Carsphairn Coming Home



On Sunday 3rd May an original 'Homecoming' event 'Carsphairn: The Pupils Come Home' was held as a farewell party for Miss Anne Rutherford's retirement.

Having been Head Teacher of Carsphairn Primary School for 27 years, there were many pupils past and present in attendance, along with their families. With over 100 guests, many people had travelled from far-flung regions of the UK, and members of the community who had been involved with the school at various times over the years were also present.

The speeches started with Lucy Blackett, presently in Primary 6, who read a wonderful poem remembering good times with Anne. Following this, past pupil Helen Campbell made a touching and humorous speech recalling some of the memorable moments of her school days, and finally Fraser Simpson, now Head Teacher of all the Glenkens Schools, gave an interesting account of the ways in which Anne has worked through a number of major changes in education over the past 27 years.

There were photographs spanning nearly three decades, computer slide-shows, food, wine and laughter – all in all it was a wonderful get-together enjoyed by all. Sylvia Sinclair, a longstanding member of the local community who has been involved with the school for many years, said: "The afternoon was a great success and we wish Anne Rutherford a long and happy retirement!"

Having been a member of the club for over 25 years. Liz knows the turf well. She says: "I was treasurer for seven years and it was just a natural progression really. I was the first lady on the committee as well, which was a big step amongst all these men!"

The club is made up of about eight or nine women out of the total of 36 club members at present, and it has always had a high ratio of men to women. Liz says: "I enjoy the game, the company and the friendship in it – win or lose, it doesn't matter. You lose more than you win".

The club meets twice a week, Monday at 7pm and Saturday at 7pm, both for a sweep game. There are other competitions as well, both within the club and in conjunction with other clubs. Men play the league on a Tuesday night for seven games, but there aren't enough women to play a ladies league. There are two open competitions a year when people from other clubs come over, one in June and one in July, and the club will have its centenary in 2012, so there will be celebrations for that.

Local Artist: AMANDA SIMMONS



Amanda Simmons of Corsock Glass has travelled a winding path to get where she is today. "I started as a BT engineer in the South East of England at 16 (at that time the only female engineer in the region)," says Amanda. "I stayed four years but realised I wanted to work closer with people and not machines so went to Kings College University to study Biomedical Sciences and then a BSc (Hons) in Clinical Sciences whilst training as a clinical perfusionist (medical technician that runs the heart and lung machine during cardiac operations).

After working in this field for eight years, Amanda needed a change. "I studied many art forms but

stained glass summer school and finding kiln formed glass I knew I had finally found my medium; within a month I had started my own studio producing stained glass panels and kiln formed glass to commission. Further study at Westminster College and then a Postgraduate Certificate in Glass and Architecture at Central St Martin's School of Art and Design in London gave me the confidence to go full-time as an artist, coinciding with our move to Dumfries and Galloway."

When considering why they decided to move to the Glenkens, Amanda says: "There are many reasons for re-locating here; the quieter pace of life and the terrific landscape drew us here after visiting for many years and making good friends in the region.

"I make kiln formed and cameo engraved glass, mainly for gallery exhibitions around the UK and produce work

Arts in Healthcare, which would combine my two passions of glass and science. Recent exhibitions include a spotlight show at Blackwell Arts and Crafts House near Windermere (now stocking their excellent contemporary craft shop), Gifted at the National Museum of Scotland and The Affordable Art Fair in London (represented by Cafe-Jello, a glass specialist gallery in Cambridge). This year I have been selected to show at Origin: The London Craft Fair, which is the UK's principle selling event for makers of contemporary craft. It's an extremely difficult show to get into and I am very happy to be representing Dumfries and Galloway!"

But what is it about glass that Amanda finds so fascinating? She says: "I am very process led and love working with glass because of its technical and chemical challenges. The firing process for me is just the beginning as much of my work is done with 'cold working' the glass using diamond tools and a lathe to engrave designs, grinding to give form to my vessels and sandblasting which gives my trademark 'matt' look to the glass. "We have been in Corsock now for three years and my husband and I love it here. For a small community there is a lot going on and it is so good to know and speak to your neighbours.

Soldier's Memorial Access Update

As we reported in the last issue of the Gazette, the Forestry Commission has recently improved access to the Soldier's Memorial which overlooks Loch Ken between New Galloway and Mossdale.

This involved several days work by a team from the Forestry Commission using chainsaws and a large chipper. Access to the memorial is now from the car park at the foot of the Lowran Burn - walk towards New Galloway and take the first track sharp left through the trees and then follow it to the memorial. The track is very boggy and 'wellies' are advisable, but otherwise it is a relatively easy walk and well worth it for the view. Archie McNeillie from the Forestry Commission says he expects to have signposts installed later in the summer and is hoping to be able to improve drainage on the track although he is not yet able to plan this work.

The memorial is to John Murray of Troquain who was killed in the First World War. Information on war memorials in the Glenkens and the rest of Scotland can be found online at www.scottishwarmemorials.co.uk

An application for funding for a full feasibility study has now been submitted. This study needs to be done before application can be made for a grant to purchase premises. It will include further and more detailed consultation on what the community feels is needed over the next several years. It will also look into the financial costs and sustainability of projects. In the meantime there has been a meeting with the officer from the Council who is responsible for the Town Hall. We have been told that there is money set aside within the budget for repair works and for disability access. A condition survey is being organised by the Council. When this is done there will be further discussions and consultation.

The Royal Burgh of New Galloway & Kells Community Council

The Annual General Meeting was held in New Galloway Town Hall on Monday 11th May. The Provost, Mrs Margaret Sainsbury, gave her comprehensive report of the year's activities ranging from the threats to the local Post Offices and the Town Hall to development of the new Loreburn Housing at Carsons Knowe.

The Community Council had also marked the auspicious occasion of our oldest resident Miss Nettie Murray's 100th Birthday, and also the retirement of Mrs Nancy Plummer after 27 years as Head Teacher of Kells Prmary School.

The Provost thanked all Community Councillors for their commitment throughout the year and also Mrs Joan Berkley who had retired as Secretary in February. Mr John McGaw then presented the Treasurer's Report.

Mrs Margaret Sainsbury was unanimously re-elected as Provost. Mrs Maybelle Thomson will continue as Vice Chairman and Mr John McGaw as Treasurer. The members were pleased to note that Mr Chris Newman of Carson's Knowe, New Galloway, was interested in taking on the role of Community Council Secretary. He would be invited to attend the next meeting.

Before the meeting, members were pleased to present cheques for £500 each to Macmillan Cancer Relief and The Maximum Attack Leukaemia Appeal. The donations were made from the proceeds of last year's Alternative Games.

The cheques were accepted by Mrs Irene McFadzean on behalf of MacMillan Cancer Relief and by Gordon Clendinning for the Maximum Attack Appeal Fund.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 8th June 2009 at 7.30pm in New Galloway Town Hall.

Carsphairn Community Council

A lack of road gritting during the winter months was mentioned by the Councillor present, George Prentice. There was discussion about particular roads where there was a problem.

It was reported that the Scottish Government have dropped the idea to lease Forestry Commission forest but still want to plant more forestry, they just need a new way to finance it. It was agreed that the CC would oppose this but no action was to be taken at this time.

Near the A713 north of Carsphairn, branches have been baled and there are now enormous piles awaiting transportation. It was agreed to write to Charles Clemie, head of the Timber Transport Forum, asking about this and Councillor Prentice said he would ask too. Councillor Prentice was asked whether it would be standard practice, as it will significantly increase the amount of timber lorries going through the village. The subject of scoping reports was raised — one will be done in July for Carsphairn forests. This is the chance for local people to give their views. It was mentioned that when a scoping report for Drumjohn forest was received by the CC they gave a lot of feedback but were unsure if this was taken into account at all. It was agreed that more information on the next scoping report would be sought.

Discussion was held on the matter of refuse collection. It was thought that the new cost of 50p per Council refuse bag and the £30 per item for collection of white goods would increase fly tipping.

It has been suggested that there is a need for a community notice board as well as a CC notice board as there are often too many notices for the shop windows. It was agreed to approach CarsphairnVillage Shop (CVS) Ltd as the owners of the building. Date of next meeting — Monday 29th June in Lagwyne Hall at 7.00pm.

Margaret Elphinstone in Conversation with Tom Pow, Fri 5 June, 7.30pm, £5


For six thousand years after the last Ice Age, Scotland was home to bands of huntergatherers. They left little trace, but one event is known to have occurred Around 6150 BC a

NEW GALLOWAY - Our Historic Burgh

Changes for Better or Worse

The 1950's and 1960's saw many changes in New Galloway, some were for the better, but others were not welcome at all. A certain amount of building was carried out in the village, when in 1950 the Council built six new two-storey houses in Braeside, and a few years later the Forestry Commission started their housing scheme in the same area. The new Kells Primary School appeared in 1961 to replace the old Victorian school in the High Street.

This airy, modern building was a great improvement, although its flat-roofed design was not as attractive as the traditional old school. It did, however, have a lot more space around it with room for a good playground, a decent-sized football pitch and a garden. Three new Forestry Commission bungalows to house senior foresters were built backing onto the new Kells Primary School, completing the housing in that area.

During this period several of the older cottages in the village were, if not derelict, in bad condition and in need of either complete renovation or demolition. Luckily for New Galloway most of these houses were bought by private buyers. and refurbished without spoiling their outward appearance.

In the early 1960's British Rail, who had taken control of our railways in 1947, began making noises regarding the closure of certain 'unprofitable' lines in rural areas. One, named on Dr Beeching's 'hit list' was our own 'Paddy' line, which, owing to increased goods tariffs and increased passenger fares, was not being used as much as it had been in the past. In 1965 plans were laid to re-route all London to Stranraer traffic via the Ayr and Girvan line, adding almost forty miles to the journey between Dumfries and the Stranraer ferries. Stranraer ferries.

The axe fell on Saturday 12th June 1965 when the last passenger train ran through the lovely Galloway countryside. There was sadness and anger in the area as the local residents had always had a certain affection for 'their' railway. As the last train was due at about 11.00pm, a group of people gathered at Mossdale Station to witness the sad occasion.

The train drew in to the platform and people gathered to speak to the crew. Some shook hands with the driver, fireman and guard. Then with a melancholy blast on the whistle the last 'Paddy' drew away from the station on its final journey into history. A few people stood around on the platform until the lights were switched off and the train could be heard no more. The 'Paddy' had died'

Although there were bus services to Castle Douglas there was a feeling locally of being cut off, deprived of a service which had, over the last century, become so much a part of the lives of the community. Soon the tracks were lifted and the railway was no more than a memory.

The 1970's brought further changes to the way of life in New Galloway. The new Local Government Scotland Bill was given Royal Assent in 1973, opening the way to a revolution, not always welcome, in local administration.

The old system of County, District and Burgh Councils

which had operated satisfactorily for many years was to be replaced by a two-tier system of Regional and District Councils, with a voluntary provision for 'Community Councils'. Our well respected Burgh Council, which had been in existence since its inauguration in 1633, was to

Many people were afraid of the small Burgh losing its identity in a welter of paper and bureaucracy, but in 1975 'the powers that be' assured everyone that the new Community Council could, if it was formed, take the Burgh forward! It would have no fiscal powers, but would merely act as a 'watch dog' to express local opinions to the District and Regional Councils. It would also be in a position to organise traditional local events traditional local events.

Community Councils were eventually formed but only if the residents of the area made a positive approach to their district council. The New Galloway Burgh Council held its last meeting in 1975, chaired by Provost Jack Paterson. Soon afterwards the residents of the village and the surrounding area were making a very clear demand to the Stewartry Council. As a result of this, the Royal Burgh of New Galloway and Kells Parish Community Council was formed and held its first meeting in 1977 under the able chairmanship of Mr its first meeting in 1977 under the able chairmanship of Mr Alastair Warren.

And so, although we no longer had our own Burgh Council, and had not the same control over our own affairs, New Galloway, our historic burgh, could look forward to the future.



Health Tips: Top Tips for Healthy Meals During the Credit Crunch

by Nutritionist and Dietician Lorna Willock

- 1. Use plenty of vegetables e.g. carrots leeks and onions to make hearty bowls of soup or to bulk up stews.
- 2. Make use of pulses a cheap source of protein with a low glycaemic index (keeps us fuller for longer). A ham end with some lentils or split peas can make a hearty bowl of soup.
- 3. Try sprouting beans e.g. mung, aduki. Sprout pre-soaked beans in a jar with muslin on top and leave by the window. Rinse and strain a couple of times a day and watch them grow. N.B. Do not leave them too wet or they will rot. Use in salads, stews, stir-fries, lunch boxes or just for snacking.
- 4. Have a shot at making your own bread or scones. Adding seeds to the bread will increase it's health benefits and not strain the purse. Scones, preferably wholemeal, are good for filling up hungry children. Dropped scones are another simple, quickly prepared snack and you can sweeten them with honey rather than sugar.
- 5. Use the bread above with some local farm eggs to make 'eggy bread'. Kids love it and it is a more nutritious start to the day than coco pops, frosties or crunchy nut cornflakes.
- 6. Old-fashioned puddings such as crumbles and pies can be tweaked to

make them healthier. Use spelt flour and add some nuts and/or seeds to the mix. I add sunflower seeds and walnuts. Cut back on the sugar - most crumbles are really sweet.

- 7. Make your own museli this is another breakfast food that will sustain you until lunchtime without the need to snack. Mix rolled oats with plenty of seeds and nuts that you love and add a little dried fruit to sweeten the mix. Sometimes I omit the dried fruit and add some fresh at breakfast time. It keeps for a while in an airtight container.
- 8. Even easier start the day with a bowl of porridge. You won't find a cheaper, more filling start to the day.
- 9. Cook together chicken and brown rice with lots of chopped vegetables and some stock. This is literally a meal in a bowl and you can take a flask to work with you.
- 10. Buy cheaper, nutritious cuts of meat and fish. Slow cooking of tougher cuts of meat can make them melt in the mouth – experiment a little and have a chat with the local butcher and fishmonger. They will have plenty of ideas.
