Ewan will be entering with a sidecar motorcycle. He says: "The bike I am running is a chassis built by Gordon Shand from Auchentiber (near Kilwinning) and a tuned tuned Suzuki GSXR 600 engine. My sidecar passenger is Dicky Gale from the Isle of Man, although local man Tony Moore used to passenger me on short circuits."

Open for Business: Dalry Post Office at New Location

The Post Office in Dalry has now moved into Wright's Shop, 17-19 Main Street (opposite the Clachan Inn).

Following the refurbishment of the shop, the Post Office opened for business on 30 April when subpostmistress Florance Ruddock closed the former branch.

Lyndsay Wright and her staff at Wright's Shop are operating a local Post Office branch including postal services, cash withdrawals via chip and pin, bill payments, phone top-ups, Post Office card accounts and foreign currency. The Post Office now also benefits from the longer opening hours of the shop.

Lyndsay is delighted with the changes to the shop and is very pleased with the positive responses she has received from customers.

She would like to thank her customers for their continued support and understanding during the disruption, and she looks forward to continuing her work within the village.

THE FOOD TRAIN

You may have seen the Food Train vans out and about – but do you know what we do?

The Food Train is a local charity and voluntary organisation providing a weekly service delivering groceries to older people living in Dumfries and Galloway.

Any person aged 65 and over living in D&G who has difficulty doing their grocery shopping due to ill health, disability, frailty or mobility problems can enjoy the benefits of their local Food Train.

Every week volunteers collect shopping lists from our customers, in person or by phone. Volunteer shoppers make the orders up in the shop; the orders are packed in boxes complete with till receipt and the original shopping list. The orders are then collected by other delivery volunteers, and on receipt customers pay for their shopping plus a £3 charge for each delivery (and £1 a year membership). In the Stewartry we shop in Castle Douglas in the Co-op, Tesco and Sunrise.

People can refer themselves, or be referred by others and enrolling is easy: there is no assessment process and no application form to fill in. The Food Train is flexible and easy to use, and a phone call to the branch office is all it takes to set it up. It can be used weekly, fortnightly or monthly; it can be used short-term while recovering from an illness, or for as long as it's needed. If you are an older person struggling with your grocery shopping you can let the Food Train take the strain.

Food Train also offers its 'EXTRA' service to anyone aged 65 and over. Our volunteers do odd jobs that folk are unable to do themselves, for example; defrosting freezers, cleaning the inside of windows, hanging curtains.

defrosting freezers; cleaning the inside of windows; hanging curtains. (No jobs are undertaken that would require a qualified tradesperson.) EXTRA jobs cost £3 upwards depending on

the size of the job, and time required to complete it.

We rely on volunteers to deliver our services – volunteer shoppers, volunteer drivers and co-drivers, admin and 'EXTRA' volunteers. They do a fantastic job, and our customers really appreciate the chat and care they give when delivering the shopping



Eco Feature sponsored by natural power What is the issue with North American signal crayfish?

North American signal crayfish, first formally recorded in Scotland in 1995, are wellknown in the Glenkens and have now been recorded in a number of other locations across Dumfries & Galloway.

Signal crayfish can be 2-15cm long and are a very aggressive and highly adaptable species. They can have a significant adverse impact on our native freshwater animals and plants in any river, loch or pond that they inhabit. In running waters extensive burrows may destabilise banks, causing erosion and bank collapse. They also prey on fish eggs and young fish, and compete for food and habitat which further impacts on the populations of native fish.

Signal crayfish are one of many non-native species in Scotland introduced by humans. Once established some, such as signal crayfish, become invasive and can cause problems for recreational users and others who rely on our rivers and lochs for their livelihoods.

Unfortunately no long-term solution has yet been found to eradicate signal crayfish once they are established. Research continues to try to find suitable control techniques and to prevent the movement of signal crayfish within rivers and between catchments.

Trapping trials have concluded that although numbers may be reduced during the short-term, traps favour the capture of larger individuals. An unintended consequence of selective harvesting is the increased growth and earlier maturation of juvenile crayfish, which can cause the population to increase. It is not, therefore, a sustainable long-term solution. It is illegal to trap signal crayfish for personal consumption or for onward sale due to the significant and unacceptable risk of introduction to other waters which are presently unaffected by crayfish.



Any trapping for scientific purposes, or to limit numbers, requires a licence.

Many water-users, businesses and associated organisations across the region and further afield are hugely concerned that other water bodies could also become infested with signal crayfish. Until a longterm solution can be found the only way of protecting unaffected waters is to prevent the movement of any crayfish or their eggs, which could find their way to new locations.

The law is therefore clear;

that it is an offence to be in possession of a live crayfish or to set a crayfish trap in Scotland without a licence. They must not be transported or released into the wild (including returning live animals caught by accident to the water or ground).

If you take a signal crayfish from the water (accidentally or otherwise) do not take it away, as females may be carrying eggs which could be spread to other waters. It should be humanely dispatched and buried close to where it was found.

Please help to prevent the spread of all invasive non-native species by 'checking, cleaning and drying' all equipment that is used in water before using it elsewhere, and spread awareness with others. If you come across a crayfish trap, do not handle it or remove it from the water. Please report it to Police Scotland by calling 101.

Central Table Communion at Carsphairn

Once a year the historic central communion table is used during the celebration of the Lord's Supper in Carsphairn Church. This year this service will be held on Sunday 6 July at 10.15am.

Visitors would be welcome to join members at this service at which the 1647 communion cups will be used. Carsphairn Church acquired these cups under the ministry of Rev John Semple very early in its history, just before the start of the turbulent Covenanting period.

Semple drew people from

far and wide to his celebrated communion services at Carsphairn. He was a leader of the Covenanting ministers and once stood up to Oliver Cromwell at a meeting in Edinburgh – for which he suffered six months in prison!

Conventicle at Halfmark

The conventicle this year will be at Halfmark in Carsphairn parish, and will now be on Sunday 8 June at 3pm, as opposed to the earlier advertised date of 27 April.

Halfmark is a ruined cottage situated roughly midway between Garryhorn and Carnavel which was inhabited until around the middle of the

19th century.

In Covenanting times a man by the name of McRory lived there. He was quietly reading his Bible one Sunday morning having put his cattle out to pasture when Grierson of Lagg, who was stationed locally at Garryhorn, came by with his soldiers. Lagg shot him dead on the spot.

Parking will be at Garryhorn, from where it is an easy walk down a grassy track to the place where the open-air service will be held.

However, to get to Halfmark itself, which is a few hundred yards further on, wellies will be needed to ford the Garryhorn Burn.

The TT is not a rally but a road race run on closed public roads. It was because the Isle of Man had its own set of road laws that the race was allowed to run originally, as racing on the main roads of the UK mainland was forbidden.

For anyone interested in taking part in a race like the TT, Ewan goes on to say: "To compete in the TT you need several

years of racing experience, to hold a National Licence, to achieve satisfactory results in the previous season and also two events in the current year. Entry to the TT is free but the preparation and spares needed to support the bike during the event cost quite a lot of money; after all, the course is 37.5 miles long with three laps to each race and two races, as well as all the practice laps, maybe 12 or 14".

In conclusion, Ewan says: "Motorcycle racing is great fun and brings you into contact with some real characters. MOUNTAIN RESCUE MISSION

On the morning of Saturday 29 March observant Dalry people would have noticed a large number of vehicles outside the Police Station from about 9.30am onwards.

Particularly noticeable would have been the vehicles of the Galloway Mountain Rescue Team (MRT) and the Moffat MRT who were holding their joint exercise locally.

Less obviously, the local Scouts were involved too. Every Mountain Rescue training exercise has a purpose and quite commonly an exercise will be based on a scenario. The March scenario was that a group of Scouts had set out to do the three Cairnsmores Challenge (Cairnsmore of Fleet, Cairnsmore of Dee and Cairnsmore of Carsphairn). The Scouts had split up and got lost, one group of four somewhere near Craignarget (northern end of Cairnsmore of Fleet) and the other group, also of four, on the southern slopes of Cairnsmore of Dee. The scenario required the Scouts to be cold and tired. I went with the team on Craignarget and the other team had a well known local Dalry

resident, Bob Peace, with them.

The team on Cairnsmore of Dee were found by our SARDA (Search and Rescue Dog Association) dog and the only problem there was that the dog, Troy, loves children and stayed to be petted instead of going back to bring his handler to the location. The team on Craignarget was found in the edge of the forest by a group made up of both Moffat and Galloway MRT personnel. They were supposedly hypothermic so the appropriate First Aid was to make them warm - it was a warm day!

Due to time constraints both groups of Scouts were evacuated from the hill quite quickly after being found, and everyone came back to The Clachan Inn for a debrief, soup and sandwiches.

Overall, it was an excellent day

for both MR teams and for the Scouts.

Both the Galloway and the Moffat teams have a series of exercises throughout the year and it's important that they're able to respond quickly and skilfully whenever needed.

Glenkens Transport Initiative

In recent years the growth and success of the Glenkens Transport Initiative (GTI) has attracted compliments and much praise from not only people in the Glenkens but also from across Dumfries and Galloway and other parts of Scotland.

It is therefore rather surprising and somewhat disappointing how little use of GTI is now made by the people the initiative was originally designed to help – the residents of the Glenkens.

There are, of course, exceptions including the Wednesday evening service to Castle Douglas, the 'senior swimming' on a Tuesday and the regular use of a vehicle by Dalry and Kells School.

Many people think we are extremely lucky having 56 user groups registered with GTI and yet throughout 2013 only 24 of those groups actually used a bus and some of them only once!

We are very lucky having our own qualified Midas trainer/ examiner, Jon Nimmo, making it easy to get drivers trained, and many of our volunteer drivers are prepared to help if a driver is needed. The trips we regularly run, none of which have ever cost more than £6, are also struggling for support, and only recently a planned visit to Dumfries House was cancelled because not one person showed any interest. Likewise, although transport is often available in connection with events at the CatStrand, there is very little interest, even though it means no parking problems and no restrictions on having a drink

The GTI Committee took the opportunity a few years ago to apply to be on the Dumfries & Galloway Council's approved list for providing transport. This together with the recent demise of the Stewartry Sports Council has led to a number of opportunities to provide transport for the Council as well as a steady influx of requests for transport from other organisations and new user groups based in the Stewartry.

We now have four vehicles at our disposal, three with 16 seats and one with eight seats, two of the mini buses being based in Castle Douglas and two in the Glenkens.

We have total flexibility where these vehicles are used giving GTI the ability to deal with most transport requests. It is rather disappointing that user groups based near Castle Douglas seem to make more use our facilities and use them for such things as walking festivals, golf trips and social events.

The cost of using a vehicle is

reasonably cheap and it is far more environmentally friendly than everyone using cars.



How To Beat Doorstep Crime

From bogus callers to rogue traders, doorstep criminals are cunning, creative, and often very convincing.

Anyone can be fooled as these people are professional conartists. However, the over 60s are often specifically targeted.

What is Doorstep Crime?

There are two main types:

- 1 Bogus callers try to get into your home or obtain personal details by pretending to be someone they're not, including council staff, meter readers, charity collectors or police officers. In reality, they are criminals trying to steal cash and valuables.
- 2 Rogue traders usually coldcall, claiming to be workers offering to make repairs or carry out work on your house, garden or driveway. In reality they charge inflated prices for shoddy

or unnecessary work.
We do not recommend dealing with cold-callers for property maintenance and repairs to your home.

What can I do?

- Be on guard if someone turns up unexpectedly
- Use a door chain or bar
- Always put the chain on before opening the door
- Keep it on while talking to callers
- Don't feel embarrassed; genuine callers expect you to be careful
- If you don't have a door chain, check from the nearest window.
 Remember, door chains can be easily fitted
- If you're not sure, don't answer the door.

Who should I call...

...If I feel threatened, unsafe or suspicious of a caller?

Contact the police immediately on 999.

...if I see something suspicious in my area, or want more advice about doorstep crime?

Contact the police on 101; try and take a note of vehicle details or registration numbers and descriptions of anyone suspicious.

...if I want to contact the police anonymously?

Contact the independent charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111. You can also visit its website at www.crimestoppers-uk.org

...to find out more about home safety services?

- Contact your local police station on 101 to arrange a free security survey.
- Contact your local Trading Standards; some operate No Cold Calling zones or have lists of approved traders.

THE HARMONY OF SPRING

For some it's woolly willow catkins by the roadside, for others the delight of gambolling lambs in the fields, the vanguard swallows fresh home from South Africa or myriad other colourful images that confirm the arrival of spring.

This year, for me, it was the rattling calls and gathering of a couple of dozen sand martins over the Water of Ken, just above

the confluence with the Garroch Burn. Following repeated flooding of their riverside nest burrows in 2012, the depleted colony enjoyed a bumper breeding season last year and are now back in profusion. These resilient birds have evolved to deal with

a range of disasters, natural and otherwise, that affect variously their sand bank homes, their wintering grounds or their running the gauntlet of a 3,000mile journey between the two. The 1970's drought in the Sahel saw them hit their lowest levels in living memory, but in recent years these indomitable mites (only 1/2 oz or 14g!) have been widespread and are the earliest of our summer migrant birds, usually seen heading north over rivers and lochs in mid to late March. I love them.

Around this time I also love to hear oystercatchers making their first nocturnal forays upstream to their inland breeding places from their coastal wintering quarters – how excited they sound. Also, on early morning and dusk walks down the Ken at Dalry in March, when Earlstoun isn't generating, I usually scan downstream from the swinging brig in the hope of seeing a whaup (curlew) feeding on invertebrates in the mossy

shallows. Although I've heard an odd bird overhead, I've yet to be lucky this year.

These brilliant big waders, with their uniquely evocative calls, greatly increased in numbers in the pre-forestry and presilage post-war decades in the southwest, but this was to be short-lived. More recently their numbers have crashed throughout much of the British Isles, but especially in Ireland and south and west Britain due to habitat change. Many thousands lost their moorlands here directly to forestry, but recent research has confirmed that forestry also has a negative effect on whaups

well beyond its boundaries, probably due to harbouring predators.

Although some raptors predate them, most nests are lost at the egg stage and ground predators like foxes appear to be the major culprits. Land-use change has also seen them decline on the continent and the UK now holds about a quarter of the global population.

There are still a few pairs on the moorlands north of Carsphairn and it was great to hear them singing this morning (6 May) as I looked and listened for black

grouse (I saw two). Conifer maturation has pushed both species out of the immediately forested areas, but it is hoped that the second rotation will at least provide homes for some of the latter.

As a boy from coal-mining New Cumnock, in the early 1970s I walked several times from the Afton over onto the Water of Deugh, fascinated by the chambered cairn a little downstream from Brownhill. At that time the Deugh was on the New Cumnock fishing ticket – it may be still – and my paternal male relations were all keen fishers, so much so that I often

had the job of holding polythene bags full of (brown) trouts as they caught them with the worm in a falling, black-tea-coloured water with almost unbelievable regularity. Planting had then only recently begun and the spring landscape on the upper Deugh

was one of open moorland alive with whaups and black grouse. Hen harriers were regular, too, and I even saw golden eagle once or twice.

Whilst beauty is, of course, in the eye of the beholder, I must say I don't think I would be alone in my feelings regarding the industrial transformation that afforestation and clearfelling has brought to this area. It now looks like a war-zone.

Finally, not being a `sportsman' myself, I clearly can't appreciate the thrill that shooters get from

killing their quarry, although I am certainly not opposed to (legal) shooting in principle. However, I'm certain that, like me, many shooters will also fail to appreciate the thrill that accompanied the shooting of a whaup by someone on the Ken at Dalry early on Saturday morning a couple of weeks ago. Sadly, that's one I won't be seeing feeding in the mossy shallows in future.

For children there will be a treasure hunt as well as the chance to perhaps see Rocky the Kendoon Monster, and even fairies in the garden! There will also be an exhibition of patchwork and quilting (the quilter will be present), a plant and cake stall and teas for £2.50.

The Open Garden is on Sunday 15 June from 2-5pm, entry is £3.50 with children under 16 free and dogs on leads are welcome. Funds raised will go towards the Glenkens Children's Club and Dumfries & Galloway Canine Rescue Centre.



War Graves in the Glenkens

Although most war graves are in large cemeteries erected near the battlefields of WW1 or WW2, there are many individual war graves back here in UK.

These are soldiers who died of wounds or illness 'at home'. There are five such graves in the Glenkens and these have recently been highlighted by new Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) signs placed at the entrance to the churchyards.

Some of these graves have official Commonwealth War Graves Commission pattern gravestones but other families preferred to have a private stone erected - the photos show an example of each.

The official war graves of the Glenkens are:

- John Anderson, WW1,

than one war death.

and died of illness. The rules were much stricter to be granted official war grave status for such organisations - if she had been a member of the Armed Forces then she would have qualified. However, despite being listed on the Kells War Memorial, her grave remains a private one and does not have official war grave status.

Remembrance Poppies The Glenkens Connection

born in Old Cumnock in 1776 and was farming at the Holm of Dalguhairn, Carsphairn, when his son David was born in 1800.

David was farming at Dukieston in Kells parish when his son Thomas was born in 1820. Dukieston is now a ruin on Forrest Estate. Thomas farmed in Laurieston and his son David was born in 1845. A few years later, Thomas and his family emigrated to Guelph, Ontario. David became an army officer and had a family of his own, one of whom John, born on 30 November 1872, is the key part of this history.

John McCrae also joined the

Marmaduke McCrae was Army and served in the Boer War and the First World War where he became a medical officer. He was in charge of a field hospital during the Second Battle of Ypres and it was there that he wrote the poem In Flanders Fields following the death of his friend Alexis Helmer in 1915. The poem was published soon after in *Punch* magazine.

> In Flanders Fields was the inspiration for the poppy to be adopted as a symbol of remembrance and the poem is used in remembrance services across the world.

Marmaduke's gravestone can be seen in Carphairn Churchyard and memorials to John McCrae can be seen the world over.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN THE BATTLE OF BANNOCKBURN

This month marks the 700th anniversary of the most iconic battle in Scottish history, fought on 23 and 24 June to preserve the freedom and independence of the nation of Scots against the mighty army of England's Edward II.

Robert Heron of New Galloway (1764-1807) wrote A New History of Scotland from the earliest Times...to 1748 in five thick volumes, a fascinating

work which seems to have been almost completely forgotten. Heron was a genuine product of the Scottish Enlightenment, a polymath who wrote on numerous subjects. He was stee

subjects. He was steeped in Scottish literature, had absorbed every enlightenment publication worth reading, but sadly was a self-confessed waster and boozer. He was disappointed that the field of Bannockburn retained no conspicuous vestiges of the battle, in which 'freedom spurned tyranny to the earth, and crushed his neck in the dust'. Nothing remained to show it was 'once the scene of an engagement decisive of the fate of Scotland', save for the stone that supported the royal standard. This year the site has acquired a shiny new visitor centre portraying the battle using the latest high tech.

Bannockburn was Scotland's greatest victory, as might have been predicted since it was fought on a particularly auspicious day, that of John the Baptist, Scotland's favourite saint, having baptised Scotland's

own St Andrew, 'first-called' of the disciples, who advised his brother Peter, of the coming of the Messiah. The victory, against apparently overwhelming odds, was iconic because it was fought for the most sublime of causes, namely the defence of king, country and community. Bannockburn represented invincible corroboration of the legend that Scotland, specially favoured by God, had never been a conquered country, unlike England. More practically, defeating the greatest military force in Europe gave the Scots a massive psychological boost. It was claimed that the English army marching north was 20

miles from end to end. The amount of booty looted from the field was valued at an unbelievable £3 million in 1874. Scotland was suddenly a place to be reckoned with, Bruce a warlord to be admired and his battle-hardened veterans to be envied and respected. Every year thereafter the elaborate celebrations at the Feast of John the Baptist, handily corresponding to Midsummer's Day, would recall Bannockburn and the noble aspirations it symbolised.

What was the impact of Bannockburn on the Glenkens? If a referendum had been held in 1314 even more of the inhabitants of Galloway would have voted 'No' than are expected to do so 700 years later. Galloway had little love for the Bruce cause. Robert's brother Edward was violently imposed on the province as Lord of Galloway. The Galwegians



continued to defy the Bruce regime until the 1350s. The 'Black Douglas', Bruce's loyal lieutenant, was granted the regality of Buittle, a bridgehead for the almost total Douglas takeover of Galloway by the mid-15th century. Another Bruce stalwart, Thomas Randolph, received estates in Parton. Native McMillan landowners in the Glenkens, Gylbricht McMalene and Gilruth McMolene, of Brockloch and Knockengorroch (Carsphairn) had their lands forfeited, for supporting the English. The

Church in Galloway continued to oppose Bruce who attempted modest pacification by granting the patronage of Kells to Whithorn Abbey for the damage it had suffered in the wars.

Whithorn thereafter had the right to nominate the priest of Kells. This process was known as 'appropriation', whereby the revenues of the parish were siphoned off by the beneficiary. Quite often in such cases insufficient funds were left behind to maintain the parish priest and the fabric of his kirk.

Two World Wars have taught us to commemorate, rather than celebrate, battles. The loss of life in the Anglo-Scottish wars was horrendous. Both Edward II and Robert I would have preferred to avoid the battle. From a Scottish point of view it was about resistance to tyrannical invasion, occupation and conquest by an alien despot. Much water has flowed down the Bannock Burn since 1314. A conflict that took place 700 years ago must be seen in its context of time and circumstance. Today we engage in very different battles.



GLENKENS CLUSTER HEAD TEACHER RETIRES

Fraser Simpson, head teacher of the Glenkens Cluster of schools, is retiring at the end of June after 12 years at Dalry.

His time at Dalry School has seen many changes, most notably the formation of the Glenkens Cluster - Glenkens Nursery, Carsphairn, Dalry and Kells Primaries and Dalry Secondary all coming under the umbrella of one head teacher.

Other highlights of the last 12 years for Fraser include the ski trips, the annual geography trips to Glasgow and making it to the Small Schools Football Cup final in 2009. But it is the daily working with young people ranging from toddlers to teenagers that has been the best part of the job.

"Every child only gets one shot at education and an environment like the Glenkens is a fantastic opportunity for them to grow and learn," says Fraser. "There is a great sense of pride at the S4 Leaving Assemblies as those who we have taught and guided, often from the age of three, move on as successful, confident young adults."

Apart from a brief spell as a

part-time football reporter for DC Thomson when he was a student in Edinburgh, Fraser has been a teacher all his working life. There had never been any question in his mind about his chosen career - in fact the only decision was whether to train as a geography or PE teacher. Geography won the day.

Three years at Dunblane High School was followed by seven years at Wallace High in Stirling. Then in 1987 he and his wife Mags moved to Stranraer when he was appointed principal teacher at Stranraer Academy. In 1996 he joined Douglas Ewart High School in Newton Stewart as assistant head where he remained until coming to Dalry.

Dalry Secondary may be one of the smallest high schools in Scotland but it is firmly at the forefront in delivering top quality education, as the national exam league tables demonstrate year after year. Paul Bannister, principal teacher pupil support at Dalry, comments: "Fraser always puts the needs of pupils first - every decision made in school has been for their benefit."

Asked what advice he would give his successor, Fraser said: "What makes a school effective are strong and positive relationships with staff,



pupils, parents and the wider community - this is much more important than Standards and Quality Reports or School Improvement Plans which will not work on their own without good relationships."

Having gone straight from university and teacher training college to his first job, Fraser is planning a 'gap year' for his retirement and it will be no surprise to a generation of pupils that this will involve going to all the Falkirk FC games. Golf, cycling and a bit of travel in the camper van are also on the agenda.

Andrea Ramsay, chair of the School Parent Council, voices the good wishes of all parents for his retirement and the Glenkens Gazette and the wider community of the Glenkens also wish him all the best.
