Love to Eat

An entrepreneurial duo in New Galloway has started up a new Glenkens business. Helen Keron and Dawn Spernagel have created *Love To Eat*, a company offering high-quality home-made frozen meals.

Ingredients are sourced as locally as possible, with meat from Grierson's butchers in Castle Douglas, fresh fruit and vegetables and free-range eggs, as well as seasonal extras from their own gardens. These top-quality ingredients are used to create a varied and seasonal menu of mains, puddings, soups and breads that can be kept in the freezer until needed.

Helen says: "We got the idea from those busy days we all have when you just don't feel like - or have time to - cook from scratch. Yet you still want to eat high quality, tasty food made from ingredients you would choose yourself. As there was nothing like that on offer around here, we decided to fill the niche!"

The business, which started in February 2013, is really taking off, with many repeat customers around the Glenkens. This initial success has prompted the pair to expand further afield to include Castle Douglas, as well as catering for local businesses. One interesting development that Dawn and Helen didn't



expect was providing meals for elderly customers who are looked after by carers. In response to this, they have modified a number of their meals to be microwaveable instead of oven-cook in order to allow them to be prepared and served in a very short time.

Dawn has always been interested in seasonal food and runs a number of 'specials' through their Facebook page. These are keenly watched for by loyal customers, and everything from Wild Garlic Pesto to Elderflower and Gooseberry Jam gets snapped up straight away.

"When they're gone, they're gone!" says Dawn. "I have always loved foraging and sourcing seasonal fruit and veg to make delicious food for my family, and its exciting now to be able to offer it to a wider audience. They seem to love it just as much as we do!"

It's great to see new enterprises starting up in the Glenkens and with the energy and enthusiasm the pair are putting into their business - from choosing only the best ingredients to providing that little bit of extra customer care - this small business is set to go from strength to strength.

Upcycyling

The eco word of the moment is 'upcycling' and it is something we can all consider when it comes to our waste products.

Everyone's heard of recycling, but upcycling is the conversion of waste into something of use. The modern generation has become incredibly wasteful and we are labelled the 'throwaway generation'. We have a tendency to regard everything as disposable and those objects in our lives that we no longer require are just thrown away.

However, upcycling is not a new concept; our grandparents and older relatives would often spend their long winter evenings converting old products into something new and useful. In fact, in developing countries, where

raw materials are expensive and not so easy to come by, upcycling is common practice.

The fashion and art worlds have long been trying to inspire us to upcycle what we see as waste. One of the most famous examples of this is Picasso's 'Bullshead' sculpture, and even here in the Glenkens you can find examples such as the CatStrand's trademark sheep, created by artist Silvy Weatherall from the old school shed!

Admittedly, not all of us are that talented, but perhaps we should all take a second look at the things we are throwing out.

So where do you start? There is a plethora of websites with information on how to upcycle everything from bathtubs to clothing, bedsheets to tyres.

I recently visited a Glenkens resident who, on having a new bathroom suite put in, upcycled her old plastic bath tub. She used wood from old pallets to build a frame around it, painted the wood and filled the tub with plants. It looks great; you'd never guess it was something otherwise destined for the rubbish dump.

Upcycling seems a sensible and eco-friendly concept, and can also inform our purchasing habits. There are more and more companies out there who are upcycling old products and turning them in to everything from jewellery to garden furniture, paving to post-andrail fencing. Broken glass is an obvious danger both to people and animals, particularly to children. Please dispose of litter responsibly.



BECK GOLDSMITH

CatStrand youth worker Rebecca, aka Beck Goldsmith, is going from strength to strength with her music career.

Rebecca says: "I've now signed a record contract. The deal is a partnership between a strong independent label and Island Records, so I get the backing of a major label but still keep a lot of independence and control - best of both worlds!"

Her new album will be released in September, and will include the song I Vow to Thee My Country, originally used for a BBC TV trailer, as well as some other traditional songs with contemporary arrangements and some of her own original songs too.

Spare Room Doom

This April heralded sweeping new changes in welfare reform. One of the changes, nicknamed the 'bedroom tax' by Labour, has been seen to have had the biggest effect on people.

The new legislation affects residents in social housing who are of working age, that is, those aged over 16 and under 61, and who are in receipt of Housing Benefit. If a tenant has one spare room, their benefit will be cut by approximately 14% of the rent they pay each week (an average of £11). For two or more spare rooms, this percentage increase to 25% (an average of £20 per week).

This leaves tenants liable to pay their landlord the difference between the housing benefit payment and their rent. Dumfries & Galloway Council has already responded to the implications of the bedroom tax by allocating £500,000 to help people who are facing financial difficulty due to the cuts. The Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) has increased the money it gives the council for discretionary housing payments from £72,000 in 2012/13 to £232,000 for 2013/14. Discretionary housing payments are short-term awards given to

help people pay their rent. Early indications show a significant increase in people applying for discretionary payments in March and April as a direct result of these changes.

Local councillor Brian Collins, SNP councillor for the Glenkens ward, is chair of a new subcommittee created to support those affected. Brian commented on the discretionary housing payment fund:

"The focus of this fund will be to assist those tenants who are unable to improve their current situation and have no alternative means to access funds. We want to support people who are experiencing financial difficulties as a result of welfare reform."

MSP Russell Brown points out that due to housing shortage in the region, many will suffer as there will be nothing they can do to avoid the cut.

Dumfries & Galloway has some of the most beautiful scenery anywhere in Scotland, but many of our youngsters pass through it every day and take it for granted.


In addition, the attractions of the X-Box, Playstation, computer and mobile phone mean that fewer young people than previously now get outside to investigate the landscape which surrounds them.

To redress the balance just a little, the Education Department of Dumfries & Galloway Council, together with the National Scenic Area (NSA), recently took 18 S2 pupils from four local secondary schools (including Dalry) into some of the most scenic locations across the Stewartry. Funded by

the NSA together with the Holywood Trust and the schools themselves, this project was supported by film maker John Wallace and writer Jackie Galley who helped the young people express and record their responses to places as diverse as the Galloway Forest, Screel Hill and the Carrick Shore. Based at the Stronord Outdoor Centre, transport was courtesy of the Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI). The final outcomes of this project will be a booklet and a film which will receive its World Premiere in Castle Douglas Town Hall on the 27 of September. The Premiere, which has been incorporated into the inaugural Environmental Arts Festival Scotland, will be hosted by the pupils themselves, with an invited audience of over 250 due to attend. KELLS GTI SCHOOL RUN ENDS

After six years of providing transport for pupils travelling to and from Kells School, Tuesday 2 July was the end of the road for this service operated by Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI).

A review carried out by Dumfries & Galloway Council into school transport has meant that transport needs have been reduced and GTI have been asked to provide transport for pupils from Crossmichael to Castle Douglas instead. It is likely this service will be operated using a Rural Transport Solutions vehicle belonging to the Council, and will involve providing some transport in the Castle Douglas area to the Adult Resource Centre. Exact details are not yet known, but we have to remember that being involved in providing such

transport must remember this is our financial bread-and-butter, and without such income we would not be able to cater for the needs of people in the Glenkens.

With effect from Wednesday 7 August, the service operated from Dalry into Castle Douglas and back will have a slightly different timetable. Mulanje hospital covers a population of 55,000 people, many in isolated villages with little or no health care and massive problems caused by Aids, mother and infant mortality during birth, malaria in the wet season and general malnutrition. 66% of all admissions are Aidsrelated and the population of Malawi is 50% children due to

the affects of Aids. However, life expectancy has gone up from an average of 37 to 57 years, so progress is being made. Ian goes on to say: "You wouldn't credit this backdrop of human misery as the people of Malawi are so friendly, spontaneous and happy. They have a very communal approach to life, much of which goes on along the roadside so cycling through gave us a good opportunity to witness it. Often we would be cycling

along with Malawians carrying a goat strapped to their bike or other huge loads of sugar cane, maize, etc.

"The bike ride took us through some stunning and varied African scenery. The challenge was very well managed and we were very well looked after by our tour guide Henck, his Kenyan and Malawian helpers, our tour doctor and EMMS (the organising charity) representative."







FIRST WORLD WAR CENTENARY COMMEMORATIONS

I believe the time is right to discuss how the people of the Glenkens wish to commemorate the centenary of the outbreak of World War One. Many groups and organisations are now beginning their plans and Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) grants may be available if their criteria can be met.

I have already approached a few groups and individuals who I thought might have useful ideas and have been encouraged so far, including receiving a supportive mail from Alex Fergusson MSP. Therefore, I have arranged an informal meeting where views can be aired and we can see if there are sufficient grounds to continue.

trip around the WW1 war memorials of the Glenkens, a bus trip to the Scottish National War Memorial in Edinburgh Castle, guest speakers for a talk(s) in the CatStrand, research/display into how life in the Glenkens changed during and immediately after the first world war, a school bus trip to Devil's Porridge exhibition and possibly Quintinshill rail disaster, Glenkens children create a memorial plaque/stone/sculpture. Activities would be either recorded (for DVD) or published as a book, whichever is most suitable, and this would form a permanent record of how we commemorated the centenary. Hopefully each item would be either subsidised or funded in full by an HLF grant.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

The Man Who Founded

New Galloway religious views. As patron of

Sir John Gordon of Lochinvar (1599-1634), founder of New Galloway, did not live to see his dream realised.

He was the son of Sir Robert Gordon who was the inspiration in 1622 behind the proposed colonization of New Galloway (now Cape Breton) in Nova Scotia, and who "built ships destined to propagate the fame of the Scottish name" beyond the Equator.

John was held responsible, along with his enterprising father, for the illegal seizure of a ship of Middelburg, capital of Zeeland, and its cargo. This was profoundly embarrassing for Charles I who wished at that time to maintain good relations with the Netherlands. From his father he also inherited savage feuds with the families of Herries and the Earls of Galloway, both sides having to put up sums of 20,000 merks as guarantees of good behaviour.

In fact Sir John Gordon appears to have been of rather a docile nature. While he was growing up his family stayed at Rusco, near Gatehouse of Fleet, as well as at Greenlaw, at the foot of Loch Ken and, of course, Kenmure Castle which he was credited with "having brought to the perfection of a complete fabric as it never was before". As a young man he resided for a time in France with the somewhat crazed evangelical minister, John Welch who was exiled by James VI for his radical

Anwoth, Gordon attempted

to persuade the covenanting minister John Livingstone to accept the charge and, when he declined, it was offered to Samuel Rutherford, one of the giants of the Covenanting revolution. Welch, Livingstone and Rutherford all figure in John Howie's hugely influential Scots Worthies (1775), a collection of the biographies of those who served and/or suffered on behalf of the Scottish Reformation. Surprisingly perhaps, Sir John Gordon finds a place in the book too, largely because his friend, Rutherford, tended him in his dying months and wrote 'The Last and Heavenly Speech and Glorious Departure of John Viscount Kenmuir' (1649).

The theme concerns Kenmure's fears which gradually turn to joy and certainty as he prepares to meet Christ, 'coming leaping over the mountains and skipping over the hills'.

In 1633 the king, in Scotland for his coronation, created him Viscount of Kenmure and Lord of Lochinvar but since he disagreed with Charles in matters of politics and religion he withdrew from Edinburgh supposedly on account of his wife's ill-health. He later claimed that he feared "incurring the indignation of my prince and the loss of further honour". According to Rutherford he deeply regretted his action on his

deathbed,



you". Such divided loyalties would haunt the House of Kenmure until the execution of the sixth Viscount in 1716.

In 1629 Kenmure was granted a charter to erect a royal burgh to be called the burgh of Galloway on a part of the barony of Earlston, lying upon the Water of Ken.

Commentators have always assumed that the geographical description refers to Dalry though the village is not specifically mentioned in the document. Almost two years later Sir John changed his mind about the site when another charter allowed for the creation of a royal burgh on part of the lands of Roddings in the barony of Kenmure. The new site was probably preferred because the river ceased to be navigable north of Loch Ken. Robert Gordon, of Knockbrex, is listed as burgh commissioner of 'Newgalloway' in the parliament of June 1633 which also ratified the earlier charter authorizing "ane hail and frie burgh royall to be callit in all tyme coming the burgh of Galloway" By 1648 New Galloway, sometimes known as Newton, had a provost, one James Gordon. In a taxation rolL for 1649 the burgh was among those that paid the least monthly amount. It was never to reach its hoped-for potential but it is of interest to note that a New Galloway in Canada had been named some eight years before there was a New Galloway in Galloway! Ted Cowan
