#### to Gazette Founder Fond Farewell

Dalry shopkeeper and founder of the Glenkens Gazette, Matthew Newton, and his wife Gill, are moving to Aberdeen at the beginning of July.



Since their arrival in Dalry nearly 18 years ago, they have been involved with every aspect of community life and they will be sorely missed.

Neither Matthew nor Gill had any experience of running a retail outlet, but after being made redundant from the NHS Matthew decided the time had come to fulfil a life-long dream of being selfemployed, and so started the search for a village shop to run. Having looked all over Scotland, they decided that the shop in Dalry that Mr Kerr was selling fitted the bill, and they took over the business in September 1995.

A steep learning curve followed, made easier according to Gill by the excellent staff and patient customers! However, that first winter was very testing when the extremely bad weather deprived them of water and power for over a week and made it almost impossible to get supplies in for the village. Luckily, a massive truck with snow tracks from their main supplier managed to get through.

Their children, Imogen and Sean, both attended Dalry School and Gill has high praise for the way the school helped them both settle in. For Imogen in particular it was a big change from her High School in Glasgow, where she was one of 1200 pupils. Both children took advantage of the many clubs and groups, with Sean enjoying football and Imogen joining the youth drama group. A proud moment for them all was when the group's play 'Dream Jobs' won against stiff competition from adult groups at the Stewartry Drama Festival.

#### RUNNING **CORE PATHS UP**

This year saw the adoption of the Core Paths Plan for Dumfries and Galloway (D&G).

One hundred of these key paths can now be found crossing the region, with nine of them in the Glenkens itself, geared for the use of all outdoor users - hill walkers, cyclists and horse riders.

D&G Council was obliged under the Land Reform (Scotland) Act of 2003 to locate and investigate a number of key or main paths in the region that would provide the public with routes that fulfilled a variety of objectives: functional, educational and recreational.

The routes would be primarily off-road and would promote, for example, safer access to school or a route to a particular place of interest. It also gave landowners the means to manage and navigate outdoor users through their land, while at the same time recognising the general public's right of responsible access or 'right to roam'.

The research started in 2006 when the D&G's Outdoor Access Service kicked off the Core Paths plan by consulting with Community Councils, landowners and the general public. Communities and individuals were asked to mark maps with the routes which they used or wished to use. Some of the paths suggested were already physically there and were in use, but some new paths were proposed.

Each was assessed according to specific criteria including natural hazards, state of repair and relevance to the 'Core Paths Plan' objectives.

This year these paths have been made a legal entity in themselves. It should be pointed out though that they are not owned by the Council and remain at all times in the ownership of the landowner through whose land the paths pass.

There is a variety of walks all with different types of paths and through different landscapes, of varying distances and requiring different levels of fitness. One of

the conditions of becoming a core path was the ability of the path to be brought up to a suitable standard, and all efforts will be made to ensure that the paths are both passable and navigable.

To assure your safety and wellbeing in walking, cycling or horse riding along these routes it is essential to remember that the land which you are traversing provides the local landowner with a livelihood. You have to be aware and accept that the outdoors cannot be made risk-free. This includes not only making sure that you have the right fitness level for the walk, but also wearing the appropriate clothing and

footwear as well as carrying maps, food, water, and a mobile phone. Look out for signage as you may well be entering an area where shooting is taking place or cows are calving; it is always better to avoid areas with young livestock, especially if you have a dog with you. Dogs must be kept under control on short leads.

### **CORE PATHS AROUND CARSPHAIRN**

In this and future issues of the Gazette we will feature Core Paths in different parts of the Glenkens. In this edition we focus on the Carsphairn area.

The Carsphairn Community Council area is nearly 100 square miles. A lot of the Core Paths routes, as mentioned in the front page feature, are already established and used, and indeed those who know this tranquil and remoter area of the Glenkens may already be familiar with them. Those who frequent our award-winning Heritage Centre will definitely recognise the routes as some of the Centre's former Heritage Walks.

The area is so ideal for the project that the Core Paths have been split in to two. The first area of paths are to be found off the A713 and the second off the less central B729 (known locally as the back road between Carsphairn and Moniaive). There are six centrally located Core Paths: Upper Deugh Trail, Knockengorroch Trail, Holm and Garryhorn Trail, Cairnsmore Trail, Knockgrey Trail, and the Dundeugh Trail. The first four walks are to be found north of the village on both sides of the A713. The Upper Deugh and Knockengorroch trails are appropriate for both walkers, cyclists and horse riders. It is a

mixture of tarmac and forestry tracks that takes in an ancient burial cairn, wild moorland and with an Ordnance Survey map one can discover the remains of an area that used to be more densely populated. The Holm and Garryhorn Trail is a fascinating walk that takes you through a landscape that played an important part in not just local history but in the history of Scotland in general. The walk wends its way through an old abandoned mining village where the standing remains of a whole community can still be seen, and it isn't hard to conjure up the life lived there.

If it is views that you seek then you may want to give the Cairnsmore walk a go. It is a circular route (descending on the Knockgrey Trail or vice versa) that takes you past the Green Well of Scotland, with its many legends, and up the famous Cairnsmore of Carsphairn. It has to be said that this is a walk for the more fit amongst you and it will take about an hour and a half to reach the summit. The views are stunning and on a good day you can see both England and Northern Ireland. The last Core Path off the A713 is the Dundeugh Trail, based around Dundeugh Hill; bordered on three sides by water it is suitable for horses, walkers and cyclists, and frequented and greatly loved by all local dog owners. There are the remains of two ancient castles in the

area which can be found with a bit of perseverance and a good map. The charm of this walk is that a section of the walk takes you along the banks of the Kendoon Loch, with its abundant wildlife. Once you are feeling confident with the main route do discover all the little tracks that cross over and intertwine it. Some take you down to the suspension bridges with their lovely views up the rivers, and some take you on quirky routes through the forest.

The Carsphairn Core Paths really help you to discover what is our most far-flung Glenkens landscape and community. Why don't you take advantage of these accessible and well-maintained routes, and discover some of the local secrets and hidden gems? You won't be disappointed! Sara McNeill

### New funding available for energy-saving measures...

Our region will benefit from Scottish Government funding to the tune of £1.27 million. This is the sixth highest funding allocation in Scotland.

The key purpose of the funding is to tackle fuel poverty in our region and the focus will be on whole street solid wall insulation, free loft and cavity wall insulation and a whole house approach to energy saving.

The range of measures available include new heating systems, solar panels, double glazing and

thermal insulation.

Many properties in our region have a solid wall construction and are built using traditional stone materials. This new scheme will provide access to funding to tackle the poor thermal insulation normally associated with these properties.

This is a particular issue in rural locations, such as the Glenkens.

Eligibility for each scheme will be assessed on a case by case basis by the Energy Agency with the applicant's post code, council tax band and income level dictating the level of help available. This

will ensure that the free support is focused on those that need it the most.

The funding for 2013/ 2014 is three times greater than last year's allocation, and will allow the Council and its partners to implement a strong programme of works across our region.

The loft and cavity wall scheme will continue from April 2013 with the solid wall insulation project and whole house scheme to follow in early summer.

### **Community Energy Project**

Meetings are being held with representatives from the Community Councils of the Glenkens to agree a plan to take this project forward.

We hope to provide information to the community

about home insulation and types of sustainable energy. In the meantime be careful of the 'special offers' you are being offered by coldcalling companies. Check whether the company is registered with the Government Green Deal and that any deal being offered is really worth your while.

### Local Initiatives in New Galloway (LING)

New Galloway Town Hall: At last things appear to be moving. D&G Council have introduced a new format for their asset management. In the Stewartry, New Galloway Town Hall is now featuring on their immediate list, so look out for ways to put your views forward.

To be viable and able to be used by the whole community, it will be necessary for a lot of upgrade work to be done - disability access, upgrade to toilets and kitchen, as well as a

replacement of the heating system. This can only happen if we can justify appropriate grant applications with evidence about present and future use. As well as fundraising activities over the next few months, there will be meetings and surveys involving the whole community to find out what people would like to see happening. Gill feels strongly that her children have achieved so much by living in the Glenkens: "The school, the community spirit and all the groups, volunteer-led, gave them a really good start," she comments.

Matthew has been involved with many of the local groups and organisations, including 12 years with Dalry School Board, first as a parent member, then a spell as Chairman and latterly, once his children had left school, as Clerk. Head Teacher Fraser Simpson says;"Matthew was a great support over the years that he was Clerk to the School Board. Despite being inundated with minutes, D&G papers, Scottish Executive memos and so on, he always remained calm and effective and had a wicked sense of humour at just the right time. A real gentleman and pillar of the community".

In addition, Matthew has been involved with the Clachan Fair, the Town Hall Committee, the Community Council and the Heritage Group. Hilda McAdam, Chairman of the Heritage Group, says; "Matthew was an active member, particularly

during the production of 'A Day in Dalry', our book recording life in Dalry at the millennium".

By 2000, Matthew felt that although there was so much going on in the area, there was no newsletter highlighting all that was going on in the community. Having noted that Moniaive had a newsletter, he asked their advice and, with help from local councillor George Prentice, got a grant to help with printing and paper.

#### Thus the first Glenkens Gazette was put together on the Newtons' kitchen table!

It quickly became a great success, but after two years Matthew found he did not have the time needed to keep producing it and so the newly formed Glenkens Community & Arts Trust (GCAT) took over. Now in its 13th year, it has become part of the fabric of life in the Glenkens and it gives Matthew great pleasure to see it going from strength to strength. Running a local shop, open seven days a week, is so much more than the sum of its parts.

Newspapers, groceries, local baking, coffee and filled rolls at lunchtime, ice-creams and sweets, beer and wine, dry cleaning and general information point all combine to make it an important part of village life. Gill says; "We have particularly enjoyed taking on young people as staff and seeing them grow and develop into confident young adults". Matthew adds: "All our staff, both past and present, have been so supportive, as have our customers. Even in these difficult economic times, when people have to shop more carefully, they still continue to support their local shop".

Now that their daughter is married and settled in Aberdeen, Matthew and Gill feel the time has come to retire and move up there, particularly as there is a grandchild due later in the year. They are delighted that Lyndsay Forbes (nee Wright - pictured on front page) is taking over the business and wish her every success. Lyndsay was ten when her family moved to Dalry and ran the Garden Centre. After leaving school she moved away, but now comments: "It's so nice to be coming home!"

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### To Thine Own Lion-Heart Be True

There is an old Italian saying: 'È meglio vivere un giorno da leone che cento anni da pecora', which translates as: 'It is better to live one day as a lion than 100 years as a sheep'.

Undoubtedly, it is hard to be a lion (even on a good hair day), for that would mean taking a fearless and bold approach to life. How many of us can honestly say we do that? What is it that stops us? If you followed the old Zen adage of 'leap and the net will appear', what would you be doing differently with your life?

Feeling bad about ourselves, allowing others to treat us dis-respectfully and holding onto our emotions, such as anger and fear, can lead to suppressed immunity and high levels of the stress hormone cortisol. Not to mention depression and anxiety.

The good news (hooray!) is that we can change the way we feel about ourselves through learning new positive ways to think about ourselves, setting new goals, finding our voice and being supported.

My new course, Lion Heart Confidence, is designed to support you to challenge the beliefs you hold about yourself which are limiting your potential. You can learn new ways to communicate which will help you to reduce conflict and feel empowered. Most importantly, it will allow you to meet your best self. Living life with confidence can be seen as a marriage between trust and courage.

Trust in yourself to know what the right thing to do is and have courage to carry out your conviction.

We develop trust in ourselves when we remain authentic and do what we think is best, regardless of what others may think, and we accomplish goals that we set, regardless of any mistakes we may have made along the way. We can all be lions all of the time if we learn how to have a lionheart.

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# **'Connecting in Retirement' Opportunities for Over Sixties**

The CatStrand's new 'Connecting in Retirement' project is now underway.

This is a four-year project, funded by the Big Lottery, which aimis to reduce social and rural isolation among Glenkens residents aged sixty-plus.

The project has already attracted a great deal of attention and support from numerous individuals and groups based in the Glenkens. Brian Jones, who was appointed in February as the Community Projects Officer at the CatStrand, is keen to hear from any Glenkens residents aged over 60 who would like to join a newly-formed activity committee to plan and implement activities and events.

The project aims to create sustainable groups, activities and partnerships which will enable those who might feel isolated to become involved in the Glenkens communities.

This would include more use of community transport to enable people to attend more

activities and events as well as take part in regular outings.

To date a number of regular session are taking place where the sixty-plus aged group are involved - these include Exercise to Music, Pilates and Zumba Gold. A five-week Learn to Play the Ukulele class is also underway with professional music tutor Stuart Butterworth, with participants already playing a number of songs. This has proved to be very popular so the current group looking to continue as well as other new groups likely to start.

Also planned is both an IT
Awareness drop in day on
Saturday 1 June, followed by a
six-week beginners/improvers
IT class at the CatStrand. For
those people wanting a gentle
form of exercise, a ten-week
Tai Chi class is being scheduled
to start in July, to run in
conjunction with the Stewartry
Building Healthy Communities
team run by Morag Curtis.

For those who would like to take part in basic cooking and nutritional advice, a taster session followed by a six-weekly preparation and cooking session is

planned to happen in the July/August timeframe.

# Watson Bird Update

The results of some very creative work by pupils at Carsphairn, Dalry and Kells were the key attraction at the Watson Birds Eggs and Nests day on Easter Saturday in Dalry Town Hall.

The imagination and creativity of the children was evident in all of the displays and delighted responses of the 100 plus visitors on the day.

Watson Birds representatives attended the Scottish Bird Fair at Hopetoun House and were pleased at how many people were not only interested in our project, but expressed a willingness to join us for our third Festival in September (Friday 20 to Sunday 22).

On the fund-raising front we are

making steady progress. Our Feathers campaign for activities and events has now topped £25,000, a quarter of the way towards our £100,000 target. Most significantly, we have received an anonymous donation of £100,000 to help purchase Barone. Together with funds provided by the Pamela Young Trust as partners in our project, we are now in a position to begin formal negotiations with the Watson family for purchase of the house.

We are gathering a collection of Donald Watson's paintings on loan from various sources which will be on display in Dalry Town Hall and the CatStrand, to remind everyone of the excellence of Donald's art and the ambitions of our project.

Festival plans are well underway, with some new items this year; photographic master classes and

talks on wildlife photography, talks and debates led by the winner and runner up for this year's Watson Raptor Science Prize, and the formal opening of our walking and car/cycle trails. In addition, we will have music concerts, poetry and an art exhibition and a talk by one of the artists, Darren Woodhead, whose work is currently on display at the CatStrand to emphasise the importance of our bird project as part of the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust (GCAT).

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### **LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN**

### Alexander Murray: Linguistic Genius



Two hundred years ago Alexander Murray died. He was born at Dunkitterick in 1775 to his 70 year old father and his second wife.

We all know his monument on the Queensway but how many of us really question why he deserves such a memorial?

The obelisk marking his grave in Greyfriars' churchyard, Edinburgh, succinctly captures local pride in his achievement: "Erected by Admirers chiefly connected with Galloway, to Commemorate the Genius and Fame of the Shepherd Boy who rose to be the most eminent Linguist and Oriental Scholar of his day".

From humble beginnings in the wilds of Galloway he became the only person in Britain who could translate a letter written in Ethiopic for George III. He was not strictly a Glenkens man but he had connections here. His father, who grew up in Kells, worked for Mr Lawson of Clatteringshaws. Murray senior had enough education to teach his son to read and write. Alexander's maternal grandfather lived near New Galloway where the boy was briefly taught by William Gordon. There he was mocked as a child from the moors of Minnigaff for his idiosyncratic pronunciation. There too, according to himself, in that wellknown den of iniquity, he ran wild for the first and only time in his life: "I learned to swear, lie and do bad tricks".

He was gradually acquiring an interest in languages. Later he received from his cousin, John Heron, father of another lad o' pairts, Robert Heron of New Galloway, a Hebrew lexicon. By



the time he went to Edinburgh University he knew Latin, Greek, French, something of Hebrew, Anglo-Saxon, Gothic, German, Welsh and Gaelic. All were largely self-taught because due to poor health and poverty he had a total of only about sixty weeks of schooling. His secret was in his favourite book. "If I had a copy of the Bible in any language of which I knew the alphabet, I could make considerable progress in learning it without grammar or dictionary".

# Locally he was famous for memorising and reciting great chunks of the good book.

He continued his studies at Edinburgh moving into Asiatic languages and especially Sanskrit, knowledge of which was brought to the west largely by Scots serving in India. He became editor of the Scots Magazine and also of James Bruce's Travels to Abyssinia. Then he became minister of Urr, where he worked on his great two-volume History of European Languages before his appointment as Professor of Oriental Languages at Edinburgh, a post he held for less than a

year, dying of tuberculosis aged 37. His History was not published until 1823.

Murray's true contribution was that of comparing the grammars, vocabularies and alphabets of languages to discover the relationships between them. He was one of those who discovered Indo-European, an ancient hypothetical language which was the root of so many others from English to Sanskrit and Icelandic to Abyssinian.

For example the same word crops up in languages far apart, such as 'father', which is 'vater' in German, 'pater' in Latin and 'pitar' in Sanskrit.

Such awareness led in turn to important questions about the origins of language itself, which we are still asking, since it is our basic human possession. In Murray's day it was believed that the first language was Hebrew, spoken in the Garden of Eden and, of course, the language of the Bible. He demonstrated that there were languages older than Hebrew thus potentially questioning biblical teachings and his own faith. His discoveries were as important as later nineteenth-century revolutionary breakthroughs in such fields as geology, natural history and science. As he wrote, "I wish to combine etymology with the study of the human mind, and to trace the history of nations in the history of language". This man who grew up listening to the sheep and the birds in the shadow of Craignelder was truly a giant and a genius. Think on that the next time you pass his monument at the Grey Mare's Tail! ### Children's Club Gets Go-ahead for Growth
