Local Artist: PAUL MOSLIN



Paul has been living in the Stewartry for six years now, the last year and a half of which have been in the Glenkens. Originally from the north of England, he developed an interest in woodworking whilst living in Ireland where, as a builder and plasterer by trade, he often did various joinery work and found that this was an area he really enjoyed.

Working with native Scottish hardwoods, Paul sources almost all of his wood locally. At present his workshop is based near Kirkcudbright but he hopes to find a suitable workshop space somewhere closer to home in the Glenkens in the near future.

Paul's work ranges from decorative, delicate mirror frames to huge double gates, practical, space-saving Irish settle beds to last-a-lifetime tables. His newest creation is a set of rocking chairs which he's christening the 'Granny and Granpa'. All of Paul's pieces are of a very high quality - solid and built to last - and are really tactile and welcoming.

The settle bed is an interesting item as the design is from an old Irish style that stopped being made years ago, and Paul doesn't know of anyone else who is making these. It is a straight-backed bench (see image below left) which folds out into a boxed-in bed - this design was used in days gone by to make efficient use of space and to keep

the drafts out whilst you were sleeping.







Glenkens Business Association

Following their Open Meeting in November a group of local businesses have signed up to take part in the Business Mentoring Programme. The group will be

looking at aspects of their own business which they wish to improve as well as how everyone can benefit from networking. If any other business would like to be involved they should contact Alan Rumble as soon as possible.

Scotland's most recent best kept secret is now out. Over the last few years the Scottish Government has been supporting a Scottish Homecoming 2009 to attract those with a Scottish background, or who have a love of Scotland, to visit next year. 2009 is the 250th Anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns. Susan Garnsworthy from the Dumfries & Galloway Arts Association explained how businesses can be involved.

This is an opportunity for Glenkens businesses to be seen across the world through the GBA membership website.

A new organisation is being set up to look at community projects in New Galloway. Two have been highlighted so far – the future of the Town Hall and of the Village Shop which is up for sale.

Following re-organisation of local government in the 1970s, ownership and management of the Town Hall was taken away from the then Burgh Council and ended up with Dumfries and Galloway Regional Council. A year or so ago the Regional Council indicated they would like the Town Halls to be owned/managed locally but the way in which local government is now organised prevents the Community Council taking direct control. Hence the need for an independent body to be set up. The shop and attached residential premises was put on the market in the summer. Whilst it is possible that it may be purchased by someone who has the intention of carrying on the business, this is not necessarily so. New Galloway as a community would be much the poorer without their shop. Other community shops in the area include Carsphairn and Auchencairn where the premises are owned by the community and leased to the shop proprietor.

It is planned to apply for grants to carry our a feasibility study on both projects and if possible to apply for appropriate funding.

Carsphairn Community Council

Exerps from minutes of the meeting held on 27th October 2008: Information was circulated on the research which has been done so far on the creation of a Carsphairn website. A public meeting will be called before the end of November to find out what the community wants on the website.

No new planning applications have been made for the Carsphairn area. Three members of the CC had viewed a consultation pack for a proposed development in the Carsphairn parish. The timescale meant that it could not be brought to the full meeting, but they were of the opinion that the development was of a style sympathetic to the area and saw no cause for objection by the CC.

Discussion took place about the grounds on which the CC could object with regard to planning. It is part of our remit to liaise with Planning and Roads and our opinion will carry a lot of weight with the planning authorities. However, if the application satisfies all policies and planning criteria, objections are unlikely to be considered. Discussion also took place on how Developments may affect the 'Right to Roam' and effects on Core Paths.

A progress report for the Community Garden was presented on behalf of the steering group. An artist's impression of the community garden has been commissioned. Quarry stone is available from a forestry site for dyking. Discussion took place on the practicality of transporting it and the amount of waste that would result on site leading to increased costs.

The Combined Services group has sent recommendations for improving street lighting. However, the Lighting Section has no budget at this time to carry out work and suggested that the Area Committee be asked for funding.

There have been suggestions in the community that there is a need for a Community notice board as well as the CC one. It is thought grants are available.

The next meeting will be on 26th January 2009, 7pm, Lagwyne Hall.

Three of these are in the Glenkens - Corsock, Balmaclellan and Mossdale Post Offices will be replaced by a mobile service. Balmaclellan will receive the mobile service for five hours a week, Corsock for two hours a week and Mossdale for four hours a week.

Small Schools' Cup: Castle Douglas HS 4 - 7 Dalry School

Dalry's under 14 team put in a superb display at Castle Douglas to record a convincing victory in the local derby match. A squad of twelve boys including two from P7 and another two who had never played an eleven-a-side game battled hard from start to finish and thoroughly deserved this unexpected win.

A hat trick from Connor and four goals from Captain Marvel, Greig, were backed up by a first rate team performance. Young keeper Ryan was faultless and supported by two solid central defenders, Jack and Darrel, whilst inexperienced full backs Ronan, Jamie and James stuck well to their defensive duties. Martin on the right wing provided the 'escape' ball by clinging to the touchline.

The midfield of Henry, Calum and William, who was unlucky to have what appeared to be a good goal chalked off, were totally dominant throughout, providing the ammunition for the deadly duo of Connor and Greig. All in all a fine team performance with a semi final against either Langholm or Sanquhar next.

Kells Primary - 2nd Green Flag!

Kells Primary School has been awarded a second green flag by the Eco School's assessors for the pupils' achievements in sustainable living.

One of their 'green' projects was the greenhouse made from discarded fizzy drinks bottles collected by New Galloway residents.

The children use graphs and charts to record the progress of recycling, and garden projects have become a part of the maths curriculum!



A Day of Culture in the City

On 13th November all seventy six of the secondary pupils at Dalry School took to their coaches for a day out in the city. The trip began at Kelvingrove Museum where students were dazzled by architecture, art and archives. Museum displays covered nature, culture and some famous works of art including a Salvador Dali and work from the Scottish Colourists.

A large group of pupils took the opportunity to walk to the Transport Museum and another group were invited to the art exhibition to enhance their Intermediate Art course. Lunch was accompanied by an organ recital in the museum. The afternoon was spent at the Theatre Royal watching a fifty year anniversary production of "West Side Story". The set was magnificent and the dancing was tightly choreographed. Pupils were stimulated by several contentious issues and honed their critical skills through discussion of the characters, actors, music, dancing and set. All returned enriched as a result of the foray into some of Glasgow's cultural offerings.

A Busy Year So Far at Dalry!

On the 22nd of September P4/5 went to a Tri-golf Tournament at Castle Douglas High School. They played Kells, Hardgate and Lochrutton, practising various skills at four different stations. The trickiest station was where you had to chip the ball through the hole and into the net – almost impossible! The children had a great time and enjoyed the opportunity to mix with different schools.

Last term P6/7 covered the topic 'The Olympics and China'. To give the children a chance of experiencing an Olympic style event, P6/7 took part in a Mini-Bowling Olympics organised by P6/7 from Kells. The children played in mixed teams and tracked their own points. At the end of the morning they celebrated the three top scoring teams; each team got either a gold, silver or bronze medal created by the P6/7 pupils from Kells.

The children had a fantastic time and really appreciated the children and staff from Kells organising the event, and the fabulous weather!

P1/2/3 have also been busy at sport and

are currently challenging themselves to sprint certain distances and improve their times. They had an initial training session with Sean Laird, Active School Primary Co-ordinator, and really did rise to the occasion with excellent sprinting times. Now it's up to P1/2/3 to improve their times before Sean returns for the final sprinting session!

Finally, the Nursery children have been working hard baking cakes to raise money for Children in Need. This was their fourth year running the event. The children at Dalry really enjoyed their home-made cakes - well done to the Nursery children and staff!



Windy Wigtown Book Festival

The end of September saw all of S1 and S2 wending their way down to Wigtown to join several other schools from the region to sample a day of authors and workshops. The marquee nearly blew away but did not dampen

pupils' spirits. They were, rather, inspired by the likes of J A Henderson and James Jauncey who both entertained and informed the troops. Afternoon workshops with the writers gave pupils the confidence to create their own pieces of writing, including poems.

The staff mingled with the authors in the green room over refreshments and both staff and pupils agreed that this was a most worthwhile adventure which they hope to attend again next year.

LOCAL HISTORY

NEW GALLOWAY - Our Historic Burgh

At Home During the War

During the second world war, while our young men and women were away serving their country, life at home continued, despite rationing, black-outs and other restrictions to add to the general gloom around us. However, there were some bright moments to cheer the inhabitants of New Galloway, and one of these occurred on 13th March 1940. On that day Mrs Margaret Paterson, the mother of Mr John Paterson, the local butcher and Senior Magistrate of the Royal Burgh, celebrated her 100th birthday at the home of her daughter in the High Street.

A telegram came from Buckingham Palace with the following greetings: "The King and Queen are much interested to hear that you are celebrating your 100th birthday and send you hearty congratulations and good wishes." Mrs Paterson also received a telegram from the Provost, Magistrates and Councillors of New Galloway, and later in the day Provost and Mrs John Courtenay called to offer their personal good wishes and presented Mrs Paterson with a beautiful bowl of white hyacinths. A quiet but cheerful party, attended by family and close friends, was held in the afternoon, an enjoyable and memorable occasion for everyone present.

14th June 1940 brought rumours of German paratroopers landing in the Mossdale district of the parish! While the police and military personnel searched the area the school children were sent home early - no doubt much to their delight. Of course, it all turned out to be a false alarm!

The New Galloway Book Club went from strength to strength during the war, and in 1942 the membership stood at sixty

six. Over 150 books had been donated by members of the community during that year, and a good selection had also been sent from the County Library. All were very much appreciated by the members. The number of actual issues to readers had increased over the previous year, from 2,538 'borrowings' to 2,996 in 1942. New Galloway residents were obviously keen readers.

In June 1944 the sudden death of the teacher at Clatteringshaws School resulted in the pupils being sent, temporarily, to Kells School. There they remained until November 1945 when a new teacher was appointed at Clatteringshaws.

8th May 1945 saw the end of hostilities in Europe, and the young men and women who had been away gradually began to return home to resume their normal lives among their families and friends. A celebration to welcome them was planned by the Council, and in June 1946 a Presentation and Supper was given as a Welcome Home to the Service Personnel of New Galloway and Kells Parish. The Presentation took place in the Park, and after an address by Provost Paterson and ex Provost Warnock, Sir Andrew Agnew, CBE of Glenlee, presented Commemorative Scrolls to relatives of those who had given their lives. Lady Agnew then presented a Welcome card and £14.10/- to each of the women of the Services, followed by Sir Andrew presenting similar gifts to the men.

Later that evening around 130 service personnel and families enjoyed a splendid supper and dance in the Town Hall, a happy occasion for all present.

HistoryStop - Glen Trool (card 13)

Over the next few issues of the Gazette we will be featuring areas of historical interest around the Glenkens as highlighted on the Glenkens HistoryStop cards. These cards focus on a particular local area or feature which you can then choose to visit if you like. The full set of History Stop cards is available for purchase at The CatStrand, New Galloway (you can also purchase them individually).

Glen Trool is a Forestry Commission village which was built in the 1950s to house their workforce and is within Galloway Forest Park. There is a Visitor Centre in the village. Nearby, Caldons contains a memorial to six Covenanters (1638-88) killed on the spot whilst attending an open-air prayer meeting, and Bruce's Memorial Stone commemorates a famous victory against the armies of the English in 1307; said to be the turning point in his wars of independence.

There is an inscription inspired by Sir Walter Scott on the bridge at Buchan Burn and the Old Bridge of Minnoch is an archaeological site of a remote bridge. A Bronze Age hoard was discovered some

years ago and you can see King's Cairn, Sheuchan Cairn and The White Cairn that are more than 3,000 years old. Directions: Glen Trool is close to Clatteringshaws Loch on the A712 Queens Way road through Galloway Forest Park, to the west of New Galloway.



GLENKENS OBJECT OF THE MONTH

A 'Cribbie' or 'Niddy-Noddy'

This wooden tool was used in local farms and cottages in the 19th century and earlier for making up hanks of linen or wool yarn after it had been spun on a spinning wheel. The yarn was wound between the two short ends. The winder kept count by repeating the verse:



UP THE CRIBBIE,
DOON THE CRIBBIE
CRIBBIE, YE ARE YIN
UP THE CRIBBIE,
DOON THE CRIBBIE
CRIBBIE, YE ARE TWA
ETC...

This example is believed to be from Knowehead in Carsphairn Parish, but this was a common implement in use throughout Galloway.

Each month a different 'Object' from The Stewartry Museum, Kirkcudbright, is on display at The CatStrand, New Galloway.

Make sure you have one properly fitted on each level of your home, and don't be tempted to remove the batteries to power a Christmas present!

On the Second Day of Christmas... Check your Christmas tree lights, make sure the wiring isn't split, and check they conform to a British Standard. In addition check you have the correct fuse. Always switch them off and unplug them when you go to bed or leave the house.

On the Third Day of Christmas... Never leave candles burning whilst unattended, and make sure they are on a non-flammable base, and keep

10 Top Tips for Health

- **1.** Avoid ready meals. A quick meal can be a piece of grilled meat or fish served with salad or vegetables.



A miniature of the hall adorned the birthday cake, baked and decorated by Mrs Sheelagh Rusby, who had also executed the

greatly admired programmes. Mrs Jean Turnbull, nee Murray, cut the cake and is a great niece of George Murray who provided the hall in 1908.

As his great grandfather had before him, at the opening of the hall Mungo Bryson was entrusted with the toast to Parton Hall and to Mr George R Murray who built the hall for the benefit of the community, and to leave the school reserved for purely educational purposes and the present library would be transferred to the new hall.

It was left to Mr Alistair Nelson to give the vote of thanks to speakers Mr Alex Fergusson and Mr Mungo Bryson, Mrs Jean Turnbull for cutting the birthday cake, the caterers and croupiers and anyone who had helped to make the evening a success with memories of Auld Lang Syne.

During an interval Sam Callander was 'knocked for six', being presented with a tartan clad box containing a bottle of 'mountain dew' and crystal glass inscribed with 'Floreat Partona 1908-2008' (the hall's, not Sam's, age) by the members in recognition of the time he gives to the community.
