

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


