# **HELP SAFEGUARD OUR GLENKENS RED SQUIRRELS**

The grey squirrels are coming back to Galloway in strength and urgent action is required to save the native red squirrel.

That was the dramatic message delivered by squirrel expert Heinz Traut at a 'Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels' event held recently in New Galloway which has led to local residents forming the Glenkens Red Squirrel Group.

The new group's aim is to tackle the recent increase in grey squirrels in the area. The greys, a species introduced from North America, pose a significant threat to our red squirrels through competition for food and habitat, but more critically by spreading squirrelpox disease. Greys are immune to the disease they carry but it is lethal when passed on to the reds.

"Many people living in England have seen their red squirrel populations decimated over the last decades," says Caroline, one of the group. "We are extremely lucky in Dumfries and Galloway to have a large wild population of red squirrels and need to do everything we can to protect them to ensure that current and future generations

The assistance of local residents is critical, whether it be reporting red or grey squirrel sightings to the group, or participating in practical conservation tasks, such as surveys or arev sauirrel control.

The Glenkens Red Squirrel Group is looking for someone to take the role of group co-ordinator and for a secretary to facilitate communication for the group and

take minutes.

As it develops the new group hopes to carry out education projects and promote awareness of red squirrel conservation throughout the Glenkens.

### Local Initiatives in New Galloway (LING)

New Galloway Town Hall: The LING committee are following up suggestions for activities and events made in the surveys and open days in the summer. They are liaising with the organisation Let's Get Sporty to set up activities, especially for younger people.

LING have applied for a grant from the *Day Opportunities Putting You First Fund* to restart the weekly lunch group, and keep a look out for badminton, indoor bowls and a gardening group starting-up...

In order for the Town Hall to be transferred from D&G Council, LING have to show a likely continuing income. Apart from letting charges and fundraising events, LING will be asking for regular contribution pledges from residents. For instance, £2

a month from 150 people would raise £3,600 a year - enough to ensure sufficient income to cover likely annual maintenance costs.

New Galloway Store: A questionnaire will be circulated to find out what people buy at the moment and how they would like to see the shop developed. This is necessary to show grant funders that the shop would be financially sustainable.

### Update on the Allangibbon Bridge

Finally, after two years of campaigning by Dalry Community Council about safety issues on the Dalry side of the Allangibbon bridge, the regional council have agreed to road improvements.

Following numerous accidents mainly involving large lorries,

Dumfries & Galloway Council have included upgrading the dangerous corner whilst carrying out resurfacing works on the bridge itself. This will involve super-elevating the bend to remove the negative camber. Whilst the work will unfortunately cause temporary disruption to traffic, it is hoped that it will bring an end to the regular accidents that have blighted this section of the A713. However, there is still the issue

of accidents and actual road deaths occurring a little further up the road at Carsphad. This very scenic area by the reservoir has now claimed two lives in as many years, and must be close to an official 'accident black spot' designation. We, as a society, really need to end this policy of putting finances before human life; people are more important than pounds!

### DALRY'S 'BAD WINTER' PLAN

It might seem a bit premature to be thinking about the winter months when we are still in late summer but the old adage 'forewarned is forearmed' still holds good today.

Although we are living in an increasingly technical age in which help can be available at the touch of a button, all the smart-phones and computers in the world are unable to help if the power fails, particularly for a prolonged period. Dumfries and Galloway (D&G) Council has recently been encouraging communities to prepare a Resilience Plan which means having a plan and facilities in place so that the community can look after its own in the event of an emergency.

Every community will have different needs but here in the Glenkens the most likely scenario would be bad weather such as severe flooding or snow cutting us off and/or a prolonged power cut. Keeping warm is critical in such a situation but many homes require electricity for heating pumps even if the fuel is oil or gas. Dalry Community Council have been working on their plan for some months now and decided that in such a situation the first thing would be to look after our vulnerable neighbours, in their own homes if possible, by supplying warmth, hot food and light.

Without electricity the approach needs to be 'low tech' so a small supply of battery-powered lamps (each battery can run for three days), food and drink thermos flasks and covered hot-water bottles have all been purchased. Dalry Community Council has also obtained a tworing camping stove and stock of gas canisters. The plan here is to keep people warm by blanket-wrapping them with a hot-water bottle whilst providing hot food and drink twice daily with light to read by. We

are very grateful to the Glenkens Community Shop which has funded many of our purchases and we hope to augment our stores further over the coming months. We would also like to add to our team of volunteers who have alternative heating methods such as a wood-burning stove or solid-fuel range: please contact Jim Reid on 430 231 if you would be happy to have your name added to the list.

Another aspect of a potential emergency is mobility and D&G Council have given us a grit-spreader, shovels and clothing to help keep pavements and paths clear in the event of snow and ice.

However, none of the above help can happen without volunteers. Should a heavy snow fall or big storm take place during the working day, many residents may be away from the community and unable to return to look after elderly family or neighbours; the more of us who sign up to help, the better we will all be able to cope.

Let us hope we have another mild winter, but it is better to be prepared - if you think you could help in any way during an emergency, please volunteer by contacting your community council.

The ZDF team had already been working on the rifts opening up between family members and communities in Edinburgh and were looking for a more rural location to film for comparison.

The German public were very interested in the referendum debate as, having relatively recently reunified there country after a lengthy divide; they can't understand why anyone would want to split their nation up.

The film crew focused on the divide within Andi's own family, but also interviewed several other residents of Dalry to canvass their opinions as well. Andi says they were a delight to work with, very professional, and not trying to create their own angle. They asked some very sensible questions and got some very honest answers.

Andi hopes they come back sometime after the referendum vote to see what impact it has had on rural Scotland after the dust has settled.

# Eco Feature sponsored by natural power The Masonry Stove

Local builder Paul Moslin, who lives in Dalry, has been working for the last ten years on creating a modern version of a traditional Swedish

masonry stove. Originally inspired by a Hungarian friend who built one for him in Ireland, Paul has since built six and is now happy that he has perfected his version of the stove. The design Paul uses is called a kakelugn and was created in 1767 by Swedish inventor Carl Johan Cronstedt. Cronstedt's system increased the efficiency of the woodburning stove roughly eightfold by directing smoke and heated gases along flues that wound up and down inside a brick-built stove. Using this system, you only had to light a short fire in the morning and evening for the heat to then radiate into the building day and night. This design had significant social

and economical consequences throughout Sweden and later Europe and America, and is still used up to the present day in these countries.

Cronstedt's invention also had significant environmental impact because it saved forests from excess usage - something which is hugely relevant today with the focus on reducing our carbon footprint.

Paul uses modern fire-bricks and fire-cement, along with other forms of ultra-efficient insulation, to create his own custom-made masonry stove. He says: "They have been making them in the USA for 50 years or so. The style of stove originates in Northern Europe, Russia and Scandinavia, countries where wood fuel has been the major heat source for hundreds of years. Much less wood is used for the amount of heat output. The thermal stove weighs about two tonnes, and heats up with just an armful of sticks a day. It begins to heat up within an hour (straight away right in front of the stove door), and you can also use the fire to cook, either by building a purpose-built oven into the structure or just using the fire box itself."

To have a stove built costs about £5,000, and takes three men about a week to build.

Rupert Harvey of Drumbuie Farm, along the Garroch Glen, who is a local firewood contractor and self-confessed firewood fanatic, has been burning wood all his life. Rupert had one of Paul's masonry stoves retro-fitted in his farmhouse in November 2013. and is thrilled with the results.

Cronstedt's system increased the efficiency of the wood-burning stove roughly eightfold by directing smoke and heated gases along flues that wound up and down inside a brick-built stove.

> He says: "I wanted to try it out and am really happy with how it has turned out. They are the most efficient way of burning your wood, and are just so easy to live with. The heat you get is a really nice heat; not stuffy like your standard central-heating systems, but a dry, cosy heat; there is definitely a different quality to it."

> Rupert's sons, Joe and Hamish, are also enthusiastic about the stove. Hamish says: "We make dinner in it almost every night

 roast chicken, casseroles, whatever we like."

The stove at Drumbuie has a lime-plaster finish, but it can be tiled and the shape can be made to suit the building it is going into - the traditional pillar shape, or even with seating built-in.

Paul says: "The most efficient way to build a thermal store is in the centre of an open-plan

building, with a wall of each room built onto the stove. Another benefit is that because the stove is so fast-burning, you don't get creosote building up in the chimney, and

barely get any ash or smoke at all as smoke and ash are made up of all the un-burnt solids from a fire. You only need to clean the ashes out every couple of months! So it's less dusty and messy than a standard woodburning stove."

### **CARERS TRANSITION PROJECT**

Putting You First is supporting a ground-breaking, region-wide initiative aimed at helping carers to cope when their circumstances change.

The Carers Transition Project has introduced a 'Counselling for Carers' service available through Relationships Scotland and Cruse Bereavement Care Scotland.

Putting You First is a five-year change programme for Health, Care and Support services in Dumfries & Galloway. Sue Madigan, project coordinator for the project, says: "While caring can be rewarding, it is also important to recognise that taking on or losing caring responsibilities can be very difficult and stressful. Becoming a carer is often life-changing in

terms of finances, employment and hopes for the future."

Life can change in the blink of an eye and turn your whole world upside down. For example, a young man of 29 now finds himself caring for his wife. They met at university, got married and made plans for the future. However, her health deteriorated rapidly; over a short space of

time he had to leave work and become a full-time carer for his wife. Stress and depression began to take hold. In situations such as this people can find support through the Dumfries & Galloway Carers Centre who work to improve support, services and recognition for anyone living with the challenges of caring, unpaid, for a family

member or friend who is ill, frail, disabled or has mental-health or addiction problems.

Census reports between 2008 and 2010 estimate the number of carers in the region to be between 14,000 and 22,000. Sue Madigan believes the real figure could be even higher. She says: "There are a lot of hidden carers needing support, many

of them young people for whom it may be time to leave home or go to university, but they are worried and confused. It is estimated that some 70% of carers experience stress exiety during their role. We

### YOUNG SOLDIER REMEMBERED

A young local man who lost his life in the First World War has been remembered at a ceremony held by the charity South West Scotland RnR (SWSRnR) at the war memorial overlooking Loch Ken.

The memorial is to second lieutenant John Murray, whose father was a farmer and minister at Balmaclellan, who served with the Kings Own Scottish Borderers (KOSB) and died aged 19.

There was a piper in attendance
- Michael Hogarth from
Innerleithen, ex-KOSB and also
ex-pipe major of the 1st Battalion

of the Royal Regiment of Scotland - and local minister David Bartholomew conducted a service paying respect to this man who lost his life so young in defence of his country.

The people attending were also formerly of the KOSB and had been in conflicts in more recent times. These ex-servicemen have enjoyed the benefits of the care and hospitality of SWSRnR, based at Carsethorn, and we felt this ceremony was therapeutic to our former KOSB combatants as they had all served with the same regiment.

This event was featured on Border TV and by word-of-mouth we found John Murray's nephew, 78-year-old William Johnston, who laid a wreath at the memorial.

### **Karate:**

I recently gave a class talk in my English lesson. I chose to talk about karate because I have been going to karate for a long time, about seven years.

Karate comes from the
Japanese words 'kara' which
means open and 'te' which
means hand. It is thousands
of years old and was founded
on the Japanese island of
Okinawa which had a ban on
weapons so people learned how
to fight. It has been further

developed from other martial arts. It teaches that technique is everything, like a young girl who knows the right technique can defeat a fully grown man. You do gradings to move up belts, and are assessed on four main areas: basics, sparring, katas and ippon kumite.

Basics are the basis of all karate and a chance to concentrate on your techniques and stances. In the beginning you generally learn four stances: forward leaning stance, backstance, kibba dachi and catstance, and as you progress you learn more stances. Stances are the most important thing in karate.

Different classes have different uniforms and you can get a

range of colours and styles although it is a uniform like

that one on the right we wear at Dalry.

The belt order is white, red, yellow, orange, green, blue, purple, purple-brown, brown, brown-white, brown-black, black-red then black.

- The good qualifications students leave S4 with and the personal qualities they develop

There were some common themes in what you would like to see changed, which are as follows:-

- The extent to which the schools work together to develop consistent approaches, within and between the stages
- Improved use of the natural environment and a focus on physical activity in the Secondary phase.

This is a very simplified summary as there were many specific and individual comments offered.

We look forward to working with the community in tailoring education in the Glenkens to the needs of individuals, utilising the advantages of the environment whilst tackling the potential limitations of a rural location.

I firmly believe that the benefits of the Glenkens, massively outweigh the limitations and that between us we should be able to further develop an enviable and unique educational provision.



In the early stages of the debates and discussions I was worried that most teenagers would cast their votes based on the fictitious tale of the Scottish legend William "Braveheart" Wallace. Then in the weeks leading up to the referendum things become even more heated as new facts and information gave rise to new concerns for voters who had already made up their minds. These things made the decision for undecided voters even more challenging.

As a teenager it was quite easy to get caught up in the propaganda and scare stories coming from both parties who were increasingly desperate to persuade the Scottish population to vote for their campaign. I took it upon myself to become educated in what impact my vote would have and whether or not it would benefit me in years to come as I continue my education through university. There seemed to be a growing number of teenagers who did the same. In school the topic was covered regularly, especially in the last month through PSE (personal and social education) and general conversation with teachers and pupils. However the information offered was very brief and often didn't give pupils the full picture. At times, the information was being presented in a childish way with big pictures and large text - all very aesthetically pleasing but pretty useless. So many teenagers had to go and do their own research, but despite that, I found that the younger voting population were often better informed than the adult population.

Having listened to discussions and debates, both within and outside school, I was confident that the youth of Scotland would make an informed choice.





### WHINNYMUIR - WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Whinnymuir is the name of the last house on the right leaving Dalry on the Moniaive road.

This name is particularly appreciated in the spring, when the yellow whins (gorse) brighten the rising ground beyond the house on the old track over the Mulloch. However, the use of the name, when there is no topographic feature bearing that specific title, suggests a contributory and deeper significance in folk lore and ancient funereal custom.

The ancient practice of the 'lyke wake' (watch over a corpse prior to burial) is well attested. Hugh Miller, writing in the 1830s, ventured the opinion that the custom was "far beyond the reach of history or tradition". Sir Walter Scott in his Minstrelsy of the Scottish Border, quotes a dirge sung over the corpse, spelling out the challenges of purgatory, the first of which was Whinny-muir with its vicious spikes:

When thou from hence away are paste, Every night and alle;

To Whinny-muir thou comest at laste; And Christe receive thye saule.

If ever thou gavest hosen and shoon, Every night and alle; Sit thee doon, and put them on; And Christe receive thye saule.

If hosen and shoon thou ne'er gavest nane, Every night and alle;

The whinnes shall pricke thee to the bare bane; And Christe receive thye saule.

From Whinny-muir when thou mayst pass, Every night and alle;

To Brigg o' Dread thou comest at laste; And Christe receive thy saule.

Having survived Whinny-muir, the final hurdle was the purgatory fire beneath the Bridge of Dread, into which the unworthy would fall, as recounted in the remaining verses.

Scott acknowledged the North Yorkshire origin of the dirge which he recorded, but it is clear that Whinny-muir was not any particular place in Yorkshire or elsewhere, but a metaphorical phrasing in terms that all could understand for the hazardous route that the departing soul had to face, to test his or her charity in life.

It is significant that Scott's book was published in a newly-edited form in the 1920s, followed by the

house in 1929. Knowledge of the dirge may well have played a part in the choice of name, reflecting both the picturesque position of the house and the traditional significance as recorded by Scott.



Presumeably to maintain the whins connection, a patch was introduced into the garden landscaping, still flourishing, but prudently of a smaller and much more manageable variety.

Mr and Mrs Wise prefer to think of their home as being on the road to heaven rather than on the path through purgatory but, however viewed, the name's evocation of long gone beliefs is fascinating. Perhaps it is still an incentive to watch our ways and in both senses to pull our socks up!

Are you interested in birds and other branches of natural history?

If so, why not come along to the Stewartry Birdwatchers meetings this winter? Since 1976 monthly meetings have been held in Kells School, New Galloway. Meetings start at 7.30pm and run from September to April - all are welcome.

Throughout the year excursions are arranged to interesting locations such as Caerlaverock and Mersehead for Barnacle Geese, inland to the Mennock Pass for the elusive Ring Ouzel, across to Loch Ryan for Brent Geese and numerous waders, or to woodlands for small birds such as migrant warblers. Beginners are welcome as these trips are an excellent way to learn how to identify birds, butterflies, flowers, etc.

This winter's session got off to a flying start on Thursday 25 September when Keith Kirk gave his presentation 'Galloway Gems'. Keith, one of our Dumfries & Galloway Rangers, is an excellent photographer who always accompanies his photographs with interesting and unusual bits of information.

On Thursday 9 October there will be an illustrated talk, 'The Decline of Seabirds', by Allan Whyte. Allan, who is employed by the RSPB, has been researching the worrying pollution of our marine environment and what needs to be done to ensure that Scotland remains one of the most important places in the world for seabirds. Jim Cassels' illustrated talk on 13 November is 'The Birds of Arran'. Jim retired to Arran and is now bird recorder for the local natural history society.

### KARS CASTLE OF CARSPHAIRN

Local historian Bill Blyth of Blowplain, Balmaclellan, revisits the story of Kars Castle.

The castle's remains can be found by taking the track running east off the A713 just north of Dundeugh and crossing the bridge to a car park. The ruins are in woodland just south of the car park.

The 'lost' Castle of Kars is truly a sad sight today. 'Lost' in a maturing Forestry Commission plantation, with trees growing tightly against the crumbling walls, and in the ruins itself fallen and decaying trees. 'Lost' also in the sense that

it is sometimes erroneously referred to as Dundeugh Castle.

Kars is situated on a raised embankment protected to the south, west and east by the fast-flowing Deugh River. The modern parish of Carsphairn derives its name from Kars.

McKerlie, in his 'History of Lands and Owners in Galloway' (1993), states in confirmation of the name "there is a pool in the Deugh at the Castle still called the Kars Pool and beside it a bridge had existed". Timothy Pont in his map, drawn up in approximately 1590, published in Blaeu's Atlas of 1660, quite distinctly shows Kars Castle with a tower symbol situated near the junction of waterways. The map also shows, a short distance away inland, Dundeugh Castle, again quite distinctly marked with a tower symbol. Today all that remains of the castle at Dundeugh is a large pile of stones and an old orchard. Dundeugh in its later years had become a farmhouse. At the time of Pont's Survey it is almost certain that Kars was a substantial ruin and to some extent Dundeugh Castle had replaced it.

... Loch Doon Castle appears to have been one of the three chief fortresses of the Earls of Carrick (Robert the Bruce's family), the other two having been Turnberry and possibly Kars Castle at Dundeugh.

McKerlie also states: "the only remains of the castle now left consist of a single arch". About fifty years prior to his visit there had been two

Trotter, in his 'East of Galloway Sketches' (1901), states that Loch Doon Castle appears to have been one of the three chief fortresses of the Earls of Carrick (Robert the Bruce's family), the other two having been Turnberry and possibly Kars Castle at Dundeugh.

Trotter's sketch of Kars in 1865 shows the arch and the vaulted basement with a large oak tree

growing in the centre. Today the vault has all collapsed, but there remains the rotting stump and limb of an oak tree. Although Trotter labels this sketch 'Dundeugh Castle', it is almost certainly Kars Castle. McKerlie's description of the remains in 1893 would support this.

The ruin has obviously been quarried over many centuries. Much of the good stone, including the facing stones and lintels, have gone and been used in building elsewhere.

The nearby medieval village of

Polmaddie is likely to be contemporary with Kars and would have supplied the castle with labour and victuals. Polmaddie would have been the original village of the area long before Carsphairn itself came into being.

No doubt one day the site of Kars will be

cleared of the growing and decaying trees. Another generation will excavate the site properly and expose the foundations so that a proper analysis and understanding can be made and a fuller history emerge.

In an age when conservation and heritage are very much in vogue, how can such an important and potentially lovely site be treated with such great insensitivity?

## The Glenkens Story: **Sharing Our History**

Somebody once observed that all history is local even though some of it is of national or even world significance.

Glenkens must be one of the least known glens in Scotland. People enter and leave it without knowing it by name. There is nothing to tell visitors about its existence vet it has been a major highway linking the Solway with the Central Belt since prehistoric times. The Romans had a name for it. It

was occupied at different times by Welsh, Scottish, English and Irish peoples with a dusting of Vikings and Normans. Scotland is a nation of immigrants and some of them liked what they found here: clean rivers abounding with fish, woodlands and rough pasture, the flood-enriched arable of the Ken valley. Although the glen is mentioned in many books and other sources there is no single-volume devoted to its rich and fascinating history.

Starting next January there are plans to create an informal group of folk interested in all or any aspects of our history, from the Ayrshire border to the foot

of Loch Ken. Under the umbrella title, The Glenkens Story: Sharing Our History, we are planning around six meetings per year to give people an opportunity to share historical knowledge and interests. Suggested topics so far include the shops of the Glenkens villages, the history of our homes, metal detecting our past, personal reminiscences, folk tales, Glenkens landholding - in short anything about the glen's past.

It is hoped The Glenkens Story will become a community effort organised by the knew of it and probably community for the community.

> Following the success of this year's conference we will organise an annual Crockett Day event. Field trips and small exhibitions are possibilities. Further ideas are most welcome. We hope to build on and share the inspirational work already being achieved by groups and individuals in Carsphairn, Crossmichael, Parton and Dalry while encouraging others to pursue their particular interests. It is hoped The Glenkens Story will become a community effort organised by the community for the community. The group, operating under the auspices of the Glenkens Community & Arts

Trust (GCAT), will hold events in venues across the area.

The times are propitious. I have the honour to chair the European Ethnology Research Centre (EERC) based in the School of Scottish Studies at Edinburgh University. Ethnology is concerned with change of all kinds, from the use of buildings to the way we dress, from what we eat to relationships in families and communities. The centre

> recently has embarked upon an ambitious project on the regional ethnologies of Scotland, of which the first volume will be the Regional Ethnology of Dumfries & Galloway to appear in two volumes.


The first will be documentbased up to about 1900, the second will draw heavily on oral recordings currently in progress throughout the region, including the Glenkens, which I hope will have a notable presence.




The standard was again very high and the comments from the visitors who attended were very positive and encouraging.
