CRAYFISH CRAZY

"You may have seen on television recently or read in the Galloway News that some of our waters are infested with crayfish,"says New Galloway Angling Association Chairman Cliff Winstanley. "This has been an ongoing problem over recent years and the Association has brought this to the attention of various authorities including local MPs but there will be no quick and easy solution. However, in the meantime fishing continues with some hindrance to bait fishing, particularly on Loch Ken during the summer months."

Due to the problems caused by the spread of the North American signal crayfish throughout local rivers and lochs, licences for the capture and sale of crayfish could be granted. Perhaps this troublesome pest could soon become a local delicacy, luring tourists to the area rather than chasing them off - here's hoping!

WINDFARM INQUIRY

Dalry Town Hall has been host for some weeks to an inquiry to decide whether the windfarm at Blackcraig will go ahead. Below is a statement from the Scottish Government about the inquiry:

Scottish & Southern Energy Generation applied in September 2005 for a 23 turbine wind farm. As Blackcraig wind farm is over 50 Megawatts, the application comes directly to Scottish Ministers.

The public inquiry began on 26 February 2008. The council, applicant and third parties have the opportunity to make their case.

The report of the public inquiry will be sent to Ministers, and Ministers will make the final decision on whether to grant or refuse permission. There is no timescale on when Ministers will make a decision.



Dalry Community Council

The Chairman expressed thanks and appreciation for all the hard work Mr Hamilton had carried out around the Summer Seats and within the community over many years.

A representative from UPM Forestry attended the meeting to give a speech on the proposed application for a commercial forestry plantation at Duchrae. There is to be a Scoping meeting on Tue 11 March at 10am in the Lochinvar Hotel, and it was agreed that a few members of the committee should attend this meeting. During the discussions concerns were raised about the increase in logging traffic through the village such a scheme would generate. The local timber liaison meetings are held each quarter, and Councilor Duncan will raise the community's concerns at the next meeting and will also suggest that a general meeting should be arranged between all local community councils within the area.

three people. A member of the community went along and expressed concerns about the type of people housed in property within our village. Nothing came of this. It was suggested that the only way forward is to keep monitoring the situation and to keep raising our views to the appropriate authority until such time that they take notice. Councilor Duncan agreed and suggested the committee should write to the Housing Association, setting out our concerns, particularly regarding the way the open meeting was handled and publicised and to forward a copy of that letter to the Galloway News.

It was confirmed that the sum of £1500 per year would be available to the Community if the windfarm project goes ahead. The award would be overseen by Solway Heritage. Discussion took place on whether it was appropriate to withdraw the Community Council's support of the bid for funding from the STTF for the Lorg road now that we had a copy of the final application. It was agreed not to withdraw support, although there appears to be a bias towards benefits for Moniaive.

It was reported on progress towards establishing a youth club; letters have been sent to parents and households, meetings have been arranged, there have been donations of toys and equipment The open meeting arranged by the Housing Partnership held on 6 Feb was attended by only application for Disclosure Scotland forms application for Disclosure Scotland forms.

There was a report from a Community Council member who attended the Whiteside wind farm meeting. The windfarm has planning approval and under the D&G Scheme for Community Benefits from Windfarm Developers, Carsphairn will receive £1500. It will be administered by Solway Heritage under this scheme and we need to send a plan to access the money.

It was agreed to write in support of the campaign to save the Lookaround programme. Petition cards will be available in the shop for individuals to support the campaign.

Information is being sought as to whether the village's

participating in the Rag Bag scheme run by Nathan's Wastesavers and it was decided that having a textile recycling bin would undermine this scheme. Regarding recycling, it was noted

that anything can now be put in our bins, as sorting for recycling takes place at the new Eco-Deco plant at Dumfries.

NEW GALLOWAY ANGLING ASSOCIATION

New Galloway Angling Association has been in existence for over 50 years and was originally formed with the objectives of encouraging and promoting angling in the district and preventing illegal fishing.

Permanent residents of New Galloway and Balmaclellan qualify for full membership whilst permanent residents of Dalry qualify for membership but without rights to take office or attend meetings unless invited by the President. Membership subscriptions for 2008 are £10 for adults and £2 for juniors (under 16). The current President of the Association is Cliff Winstanley.

The Association controls a stretch of the River Ken, a stretch of Loch Ken, Clatteringshaws Reservoir, Mossdale Loch and a stretch of the Blackwater of Dee River. Brief details of the Association's waters are as follows:

River Ken - Brown trout are native to the river and also stocked; salmon occassionally run during the season; pike, roach and perch are also present. Spinning and bait fishing is allowed but not maggots.

Clatteringshaws Reservoir - fishing on the reservoir is shared by New Galloway and Newton Stewart Angling Associations. Brown trout and pike are native to this loch.

Loch Ken (west bank) - brown trout, pike and perch are native to this loch and salmon run through during the season. The loch is a favourite with roach anglers and many matches are held during the year. Blackwater of Dee - brown trout and pike are native to the Association's stretch of the river.



Local potter Hannah McAndrew has been doing ceramic classes with the cubs. The figures that they have made will be on display at The CatStrand for the first 2 weeks in April.

Mossdale Loch - fishing on this loch is from one of the two boats owned by the Association and is strictly fly-fishing only. The loch is regularly stocked with rainbows. Bookings are available from Mossdale Post Office.

During the fishing season the Association holds competitions for members in various forms of angling and also a specific competition for junior members. The current Juniors Trophy holder is Martin Wilson from New Galloway. Competitions for this year are as follows:

Bertram Cup - River Ken (fly only) - Saturday 10 May; Webster Cup - Mossdale Loch (fly only) - Sunday 8 June; Juniors Cup - River Ken (any legal method) - Sat 19 July; J McCubbing Trophy & Seniors Cup - River Ken (any legal method) Saturday 9 August; Jack Holland Trophy - Mossdale Loch (pike only) - Sunday 2 November

What is the Well **Driven Scheme?**

The Well Driven Scheme is something which was set up to monitor the driving of mainly goods vehicles, such as HGV's (including vans), when it became obvious that many people were being affected by the bad driving of such vehicles, and this was affecting the companies' reputations. This led to many contracts being issued to companies to haul goods only if they were in the scheme.

This affected our area when the forestry bodies took the scheme on board with regard to timber haulage. It was seen as a way to regulate hauliers and drivers who caused problems by bad driving and use of unauthorised roads.

The scheme allows anyone to dial the 0800 number and report incidents such as poor or discourteous driving, or lorries on routes which they shouldn't be.

When you phone, the operator takes details of when where and the incident happened, and asks for the registration number or name of operator - thereafter a letter is sent to the body concerned. This flags up to an employer any driver who is regularly being reported (and often leads to dismissal - so it is effective).

These complaints are also raised at regular meetings of the forestry bodies, where local councilors, police and other parties discuss non-recommended routes which are being used, or other problems regarding timber haulage which are being encountered in the locality. This may mean routes are changed and hauliers may be censured re their contracts if complaints continue.

Reporting incidents to the Well Driven Scheme will help our roads to be safer, and make sure that the larger vehicles using our roads are doing so responsibly - so make sure you report any nearmisses, discourteous behaviour, or any other incident you feel is relevant. LOCAL HISTORY

GLENKENS OBJECT OF THE MONTH: A new historical feature has been introduced in The CatStrand with the exhibition of a 'Glenkens Object of the Month' in collaboration with The Stewartry Museum in Kirkcudbright.

From April, a single object relating to the history of the Glenkens will be placed on display in the centre. The April object is a medieval silver brooch dating to around 1300, which was found recently near Dalry. Future months will see engravings, archive photographs, books, medals, tools – in fact any historic material relating to the Glenkens. Many of the exhibits will come from the Stewartry Museum collection, but if any readers have historic items which they would be prepared to lend for a month, please contact David Devereux at the Stewartry museum on 01557-331643 or Rachel Thompson at The CatStrand 01644 420374.

APRIL 2008 - A Medieval Gilded, Silver Brooch, c.1300 - This is a near-complete medieval brooch which would have been used to pin up a cloak or outer-garment. The fastening pin is missing. It was found by the Rev. David Bartholomew using a metal detector near Boatknowe, south of Dalry. Stuart Campbell, National Museums of Scotland, prepared this report for the Scottish Archaeological Finds Allocation Panel.

"This type of annular brooch with applied rosettes is a distinct type found throughout the British Isles but is particularly well represented in southern Scotland where the border warfare of the 13^{th} and 14^{th} centuries



caused a number to be deposited in hoards. Comparison of this material on the grounds of artisan techniques and stylistic quirks has suggested that the brooches can be grouped into categories representing the work of separate individuals and both in appearance and the materials and techniques used in construction this brooch is to all practical purposes identical to two from the Canonbie hoard, strongly suggesting that they must have come from the same workshop. The two find spots are c. 80km apart and might suggest local or regional production.

Judging by the quantity and quality of the material deposited in hoards — as well as the inherent quality of this piece — such brooches were most likely the possessions of relatively prosperous families and represented a form of stored and portable wealth as well as a badge of status."

The brooch has been allocated to The Stewartry Museum in Kirkcudbright through the Treasure Trove process. (The photo is David Bartholomew on the right and David Devereux on the left standing beside the new CatStrand display.)

The 2008 exhibition is titled 'Kail, Cakes & Cures' and gives a unique insight into domestic life in the Glenkens. It includes old recipes, some of which have been handed down through several generations. Life in the kitchen was not just about cooking, however, and included an assortment of potions and cures for an intriguing variety of ailments. There are also many artifacts from the domestic kitchen on display which are sure to spark a few memories for all who visit!

The Heritage Centre will be open from 21 Mar to 26 May on bank holidays and weekends and from 27 May to 28 Sept daily except Wed.

Remember all old Police station lines are now disconnected and everyone has to use the 0845 600 5701 number to contact the police. Other useful numbers are 0845 555111 for Crimestoppers, and 0800 225533 for the well driven scheme for troublesome HGV's (see article on page 4 for a bit of background about this).

There are still a number of scams going round by the mail, phone and internet promising millions from faraway lottery prizes, and persons promising pots of money to help them bring money into the country from various places on the globe. Don't be conned - if it sounds too good to be true then it usually is!

Motorists beware as many roads surfaces and verges are suffering after a long wet winter, slow down rather than take to the verge they are so soft just now they will drag you in very quickly and another phone number to remember (promise this is the last one!) is the Council Pot Hole Hotline 0845 276 0000. Don't leave it to someone else to report that hole, the next motorist who damages their car or worse might be a friend or relative.

And finally, at this time of year many of us venture out and about. The 'Right to Roam' legislation is there to allow us to do just that - but both rambler and landowner must show each other mutual respect.

Walkers should keep dogs on leads please, and no fires or litter. Landowners, if you are carrying out agricultural or other sporting pursuits, please be aware of the need to politely ask persons to take another route and don't carry on with work or whatever you are doing until it is safe to do so. Community Fire Safety Message

New Galloway Station's crew have been out and about in the community carrying out Home Fire safety Checks, giving advice within their area on Fire Safety, and fitting a free smoke alarm with a 10 year battery into many homes within the Glenkens. They are in the process of reaching out to many more homes, so if you do not have a smoke detector or feel you want your detector tested and receive free advice, please contact Dumfries Fire HQ on 01387 252222 who will pass on your details to New Galloway Fire Station's crew. They will then carry out a professional inspection for you free of charge, and if found that you require a detector they will fit one in the most suitable place in your home.

Glenkens Fire Cadets

The Cadets have just completed another seven week module at New Galloway Fire Station. The eight young cadets completed a training session on the aerial ladder from Dumfries Fire Station as well as training on search and rescue, breathing apparatus use, dam building and pumping exercises. This was followed by a trip to the realistic Fire Training Unit at Dumfries where they experienced a fire situation training session, with crews tackling a live fire, and were able to observe at a safe distance "Roll Overs" and "Flash Overs" inside the unit. The Cadets are on a well earned rest before they start up again with a new seven week session. This will involve team building, motivation training, breathing apparatus use, pumping, ladder work, first aid and trauma input.

There is a proposed open day at New Galloway Fire Station in the Summer where the Cadets will be centre stage and will be able to display all the skills they have acquired in previous sessions.


