Can You Get Broadband?

Last year the Scottish Government initiated the Broadband Reach Project for Scotland to create broadband access for anyone in Scotland who could not yet receive this service. The deadline for applications was last May, but they have recently stated that they are still willing to take late registrants.

If you are unable to get broadband due to your distance from the exchange but were not aware of the Government's project until after the cut off date for registrations (31st May 2008), your name can still be added to the late registrations list.

"You must be out of reach of conventional broadband and unable to get even 512k down over the copper network," says Project Manager Helen Foster. "The latest date for inclusion on the late registrants list will be the end of March. Contracts must be with Avanti (the company completing the broadband installation) by the end of April 2009 and installation completed by the end of May 2009. After that, it is not anticipated that there will be another broadband project of this nature or any more funds available from the Scottish Government."

Regarding the project, it is stated that: "We must stress that at this stage, we cannot make a commitment or promise to deliver broadband to any late registrant as it depends on the funds available, and our priority is for delivery to the eligible people who registered before the cut off date. We will, however, do the best we can to make the available funding go as far as possible."

Local Artist: CRESSA MCLAREN



Cressa McLaren, local glass artist, first started working with glass 12 years ago. She says: "My first interest in glass came when I undertook a one year portfolio course in 1996. My final exam piece was a desk combining wood and stained glass panel doors; my adventure with glass had begun!"

"Over the next few years I worked and travelled, and eventually decided to head back to college to study furniture making. I wanted to gain a further understanding of how to combine glass and wood in other forms. Although interesting, the wood working wasn't for me - I now knew my passion was for glass only."

After a one year break, time to have her first child, Cressa undertook a two year course in Architectural and Decorative Glasswork, and found that this was definitely where she wanted to be. "I learned and practised all forms of glassmaking in this time and decided I wanted to make a career out of producing and selling my glass work," says Cressa. "After having my second child I moved out of Glasgow to Laurieston, with its beautiful countryside and great craft network. I knew Dumfries and Galloway would be a good choice to bring up my young family and start my business."

Setting up Cressa's Glass Works in 2006, her work at present is centred around the processes of 'fusing' and 'slumping' glass. "I work with bulls-eye opaque glass due to the vibrant colours available and the unique reaction which can be achieved when fusing the glass together," says Cressa. "My main inspiration for design comes from botanical forms, shapes and patterns created within the natural world. The finest detail of a dried dandelion or the simple repetitive structure of a hemlock flower inspire me to create designs which are intricately pieced together using glass 'stringers'. I also make lead panels or fully fused to commission."







Glenkens Business Association

The GBA continues to keep abreast of developments at regional and local level.

At the meeting on 21st January Tony Fitzpatrick and Helen Friedrichsen from the Dumfries & Galloway Economic Regeneration Unit were present to discuss the new Regional Economic Strategy. The strategy aims to create innovative and sustainable rural economy through four themes; business infrastructure, growing business, quality of life developing and competitive а workforce.

The GBA will be discussing ways in which the businesses of the Glenkens can link into and benefit from the regional objectives.

Last autumn the GBA Chairman and Vice Chairman were invited to attend a meeting at which Keith Legge, Chief Executive of the Scottish Youth Hostels Association, explained the Association's proposals for Kendoon Hostel.

The number of visitors to the hostel does not justify a full-time seasonal manager or a series of volunteer managers, so this season the hostel will basically be run on a 'Rent a Hostel' basis. As there is the need for some upgrading work, including the replacement of the septic tank, the SYHA is looking for ideas from the local community for the longer term future of the hostel.

LOCAL HISTORY

NEW GALLOWAY - Our Historic Burgh

Post War New Galloway and the First Gala Day

By the late 1940's most wartime restrictions were a thing of the past, although rationing was to continue for a few more years. Life in New Galloway was peaceful in the extreme, with the Burgh court being surely one of the quietest in Scotland. The average was two court cases in a year, but in 1947 not one case had to be dealt with! A very good record.

In November 1947 Provost John Paterson had a very pleasant surprise. Up until that time he had no chain of office, but when Mr and Mrs CW Forbes of 'Earlstoun', Dalry celebrated their Golden Wedding they marked the occasion by presenting a chain of office to New Galloway Burgh.

In 1949 a few public spirited citizens of the burgh got their heads together and decided to start a new venture in the way of entertainment for the local people. A committee was duly formed and the foundations were laid for the New Galloway Gala Day, the aim being to hold what was hoped would become an annual event, and to establish a fund devoted to the improvement of public amenities.

The committee consisted of chairman Mr S Douglas of the 'Kenmure Arms', Vice Chairman Mr Andrew Robb of 'Mains of Kenmure', and the Secretary was Mrs Agnes Milligan. Subcommittees were elected for Childrens' Sports, Foot Events, Mounted Sports and Fancy Dress Events.

To set the ball rolling a Gala Dance was held on July 9th in the Town Hall, music being provided by the Starry Nights Band, and admission was 2/- (10p). A Whist Drive and Dance was held on

Friday 22nd July, and the Gala itself was on Thursday 28th July at the 'Mains of Kenmure' by kind permission of Mr Andrew Robb.

The childrens' sports started at 2.00pm and the events were judged by Mr D Wardlaw of the 'Schoolhouse'. Among the winners were J Pringle, D Marshall, J McQueen, I Milligan, J McNaught, E MacDonald, and Y Wardlaw. The Fancy Dress Parade followed, assembling at the Sports Field for judging by Mrs Hyslop of 'The Cottage' and Mrs Simmons of 'Meadowbank'. Carol MacDonald was the best dressed girl, and Hamish Yeoman was best dressed boy. The best couple were Alice and Gordon MacDonald. The most comical adults were Mrs R McGill and Miss A McCubbin, and Alistair MacDonald was the most comical boy. Once the judging was over the procession paraded through the High Street to the Golf Club, then back to the Town Hall where they dispersed.

Later the Mounted and Foot Sports took place at the Sports Field. There were races for both married and single ladies, three legged races, and Five a Side Football, this being won by the 'Mossdale Station Crocks!' Mounted events included a Farm Horse Gallop won by T Robb, and Pony Jumping won by Miss L McWilliam (now known to us all today as Mrs Lilias Thomson) on her pony Barney.

The decorated vehicle prize went to 'Bonnie Galloway', and the best dressed bicycle was won by J McQueen. The first New Galloway Gala Day was a tremendous success, and it was to become, as the committee hoped, an annual event for many years to come.





Love Tokens







You may be familiar with the rhyme: "There was a crooked man and he walked a crooked mile. He found a crooked sixpence against a crooked stile. He bought a crooked cat, which caught a crooked mouse. And they all lived together in a crooked house."

But, did you know that there really were such items as crooked sixpences? The bent sixpence was made to be kept as a good luck charm along with many other items which were thought of as bearers of good luck. An old English superstition explained that a bent coin should always be kept in a pocket or purse and it would ensure that its owner would always have a pocket full of money.

The crooked sixpence also served another purpose - in medieval times, until late in the 17th century, it was the custom for a gentleman to bend a coin and give it to his beloved as a token of his love and a sign of his intention to marry her. The coin was not to be spent, but instead, to be carried always by the woman as a demonstration of her fidelity, a constant reminder to her each time she opened her purse.

The difference between the good luck symbols and those given as love tokens was that those used as good luck charms to bring monetary fortune were usually bent through the centre, while those made as love tokens were usually bowed or even cup-shaped.

In the 18th and 19th centuries coins continued to be used as love tokens. They were handmade by suitors who gave them to their sweethearts. These love tokens were always flat. Poorer working class young men made their tokens from copper coins. The wealthy young man could use a silver or even a gold coin. Love tokens varied in size from the cartwheel penny of George III, to the smaller farthings. They were made simply and sometimes highly decorated. The coin would be rubbed down on both sides, until the monarch's head and other details of design were removed. The young man then engraved or stamped his own

design and message onto the blank disc he had created.

Considering the fact that most of the men who created these love tokens were unskilled and most-often illiterate, some of the results are quite remarkable. Decorations ran the gamut from finely-decorated to very crude. The symbols that were included used romance and love as their theme, so there were many hearts, Cupid's bow and arrow, hearts and arrows, flowers, doves, lovers' knots were often included, as were the initials of the young man or his sweetheart's.

Victorian times brought with them a whole new crop of love tokens. Because the waistcoat was a fashionable part of gentlemen's clothing and a watch was worn in the waistcoat pocket, one would often find coins hanging on a watch chain. The coins were usually farthings, silver three-penny pieces, and sometimes even sovereigns. The coins of lesser value were the ones which had one side filed down and the name of a beloved engraved upon it.

At The CatStrand during February you will find some examples of love tokens found in the Glenkens by local minister and metal detectorist David Bartholomew. There are four examples of crooked sixpences - one is a William III sixpence of 1699, two are too worn to make out any details, and on one you can just make out the bust of William III. There is also a crooked George II farthing of 1746 found at Dalry (perhaps a local lad trying to get his girl on the cheap!) as well as five examples of halfpennies of George II and III which have been worn smooth and inscribed. Most or all are probably love tokens. One token, found on the Holm of Dalry, is inscribed 'JONATHAN ROBINSON', and has also been bent in a crooked fashion. Another from the Holm of Dalry is inscribed 'LYN'. Two from Carsphairn are inscribed 'BARCLAY' and 'PF LUNKE', or something similar. A final one from Dalry has 'BT' on one side and some more obscure letters or symbols on the other. No more highly decorated love tokens have so far been found. **David Bartholomew**



Chimney Fires: Soot and un-burnt particles of fuel build up in chimneys over time. Eventually, they will catch fire. Call 999 straight away if you have a chimney fire!

Why are Chimney Fires Dangerous? The chimney could send an avalanche of burning soot into your living room. If there are any cracks or defects in the lining of your chimney, it could start fires on the floor of the house. Unless you've had one, you won't believe the mess a chimney fire causes - even if it doesn't burn the house down. Signs of a chimney fire:

- Burning particles falling out of the chimney
- A roaring sound in the chimney
- Chimney breast too hot to touch
- Hot walls in upstairs rooms
- Sparks or flames coming out of the top of the chimney

WHAT TO DO: if it's safe to do so, douse the fire with water. Try to cut off the air supply at the bottom - close all vents, block the fireplace with metal plate if you have one - put the guard up, get everyone out and call 999!



With obesity levels increasing at an alarming rate and diabetes rates following along, we possibly need an even better understanding of how this is happening within modern day diets and lifestyles. Here are a few of the many reasons for weight gain:

- Eating very glycaemic foods i.e. eating carbohydrates that raise blood sugar levels very quickly (surprisingly, a baked potato has a high glycaemic index of 85, compared to lentils at 29).
- Eating poor quality foods containing lots of sugar, saturated fat and chemicals e.g. flavour enhancers.
- \vec{j} Lack of activity could be due to poor weather, lack of time in daylight, television and computers, etc.
- Lowered metabolism the result of being on a lot of diets and/or lack of the nutrients needed to increase metabolism.
- Feating biscuits and cakes as well as, and instead of, nutritious meals.
- The laying down of fat to store toxins from food chemicals.
- Being addicted to chocolate and sweeties.
- Lack of self control in a 'sea of plenty' it can be hard to stay on track. Food manufacturers are preying on the fact that the 'feel good' component of their foods make us overeat.


