Agnes Holden from Carsphairn recently beat off a host of other entrants in the Daily Record 'Love Food Hate Waste' competition.

The competition is part of a government initiative to raise awareness about food wastage. The Love Food Hate Waste website states: "In Scotland we throw away 566,000 tonnes of food waste from our homes every year and of that 69% could have been avoided if we managed our food better. This is an expensive habit and costs each household an average of £430 each year!"

The idea of the contest was for entrants to make the most of the food in their fridge, and the task set was to create a great recipe using leftover ingredients, plus a few store cupboard essentials. The leftovers included roast lamb, tomato, onion, potatoes and red pepper.

The finalists were judged by Michael Kilkie, Sunday Mail chef, John Quinn, Head Chef at Tennent's Training Academy, and Chris Morrison



of Zero Waste Scotland.

Agnes' winning dish was Patties and Pakora with a Tomato and Pepper relish.

Michael Kilkie said: "To come up with a dish like that and then make it

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## Dalry Library Dalry Community Council (DCC) has

been researching the history of ownership of Dalry Library. The library was given freely to Stewartry District Council in 1946 so has never been the property of the village. There are, however, heritable burdens attaching to the deed; it has to be used as a library and known as Gourlay Memorial Library and if the Council no longer want the library, they have to hand it back to the Gourlays.

A legal opinion was sought on the matter, and it seems that if the Council wish to sell the library, the burden attaching to the building would need to be overturned and at that point DCC could challenge the application.

## PLAYGROUP UPDATE

On Thurs 17 Nov, Dumfries & Galloway's Education Committee met to discuss the 'Rationalisation of Pre-School Education in Dalry'.

The Committee voted that the funding for pre-school children (aged three to five) to attend Glenkens Playgroup be withdrawn from August 2012.

During these difficult economic times I believe that the council should be investing in our young people and supporting our vulnerable rural communities. I have heard council officials say Dalry has been 'privileged' to have had a choice of pre-school provision for so long. Surely education is a right, not a privilege? Every two-year-old in the Glenkens and elsewhere should have the right to pre-school education. That has now been taken away from us as Dalry Nursery cannot accept a child until the term after he or she turns three.

I will do my utmost to try to keep the Glenkens Playgroup running in some capacity. Many members of the community have pledged their support in finding alternative funding. However, the future does not look very promising. I'm sorry to say that after 40 years, it looks as if the Glenkens Playgroup will soon shut.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who showed their support for Glenkens Playgroup. Your support has been overwhelming.

# Eco Feature

sponsored by natural power



Each issue, a member of the community or an expert in the field of green energy will submit an article or question for our Eco Feature. This issue we have a question which is answered by local expert Ted Leeming.

Most people who have solar panels rely on the domestic electricity supply to drive the pump. Therefore, if there is a power cut, the potential energy from the panels cannot be used.

I suspect similar problems apply to domestic wind turbines. Can a standby battery be wired up for use in such instances, and if so, what sort of battery, how is it installed, etc?

I also heard something about installing an adapter into which you can plug a standby diesel generator - what is involved in this process? In short, how does one protect alternative energy supplies that rely on mains power from mains failure?

A: A good question indeed, and great to have

some feedback.

Using my own personal situation of a wind turbine as an example, we are looking to install a generator as a backup when there is a power outage for our water supply which comes direct from a borehole (we do not have a large storage tank) and because we have an electric cooker (run off the wind turbine).

We did look into going off grid and having a battery/diesel setup but if already on the grid this is a very expensive option if only installed for the relatively rare occasions of power outage, and requires a level of maintenance that we were not prepared to commit to.

We looked at this option for our 15kW wind turbine however, and it might be cheaper if

looking at this for a smaller array of PV. We decided that the grid (the best battery in the world!) was preferable to dealing with lots of lead acid and maintenance (we are away a fair amount with work) and we would take the hit when there was a power failure.

P.S. I should note that in two years we have had one power failure that lasted about eight hours (plus several lasting not more than a few seconds/minutes) and it simply would not be cost efficient to install a back up for such rare circumstances.

Keep the questions (and articles or suggestions for articles) coming folks - that is the idea behind this feature; to raise awareness and discuss issues.

#### Clarification from our last Eco Feature: What is Cloud Computing?

Cloud computing is the delivery of computing as a service rather than a product, whereby shared resources, software, and information are provided to computers and other devices as a utility (like the electricity grid) over a network (typically the internet).

Who would have thought 12 months ago that Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI) would now be where it is now...

We have two buses, a qualified Midas trainer, are operating a school run both morning and afternoon, and are also one of only two Transport Initiatives in SW Scotland to be on the approved Council list able to tender for work during the next four years!

The year started with a generous donation for a new VW mini bus which is being very well used and appreciated. With the aid of further funding, Jon Nimmo recently attended a course in Edinburgh qualifying him to train volunteer drivers to Midas Standard – he is the only such qualified person in the area and will be a huge asset to not only GTI but to other groups in the Stewartry requiring training.

The ability to tender for work with the Council during the next four years is also very important. There is no obligation on submitting tenders, but without being on

that all important list we could not do school runs or help with the play scheme run by the Council for disabled children.

Trips have continued to be popular with visits to Cumbrae Island and Callender House being new to the itinerary and suggestions have already been received for the 2012 program – keep them coming.

New volunteer drivers are being trained – there is always a need for more – and a number of new user groups have recently registered with GTI; one of the more unusual names for a group being 'Mid-Life Crisis'!

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
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## **Youth Cafe Revs Up**

months.

One minute I'm in the depths of the countryside in my parents' cosy little cottage sipping on a nice cup of tea and the next i'm flung headfirst into one of the busiest and most hectic cities in Britain...

Not an easy move, I must admit, but I welcomed it with open arms. It takes some getting used to but I'm actually loving it here in Manchester. Everything I ever need or want is right on my doorstep and the public transport is amazing! We have trams, trains, buses, taxis...you name it! 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## Safer Winter Roads recommend a minimum trea

Winter is well and truly on its way; the clocks have changed and many of us find ourselves travelling to and from work in the dark. Perhaps now is a good time to take a moment to stop and think how we could make our journeys on winter rural roads as safe as possible.

Keep your vehicle well serviced and check tyre pressures and tread depth weekly (RoSPA minimum tread depth of 3mm) the legal minimum is 1.6mm.

Ensure all your lights are all working and clean; it is surprising how much light a film of road grime or salt blocks. Simply wiping them with a damp cloth can really help you see and be seen.

Make sure your windscreen is clean inside and out, your wiper blades are in good condition and that you have plenty of washer fluid mixed appropriately to prevent it from freezing.

Drive at a speed appropriate to the road and conditions. Consider the width of the road and how wide a lorry coming the other way may be. Several crashes have happened recently when vehicles, especially lorries, have pulled over to allow others to pass and sank into the verges.

## **LOCAL HISTORY** with TED COWAN

# John Gordon Barbour

# of Bogue

Hogmanay is the traditional occasion to think upon times past and folk that are no more, while contemplating the promise of a new year.

For those sensitive to the 'genius of place' the scenery and environment of our everyday surroundings preserve memories of the lives and activities of our predecessors and ancestors. One native of Glenkens who was extremely aware of such places in the landscape was John Gordon Barbour of Bogue, just east of St John's Town of Dalry.

Born in 1775, Barbour was a notable radical in politics and religion whose unconventional views have condemned him as nothing more than an eccentric in the view of some commentators, as just another Glenkens daftie. In fact he was a fiercely independent-minded and patriotic Scot inspired by the twin fonts of Robert Bruce's exploits (especially in Galloway) and the Covenanters of whom he wrote that 'if there be a God who has distinguished betwixt probity and perjury, betwixt sinning and suffering, betwixt patriotism and impurity, still must the memories of our forefathers be embalmed in the recollections of every right-minded

Barbour was a collector of folklore, notably that of Galloway, but he travelled extensively throughout Scotland and he communicated with many members of the Scottish literary establishment. He deplored Scott's treatment of the Covenanters and the smugness of contributors to Blackwood's Magazine whom he termed 'Blackadders'.

James Hogg, the Ettrick Shepherd and John Wilson visited him at Bogue. Indeed, Hogg's Brownie of Bodesbeck and Barbour's 'The Brownies' Well' share the same motif. Barbour's story concerns Ramsay, tenant of Bogue, who is imprisoned for his religious sympathies. His covenanting supporters are mistaken for brownies when they secretly and

silently, and generally under cover of darkness, carry out all the necessary tasks on his farm. The difference is that Barbour purports to relate historical fact while Hogg produced a novel.

Barbour basically preserves a vanished world for posterity. In his Lights and Shadows of Scottish Character and Scenery (1824) numerous sites in his own backyard conjure memories of a departed world and its people. He explains placenames in his own neighbourhood which are no longer on the Landranger Ordnance Survey map but which were preserved on the first O.S. production, the 1854, six inches to the mile, sheets.

At the close of 'Brownie's Well', for example, he wrote that he would never forget the perils and sufferings of his forefathers. Writing in the third person he is insistent that 'while he can wander through the woods, or saunter by the sacred stream, he will not easily forego such reminiscences. To him shall Holy Linn and Holy Croft have renewed charms. Often he shall walk by Society Holm and Cushat Craggs; nor will he cease to bless the Brownie's Croft and Brownie's Well'.

Of these names only Holy Linn on the Garple Burn now survives on maps; the others have disappeared. Barbour may now be the sole source of the tradition that the Rev. Verner, or Warner, outed minister of Balmaclellan, who lived on a farm on the shore of Lochinvar, carried out baptisms at Holy Linn and at Holy Croft just to the north, whence they had to flee to escape Claverhouse's persecuting dragoons. There are now marked trails to the Linn.

About a mile west of Holy Linn was Jean's Wa's, named for Jean Gordon of Shirmers, who, jilted by her faithless lover, retreated to the woods by the Garple where she built a cottage and spent the rest of her life communing with nature. Barbour spells the name Skirmars which may indicate how it was pronounced locally; the 1854 map has Shirmers, as at present. Barbour consistently uses Garpel for the burn. A rock shelf just above the water provided refuge for a Covenanter named Duncan who was chased by dragoons. The place was still Duncan's Pantry in Barbour's day. Society Holm must have been named for meetings of the 'Societies', those who

believed in the central importance

of the Covenant but who differed in some points of detail. Court Knowe, which is still on the map, said to be the site of a baron court of the Kenmures, prompts an account of witchcraft. Old names now gone, such as My Lord's Cleuch and Deer Den allegedly originated when a prize roe stag head-butted a Kenmure over the bank and into the Garple, giving rise to the proverbial expression, 'a great lord's as easy cowpit as a wee man'.

Two names that survive on the modern map are Kate's Hill and Kate's Wood, named for Katherine Ramsay of Bogue whose marriage to Thomas Barbour was delayed due to the religious war, during which Kate provided what relief she could to the persecuted, who continued to worship at Society Holm.

John Gordon Barbour believed that the 'embryo' of the Glorious Revolution of 1688 was the Glenkens Rising, which was launched at Dalry in 1666.

After the revolution the young couple were duly joined in matrimony. Fiddler Bog where they danced, and Supper Thorn, where they dined, have both now vanished, as have several 'chapel' names north of Trolane, or Torlane as it used to be, along with 'Tower' and a motte site northwest of the same farm.

It is perhaps tempting to think that Barbour simply made up the stories for theses place-names but he had too much respect for the past and the ancestors to pull that stunt. It may also be suspected that Barbour was the informant on nomenclature for the Ordnance Survey team but the team did not arrive until 1849, by which time he had been dead for six years. He was not intent upon turning landscape into storyscape. Rather he hoped to preserve some local knowledge of the past for posterity and for that we should be grateful. He is a fascinating character to whom this column will undoubtedly return at some time in the future. Ted Cowan
