Dalry Community Update

A713 Allengibbon Bridge

Dalry Community Council has campaigned for some time now to get signage and road conditions improved at the Allengibbon Bridge, about a mile north of Dalry, after several timber lorries have overturned at the tight bends.

Dumfries & Galloway Council responded (finally) by applying an anti slip coating to the road, but not upgrading the signage to warn HGV drivers of the adverse camber and tight bends, and on Monday 3 September another timber lorry fell over at the bridge, making it quite clear that providing an anti-slip surface is not sufficient. Apparently upgrade work in this area is planned, but not for a couple of years... In the meantime Dalry Community Council would like to see improved warning signs – perhaps even a motion activated flashing sign. Plainly

the timber lorry drivers should be aware of the hazards at this bridge and respond accordingly.

4/5 bedroom homes wanted for Whinneymuir housing development

One of the reasons that
Dalry Community Council
opposed Dumfries & Galloway
Housing Partnership's (DGHP)
Whinneymuir development was
not the development itself,
but the nature of it; too many
properties crammed into a small
field which already had drainage
issues, but also a lack of four or
more bedroom properties.

The issue was raised with DGHP two years ago, who agreed to look into it, but nothing has happened. I am told there are two families with a local connection in need of a 4/5 bedroom social home who cannot get on the list for Dalry because; 'there are no 4/5 bedroom DGHP properties in

Dalry', yet when DGHP was asked about provision of larger properties for these families, they said there was no demand for them as there was nobody on their list! Is it me, or does DGHP's left hand not know what its right is up to?! I believe we should be able to expect better from the region's leading social landlord.

Not very broadband

Broadband provision in this remote area continues to be a problem and hinders internet access for business and private users alike. Recent 'blackouts' have highlighted that BT's ageing exchange is struggling to deal with demand, and we are told it will be some time yet before upgrade work is made in the Glenkens.

Whilst I can accept the economic reality that there are probably not enough subscribers in this area to make it 'financially' justifiable for BT to give us fibreoptic broadband any day soon, if we don't get internet provision improved we won't attract new people and businesses to the area that would make the investment worth it for BT. We desperately need intervention by the Scottish Government / Dumfries & Galloway Council to break out from this chicken-andegg cycle!

Halloween Special: A Ghostly Execution

Just over 150 years ago, Dumfries played host to the last public execution of a woman in Scotland when Mary Reid (or Timney), was hanged in front of a crowd of thousands at the old Buccleuch Street Prison.

Mary, who was thought to have lived at Carsfad cottages on the A713 north of Dalry, was found guilty of murdering a neighbour following an argument which clearly got of hand. After a gut-wrenching build up and high drama on the day itself, Mary met her maker at twenty three minutes past eight on the morning of 29 April 1862.

Local paranormal team, Mostly Ghostly Investigations, marked the 150th anniversary of Mary's

execution with one of their popular Dumfries Ghost Walks.

"The team feels that Mary's tragic tale has captured the public's imagination," says Kathleen Cronie of Mostly Ghostly. "Mary's story is an intriguing insight into the events of that fateful day in 1862 and in addition to this, participants have reported a number of unexplained occurrences on the site of the old prison..."

Kathleen goes on to tell us about a bizarre incident which occurred on one of the Mostly Ghostly tours. Below is an eye-witness account:

"My family and I had the strangest experience... The guide was telling our group about the hanging of a lady there years ago. Out of the corner of my eye I could see a small light, just above a young girl's head. The light moved down to the top of her head,

then disappeared. At the same time she jumped and started rubbing her head.

"As we left the location, I said to the girl: 'Did something touch you on the head back there?' She answered: 'Yes, how did you know?" I replied; 'I saw it touch you.' I can't explain what happened that evening..."

Kathleen says: "We at Mostly Ghostly cannot say for sure who or what is responsible for these unusual occurrences. However, places where people have met tragic, untimely or violent ends are often associated with hauntings. There can be few places with stronger emotional imprints than the site of public executions."

Mostly Ghostly have two Halloween Tours planned for Wednesday 31 October, at 7pm and 9pm.



In this issue we find out what our new designation as a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve will mean to the Glenkens.

What do Galloway, Mount Kenya, and Uluru have in common?

They are all UNESCO Biosphere Reserves. In July 2012 the United Nations, in the form of UNESCO, designated Galloway and South Ayrshire as Scotland's first Biosphere Reserve, and part of the World Network of Biospheres under the Man and the Biosphere (MAB) programme.

This programme is dedicated to improving human livelihoods and ensuring natural habitats by promoting strategies to ensure sustainable development.

Our region was chosen for its number of unique combinations of habitats and environments, rich cultural heritage and communities that are aware of their impact on the environment and want to develop sustainably.

There are currently 600 Biospheres world-wide, with only two others in the UK - one in north Devon and the other in mid-Wales. Each Biosphere is

seen to be a site of excellence where new and optimal practices to manage nature and human activities are tested and demonstrated.

The Galloway and South Ayrshire Biosphere - based on the reserves of Cairnsmore of Fleet, Silver Flowe, and the Merrick Kells (SSSI) - covers an area of 5268 square kilometres. It is divided into three distinct areas: the Core, the Buffer, and the Transition area, and ranges from Ayr in the north to Whithorn in the south, Portpatrick in the west to Thornhill in the east, encompassing 45,000 dwellings and 95,000 people.

Being part of the Biosphere programme is a unique opportunity open to individuals, businesses, and communities to develop the region sustainably, both economically and environmentally, for the benefit of the local and ultimately global community.

What the Biosphere brings is partnership in an international first class brand. The Biosphere does not directly bring funding with it, but it is a worldwide

symbol of a unique and spectacular environment; a symbol that is to bring the south west of Scotland more attention from both tourism and bodies such as the Scottish Government. The Biosphere is also interested in lending its support to a wide range of enterprising initiatives from micro energy generation to the promotion of traditional rural skills for biodiversity management, from sustainable tourism initiatives to the celebration and interpretation of local heritage and culture.

A group of local artists and writers is one of the first groups to take advantage of the new designation, and some of their members recently had the experience of visiting the East Carpathians and High Tatras Biospheres. The results of this informative trip will be reported at an evening event at the CatSrand - keep your eyes peeled for more on this.

Apollo5 are busy building a career as performers and we will certainly hear their name in the future. We are very fortunate that they chose Dalry as their first Scottish engagement.



THREE UNFORTUNATE BROTHERS

This tragic tale follows from a reader's request for elaboration on the story of Robert James Clark mentioned in Paul Goodwin's previous article on Dalry's war memorials.

In 1901, Hugh and Esther Clark were living in Craigielea, Dalry, with their three sons and four daughters. The oldest son was named Hugh after his father, with his brothers being John Martin and Robert James.

Hugh and Robert both served in the First World War in the Gordon Highlanders. Robert was unfortunately killed on the battlefield by a shell in November 1916; he had been an apprentice joiner to his father and was also a relief postman, and he is remembered by being the first named on the village war memorial.

John took his own life in

February 1917 in Dalry. As was customary in such cases, no newspaper report of his death was published, just an obituary, and in order to spare the feelings of anyone who might read this, I will also publish no further details of the event. I will also not speculate as to the circumstances other than to observe that this took place just two months after his brother was killed at the front.

Hugh eventually returned safely to Dalry after his war service and became the village postman for forty years before retiring and becoming the relief lighthouse keeper at Ross lighthouse in the Solway.

On 18 August 1960, Hugh was found murdered in the lighthouse. He had been shot three times in the head by assistant keeper Robert Dickson, who was eventually caught, tried and convicted of murder and theft. There are some well-written articles about the case to be found on the web; just put 'Ross Lighthouse Murder' into

your favourite search engine. The names of their parents, Hugh and Esther, can still be seen in the village; as you leave Dalry on the A713 to Carsphairn, a little way past Bone's garage is a bench with a plaque dedicated to them.

Three unfortunate brothers indeed; killed by enemy action, suicide and murder. One last puzzle remains... on the family gravestone beside the entrance to Dalry church, John Martin Clark is described as their eldest son - but we know from the 1901 census that Hugh was older by a year... We continue our interviews with the newly elected councillors for the Glenkens with Finlay Carson (Scottish Conservative & Unionist).

What are your links to the Glenkens? I have lived in the Stewartry all my life, and have regularly visited the Glenkens. I have a close relationship and interest in the area, and am a keen supporter of the CatStrand.

What skills do you believe that you bring to your job as councillor? I think that as a family man, I am aware of and live with the issues that folk in the area deal with. I have an IT business in the area, and used to be involved in the farming sector; it is this practical knowledge and experience that I aim to bring to the job of councillor.

What do you believe to be the important issues facing the Glenkens at present, and how would you feel they would be best tackled? The important issues facing the Glenkens are employment, especially where the youth are concerned, and public transport. I believe employment can be encouraged through developing the Glenkens as a tourism destination in its own right, and I think councillors need to get behind projects that develop this sector.

I also believe that we must assist and support enterprising initiatives taking place in the area. An excellent example is the Crayfish Project. Initially this was aimed at dealing with the spectacular growth of the non-native crayfish in our waters, which were having a detrimental effect on both our water habitats and our native species. It was then suggested that an initiative could be developed whereby the crayfish could be, under license, commercially farmed and processed, as is done in other areas of the country. This particular venture has hit a hopefully surmountable brick wall, but it is enterprising endeavours like this that must be pushed forward.


Transport in the Glenkens, I think, has been addressed with the Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI), but I would like to see this widened and developed to ensure that everyone has a reliable and regular service making access to town, and the facilities therein, available to all.

What do you believe are the important issues facing councillors today? Councillors and politicians across the UK are constantly being slated for forgetting why they have been elected to the positions that they are in. It is the responsibility of councillors to improve the lot of the people that they represent, and it is the duty of all councillors to work together, regardless of party politics, towards this end.

Councillors must be accessible to their electorate, willing to meet with them face to face and engage with them

in an environment that they feel comfortable in.

How would you like to see land use change in the Glenkens over the next ten years? I can't see the Glenkens changing much over the next ten



How would you like to see the Glenkens change over the next ten years? I would like to see the Glenkens developed into a recognised tourist destination. It has a lot to boast about with fantastic landscapes, natural history and great attractions such as Watson Birds, Galloway Activity Centre, the Water Ski Centre, and the CatStrand which, if marketed together, create a great holiday package.

What issues do you plan to tackle during your term and how? I plan to ensure the development of the GTI. It is essential to sustain communities, allowing the older generation to live independently for longer and the youth an essential key to employment. I also look forward to grasping the opportunity to work with the renewable energy sector, as well as forestry, as these provide opportunities for employment in the area as well as harnessing sustainable energy sources. Dumfries and Galloway is the second highest region in Scotland for fuel poverty. Councillors have a part to play helping communities and individuals access the ability to microgenerate their own electricity that can be used to power, for example, village halls or even whole villages.

What do you think can be done to encourage and attract new businesses to the area? I think that high speed broadband, good quality, affordable and appropriate housing, and a good transport infrastructure are important factors when attracting new businesses to an area. I feel, too, that we can attract new business to the area by promoting the unique personality of the Glenkens, with our good schools, lifestyle, and landscape.

ROKPA Kids On Tour brought a little slice of Nepal to the CatStrand.

A group of ex street-children from Kathmandu told their stories through film, drama, dance and song. These children had been saved from homelessness and poverty by a charity called Rokpa. Rokpa is the Tibetan word for help and that is exactly what they do. Rokpa adopted these children providing them with food, accommodation, security, love and a fresh start.

The show aims to help audiences better understand the difficulties that these children faced and how Rokpa has transformed their lives. The show is a staged autobiography of the children's experiences, covering themes such as bullying, domestic violence, hunger and drug abuse in a sensitive yet heart-breakingly honest way.

Despite the serious nature of the subject matter, the stage was brought to life with the vibrant traditional Nepalese costume and dance, touches of comic relief and their beaming smiles allowing the audience to appreciate just how much of a difference Rokpa has made to their lives.

After the show we interviewed two of the older members of the cast and saw how much of a buzz they got from their time on stage. The most important thing for them, however, was how "fortunate" they felt to be given the opportunity to share their story and, with the audience's support, help the thousands of others like them. They told us that the process of sharing their stories in order to put together the show was incredibly difficult for them but also that it was very important in helping them to overcome their past and start again. It was very clear to us how much gratitude they had for Rokpa and what it had done for them. When asked what Rokpa meant to him Sanjay answered, "like heaven".

We all felt very privileged to have been given an insight into these children's difficult lives and the bravery they have had to share their story. It made us all realise how lucky we are and how important charities like Rokpa are.



CAITLIN'S COLUMN

AGNES COOKS...

SALMON

Does anyone else share my acute irritation when buying fillets of fish (especially salmon) to find that the scales have not been removed from the skin?

Many recipes call for fillet skins to be cooked to a crisp and eaten but you cannot cook or eat scales and they are impossible to remove easily when the fish has already been cut into fillets. As I like to fish, I am very happy to deal with all that needs to be done to prepare fish for the frying pan, including gutting, but I find de-scaling a fish an immense challenge. If done at home you will be picking scales off the ceiling and walls for weeks! Even in fishmongers now, fillets are often sold with the scales still on. I recently tried to buy a whole salmon which I was happy to fillet myself but when I asked if I could have it descaled I was told there was no one there who could do it!

To protect my blood pressure, this recipe calls for salmon fillets with no skin at all! This is one of my favourite ways of cooking salmon, and although it includes salt and sugar, it contains no added fat and the watercress sauce is easy and lovely with all

other types of fish too.
The fish can be prepared for any number of people by allowing one fillet per person. The quantities for the sauce will be enough for four to six people. Make the sauce first and keep warm as you cook the fish.

Watercress Sauce

In a deep pan (not a frying pan) gently fry a finely chopped shallot (or small onion) and crushed garlic clove in a little olive oil. When cooked, add about 175ml of white wine and boil until the liquid reduces to about half the quantity. Add a whole bag (usually 70 - 100g) of watercress. Stir it around but remove from the heat and blitz with a hand held mixer or in a food processor. Add the juice of half a lemon and season with salt and pepper. The addition of a couple of tablespoons of double cream makes it lovely and rich but it works well without. Keep the sauce warm in the pan while you cook the fish but avoid boiling it.

Griddled Salmon

If you cook the salmon on a ridged griddle you end up with nice toasted lines on the fillets but it works fine in a frying pan. Put a griddle pan or frying pan onto the heat with no oil. While the pan is heating, sprinkle a small pinch of salt onto each side of the salmon fillet. Repeat using pepper, and finally do the same with a little sugar. Try to get equal quantities on each



side. It is important to do this just before you are going to cook it as the salt will draw out moisture from the fish, making it wet.

When the pan is hot (it does need to be hot or the fish will stick) put your fillets in. Reduce the heat slightly at this stage and cook for about 3/4 mins each side depending on the thickness of your fish. You will see the fish becoming opaque as it cooks. The sugar also caramelises slightly as it cooks, giving a lovely crispiness to the fish.

Put the fish onto a warm plate and add the sauce. This dish is nice with plain boiled new potatoes and veg of your choice. The fish also works well cold with a little salad dressing or mayonnaise.

BATTLEFIELD CONNECTIONS

In the last issue of the Gazette there was a story from the pupils of Dalry Secondary School about their visit to the battlefields of Flanders and the Somme in June. After a reader's request for elaboration on local links found, here are three pupils' stories.

Mackenzie Lawrie, S3: This was my first time abroad and on day two of our trip we visited Thiepval, in France. This is a huge monument to the soldiers who were killed during the Battle of the Somme in August 1916. One of those soldiers was John McCubbing, my great grandfather, who was only twenty years old when he was killed. John lived in Wylie's Brae, New Galloway, and you can see his name on the New Galloway War Memorial.

I managed to find John's name

at Thiepval and I felt very proud that my great grandpa had fought and died for his country. I had always pictured him as an older man, but when I saw photographs of him when I came home, I realised that he had not had the chance to grow old. This made me feel very sad for John and I wish that I had known more about him before I went to France.

Josie Oliver S3: On Saturday evening on Saturday 23 June, we got on a coach to go down to Dover. I was quite excited about the trip to Belgium, as I thought we would all learn a lot from it.

I found my great-great-uncle, John Marriott, on the Menin Gate. He was from Rochdale and worked in the printworks, and he enlisted in the army in November 1914. He was buried by a mine on 6 June 1916, and though his pals tried to dig him out, his body was never found. The Menin Gate is a memorial to men who where never found. Two of his brothers were also killed in the war, and they are in the Loos memorial and Wellington cemetery, which were too far away for us to visit. I felt

relieved when I found his name, as I was worried we weren't going to be able to.

I am proud of all my great uncles who fought in the war, and of all the men who gave their lives for their country. The trip taught me to be grateful for what I have, and I am thoroughly glad I went on it.

Thomas Petch, S3: While I was over in Belgium my main goal was to find the family members who had died in service during WW1 that I knew of, because I was one of the first members of my family to actually visit them.

The first person I saw was my great great uncle on my dad's dad's side called Jonathon James Petch. He died during the battle of the Somme and because he does not have a grave, his name was put on the Thiepval memorial, a stone monument dedicated to the missing of the Somme. This was especially important to me as it is the source of the 'James 'in my name.

The second person I saw was my other great great uncle on my dad's mum's side called Thomas Woodland; he died during the battle of Passchendaele and (unlike Jonathon) his body was found and buried in Tyne Cot cemetery, one of the biggest war cemeteries in the eastern front. This meant I was able to sit by his grave and tell him he was not forgotten (something my dad had asked me to) as his name carries on through me.

Balmaclellan Crimea War Memorial

Paul Goodwin will be writing an article about this, the oldest civic war memorial in Scotland, and has also been contacted by a couple of fellow members of the Scottish Military Research Group who intend to write and publish a booklet about the memorial.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

Kenmure's Awa'

William Gordon, sixth Viscount of Kenmure, is famous for having been executed for his part in the sorry Jacobite Rebellion of 1715.

His father, Alexander, was suspected by the royalist Claverhouse of conversing too frequently with the rebels; that is, the Covenanters. 'Bluidy Clavers' to his enemies and 'Bonnie Dundee' to his admirers occupied Kenmure Castle in 1682, charged with the suppression of the southwest. When Claverhouse was killed at the battle of Killiecrankie,

Gordon was on the opposing side fighting on behalf of William of Orange following the 'Glorious Revolution'. His son William Gordon, however, chose to become a Jacobite and thus a supporter of the exiled James VII and II. As a result he rallied to the standard at the outbreak of the '15 Rising. Each year the Earl of Mar hosted a great hunt lasting several days on Deeside. Under cover of that event the rebels gathered, Mar appointing Kenmure to the post of chief commander in the south of Scotland, despite the fact that he was described as 'utterly a stranger to all military affairs'; not the best of qualifications.

Kenmure, rightly or wrongly, comes across as a somewhat dithering individual who found himself in command by accident.

The whole rebellion, although thought by many commentators to have had the best chance of success of all the Jacobite risings, was a shambles from start to finish, organisationally pathetic and fatally lacking in leadership.

Indeed the Jacobites had a habit of holding supposedly secret meetings in public and so

advertising their intentions to the British Government.


The Viscount's first objective was to capture Dumfries. Learning that the burgh was full of armed men ready to defend it, Kenmure allegedly said that 'he doubted not that there were as brave gentlemen there as himself, and therefore he would not go to Dumfries that day'. Instead he went to Lochmaben where he proclaimed the Old Chevalier as James VIII, a ceremony repeated in Langholm, Hawick and Jedburgh. According to Peter Rae's 'History of the Rebellion' (thought to have been the first book published in Dumfries) Kenmure stumbled around the Borders to no effect in the Autumn of 1715 and crossing into England he was forced to surrender at the battle of Preston on 14 November.

The following
January he and six
other noblemen,
including the Earl of
Derwentwater and the
Earl of Nithsdale, were
impeached for High
Treason.

Kenmure begged for mercy, 'that I may live to show myself the dutifullest of his subjects, and be the means to keep my wife and four small children from starving'. To no avail; with Derwentwater and Nithsdale he was sentenced to death, although one member of this Solway Group, Nithsdale, escaped. Kenmure made no

speech but he wrote a final letter to a fellow nobleman who had

attempted to intercede



On the scaffold Kenmure was accompanied by two ministers, an undertaker, and a surgeon who drew his finger across the victim's neck to indicate where the executioner should strike. He prayed for the Old Pretender, repented of having pleaded guilty, 'and died after a very courageous manner'. It could be said, in charity, that nothing in his life became him like the leaving of it. The title was attainted but in 1824 it was restored to John Gordon, the man who entertained Robert Burns at the castle; it became dormant on the death of Adam eighth Viscount of Kenmure without issue in 1847.



And more fun for the grown-ups; there will also be a Halloween Fancy Dress party on Saturday 27 October at The Clachan Inn, Dalry.


