Gordon's Cycle Challenge

Gordon Mills, from the Lochinvar Hotel in Dalry, recently completed the 'LEJOG' 2009 – Land's End to John O'Groats cycle challenge to raise money for cancer research.

The journey commenced on 3rd October, with Gordon and fellow cyclist Glen Rossell raring to go. Although it was a long stint, it sounds like a great time was had, with 975 miles covered in 11 days.



Gordon says: "Great trip - all completed with only two punctures! Stops along the way included Bodmin, Tiverton, Pill, Ambleside and St John's Town of Dalry, to name but a few. The stint from Ambleside to Dalry, 117 miles in the rain, was particularly gruelling. Glad it's finished and I can truly say I am not missing the Lycra!

Dark Skies for Galloway Forest Park

The 75,000 hectares of the Galloway Forest Park, which includes a large area of our Glenkens, has another feather to add to its cap - it is the first Dark Skies Park in the UK, and the first outside of the United States.



The largest forest park in the UK, the Galloway Forest Park is home to the 7Stanes mountain bike trail, and parts of the Southern Upland Way. It has great fishing, canoeing and hill-walking as well as spectacular scenery and wildlife, and now with its Dark Skies status, its appeal doesn't even diminish after dark.

The Dark Sky Association set up these awards with the aim of informing on the effects of light pollution, conserving energy and being aware of and looking after nature. The rural location and lack of light pollution in our area creates an environment dark enough to study the skies in all their grandeur. Less than 10% of the UK population can see the full beauty of the night sky, but here in the Glenkens, we can see over 1000 stars including our own Galaxy, the Milky Way.

The Sky Quality Meter Scale (0-25) measures the park's skies between 21-23.6, near to total darkness, giving it Gold Tier Status - the highest achievable. The Forestry Commission website suggests many places within the park where telescopes can be set up and includes Clatteringshaws Visitors Centre car park and the Galloway Red Deer range car park.

Local Artist: Carol Taylor



Childhood Memories by Carol Taylor... I was born in Dumfries in 1957 and grew up in the beautiful wee village of St Johns Town of Dalry. I was a pupil at Dalry primary and secondary school until the age of 16 when I had to attend Kirkcudbright Academy for one year to study for my Highers. I left the area when I was 17 to become an art student at the Edinburgh College of Art where I studied sculpture for five years.

I miss the rolling hills of Galloway and visit my parents and the area regularly. Life as a child and teenager in Dalry had a profound impact on me as an artist. I met the artist Kim Redpath (the painter Anne Redpath's nephew) when I was 8 years old. His home and studio were 3 miles away in Balmaclellan where I spent many weekends learning to draw and paint. He was my art teacher at Dalry School and we have remained friends for the past 44 years. Kim was my mentor, a real inspiration, and still is today at 83 years of age and he is still painting!

My Dad was the village policeman and my Mum was the assistant cook at school. We didn't have a butcher in Dalry so my Dad fished the rivers for salmon and trout; he went shooting so that we could eat meat. Game was our staple diet along with a fantastic range of vegetables from my Dad's large organic garden.

We had a very rural, rustic upbringing close to nature and the hills, lochs and the river Ken. My Dad loved nature, gardening and photography. I decided when I was 9 years old that I would go to art school and become an artist. I spent my childhood in Galloway drawing and painting everything around me and realise now that I was inextricably linked into nature.



I currently live and work in my studio situated in my garden in a beautiful rural location in South Lanarkshire, Scotland. I am currently involved in collaborations with scientists

who "explore and explain the world of plants" (RBGE). I feel it is vital to explore ways in which artists, scientists and community can work together to combat pollution and raise awareness about sustainability and other environmental issues.

The Royal Burgh of New Galloway & Kells Community Council Election of Councillors October 2009 - there being no poll, ten

Election of Councillors October 2009 - there being no poll, ten candidates remain validly nominated for the Community Council. Continuing councillors being Margaret Sainsbury (Chairperson), Maybelle Thomson (Vice Chair), John McGaw (Treasurer), Brian Edgar, Andrew Frew, Vic McIntosh and Jimmy McKenna. Three new councillors are Chris Newman (Secretary), John Boyd and John Thom.

The popular annual Alternative Games (held in August) brought in gate money of £2,010.00 plus donations from stallholders etc. With most of the expenses now accounted for, the dispersal of funds will be discussed at the next meeting of the Community Council on 7th December 2009.

A number of maintenance issues reported to Dumfries & Galloway Council have been dealt with satisfactorily, others await confirmation or completion. A further issue being dealt with by the Community Council is the possible provision of a bus shelter at Achie Bridge bus stop at the lower car park, to serve the residents of Carsons Knowe area.

Arrangements for the Senior Citizens Christmas Lunch to be held on Sunday 13th December 2009 are progressing well.

Balmaclellan Community Council

The Returning Officer described procedure at this first meeting and shared sources of guidance and information for Community Councils, including the code of conduct, constitution and guidelines. Introductions were made, with members of the new council being Chris Bird as Chairperson, Clive Brayshaw as Vice-Chairperson, June Hay as Secretary and Jane Brayshaw as Treasurer. The date and time of subsequent meetings were confirmed as usually being the last Monday of the month.

Christmas Lunch will be on the 17th December at the Ken Bridge with 50% cost paid by council (tbc). It was agreed to attend the Convention of Community Councils. It was agreed that a loan of tables to St Margaret's Church would be made – a donation would be welcome. Regarding the village hall, there is enthusiasm in the community for the hall to be used more and a need for it to have its own committee. Following discussion, it was decided to hold an

open meeting regarding this. On a different note, the local Access Officer is to be invited to attend the January meeting.

Carsphairn Community Council

Regarding the Core Paths, although the council is obliged to prepare a Core Path Network, they are not legally obliged to implement it. There is no budget for maintenance of the proposed core paths.

The condition of the bollards on traffic islands at both ends of the village are a matter for ongoing concern. There is still no lamp on the island at the North end and the southernmost bollards and lamp were demolished in a recent accident - the traffic islands do not seem to serve their purpose in slowing down traffic and in their present condition they present a hazard and seem to cause accidents. This issue will again be brought to the attention of Charles Clemie. The Carsphairn community website is progressing – a site has been established and work is ongoing.

The Duchrae planning application is being looked into and it was agreed that the CC would write again to express concern on increased traffic through village and general detrimental effect on roads surfaces.

An out of court agreement was reached between Knockengorroch Community Interest Company and Scottish Power which prevented Scottish Power from restricting vehicular access to festival-goers which allowed the September event to go ahead. KCIC is currently in negotiation with SP over access to secure the future of these community events. It has been established that we now have a Cashless Payphone in Carsphairn. A BT card is needed and these are available in shops. The chairman will find out if they are available in Carrick's. It should also be possible to use a credit card, but at the moment it doesn't appear to accept them! Instructions displayed in the box are not clear and some are irrelevant or out of date.

The Shop and Heritage Centre are willing to take leaflet and bags for dog fouling. A letter to village dog-owners and holiday houses is still to be composed. Neil Dyson confirmed for November meeting regarding timber transportation — the format for the meeting and invitations to other CCs was deferred to the next meeting.

Full minutes of local Community Council meetings are available to view at Dalry Library.

Dark Skies story continued from front page... The Galloway Forest park is, of course, accessible by foot, bicycle and by horse for the more adventurous, but for those who prefer to drive, our own Raider's Road (open Friday night till Sunday afternoon) and the Carrick drive (open early April to October) also offer a good view of the night sky. The Forestry Commission, one of the bodies involved in this initiative, is eager to point out that Dark Skies is part of their conservation policy. Energy conservation along with responsible use of exterior lighting not only allows us to see the glory of our night skies, but it also benefits our wildlife who live according to our planet's cycle of day and night and who can be confused by our electric lit 24 hour lifestyle. They point out that we can all help maintain the glory of night skies with simple measures; turning off exterior lighting when not needed or pointing down exterior spotlights. It all helps.

For those of you interested in stargazing and learning more about the night skies, the Wigtownshire Astronomical Society aims to promote and advance public education in astronomy. Set up in 1998 the Society, run from the Galloway Forest Observatory, has a full programme of workshops and classes that focuses on encouraging a popular interest in astronomical study and observation. Kells in Action

The open morning is an opportunity for people to watch the classes in action and for everybody to contribute to the direction of the school, ensuring Kells reflects the values of it's community.

Also, we are having a Rag Bag Textile Recycling Scheme pick up from school on Wednesday morning, 9th December, to raise money for school funds. Any unwanted clothing, textiles, shoes, bags, hats, belts, towels, curtains or bed linen in black bags would be gratefully received. These could be brought to school anytime after 8.30 a.m. on 9th December.

Our school Christmas production is on Thursday, 10th December, two performances, at 1.30 p.m. and 6.30 p.m. P1-3 are performing "A present for the baby" and P4-7 will be entertaining the audience with carols.

Harvest Assembly: On Friday 2nd October Dalry school held their annual Harvest Assembly. The P1/2/3 pupils and Nursery children led the assembly in front of a lot of friends and family. Everyone contributed a lot of produce for the harvest table and then stayed after the assembly to help share it amongst nearly one hundred bags. The children, with parents and staff, then went out into the community and delivered each bag to one of the Dalry locals. Everyone enjoyed the day and our local residents seemed very pleased with their gifts.



Dalry Small School Sports

On Wednesday 7th October Dalry School held a Small School Sports event. Pupils and teachers from Hardgate, Kells, Carsphairn and Crossmichael Primary Schools came to join us. We played rugby, netball, and rounders, and even though it was really cold, quite a few parents came out to watch us! We all had a fantastic time and hope to make it an annual event.

Christmas Dates for Dalry

There are two musical events taking place in December at Dalry School: Tuesday 8th December at 1.45pm - Good Neighbours Concert combined with primary open afternoon. Tuesday 15th December - combined Dalry Primary and Secondary Christmas Concert - 7pm. In addition, there is a combined Christmas service in Dalry Church for all three local primary schools - Dalry, Kells and Carsphairn - on December 18th at 10am.

Dalry School Remembrance Day Assembly

The remembrance assembly at Dalry School began with Mr Simpson, the head teacher, giving an introductory talk on the passing of Harry Patch who died this year and was the last British survivor of World War I.

The assembly then took a different direction this year. A short talk was given by Paul Goodwin who is the school ICT Technician but also the Regional Volunteer for the War Memorials Trust. He explained the importance of War Memorials as a focus for remembrance and the work the trust does on preserving War Memorials. He went on to give a presentation with slides on Adam Byers who is commemorated on the New Galloway memorial and who was killed in the trenches in 1916. A small murmur went around when the pupils realised that two of them now lived in the house where Adam Byers had left to go to war. At the end of the talk Paul presented the results of the research to the special guests of the day, William Galloway from Twynholm who is the Great Great Nephew of Adam Byers and William's Grandmother Margaret who actually knew Adam Byers' sisters and widowed mother.

Mr Simpson then asked all those present to stand in turn according to a card each were given as they entered, representing the number of WW1 men listed on each of the four parish memorials in the Glenkens. By the end of which, almost all were standing and everyone was left with a strong impression of the number of men killed.

After the two minutes silence, S3 pupil Henry Sainsbury read 'In Flanders Fields'. Reverend Dr David Bartholomew went on to read from a letter to the bereaved parents of Robert James Clark of Dalry who was also killed in the first World War. The assembly ended with the usual prayer of remembrance.

Carsphairn School News

The children at Carsphairn Primary school have been busy during November and December preparing artwork and finding facts about Carsphairn for the annual School Calendar Enterprise. Children have been learning about different printing techniques as well as painting and collage for the artwork to be included in the calendar.

Over the last 6 weeks children at Carsphairn have also had visits from two different writers. Shoo Raynor, an author and illustrator visited the school and was able to show the children how he came up with different stories and where his ideas came from for his characters. Another author, Lari Don travelled from Edinburgh to visit the school twice during November, working with the children on improving writing skills and helping them to find ways of writing stories. LOCAL HISTORY

The Identity of the Glenkens

Glenkens folk know that they are fortunate to dwell in the very heart of Galloway with its neat farms rooted in a stunning historic landscape of woods, water and wilderness. But what precisely is the extent of the district – from Polnaskie Bridge to Parton or Cairnsmore of Carsphairn to Clachanpluck - the spectacular glen harnessing the waters of Ken, Deugh and Carsphairn Lane while poaching on the resources of Loch Doon thanks to the ingenuity of Hydro technology? The name first appears in a document of 1275 mentioning the deanery of Glenken, an administrative subdivision of the medieval church. Another example is the deanery of Annandale. Glenken comprised the parishes of Kells, Dalry, Trevercarcou, Kirkandrews Balmaghie and Kirkandrews Parton. Surprisingly, perhaps, Crossmichael was not included. There is dispute about the identity of Trevercarcou but it was presumably the old name for Balmaclellan before the latter emerged in the fifteenth century. Carsphairn was carved out of Kells and Dalry around 1640. Thus by today's reckoning Glenkens might properly include the parishes of Carsphairn, Dalry, Balmaclellan, Parton, Balmaghie and Kells.

In 1300 Sir Adam Gordon was granted half the Glenken by John Maxwell son of Sir Herbert Maxwell of Caerlaverock. Sir Adam in turn conferred these lands upon his son William, progenitor of the Gordons of Kenmure. Another document of 1300 declared that Gordon and everyone living in the Glenken were freed from the antiquated and much resented convention known as 'surdits de sergeants' which gave the sergeants or officials representing the lords and barons of the area the right to billet themselves and their men on local householders. They could also accuse individuals of crimes and in some cases they had powers to administer capital punishment. A few years later the 'Community of Galloway', a very interesting descriptor, petitioned for the end of the pernicious practice which had supposedly been banned everywhere in Scotland a generation earlier but which persisted in Galloway. It is ironic that sergeantry should be used as a crude weapon in this area at the outbreak of the Wars of Independence, involving the brutal practice of billeting 300 years before the advent of Bluidy Claverhouse and Grierson of Lag during the Killing Times.

Robert Bruce, having triumphed over the Balliols who held Kenmure Castle among other strongholds, exchanged his lands of Kinfauns in Perthshire for Glenken in 1313 thus showing his determination to control the important north-south route from Carrick to the Solway. Glenkens was Gaelic-speaking in the fourteenth century. In 1365 Gilmor MacAulay McCormack granted Stroangassel in Glenken to Aulan son of Aulan McCormack. A year later David II

granted the New Forest of Glenken to Sir Walter Lindsay and his wife Euphemia Ross. Within a decade it was back in the hands of the ever-receptive Maxwells. Today it is memorialised in the Forrest Estate.

The Glen was for long considered remote and barbarous. The Rector of St John's Town of Dalry, 'in the Glenken', petitioned the pope to be permitted to raise money for the repair of his church, 'which is situated in the woods, far from the habitation of other Christian faithful and among fierce men ill-versed in the faith'. The church was so decrepit that unless it quickly received help it was likely to prove ruinous. Shortly after the Reformation the earls of Bothwell held the extensive estate described as the lands and barony of Earlstoun, 'called the Glenkens'. The plural form of the name probably arose to describe the group of parishes that was by now understood to make up the district. Government orders during the Covenanting era referred to 'the parishes called the Glenkenns', which they designated as Carsphairn, Kells, Dalry and Balmaclellan. These four had provided the main inspiration and support for the misleadingly named Pentland Rising of 1666, which would be better described as the Glenkens Rebellion. Andrew Symson in his Large Description of Galloway (1684) noted that the same four parishes, 'because the river of Kenn runs through them', were commonly called the Glenkennes. One of many addresses against the Union of the Parliaments in 1707 which led to the creation of the United Kingdom was issued on behalf of the barons, freeholders, heritors and others of the four parishes of the Glenkens. It would appear that since the 1660s the name Glenkens has been reserved for the four northern parishes which is the common understanding today.

In 1802 John Rennie surveyed the route for a projected Glenkenns canal between the Boat Pool at Dalry and the port of Kirkcudbright. He it was, the builder of London Bridge, who designed the sturdy granite structure across the Ken, which we all still use, linking Kells and Balmaclellan. He thoughtfully provided arches which would permit the free passage of traffic under the bridge should the canal ever be built. In the mid-nineteenth century a Glenkens Society was formed but that will be the subject of a future article in the Gazette. For centuries Glenkens has cultivated a distinct identity which deserves to be fostered and celebrated now and in the future.

Nb. The variations in spelling of Glenken or Glenkens follows the convention of the documents in which the name is found to give some idea of variations over time.

What is happening to our communities?

In the past, Dalry was a thriving village with over a dozen shops as well many other businesses. Over the years the numbers of shops and local facilities diminished as people were able to travel further afield for their shopping and or services. Now the number is drastically reduced and may soon end up with no shops at all.

It's all very well going to Tesco, etc but if you only need a few things, it's probably cheaper getting them locally. If your local shop doesn't have what you want, and you use the shop regularly, ask them - maybe they can stock it for you.

Strong, integrated communities have power when local people become involved. There is the potential to achieve all kinds of things, such as the creation of new buildings and facilities for adults and children, grants for youth, business and community woodland schemes, developing tourist facilities and attractions, and local enterprise companies.

This area is rich in natural assets - what we need are the resources to promote them. But without a strong community who value and use local trades and events, tourists, who are very important to the area, will not have much to come to see, and we will have no chance of improving things.

I'm not suggesting we go back to the mid 20th century, but communities in the Glenkens seem to have lost theior cohesion. If something is on in or around the village, why nt go along and support it. Use local businesses where possible, and buy from your local shops. We need to support our local community or we're going to lose it.

STAYING HEALTHY OVER CHRISTMAS (NUTRITIONALLY SPEAKING!)

On the 1st day of Christmas - Check your Christmas tree lights conform to the

On the 2nd day of Christmas - Never place candles near your Christmas tree or furnishings. Don't leave them burning unattended

On the 3rd day of Christmas - Make sure your family and guests staying for the festive period know what to do in an emergency. Make a fire escape plan.

On the 4th day of Christmas - Decorations can burn easily - Don't attach them to lights or heaters
On the 5th day of Christmas - Never overload electrical sockets. Take special care with Christmas lights.

On the 6th day of Christmas - Most fires start in the kitchen - never leave a cooker unattended.

On the 7th day of Christmas - Celebrate Christmas and New Year safely. The risk of accidents, especially in the kitchen, is greater after alcohol is consumed.
