### FROM SICHUAN TO THE GLENKENS

The CatStrand was recently host to a prestigious exhibition of woodcut artworks by the acclaimed Chinese artist Xiang Silou. Xiang exhibited his work at the Burrell Collection in Glasgow earlier this year where he was also completing a teaching residency during April.


His main works are detailed prints of human faces where he captures the intricate contours and expressions of people from his native Sichuan on large sheets of rice paper. Xiang says it can take up to 40 days to create one of his stunning works which he cuts and prints by hand. Landscapes

are another of his specialities - these are filled with as much character and expression as his faces, depicting beautiful and dramatic traditional oriental landscapes.






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### Local Art: FREEDOM AND EXPRESSION

This took place over the weekend of 24-26 May and was another huge success. The event gives artists and craftspeople the chance to open their studios to the

Around the Glenkens there were four open studios this year - Ted Leeming, who produces excellent abstract and Scottish fine art photography, based in Dalry; Godfrey Smith of Galloway Footwear, master shoe maker producing traditional and modern clogs and shoes handmade on the premises, based in Balmaclellan; Jennie Ashmore, an artist creating striking works with pressed leaves and flowers, based near Corsock; and Amanda Simmons of Corsock Glass, a maker of kiln-formed glass creations varying from delicate jewellery to giant sculptures, also based near Corsock.

The Spring Fling has become known far and wide, and is Scotland's premier annual art and craft open studio event. A huge number of visitors and locals alike follow the routes marked in the Spring Fling brochure so they can have the opportunity to view the abundance of creativity on offer in the region.

#### **Carsphairn Community Council**

Discussion took place on the proposed review of the Smallholdings Policy. We have been assured that we will be consulted, but have not heard what form the consultation will take.

It was agreed that a letter will be sent to the Planning Department reiterating our strong desire to be involved in this review.

20mph signs and road markings are in place now and awaiting connection by Scottish Power and the rumble strips will be done when the firm is next in the area.

Members of the Community Council reported on the Whiteside Windfarm meeting which was held in Thornhill. A draft agreement with Airtricity, the developers, was presented for our consideration the next meeting will be on Thursday 19 June and any issues in the draft are to be e-mailed to Damien Wilson prior to the meeting.

Thefts of heating oil have taken place in the Glenkens. The police recommend that householders check their tanks regularly and report any suspicious activities. Farmers should beware of individuals who are looking for scrap metal and old batteries - they may be assessing the level of security of items of value.

Recent accidents on the A713 have highlighted the unsuitability of the High Bridge of Ken for HGVs. A request was made for signs to be erected at Dalry and the Milton Park road end stating that the road is unsuitable for lorries.

#### The Royal Burgh of New Galloway & Kells Parish Community Council

The members were pleased to note that at long last, after many letters and meetings with council officials, some maintenance work has been carried out on the Town Hall. The gutters have been cleared and repairs carried out to the roof. The Community Council will keep up the campaign to continue with a programme of maintenance, particularly urgent is painting the outside of the building and it is hoped that this can be carried out as soon as possible.

Various other maintenance jobs had been completed since the previous meeting including replacing the electricity pole near Packwood End which had been ongoing for several years. There are still several other items outstanding with Scottish Water and they would be contacted again as a matter of urgency.

The Association has written in support of retention of the Post Offices within the area recognising their importance to both business and the community especially now with only one bank available.



# WHAT CRAYFISH? NEVER SAY NEVER

As the eagerly awaited long weekend in Scotland approached, my attention was drawn to the weather forecast. The frosty nights and lovely blue sky days that we had enjoyed were about to give way to a band of low pressure from the West. Rising temperature, with rain and gale force winds, did not bode well for a family holiday. I knew however that the dropping barometer, after a sustained period of high pressure, would see the Pike switch on.

The journey north of the border was unpleasant as we battled through the elements. Overturned vehicles and limbs torn from trees confirmed the strength of the wind. We arrived safely at the cottage in New Galloway and I quickly unloaded the luggage, except the fishing tackle as I intended to fish at first light. After supper, I retired to bed in anticipation of an early start.

I was still in bed when dawn broke. I had not slept well, being disturbed by howling gales and torrential rain. I was nudged by my wife Lynne who murmured "thought you were going fishing". I responded by telling her I was in no hurry to go out as I pulled up the duvet and snuggled in. I dozed quite happily and enjoyed the comfort of the bed until almost lunchtime. After brunch I donned my fishing gear and awaited a lift to the Loch. Lynne dropped me off at the chosen swim and headed into town to enjoy the local craft shops and all the usual touristy things.

I arrived on the gale lashed banks of Loch Ken and wondered if I should bother fishing, as white horses rolled down the Loch and a peaty stain coloured the main river course. These were difficult conditions, but we all know you do not catch twenties in front of log fires! I sought shelter in a wooded area, but had to wade clear of the tree line to cast. The old Pike master creaked under load as I attempted to punch a half herring through the strengthening gale. With all the aero dynamics of a barn door, the bait stalled in the wind and landed about thirty yards out - well short of my target area. I retrieved and reviewed my tactics.... small bait big lead was the order of the day. I changed to a smaller gape trace and threaded on a Smelt with a baiting needle. I then tied the 3oz running lead to the trace swivel with PVA to keep everything in line and gain a few extra yards. I waded as far as I dared into the waves and this time used a flat cast - level with the water to beat the wind. Result.... bait on the sweet spot and me taking refuge in the trees.

Two minutes later and the rod pod was wiped out by wind and waves. The rods and reels are in the drink and the buzzers choke as they ingest water. I question my sanity once again and decide to sacrifice the brolly to utilise the storm poles as bank sticks. Job sorted, everything low to the ground, and all ready for action. Within a few minutes a bobbin dropped and the buzzer sounded. I lifted the rod half heartedly, expecting a false alarm.

I was quite taken aback when the rod looped over and the reel yielded line. I had hooked a good fish against the run of play. After a dogged battle the fish broke the surface and was almost ready for the net. That is, the landing net that is still packed away heatly in the rod holdall! No panic, get in the water and chin her out.

Success! Out she comes, onto the mat, into the bag, 25lb 8ozs. I reach for the Sony digital to capture the moment when.... disaster! No image (suspect water ingress) I take out the back up camera - low battery. AARGH! I ring Lynne and ask where she is and how quickly she can buy a battery and get back to the Loch? Fortunately she is able to help and expects to be with me within half an hour.

I marvel at the beauty of the stunning specimen as I slip her into the ET pike tube. I knew she would be safe for that time, given the water temperature and oxygen content. I took five minutes, reflected on events and enjoyed the moment, prior to launching a Snake Launce into the same area. After a few more minutes I was away again, and it was another good fish!

Another epic battle ensued and it was not until the fish surfaced that I remembered that the landing net was still in my holdall. Back into the water, ready for another hand landing. My legs turned to jelly as the fish rolled in

front of me. With a head like a crocodile and a back that would take a saddle it had to be pushing 30lbs.

I chinned her at the second attempt and strained as I lifted her clear of the water. She was a beautiful example of a pre historic predator. Unfortunately the scales did not reach the magical 30 and settled at 29lb 80zs.

What a result, a 55lb brace from a wild Scottish Loch - life doesn't get any better than this. Lynne arrived on schedule and the photos are only possible due to the kind of support my wife has given me for the last thirty years.

Although this is a summer issue, I write in spring and try as I might to project forward to the sultry days of leafy woods, buzzing insects and biting midgles, it just wouldn't be honest. Aristotle said only write what you know, and it's a long while back to last summer, the one that never came. So spring it is and how wonderful – now!




After one of the coldest and dreichest early springs I remember, everything is now happening at last.

On Sunday 11 May we sat on top of Drumglass Hill, south of Mossdale, looking north towards New Galloway, but with everything in view from Barwhillanty in the east, round past the distinctive Carsphairn Hills of Cairnsmore, Beninner and Moorbrock, to the rough moorland of Airle and Shaw Hill in the west. Most of the Glenkens, in fact, though the huge upland part of Kells was obscured by Bennan Hill in the middle ground. The mosaic of native woodland habitats, rolling farmland, moorland and glimpses of Loch Ken before us made for a compelling tapestry. Again it made me feel so privileged to live here. Of course, this was all made possible by the endless blue sky and warm sun eating into our backs.

We were scanning for new pairs of kites, which is fun enough in itself, but what collateral riches it provides at a time like this. Redstarts recently arrived from Africa were shaking their delicate little songs, while at least four skylarks all around us were competing in an intense cacophony. Lapwings clearly had chicks to the left and right of us, and their rolling peewit calls came forth now and then. A whaup was more skulking and I suspected they still had eggs in a wet flat a couple of hundred yards away. House martins and swallows came round our heads at times and a wheatear sang intermittently. Wheatears spend the winter in the scrubby arid zone south of the Sahara, and it is thought that they and other birds are suffering badly from the prolonged droughts there in recent years. Certainly, I haven't seen so many of late, which is a shame as they are so attractive and dapper in their fine spring plumage, with black wings and eye stripes contrasting with the otherwise warm grey and fawn plumage of the male and female respectively. And then that flash of white at the rump, which gave rise to their original and very similar name, but which so offended prudish mid-Victorians that they changed it to wheatear. I'll let you work it out if you don't know already! We didn't find the kites we were looking for, but we didn't much care with everything else that was going on, and just soaking in the view.

Back down in an oak strip the bluebells were bursting and will be at their best in a week or so, but the scent of wild garlic was the perfect incentive for dinner as we made our way back to the car. Summer's coming, but I can wait!

#### **NEW GALLOWAY** Our Historic Burgh by Helen Bolton - PART XXXVII

The Second World War

Maitland Gordon, grandson of Mrs Louisa Maitland Gordon of "Kenmure", had inherited the castle and estate on the death of his father in 1915. Between 1935 and 1959 Mr Maitland Gordon sold most of the remaining parts of the estate, including Kenmure Castle. Much of the hill ground between the A762 New Galloway to Mossdale road and the Black Water of Dee was bought by the Forestry Commission, and during the following years was blanket-planted with vast quantities of conifers. In doing so, a number of interesting historical sites were completely hidden. The most significant of these was the medieval settlement of some thirty or more dwellings at Clachrum, to the north of the Stroan Loch.

The four Forestry Commission houses near Burnfoot Bridge date from this period, and a water supply was brought from the wood above the houses. Later an improved supply was run from the Pultarson Burn just below the farm of "Knocknairling" The remains of the dam can still be seen below the bridge on the farm road.

The new owners of "Kenmure Castle" leased the building to General MacEwan, retired, when he became Commanding Officer of the local Home guard during the war.

One of the last parts of the Kenmure Estate to be sold was the house of "Overton" on the Kirk Road, which Mr Maitland Gordon put up for sale in 1942. "Overton" had belonged to the family since Mrs Louisa Bellamy Gordon died in 1886, and her daughter, Mrs Louisa Maitland Gordon decided to let the castle and move to a more comfortable house, since when no member of the family had lived at the castle.

In 1940 the smithy in New Galloway, which had been a vital part of village life since the middle of the 18th century, closed for ever. The building was bought by local plumber, Mr James Holmes, for his workshop. He is said to have paid £8 for it!

Our fire brigade, prior to 1941 was equipped with a stirrup pump, a torch, and a Klaxon hooter which was used as a fire alarm, and the firemen were supplied with rubber boots! However, in 1941 an old Austin 22hp van was bought and converted into a fire engine. The fire station and garage was down the Duke Street Brae at the back of the Kenmure Arms Hotel, and the building is now used by Jim McKenna, local joiner and a member of the present day Fire Brigade.

At the outbreak of war in September 1939 New Galloway and the surrounding area once again sent its sons to fight for our country. During their absence a number of local girls took over some of the jobs which the young men had left, working in shops, driving delivery vans and so on. The older men, many of whom had served in the 1914-18 war, joined the Home Guard.

Perhaps the most exciting connection with the war in this area was the arrival in the village of a number of Commandos, sent up for part of their training in the wild Galloway hills and moors. The men were billeted in houses in New Galloway, and vanished into the remote areas for days on end during their training exercises. Some of them, from the towns and cities of southern England, must have been amazed at the quietness and the vast areas of wilderness in Galloway! However, later their training was to continue in the Highlands around Spean Bridge and the wild hills and lochs of Lochaber. This would be even more remote, and the training was extremely tough.

Some of our older residents will have happy memories of those keen young men during their stay in New Galloway, and sad memories of those who did not survive the hostilities. The beautiful Commando Memorial at Spean Bridge is a fitting tribute to those brave lads.

### KAIL, CAKES AND CURES



On Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> May the Carsphairn Heritage Group held a private view to their annual exhibition which this year is entitled 'Kail, Cakes and Cures - Our Kitchen Heritage'.

The intriguing refers to the role of the domestic kitchen not only as a source of food but also as the provider

of an assortment of potions and cures for a variety of ailments. The exhibition includes recipes handed down over several generations, reminiscences of domestic life in the Glenkens, suggestions for home made remedies and many artefacts that will undoubtedly spark memories from visitors.

The opening was very well attended by the group and interested members of the community and in keeping with the theme of the exhibition refreshments were provided. The highlight of the fare was undoubtedly a magnificent Clootie Dumpling provided by Mrs Mary Thirtle of Carsphairn and made traditionally according to her recipe that is included in the exhibition itself. Shortly before the private view, the dumpling had been quietly resting in front of her open fire in order to keep warm and develop a "lovely skin".

The event provided an opportunity to invite new people to come forward as volunteer members and stewards. From Easter to September The Carsphairn Heritage Centre is open and staffed entirely by volunteers. The centre itself not only houses an annual exhibition but also holds information on local family history that is made available to everybody and is often accessed by people tracing their family history from as far a field as America and Australia. The Group needs more stewards to assist those who already give their time, some travelling to help from Ayrshire and the Solway Coast. As a community project we would like to attract more local people. All stewards find the experience rewarding and fun as it provides opportunities to meet both locals and visitors to the area.

### THE HISTORY STOP CASTLES (CARD 23)

Over the next few issue of the Gazette we will be featuring areas of historical interest around the Glenkens as highlighted on the Glenkens HistoryStop cards. These cards focus on a particular local area or feature which you can then choose to visit if you like – the full set of History Stop cards is available for purchase at The CatStrand, New Galloway (you can also purchase them individually). The first card we will include is on castles.

CASTLES: In its relatively small area the Glenkens has a diverse heritage of castles bearing witness to the troubled history of Galloway.

Kenmure Castle is the largest castle in the Glenkens. It is a mix of architectural styles and it is not easy to distinguish the phases of construction. Mary Queen of Scots stayed at Kenmure Castle in 1563. The castle was refurblished in 1633 by Sir John Gordon and was defended by Royalists against Cromwell's forces in 1650. Conversely, the 6th Viscount was executed for his part in the 1715 Jacobite Rebellion. The castle was said to be almost in ruins when inherited in 1737. Estate lands were sold to finance a programme of works in 1817 and another phase was begun in 1879. The final amendments were done in 1908. The castle passed out of Gordon family ownership from 1936 until the 1960s, during which time it fell derelict. It was re-purchased by the family but there seems little prospect for any recovery of the building, which is dangerous and should not be entered.


Unfortunately, the ruins of Lochinvar Castle were submerged beneath the waters of the loch when the loch was dammed during the construction of the Galloway Hydro-electric Scheme.

The fortified house of Shirmers stood at the north end of Loch Ken but only a fragment survives beside the farmhouse which replaced it. Traditon has it that the original castle was burned in 1568, as punishment for the owner's support of Mary Queen of Scots, although the disused building evidently still stood in the 1870s.

Earlstoun Castle is an example of the tower houses which evolved during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, with construction dating from the second half of the sixteenth. It is a three-storey L-tower, with a lack of defensive features that suggest that Earlstoun was built more as a home than as a fortification.

Dundeugh Castle was an L-tower, probably built in the sixteenth century. The remains of the castle are situated on the east bank of the western branch of the Water of Ken, close to where it is joined by Polmaddy Burn.

Barscobe Castle was built by William Maclellan in 1648, using stone from the Douglas stronghold at Threave Castle. It is L-shaped, built on two storeys with a garret floor in the roof space and is still occupied as a private family home.





### GLENKENS SCHOOLS REPORT

### DALRY STARS IN THEIR EYES 2008

The Birds Friendly Schools (BFS) programme is a free community-based project that aims to provide first-hand experience of nature through both classroom activities and outdoor learning. Almost 1000 children have taken part this year, having fun and learning about birds and wildlife in their school grounds and at home.


The initiative is delivered by trained volunteers, who visit their schools several times over the course of an academic year. They provide the schools with a nest box, birdfeeders and food and help the children to learn about birds in their local area, as well as participating in the RSPB's annual Big Schools Birdwatch in January.

Ella McLellan, the local project manager, said: "The aim of the initiative has been first and foremost to inspire children about the wildlife around them. Our volunteers provide the children and their teachers with lots of information about the birds, but they also try to make things fun by doing games and other activities.

"Schools can also link the project in to the curriculum and the whole thing also works nicely within the Eco Schools scheme, and could help towards an Eco Schools award."

### YOUTH UPDATE

### Glenkens Fire Cadets

They have started again after a short break - this seven week session will see the Fire Cadets covering fire fighting, and will include understanding fire and its effects, using the fire pumps and delivery hose, high pressure hose and fire fighting techniques. Other skills which will be covered are using ladders to gain entry to a high building, tackling fires in a building, using the ladders and hose and on the ground they will tackle a developing fire and will need to work as a team to advance the hose towards a fire.

They will have a break mid term where they will attend a session at Loch Ken Activity Centre and use the new Laser Quest; this will also develop team building skills, and give the Cadets a well earned reward for all the hard work they put in on the Wednesday nights at the Fire Station. On their return to New Galloway Fire Station to continue training they will enter the breathing apparatus phase - using equipment to enter smoke filled environments, using special guide lines and search and rescue techniques to locate casualities and fires.

As we near the end of this module we will have a guest speaker visiting to talk with the Cadets, and on completion of this phase, the last session will be a display night for parents and friends during which the Cadets will display all the things they have covered in a large multi-activity event.



### ON THE BEAT: Summer Safety

Hello Glenkens Gazette Readers, in PC Wilson's short term absence I have been enlisted to try and fill his shoes – this is unlikely but I'll give it a go!

As recent good weather spells have shown summer is definitely here. This means a lot more gardening being done and so gardening equipment and tools will be used and on display. I would ask that you secure your tools and equipment once they have been used and not to leave them out for opportunist thieves to help themselves.

Also as summer is here I know you will be aware that just as many road traffic crashes happen in good spells of weather as in winter. Please consider other drivers who are visiting and are perhaps unsure of the road or directions, and have a wee bit more patience when it is clear they are struggling and holding you up. I know that the speed of vehicles through your villages and towns is a concern for you and with that in mind we have planned some visits from the Road Safety Speed Camera in the Glenkens area over the next few weeks. I am not going to say exactly when but just be conscious of your speed as it is surprising how it can creep up when you are not particularly concentrating on it.

And finally - for all those keen walkers and climbers out there — have you heard of E-route? This is a service run by both Moffat and Galloway Mountain Rescue teams whereby information about your party, journey, expected time of arrival etc can be forwarded onto Dumfries and Galloway Constabulary just on the off chance you may be in a situation where you require help. You can reach the form on the internet via www.moffatmrt.org.uk or www.gallowaymrt.org.uk. Information on the form includes the following: estimated time of departure, vehicle location, vehicle registration number (including any second vehicle), mobile phone number, start date, time and grid reference, intended route, end date, time and grid reference, emergency contact details. If you do not have access to the Internet I would advise informing a responsible person of the above list of details in any case so that a search for you may be instigated if you fail to make contact.

Recently there have been some cases of the theft of heating oil in the Glenkens. If you are concerned about your oil, contact the local police (no. on back of Gazette) and you will receive specific security and crime prevention advice for the circumstances regarding the site of your heating fuel, or you can arrange a visit by a Crime Reduction Officer who will survey the premise/site and give advice free of charge.

The Machars peninsular looked at its stunning best under clear blue skies as did the rhododendrons in Galloway House Gardens near Garlieston. A brief stop in Garlieston to see the Mulberry Harbours simply meant the local shop ran out of choc-ices! These trips continue to be popular and allow people to visit places they might otherwise not get to. New friends are also made and the humour on the bus is an experience in itself!

Whilst in Innerleithen near Peebles some of us visited Robert Smalls Printing Works which was established in 1857. This is a family-run business still using old fashioned methods. We were shown a compositor using blocks similar to the 'John Bull sets' and it was explained it could take 1 hour to set 30 lines of print — from these early days the phrases 'upper and lower cases' originated as did the phrase 'out of sorts' which meant the blocks had been put back in the wrong place by the junior employee! Watching old printers at work (one powered by a foot pedal) does remind you how wonderful some inventions were and how far we have come since those early days of printing.

During July we shall be visiting Ullswater in the Lake District ( Mon 7th), Hutton in the Forest Stately Home and Gardens (Mon 13th), The Glasgow River Festival (Sun 20th) and Drumlanrig Castle (Mon 28th). The trips are varied in their destinations and it would be nice to see some younger passengers and children possibly visiting an event such as the River Festival.

Chairman of the Town Hall Committee, Mark Stoves comments: "Our next Market will be our 17th, which is a fabulous achievement... I would like to remind readers that the Glenkens Farmers Market is a fully licensed market, which protects both traders and buyers."

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#### DALRY ANGLING ASSOCIATION

On Thursday 8th May, 1930, a meeting was called in Dalry Town Hall to consider a letter from the Hon. Henry Mountjoy Updon of the Holm, Balmaclellan, offering Mossroddick and the River Ken from Dalry to Boatknowe (Grennan march fence), as fishing grounds to the people of Dalry and Balmaclellan. He also recommended that an Association be formed and rules drawn up and the same be submitted to him for approval. Mr George Penman became the first Chairman and Dalry Angling Association was inaugurated.

Mr Upton had generously offered a boat for the use of members on Mossroddick, and also donated enough timber to erect a boathouse to accommodate two boats. The Association paid for the timber to be sawn and transported to the loch which was stocked with 250 two year old brown trout costing £12 10s.

Today the objectives remain the same – to provide for and encourage the sport of angling for the residents of Dalry, Balmacellan and Carsphairn, and to enhance the game fishing potential for members and visitors alike. Besides full membership, which costs £10 p.a. this year, Associate Membership is open to members of New Galloway Angling Association and other applicants acceptable to the Association who for the same annual subscription will enjoy the benefits of full membership but will not be able to vote at an AGM or hold office. Qualification for Junior Membership is attendance at Dalry, Kells or Carsphairn Schools, regardless of where you live, and the annual subscription is £1 for primary and £2 for secondary school pupils. A day ticket for visitors is £7 for adults and half price for juniors.

The season for salmon begins on 11th February and ends 31st October, and for trout the season runs from 15th March to 6th October. There are indigenous fish and Carsfad is stocked. The waters available are:

1) The left bank of the River Ken from the suspension bridge to the march fence beyond Boatknowe – excluding Boatknowe frontage – and right bank from the Allan Gibbon bridge to Coom burn. Fly only until 1st May, then spinning and worm.

2) Carsfad dam – west bank only. Fly only. The cost of using a boat and equipment is £1.50 for members (£7 for visitors) and the latter can be obtained from Mr Newton's shop in Dalry. Ground baiting is forbidden. There are exchange tickets with Dalbeattie and Newton Stewart for members, also available at Newton's shop.

The Glenkens has had a Martial Arts Club for 4 years now, having been founded in April 2004 by Brian and Nancy Hilton. Brian is our chief instructor and has black belts in Shotokan Karate, Lau Gar Kung Fu and Jiu Jitsu. He is 7th Dan in Shotokan Karate. His wife Nancy is a 2nd Dan in Shotokan Karate and Freestyle Martial Arts. Brian teaches Martial Arts

based on a blend of the styles he has trained in and with an emphasis on Self Defence.

Before opening clubs across the region Brian and Nancy lived in Runcorn where they also ran several clubs. The Runcorn clubs are now being run by Ann Brindley (2nd Dan), who is this years WUMA woman's British Champion and a still a student of Brian's. We get together regularly with Ann and her clubs for competitions and courses. The Club has been enjoying growing success over the past couple of years, as our group of Martial Artists begin to mature. At our regular Inter-Club competitions in Thornhill, where all of the clubs under the Kickback Martial Arts banner meet and compete, we have picked up a large number of trophies over the past few years, many of which are firsts and seconds.

We've also had success at various National competitions, most notably at the Welsh open where last year one of our members, Hannah Sainsbury, picked up a couple of Second place trophies.

A recent development has also seen the establishment of the Glenkens Martial Arts Association, a body set up to acquire funding for equipment for the club and to help the club members attend competitions and other important functions. ### GEOFF MONK'S MOUNTAIN WEATHER INFORMATION SERVICE

#### (www.mwis.org.uk)

It's already a 'brand' and it all started here in Galloway, Laurieston to be precise, with BBC Scotland launching the Weather Watchers Network in 1984. Many of the early 'weather watchers' were members of mountain rescue teams or, at least, keen outdoor enthusiasts. Initially the main demand was for better information about conditions on high level roads but increasingly this changed to one which had more of a focus on mountain safety and enjoyment.

Eight years ago Geoff Monk, with a mass of relevant weather forecasting experience, came to work full time with what by then had come to be called 'onlineweather.com'. His passion for mountain weather soon became widely known. An experimental service was started with thousands of users emailing back suggestions about what they needed. Extra money for mountain rescue teams was provided two years ago. The decision of who was to provide the associated weather services was given to the Mountaineering Council of Scotland - MCofS and many others in the mountaineering community had already been working

closely with Geoff Monk to develop a more user friendly mountain weather forecasting and information service.

After 23 years, last Autumn the Scottish Government finally provided core funding for 'mwis' through Sportscotland. This allowed Geoff to be joined by Neil Hicking, a one time expedition leader and ex-forecaster who provided weather information from the Met Office in Prestwick for mountain rescue operations.

A new, improved version of the original website www.mwis.org.uk has now been launched and is attracting sponsorship funding which will be used to extend the range of information, mountain weather education and training provided throughout Scotland.

Locally, Roland Chaplain who originally launched 'weather watchers' now has a weekly slot on Tommy Jardine's afternoon show on Southwest Sound Radio at 2.45pm each Friday. This includes a look ahead at the coming week's weather and its possible impact on outdoor activities including, of course, what hill walkers and users of the Southern Upland Way need to look out for. The need for such a service was highlighted during the recent Newton Stewart Walking Festival when Geoff and Roland warned of the spectacular thunderstorms which affected one of the high level walks during an otherwise glorious week's weather - part of the warmest first half of May ever recorded!

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
