FITS

As I'm sure many of you may have noticed in recent months there has been in huge increase in the number of solar panels being put on peoples' roofs, or the odd domestic wind turbine being located in the Glen.

You may have even heard rumour of individuals putting a small-scale hydro electric scheme on their property.

The reason for much of this activity is due to the Government initiative know as Feed In Tarrifs or FITS.

Under the, scheme the Government is seeking to:

"...encourage the deployment of small

low carbon electricity generation, particularly by organisations, businesses, communities and individuals who have not traditionally engaged in the electricity market."

Basically what happens is that, rather than give grants for the installation of such systems as was the case in the past, the Government pays the individual a premium rate for the electricity produced from the installation - whether the electricity is exported to the national grid or consumed by the property itself.

The amount you get paid varies depending on the type and size of the installation, e.g. a 30kW hydro or 3kW of photovoltaic (electricity producing) solar panels.

The payback on such systems can vary depending on your location (eg how windy the location is where you have installed your wind turbine) but typically range from 5-12 years.

The other advantage is that every unit of electricity you produce is one less unit that you have to pay for as part of your electricity bill, so if you produce enough to meet your own domestic requirements you may not need to pay an electricity bill again during the life of the kit.

After you have paid off any loan used, you could even get a small income from your installation.

There are many specialist companies

sponsored by natural power

that can help advise you on what installation is best for you and the potential pay back periods for the kit. There are an increasing number of financial organisations that are will to offer loans to help pay for the capital costs of the equipment and its installation.

If this has inspired you in any way and you are interested in FITS and generating your own electricity then you should do some research on the internet to gain a better understanding of the scheme.

Tap in FITS to Google and look at the Government's DECC website for this. If you think you want to take this further then approach an approved company (be sure to ask them about their proven track record in the area) which you can again find on site or look in the Farmers Weekly.

These companies can also advise more generally on the scheme and the best options for you and whether or not you need planning permission for the installation.

If it all still looks good and you think you can afford the up front payments then 'go for it'. And then you can just watch as you have taken responsibility for your own electricity generation from a clean and renewable resource.

A further scheme is due to be announced by the Government by the end of the year to help you heat your house from renewable sources, eg a wood boiler or solar panels instead of more conventional sources, eg oil, gas. A future article will keep you posted as this concept develops.

NATURE & WILDLIFE

Tumbling Dice

On a long drive recently I set myself the considerable mental task of listening to the drum beat all the way through the Rolling Stones' classic, Tumbling Dice.

Not that I particularly like or dislike drums, and I really do like this track, but rather I was attempting to unravel the mystique of its attraction. For me the experience was quite remarkable and reminded me of sitting in the sun outside Peebles Hydro Hotel with a medical professor friend a few years ago. We were joint co-ordinators of a conference seminar and were enjoying a brief interval in the clear air of a golden autumn day. He said:

"Just listen to all the bird song, isn't it wonderful?"

In agreeing I observed that they were all robins, at least six of them, at various distances. Perfectly personified by Burns in his Brigs of Ayr as "whistling glee", the metallic autumn song of the robin is so evocative of the season and all its splendour. My friend was astonished and still recalls the incident occasionally when we meet. He'd probably heard the robins' symphony every year, as these incoming migrants set up their winter territories or simply sang to each other on their annual way south. However, that day he certainly assumed that the orchestra had many instruments, when in fact they were all the same.

Bird song is one of the most uplifting natural experiences for most people and

my friend's observation on its beauty was really quite unremarkable. "Oh, listen to the birds singing" is a

common enough expression after all and certainly not the preserve of socalled birdwatchers like myself. Many people do also appreciate the variety of bird songs that combine to give us our magnificent dawn and dusk choruses.

For me there is no mystique in the attraction of bird song to our ears, it is a glorious manifestation of the cycle of life that we are all part of, and by enjoying it we are somehow reconnecting with this source of wellbeing.

However, to identify the individual parts that go to make up the wondrous whole, we must adopt the Tumbling Dice technique and fix on individual songs in the way I followed Charlie Watts's drumming in the Stones' track to appreciate the part he played in holding it all together and driving it along. Discerning individual bird song is also a considerable mental task at times, and sometimes complicated by species like the skylark, which has its own backbeat theme, but brings in a randomly repeating series of other birds' songs in its own style – like cover versions. Thus skylark song, while instantly recognisable across its world range, has slight variations between areas according to the prevailing neighbouring songsters of various kinds. However, with practice this separation is possible and indeed considerable skill is soon developed.



My evening walk down the Water of Ken at Dalry provides an impressive cast of birds to unravel, and for some reason this spring brought unusually high numbers of migrant songbirds, including garden warblers, whitethroats, sedge warblers, blackcaps, willow warblers and chiffchaffs. Resident blackies (blackbirds), mavis (song thrush), shelfies (chaffinches), blue dykies (dunnocks), linties (linnets), green linties (Greenfinches), goldies (goldfinches) and others complete the throng. What colour and what sounds! Sadly, the weather of May and June was simply awful, but it at least served to heighten the pleasure of those evenings when the birds moved and sang, reminding me of how important they are in the great scheme of things.

Now summer has brought the tumbling, wheeling, wheezing swifts that so characterize the Glenkens and indeed Castle Douglas. Up on a clear day, they are simply stunningly beautiful and I just love watching them, and the visitors who stop in their tracks on the main street to marvel at the spectacle. Who needs dice?

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

The Spoiling of Glenkens making itself so evident in

The issue of wind turbines is currently, to say the least, highly controversial throughout Scotland.

Back in the 1930s when the Galloway Hydro-Electric Scheme was built at a cost of £3 million many folk were deeply concerned about the environmental impact.

An editorial by Dorothy McBurnie in The Gallovidian 1931 regretted the assault on the beauty of Galloway, an event that was greeted by the wider community with 'apathy, slackness and worse'.

The Glenkens scheme had been 'conceived and launched and had gone through Parliament almost before the greater portion of the people of Galloway had heard about it'.

Late in the day the Association for the Preservation of Rural Scotland had become involved. To cite one example, the original plan included closing off the flow of the Dee to Loch Ken at Clatteringshaws; Glenlee was the intended 'new junction'. This was approved by a consultant, Professor Bailly, who, however, considered the construction of other dams from Allangibbon Bridge north, as well as the Doon Tunnel, unnecessary.

The matter was appealed all the way to the privy council without success. Ms McBurnie feared the whole landscape would be defaced and she lamented the loss of historic sites and beauty spots as well as the erection of pylons and other structures.

Let us pray for a miracle', she proclaimed; 'and in the meantime let us do all in our power to help those already working in the cause of beauty. Let us keep some ideals, at least, from the welter of modern materialism and ugliness that is

making itself so evident in the literature, the cities, the general atmosphere of today'.

She ended by quoting a recent lecture by Prof Macneile Dixon:

Despite all her victories, science stands today bewildered before her own conclusions, and reason is ill at ease upon her imperial throne'.

Another article in 1939 deplored commercialism's ability to ride roughshod over all opposition. Forests and lochs were blasted in the name of progress. A national heritage was at stake;

'unless all classes unite in a determined effort to give nature a fair deal, and compel those in official positions to do the same, the little that remains of Scotland's most priceless possession will be lost for all time'.

There is much like-minded commentary in the contemporary press.

The promoters thought they had done a very fine job and predicted that within a few years the new Hydro structures would blend in with the landscape and would indeed enhance it.

Of course this most ambitious scheme was situated right in the heart of Galloway, in what until then was regarded as the most unspoiled part of the province, recently romanticised by S R Crockett. The idyll, ironically, was becoming industrialised...

The question is who was right? Have we taken the dams and surge towers to our hearts? Has the scheme turned out to be an eyesore or do we recognize its structures as some of our finest examples of Modernist design (Sir Alexander Gibb)? What is the message for our present debate?

W G Dobie produced a poem entitled 'The Modern Raiders' inspired by Crockett's novel. It shows that he had no doubts about the issue. One verse reads:

A raider comes today who kills The glories of our glens and hills With unheroic Acts and Bills And "private



legislation":

The company promoter's pen Will dam the Deugh and dam the Ken And dam the Dee, - oh, damn the men

Who plan such desecration! However the general editors of the Third Statistical Account (1965) pronounced the scheme 'an unqualified success. It was constructed at the cost estimated; it has done everything that was expected of it and, as regards units generated, has produced more than was expected'.

Furthermore the County Council of the Stewartry of Kirkcudbright; 'had the unique distinction of being the first local authority in the UK to undertake the distribution of electricity over the whole county area and this despite the fact population density at 30 to the square mile was lower than in any other similarly developed area'.

Such ambition had provoked outbursts of outrage from English MPs in the House of Commons, scandalized that remote areas in Scotland would have electricity before some of England's major cities!'

How unthinkable right enough!
