Day of the Region in New Galloway

Join New Galloway's weekend party...

New Galloway will take centre stage in September when it hosts a weekend of events celebrating the Day of the Region (DoR). There will be a diverse programme of free events ranging from fishing to singing, golf to photography and cooking to wildlife-watching, demonstrating the wealth of activities people enjoy accross the wider area.

The Day of the Region is a Europe-wide initiative to encourage grass-roots rural community activity and cooperation, and capture the wonderful array of activities that go on throughout the year. Four years ago Dumfries & Galloway



was the first region in the UK to take part, and New Galloway is one of eight communities in the region which have been accepted for this year's celebration which runs from 19-21 September.

New Galloway & Kells Community Council has set up a steering group to run the event, led by the council's chair, George Scott. He says: "The Day of the Region is an opportunity to showcase the many interesting and varied activities that we enjoy in the region and especially in New Galloway. We hope to encourage people and places to connect with each other and to encourage people to to share resources, find new friends, and have fun. It will also provide local people with an opportunity to volunteer in their communities and share their skills and interests."

The entire event is free and George and the other volunteer organisers look forward to

GLENKENS COMMUNITY CENTRE

It's been a busy few months behind the scenes at the Glenkens Community Centre, with the plans for community ownership progressing apace.

Because of the clear desire voiced by the wider community to see Dalry Town Hall and the Community Centre working closely together, we formed a steering committee from representatives of the Community Centre and Town Hall management committees, Dalry community council and some independent voices to ensure that the solution we arrive at is one that will benefit the area as a whole (full list of steering committee members below).

At our inaugural meeting in May, we determined that the will was there to see the Community Centre and the Town Hall managed by one Trust, or SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation), as they are formally known nowadays. Under this umbrella organisation each building would retain a management committee with responsibilities (as now) for rent-setting, bookings management and internal maintenance. The new Trust would be responsible for grant and fundraising to facilitate external maintenance and running costs, plus advertising and promotion and any other roles that would be better done as a joint effort.

We believe that this will provide a model that will allow the buildings to work in a complementary fashion, each playing to its strengths to provide the community with the facilities it needs, and indeed to become more than the sum of their parts. It is also a model that could be expanded to include other public buildings in Dalry, as and if required.

To achieve this model, there are some legal issues regarding the existing (and very old) Town Hall Trust that need to be overcome, but Will Adam is very kindly working hard on this on our behalf

We are all very excited about the possibilities that community ownership and working so closely with the Town Hall offer.

and we are confident of finding a route to our desired outcome. We have also been successful in our application for a £3000 grant from Awards For All to fund the transition costs.

Communications with D&G
Council continue cordially,
although we were surprised
to hear last month that due to
changing Council priorities, they
are not now insisting on a sale to
us in the immediate future. We can
now continue as we are under the
new Management Agreement for
the medium-term. However, the
amount of money the Council has
available for upgrades (such as

new windows) is extremely small and any external maintenance would almost certainly continue on the same ad-hoc basis as before.

At the next meetings of the Management Committee and the Steering Committee, due in early September, we will therefore discuss whether we would like to continue towards the purchase anyway. Early indications are that we should capitalise on our momentum and proceed with the purchase.

In summary, the Community Centre will certainly remain open for the foreseeable future, with a handover to community ownership

still very likely. The potential of community ownership and working in partnership with the Town Hall open up a vista of possibilities for the future which we are very excited about.

Local Initiatives in New Galloway (LING)

Town Hall: The makeover of the Lower Hall has received many positive comments. The Open Days in May were abuzz with people reminiscing about the 'olden days' over the marvellous display of photos, postcards and pamphlets put together by Avril Bridgeman.

People of all ages discussed what activities could happen now. Both the surveys and the open days have resulted in a

flood of ideas. LING are looking at ways in which these can be initiated in the next few weeks and months. They include an oral history group; regular dances, discos, ceilidhs; badminton, table tennis and other sport & exercise for all ages; gardening; cooking; drop-in lunch & activity

club...and lots more....If you are interested in helping to get your idea going, please let us know.

An updated business plan will be presented to D&G Council to take forward discussions about the future management and ownership of the Hall.

General Store:

LING is also considering an exciting move to buy Hopkins' shop in New Galloway for the community. It is extremely

early days, but the proposal would be to source grant funding that would allow for an outright purchase of the shop and attached house. Income from the shop and house rental would then come directly to the community. If an economically sustainable model could be found, this would even be able to contribute to other activities in the area, as well as maintaining a critical facility for the village.

Without tangible evidence of community support, any applications for grant funding will certainly fail, so if you think this sounds like an exciting prospect then please do come to the meeting.

> The shop would be managed professionally as a community shop - ideas at the moment include buying and selling of local garden produce, selling locally baked bread, recovering the alcohol license and selling fresh sandwiches, as well as all the staples. Moving the Post Office in may be an option too.

So far, LING has taken advice from Community Ownership Scheme Scotland and the Plunkett Foundation, and will be visiting various communityowned shops in the area for real-life experience. It has identified the Big Lottery 'Growing Community Assets' fund and the Scottish Land Fund as two potential avenues for fundina.

The next step will be to hold an open meeting. At this meeting, LING will share with the community the information it has gained, and invite any views on the idea. The meeting will be held at 7:30pm on 12

> September at New Galloway Town Hall. An update on the plans for the Town Hall will also be given at this meeting.

Pick Up Sticks...

This July the Hidden Road saw a unique event at the residence of Lorraine Ishak and Uula Jero.

Lorraine and Uula recently purchased Ironmacannie Mill and are working hard to make a living off the land.

The event was hosted by a group called Pick Up Sticks and the aim was to bring skilled craftspeople together to share their expertise and help develop projects. Stiles, ladders and paths were built in the mornings, and in the afternoons attendees shared knowledge and skills ranging from green woodworking to botanical walks and woodland folklore. Throughout the event everyone enjoyed home-cooked food and campfire music. In total around 60 people took part. Lorraine says: "It was magic to

see such a proactive collective working hard to help us maintain the mill, they also built us a cracking compost toilet. In the future, we would really like to develop green tourism in the area, working with local talent to make a 'glamping' hut or two. We are keen on permaculture and art, and would love to be a hub for information on low impact living."

Having only been here since October, the couple are really enjoying getting to know the area and, with their two children (Aarni who is three and Untamo who is ten months) they are enjoying settling into Glenkens life.

Uula says: "It's a sad fact that our generation has lost many of its hand skills and knowledge. Skill share events give an opportunity for people to empower themselves by preserving valuable information

Fundraising Raffle for James Orr Painting

Well known Scottish artist James Orr has kindly donated one of his paintings to the Glenkens Community and Arts Trust (GCAT).

The beautiful painting of Balmaghie Church will resonate with many people in the Glenkens.

Balmaghie's most famous minister was John Macmillan (1669-1753) founder of the sect known as the Macmillanites, which later merged with the Reformed Presbyterians. He believed, among other things favouring the Kirk over the State, that the Solemn League and Covenant of 1643 remained as relevant for posterity as when it was first written. A later Balmaghie minister, HMB Reid, wrote his biography.

SR Crockett later made Macmillan the hero of his novel The Standard Bearer which he dedicated to Reid. Crockett, a native of the parish, is buried in the graveyard of Balmaghie, the 'Kirk Above Dee Water'.

James Orr was born in Glasgow and now lives in Ayrshire. He began painting full-time in 1990 when he gave up his business to concentrate entirely on art. He exhibits regularly in the annual Royal Scottish Academy and Royal Glasgow Institute exhibitions as well as in a number of London galleries. He has also exhibited overseas; in New York, Hong Kong, Brussels, Paris and Dublin.

Orr paints in acrylic which suits his style perfectly. His paintings are always bold and full of light and colour. He is fascinated by the various aspects of the sea around coastlines, and bases his work on the variety of colour found particularly around the coasts of Scotland. They are joyful paintings which celebrate the simple pleasures of life.

His works are held in many

private and corporate collections in US, Canada, France, Belgium and Hong Kong, including the collection of HRH The Duke of Edinburgh.

The painting is being raffled, the launch of which will be at the Friends of the CatStrand evening (featuring a talk by Euan Robson on painters Oppenheimer and Houston) on Saturday 26 July. After that, tickets will be available from the CatStrand and the painting will be on display there. Tickets cost £1 each and come in books of five.



On 2 May, two of our P6 girls (Rachel McCreath and Caitlin Blackett) went to Dumfries Academy to compete in the K'Nex Challenge against other pupils from across Dumfries and Galloway. Their task was to plan and build a forklift with an operational pulley system and a steering mechanism.

We were out of the school to cheer on the Commonwealth Baton Relay in Castle Douglas on 19 June. The children had made bunting and a banner before the big day, and the whole school enjoyed a lovely afternoon out.

Also, we have spent a lot of time learning this year about science. We had live teleconferencing sessions with former BBC weather presenter Heather 'the weather' Reid, where the children learned all about extreme weather and its effects on people's lives. We did experiments to filter dirty water, and learned all about the water cycle. To wrap up all this fascinating science work, on 10 June the school went on a trip to the Glasgow Science Centre.

We have also researched different species of animals that live outside the UK and learned how these animals had adapted to their environment.

On 30 July, we had a morning out for Forest Schools at Drumjohn. The children had a chance to build dens, create floral signs and meet and pet some horses, big dogs, small dogs and bearded dragons.

Finally, as the children had so much fun learning about different animals, the school PTC funded an excellent trip to Blair Drummond Safari Park on 1 July.

We also had some sad farewells this year as our sole P7, Reuben Phillips, is moving up to Dalry Secondary next year; we wish him all the best. Although it is sad to see Reuben go, we are also looking forward to our two new P1 pupils starting in August.

Another big change is that Reuben's mother, Maggie Phillips, has stepped down as chair of the Carsphairn PTC after four years being in the role. Maggie has made countless contributions to the school, and we would like to give her our heartfelt thanks.

Finally, all the staff, pupils and parents would like to wish our head teacher Fraser Simpson all the best in his retirement. It has been a brilliant year and we are all looking forward to starting back up in August!





Dalry School Trip to Belgium & France

In the year marking the 100th anniversary of the start of World War 1, a group of thirty nine pupils and staff from Dalry School visited the Battlefields of Belgium and then spent two days in the fabulous city of Paris.

The visit to Belgium began with a visit to the WW1 Museum at Paschendale, which gave an insight into the horrors of trench warfare. This message was underlined a few miles later when the group visited the war cemetery at Tyne Cot, a very moving and emotional place. At Hill 62 we were able to experience real trenches and tunnels, before travelling the short distance to the town of Ypres, which was flattened during the war and has now been re-built into a beautiful

little town.

We then visited the memorial and battlefield at Vimy Ridge, an area which was gifted in perpetuity to Canada in recognition of the Canadian soldiers who fought and died there. Again a very moving visit, enhanced by the large number of Canadian WW2 veterans present.

From the French-Belgian border it was, 'next stop Paris' and the Eiffel Tower. We also took a bateau mouche sail on the Seine, visited the Sacre Couer, walked through the Pigalle area past the world famous Moulin Rouge.

The final day was spent at Disneyland, a fantastic experience for children of all ages even those over 50! From here it was a short run to Calais, an even shorter ferry journey to Dover and a long sleepy drive to Dalry.

He says: "I've never attempted anything like this so unfortunately cannot say when I hope to pass through Dalry. I take a ferry from Aberdeen to Lerwick and reach the most Northerly point of Scotland before heading back to the mainland through Orkney. After climbing the most northerly Munro, Ben Hope, I will head across to Skye and catch the boat to St Kilda for a day visit. Then on to the Mull of Galloway via Fort

William and Oban after climbing the most westerly Munro and Ben Nevis. After Dalry I will head towards Glasgow and then back to Aberdeen, climbing Ben Lomond and Mount Kean. Peterhead is the most easterly point, where I will finish the challenge. I am raising money on just

giving for Cancer Research. My grandmother had cancer so in a way it is in her memory."

SR Crockett Remembered

The centenary of Galloway author SR Crockett has been celebrated by a number of events in the Glenkens and with the news that many of his novels are being

republished 100 years after his death.

Samuel Rutherford Crockett was born in 1859 at Little Duchrae farm near Laurieston and became one of the best known novelists of his time with more than 70 titles including The Raiders and The Grey Man. When The Lilac Sunbonnet was published it sold 100,000 copies

> on the first day. Crockett, although now little known, was a friend of RL Stevenson and JM Barrie and rubbed shoulders with celebrities of the time.


Some 100 people attended a day of talks organised by Professor Ted Cowan in New Galloway Town Hall sponsored by the Saltire Society. Douglas Gifford assessed Crockett's contribution to Scottish literature and Margaret **Elphinstone** discussed the influence of Galloway on his writing. Pam Snell described his years as a minister in

Penicuik and his controversial decision to give up the ministry to be a novelist. In the evening there was a colourful celebration dinner at the Ken Bridge Hotel with many of the company adopting period dress for the occasion.

The following day Crockett enthusiasts visited key sites in the area. They were welcomed into Little Duchrae by the present tenants, Barry and Terry Farley, visited the Crockett Memorial in Laurieston and his grave in Balmaghie Kirkyard, as well as locations featured in Crockett novels including Lochinvar and Earlstoun Castle.

Crockett enthusiast Cally Philips chose April 16, the anniversary of Crockett's death, to launch her republication of 32 of his novels, all with Galloway connections and many long out of print. They are available electronically or as print-on-demand from www.aytonpu blishing.co.uk or Amazon.co.uk. Speaking at her launch event at Wigtown she asked: "Why isn't there a Crockett Trail? If the red kites can have one, why not Galloway's most famous author?"

It is hoped to establish a small Crockett archive in the Glenkens with materials presented by the author's biographer, Islay Donaldson. Islay, who was an enthusiastic supporter during preparations for the conference, sadly died on 29 April aged 92. Meanwhile a small exhibition on Crockett's life and work continues at the CatStrand in New Galloway.

Mad Sir Uchtred Of The Hills

After delivering talks recently on SR Crockett's novella, Mad Sir Uchtred of the Hills, some folk were kind enough to suggest that I might print a version in the Gazette.

Published in 1894 it shows Crockett pushing the boundaries of fiction. Uchtred has been described as 'Gothic' but if so it is strangely Calvinistic, yet romantic, in character.

Uchtred has been cast out by God because although a one-time covenanter he has abjured the covenants in the interests of self-advancement to become a persecutor of covenanters. In better times he won the love of the beautiful Philippa, adored by many men including Uchtred's loathsome brother, Randolph, a total waster.

Although Uchtred knows that Philippa is devoted to him his hatred for his brother grows; "a still and deadly hatred – the hate that can let pass ninetynine opportunities and kill at the hundredth".

When Uchtred is sent to eject a non-conformist minister from his kirk he rides into the church on his war horse. He orders the burning of the minister's possessions but the reverend solemnly curses him. Uchtred instantly reacts, "as a strained


fiddle-string snaps, so a chord twanged in his head". He flees away over the Galloway moors, shedding his clothing as he does so, becoming at one with the landscape in returning to nature.

Upon Clashdaan the madness came on him as "he fled along the shaggy tops of the lonely hills, till on the bare scalp of the Merrick, close under the lift with all the other mountains crouched and dwarfed beneath him, he had a vision. "He saw himself like Lucifer, Star of the Morning, flash out of the blackness between the tingling points of light, for a moment curve in trailing fire across the firmament, and plunge into the lake of eternal fire in which burn for ever all the sins and despairs of the universe."

For three years the madman ranges over mountain and moor acquiring Belus the cat as his god. He inhabits a similar landscape to William Nicholson's Brownie of Blednoch.

When first read the story seems as crazy as Uchtred but on closer scrutiny it has a certain charm in its blend of local folklore and covenanting belief, not to mention the spirits and devils that we all know inhabit the Galloway wastelands in the hours of darkness. The piece is most memorable as an essay on the ageold relationship between Nature and Christianity, damnation and

redemption, life and death, commitment and rejection. Historically Maclellan of Barscobe was the hero of the Glenkens Rising in 1666 yet he later abjured the covenant and was murdered in 1682 as a traitor to the cause, possibly Crockett's inspiration

for his story. The Galloway topography is recognisable; the local traditions are accurately described. I suggest you all read this rich tale and think of Uchtred the next time you climb the Galloway hills.
