DALRY TREASURE HUNTER WITNESSES VIKING FIND

A metal-detecting trip with friends turned into an historic occasion for Glenkens minister, David Bartholomew of Dalry, when one of his companions, Derek McLennan, unearthed a Viking treasure trove.

The find is one of the largest Viking hoards ever discovered in this country and has excited experts worldwide. It includes a uniquely wide range of articles including gold, silver, glass, enamel and textiles. The location on the fringes of the Glenkens is

being kept secret.

Stuart Campbell, head of the National Museum of Scotland's treasure trove unit, said: "This is a hugely significant find, nothing like this has been found in Scotland before in terms of the range of material this hoard represents. There's material from Ireland, from Scandinavia, from various places in central Europe and perhaps ranging over a couple of centuries."

Strong Support for Shop

A proposal that the local community should buy the shop in New Galloway has received substantial backing in a survey of residents.

132 local people, over 80 per cent of those surveyed,

completed questionnaires. 130 respondents backed the idea and 26 people offered practical help.

A steering group is now seeking advice and assistance from the Plunkett Foundation and the Community Ownership Support Service which specialise in aiding community initiatives. Visits are planned to community shops

already operating in Auchencairn, Carsphairn, Palnackie and elsewhere to learn from their experiences.





Life-saving Equipment in the Glenkens

Dalry Community
Council has recently
bought a defibrillator
for the village, to add
to the one currently
housed in Dalry school.

Carsphairn has a defibrillator which is kept in the village shop, and in New Galloway the Catstrand houses one. The Galloway Activity Centre on Loch Ken also has one, so between them these simple devices could massively increase the likelihood of surviving a cardiac arrest.

Training organised by Dalry CC in October was very well attended and delivered some simple but important messages about heart attacks and cardiac arrests.

Heart attacks are serious and painful but you may be able to function through them. If you feel that you are having a heart attack, ring for an ambulance immediately as some heart attacks culminate in cardiac arrest. At this point, every minute of delay in getting

the heart working properly again reduces the chance of survival by 10%. Manual cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) can help, but the best thing is to get to a defibrillator.

Defibrillators are sophisticated devices that administer a controlled electric shock to the heart, effectively 'jump-starting' it back into normal operation. However, they are also extremely simple to use. Even if you have never used one, if you know where to find one in an emergency and can turn it on it will then speak to you and direct you through all the actions you need to take. It is important to note that you cannot hurt someone by mistake with a defibrillator. If they are unconscious but have a healthy heart, it will not shock them.

Some tips to remember if you suspect someone has had a cardiac arrest are:

- Check it is safe to approach them (cardiac arrest can also be caused by electrocution - don't join the casualty list)

- Try and rouse them
- Shout for help and send someone for the nearest defibrillator
- Listen and look for normal breathing by putting your ear over their mouth and looking down towards their chest.
- If they are not breathing, ring 999 and request an ambulance immediately.
- Start CPR until the defibrillator is available
- Turn the machine on. It will then instruct you on what to do.

The most important thing is to remember that this equipment exists and where your closest one is. Access will be easy, because time is of the essence. For further information, and details of where the Dalry Community Council set will be located, contact Andi Holmes on 430 255. There will also be more training events arranged locally watch out for them on posters and Facebook.

David said: "What a privilege to be there as the hoard was unearthed - first an upper decoy hoard, which in its own right was quite remarkable; and then four inches or so below it the main hoard which included a large Carolingian silver pot which has still to be emptied of its contents. What is even more remarkable is that this find was made on the fringes of the Glenkens."

The hoard also includes an early Christian silver cross, which may have been taken by the Danish Vikings when they plundered the monastery of Lindisfarne.

Many incredible artifacts were found, and even the cloth in which the silver pot was wrapped for its preservation was remarkable. The treasures were all taken up to the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh. It will take time however for the whole story to be told.

CASTLE DOUGLAS FOOD BANK

It's tough for some families these days with the cost of living rising all the time.

It is with this in mind that I invite you to consider supporting Helping Hands Food Bank in Castle Douglas. Together we can make a difference. The food bank is run from 3a King Street, Castle Douglas (on the big roundabout opposite the old Station Hotel). It is set behind the houses and accessed by a short drive, and is open Tuesdays, Wednesdays

and Thursdays from 11am to 12noon.

The project runs on a ticket-based system and currently tickets are available via health visitors and district nurses at the Garden Hill Medical Centre. They may also be available through the Glenkens Medical Practice. A ticket entitles the bearer to collect food from the Food Bank. If it is established in consultation with the agencies that there is an ongoing need, a further ticket will be issued for the following month, and so on.

Are you able to buy an extra can of soup or packet of pasta,

a tin of meat or a jar of sauce? Non-perishable items for the Food Bank can be left in the Community Shop, Dalry, at the CatStrand, or at the local shops in Dalry, New Galloway, Balmaclellan and Carsphairn; also at local churches at the time of Sunday morning worship. They can also be left at a collection point in the Co-op in Castle Douglas.

If anyone has enquiries about obtaining emergency food they are encouraged to contact New Life Church on 01556 505 855 and leave a message for a call back.

The first few years are probably the most important time for any new project as foundations are laid for the future. In the early days GTI was reliant on government funding and passenger numbers were very low. To have reached the position we are today where the initiative is financially self-sustainable, and last year over 5,000 passengers were carried, means that the foundations have been well and truly

set. I recently received an email from the secretary of the Scottish Community Transport Association saying that GTI was an example to all community transport initiatives in Scotland on what could be achieved from small beginnings to the benefit of a rural community with limited public transport.

We must never forget that in a rural community transport must always be the main priority because without it people suffer from social exclusion, are unable to get to hospitals, shops, places of interest and meet other people, and their health and quality of life deteriorates.

I have always been very grateful to Cathy Agnew and the Glenkens Community and Arts Trust (GCAT) board at that time for having the foresight to buy the first minibus and forming and supporting GTI in its early days.


Much of the recent growth of GTI has been the result of the link with Dumfries & Galloway Council and the support received from them has been invaluable.


The sale will take place at CatStrand **Sunday 14 December from 1pm - 4pm**both before and after the annual CatStrand



The Great War - 100 Years On

One hundred years ago, the Great War was in full swing.

Regular soldiers had all gone off with the British Expeditionary Force to France and Flanders (Belgium) and the Territorial Battalions had been mobilised and gone off for training – the local 5th Battalion of the Kings Own Scottish Borderers was in Tillicoultry preparing to go to the front.


A big recruiting campaign was going on to get all fit and able bodied men to enlist which they were doing in large numbers. On top of this, large numbers of horses were being conscripted. This meant that most of the farm and estate work had to be done by women, children and men too old to fight, and then with not enough horses to do the job. The middle classes and better paid workers would have had staff at the time and

these were leaving either to join the Army or to fill the gaps left by those joining up. Life was changing fairly rapidly in the Glenkens and, as it turns out, life would never return to the way it was before.

The Glenkens had lost its first son on 14 September 1914 when Captain Augustus Ernest Cathcart of the Kings Royal Rifle Corps was killed in France. He is buried in Paissy Churchyard. His family were from Yorkshire but his Scottish home was Brockloch near Carsphairn and the family owned the lead mines at Woodhead. His brother was killed in the Boer War and is commemorated on a plaque on the rear outside wall of Carsphairn Church. Augustus was 39 years old when he was killed and left a widow and a six month old daughter.

Captain Augustus Ernest Cathcart is remembered on the Carsphairn War memorial and at his old school, Eton.

A Winter's Ghost Story

A little-known murder mystery surrounds a farm in the Parish of Balmaclellan.

On the 1 June 1529, a letter was received at the court in Haddington describing the "slaughter and murder" of a man named Donald McEwin at Corse Farm. In the letter seven men and three women were named as being accountable for the killing.

Archivists are still working on this story and we don't yet know if any further particulars of this case have survived.

The letter refers to "Hew Johnsoun, Master and his assignes one or more – of the gift of all and sundry the goods movable and unmovable tackle, steadings debts and others whatsoever which pertains to John Cairns in Cassenvey in the Parish of Balmaclellan. Andro Colyn his servant, Dungall Cairns brother to the said John. Cuthbert McKill, John Makmullan servant to the Dungall, Jonet Cairns, Bridok Cairns, Sythock

Hair, Gilbert Makgympseis and Jonet Cannan and now pertaining or any shall happen or pertain to our Soverain Lord and his estate through being of the said persons fugitive from the law and at the horn [an outlaw; rebel against the King] for art and part of the slaughter of Donald McEwin in the Cors of Balmaclellan."

This story was relatively unknown within the Parish but an interesting episode occurred some years ago. A testimony was given from a young man who told of an eerie event he had witnessed early one morning while staying at Corse Farm. He explained he had been woken by whistling which he had thought was a cockerel at first. He got out of bed and went to the window where on opening the blind he looked out and saw a horse and rider, followed by four horses pulling a hay cart, a man was driving the horses, and another was in the cart with hands bound and a chain around his neck. A small group of people, about 10 to 15 were walking behind the cart carrying torches. They were

mainly men but also one or two women wearing long greyish skirts, and wearing bonnets. They followed a road that was not the same as the existing road and which continued through the farm dykes.

The witness said he heard murmuring noises as the group moved from behind the house towards The Craig. He watched them for about a minute and a half as they went around the corner. He added "I could still see the glow, but then it vanished."

We don't know if there is any connection between this ghostly vision and the history of the murder at The Corse, but it is certainly an unusual coincidence describing the group of men and women and the one poor soul bound by chains in the hay cart slowly being taken off to some unknown fate.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

Darkness Visible

The United Nations has proclaimed 2015 'The International Year of Light'.

While the main theme will be the application of light science and technology to future developments, it will also celebrate the achievements of individuals such as Parton's James Clerk Maxwell (1831-1879). Maxwell, born in Edinburgh, was brought up at Glenlair where he conducted some of his earliest experiments. In a lecture entitled 'A Dynamic Theory of the Electro-Magnetic

Field', presented to the Royal Society of London he announced, "We have strong reason to conclude that light itself - including radiant heat and other radiation, if any - is an electromagnetic

disturbance in the form of waves propagated through the electro-magnetic field according to electro-magnetic laws". The paper, published in 1865, has since been hailed by those qualified to judge, including Max Planck and Albert Einstein, as one of the greatest breakthroughs in nineteenth-century science.

Maxwell's theories may be beyond the comprehension of many of us, but we all have ideas about light. The earliest verses of Genesis are very familiar: 'And God said, "Let there be light." Since the beginning of time humankind has striven to extend the day, pushing back against night's darkness.

Despite dire and pertinent warnings about future power shortages we all take light for granted. We seldom stop to consider that the extension of illumination, which we now enjoy through such projects as the Glenkens Hydro Scheme, marks one of the greatest differences in the everyday experiences of our ancestors and us. For most folk over the centuries activities requiring light ended at sunset. Dwellings of the Galloway poor were said to be as dark by day

as by night; central hearths and a 'lumm', or hole in the roof, created a near impenetrable internal fog of smoke.

Another legacy of God's binary organisation was the notion of light as good and darkness as bad, the latter haunted by spirits, monsters and the Devil himself, as well as thieves, murderers, adulterers and drunkards. Those occasional nights of pure Galloway darkness, which render the wayfarer quite blind, and feel almost physical in their oppressiveness, are reminiscent of Lady MacBeth's, "Come thick

night and pall thee in the

dunnest smoke of hell".

In reality the majority could not afford outdoor lights, which were in any case unreliable, just as candles indoors, if used at all, were beyond the means of most. Locals used to collect rushes from the shores of Loch Ken. Gathered in high summer, the plants would be thrown into water to keep the peel supple before it was removed, leaving the pith intact. The piths or cores were then bleached and dried for about a week after which they were dipped in scalding fat until

saturated. Rushes made from tallow, usually evilsmelling mutton fat, were said, by a man in 1911 who used to make them when younger, to give a dismal light; "darkness visible". Today one electric light bulb supplies the

equivalent of 100 candles.

Movies or dramas on historical themes always show the sets as far too richly lit. When folk told tales of Fairyland they always remarked on the brightness of the illuminations in the fairy court. Such conspicuous brightness equated with fabulous wealth, dismissed by canny Scots, including no doubt the frugal Glenkensians, as "sheer extravagance".

GLENKENS PEOPLE'S SHED

Work is progressing on the Glenkens People's Shed, a new opportunity for everyone in the area to practice and learn woodworking and other skills.

With the kind permission of the owner, a section of the Old Smiddy in Balmaclellan is being adapted to house the Shed which is part of the Connecting in Retirement Big Lottery four-year project. Work on the Shed is progressing well and insulated partitions and new electrics are in place. Benches and a range of tools are being procured, some donated or grantfunded.

Two activities are scheduled to start by the end of this year. One

is the resurrection of the wood carving class that used to be run in Dalry School by Bill Wiseman. The other activity will be wood turning and it is hoped to have two lathes in place and appoint a tutor for people who want to try their hand.

The Shed movement - originally 'Men's Sheds' - started in Australia in the 1990s to enable men of all ages to socialise and share activities they might other wise undertake in their own sheds. The Glenkens People's Shed will enable men and women to share the tools, skills and resources they need to work on projects of their own choosing, at their own pace, in a safe friendly environment. A Shed's activities usually include making or mending in wood (for example carpentry, joinery, turning, carving, furniture renovation etc) and may include

activities as varied as bike repair, upholstery, boat renovation or model engineering.

One of the major objectives is to help younger people in the area to learn new skills or crafts from some of the local craftswomen and craftsmen who will use the Shed.
