# **Audience Vote Youth Players Top Act**

The play 'We'll Be Home Tomorrow' by Wayne Denfhy centres around the escapades of a family during a holiday to the seaside and demands a great deal from the cast with no scenery or props involved.

The actors simply had two black boxes to help them present the different holiday scenes depicted. The two boxes became a car, a mountain, a diving board, a roundabout, a stage, an ice cream stall and even a picnic table at various times throughout the play.

The adjudicator, Mr Dave Bennett, praised the imaginative use of the boxes to give variety of stage pictures and also the very efficient and natural movement of the actors and the boxes around the stage. He was particularly impressed with the excellent attack, projection and confident comedy timing shown by such a young team.

Overall he was very impressed by the direction and interpretation of such an entertaining play and although this was easily the youngest team in the

competition he could clearly see that all of the young actors on stage were enjoying performing and this was reflected in the warm reception from the audience. He

recognised great potential in all of the cast and encouraged them all to continue acting and enjoying the experience in the future. During his summing up at the end of the Festival he picked out one of the lines from the play as the best comedy moment of the week.




# 100 Years in the Royal Burgh

# Local Artist: PHIL MCMENEMY







Phil McMenemy is a local photographer based in Laurieston. Recently, he judged the Glenkens Transport Initiative photo competition, which must have been a challenge as there were so many great photographs.

"I really enjoyed judging the GTI competition and was chuffed to have been approached to do so," says Phil. "I judged the images on display from a purely personal perspective and not necessarily from a technical one. The winner was a fantastic effort — full of fun and a great human perspective. Some of the images really made me smile — they were great."

In May last year Phil opened the Gallery at Laurieston at his home, Woodbank House, situated in the village. Phil says he has "really enjoyed the experience of being open regularly on Sundays and at other times by appointment. I've met some really nice, informed and friendly folk through the Gallery and my work."

When asked what inspired him to take up photography as a profession, he states; "I was having a bit of a mid-life-crisis and had left the nursing profession after many years and really wanted to do something completely self-directed and different to what I was used to doing — and here I am."

With the beauty of nature all around, it's easy for Phil to work on his favourite subject "the outside". He says: "We are incredibly lucky to be where we are, I try to appreciate it every day — when I'm fortunate to have the time to get out with my camera it completely reinvigorates me. What strikes me about our landscape is the variety on offer — we've got the lot.

"I am originally from Barrow-in-Furness but spent many years in London and Manchester before settling in Galloway. We had visited the area many times on holiday and were lucky that an opportunity arose for Louise (my partner) to progress her Doctoral career in this splendid region – fate, really. Since we have been in Galloway we have had two boys Alex aged three and Joe aged six months, so, as you may imagine, things are rather busy for us!"

# The Royal Burgh of New Galloway ধ্য Kells Community Council

It is hoped to install an electricity supply to the burgh sign to allow it to be lit and also provide a power point for the Christmas Tree. Estimates have been requested and a funding application will be submitted to the Area Committee.

Funding from the Homecoming Fund would also be applied for to help with the promotion of The Alternative Games weekend.

PC Bruton reported several cases of vandalism and one of suspected fire raising in recent weeks. Police enquiries into the incidents were progressing well. He is also aware and concerned about children riding their bikes after dark without lights. Several people have reported witnessing 'near misses' with cars and even youngsters riding down West Port at speed and straight across the High Street without stopping! PC Bruton is addressing these issues through the schools and the imminent cycling proficiency training.

A new raised flower bed has been installed at the junction near Clearwell. Various maintenance issues have been attended to recently, mainly potholes etc.

Residents are asked to report any maintenance matters around the parish to Vic McIntosh who collates the items and reports them to the relevant council departments.

The April meeting will be held one week later than normal on Monday 20th to avoid the Easter Holiday.

# **Dalry Community Council**

#### Proposed development of 28 Affordable homes in Dalry:

Mr Lynch, Operations Manager with Dumfries & Galloway Council, opened the presentation by explaining that they had a legal requirement to produce affordable housing and it was their aim to tackle the shortfall of affordable homes across the region. Dalry had been specifically identified as a 'pressured settlement' with a priority need to invest in social rented houses and shared equity homes. Funding comes from the Scottish Government, the Council and DGHP. It is therefore proposed that 20 rented homes are built and eight shared equity homes (40% ownership by DGHP). The January Housing Sub-Committee agreed to support the Dalry project to the

tune of £200,000 and also to support additional infrastructure costs.

Mr James Shirazi from DGHP then took the floor. He explained who they were and what their aims are. He confirmed that there would be no flats, the 2-3 bedroom homes would be 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  story and there would be two single level homes along with a central play area.

Their application is due in next week and plans would be made available to view thereafter. Copies of the plans would also be provided to the committee for circulation to residents. He was adamant that there was sufficient need locally for the proposed development.

Upon questioning he confirmed that DGHP would own the site by next week. He was also asked to explain why the change in ratio. The original plans by the private developer had 20 private homes and eight affordable homes. He believed that the new proposal would work and did not want to have un-saleable stock on his hands by keeping to the original ratio.

He was further questioned on the prospect of guaranteeing local people will be given the properties. He suggested that, along with D&GC, they would look at introducing a 'local letting initiative'.

Among other concerns raised one was about Road Safety. Mr Shirazi informed us that a speed table would be built to slow down traffic upon entering the site but he made no mention of any traffic measures for the A702. The other concerns included medical care and policing.

Mr C Frame, the architect, also gave a presentation on the design of the houses and the layout of the estate. Whilst the presentation was visually acceptable, unfortunately many of the people present could not hear him very well. The general consensus was that whilst the majority accepted that some social housing was needed in the area, they were more concerned with the amount of homes proposed and who the property would be eventually given to.

The presentation was duly concluded and G Bell thanked everyone for attending and the meeting moved on to matters on the committee agenda.

Next meeting Monday 6th April 2009 at 7pm in Town Hall.

# Glenkens Schools Teamwork

The appointment in February of Mrs Kelly Devine to the post of Depute Head Teacher of Kells Primary School was the final piece in the Glenkens schools' new management structure.



With effect from February 2009, Fraser Simpson becomes Head Teacher of the three local schools; Carsphairn, Dalry (primary and secondary) and Kells. Each of the three primaries has a teacher with day to day management responsibilities; Mrs Devine at Kells, Miss Tracy Lamont, Depute Head at Dalry, and Mrs Margaret Heuchan, Principal Teacher at Carsphairn.


Mrs Devine, who was previously employed in Twynholm and Sheuchan Primaries, lives with her husband and young son in Newton Stewart. Prior to moving to this area she worked in schools in Peterborough and Kent.



Already the new arrangement is producing closer working arrangements with two very successful staff in-service sessions looking at the practicalities of the Curriculum for Excellence; pupils from the three schools have worked together during the Tree of Knowledge day and the First Base Drugs and Alcohol Awareness Session. This is a foretaste of the types of shared developments that will be beneficial for all the youngsters in the area and, from a staff viewpoint, it will make curricular development work more efficient and effective.

The success of GCAT has shown what collaborative working in the Glenkens can achieve – our schools must now seek to emulate that success.



# A Look At New Galloway's Robert Heron by Ted Cowan

In the year which marks the 250th anniversary of Robert Burns' birth adulation of the bard is almost universal, while vilification of New Galloway's most talented native son has correspondingly intensified. Robert Heron (1764-1807) has long been condemned and traduced as Burns' first biographer. His Memoir of the Life of the Late Robert Burns, which appeared in 1797, has rendered Burnsians apoplectic ever since. What was Heron's crime? He reported that Burns was over-fond of drink, women of pleasure and the company of lowlifes. He was a melancholic who squandered the money he made from his poems and proved a lousy farmer at Ellisland, where Heron visited him. As an exciseman in Dumfries he totally surrendered to dissipation. There is an element of substance in each of these charges, proven or otherwise, yet what fascinated Heron were not Burns' failings but rather his achievements. He considered the poet a genius, a great man, solely of God Almighty's making, or to put it another way much favoured by thinkers of the Scottish Enlightenment, he was a natural whose amazing gift could not be rationally explained.

Robert Heron was no slouch himself. At age 11 he became a pupil-teacher; at 14 he was in charge of Kelton school. He trained as a minister at Edinburgh University but was rescued by his love of literature, becoming a prolific editor, writer, translator and hack. Many of his works are still worth reading. He wrote on Law, Natural History, the French War, the Hebrides, Chemistry and Geography and he produced a six-volume History of Scotland. Perhaps his most lasting publication is Observations Made on a Journey through the Western Counties Scotland which presents a brilliant picture of Galloway and the Glenkens written by an amusingly knowing insider who sought to assess the impact of Enlightenment and improvement upon the landscape, the economy and the people. He had read widely in the contemporary works of Scottish luminaries intent upon developing theories of progress and the perfectability of Humankind.

Heron, however, had a serious problem. Addicted to drink he was consigned to prison for debt before he was 30. Recurring bouts of drunkenness and profligacy reduced him, as he wrote, "to the very extremity of bodily and pecuniary distress" and to further confinement. He died a pauper.

In reality Heron could hardly have been more fulsome on the subject of Burns. He perceptively observed that "he exalts for a time the genius of his reader to the elevation of his own; and for the moment, confers upon him all the powers of a poet". He never knew Burns to be guilty of any deliberate meanness. Through his writings he had exercised a greater power over folk and "by consequence, on their conduct, upon their happiness and misery, upon the general system of life, than has been exercised by the most eminent statesmen of the present age". Heron was convinced that as a child of nature Burns must return to nature, because this son of a New Galloway weaver regarded

himself as similarly fated, an astonishingly gifted individual whose remarkable talents could admit of no explanation and who, for all his achievements, was a sadly flawed individual. So far as Heron was concerned he and Burns were kindred spirits. When his detractors criticise him they condemn Burns.

#### 250th Anniversary of the Birth of Robert Burns

In 1996, to mark the bicentenary of the death of the poet, New Cumnock Burns Club published Chris Rollie's acclaimed Robert Burns and New Cumnock, which quickly sold out. This year, to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the poet's birth, the Club are to publish Chris' second book, Robert Burns in England. This covers Burns' travels in England and sheds new light on an important aspect of his life, largely untouched hitherto. The manuscript has been warmly received by Dr Ken Simpson, Honorary Professor (Glasgow University), renowned Burns scholar and Founding Director of the Centre for Scottish Cultural Studies, University of Strathclyde. In a letter to Chris Dr Simpson states: "Your book represents a major contribution to Burns scholarship. There is a wealth of new information here, meticulously researched and lucidly set out; and your style makes the material accessible to a wide readership without in any way compromising its scholarly importance."

# Midsummer Cushion in Spring



I normally come on my first primroses in early April, in peregrine and raven haunts in the hills. Imagine then my surprise the other week (21 February) when my wife Catherine pointed out two primrose flowers catching the early spring light on a wooded bank, with snowdrops nearby. I was astonished, but immediately fond memories of past springs flooded in, collecting posies for my mother, who was always uplifted by them - as she was equally by catkins and bulrushes. I guess the picking of wildflowers and catkins is frowned upon by many and indeed by the law in the case of protected species.

One of my favourite poets is John Clare, to my mind the greatest of all nature poets in our language, and certainly one with the most incredibly detailed knowledge of nature. Around 1832 Clare said that it was "a very old custom among villagers in summer time to stick a piece of greensward full of field flowers and to place it as an ornament in their cottages, which ornaments are called Midsummer Cushions". Indeed, he chose this as the name of a collection of wonderful poems, but which was only published a few years ago.

Apart from enjoying that lovely image, I am also amazed and cheered that those cottagers just couldn't get enough of nature; surrounded by it as they were, with no artificial trappings of our modern times - and far more nature besides - and yet they wanted even more and brought it into their very homes! Modern medical research tells us what deep down we probably all already know; that nature and wildlife watching is very healthy and good for us. Indeed, they say that it has even has benefits without our realising it. Of course, they don't know why, but could it just be that we're a part of nature and it's a part of us, whether we like it, know it, or not? Who knows. But I do know that those primroses, those catkins and those croaking frogs were all wonderful to behold again as winter eases into spring and the sun gets ever higher in the sky. Bring it on.



Aince the tables were cleared, chairman Alistair introduced Maister Mike Duguid, ex Squadron Leader RAF, and entrusted him with the main toast o' the nicht, namely that of the Immortal Memory to Robert Burns. This was delivered in an accomplished and informative manner, different, full of knowledge, how the Bard dealt with the different situations and different people — a rale pleasure tae listen tae — Mik Duguid was guid!!

Did they just play yin tune? Twa tunes? Naw. Keen an' confident they jist telt the accompanist what they were playin' next. Quite a repertoire! Bendetti an' Kennedy – Watch Oot! Maister Vincent Mason, a doonhamer noo resident in fair Edina, but wi ties here in Parton, wis trusted wi' the Vote o' Thanks, whish wis weel put tegither. 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

Spring is on its way, although winter still has time for one last hurrah. Take care on the roads as we can never allow ourselves to become complacent. Our rural roads require due respect all year round - remember, there's no such thing as a bad road, only bad drivers. As spring brings in the lighter nights we all look forward to getting out and about more. I will soon be involved in our annual program of cycle training for primary seven children and I remind parents that they must take responsibility for instilling basic road sense in all their youngsters and if they don't have the ability to keep themselves safe on the road then it is your responsibility to accompany them or keep them off public roads. Remember the High Streets of our small villages are all main roads, not playgrounds. I don't wish to be all gloom and doom, but please keep expensive garden equipment under lock and key.

A couple of recent rural thefts could almost certainly have been avoided by any form of security measure other than "it's in the middle of nowhere so nobody will touch it". During lambing, as always take that extra minute to remove the quad keys and lock up about the steading, it may be an inconvenience when you are busy and tired but not nearly so inconvenient as losing valuable equipment. Finally, several acts of petty, mindless vandalism have also occurred over the last few weeks across the Glenkens. These appear minor in isolation but as a community we must pool information in order to secure evidence to detect and deter these offences becoming commonplace as they are in some larger towns. Don't allow this minority to spoil our beautiful area.
