Twin Trophies for Youth Players

The CatStrand Youth Players entered two plays to be proud of at this year's Stewartry District Drama Festival at Lochside Theatre, and were doubly delighted to triumph with two trophies to top it all off.

The Glenkens '73 Club CatStrand Youth Players' performance of 'Teesha's Got Elves' was awarded the Bill McKinnon Award for the highest marks overall in production out of every entry, including adult productions.

Scotland Winners in Kilmarnock.

The performance enthralled the audience and provided a huge challenge for two young actresses, Eleanor Jones and Lowena Lindsay, who met the challenge head on and held the stage throughout the play, ably supported by twelve 'elves', a few of whom were making their debut stage appearances!

Mr McKenna (principal teacher) and Mrs Banner (school librarian), who support the pupil teams, hope that the Carsphairn pupil librarians will be pioneers in the Glenkens Cluster, helping train new pupil librarians and promoting the sharing of books between the schools.

Carsphairn Community Council: A member of the community warned against bogus policemen asking for credit card donations for a yearbook to promote the police.

The funding application to the Lottery's 'Investing in Ideas' scheme for a feasibility study of Greystones Pub was submitted Mon 20 Feb. A response is expected in 6 weeks.

The CC has enquired of Natural Power whether Carsphairn's community benefits would increase with regard to the extended Windy Standard wind farm and we were informed it was not an extension and is now called Ashmark Hill. Planning permission has not yet been granted; CC to continue to investigate. . Next meetings: Mon 30 Apr & 28 May, 7pm, Lagwyne Hall.

Get into Reading is an innovative shared reading model which Gill Stanyard has piloted across Scotland for people with dementia and their carers.

Gill says: "We need to remember the person behind the dementia and do what we can to ensure that they can live as well as they can, with full opportunities for meaningful engagement. Carers of people with dementia can have the roughest ride due to the changing and progressive nature of the disease. We need to look after these carers and ensure they have good respite and feel cared for and connected to others."

Get into Reading seeks to use the shared reading aloud of stories and poems to increase well-being and reduce isolation.

Natural discussion develops and participants share experiences, memories and their thoughts and feelings about the reading.

"We have found that attendance at a Get into Reading group can increase empathy and well-being and reduce feelings of isolation and loneliness," says Gill.

As the majority of people with dementia are cared for at home, it is important to reach local communities where people can have easy access to group sessions. This is especially important in a rural area like Dumfries & Galloway.

The next phase of the lotteryfunded project will be run here in D&G as two three-month programmes of weekly shared reading groups. Gill says:

"IT FEELS GREAT TO BE DOING THIS BACK AT HOME IN DUMFRIES & GALLOWAY".

The group in Dumfries is for carers and starts on Thursday 29 March from 10am-12noon at the Alzheimer Scotland office, 1 Gordon Street.

The other group, which is for both carers and people with dementia, starts on Wednesday 28 March

at 10am at Castle Dougals Community Centre.

Glenkens residents are welcome to attend both groups; Gill has tried to work it in around the bustimes too, so people who don't drive can still attend.

And Get into Reading is not just for older folk... At the moment Gill is working in Dalry Secondary School, along with Catherine Phillips (who co-wrote the funding bid for the schools project) running a reading group with some of the students.

Gill says: "I love my job with the Reader Organisation. It is rewarding in many ways, but the real reward for me is when people have 'Got into Reading' and tell me it's the thing they most look forward to in their week."



Over the next few issues we will look at the government's new energy-saving scheme, the Green Deal. In this issue is a general overview, and following issues will focus on specific energy-saving measures.

Chief secretary to the Treasury Danny Alexander has announced the approval of £200m to be used as an incentive for the public to pick up the Green Deal scheme when it is available for homeowners in October 2012.

The Energy Act 2011 includes provisions for the new 'Green Deal', which intends to reduce carbon emissions cost effectively by "revolutionising" the energy efficiency of British properties.

At a local level, the Green Deal will enable many households and businesses to improve the energy efficiency of their properties so less energy is consumed and less money is wasted.

From October this year, participating energy utility companies and accredited retailers such as Tesco, B&Q and Marks & Spencer will provide customers across the UK with quality-assured work

to their homes, businesses and community spaces for no upfront cost, and without loans or advance finance.

The full cost of the measures will be recovered through instalments on the energy bill over several years, and because the Green Deal is not a personal loan or an advance payment scheme, there is no obligation to continue paying the instalments if you move house.

Suitability for the scheme will be assessed on a simple calculation, known as the 'golden rule' of the Green Deal - the predicted savings from the energy efficiency improvements to your property must equal or exceed the cost of installation.

So keep this date in mind, and read in the next few issues of the Gazette what you can do to make your home more energy efficient so you can make the most of the Green Deal when it becomes available.

RNLI Evening

The Glenkens branch of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) is holding its annual fundraising evening on Thursday 24 May in Dalry Town Hall.

The theme of `Life on the Ocean Wave' is particularly suited to this year with the rise in `staycation' tourism having led to one of the busiest years on record for the crews of the 45 RNLI stations around Scotland's coastline.

Last year many people opted for a holiday by the sea in this country rather than abroad, butmany then ran into difficulties in the water and had to be rescued by the RNLI. According to new figures 2011 was the sixth busiest year on record since the charity was founded in 1824. The Lifeboats receive no Government money but rely instead on voluntary donations to meet the cost of maintaining its 24 hour search & rescue service. Residents of the Glenkens have always been generous supporters of the RNLI and with more than 800 people rescued by Scotland's lifeboats last year it is gratifying to know the money is going to good use.

Diamond Jubilee

Plans to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee are in place for the residents of Dalry.

A beacon will be lit on Mulloch Hill on Monday 4 June to join other beacons up and down the country and then a village-wide 'street party' is to be held on Tuesday 5 June on the school playing fields.

Open to all residents there will also be a Fancy Dress Competition, a Best Decorated House or Garden competition and a Children's Art Competition.

Margaret's reply focussed on several of the local gentlemen, comparing them to the Bard (or not) as the case may be!

The evening was rounded off with some community singing accompanied by Margaret Sloan, a vote of thanks to all the artistes from David Gibbon, and Auld Lang Syne.

A YEAR IN THE GLENKENS

It is now over a year since Joanna Sinclair and Stewart Macpherson took over the Clachan Inn. In this article, Joanna describes their first 12 months in Dalry.

On the 28th of December 2011 Stewart and I celebrated our first year at The Clachan Inn.

On that day, we both agreed that the last 12 months had been the most challenging and rewarding days of our lives, and that we would not have survived without the support and friendship of the Glenkens locals.

Without a doubt, there have been hard times since we began our tenancy in December 2010, but this is entirely overshadowed by the huge pride we share in how popular The Clachan Inn has become.

We had lived and worked in Glasgow for several years before moving to Dalry, so the change of scenery was drastic. Instead of the noise of sirens and street-sweepers, we wake up to the sounds of animal noises... and Jimmy Dixon going for his morning messages! Although the pace is somewhat slower here, we wouldn't change it for the world and have discovered a strong and wonderful sense of community for the first time in our lives.

We had both worked in offices before moving to Dalry; I was an

organiser for a teachers' trade union and Stewart worked as an administrator for the Procurator Fiscal. Neither of us took much satisfaction in our careers, so we

felt a change was needed.

We had originally looked at hotels in Kirkcudbright, but once we were shown The Clachan we knew it was for us.

I think I will always be overwhelmed by the atmosphere and look of the bar, lounge and bothy.

Stewart and I had never worked in bars before, so the decision to take over the lease of The Clachan was both scary and exhilarating.
We were a little

naive to start, Stewart had never even started a fire

before our time here, and then there were three to light every morning!

That said, one year on, Stewart still gets 'constructive feedback' from the locals about his firelighting skills.

AGNES COOKS... RHUBARB 2 eggs, separated

In this issue, our very own award-winning cook, Agnes Holden, will give us some tips on what to do with all that rhubarb in our gardens his summer...

There are lots of recipes both sweet and savoury for this versatile fruit (although to be accurate it is actually a stem vegetable). I have decided to offer one of each as many people are faced with a glut of rhubarb and the chutney recipe should at least help with some of the excess! They both contain ginger (in different forms) but I think that rhubarb and ginger is a combination hard to beat.

Rhubarb and Stem Ginger Tart

This recipe uses preserved stem ginger which can be found in most supermarkets but maybe, like me, you have some lurking at the back of the fridge from Christmas! I am giving the recipe for the pastry but a bought tart base would be fine.

Pastry

200g (8oz) plain flour 140g (5oz) butter 2 teaspoons ground ginger 3-4 tablespoons of preserved stem ginger syrup Filling

350g (12oz) rhubarb cut into 2.5cm (1in) lengths

3 pieces of preserved stem ginger, sliced

Put the ground ginger and flour into a bowl and mix evenly, add the butter and rub it in finely. Pour in the ginger syrup and mix to form firm dough. (Alternatively, put the flour, ginger and butter into a processor and pulse until fine. Add the syrup and pulse until it

Roll the dough out thinly and line a 23cm / 9in diameter loose bottomed tart tin. Chill for at least 40 mins.

forms a stiff dough).

Bake the pastry case blind in a preheated oven (200C / gas 6) for 10 - 15 mins.

For the filling put half the sugar into a pan with 1 tablespoon of water. Bring to the boil and stir until the sugar is dissolved. Add the rhubarb and cook very gently for 5 - 10 mins until rhubarb is just cooked.

Drain the rhubarb but keep the juice it was cooked in. Arrange the rhubarb and sliced ginger in the pastry case. Put the egg yolks, remaining sugar and cream in a bowl and whisk until thick then stir in the reserved cooking juices.

Whisk the egg whites in a bowl until stiff and fold into the cream mixture. Pour into the pastry case and bake for 30 - 40 mins when it should be just set.

Dust with icing sugar. Delicious served hot or cold with some crème fraiche to which a few



teaspoons of the preserved stem ginger syrup have been added.

Rhubarb, Ginger and Orange Chutney

1 large onion, chopped 1kg (just over 2 lb) rhubarb - cut into approx 2.5cm (1in) lengths

150g (5oz) sultanas 300ml (1/2 pt) cider vinegar 400g (14oz) soft brown sugar 2 tablespoons of freshly grated ginger

Zest of one large orange 2 whole cloves

Piece of cinnamon stick

Put everything (except the rhubarb - it's added later to help retain its colour and shape) into a large pan and heat gently, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Bring to the boil and simmer for about 20 - 30 mins until the syrup has thickened. Add the rhubarb and continue cooking, stirring gently from time to time until the rhubarb is soft (about 15mins) but still retains its shape. Take the pan off the heat and cool for 15mins. Stir gently to distribute the fruit and spoon into warm, sterilised jars. Store the chutney in a cool, dark place for about one month before using. It will keep for a year.

Delicious with all game (particularly duck) and with cold meats.

Kells Parish War Memorial (Part II)

I had fully intended to submit an article on the Dalry War Memorial for this issue but I have had several observations and requests for information about the article in the last issue so I thought I needed to revisit the topic with further information.

Mike Brown mentioned that since I had not given Adam Byers's regiment he had checked the memorial himself and found that Adam was among a number who had served in the Cameronians. He wondered why this should be so.

As Dumfries and Galloway had long been the recruiting territory of the Kings Own Scottish Borderers, the fact that Adam Byers and a number of other men from New Galloway chose to enlist in the Cameronians deserves an explanation. I can do no better than repeat an item written by a fellow military researcher (Stuart Wilson, formerly of Auchencairn).

One of the main reasons for the relatively low KOSB enlistment in the New Galloway area was localised political fall-out from the decision not to include the Kells as one of the companies in the newly formed 5th KOSB (TF) in 1908.

New Galloway had always been a strong supporter of the Galloway Rifle Volunteers ('E' Coy.) and so expected to be represented in the new set-up. However, once they realised that they were being overlooked there was a great deal of ill-feeling towards the 5th Battalion and so very few men from the area ended up with the KOSB.

New Galloway's antipathy towards the new

set-up is expressed more fully by Ian Devlin in Albanich:

"With a sufficiency of recruits within the Dumfries and Galloway region, it was considered that 'E' Company, New Galloway... was drawn from too remote an area and it was with some reluctance that this Company was disbanded. It was to be many a long day before the men of New Galloway and the Glenkens were to forgive their home Regiment, the KOSB, for their ingratitude to a Company who had produced

many of the Regiments finest marksmen, two of the Regiments four Commanding Officers and their Colour Sergeant, now Sergeant Major Grierson, who had captured Commandant Wolmaran and 30 armed men in South Africa in 1901. From that date [1908] the men of the Glenkens were to offer their future services to the Cameron Highlanders."

Although omitting the reason which lay behind it, it is even noted in the official history of the 5th KOSB that: "... the first man enlisted in New Galloway went to the Cameron Highlanders. As soon as he had been seen swaggering in his kilt down the High Street of this ancient burgh, nine or ten of his chums went off to join that regiment."

That first man may well have been William Stewart, also listed on this memorial.

Thanks to research by Ken Morrison of Rockcliffe, we know that the men did not die together but on a variety of dates throughout the war.

I have placed a copy of Ken's research notes on the New Galloway men in the Catstrand. A photograph of 9 New Galloway Cameron Highlanders at the front in 1915 was published in a pictorial book of the Glenkens in 2002.

Each Town and Village set up its own War Memorial Committee and decided on the qualification criteria for a name to be entered on the memorial. Some required a man to be born there, others that they lived there at the time of enlistment but often we just don't know how they decided who should be listed, particularly as the minutes of these committees rarely survive.

We do know that the New Galloway

Committee decided to add the name of VAD nurse Jane Nodwell. Jane was the daughter of Samuel and Janet (Lockerbie) Nodwell of the Cross Keys Hotel and is buried in Kells churchyard. She died on 19 November 1918 of influenza at Yorkhill War Hospital, Glasgow.

The Voluntary Aid Detachment (VAD) was a voluntary organisation providing field nursing services mainly in hospitals. The organisation was founded in 1909 with the help of the Red Cross and the Order of St. John. VAD nurses appear on some memorials but not others; it depends on the conditions that the local committee applied.

Barbara Barker has also been in touch. Her grandfather was Alexander McCubbing, a master stonemason and one half of the building firm who built the memorial. I will let Barbara's words tell the story...

"His eldest son John, was an apprentice with the firm until WW1 broke out and he joined the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders in January 1915. He is, in fact, the Lance Corporal John McCubbing whose name in on the memorial, having been killed at the Battle of the Somme in August 1916 at the age of 20.

"He was injured by shrapnel in the knee and thigh, and was being helped to safety by a Private Hunter from Carsphairn. When he was injured his helmet had fallen off, and as he was being lifted up by Pte Hunter he was shot again, this time in the head and died instantly."

Barbara has also given information about the Stewart brothers listed on the memorial.

Railway

Since, happily, the article in the last Gazette on the Glenkens Railway generated a fair number of responses we return to it in this issue.

Logan Paterson has pointed out that there is a video of the train journey from Parton to Kirkcowan on Youtube. Put 'Madrigada Eterna' into the search facility and you will be on your way, stopping at most of the stations en route. There is space for comments so if you enjoy it and the soundtrack by KLF, a group that had local connections — and even if you don't! - please

respond and mention Glenkens in order to make this district better known.

Tom Scott reports that his mother served in the Auxilliary Territorial Service (ATS; women's branch of the British Army) during World War II. When boarding the train at Parton, on one occasion, to go south, the train was so full that she had to be pushed through the window - a local

example of in-fenestration... Rumour hath it that when Tom was on Dalry Community Council he sometimes inspired ideas of defenestration! Tom also kindly reminds us that the farmhouse at the northern entrance to Parton was originally planned to be the Station Hotel but there was not enough demand to make it viable. Speaking of which does anybody live in Parton, a village which seems curiously devoid of inhabitants? The station was unstaffed from 1951.

It has also been pointed out that it was Harold Wilson's Labour Government that actually closed down the line in 1965. The decision, however, was made under the regime of Prime Minister Alec Douglas-Home following the advice of Transport Minister Ernie Marples, who just happened to be director of a road building business, and Dr Richard Beeching. In 1950 British Railways controlled some 21,000 miles of track and 6,000 stations, reduced to 12,000 miles and 2,000 stations by 1975. During the 1964 election campaign Labour promised to stop the closures if elected, but of course later renegued.

The railway is central, to the point of tedium in my view, in Dorothy L Sayer's Lord Peter Wimsey novel, Five Red Herrings (1931) in which one of the characters briefly visits High Brig of Dee and New Galloway, but which is mainly concerned with the Stranraer-Glasgow line. The story was televised some time ago starring Ian Carmichael as Wimsey. Some may find the author's obsession with timetables utterly

fascinating but they tax the patience of this reader if no other...

In John Buchan's Thirty-Nine Steps, a story that depends on more incredible coincidences than there are varieties of weather on a Galloway Spring Day, Richard Hannay, after the murder of Scudder, decides that Galloway is the best place to go to. 'It was the nearest wild part of Scotland and from the

look of the map it was not over thick with population'. He switches from the London to the Stranraer train at Dumfries. The author was not writing a guide book but it would appear that the stations where Hannay alights to go walkabout before reboarding an east-bound train, were inspired by Dromore and Loch Skerrow. He abandons the train at the Stroan Viaduct and later comes across a road bridge beside which is an inn, 'standing golden in the sunset against the brown hills', clearly the establishment once known as The Spalding Arms, now the Kenbridge Hotel. There he meets the 'literary landlord' who has ambitions to write. When Hannay remarks that innkeepers should make the greatest story-tellers in the world he is told,

Not now. Maybe in the

old days when you had pilgrims and ballad-makers and highwaymen and mail-coaches on the road. But not now. Nothing comes here but motor-cars full of fat women, who stop for lunch, and a fisherman or two, and the shooting tenants in August. There is not much material to be got out of that'. Perhaps the pessimism was due to recession in 1930 as now. Dave and Sue Paterson, proprietors of 'The Brig', can perhaps inform us about how many pilgrims and highwaymen are among their patrons nowadays.

When the baddies show up in the book Hannay sends the innkeeper (Dave P. take note!) on his motorbike to Newton Stewart to alert the chief constable. He would have gone faster than any train but the bike was diagnostic. Slowly but surely, private transport was outstripping the public variety. Many folk have challenged my suggestion that the railway died, in part, due to apathy.

A legend seems to have grown up about Westminster deliberately severing Galloway from the rest of the country by cutting the railway but the facts are that passenger use was seriously declining and freight was increasingly moved to roads while rolling stock and allied services were becoming evermore dated.

Whether we are discussing a past way of life, dispossessed Gaels or First Nations Americans, human beings have a great capacity for waiting until peoples and institutions are on the verge of extinction before belatedly sentimentalizing their loss. The demise of the railway was a regrettable disaster in which everyone was, to a greater or lesser degree, complicit.
