LOCAL LIGHTING REVOLUTION TO CUT POLLUTION AND COSTS

Our Glenkens villages are the first in the region outwith the Galloway Forest Park to receive revolutionary new street lights which will reduce light pollution and cut energy consumption.

The orange glow from sodium street lighting which indicated the presence of villages from miles away will soon be a thing of the past.

If you have been in Carsphairn or Dalry between dusk and dawn this winter, you will have noticed that the orange glow from sodium lighting that stained the night sky has already gone. In November Dumfries & Galloway Council started changing street lights in the two villages to light emitting diodes (LEDs). Street lights in Balmaclellan and New



Galloway are scheduled to be changed by the end of March.

For the Glenkens' communities, located as they are on the edge of the Galloway Forest Park - the UK's first Dark Sky Park (and now also part of the United Nations Biosphere) - the new lights bring particular benefits.

The LED light footprint is more easily controlled, creating significantly less light pollution than traditional street lighting.

The reduction of light pollution even in small villages will make a significant contribution in helping the area maintain it's Dark Sky status.

"Street lighting is the single largest contributor to the 'sky glow' effect across the UK, and indeed the world," says Keith Muir, head of Tourism, Recreation & Communications for the Forestry Commission in the Galloway Forest District.

Anna Campbell and Ted Leeming have also stood down from the GCAT Board. Five new directors were elected at the AGM: Zoe Blamire, Brian Edgar, Richard Hermon, Helen Keron and Margaret Watson. They join Margaret Elphinstone, Andrew Mellor and Alan Smith on the Board, which will be appointing a new Chairman shortly.

"I can't believe it was back in 2001, at the time of the foot and mouth outbreak, that a group of us first got together with the idea of doing something with the old school," says Cathy. "It's extraordinary to think that it took six years, £1m, and a huge amount of dedication and commitment from so many people to transform that ruin into what the CatStrand is today. It was a real team effort and great fun. Now that the building has just celebrated its 5th Birthday, is firmly established in the community and is recognised as a first-rate regional arts venue, it's time for a change all-round. It's only fair that others should have the chance to play their part in helping shape the next five years."

Both GCAT and the CatStrand have won a number of prestigious awards since their inception, including ones from Arts & Business, LEADER and DG Life. Currently, the Glenkens is in the running to receive a Creative Scotland Creative Places Award which will be announced at the end of January in St Andrews.

FIVE REMARKABLE YEARS

Anna Campbell reflects on Cathy Agnew's contribution to the CatStrand.

The names of Cathy Agnew and the CatStrand are intrinsically linked. Now that the CatStrand has celebrated its 5th birthday and goes from strength to strength, Cathy has decided that it is the right time for her to leave the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust (GCAT) Board.

In 2001, in the tragic aftermath of foot and mouth disease, Cathy, with others, grasped the opportunity to put the Glenkens at the forefront of community and cultural activities in Dumfries and Galloway.

Cathy spearheaded the move to transform the old school in New Galloway into an imaginatively designed building fit for the requirements and demands of the 21st century. There were challenges and some opposition but, undaunted, Cathy, with her inspirational leadership and supported by her Board members and volunteers, overcame them. Her ambition was always to go for the best. Nothing less was good enough and her unswerving strategy motivated all those who believed in the goal but didn't know if or when it could be achieved. During the five years it took to complete the building, seemingly insurmountable obstacles often appeared but Cathy, with her eyes firmly set on realising the dream, tackled every problem with drive and determination laced with incredible charm.

Since the building was opened by the Princess Royal in 2007 it has been used as a centre for many diverse activities, and when one goes in

nowadays there is a feeling that the CatStrand represents a vibrant community. Its many awards in the last five years acknowledge Cathy's dream, which has come to fruition through her infectious enthusiasm, constant commitment and ability to help others have the confidence that the Glenkens could build and sustain such an ambitious project.

Keith Muir goes on to say: "It is why a huge percentage of families, when asked what colour their night is, reply by saying - orange.

"Any change that starts to mitigate this sky glow is excellent news. However, Dumfries and Galloway Council have gone one step further by changing the lights to white LED down-lighters. This will drastically change the night sky environment, making the sky above us all far more easily observed and protecting the night-time environment for all of us and the wildlife that relies upon it.

"It will also make the streets a safer place as white light adds to the security of people as you can identify colours and it reduces the claustrophobic feeling that orange lights can give. Overall, this is a fantastic move by the Council and clearly demonstrates that as a region the key public bodies are trying to make the most of our unique, selling points."

These new LEDs have less impact on the environment as they are less attractive to nocturnal insects, do not contain mercury or lead and create less carbon dioxide through using less energy. It is estimated that using LED lighting systems throughout the UK will reduce the carbon dioxide being released into our atmosphere by over 40,000 tons per year.


The project, which has been funded through the D&G Central Efficiency Fund, has cost £27,000, supported by Scottish Government grants. It has been calculated that there is a 6.4 year payback period with the venture saving 300 tonnes of

carbon dioxide over its 20-year lifespan.

The project aims to save money by spending money since LEDs are significantly more cost-effective than current technology, having to be maintained and replaced less frequently, as well as being 40% more efficient to run.

Locals seem to have a positive reaction to it, with Dalry resident, Angela, saying;

"I really like the new lights - even from our upstairs windows we now have no light coming in from the street lamps except a little silver light, more like moonlight, which is nice."

In this issue we take a look at a wood as fuel; types of wood, seasoned or green, air flow and more...

WONDERFUL WOOD

There has always been something rather magical about a real fire; the flickering light, the mesmeric quality, and the warm glow you just don't get with gas or electric fires.

The draw of a real fire, combined with the rising cost of gas, electricity and oil, have seen more and more fireplaces uncovered, chimneys uncapped and wood-burning stoves installed in kitchens and living rooms around the Glenkens, and indeed the country as a whole.

The new buzzword that abounds is 'wood fuel'; wood that is used to generate heat or electricity. It comes in three main forms; logs, chips, and pellets or briquettes made from compressed sawdust. Both logs and briquettes can be used in open fires, woodburning stoves can take logs or briquettes (some of these are not suitable for stoves - see manufacturer's guidelines for the specific product), and woodfuelled heating systems used to generate electricity can be suited to any of the three.

In this article we will focus on the wood fuel used in domestic woodburning stoves and open fires.

The most traditional form of wood fuel in the past was discarded wood not suitable for building or joinery, such as smaller branch wood from windfall (branches found after high winds and storms), branches cut when coppicing (a way of managing woodland) and the waste from hedge-trimming. Smaller branches were used as kindling to start fires, and often referred to by the anachronistic

use of the terms 'faggots' or `pimps'.

Nowadays, larger wood which would have been saved for other purposes in the past is valuable in its own right as a fuel, and pre-cut logs are the preferred type to purchase for burning. For most families, with children in school and full-time jobs, we just don't have the time or

labour available to gather our own wood; although on school holidays it can be a useful ploy to keep children entertained and the wood shed stocked!

The demand for pre-cut logs has seen a growth in the number of wood fuel suppliers offering a choice of hardwoods, softwoods, various species of tree, seasoned or green, and now briquettes have been added as an 'ecofriendly' alternative too; and that's without even delving into the whole issue of calorific value.

So let's demystify things a little by saying that all wood burns.

How quickly it burns and how much heat it produces in the burning process depends on three things; the type of wood you are using, whether it has been seasoned, and how much air you allow your stove or fireplace to draw in.

So what wood do you want to use? The difference between hardwoods and softwoods is really a question of density. Softwoods (coniferous trees such as spruce/pine) grow faster than hardwoods (broad-leafed trees such as oak, elm, cherry, ash) and as a result are less dense and tend to burn quicker and hotter. They also have a higher resin content, which can make them spark more (so if you intend to put softwoods in your open fire remember to use a spark guard), and causes a higher build-up of resinous tar or 'creosote' in your chimney

which must be cleaned out regularly to avoid chimney fires. The major cause of this type of build-up, however, is from burning un-seasoned softwood; un-seasoned wood is the least efficient in heat-production, as well as the worst for the condition of your fireplace or stove, and chimney.

Seasoned hardwood is the best firewood to burn as it is denser, burns slower and is easier to regulate, and has less resin to create nasty chimney build-ups. With a wood-burning stove you can regulate the speed at which wood burns through adjusting the various air-intakes. This makes burners/stoves much more fuel-efficient than open fires. Also, with an open fire a large percentage heat goes up the chimney - some sources say as much as 90% - so if you have the opportunity, converting your open fire to a wood or multi-fuel stove will maximise your fuelefficiency.

At the end of the day a shed full of hardwood is going to last you longer than a shed full of softwood, but in an area where spruces abound and softwoods are more readily available, it seems a common sense option.

The most important factor in buying firewood is the moisture content. If you burn either wet or green/unseasoned wood, your fire will spend much of its energy boiling off the water rather than producing heat, as well as producing more soot and tar that will eventually damage your chimney. So if you are buying firewood for immediate use, make sure that it is seasoned. However, if you have the space to buy in advance and season your own wood over the course of a year, this will be your most

PERFECTLY POTTY

In February 2003 Hannah McAndrew received a start-up grant for her pottery business.

This year she is celebrating her tenth year in business and plans to mark it with a series of events and special pots, starting with an open studio day on Saturday 9 February at her workshop in Kelton, Castle Douglas.

Hannah is an award-winning slipware potter. She uses a technique that has been used for centuries to create earthenware pots characterised by the use of liquid clays called slips to trail patterns and images across their surfaces. Though inspired by medieval British pottery, Hannah uses these techniques in such a way that the pots she makes are characteristically hers and not copies of older wares.

Hannah works in red terracotta

clay and mixes coloured slips to create the decoration which is so key to her work.

"I make pots with a purpose, pots for use in the home," says Hannah. "My work, thrown in red earthenware, is decorated with coloured slips and rich honey glazes. The decoration is applied to the surface of the pot whilst the slipped surface is still glistening wet. The nature of this means that patterns applied must be free and fluid to take full advantage of this state."

In April 2011 Hannah was invited to demonstrate her skills in America at a series of workshops at arts centres on the east coast. November of the same year saw her exhibiting at the prestigious Philadelphia Museum of Art Craft Show as one of a select group of crafts people from Scotland who were there as invited guests of the show.

During March 2012 an exhibition

billed as 'the best of British slipware' and featuring just three potters was held at Gallery St. Ives in Tokyo, Japan and Hannah's pottery was included.

2013 brings with it the opportunity to exhibit in the USA again during the Minnesota Potters Tour in the St Croix Valley, and Hannah will be the first non-American to be invited to take part as a guest of the show.

Mindfulness - It's Not What You Think

Mindfulness is officially mainstream; it was referred to by name on Eastenders over Christmas.

So what is mindfulness, why has it become so popular and what can it do for you? There are many definitions, but essentially it is being in the present moment and knowing you are in the present moment with a relaxed, non-judgemental state of mind and an open heart.

It sounds easy until you sit down for ten minutes with the intention of calming the mind and not following the often unrelated stream of thoughts that continually come into it. Most people find it a real challenge.

Thousands of people in Dumfries and Galloway alone suffer from a stress-related long-term condition.

Pain is inevitable, but the suffering which is created by our minds when we revisit an event over and over can be optional. The job of mindfulness is to alleviate suffering based on concrete, evidence-based,

neuroscientific understanding of how our minds work.

With mindfulness, we train what is called the 'mindfulness muscle' to stop following negative thoughts using core methods which have been tried and tested over years, if not centuries. When applied regularly the actual makeup of the brain changes and new neurological pathways are built. These enable us to find more creative solutions to the inevitable challenges and problems of life.

Mindfulness is the ultimate selfmanagement tool.

It is not a new self-help method or therapy. The ability to calm the mind and emotions and be happy from within is foundational.

As adults we also have a duty of care. Reports are showing that a brain gap is developing between generations. As younger people are 'plugging in' and spending more and more time on screens, the brain is becoming 'e-ddiction' trained resulting in shorter concentration spans and the need for more and more stimulation.

A recent UNICEF report found

that children in the UK are the most unhappy in the world, followed by American children.

For anyone involved in children's wellbeing it is a sobering thought indeed. I hear reports frequently from grandparents about the negative effects they feel 'screen time' is having on their grandchildren and they are often the ones who have a good overview.

When she was asked for her opinion on what brings lasting happiness and true freedom, Alice Sommers-Hertz, survivor of concentration camps and now one hundred and thirteen years old, said it was the satisfaction of doing a job well and thankfulness; being grateful for every small thing - a smile, a flower, everything.

It sounds like common sense, but as a friend recently said to me common sense isn't all that common anymore, and gratitude is now being promoted as one of the most effective mindfulness tools in combating low-level depression and anxiety. It seems we do need tools and training to recover our true natures and restore the balance of our minds and hearts, and mindfulness is an exceptionally effective one.

Most readers will have attended an event at the CatStrand.

Some of us will be regular supporters, paying £8 to £12 for a ticket. But how many of us really appreciate the fantastic value offered?

We would probably have to pay more than twice as much in a city venue for the shows we see on our doorstep.

With an audience capacity of less than 90, all these events

are heavily subsidised; usually the takings do not cover the cost of the performers, and certainly do not contribute to the cost of running the building or staffing costs. The CatStrand has brought many benefits to our Glenkens

communities: there really is something for everyone, young or old or inbetween. Some examples of what's on offer are: Family and children's events, music, comedy, drama, films, lectures, fitness activities, art and craft

exhibitions, a

shop, café, meeting place and computing and internet facilities with wifi.

Despite the many generous grants from public bodies and various family trusts, and invaluable help from an army of volunteers, the CatStrand makes an operating loss, which obviously cannot continue forever. Nor should we assume that in these times of financial constraint grants will continue at their past rate.

AGNES COOKS...

Fish with a Nip in the Tail

After moving here from the city we bought two huge chest freezers, as I imagined access to the shops would be difficult.

This turned out not be the case but having purchased the freezers I realised I needed to fill them. The problem I have is that I am a hopeless 'batch' cook. I recognise the sense in cooking two or three cottage pies at a time, or making extra cakes, but I just prefer cooking most things from scratch and having them fresh from the oven. So what do I fill my freezers with? Well, one is kept mainly for meat and fish and the other with everything else. I do freeze a large amount of stocks (mostly chicken and game as I think fish and vegetable stocks are best used fresh).

The recipe I am using today is based on an experience I had when using some fish from the freezer. Fish doesn't freeze well for long. I find vacuum-packed is best, but even then three months is really the limit for keeping. The fish will not go off after this time, but the texture will have changed and the taste will not be at its best.

On a whim one day I purchased a whole salmon. It was a huge beast of a fish. Unfortunately it was the day before going off on holiday and so I froze it whole, and there it remained for more months than I care to say. The problem was that it needed a large family gathering to do it justice and, as I also recognised the amount of prep involved, I always seemed to find an excuse not to use it. Finally at Christmas time I faced my demons and got the monster out of the freezer. Although the fish was fine to eat, the texture was a little soft and so not suitable for cooking as fillets or presenting as a whole salmon (a whole salmon frozen for up to three months is fine to cook as a whole fish).

This is the recipe I came up with - they are Thai inspired fish cakes, but have no added bread crumbs or potatoes. They contain no flour so are suitable for gluten intolerant diets. I have listed smaller quantities of the ingredients than I used but you can multiply the proportions if needed. You will need a food processor to obtain the right consistency.

Ingredients:

Approx 500g salmon fillets, skinned (or any combination of 'meaty' fish that you

have)
½ bunch of spring onions, roughly

chopped 1-2 red



chillies, roughly chopped (seeds removed)

2 cloves of garlic, roughly chopped

A piece of fresh ginger (about the size of a big toe!) peeled and grated

Handful of fresh basil
Handful of fresh coriander
(parsley if you prefer)
2-3 tablespoons fish sauce
Juice of 1 lime
1 teaspoon sugar

Salt and pepper

Method:

Put everything into a food processor and blitz until the mixture forms a paste. It needs to have a really sticky texture or it will break up when frying. Form into round, flattish cakes. This mixture will make 4 -6 large cakes or 12 -16 smaller bite size ones. The cakes then need to be chilled to firm up for at least one hour. Shallow fry in sunflower oil or a light olive oil until brown on each side. Serve hot with a chilli dipping sauce.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

The 'Muir Doctor' of New Galloway

In my last Gazette contribution there was mention of Alexander Trotter of Dalshangan.

His grandfather was one of many Glenkens residents who deserves to be much better known. He was Robert Trotter, a medical doctor (c.1736-1815) and associate of the Kenmures and Robert Burns.

Educated at Dumfries Grammar School, he proceeded to study medicine at Edinburgh University. Plans to emigrate to the West Indies were foiled when he missed his ship, and instead he headed for the Glenkens where his father, John of Burnfoot, Tynron, had gained some reputation as a surgeon and a wastrel who squandered the family fortune.

On arrival, Robert was so fortunate as to cure Margaret Murray, of the prominent New Galloway family, of a longstanding but unnamed disease. Other achievements involved sewing a man's nose - severed by a cutlass - back onto his face. He was also credited with eradicating from the south of Scotland the disease of yaws or 'sivens', which caused painful bodily lesions. He thus acquired a reputation beyond Glenkens, attracting patients from as far away as Edinburgh, Ayr and Stranraer. On one occasion he

Such individuals were not hard to find since, at this period, those intent on a medical career were often apprenticed to established doctors before undertaking university courses. Also there was an overproduction of medical graduates who found difficulty in obtaining suitably lucrative practices, which is why Trotter was remarkable in gaining such success while based in the wilds of Glenkens.


His treatments seem to have been a mixture of the scientific and the traditional.

He regularly referred patients to the Physic Well in the New Galloway parks and when his own children caught whooping cough at school in Balmaclellan,"they were sent in a cart to be ground in the hopper at Gordonstone Mill, which was expected to cure the complaint"! This practice was not as alarming as it appears. In his Gallovidian Encyclopedia John MacTaggart explains that children suffering from 'kenkhoast' were put through the hoppers of the mill by their mothers who fancied the disease

Elsewhere the mill was simply set in motion in the presence of the children, so it was the cartload of grain that was ground rather than the kids.

The doctor was an energetic, somewhat restless individual who moved around a lot within





Trotter had obviously inherited some of his father's bad habits for he died a bankrupt. Throughout his life he kept racehorses, always an expensive proposition.

He was a talented curler and played at quoits, as well as stone-putting. But his greatest weakness was cock-fighting, something of a passion among gamblers in Galloway in general, and Glenkens in particular. Three days before he died he was carried to Dalarran Holm to witness a cock-fight, Fellow afficionados were Rev M'Kie of Balmaclellan, Lord William Gordon, Willie Sinclair who emigrated to Canada, William Corson of Cubbox and James Wylie, the Beadle of Kells.

Trotter's wraith was seen in New Galloway shortly before he died.

His son recalled that during the doctor's last illness, in the midst of his family there was a rap on the table. "That's a call for me", he said, "my time here will not be long".

Families continued to believe into the late nineteenth century that such a rapping at table or door heralded the death of a family member. The Muir Doctor's grave is in Kells kirkyard.
