Keep Our Playgroup Open

Dumfries & Galloway Council are set to cut pre-school funding for the Glenkens Playgroup.

Due to the fact the school nursery has 20 spaces available, not all of which are currently filled, the Council say they have to cut funding to the Playgroup or they are, in effect, 'double-funding' as

state funded children
- from the age of three
- could be at the nursery, rather than the Council paying for children to go to the Playgroup.
But they would only be saving around £8,000

a year. And

the knock-on

effects for our community are far-reaching - if Council funding is withdrawn, the Playgroup will have to close as it isn't financially viable for it to continue without it.

This means there will be no childcare/education facility at all for under 3's within the whole of the Glenkens, with children missing out on at least a year of preschool education at an age when educational imput is of vital importance to child development.

On Page 6 are contact details for a consultation the Council is doing to find out people's views. Please get in touch; the more ideas, thoughts and comments received, the more chance of finding a solution to save our Playgroup.





The meeting stressed that the Glenkens Playgroup is the only option for pre- pre- school care in Carsphairn, as there are no child minders in the village. Committee members from the Glenkens RNLI Fundraising Group recently attended a presentation of awards ceremony in Kirkcudbright where Marion Bone and Ann Rusby, both from the Glenkens, receive RNLI

The presentations were made by the Lord Lieutenant, Sir Malcolm Ross, during an enjoyable evening with wine and canapes.

Last year Marion Bone and Ann Rusby stepped down after many years fundraising for the Lifeboats here in the Glenkens. Ann was Treasurer for over 10 years and received a Special Certificate of Thanks. Marion Bone was Chairman of the Glenkens Group for 19 years and under her stewardship over £11,000 was raised for the RNLI; for her hard work and dedication she was awarded the RNLI Silver Medal.

The Lifeboats receive no Government money but rely instead on voluntary donations to meet the cost of maintaining its 24 hour search

and rescue service.

Residents of the Glenkens have always been generous supporters of the RNLI and with over 900 people rescued by Scotland's lifeboats last year it is gratifying to know the money is going to good use.

Eco Feature

Each issue, a member of the community or an expert in the field will submit an article for our Eco Feature. In this issue we have an article by Roland Chaplin on community ownership of renewables and energy storage for local use.

The Scottish
Government
recently announced
a commitment to
supporting communities
towards their owning
at least 500MW of
renewable energy
generation by 2020.

This comes hard on the heels of the Forestry Commission's proposals for partnerships with local communities to harness renewable energy from their estate. In the draft Local Plan much of the area from just east of the Hidden Road northwards through Blackcraig to Windy Standard is being proposed as suitable for medium or large scale wind farm development.

In the past one of the main concerns about what appeared to be excessive support for wind farms, compared with other sources of renewable energy, was extreme intermittency and moderate unpredictability. Two factors have changed, both of which offer huge potential opportunities for future economic regeneration and sustainability in the Glenkens and surrounding area. These are energy storage and data centre demand for renewable energy.

Communities elsewhere in Scotland are going down the route towards storing energy in the form of hydrogen or methane to be used to generate electricity and heat when required and to fuel local transport. The question is increasingly being asked – why should large energy corporations and their shareholders reap huge profits from a mix of UK Government subsidies and 'our' energy? There still has to be a national grid and part of it badly needs upgrading. However, maybe that does not need to be to the levels proposed now that there is a growing realisation of the importance of using electricity as near as possible to where it is generated.

What only a few people seem to have grasped so far is that in the future energy and data will become increasingly interchangeable. That is where data centres and cloud computing come into the picture. Carbon taxes Europewide (and perhaps worldwide) look like rising from around 17% to 60%. Data centres are already one of the largest energy user sectors but through cloud computing they can also massively decrease the amount of energy wasted on our present day hard drives, lap tops, etc. There are lots of reasons why this displacement is highly desirable. In order not to have to pay these high and necessary taxes providers of 'data centre' facilities will increasingly want to have multiple dedicated sources of renewable energy.

The Glenkens and surrounding area is particularly well placed to play a leading role in

demonstrating how a community can come together to grasp this opportunity. However, for this to happen there needs to be the strongest possible negotiating team in place to see off exploitative windfarm developers and work with those who are willing to help communities in the Stewartry to own all or at least part of any new windfarms.

The same model could also apply to new hydro schemes, solar farms, biomass plants, energy storage systems and even possibly eventually the harnessing of tidal and wave energy from the Solway.

This may all sound like a fanciful dream and it will take years to realise as well as a great deal of hard work. However, faced with the dual global challenges of resource depletion and climate disruption, there seems no other route to ensure sustainability and balanced communities in this area in the future. What ever we may individually think, the 'multi-media' age and energy revolutions will happen. We have a window of opportunity now not to be exploited but rather be the initiators and the beneficiaries. Do grasp it!

Many people say; "but I do breathe or I wouldn't be alive". Yes, but the breath I am speaking of is practised with a gentle awareness, allowing the breath to flow in without stress or strain - just the act of being aware is so important.

Right now things are going steady and slow but by the time you read this the wind will have picked up speed and carried me into the whirlwind of excitement that is the great city of Manchester.

From what I imagine I will have so much fun in my first term that it will just fly by and then before I know it I'll be home in Galloway and the narrow lanes, dotted with bare-branched trees, will be sparkling with white crystals of snow. Our house will be decorated with flashing icicle lights, the Christmas tree proudly presented in the window and I will have a chance to unwind.

Christmas in Galloway is my favourite thing in the world! I don't know what, maybe it's the familiarity of tradition or the beauty of the snow-coated landscape or that feeling of nostalgia I get when we decorate our tree... All I know is that I'll be happy to come home.

Are You Entitled to More?

Unfortunately, the Stewartry has lost out again with more money and more qualified staff going to support the Financial Management and Inclusion Teams within the other areas of Dumfries & Galloway.

We have one advisor to cover the whole of the Stewartry but, luckily for us, what a gem she is. Kay Harper is an angel. She is a thoughtful, compassionate, approachable person whose knowledge and professionalism shines through. I have worked with Kay for three years and have seen the difference she has made to so many lives with her advice.

She does a basic financial assessment and from there will assist with applications. Applications, that help to put more money in people's pockets. Money which can help in this time of inflation and rapidly increasing prices. Money that people are entitled but are often unaware is available to them. It is not scrounging or being on welfare it is simply reward/ support for the roles that so many people in the Glenkens do. Provide care for loved ones, often when their own health is not great. It is not charity either; supporting carers husbands and wives or other family members caring within the home for as long as possible saves the local government

a fortune. A fortune in care homes, care staff, etc.

If you are reading this and live alone, you may also be entitled to support that will help you to continue to live independently for as long as possible or help with bills, etc.

Please, if you see that Kay is coming to your area take the opportunity to come along and find out more. We are keen to run more advice sessions within the local halls of the Glenkens but I want to make sure that Kay's precious time is well spent and sessions are well attended. Dalry Angling Association 1930 – 20...?

Dalry Angling Association was formed in 1930, when a meeting was called in Dalry Town Hall to consider a letter from the Hon Henry Mountjoy Upton of The Holm, Balmaclellan.

The letter was an offer to the people of Dalry and Balmaclellan of Moss Roddick and the River Ken from Dalry to Boat Knowe as fishing grounds.

At a meeting on 22nd December 1930, the accounts showed £10 13/- credit balance, and it was agreed to purchase 250 two year old trout and release them in Moss Roddick. They cost £12 13/-. There is no record of how the shortfall was made up!

I am reminded of the words of Norman Fitzroy Maclean who at the age of 73 wrote his iconic novella 'A river runs through it'. When Norman was asked by an officer of the law how he might help a wayward brother he

replied simply; "I would take him fishing".

Today, Junior members fish for the McAdam Trophy - the Winner of the Junior Competition this year was Annabelle McAdam.

Over the years the Committee has changed fairly frequently and although expenses

had always been given, Honorariums were introduced to encourage Officers running the Associations. Efforts have been made to publicise the Association through a new website along with articles in local publications, in the anticipation that new members will join the Association.

The club has been in existence for 81 years but sadly is in danger of closure. Membership is down to 24 and it is becoming increasingly difficult to recruit committee members, and as such it becomes difficult to hold meetings through lack of a constitutional quorum.

For the first time since opening in 2007, Catstrand is presenting a performance off-site at Dalry Town Hall.


On Friday 4 November, at 7.30pm, Dalry Town Hall will host Uncharted Waters.

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LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

The Glenkens Witches

It is often thought that historians are triumphalist about the past they study, but in fact they often have to confront some of the dark stains upon their nation's history.

One of these, in Scotland, was the phenomenon of the Witch Hunt. Between 1563 and 1736 there were 3837 accusations throughout the country of which around 2000 ended in execution. Some 80% were women

In Dumfries and Galloway there were 128 cases. Many of the victims suffered appalling tortures before being condemned to death. Thankfully, very few were burned alive; they were first strangled. The favoured method for detecting witches in Scotland was sleep deprivation, which then, as now, was an unofficial, but effective, torture.

The first of our Glenkens witches was Janet Macmurdoch of Airds on the shore of Loch Ken where her husband, James Hendrie, was a tenant farmer. Her troubles began when John Moor of Barlay, Balmaclellan, baron-baillie of the estate seized some of Janet's livestock for unpaid rent, whereupon she vowed to do him an 'evil turn'. When a cow and calf belonging to Moor died, he challenged Ianet who retorted that there was worse to follow. When his child died, "sweating to death', he accused Janet of being a witch of long standing. Soon after others were making similar statements about her. Calves and horses died. One farmer lost 15 cattle, three horses, and his wife; another's child drowned in a peat bog. There were disputes about pasturage.

William Gordon of Minibouie drove Janet's livestock off his grass and she cursed him, hoping he would have fewer cattle to eat his grass next season, which happened when twelve of his oxen and seven horses died. Janet's daughter was employed by Margaret Maclellan in Boghall. When sent to muck out the byre she was found disporting herself in the dung. "Playing some of her mother's devilish tricks" was how Ms Maclellan described it, whereupon her husband fell ill. Disputing with another farmer Janet 'bade the divill pyk out his eyn'. She just could not contain herself, an unwelcome quality in patriarchal Galloway. Before he died the sick man "left his death upon her, and ordained his friends to pursue her as a witch and a necromancer".

Folk began to recall other incidents over the years. She was indicted in 1671 for having taken service with Satan, and practising "sundrie devilische charmes witchcraft and sorcerie". She was tried by jury in Dumfries, found guilty by a majority of one vote, and executed.

Elspeth McEwen of Boghall, Cubbox, Balmaclellan was said to be a woman of superior education. Curiously she lived at Boghall, the same place as Margaret Maclellan twenty years earlier. Elspeth allegedly used her talents to bewitch hens into laying extraordinary quantities of eggs or to cause them to stop producing altogether. She also used a wooden pin to steal milk from cows. This was a perennial. The overproduction or underproduction

of milk was almost universally attributed to witchcraft. These are matters that may seem trivial now but they loomed large in agricultural communities.

She bewitched the minister's horse so that it sweated blood when the reverend was sent to bring Elspeth before the session. In later years the road leading to the manse at Balmaclellan was known as 'Bloody Brae', a designation that seems to have been forgotten today. She was also accused of correspondence with the Devil. She was arrested and placed in Kirkcudbright tolbooth where she toughed it out for two years before being tormented into confession. One person stood up for her. Janet Corbie "endeavoured to dissuade her to confess" saving that people "sinned their sowl" who said she was a witch. To no avail. We have the accounts for her execution in 1698, late even by Scottish standards.

"Peats to burn Elspeth with" cost £1 Scots, with coals added for good measure.

It cost two shillings to buy a pint of ale for the executioner William Kirk, "when she was burning" and another 13 shillings for further quantities of booze, hopefully to drown his shame.

Neither of the victims were poor; one owned property and the other was well educated. Two independent-minded Glenkens women died for a phantom crime, martyrs to the petty-mindedness of their neighbours, a pitiless kirk and a merciless state.
