DALRY SPREADS ITS WINGS

A series of environmental workshops in October was the launching event for Dalry Bird Town, celebrating the life and work of renowned bird artist Donald Watson and his son, golden eagle expert Jeff Watson.

During the week 14 young people braved the chilly October weather to make art works and explore the outdoors around Dalry. (See p5 for more on the Creative Explorer workshops...)

At the heart of the concept of Dalry Bird Town is the Watson Bird Centre, which it is hoped will provide opportunities for new writers, artists and all interested in any aspect of birds, arts and landscape, which was the core of Donald's work. Roger Crofts, who is at the forefront of the project, outlined current thinking on the conversion of the Watson family home at Barone on Main Street: Donald's original studio, archive and library, offices for bird organisations, exhibition space, accommodation and work space for artist in residence and

caretaker. In addition, the garden would provide space for sculptures, trails and an open air studio.

The initiative is being taken forward by a steering group including Dalry residents, the Watson family, bird, arts and science interests and it has been agreed that the Glenkens Community and Arts Trust will provide the charitable home for the initiative. (See p3 for more on Dalry Bird Town...)

Glenkens-based author Cathy Cassidy gives us a taste of life as a successful childrens' book writer:



Appreciation was expressed for Chris Bird, former chair of the CC, who has resigned. A vacancy now exists on the CC and various options are being considered.

Repairs to 'Old Mortality' are likely to be delayed due to sensitivity of materials to temperature and moisture. However, the prospect of further damage due to winter weather was noted.

The village hall committee reported on a busy programme of events planned for participation and fun. In the New Year, a Burns' supper will be held on January 22nd and you are all welcome!

Carsphairn Community Council

There are to be massive cuts in the council's budget next year, in line with national budget cuts. Cllr Duncan advised that people will really start to see changes.

The volume and speed of timber lorries on the B729 was found to be "shocking", and very frightening when lorries don't move out of the centre of the road. When drivers have been questioned, they say the verges are too soft. It was agreed that the chair would pursue this issue.

The chair contacted D&G and Ayrshire roads dept. regarding closure of the A713 for resurfacing and the lack of prior notification to businesses and residents effected. It was confirmed that Carsphairn will be consulted next time the road is to be closed.

There will be no meeting Dec. The next meeting will be Mon 31 Jan, 7pm, Lagwyne Hall.

LOCAL HISTORY

William Macmath, Ballad Collector of Glenkens

As the Festive Season approaches it is to recite a ballad as a party piece. sobering to reflect that while Hogmanay was well celebrated in the Glenkens, Christmas was not.

Since there was no scriptural authority for the date of Christ's birth, presbyterians gave it a body-swerve. However, irrespective of how folk marked the passing of the winter solstice and the return of the light, there would be an accompaniment of story-telling and ballad-singing in the home, the 'big hooses' and the hostelries of the glen.

Galloway had the reputation of being a musical place and one man who devoted much of his life to the preservation of ballad heritage in particular was William Macmath (1844-1922). Born in Brighton to Scottish parents he spent much of his childhood at Airds of Kells, home of his maternal grandparents and his beloved Auntie Jeanie, aka Miss Jane Webster. Jeanie ended her days in Crossmichael.

Of Airds, where the Dee meets the Ken. it was said that "the hand of Nature has shut it out from almost all communication with the world: it seems intended as the nursery or dwelling of a poet", as indeed, it had been, for Robert Burns visited to pay homage to the memory of Glenkens poet, John Lowe.

Macmath always referred to himself as "a Stewartry man", visiting almost annually until a few months before he died. He will be known to some as the agent of Kirkcudbright artist E A Hornel, purchasing books, notably on Burns, for the splendid library at Broughton House. He had a day job as an Edinburgh lawyer but ballads were his passion and these he collected and sent to the American scholar Francis James Child who, based at Harvard, was compiling his ambitious The English and Scottish Popular Ballads, the first volume of which appeared at Christmas 1882; four more followed. William was well placed to perform this (often laborious) service. His mother, his aunt and four surviving younger sisters were all ballad singers, as well as collectors of tales and riddles. He, apparently, did not sing, but he was known

Though undoubtedly interested in the oral tradition, much of his work was on ballad manuscript collections, some of which he secured for Harvard. In truth, despite their mutual interest in the rambunctious, evocative, emotional and violent world of balladry, both he and Child often appear like a couple of dry sticks in severe need of combustion. But it is now largely due to William that we know anything at all about a Glenkens tradition, a precious legacy well worth acknowledgement.

He was very interested in the historical origins of individual ballads, more so than Child. Believing the latter to be overly concerned with questions of arrangement and classification, he once, rightly, threw Child's words back at him: "Strictness is offensive as well as useless. Perhaps it is impossible. Ballads are not like plants or insects, to be classified to a hair's breadth". He understood that ballads arose from the folk themselves and thus were as elusive, magical and mysterious as their creators, that ballads on a printed page were dead things, whereas in performance they were exhilarating and entertaining, familiar yet unpredictable, often offering essential cultural and social reinforcement. He was emphatic that the ballad's integrity must be respected; he totally opposed the 'improvement' favoured by Walter Scott and others, not to mention deliberate fakery and modern intrusions.

From Jeannie Webster he acquired an excellent version of the haunting Lord Randall which she had learned 50 years earlier from Mary Williamson, a nursemaid at Airds; another was a variant of Johnie Scot which she had heard from Miss Jane Hannay, Newton Stewart. In all, through her brother, she contributed sixteen ballads to Child's collection. William's sister, Minnie, supplied eight of the scarce 'ballad airs from manuscript'.

By the late nineteenth century the tradition was dying and the tunes had often been forgotten. From the recitation of Mary Cochrane, Abbeyyard, Crossmichael, he secured a lively version of The Broom of Cowdenknowes. In 1883 Macmath Happy Holidays!

obtained a copy of The Lochmaben Harper from the Rev. George Murray of Greenock who had it from his father, George Murray of Troquhain, minister of Balmaclellan 1838 to 1881, who had taken it down from the singing of a sad woman in his parish named Sarah Rae. A true find came from Robert Trotter of the Glenkens literary family who communicated two verses of a Galloway ballad that had several different titles but was the inspiration for Scott's Lochinvar who "came out of the west":

They askéd him and speiréd him, And unto him did say, 'O, saw ye ocht o' an arméd band, As ye cam on your way?'

He jested them and jeered them, And thus to them did say, 'O, I saw nocht but a fairy troop, As I rode on my way'.

The 'ocht', the 'nocht' and the humour are convincingly Galloway. It is a pity that not more of it has survived.

There is no doubt that Macmath was a prickly character. When some of his favourité trees were cut down at Airds he never returned. A lawyer colleague reported that when his company placed William in charge of such activities as rent collections, roups or sales, he was not prepared to suffer fools gladly, nor was he so popular as some of us with those of the company assembled who set at least as much store on the attendant refreshments as on the business of the day". He died a bachelor; a cousin reporte that the Macmaths were not a marrying family. A John Macmath may have compensated by producing a largish family at the Woodhead lead mines at Carsphairn, but the Galloway Macmaths were otherwise on the decline; there are now more in the USA than in Scotland. William's labours in balladry undoubtedly made many people happy but not as many as a distant relation, the most famous of the family, who will almost certainly appear on our TV screens this Christmas. Ginger Rogers was born Virginia Katherine Macmath! Ted Cowan

lecture season 'with a bang' when Keith Kirk, one of our Countryside Rangers, spoke so about the wildlife of Dumfries & Galloway, illustrating his talk with his excellent photographs.

A short video of the Burnie Baker' dipping and feeding in a local burn began the evening's entertainment. But how many in the audience knew beforehand that this was a local name for the Dipper? Presumably called this because its white front looks like a baker's apron and because the bird nests and feeds around burns.

Surely the most attractive of winter waders is the Sanderling, with its pure white underparts and bright pearly grey back and wings, which scurries along the shoreline on its short black legs like a little clockwork toy dodging the waves. During his talk Keith mentioned and showed photographs of two other waders. First he told of the decline of that summer migrant, the Common Sandpiper, around Loch Ken, and then he said that the numbers of Whimbrels passing through Galloway every spring and autumn on the way to and from their northern tundra breeding grounds had greatly increased.

Memorable images shown by Keith included the Greenland White-fronted Geese in flight, which winter in the Loch Ken area, clearly showing the distinctive black markings on their bellies; the Black Guillemot flying across Portpatrick harbour with its feet splayed out to show off their brilliant and unique shade of red; the white Buzzard which has nested in the

Stewartry Birdwatchers tarted their winter Loch Ken area for several years now and has so often been mistaken for a Snowy Owl when perched on a fence post close to the A713 road near Parton; the colourful Waxwings feeding on equally colourful yellow rowan berries; and the close-up of the Nuthatch, a bird which was first noted on many local birdtables only in the early 1990's, and now nests throughout the region – a real success story when so many other species are in decline.

> Of course birds of prey also featured in Keith's talk including some superb photographs of the Ospreys which nested at Threave this year and successfully reared three young, as did the Ospreys which nested near Wigtown and near Caerlaverock. The viewing platform at Threave is probably the nearest members of the public can get legally to any osprey nest in Britain. Keith also had several clever shots taken at the feeding station near Laurieston showing how acrobatic Red Kites are and, in addition, one of another Red Kite elsewhere in the area carrying off a Mallard duckling showing, unfortunately, that they do not only feed on carrion.

> At the next meeting on Thursday 9th December in New Galloway School at 7.30p.m. the speaker will be Brian Morrell, who works at the Wildlife and Wetlands Trust at Caerlaverock, and his talk is entitled "Wild geese in the realm" of the ice bear". All are welcome. Next year starts on January 13th with another excellent and prize-winning photographer, retired Dumfries GP Edmund Fellowes, on 'Some Northern Birds'.
