Carsphairn Community Pub Venture

On Monday 19
December, a public
meeting was held
in Lagwyne Hall,
Carsphairn, to discuss
the potential for
Carsphairn Community
to buy Greystones, their
village pub.

The pub has come to the village's attention as the previous owner died recently, and his executor approached the Community Council as he knew the community may be interested in buying the building. Community-owned pubs are a hot topic at the moment, with schemes such as 'Pub is the Hub' going strong, and boasting

the support of people such as

people – and a lot of ideas were aired. The overall consensus reached was that running the building as a pub only would not be a realistic option, and it would have to have some other community use as well. So it was decided the next step would be a professional study looking into a variety of options for the premises – landlord accommodation, restaurant, renovation costs, etc.

The Community Council has agreed with the executor that he will wait while research is carried out and that the community will keep him closely informed as things develop.

The group chosen to carry out the research is the Creetown Initiative, and a meeting was held with Andrew Ward, who runs the project, where he explained what would be involved.

Matt Hickman, Chairman of Carsphairn Community Council, says: "The community will be working closely with the executor of the estate and hope to come to a decision about purchasing the pub within the next six months".

Hopefully the initial study will be carried out over the next couple of months and there will be a further update in the next Gazette.

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Local Initiatives in New Galloway (LING)

After MSP Alex Fergusson's successful intervention in persuading the D&G Council to improve the appearance of the Town Hall, members of the LING committee met with officers of the Council to hear the current plans.

The Town Hall is to be kept as a 'flagship' building; the council will review whether any of its own services can be accommodated within the building, followed by further discussions with the local councillors and the local community to determine the most appropriate use. Watch this space ...

The condition of the car park has deteriorated with large potholes now spreading out into the surface of the adjoining road, recent flooding from the Mill Burn had also caused problems at the lower end of the car park.

A general discussion took place on the Crayfish problems in Loch Ken, and the lack of any information on what is being done. It was agreed that a meeting of interested parties including our neighbouring community councils around Loch Ken (Balmaclellan, Balmaghie, Crossmichael and Parton), also Glenkens Business Association and SEPA. Next meeting: Mon 12 Feb, 7.30pm, New Galloway Town Hall.

Balmaclellan Community Council: Next meeting: Mon 27 Feb, 7.30pm, Balmaclellan Village Hall. **Carsphairn Community Council:** Cllr Prentice complained about the speed of heavy goods vehicles in the area through the village, and this is to be passed on to the traffic department.

The proposed reduction in cutting the Kirk yard grass from 15 to 3 times a year was discussed, and it was agreed the CC would object to the proposals and request that they be consulted before any final decisions are made.

David Whyte confirmed his resignation as Secretary, and there was a discussion on whether the post should be paid or not. A notice is to be placed in the Village Shop. *Next meeting: Mon 27 Feb, 7pm, Lagwyne Hall.*

We know that cash is in short supply for many at present, so we are asking people to donate old CDs and DVDs so we can sell them to a recycling company. Eco Feature

sponsored by natural power

Each issue, this section will highlight a pertinent 'eco' issue, with information that will be useful to local readers. This issue we have a few tips and facts to get you thinking and hopefully save you energy, and money.

- On average every person in the UK throws away their own body weight in rubbish every 7 weeks.
- Every year an estimated 17.5 billion plastic bags are given away by supermarkets.
- A single tree will absorb one tonne of carbon dioxide over its lifetime.
- Fix hot water leaks a dripping tap wastes at least 5,500 litres of water a year: that's enough water wasted to fill a paddling pool every week for the whole summer.
- Only boil the water you need By everyone just boiling the amount of water needed when making a hot drink we can save enough energy to power over 7 million TVs for a year.
- Switch appliances off at the wall. Avoid leaving TVs, videos,

computers or music systems on standby and remember not to leave appliances such as mobile phones on charge unnecessarily. Even while on standby, most appliances use electricity, so switch off and save up to 8% of your electricity bill.

- The average household wastes £37 each year by leaving appliances on standby. Across the UK this is equivalent to the annual output of about 2½ 700MW power stations.
- Households in the UK now spend around 10% of their electricity bill on standby power.
- The average household has up to 12 gadgets left on standby or charging at any one time.
- In the UK around 15million TVs are left on standby for 20 hours per day. If they were all switched off, we'd save enough energy to decommission an

entire power station

- £90 million of bakery waste is thrown away by Scottish households every year that's enough to make everyone in Scotland a sandwich a day for the next 6 months.
- £70 million of fresh fruit waste is thrown away every year that's the equivalent of an apple a day for every school child and teacher in Scotland for a year and a half.
- £130 million of meat and fish waste is thrown away by Scottish households every year that's enough to make everyone in Scotland a bacon buttie every Saturday for the next year.
- £93 million of dairy waste is thrown away by Scottish households every year that's enough for everyone in Scotland to have milk on their cereal for the next 6 months.

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
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90th Anniversary for New Galloway Rural

AGNES COOKS...HAGGIS

Welcome to our new feature 'Agnes Cooks', written by local awardwinning cook Agnes Holden. In this issue, Agnes will be cooking something truly Scottish...

I am writing this in early January although I am aware that you are reading it in February / March. The idea of this column is to look at seasonal food and suggest a few ideas. I have decided to use haggis for this edition. Although, strictly speaking it is not "seasonal" I am surrounded by it at the moment and it is available all year round. Love it or hate it, it is Scottish winter fare!

The first recipe is a supper dish which can be increased or decreased depending on the quantity of people you are feeding and the size of your haggis! The second recipe is good as a nibble with drinks and as a wee taster for those who are trying haggis for the first time. Both recipes can be made using a meaty or vegetarian haggis.

Haggis Shepherd's Pie

1 Haggis

stock

Tin of red kidney beans (or other - chick peas are good too)

Approx 500ml beef or vegetable

Packet of spinach (about 300g) Quantity of mashed potatoes Finely grated cheese (cheddar, parmesan or a combination of any hard cheese)

Take the haggis from its casing and put into a small casserole dish. Mash down with a fork and spread over the dish (you can put the haggis into the microwave for a minute or so and it will soften enough to mash - but make sure it is out of its casing first or it will explode!) Drain and rinse the beans and mix into the haggis. Add the stock and stir through. Wash and drain the spinach and put into a pot with no added water. Put onto the heat to soften - you want to take the "bounce" out of the spinach but not actually cook it. Take it from the heat and spread over the haggis. Top with the mashed potatoes and sprinkle over the



cheese. Put into the oven 190C /mark 7 for about 40 mins and nicely toasted on top. Larger quantities will take longer so you might want to loosely cover with foil if it is getting too brown on top.

Haggis Puffs

Roll out a sheet of puff pastry and using a 6/7cm round cutter cut out circles. Put a teaspoonful of haggis on each round and top with a little mango chutney (other chutneys work well too). Brush the edges with a little water and fold one half over to make a semi circle. Crimp the edges with a fork and brush the tops with a little beaten egg. Make a small slit in the top of each and cook for about 12 mins at 200C / mark 6. As with all haggis these need to be eaten hot. They can be cooked in advance and frozen. Just defrost and reheat when needed.

PANCAKE LUNCH 2012

Balmaclellan and Kells Guild will be holding their 15th Pancake Lunch on Shrove Tuesday 21 February, in New Galloway Town Hall from 12 noon to 2pm.

This has become a very popular event in New Galloway over the

years and a different charity has been chosen to benefit each year.

Alexander Gordon Memorial Stone

In last year's April/May issue of the Gazette, the idea was floated of erecting a memorial stone to the noted Covenanter Alexander Gordon of Earlstoun in Dalry churchyard.

It was mentioned how he survived the times of persecution and was buried in Dalry churchyard in 1726, but no stone ever raised over his grave.

I mentioned how his grandson had prepared an inscription and poem for such a stone (the words of which are preserved in the Gordon papers in the Ewart Library, Dumfries), but lack of money had prevented him from fulfilling his plans.

It was most encouraging to see the way local people rallied round this project and the stone was erected in November.

On Sunday 27 November a service was held in Dalry Church, followed by the dedication of the memorial stone and the unveiling of a plaque on the Gordons of Earlstoun, which is attached to Dalry Session House alongside the stone.

The stone was funded by a generous grant of £1200 from the Scottish Covenanter Memorials Association, by a grant of £500 from Dalry Community Council (drawing on a bequest from Miss Jean Gibson, who always took an interest in the history of the Glenkens) and by donations

from many local individuals.

Thanks are also due to Russell Brooks of Ayrshire Memorials for producing the stone for a considerably reduced price. A grant of £500 from the Galloway Association of Glasgow largely covered the cost of the plaque. We are sure Sir John Gordon would be delighted with the memorial to his grandfather, inscribed with his own words. Now some 240 years after he failed to realise his own plans we have raised a memorial to a valiant man who lived through those troubled times. It is hoped the stone and plaque will form a focal point for the proposed Glenkens Covenanter trail.


Kells Parish War Memorial

There are twenty four war memorials in the Glenkens but the memorial to the men of Kells Parish in the burgh of New Galloway, at a height of twenty five feet, is certainly the largest.

The site in the Showfield was gifted by the tutors of John Seaforth Maitland Gordon of Kenmure (his father had died previously and he was only twelve years old himself). The monument is made of granite from the Burnfoot quarries on the Kenmure Estate and the symbol at the top of the memorial is a Chi Rho, one of the earliest Christian symbols which was brought to Galloway by Saint Ninian.

The memorial was built by Messrs Murray and McCubbing of New Galloway from an original design by Captain J W Dods VD. It was unveiled by Vice Admiral Sir A J Henniker-Heughan Bart CB RN of Airds on Sunday 23 April 1922, and custody was accepted by Provost Cowan on behalf of the Town and Parish councils.

The memorial is a well known local landmark and is still used for the service of Remembrance every November. It is also a familiar backdrop for the annual Alternative Games.



If you know about someone who is listed on a memorial then it helps to understand the importance of it so I would like to tell you about one of those listed on this memorial.

Lance Sergeant Adam Byers was the son of a shepherd, born in Kells parish, and was the oldest son of William and Sarah Byers. Although they had originally lived in Glenshimmeroch near Lochinvar, they had moved

to Craigenbay near Clatteringshaws by the time war broke out. His father had already died so he left behind a widowed mother, younger brother and two sisters when he enlisted just six weeks after the start of the war. He left behind his job as a gamekeeper at Dunveoch farm in the Garroch Glen.

We actually know much more about Adam from his service records; he had blue eyes, two vaccination marks on his left arm and he was once reprimanded for appearing for guard duty without having shaved. One day in September 1915 at the battle of Loos, over five hundred men of the Battalion were killed wounded or missing in a single day (over half the men). Adam Byers survived. By April 1916 he was in the trenches near the Hohenzollern Redoubt and an extract from the Battalion war diary of this period relates:

"...the rain came down in torrents and continued incessantly for forty hours. It is very difficult to imagine the misery and discomfort which the men suffered. The so-called trenches were full of water up to the men's knees. It was almost impossible for the ration or water parties to get up or down. During the second afternoon of this downpour, the German artillery hit our front line."

Adam Byers survived all this, so it was ironic, therefore, that on 28 May 1916 he was the only man from his Battalion who was killed whilst on a wiring patrol, when he was hit by a trench mortar. Like many others, his body was never found so he has no grave, but his name is inscribed on the wall of the memorial at Loos.

That is how a tragedy can affect one family and if we look at the four men named McCheyne, they were all brothers – what the rest of their family must have suffered is virtually uknown in modern times.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

The Glenkens Railway

Today a newspaper headline proclaiming 'Glenkens Derailment' is much more likely to be associated with some snag in local planning permission rather than the great age of railways.

The Portpatrick Railway first ran through Glenkens in March 1861, generating an almost unprecedented spirit of optimism concerning future economic benefits and the end of Galloway's isolation. It was killed off in June 1965 due to a combination of public apathy and the lethal lack of foresight displayed by the Tory government acting on the recommendations of 'Butcher' Beeching, chairman of the British Railways Board.

The railway followed the construction of the Dumfries-Castle Douglas line, inspiring a number of landowners and business interests in Wigtownshire to campaign for an extension to Portpatrick and thus Ireland. As a result most of the finance for western expansion was raised through local efforts, a source of great Galloway pride.

The rails entered Glenkens at Crossmichael running up the lochside to Parton, crossing the Loch Ken Viaduct (pictured) to Mossdale or New Galloway station, where navvies erected their huts during construction, and then headed into the hills by way of Stroan Viaduct and the roadless country around lonely Loch Skerrow. Between there and Gatehouse station, according to C H Dick, the savagery of scenery caused some travellers to 'shudder at the recollection'!

Malcolm Harper had a poem in which an auld wife 'saw a train come cross the Dee,/ Oh! What a woners thing said she'. The Loch Ken Viaduct, at the ferry crossing of Boat of Rhone, built at a cost of £,12,288 and 13 shillings (around £,600,000 today) was regarded then, as now, as one of the finest features on the entire railway. A proposal to provide a road alongside the rails was rejected. The three 130 foot spans are supported by two piers consisting of stoneclad iron cylinders sunk in 36 feet of water.

However not all locals were impressed. In December 1861 a £,20 reward was offered

for information about a large block of wood, which the Parton-bound train struck on the viaduct. A fish train from Stranraer derailed at Mossdale in 1913, and at 5am on 30 December 1935 the nightly 'Paddy', emerging from the west side of the bridge, lost seven of its coaches down the righthand embankment. In the midst of the wreckage were very dazed postal sorters but no one was seriously hurt.

When the railway opened Mr Wellwood Maxwell of Glenlee hosted a public dinner in New Galloway; the burgh's punchbowl was filled with toddy and the enterprise's success toasted. Maxwell advocated the extension of the track to Dalry. A man of true vision he also proposed a line to Sanguhar as the most effective link to Edinburgh and Glasgow. In 1898 a light railway from New Galloway station to



There can be no doubt that the railway, for a time, improved Galloway's links with England and Ireland but it only marginally enhanced those with central Scotland. On the other hand the trains brought unprecedented numbers of visitors to Glenkens. Shooters and fishermen made for Loch Skerrow. Landowners were convinced trains transported additional poachers. On 12 August railway staff allegedly did well by contriving to have the earliest grouse, victims of overhead wires and possibly the trains too, on London tables. Children from Dromore and Skerrow took the train to school at Mossdale. Skerrow residents received remoteness payments and were allowed six tons a year of free coal. Additionally they were given weekly 'market tickets' for shopping in Castle Douglas. There was also a Wednesday-only service

between Castle Douglas

and New Galloway. Mail services certainly improved locally. Station-masters at Mossdale and Crossmichael were permitted to open post offices. Overall trains opened up additional markets for local agricultural produce and game.

Tourists were the major acquisition, inspired from the 1890s by the works of S R Crockett, among others. An Edinburgh hotelier took a lease of the hotel at Ken Bridge in anticipation of guests exploring an unknown part of Scotland, travelling on some of the three trains each way daily except Sunday. Carriers of goods and passengers also experienced considerable increase in business. The first motor charabanc was in service between Dalmellington and Dalry in 1912, later extended to New Galloway, but at 3 shillings and sixpence, one way, it was expensive. In the 1890s slower horse-drawn public conveyance was widely available, leaving from the Kenmure Arms and Cross Keys Hotel at 9am and 2.45pm, from the station at 10.01am and 3.29pm (note the precise timings!) Transport was also available for Dalry and Carsphairn. On Monday and Saturday there was a service from Balmaclellan (via Ironmacannie) to Parton at 8.30am.

H D Thorne in his thorough study Rails to Portpatrick (2nd ed. 2005) laments the description of the Loch Ken Viaduct as 'a very rickety old bridge'. Now in private ownership it is reportedly not so decrepit as to be impassable to Land Rovers during the shooting season but the most iconic structure of Glenkens' modest railway era is not improving with age. While fully aware of the difficulties involved, might it be suggested that, somewhat restored, it would make a wonderful walking and cycle route, as well as a monument to past local aspirations. The failure to develop the Glenkens railway northwards was every bit as disastrous as its closure. The partial re-opening of the viaduct would indeed be a 'woners thing'. FUEL ROUND THE

CLOCK Dalry now has a 24 hour fuel forecourt - but this isn't the first time fuel has been available at all hours from The Garage...

Over 30 years ago, Dalry was one of the first fuel stations in the south of Scotland to have a 24 hour forecourt. In the mid-seventies Willie Bone 'senior' introduced a new concept at the time; a 50-pence coin operated pump. This installation allowed fuel sales around the clock. However, once fuel went over a £1 per gallon, this service became extinct due to a law which stated the minimum sales of motor spirit was half of a gallon!

Another first was when Willie 'senior' introduced lead-free petrol in the late 80's, and Dalry was one of the first forecourts in Dumfries & Galloway retailing the then new unleaded petrol.

Now, following in his father's tradition, William Bone has installed the 21st Century answer to round-the-clock fuel retailing, with the first un-manned forecourt in the Stewartry.

The main aim of the project was to end up with a modern fuel forecourt and also to be one of the top rural sites in Scotland. Hopefully, further 'firsts' will continue to take place in the future - watch this space!
