The Trust Fund had heard about the activities of GTI through a local resident who is a member of their Board and realised that because of our success, we were in need of a second vehicle.

The Bus is a lifeline for many within the Glenkens, and is so popular that often trips are booked up before they're even advertised! George Colbenson, Dalry resident and regular

"The Bus makes a lot of difference to me and to a lot of older people in the Glenkens who can't drive anymore. There is a great social side to the Bus - my wife Barbara and I see a lot of people we otherwise wouldn't get to see. A lot of trips get fully booked, but with two buses, everyone who wants to go should

be able to, and we can have a great party on the way!"

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DALRY HOUSING

Reports suggest that Dalry is about to experience a house-building boom. Quite how many houses will eventually be built is impossible to say but there are currently three projects, one planned by a public body - Dumfries & Galloway Housing Partnership (DGHP) - and two by private developers. As far as can be ascertained this is the situation as it stands...

The proposal by an Ayrshire firm to quarry 40,000 tonnes of rock and build 10 houses on a site between the school and the Manse was given provisional approval by the Council in November 2009. This resulted in a wave of protest and a well-supported petition that was presented to the Council. The Council's Operations Manager has now indicated that no agreement has yet been reached with the developer over the conditions attached to the provisional approval of the plans. Until that happens; "there is no planning permission for the development". Local protesters are awaiting further news but, if permission were to be eventually granted, are determined to mount a legal challenge.

In February Dumfries & Galloway Council gave approval by 9 votes to 6 to a proposal by DGHP to build 29 houses on a marshy site on the Moniaive road next to Whinnymuir.

This is in addition to an earlier

planning application and means that provisional permission has now been given for 35 houses to be crammed onto this very small site. It is difficult to find information about the plans of the private developer who had previously advertised houses for sale on the same land but it seems that DGHP now owns about half of the site. The private developer (whom I am told is now using the name Dalry Properties) apparently still owns some of the land, including that needed for a flood prevention scheme, and could also build more houses next to Wayside.

There were many objections to the DGHP proposal as it stood but it is most important to say that the objectors were very much in favour of affordable family houses being built on the site. However, they believed that the DGHP plan was for housing at too high a density and of the wrong

A settlement has existed at Dalry for the best part of a thousand years. In that time the village has grown slowly to have a population today of around 400. Buildings have been added, a few at a time, in response to local need for housing and services. This demand for new buildings varied as employment opportunities in agriculture, forestry, hydro-electric power and service industries waxed

and waned.

In recent years a gradual reduction in the size of families has meant that the building of additional houses has not led to any significant rise in the population. Many of the existing houses in Dalry were built at a time when overcrowding was the norm. It was not unusual for large families to be raised in one or two-bedroom houses, but nowadays most such dwellings have just one or two occupants. If we want to encourage the development of a lively, mixed community it is obvious that more houses suitable for families are needed. DGHP seems intent on pushing through its plan of building the maximum number of small houses on the Whinnymuir site, rather than engaging with the Community and coming back with a modified plan. I think we have a right to expect better of such a publicly funded body.

However, now that the decision to build the DGHP development has been taken, it is most important that the community comes together to welcome the fact that some of the houses at least will be suitable for families and to press for them to be allocated to those families in the area who are in desperate need of suitable housing. Above all, I hope that whoever occupies these houses they will (as my family was many years ago) be welcomed into the community, and encouraged to take a full part in it. Andrew Mellor

BIRD TOWN UPDATE

We have good news to report on the planned Dalry Bird Town project.

In addition to the £10,000 already received from the Big Lottery for a Project Development Officer, a grant of £9,000 has been awarded by Scottish Natural Heritage. We are also awaiting the final outcome of an application to Rural Dumfries & Galloway LEADER for over £40,000 as this would complete the funding package for the next stage. We are actively seeking office space in the village.

We want to concentrate on two key elements; first and foremost, we will be putting together the funding package for the purchase and refurbishment of Barone, the former Watson family home. This will take time to come to fruition, which is why we have a second element; a series of events to keep the pot boiling so to speak.

A date for your Diaries: Friday 30 September to Sunday 2 October will be the dates of the first Dalry Bird Festival. We have lots of ideas to appeal to all of the family, all ages, all abilities and all interests. Among the ideas for indoor events being developed are a children's fancy dress parade, talks about the birds of The Glenkens, demonstrations on how to make bird feeders and bird boxes, a chance to see Donald Watson's original studio, art exhibitions by children as well as

professional artists, a book stall, and a chance to buy cards, calendars and posters all created by local children. Outdoor activities being considered are guided walks to bird locations, visits to Donald Watson's favourite painting sites and how many birds can you spot in the village. In the evening we are considering concerts around bird song and bird related music. So if you have ideas please let me know. More information will be available over the coming months.

Dalry Community Council: The CC was informed that two officers have been appointed for the Biosphere project, one from Dumfries & Galloway and the other from East/South Aryshire. It was confirmed that the library will remain open for the time being, any decision being deferred until at least next year. Next meeting: Mon 4 Apr, 7pm, Dalry Town Hall.

New Galloway & Kells Community Council:

It was agreed that a donation of £25 be made to the childrens' party arranged by Balmaclellan Community Council. Discussion took place regarding the painting by DR Pelly, currently in store, which is intended to be on permanent display in the Town Hall; the necessary permission to be sought from the Council. Next meeting: Mon 11 Apr, 7.30pm, New Galloway Town Hall.

Balmaclellan Community Council: The A712 is in a terrible state, and repairs are being done. Because it's so narrow, it is being closed (7am-7pm) for repairs. This follows an earlier closure – in December – and more to follow. It was asked whether there any way weight restrictions could be introduced to cut down on the heavy traffic. Cllr Peter Duncan said probably not but he would raise this with the traffic department. Next meeting: Mon 25 Apr, 7.30pm, Balmaclellan Village Hall.


Carsphairn Community Council: Cllr Peter Duncan indicated that upgrading of the B729 would be

paid for from the Strategic Road budget, although the Council were negotiating a contribution from Timber Transport. A meeting will be requested with the Roads Department to consult and to clarify what would be included in the upgrade. The Roads Department agree in principle to there being signs warning of heavy transport vehicles.

A SEPA representative discussed the additional flow to through the Galloway Hydro Scheme. Under the new EU Water Framework Directive the river flows from Loch Doon are classified as 'good', but at Tongland are classified as 'bad' and need to be upgraded to 'good'. The preferred solution indicates 0.45% extra flow throughout the length of the Scheme. In theory this should not increase banks erosion, flood risk and sewage disposal.

The CC queried this, particularly when water was released from Drumjohn. It was suggested that although the official objection deadline has passed, letters from the CC and individuals could be submitted to SEPA East Kilbride where they would not be formally recognised in SEPA's determination of the application but, as it was likely to go to appeal to the Scottish Executive, they would probably be considered at that time. It was agreed that a letter be sent from the CC detailing concerns about banks erosion – particularly at Woodhead Bridge - flood risk and sewage disposal. Next meeting: Mon 25 Apr, 7pm, Lagwyne Hall.

Diabetes Support

People in the Glenkens who have been diagnosed with diabetes are being encouraged to join a local support group.

This region has the highest proportion of diabetics in Scotland and there are fears the numbers could continue to spiral.

The Diabetes UK Stewartry Support Group offers diabetics the opportunity to learn more about the condition and how to live with it at a series of talks held between March and December.

The next meeting takes place on Monday 28 March when the guest speaker will be Imran Arain from Castle Douglas Health Centre who will talk about public health programmes currently available in the Stewartry.

Duncan Ferguson, chairman of the group, said: "We would like to see more people from the Glenkens coming to our monthly meetings. The meetings are open to people diagnosed with both type 1 and type 2 diabetes as well as members of their families and their carers."

Currently, Scotland is said to be on the verge of a diabetes epidemic and, according to the latest NHS statistics, Dumfries & Galloway has some of the highest figures.

At the start of 2010, a total of 7,348 people in the region were registered with the condition, representing five per cent of the population; the highest rate of any health board area in the country.

The next meeting of the group takes place on Monday 28 March in the Gordon Memorial Hall (adjacent to St Ninian's Church), Whitepark Road, Castle Douglas at 7pm. Admission is £1 and refreshments are provided. There is also a fundraising raffle.

Any money raised by the group is donated to Dumfries & Galloway Royal Infirmary's Endowment Fund to be spent specifically on diabetes care in this region.

LOCAL HISTORY

The Glenkens King

Cairn Edward, smothered as it is in forest, when viewed from the east, looms like a great pudding across Loch Ken or above New Galloway.

The hill's name is of Gaelic formulation since in English or Scots it would be 'Edward's Cairn'. The question is - who was Edward? It has been unconvincingly attributed to Edward I of England but a less likely individual for Scottish commemoration is difficult to imagine since it was he whose invasion of Scotland in 1296 led directly to the Scottish Wars of Independence. Venerated as a great king in England, he is characterised in Scottish historiography as a cruel and bloody tyrant who was responsible for the English occupation of the country and the vicious execution of William Wallace.

John Gordon Barbour of Bogue House near Dalry asserts that in his day (1824) the locals pronounced Edward, Ethart, possibly influenced by Gaelic Eideard. He relates the tale of how Edward Bruce, brother of King Robert, victor at Bannockburn, climbed the hill and, admiring the magnificent view over Ken and Dee, exclaimed that he must one day take possession of such a beautiful vista. Accordingly a cairn was erected on the summit and Edward Bruce, in due course, became Lord of Galloway. However he was a hot-headed warrior who is depicted as something of a maverick and folk do not usually name places for their enemies.

Glenkens was Balliol territory and the Bruces were their sworn foes.

The families fought one another on several occasions and the Bruces, when they gained the upper hand, wreaked havoc on the glen.

Balliols and Bruces were competitors for the Scottish kingship in the 1280s and '90s. Edward I, having been asked by the Scots to decide the case, selected John Balliol as the man with best title in 1292, ruling until deposed three years later. It is the latter's son who is most likely to be remembered in Cairn Edward. Edward Balliol, grandson of Dervorguilla, Lady of Galloway and great grandson of Alan Lord of Galloway, was recognised by the English and not a few Scots as King Edward from 1332-56, albeit his title was much disputed. The true king was David II, son of Robert Bruce. Balliol was king only with English support and so can be seen as the 'Young Pretender' of the fourteenth century. Local hero he undoubtedly was, but he lived a somewhat futile and pathetic life.

There was a failed conspiracy to place him on the Scottish throne in 1320 in opposition to Robert I who had insisted that landholders possessing estates in England must surrender them or face banishment, and must decide whether they were Scots or English. He thus created a seriously dissident group known as 'The Disinherited' who continued to support Balliol for a generation. After his father's deposition young Edward was subjected to rather luxurious detention in England. He was godson of Edward I, a sometime playmate of Edward II and the pawn of Edward III.

In 1332 he was invited back to Scotland by a man whose name looks like a Galloway spoof – Twynam Laurison!

He began well, winning the battle of Dupplin Moor in which he "displayed a bold spirit of enterprise, and a courage superior to all difficulties"; he also inspired a revolt in Galloway. He was crowned King of Scots at Scone, celebrated in English propaganda as, 'the very and true king of Scotland, as by heritage and right line'. David II was eight years old and so, as a minor, deemed by some unfit to occupy the kingship. By year's end the Bruce party had driven Balliol out of Annan Castle, uncomfortably straddling a saddleless horse "with one leg booted and the other bare". However, he recovered, to win further victories at Berwick and Halidon Hill, only to face defeat at Culblean in 1335.

Once David II began his personal rule Balliol was little more than an English pensioner. For the rest of his life he was a spent force whom English commentators dismissed as a pseudo-king, manipulated at the whim of Edward III for his own nefarious purposes. Balliol based himself at Hestan Island in Fleet Bay and at Burnt Isle in Loch Ken.

His 'kingdom' amounted to little more than an extended Glenkens, specifically Buittle, Kenmure and Kirkandrews.

The last-named included Balmaghie, Parton and Crossmichael while he also controlled Kenmure Castle and the Earlston estates. Eventually, in 1356, he was forced to alienate the whole of the south of Scotland to Edward III, as well as, unforgivably, his own kingship, "roaring like a lion, almost beside himself with anger [he] burst out in words more bitter than any conceivable death", lambasting "the Scottish people, that most unsympathetic of nations who have rejected me as their ruler". So saying he handed over his crown and a handful of Scottish earth and stones.

Thus the ambitions of the last of the line of the Lords of Galloway ended in dust.

He lived for a further eight miserable years. Glenkens should memorialise its one king for History's victims deserve to be remembered alongside her heroes even if, as the chronicler wrote, "On this matter it should be noted that he gave away nothing for his part, because he had no right in the beginning". The local Church of Scotland congregations are planning to set up a Covenanter trail around the Glenkens.

Curious to know where the noted Covenanter Alexander Gordon of Earlstoun was buried, I was browsing through the Gordon family papers in the Ewart library, Dumfries, when I came across the following lines:

"He died at Airds (Parton parish) 1726 and was buried in Dalry Churchyard, south side near the dyke, on which spot his grandson Sir John Gordon intends raising a monument to his Memory with the following inscription: To the Memory of the very worthy Pillar of the Church of Scotland, Sir Alexander Gordon of Earlstoun, Bart. who, after many years sufferings, died 1726 aged 76'."

There then followed a lengthy epitaph composed by his grandson. His grandson arranged for the erection of a stone with a similar epitaph over the grave of his great-grandfather William Gordon of Earlstoun, who was buried in Glasford churchyard, Lanarkshire after being killed at the Battle of Bothwell Bridge; but the family were going through hard times financially after the years of persecution and it would seem that he never managed to erect the stone in Dalry churchyard.

After the Battle of Bothwell Bridge Alexander was outlawed. For a time troops were billeted in Earlstoun Castle and when they were absent he sometimes returned to sleep in his own bed, only quick actions enabling him to elude capture on a number of occasions.

hanging on to life; and he had a hideout nearby in the woods where he often slept. In the end he was arrested on board ship while on a mission to Holland for the Covenanting Societies and spent six years in jail in the Edinburgh area, including time on the Bass Rock.

It seemed very appropriate to me that there should be a memorial to Alexander in Dalry churchyard, perhaps as one of the central focal points of the proposed Covenanter trail.

So I approached the Scottish Covenanter Memorials Association to see if they would take on the project. They have been very helpful and have offered a grant of £1200 to the project, but that will still leave us short of what is

There are two possible ways of taking the project forward; the more ambitious one would be to erect a memorial stone like the one pictured. This contains a good portion of the epitaph, though with twelve lines missing from the centre of the poem. The owner of Ayrshire Memorials, who is a member of SCMA, has quoted £3345 for the preparation and erection of such a stone. Normal cost for such a stone would be over £5000. The other option would be to leave the poem off the stone, which would reduce the cost considerably but would leave us with a far less eyecatching stone without these inspiring words which bring it to life.

It is proposed to erect the stone just to the left of Dalry Session House, as you face it from the front. It is also hoped to prepare an information board on the

Gordons of Earlstoun which could be attached to the Session House itself. There could be possibilities of having the poem on the information board; but that would be a far less enduring memorial and subject to vandalism.

I would value feedback on what you think we should do. I would also be grateful of any pledges from people willing to help us reach the amount required for the more expensive stone.

There are 32 lines of text and, alongside grant support, you could perhaps think in terms of sponsoring, say, a line for £50 to help us reach the total. If there is support for it I would certainly favour the first option.

There will be a Conventicle in Dalry churchyard on Sunday 26 June at 3pm. This could conceivably be for the dedication of the new stone if the project comes together quickly. Otherwise it will be a milestone on the road towards the erection of that stone, and will highlight the connections which the churchyard has with Covenanting times. David Bartholomew



STAR WARS Over the

past few years, 4 May has come to be known worldwide as 'Star Wars' day; an affectionate pun on the iconic greeting which is spoken in hushed tones by the likes of Luke Skywalker and Obi-Wan Kenobi in the Star Wars films.

It is perhaps a sign of how strongly the Star Wars saga has impinged on popular culture over the past 30 years that the phrase "May the Fourth be With You" immediately evokes thoughts of Jedi kinghts and lightsabre battles!

But just how much science is there behind the science fiction of Star Wars? Could we ever travel to other planets, traversing the vast distances between star systems using shortcuts through hyperspace? What kinds of alien worlds might exist elsewhere in our Universe, and could they bear lifeforms that resemble the exotic creatures found in the Star Wars cantina? Could a Jedi Knight really use a lightsabre to fend off blasters and energy weapons? Could the Death Star really blow up another planet?

On May the Fourth 2011 Dr Martin Hendry, an Astrophysicist from the University of Glasgow, will give a talk on the 'Science of Star Wars' at The CatStrand as part of the Dumfries & Galloway Science Festival.

As a lifelong Star Wars fan, Martin has always been fascinated with the exotic worlds, spaceships and alien life depicted in science fiction - and how they might relate to what science tells us about the real Universe. He currently holds a Science in Society fellowship from the UK Science and Technology Facilities Council, the aim of which is to lead an international programme of science outreach on the theme of 'Exploring the Dark Side of the Universe'.

The aim of this project is to engage schools and the wider public with some of the biggest questions in science: How did the Universe begin? What will be its eventual fate? Is there life on other planets? Why are we here..?

Perhaps above all what he has learned from 25 years as a scientific researcher is that the real Universe is even weirder than anything science fiction has dreamed up. Come along to The CatStrand on 4 May to find out more...
