WET AND WILD IN THE GLENKENS

Monday 30 December 2013 saw flood levels in the Dee catchment area at their highest since records began in 1977, with over 2" of rainfall within 12 hours in parts of the Galloway hills.

Communities in the Glenkens were heavily hit all round with extreme wind, power cuts and severe flooding.

Accross the area trees were blown onto power lines, causing power-cuts which for some lasted days. And just when things seemed to have settled down a bit, the rain came on. Homes, businesses, venues, farms and many roads were affected, with some properties under two feet of water. Worst affected by the water were Carsphairn and New Galloway, with the main road in Carsphairn becoming impassable and in New Galloway the road from the Ken Bridge to Quarry

Corner was more river than road with portions of the tarmac being swept away. More than eight properties in Carsphairn were flooded while New Galloway's CatStrand was also badly affected.

The flooding has been the worst for many years - it was reported that the last time you could take a boat down the main road in

Carsphairn was 60 years ago, and if anyone had been inclined this time they could have had a good run!

Brian Edgar, New Galloway resident and general manager at the CatStrand, said: "It's the worst flooding I've seen in my lifetime (53 years), and everyone I've met says it's the worst that they have ever seen."



PROS AND CONS OF WOOD AS A FUEL

Every fuel has its own pros and cons, and wood fuel is no different.

I use wood fuel, but I also sell it in its many different forms, so I get feedback from hundreds of customers which I will précis to help you choose the best fuel for your household.

Environmental Considerations

I know most of you will skip this and I fully understand why. I also have had enough of being preached at by the global warming lobby. Like the majority of you I just want to stay warm at the lowest possible monetary cost. However, if you want to factor in environmental issues, the beauty of wood fuel is that it is carbon dioxide neutral, in that it absorbs as much carbon dioxide during its growing life as it emits whilst burning to keep us warm. It is also fully renewable over a relatively short 40 to 100 year growing cycle. If the wood you are burning is a waste product or comes from FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) certificated woodland, so much the better. So wood gets a big tick in the environmental box.

Wildlife Issues

In my opinion this is not quite so clear-cut. The proliferation of wood stove installations over the last decade looks set to continue into the foreseeable future. Lots of wood stoves require lots of wood and most folk want to burn only hardwood, which comes from our deciduous trees like oak, ash, beech, sycamore, elm and so on. Many of these tree species, like ash and oak provide highly valuable wildlife habitat whilst growing, and all provide invaluable habitat whilst they decay after death.

The forestry lobby want us to bring 'under managed' woodlands into management to help meet this market for wood fuel. There is no doubt that good management of our woodlands for timber production is highly beneficial, but there is a danger that this will lead to naturally fallen timber being taken to feed this market for wood instead of being left on the woodland floor as a highly valuable habitat for a myriad of flora and fauna.

Of course, the wood has to come from somewhere, so where is best?

 FSC (Forest Stewardship) Council) is an independent, non-governmental, not for profit organization established to promote the responsible management of the world's forests. Try to make sure your timber started its journey to

Whereas you might put two or three logs on the fire at more and you risk creating one time, you will only need one good quality briquette, any more and you risk creating a furnace!

your fireplace from one of these sustainably managed woodlands.

 Arboricultural Waste is wood generated as a result of woodland management professionals pruning or removing trees that have, for instance, grown to the stage where they are a potential danger to the general public using roads, footpaths,

gardens and other public places. This is a very common source of logs and they are usually cheap because the arboriculturalist has already been paid for taking the timber down and can afford to sell cheap to clear it away. The problem is that it is rarely dry enough to burn right away.

What Form is Best?

- Traditional Logs are most people's first choice. They are readily available and if you are able to purchase 'late winter felled timber' (when the sap is down and newly felled timber

is relatively dry), and store undercover over summer ready for use the following winter, then traditional logs are also the most economic option.

 Manufactured Briquettes are the new kids on the block. These modern, high performance briquettes are consistent in size, moisture content and performance. They are clean and easy to handle, stack and store. Being less than half the moisture content and of greater density than traditional logs they generate more heat, more consistently and over a longer period, and are generally made from timber waste from manufacturing processes. Whereas you might put two or three logs on the fire at one

time, you will only need one good quality briquette, any a furnace! Quality is the only proviso. There are plenty of inferior quality, poorly compacted, cheap briquettes out there. They give briquettes a bad name.

Price?

This you might find difficult to believe, but facts are facts. Most people pay about £60 for a builders 'dumpy' or 'tote' bag of logs. Many log sellers describe this as approximately 1 cubic metre. Measure it (height x width x depth) and you will find most tote bags contain between 600 and 700 litres, not 1,000 litres. If those logs are dried down to 20% moisture content (ready to burn without creating tar in your chimney) then the average 'builders bag' will weigh approx. 200kg. That means you require five bags to equal one tonne. $5 \times £60 = £300$. Good quality briquettes cost between £250 and £350 per tonne. No wonder there is a massive movement by enlightened folk to burning briquettes instead of logs.

Originating in the United States in the 1980's, the concept behind Neighbourhood Watch was simple; working together can help to improve your community.

Currently, Dumfries and Galloway already has a significant number of active Neighbourhood Watch schemes. Whilst many schemes are long-established, there are new schemes being established all the time. Some areas of Scotland - Fife and Grampian, for example - have formed Regional Associations to provide focus and support for local schemes and to share good practice.

Following discussions by a group of Dalry residents and the Stewartry Crime Reduction Officer, it has been decided to look at the re-instatement of a Neighbourhood Watch group in Dalry, open for all present and

future residents to join.

together to address community safety and security issues. It is not just about local crime or antisocial activity but helps tackle issues of cyber-crime, internet fraud and unsolicited cold callers or visitors.

- Support and practical advice given to those affected by identified issues.
- Residents work together to make their community better.
- Opportunity to bring the residents and the other community organisations of Dalry together.

The first meeting of the proposed Dalry Neighbourhood Watch, to which all residents are invited to attend, will take place on Monday 17 February in Dalry Town Hall at 7pm. Anyone who lives in the village and is interested in finding out more is urged to come along to discuss the need for and the benefits of having a Neighbourhood Watch group for Dalry.








GLASGOW YOUTH FILM FESTIVAL 2014

Laurieston in 2013

2013 has been a great year for Laurieston. This year the village has been both celebrating and securing its past for future generations, as well as embracing its present with a variety of community events.

The Memorial to one of Lauriestons most famous sons, Samuel Rutherford Crockett, has been tidied up and given a new face lift. SR Crockett (1859-1914) was a novelist and poet, and probably most well-known for his work, *The Raiders*, published in 1894, a novel still considered a 'mustread' for those living in or visiting Galloway. Crockett was a contemporary of both Robert Louis Stevenson and JM Barrie,

the latter of whom often stayed with

him at his home when he served as minister for the Free Church of Scotland in Penicuik, near Edinburgh. The writer, whose works are full of both elements of Scottish history and of his native Galloway, was born at Little Duchrae, Balmaghie, Laurieston; the son of a Galloway farmer. On the weekend of 6 April, a series of Crockett-related events is planned - see p6 of this issue of the Gazette for details of this. A year of austerity hasn't held back this little community with their village hall being a venue for many events. Events included:

Laurieston is not the last in raising funds for those in need either with the 2013 annual Duck Race, being held on the river 8888 and marshalled by Des Hadnet; it raised both smiles and funds.

One shouldn't forget the annual

Laurieston Flower show either which is gaining a reputation, and saw the amount of entries significantly up.

Local businesses are seeing more and more visitors and holiday makers discovering the delights and scenery of Laurieston. Spring Fling and other exhibitions this year by artists and photographers such as Phil McMenemy have brought many to the area. Phil's exhibition at *The Gallery* has seen visitors from as far as way as Edinburgh and the north of England making a point of pulling off the welltrodden routes and venturing further afield. The Earth's Crust bakery originally set up in 2011 by Tom & Pavlina van Rooyen has seen another successful year. Tom has seen his baking courses and involvement in the Flavour Fortnight take off with a lot of courses fully subscribed. 2013 has been another great and positive year for this little Glenkens' community. HAPPY NEW BUS

The Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI) has another busy year to look forward to with a probable extension of the Rural Transport Solutions Project and the Stewartry Sports Council recommending GTI to their members as an alternative transport provider.

In addition the new smaller minibus now available for use and gives another option for transport to people in the Glenkens.

It has already been used for two GTI trips when there was not enough demand for the larger vehicle – once to Glasgow before Xmas and then to Ayr on Thursday 2 January and it is anticipated it will be a great asset to the community. The amount charged for fuel for the minibuses has been amended to take into account the different sizes with the smaller vehicle (eight seats) being charged at 40p per mile and the larger vehicle (16 seats) at 50p per mile.

We have received a number of suggestions for trips during the

coming year including the Falkirk Wheel, Loch Lomond and Deny Museum, Dumbarton, Dumfries House, Strathclyde Park for the Commonwealth Games Triathlon, Antique and Collectors Fairs in Ayr and a Farmers' Market in Dumfries - the more suggestions we get the better. Two trips that are already arranged are to Dobbies Garden Centre in Ayr on Saturday 22 March and to Wigtown during the Easter school holidays on Wednesday 9 April for a brief talk by the Countryside Ranger and a visit to the nearby Nature Reserve.

Tickets for trips will once again



be available approx. Four weeks prior to each trip and must be paid for when booking – unfortunately no refunds will be made unless the trip is cancelled by GTI.

Eye-catching posters are being printed giving details of trips and new leaflets for distribution at local shows designed, but the best publicity is word of mouth – please remember to tell new neighbours or your visitors to the area about GTI and what we offer, as more passengers are always welcome.

facility is run by Lucy and Gemma. Helen Keron, GCC chair, said: "It was a great year for both the Childrens' Club and the Playgroup. The Club has gone from strength to strength and it has been great to see the

Playgroup take off, with both the children and their families enjoying the facilities provided." The now bi-annual Clachan Fair always proves a big draw, with a range of activities for young and old.

The new series of the BBC Alba's programme, Farpaisean Chon-Chaorach, featuring the Carsphairn Dog Trials, was aired on Monday 7 January.

Farpaisean Chon-Chaorach is a successful series that showcases Sheep Dog Trials and competitions. The programme begins each series by filming 2 or 3 Open Sheep Dog Trials across Scotland, and follows some of the competitors up through the ranks to the National Sheep Dog Trials, where 150 dogs compete for the title of Scottish Champion. It is out of these competitors that 15 dogs are chosen to represent Scotland in the International Sheep Dog Trials held annually between England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales.

The programme featured well-known competitors in the Dog Trial world and was won by Peter Hetherington and his dog, Pete. Many of the competitors had connections with Carsphairn including the competition judge, David Armstrong, who worked as a shepherd at Lamford and Brown Hill.

The episode included footage of the Carsphairn show, the Heritage Centre and the village. It included interviews with

The Wallace family of Fingland were singled out for a special feature by the programme, focusing on their families' famous dog, Loos, who damed 4 Supreme International champions. The filming of the Carsphairn Sheep Dog Trials was brought to the attention of BBC ALBA by the International Sheep Dog Trials Society. Life-long member of the Society and local Carsphairn shepherd, David McMillan, met with the programme makers to show them the venue. Davy said, "It was a very misty day when they drove down to view the location and learn about the show and the village. I told them

about the history of Carsphairn, and the show, and explained that it was one of the oldest agricultural shows in Scotland. Just as the meeting was about to end the mist lifted, and the hills came into view. I think that it was the stunning scenery that sold it to them in the end". Carsphairn school teacher, Walker McKenna, told the Gazette: "It was great to show off our little community and have it show-cased to a wider audience."

Dalry Community Council Update

Dalry Community Council has been working with Dumfries & Galloway Council to develop its Winter Resilience Plan, so it can help Dalry residents to be better prepared for whatever the winter weather throws at us.

Last year's March snow and recent high winds, heavy rain and flooding this year highlight how quickly changing weather patterns can cause difficulties for people.

Thanks to a donation from the Glenkens Community Shop, Dalry Community Council is now in a position to make its first purchases of equipment for handing out in an emergency to Dalry residents.

This includes hot water bottles, battery-powered lanterns and hot drink/soup thermos flasks.

The Community Council plans to expand its emergency stock pile as additional funding is obtained.

In addition, snow clearing equipment has been requested from Dumfries and Galloway Council to help improve our ability to deal with heavy snow fall.

Thanks are due to Community Councillor Jim Reid for his hard work on this project.

The Community Council would appreciate hearing from any Dalry residents who are experiencing weather related problems, so we can gather information about flooding hot spots, blocked drains, sewers etc. so it can be passed onto Dumfries and Galloway Council for attention. Footnote by Bill Blyth, Blowplain: "I walked to school in Balmaclellan with other children in 1940. With my gas mask slung over my shoulder and carrying a piece bag as there were no school dinners in those days. Walking to school taught us self-reliance and resilience. A school car was put on later in the year driven by Mrs Watret of Midpark who drove very conscientiously for many years.

The Glenkens Rebellion:

Aftermath the battle. Many of those who

Estimates of the numbers killed at the battle of Rullion Green differ widely.

It was claimed that only four or five died on the government side while fifty of the rebels perished. Some suggested that 100 covenanters were slaughtered on the field, including some forty of 'the westland men', while 300 were dispatched as they fled by the peasantry of Lothian. Upwards of 130 were captured and imprisoned in Edinburgh. The victorious General Tam Dalyell preached a gospel of extermination; all rebel supporters were to be removed or destroyed. Scotland's Royal Commissioner, the Duke of Rothes, opined that those 'damd incorrigeable phanaticks' whom he characterized as 'nyaffs', must be suppressed and he set off on a progress to pacify 'those parts where the frenzy first took its rise', namely the Glenkens and Galloway.

It is always difficult to ascertain exactly what happened in history but this period is particularly difficult because covenanting apologists, understandably, took a completely biased and one-sided view of their heroes while supporters of the Crown exaggerated enemy atrocities and motivations. We cannot always be sure that the 'martyrdoms' depicted by Robert Wodrow in his History of the Sufferings actually happened because we often lack corroborative evidence. He argued that the covenanters were not guilty of treason because they acted in self-defence, which is rather a stretch, while government officials were none too picky about their victims, often accusing people who were nowhere near Dalry or Rullion Green. What cannot be doubted was the vindictive punishment inflicted on these 'poor naked country lads who had never seen war' and their families, following

escaped execution were hounded for the rest of their lives.

An example was to be made of two rebellious participants: Hew McKail a 26-year-old minister from Edinburgh who suffered from tuberculosis and who pulled out of the march before the battle to be subsequently arrested by Dalyell, and Neilson of Corsock who had promised protection to the captive Turner, who, in turn, attempted unsuccessfully to intercede on his behalf. Both were brutally tortured, their legs shattered by the vicious 'boot', an iron contraption into which the leg was inserted, followed by the hammering in of as many wedges as were required to produce a result. Both went bravely to their deaths. Alexander

Many of those who escaped execution were hounded for the rest of their lives.

Robertson, minister of Urr, was also executed. Remarkably Maclellan of Barscobe eluded capture until 1682 when Claverhouse allegedly planned to have him hung drawn and quartered, a fate he averted by rejecting the covenant. A year later he was murdered as a traitor to the cause by fellow-covenanter Robert Grierson of Mylnemark. Among those sentenced to death at Ayr on Christmas Eve 1666 were John Graham, James Smith and John Short of Old Clachan of Dalry, and, from Carphairn, Alexander MacCulloch and John McCoull. In 1667 the quartering of troops led to further atrocities at the properties of Gordon of Holm of Dalry and Gordon of Earlston, Specifically named in commissions were the Cannons of Barnchalloch and Barley, Gordon of Garrery in Kells, Henry Grier in Balmaclellan, Gordon younger of Holm and Dempster of Corriedoo. Even after the Duke of Lauderdale introduced an indemnity the persecution continued.

In 1668 the authorities still sought

sixteen people in Dalry,

among them, unusually, two women, Margaret Tod and Bessie Gordon. The wanted list included Robert Gaa, smith in Clachan, and one each of McCall, Chapman, McMichael, Douglas, McAdam, Girvan, McCutcheon and McNaught. Listing such things may appear boring but many of the personal and place-names of those sought have survived, a circumstance which, I would argue, brings those folk of the past, and the terrible fears they must have faced, much closer to us. Thus wanted in Dalry were: (original spelling retained) Crichtoun in Knoksting and in Fingland, Ferguson in Trostan, McCall in Craigincore, Roan in Stroanpatrick, Neilson

> in Clachan, and Gordon and MacMillan there, MacMillan in Ardindarroch, McQuhannel in Kirkland of Dalry, Miller in Auchinshinoch and Cannon in Blackmark. In Kells were Bennoch in Strangfastnet,

McLeive in Barskelloch, McCall in Airy, McAdam in Newtoun and for others there. Balmaclellan parish: Milliken in Fell, Gordon in Crogo, Dempster in Hill, Kersan in Killochy, Raine in Cubboks. In Carsphairn, Cannon in Formartoun, McMitchell in Knokinrioch, McMillans in Stronggashell, Kiltarsan and Bredinoch, McIlnay in Polundow, Logan in Locheid, Crauford in Drumjoan, Cunningham in Longfoord, McAdam in Waterheid and Hannay there, McAdam in Bow, McMillan younger in Brokloch, Ferguson in Woodhead, Cubbison in Mosse, McAdam in Knokgray, MacMillan in Bank, Smith at Bridge of Deuch, Wylie in Smeiton, Malcolm in Netherholm and McColm in Netherglen. What happened to them all we cannot know but the names of these folk who, for refusing to attend church and resisting subsequent fines, were treated like terrorists, should be cherished in the annals of Glenkens and of Scotland.

End of an Era

Balmaclellan Smithy closed at the end of 2013 after over a hundred years of family service to local farmers and the community as a whole.

Thomas Corrie took over as blacksmith at the beginning of the twentieth century, and his grandson, also Thomas, has carried the business through to the present day. In this time,



the role of teh smith and the smithy has had to adapt to changing demands. To move on from the traditional forge work and teh shoeing of horses, the smithy operations were transferred to a new site a short distance down the road, using the former village inn premises. This provided more space and allowed the introduction of new equipment for the maintenance of farm machinery and a wider range of engineering work. An office and petrol station were built across the road.

Now the relentless evolution of management of farming operations and associated equipment has eroded teh business to the extent that it can no longer continue, and Tom Corrie has reluctantly decided



to lay down his tools, bringing to an end three generations of family achievement. The contribution of the smithy to the life o fthe village and the locality will be greatly missed.
