GLENKENS COMMUNITY SHOP DISPENSES MORE CHEER

Glenkens Community Shop in Dalry has now distributed £15,415 to local organisations since it opened three years ago.

More than 20 local organisations have received grants of up to £500 from the charity shop including schools, town halls, several children's groups, walking groups and numerous others. The Glenkens Children's Club summer activity programme for example was fully funded last year by a community shop grant enabling more than 60 children to sample various physical activities during the summer holidays.

New Galloway Mother & Toddlers group is among recipients in the latest round of funding. Fiona

Oliver, treasurer of the group, says: "We are extremely grateful to the Glenkens Community Shop for this grant. This will ensure the group can sustain itself for a whole year, providing an excellent play and social environment for babies, toddlers and parents alike in New Galloway Town Hall." She also added, "Please continue to use and support the Glenkens Community Shop. Without grants such as these our local groups would struggle to provide a wide range of activities and amenities for our rural but thriving community."

CATSTRAND FLOOD APPEAL

The CatStrand suffered huge damage when it was flooded again on Wednesday 14 January.

The damage is far worse than last year's flood, both because of the increased volume of water that came into the building and because the water was muddy this time. The building was at one point full of water to a depth of about 2', and small boulders were swept into the building. The damage has not yet been quantified but a large amount of stock from the shop, all of the floors and a lot of the kitchen

equipment appear to have been damaged beyond repair. The entire building is sodden and filthy.

Staff were alerted to the flood late at night on the 14th, in the aftermath of the terrible rain that fell that evening. Despite staying late into the night and with the support of the local fire brigade, the damage had mostly been done by the time they got there, due to the fact that the retaining wall at the culvert to the side of the building had

given way and the burn water was flowing directly into the building.

REMEMBERING GODFREY

It is with a heavy heart that I tell you about the loss of a dear friend to many and pillar of the local community, Godfrey Smith, who died on 12 January.

Godfrey ran the Clog and Shoe Workshop in Balmaclellan and was the last traditional clogmaker in Scotland and one of very few left in the whole of the UK. He was also a vital part of our Glenkens community, involving himself in so many valuable community initiatives, charitable projects and supporting many local young people in finding their direction in life.

Godfrey will be remembered as a friend to many, as well as a mentor, teacher, husband, father, godfather and in so many generous and supportive roles; I don't think I ever heard anyone utter a bad word about him in all the time I knew him.


Having moved to the area

in the early 1970s, Godfrey married Sheila Mackay and lived in Dalry for some time. Then the couple bought the old school in Balmaclellan where they raised their three boys – Pete, Sandy and Vondy.

With an intense interest in community and supporting the next generation, Godfrey was involved in Balmaclellan Community Council for many years, Southwest Community Woodlands which, among other things, created the community woodland of Taliesin outside Castle Douglas, the South West Association of Nature Conservation(SWANC) group, as well as establishing the Afghan Schools Trust with Robin Ade.

He also provided accommodation and activities for a group of children from Chernobyl after the terrible nuclear disaster, was instrumental in creating the youth apprenticeship scheme in the area and was pivotal in battling to stop the burial of nuclear waste in the Galloway hills.

The Glenkens will be an emptier place without Godfrey

Discussions naturally centred on the recovery plans from the flood, but Alan Smith, new chair of GCAT and Brian Edgar, general manager, also gave an overview of the year's very successful activities. All of the GCAT projects (the CatStrand, the Gazette, GTI, the Watson Bird project, Connecting in Retirement, Youth Arts,

Glenkens Children's Club and GCC Playgroup) have gone from strength to strength and many have attracted new funding. Core funding remains an issue, and all support from the community, friends and patrons is very much appreciated.

Alan Smith expressed his great thanks to Andrew Mellor, outgoing Chair, for all his hard work over the last few years and for his steady hand guiding the projects.

John Crallan was co-opted as a new director, and Margaret Elphinstone stepped down after her three year tenure. She was also thanked for her thoughtful contributions and most helpful perspectives.

Immediate plans were discussed and it was generally

agreed that an engineering solution to the flooding issue is of critical importance, as neither the staff, board or community could bear to see a reoccurrence.

Robert Peace gave a vote of thanks at the end to all the staff and volunteers who had done so much already to recover the situation, which was very much appreciated by all concerned.

GREY SQUIRREL CONTROL IN THE GLENKENS

Over recent months more and more sightings of grey squirrels have been reported in the Glenkens.

We need your support to help control the spread and threat that these cute but invasive animals pose. They out-compete red squirrels for habitat and food, usually replacing them within 15 years. This threat is magnified by the squirrel pox virus carried by the grey squirrel which is fatal to our native red squirrels, killing them within 15 days.

The Glenkens were a stronghold for red squirrels, but less of them are now being seen. Why? Simply because of the spread of the slightly bigger grey squirrel. We can reverse this process by controlling the continuing spread of grey squirrels. Evidence in other areas of Dumfries and Galloway shows a proven record where eradication of grey squirrels has led to a return of our native red squirrel.

Help us to re-establish former numbers of the very popular and iconic red squirrel in the Glenkens. Please report your squirrel sightings, both red and grey, to Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels at www.scottishsquirrel survey.co.uk Robert Peace

The international designation has been awarded in recognition of its potential to become a world class place for involving communities who have a passion for living and working in a way that benefits people and nature.

The Glenkens is in the middle of the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere and hosts an amazing combination of culture, wildlife and countryside.

It is easy to see why people care about their surroundings, want to find out more and know it is worth taking a closer look. Of course the more you look the more you find out and then want to pass on your new found knowledge to others or take positive action to take care of our environment. This kind of approach is exactly what the Heritage Lottery Fund wants to promote through its Landscape Partnership Schemes. The schemes knit together many projects over a well-defined area to involve people with the improvement of local built, natural and cultural heritage.

Dumfries and Galloway Council is beginning to develop a Landscape Partnership Scheme for the Ken/Dee river catchment and are keen to hear from individuals, groups or organisations with aspirations

to enhance the area between Carsphairn and Kirkcudbright. An enormous range of projects might be included in a Landscape Partnership Scheme as long as they improve

conditions for both local communities and local heritage.

Your projects might help people develop rural skills such as drystane dyking or learn about recording ancient trees and the special wildlife they support, such as the tree lungwort lichen. Perhaps your project will research the development of towns and villages in the area, discover why some prospered and others never got beyond the initial plan or maybe you are fascinated by the unusual 'Adam and Eve' headstones in your local graveyard and want

to involve volunteers in recording and preserving them for future generations to enjoy.

Your idea might be about undertaking physical improvements or telling a story about the special qualities, characteristics and identity that makes the Glenkens different from other places.

The size of a Landscape Partnership Scheme means they require two or three years to evolve but it is important that local people get involved in the early stages to suggest ideas

and help them develop.


Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere Partnership are excited by this opportunity to provide a lasting improvement to the Glenkens.

In the morning of the 15th, more than 20 volunteers and staff arrived with shovels, brushes and boxes to save what they could and clear out the rest. Brian Edgar, the CatStrand general manager, said: "The scale of the damage is unprecedented and frankly heartbreaking. We would like to say a big 'thank you' to all the people who turned up to help, and to the others who have expressed their support including the fire brigade, Natural Power, local town hall committees and Kells School. We don't yet know our exact plans for the future, but we will do our absolute best to re-locate all planned events and performances and to cancel as few as possible".

Alan Smith, recently elected Chair of the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust (GCAT), said; "Our priority at the moment is getting the building safe and secure and getting the staff able to work again. We can then concentrate on getting the building repaired and re-opened, while working with the Council and others to ensure that a robust engineering solution is found to prevent this happening ever again." He added his thanks to the staff and volunteers, who as ever have worked above and beyond in support of this very popular local charity.

In the short term, the CatStrand staff will relocate to Rosebank Cottage (located at the junction of Kirk Road and the Newton Stewart road in New Galloway, over the road from the doctor's surgery), from where they can offer information on events and performances, sell tickets and will even be offering tea, coffee and cakes for sale.

Phone numbers to contact them remain unchanged, so anyone

unsure of plans for events and performances will be able to ring through as usual.

In the light of this disastrous event, Helen Keron, a director of GCAT, said: "We can all do our bit to help this facility that offers so much to the Glenkens communities get back on its feet by continuing to buy tickets and attend events. The worst thing that could happen now is for numbers to drop, just when the CatStrand needs our help the most." There is also a website set up for anyone who would like to donate;

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GLENKENS COMMUNITY CENTRE UPDATE

Plans for the purchase of the Glenkens Community Centre are progressing well, with the first stage application form accepted by Dumfries & Galloway Council.

The Community Centre steering group commissioned an independent survey of the Centre in December which showed that although some moderate work for woodworm and damp joists is required the Centre is overall in very good condition for its age.

D & G Council has also been carrying out extensive work on the Centre in preparation for any handover including replacing and

repairing window frames and facias and painting of exterior woodwork.

The management committee and steering group are excited about the possibilities for the Centre and are meeting in January to make the final purchase decision.

If it is agreed on all sides, the Centre could be in community ownership by the summer, at which point grants would be sought to cover the required work and get the Centre on to a sustainable footing.

I would like to say a big thank you to everyone who has helped in the process so far, and in particular to Mr Will Adam who has provided invaluable advice and assistance.



PLANNING CONTINUES FOR NEW GALLOWAY SHOP

The steering group exploring a community purchase of the New Galloway shop has completed a fact-finding tour of other community-owned shops in the area.

These visits were very interesting and provided useful learning to assist the long journey towards a community-owned shop.

The group is also investigating potential uses for the house accompanying the shop, as the chosen option must make a positive and valuable difference to the

community. The impact on the community is one of the most important factors that will encourage national funding bodies to support a funding bid, and without large grant funding the project will not get off the ground.

The next step is to use the information from our local survey to undertake further research about the feasibility of this project. The steering group is about to apply for an initial grant to undertake this research. Feasibility studies will help to build a picture as to how sustainable this project would be, and provide an idea as to what model of operation would best work for the shop and house, and the results will form the basis of a large grant

application.

As reported in previous issues of the Gazette, a survey of local people showed 130 backing the idea of a community shop with two opposed. Jim and Margaret Hopkins, the shop's owners, are planning to retire and wish to sell the shop and house. We thank them and Marie McClurg for their continued support for this project, and also the tenants and management committees of Carsphairn, Auchencairn and Palnackie community shops for giving us their time and allowing us to learn such useful lessons.

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
Smile Daddy I am Dying

The Droving Project Comes to New Galloway

Why we became Scottish cattle drovers for the day...

Three cows, a filmmaker, a photographer, a sound artist, a musician and a writer walked along an ancient drovers' track across the regional border from Knockengorroch farm in Galloway to Bellsbank town in East Ayrshire. The walk re-traced a journey that people have made with their cattle for hundreds of years.

The Droving Project is a collaborative arts project which addresses the ancient cattle culture of Scotland by following one of the many drovers' pathways that cross this country. In so doing it comments on rural life and farming today and touches on the art and psychology of walking.

People in Scotland have walked with cattle for over a thousand years. Current legislation made a

slower way of life may

re-creation of this journey much more complicated. The route crossed five different farms

altogether. As bringing cattle onto a working livestock farm imposes a thirteen-day standstill of all animals, the cows would have been unable to walk the sevenmile route in less than eight weeks. As a result, walkers set out from Knockengorroch cowless, and met

up with the cows three miles into the route where they had been moved thirteen days previously.

The history of cattle in South West Scotland goes back beyond record. Cattle are indigenous to the UK and were once the lifeblood and wealth of the country.

The project was not set up to be a re-enactment of history, but an exploration of contemporary values, in a very real (wet) and present setting, drawing parallels with people in many other parts of the world who still walk with their cattle, camels, reindeer or yaks, to reach fresh pastures or trade.

Herdspeople have been lauded for their low impact on the environment, their creative thinking and innovative approach to environmental challenges. The people in Scotland, and particularly in upland areas, have also lived for many hundreds of years as partial nomadic herdsmen, a section

> of social history often forgotten.

Towns such as Bellsbank that lost the mainstay of their livelihood

with the closure of the coalmines are common in many areas in Scotland. Before the industrial revolution people in these areas farmed and kept livestock. The industrial age is over so what is next for towns in rural areas like these?



The Droving Project gently nudges people to consider questions such as these, while suggesting that a slower way of life may be beneficial for our psyche and the health of the natural environment.

The Droving Project, funded by Creative Scotland, features award-winning photographer Alice Myers, film producer Stevie Whiteford, writer Catrina Davies, Nick Jenkins of the Lorraine Macauley Band and sound artist Pete Smith.

The results will come to the CatStrand for a month from Tuesday 3 February after having been exhibited at the Doon Valley Museum in Dalmellington since October 2014 - please contact the CatStrand on 01644 420 374 to find out alternative arrangements while repairs are being made to the building.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

McMILLAN'S GALLOVIDIAN ENCYCLOPAEDIA



One of Galloway's greatest literary productions is *The Scottish Gallovidian Encyclopaedia* by John Mactaggart of Borgue (1791-1830), a noted wit and an assiduous collector of oral information drawn from the Galloway folk.

The first edition of 1824 had to be withdrawn because it gave serious offence to the great and the good, but it was reprinted in 1876 and in subsequent runs. The author's ambition was to preserve the original antiquated and natural curiosities of the South of Scotland, "containing sketches of eccentric characters and curious places, with explanation of singular."

characters and curious places, with explanation of singular words, terms and phrases, interspersed with poems, tales, anecdotes, etc. . . . illustrative of the ways of the peasantry, and manners of Caledonia". He pronounced himself a proud peasant and a fiercely patriotic Scot. He became an engineer through the patronage of John Rennie who built the Ken Bridge.His publication was truly unique and it remains immensely valuable.

The Wigtown Book Festival commissioned local Dumfries and Galloway poet, Hugh McMillan, to produce his own version, inspired by Mactaggart. As Hugh would acknowledge, comparisons between the two projects are invidious. For one thing McMillan was given eight

months to produce his book, while Mactaggart claimed that he began collecting as a child. Both men are talented poets, both enjoy philosophising and both enjoy social criticism. McMillan is to be congratulated on producing an enthralling, idiosyncratic collection which will appeal to readers with a good sense of humour and a taste for strong drink. Throughout he develops his idea of Dumfries and Galloway as a ghost landscape. For him the Wickerman movie incorporates and perpetuates myths about the region which are not so different from those confronted by SR Crockett. As this self-described "broken down history teacher" travels around he reflects on JM

> Barrie's rather stained reputation and John Buchan's 39 Steps. Mactaggart-like he quotes a man who tells him that "Wigtown has always been a dump and now it is a dump with a book festival!" He scoffs at Burnsians and Rotarians who toast the Queen but exclude women from their events. He muses on the tragic coincidence that three of the UK's worst transport disasters took place in the region. The Gretna or Quintinshill railway disaster in 1915; the wreck of the Princess Victoria en route from Stranraer to Larne in 1947 and Pan Am Flight 103 in 1988 in Lockerbie.

One acquaintance describes Galloway as a place where depopulation has become a tourist attraction. A visit to Carsethorne prompts thoughts of the region's regrettable emigration history. Past numbers were huge, particularly in the 19th century, but 3,500 left the region to go abroad between 2006 and 2012.

All of this suggests the book is much darker than in fact it is. But fortunately the McMillan humour is never far away and some of it is wicked. By way of contrast he has a poem 'Carsphairn', a place which once advertised for settlers: "the last wurd in colonization a wis telt/a mean they advertised doon south fir settlers/like the Wild West, ken, here's a slice o land fir ye/dinna fash aboot the savages they're a extinct". He defines the King or Queen of Clatteringshaws as "a generic term for a hopelessly deluded person, simultaneously

mad but entertaining, a lover of history who has lost his or her reason after too many nights thinking in an empty room and far too many house doubles".

He recounts his adventures travelling

in our area by bus, - "50 minutes to travel 13 miles and half an hour into the journey we were further away than when we started" - of being trapped in the Crosskeys, New Galloway, by a hunting party, and (local hoteliers take note) of the drouthy visitor's perpetual anxiety when in Galloway about whether any of the pubs will be open! The Loch Ken crayfish also fall under his gaze. As will be obvious by now Hugh McMillan's Galloway Encyclopedia is an invaluable treasure trove of multifarious information about the area attractively, thoughtfully and wittily presented. The author, his illustrator Hugh Bryden, and all others involved are to be congratulated. Ted Cowan
