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CARSPHAIRN SHOW 2009

Carsphairn Show, being the first Agricultural Show of the season in the South West, has always been well recognised, and this year was no exception.

The Show started early Saturday 6th June with the first of the entered seventy dogs running in the Sheep Dog Trials at 8am. This year the Open Section winner was Fergie with Max from Straiton, Confined, Bert White from Dalry with Bracken and the young handlers were led by R Welsh from Patna with Maid. J White, with Jess, was third in the Young Handlers section. The Dog Trial goes on all day and can last until after six in the evening, when the rest of the Show is long finished.

As time drew on in the morning to 10am when the Show sheep arrived, entries were taken on the Showfield for the 28 classes. The early classes were for the local parishes, and this year's 'Confined' Blackface Champion was from Messrs Ramsay, Knockreoch. David Pringle's hogg from Marbrack was the Shepherd's Champion, and also the winner of the 100th Show Trophy. At midday the Open Blackface Classes began and this years Open Championship was awarded to Messrs Barrie, of Cambret, Carsluith, who also won the Overall Championship, the prize being a meal for two kindly donated by the Lochinvar Hotel. Other classes on the day were held for Bluefaced Leicester (Champion Robert McTurk, Glenhowl) and Any Other Breed (Champion McMillans, Newton Stewart). The Champion Mule went to Messrs Lockhart, Culdoach.

Just before the Judging for the Furmiston Interbreed Trophy, Alex Fergusson MSP was invited to present local shepherd David Pringle with the Royal Highland Agricultural Society's Long Service Award Medal for thirty years service at Marbrack. Natalie Vardey is a local jeweller who has recently created a unique range for The CatStrand. Fine attention to detail would probably best describe Natalie's approach to her work, with every piece being honed to perfection.

"I have been knitting, crocheting and weaving precious metals for years, developing the traditional skills I was taught as a small child, literally at my mother's and grandmother's knees." However, these are not the only techniques used by this talented jeweller, who has been living and working in Balmaclellan for the past 19 years. "I work in silver and gold and each collection is different. Whether weaving fine threads into delicate necklaces, hammering textures for highly polished earrings, or using acrylic with silver, I make each piece of jewellery by hand, using few machines and basic tools. I also make wedding rings and special jewellery for brides, work I particularly enjoy".

The Royal Burgh of New Galloway & Kells Community Council

The members were very pleased to welcome Mr Chris Newman, as the new Community Council secretary.

The main topics discussed at recent meetings were as follows: General complaints received by the members recently had mainly centred around the general lack of maintenance of the public areas and of the Town Hall. Whilst the Park grass is regularly cut, the other grass areas around the burgh do not seem to be maintained as regularly as before, if at all. However, some of the grass areas are apparently not the responsibility of the Council but are supposed to be maintained by Dumfries & Galloway Housing Partnership. As this argument had arisen in previous years it was agreed that the relevant Council department should be asked to produce a definitive map to confirm the different areas of responsibility once and for all.

The condition of the exterior of the Town Hall continues to deteriorate and many locals and visitors have commented on its dilapidated appearance. This subject is raised at every meeting and whilst the council have previously said that they would make good the exterior before the Hall was taken over by a proposed management committee, this could potentially still be some time away and the longer the situation is left, the more expensive it would be to remedy. The members felt that it would be much more cost effective to redecorate the exterior now and would press for action to be taken without further delay.

It was agreed that a street map and information regarding local facilities and amenities should be added to the new Red Kite Information Board. It was noted that an area adjacent to the Lower Car Park had now been fenced off by the land owner and the route of the footpath had been diverted and signposted. The Council now own the main area of the Car Park and are planning to carry out improvement works in the near future.

It was reported that the future funding of New Galloway Fire Cadets was uncertain. It was felt that this had been a highly successful project, pioneered in the region by New Galloway Fire Station. Every effort should be made to ensure that the scheme is continued and hopefully introduced to other areas in the region. Members were pleased to note that The Fire Cadets would be helping at this year's Alternative Games with gatekeeping and stewarding duties.

Community Council elections are due to take place in October this year.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 10th August at 7.30pm in New Galloway Town Hall.

Carsphairn Community Council

There has been a problem of dog fouling in the village, and George Prentice agreed to contact the community warden and give contact details. PC Bruton reported that information was received about drugs in the village and a warrant was issued and acted upon by police. Knockengorroch World Ceilidh passed peacefully, with only one anti-social incident. PC Bruton will make enquiries about feral goats on the B729 as several people have almost collided with them recently.

Meetings were held in Lagwyne Hall in April to inform the public about proposals for grid connection at Margree and Blackcraig wind farms. Some concern has been expressed about the high voltage and the increased risk to health. It was agreed to write to Scottish Power expressing concern about health risks and asking for information.

A returning Officer has to be appointed before the elections in October. All were asked to consider before the next meeting. A new secretary will be needed after the election - the secretary need not be an elected member.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 31st August in Lagwyne Hall at 7.00pm.

Dalry Community Council

AGM: The Chairman reported that there had been a successful party for the Senior Citizens with an attendance of 50. Appointment of Office Bearers: Chairman - G. Bell, Vice Chairman - A McKay, Treasurer - M Newton, Secretary - C Rae, Minute Secretary: M Jones. Councillor Prentice reminded the committee that in September the Community Council have to stand for election.

A survey has been carried out by the Trustees of the P Young Trust showing that in the last two years 14 people have applied for property and they have housed six. If the DGHP plan went ahead then Dalry would have a 38% proportion of affordable accommodation. The Scottish proposal recommends only 25%. Figures have been submitted to the planning office. Finally there has been no information available as to when the planning committee will meet to discuss the application. It has been agreed to support the Glenkens Business Association project 'Destination Glenkens' and further investigations will be made as to becoming a partner and electing a representative to go on the steering group.

Full minutes of local Community Council meetings are available to view at Dalry Library.





LOCAL HISTORY

THE DEUGHSIDE COVENANTERS

Deughside, later re-named 'Bridge of Deugh', was a small, pastoral farm on the northern slopes of Dundeugh Hill close to the steep sided gorge on the Water of Deugh, later to be known as the Tinkler's Loup. All this area is now submerged under the waters of Kendoon Loch.

Robert Smith, who lived at Deughside, and his son William fought at the battle of Bothwell Bridge in 1679, a vicious battle in which the Covenanters suffered a severe beating by the government troops. Robert was sorely wounded but with the help of his son he managed to reach home where he died soon after.

William knew it was no longer safe for him to remain at home, and, leaving his younger brother and sisters at the farm he took to the wild hills for refuge. However, even before he had time to escape, one of his neighbours, Robert Canon of Muirdrochwood, saw him and sent a band of passing dragoons to search for him. William luckily managed to take cover below a small turf covered bridge near his house, while his faithful dog, which was with him and which he feared might give him away, fled into the hills and only returned after the dragoons had gone away.

On their way back to the garrison at Carsphairn the dragoons came upon a young woman, and thinking she might know of the hiding-place of William they arrested her and tortured her by applying the thumb screws to her, but she told them nothing and eventually she was released. This young woman was Mary McClymont of Dalmellington. Her father had suffered grievously for the cause and Mary had thrown all her youthful energy into supporting the Covenanters in any way she could.

William Smith returned home under cover of darkness, but the next evening Canon of Muirdrochwood returned to Deughside with a party of dragoons, determined to find William and get the reward for his capture. Thankfully William's dog barked a warning and William had time to escape from the back of the house and once more take refuge in the hills. He and four other men hid in a small cave at Craigdow, but soon they realised it was not safe to remain there, and they decided to scatter and find hiding places individually. William made his way west towards Dalry and was led to a refuge in a deep gorge on the Water of Girvan on the farm of Camregan by Mary McClymont, who was taking food to two men who were already hiding there - she was staying with her uncle at Camregan.

After a while a spy discovered their hiding place so Mary and the three men had to flee for their lives. Mary went to relatives at Glenmuick, the first house across the Stewartry boundary in Ayrshire to the south of Dalmellington. By coincidence William had found a refuge among the rocky cliffs at Wolf Craig to the north of Glenmuick. One of the local shepherds spoke of seeing William up near the Muick Water and Mary overheard him, so the following evening she hid near the spot where he had been seen, and saw her friend returning to his hide-out.

She took some food there the next day and left it for him, as he was not there. This went on for a number of days, then some troops arrived at Glenmuick and roughly questioned Mary. She ran from the house and along a narrow path high above the glen, followed by the drunken troops. One thrust at Mary with his sword and missed her, falling over the precipice to his death. Later she found the sword and took it to William in his hiding place.

Not long afterwards, during a brief lull in the persecution, Mary and William were married at a Conventicle held in a secluded glen near the farm of Bowmoore on the Water of Deugh, but they still had to split up each night, Mary returning to Glenmuick and William to Wolf Craig.

The local shepherds helped to protect them by constructing a secret chamber within a peat stack which they built against the gable end of Glenmuick, with a hidden access from the house. They used this secret hide-out for many months when danger threatened, and were here able to enjoy some privacy.

During a period when persecution was less intense in Galloway, Conventicles were again held and people sought to encourage one another in the faith. Robert Canon of Muirdrochwood heard of a Conventicle taking place on the march between Dundeugh and Marscalloch and alerted his friend McMillan (possibly a tenant in Marscalloch which was owned by Canon), also a persecutor of the Covenanters, and they alerted the troops garrisoned at Carsphairn. Soon the Conventicle was surrounded, and Mary and William with some trusty friends took up their stand beside the minister. William was wielding the sword which Mary had given him. A number of people were injured as they fled, and McMillan approached William and entered into combat with him. Eventually McMillan dashed his military cap into William's face and ran him through with his sword. Mary quickly seized her husband's sword and struggled with his murderer who overcame her and dispatched her also. It was said that from the sword wound in her breast flowed forth a mixture of blood and milk, showing that she was nursing a baby which had then been left

McMillan was filled with remorse at the sight of this and swore never to use his sword against a Covenanter again. He returned that night with two or three more trusty soldiers and they buried the bodies in the moss where they had fallen. They took an oath never to reveal where the two were buried.

Around 1830 some locals were cutting peats on Marscalloch Koss and they found two well-preserved bodies which they believed to be the two martyrs, William and Mary Smith. No doubt they covered the bodies up again and left them to rest in peace. We do not know exactly where that place was, and no memorial was ever raised in their memory.

As people gathered on the lawn in front of Mr and Mrs lan Watret's home at 'Marscalloch', overlooking Kendoon Loch, midges appeared and bottles of midge repellant were shared among the ladies and gentlemen.

Soon the gathering of almost fifty people were settled, and it was with great pleasure that we beheld among our number Mrs Bella Wood, who at the great age of 97 is the oldest inhabitant of Dalry. Rev Dr David Bartholomew opened the 2009 Conventicle and as is traditional, only psalms were sung. This year's service began with Psalm 95, "O, come and let us to The Lord" to the tune Kilmarnock. This was followed by the Old 100th "All People That on Earth Do Dwell". Not long after the service commenced the clouds slowly rolled away, the sun broke through, and to everyone's delight a nice breeze gradually dispersed the midges!

Dr Bartholomew's sermon told of the harsh and cruel treatment of those who adhered firmly to the Covenant and refused to accept the episcopal system. All the kirkyards in the Glenkens contain graves of those who chose death rather than compromising their beliefs and principles. Dr Bartholomew then recounted the story of William and Mary Smith as, appropriately, the congregation looked down on Kendoon Loch, the waters of which now cover the site of 'Deughside'.

The collection was gathered in the traditional way, in a blanket, and after a further prayer the Conventicle closed with a spirited rendering of "O God of Bethel" to the tune Salzburg. It was interesting to note several cars, passing along the road, slowing down while the passengers obviously speculated as to why the Minister was preaching to a gathering of people on the front lawn of this attractive Galloway cottage!

Tea and coffee and some really scrumptious refreshments were provided by the ladies from Carsphairn to be enjoyed in this idyllic setting, and thanks must go to all those who made the Conventicle a delightful social gathering. Many thanks, also, to Mr and Mrs Watret for hosting the event, and for thoughtfully providing chairs for those without rugs or chairs of their own. Mr Jim Sloan did a sterling job of marshalling all the cars as they arrived.

To Dr Bartholomew, our thanks for once again finding an interesting and most attractive location in which to hold this year's service. Where will we be gathering next year? We look forward to it, where ever it may be.

NATURE 8 WAREDERFE

The Bum-Clock Humm'd wi Lazy Drone!



The merry month of May?! In the depths of winter, or indeed on dull days at other times of the year, the thought of May with all its delights brings comfort to my soul. This year, though, for the most part it just failed to arrive in anything but name. It wasn't so much the rain, but cold easterly winds and dreich days with little sun. However, thankfully some glorious exceptions served to charge the memory banks for future sustenance.

On one of the better days, I enjoyed a familiar stroll down the River Ken footpath from my home in St John's Town of Dalry (I usually just call it `the burn', but I particularly remember being upbraided by an elderly man in a local hotel, who insisted on it being the River Ken – I suppose he was right). From the foot of the `boat weil' (way) and downstream from the kirkyard on Newfield is an absolute delight. Traditional and sensitive management by the Edgars on this part of their farm produce a wealth of interesting wildlife. The riverside strip as far as the Kirkland boundary is not cut for silage, and grazing in the back end allows a plethora of wild flowers to prevail, with all the attendant insect and birdlife – it is truly wonderful, especially in May when birds are in full song and insects are on the wing.

One of the dominant plants is pignut conopodium majus, which requires old permanent pasture of this kind. It is an umbellifer and has a delicate and loose composite head of small creamy blossoms, with succulent, bulbous nuts underground. I have fond childhood memories of digging these up and eating them - we called them groundnuts. Yellowhammers, so rare now in much of the countryside following the decline of cereal production, are still to be found on Newfield and Kirkland, thriving amongst the rougher areas and enjoying the leftovers from the traditional grain production on the former. Their haunting song `little-bit-of bread-and-no- cheeeeeeese' is a most welcome sound on such days — as are the tunes of chaffinch, mavis (song thrush), blackbird, whitethroat, willow warbler and greenfinch, amongst others. It really is a rich area, with

whitethroat, willow warbler and greenfinch, amongst others. It really is a rich area, with wild rose, gorse and hawthorn scrub providing lots of safe nesting habitat for these birds, and the wild plants providing an abundance of seed and insect food.

An insect that very few birds tangle with is the bumclock. These magnificent creatures, also called cockchafers or May bugs, emerge from wild swards in the gloaming in springtime, especially May. The wild and unimproved vegetation of the flood bank and adjacent strip on Newfield is ideal for them and many are the times I've been daunering down the bank enjoying the air, when one of these huge hummers has drifted up past my lug, half-frightening me to death and eliciting some half-formed oath. They certainly keep you on your toes, but all part of the glorious attractions of the season. Burns cited these beauties in the perfect conclusion of his Twa' Dogs.

FURMISTON JUBILEE

On 31st May 1889 over 100 people attended the 60th Jubilee of notable farmer, Mr John Harper. He had farmed Furmiston for 60 years and a celebration had been arranged including a marquee, food, speeches, songs and poems. Even the Dalmellington Brass Band were in attendance.

And so, 120 years later to the day, Carsphairn Heritage Group were invited by David and Jean Gibbon (present occupiers) to visit and mark the occasion. The 're-enactment' included a photograph being taken in the same field as that taken in 1889, and although the Brass Band were not in attendance, Nigel from the village treated the visitors to some tunes on the cornet, accompanied by Margaret Sloan. Visitors on the day included descendants of some of the original attendees in 1889, and some previous occupiers of Furmiston. Copies of the speeches and poems from the original event can be seen at the Carsphairn Heritage Centre.
