Great News for Local Children's Groups

It's been a good few months for the preschool community groups in the Glenkens.

More than £14,000 of funding has been secured to maintain their existence for at least the next 18 months, which means they can all plan for success instead of existing term to term. Nearly 30% of the funding has come from very local individuals, charitable groups and employers, which is a fantastic testament to the social commitment and sustainability of our area.

GCC Playgroup has secured a second grant from the Big Lottery Community and Families fund, which will assure its future until at least August 2016. GCC Playgroup chair, Helen Keron, said: "We were delighted to be allocated this money from the

Big Lottery, as it represents a real vote of confidence in what we are achieving at Playgroup. We have had 10 children on the books so far this year, with another five expected before the summer. Sue and Chrissy

are doing a fantastic job in giving the little ones their very first taste of independence and learning in a fun and secure environment, and the children all love it".

MAGIC MEMORY FOR MATHS

Dalry S1 pupil and 'Memory Marvel' Annabelle McAdam managed the astonishing feat of memorising pi to 28 digits.

It took her about six minutes to memorise the numbers and

she could then repeat them. Five days later she could still repeat the series of numbers with no warning and with only two errors.

Maths teacher Mr Bannister said: "I am amazed and wanted to know how Annabelle managed it". Annabelle said: "We do Kim's game a lot at Guides and I said the numbers over and over to memorise them".

CATSTRAND RECOVERY IN FULL SWING

The flood recovery work at the CatStrand is in full swing now, with the stripping out of damp internals completed and the drying out commenced as we go to press.

The water damage was such that the building will be stripped back to solid walls a metre up from the ground in most places. All floors, the mobile seating in the auditorium and all kitchen and shop units will be removed. This very comprehensive stripping out allows for absolute assurance during the drying phase, which is expected to take three weeks. Once the building has been certified dry, then the re-fit can commence. The current expected re-opening date is July 2015.

The insurers are being very supportive of all the issues, and will cover full replacement back

to the original standard, including damaged art installations. The CatStrand team is taking the opportunity to see how the building layout can be optimised to improve the experiences of visitors, but the footprint and the feel of the building will remain unchanged from before the flood.

The Flood Risk Assessment, including a full topographical survey of the catchment area for the burn, is also underway and, although not complete, is already suggesting some structural changes that will absolutely minimise the risk of a repeat event. D&G Council are also designing a new headwall for the burn inlet which will be constructed in association with rebuilding the boundary wall.

The CatStrand programme of events continues largely unchanged, now at various venues across the Glenkens villages. Do keep on supporting the venture by attending performances if you can - some non-New Galloway

people have already reported that they are enjoying the unexpected upside of being able to walk to events!

There is a fundraising event planned for the CatStrand to help with the inevitable costs not covered by the insurance. It will be a table dinner and dance at New Galloway Town Hall on 16 May. Finally, the team at the CatStrand would like to thank all members of the Glenkens community for their ongoing support of our efforts. It remains a difficult time, and we are all missing our beautiful building. But thanks to an enormous amount of hard work by a lot of people - staff, directors and volunteers alike - we are on track to be back up and running just as soon as possible. Thanks again to all.

The proposal to purchase the shop received substantial backing from the community last year but if our grant applications, firstly for initial project funding and subsequently for the purchase of the shop, are to succeed, we will need to provide funders with evidence of continuing widespread support in the community. For the first time ever, two of Scotland's prestigious nature festivals are uniting to showcase over 150 family-friendly events taking place in the south of Scotland throughout April, May and June.



CARSPHAIRN TREASURE HUNTERS

This term, the pupils at Carsphairn Primary School have been learning about history.

Since this term is particularly long, we have decided to look at history in three different ways. By learning about the Egyptians we will learn about ancient history, by learning about the Titanic we can discover more modern history and we are also finding out about how we learn about history.

We started the term focusing on Egypt, and the kids have done some independent research to write a class report about the Ancient Egyptians. We used a combination of books from our library and chose the best websites on the internet to find information. We then went through the seven steps of writing to produce our reports on several different aspects of Ancient Egyptian life. We also constructed our own sarcophogi, and looked at the process of mummification - which we all agreed was pretty gross!

Next we started learning about the Titanic. For homework, we were all tasked with the job of constructing scaled models of the ship using recycled

materials. We think our parents enjoyed this as much as we did! We also learned about the details of what happened on the fateful night that the Titanic struck the iceberg, and why it mattered if you were travelling in first class or third class. Finally, to celebrate everything we will have learned this term about the Titanic, we are going on a school trip to Belfast to see the Titanic Belfast Exhibition. It will be a long day, but we are looking forward to taking our own boat/ferry journey across the water to Northern Ireland.

Finally, we have been really lucky to have *Beyond the Beep* visit our school to teach us all about responsible metal detecting, which fits in very well with the outdoor learning ethos at our school.

Sharon and Derek from Beyond the Beep were able to provide us with all the metal detecting and digging equipment and expertise required to search the fields behind our school grounds. We unearthed all kinds of artefacts such as old toys, coins and other random items, and we are still researching to find out as much as we can about everything we have discovered. It has been a really great way to learn that we



have loads of history right in our own backyard!

To show off all that we have been learning about history, we will be having an open house at the school at 10am on 2 April. Everyone is invited and we would love to have you visit our wonderful wee school. So if you are interested in history, or just want to see what the pupils at Carsphairn have been up to, we hope we can see you in April.

CatStrand Youth Players

The Youth Players entered two plays for this year's Scottish Community Drama Association Festival with the Stewartry District round being held at the Fullarton Theatre over five sessions from 25 to 28 February.

Amateur drama is certainly flourishing in the Stewartry and this, once again, was by far the biggest festival in Scotland with 14 entries.

The Youth Players' ambitious production of 'I Never Saw Another Butterfly' by Celeste Raspanti was placed third, winning the Aitchison Trophy. The play was a very moving piece of theatre with demanding roles for the three main characters played by Zoe Kirkpatrick, Eleanor Jones and Mathew Godridge ably supported by another eight young actors. The story was based on the true account of a Czech Holocaust survivor, Raja Englanderova, who was held in the Jewish Ghetto of Terezin near Prague during the German occupation.

The adjudicator also seemed very impressed to the point where his public adjudication suggested that a higher place than third was forthcoming. The audience feedback too was very positive and hopes were high as the Saturday evening presentations approached but in the end it was to be third place this time. The cast are very grateful to Iva Pennington for all her help with the pronunciation of all the Czech words and names in the script.

The second production was 'Dream Jobs' by Graham Jones, a well known piece of youth theatre depicting the plight of five teenage girls as they wait for an interview with their careers adviser. Each of them has a dream job, all of them either a bit too glamorous or academically beyond the limited

ability of the girls.

Each character had their spot in the limelight as they acted out a scene based on their glamour jobs such as a fashion model, a dancer or an air hostess. Slowly they came to realise that none of them was ever going to achieve their 'Dream Jobs', except for Joan who only ever wanted to get married and have a family – it transpired that she had achieved part of her ambition already, although not in the way she would have liked, as she was expecting a baby. The

adjudicator also praised the cast of Dream Jobs for their strong characterisations and particularly praised the 'fantasy' scenes where they left reality and overplayed their idealistic perception of their dream job.

Whilst this production wasn't placed this time it also received high marks and was very well received by the audience.

There were many memorable comedy moments, not least the game attempts of Lucy Olley, who was playing Angela, to act out her scene as

a fashion model whilst walking on crutches after unfortunately breaking her ankle a few weeks ago.

Both plays were directed by Brian Edgar with sound effects and music by Simon Davidson.

URG AND I: Part I

One man's story of living with a broken ankle...

I broke my ankle. It's a very weird experience for me, as I've never broken a bone before.

Now all my routines, assumptions, and predispositions are suspended or questioned.

To begin with I thought it was just a sprain. Couple of days off work. No sweat. Then I thought I'd better check with the doctor, get an X-ray maybe. The next day I was in hospital and had a 'slab' (a bulky bandage/cast hybrid designed to

support the limb) put on it. Next Thursday I get a full cast which will bring a whole new set of experiences.

Until then I am adjusting to the brick attached to my left leg, to the almost continuous (although rarely intense) pain, to one-legged and double-crutched hopping, and various other little (or not so little) discomforts that arrived unexpected and unannounced, in company with this throbbing lump. I shall call it Urg.

Living alone I have no-one to beg favours of when Urg makes things difficult. My house is small and merrily cluttered (some would say 'a complete mess') and I have found that negotiating (on crutches) the

fermenting blackberry wine, the easel, bookshelves and two tables while carrying a cup of coffee is impossible. So I leave the crutches by the sink, hop around the wine, and, leaning on the easel here or a bookshelf there, gradually make my way to the couch, set my coffee on the table and then return, hop-foot, for the crutches. Urg complains throughout the duration of this safari.

Going to bed is fun. I have to climb a set of polished wood stairs. Urg refuses to co-operate, so I leave the crutches at the

bottom and clamber backwards, one step at a time, up to the second floor and into my room, holding Urg in the air all the way.

Then there's getting into bed. I can't just slip Urg between the covers like the little eel on my other leg. I have to flip the bedclothes back, gently lift Urg into place upon the mattress, cover him with the bedclothes and then use the little eel to adjust them around Urg if need be – which is usually the case.

And Urg has to be in just the right position before he will settle down, otherwise he complains painfully.

As for rolling over or adjusting my (or Urg's) position - well, even if he does want to move he complains when we do. This normally brief little adjustment has become a slow, delicate and painful affair.

Eventually of course we fall asleep. Then we wake up. That happens two or three times. Then we wake up and it is morning. At this point a third character becomes involved. His name is Senor Bladder.

It doesn't matter if Urg and I are perfectly happy, warm and comfortable and have no desire to move, Senor Bladder

is very insistent. So Urg and I have to take Senor Bladder downstairs. Urg objects. Nevertheless we are forced to once again slide laboriously downstairs to where I left the crutches.

Now here's a warning. When moving from a high point (a stair) into crutches, beware

the tendency to pivot forward uncontrollably. I nearly poled through the front window this morning. Only tripping over the couch saved me. Urg was not amused.

Anyway, once Senor Bladder is calmed down Urg and I sit and watch the day loom. That's what we're doing now. Watching the day loom. We do have one thing to look forward to. This afternoon we're going to have a bath. I haven't told Urg yet. Kevin Ade

HISTORY LAUNCH DRAWS CROWDS

It was standing room only in the Glenkens Community Centre in Dalry when Professor Ted Cowan launched The Glenkens Story project and introduced the first speaker of the day, Anna Campbell of the Carsphairn Heritage Group.

She was followed by local farmer, Bill Blyth, on his life-

time of book-collecting, the Rev. David Bartholomew on the Covenanter trail and Dr Lizanne Henderson on the Glenkens witches.

Almost 150 people dropped in during the day-long launch to view the displays or listen to speakers including Michael Ansell on discovering history through place names, Professor Joseph Murphy on how 'natural' resources shape history, Paul Goodwin on the military past and Alison Burgess with oral history gathered locally.

The displays by the Carsphairn

and Dalry Heritage groups, showings of historic films and the finds of the local metal detectors attracted crowds. Enthusiastic visitors gave Avril Bridgeman and Tom Carlyle copious information for their history of the New Galloway shops.

Having established that many local people want to discover more about their history, The Glenkens Story project will soon be announcing its next events. Watch out for posters and flyers.

Update on the War: 100 Years On

Well the war was not over by Christmas (as many people had thought) and the Glenkens had lost its first son, Augustus Cathcart of Carsphairn, on 14 September 1914.

Although he was never to be listed on any Glenkens memorial, Lieutenant Frederick WJM Miller was killed in action on 23 October 1914. His father was Sir William Miller Bart of Glenlee although the family by then were

no longer connected with the area.

The Kirkcudbrightshire
Advertiser (fore-runner of the
Galloway News) printed a letter
from the minister at Kells on
13 November to report that a
cottage occupied by refugees
(from Belgium) had been given
rent free by Mrs Turner and that
valuable assistance had also
been given by Miss Turner.

The next man to fall would be Arthur Rennie on 12 March 1915. Aged 29 and a former gardener at Kenmure Castle, he is listed on the Kells war memorial. He was the fifth son of the late

constable Rennie of Carsphairn and a brother of police sergeant Rennie of Dalry.

An edition of the Kirkcudbrightshire Advertiser of 25 December 1914 contained a Roll of Honour with the names of all those serving in the armed forces. The numbers were Dalry (32), Kells (40), Carsphairn (18) and Balmaclellan (9) and it is also known that a teacher from Kells school was serving at the front as a war correspondant so that makes exactly 100 men from the Glenkens serving at home or overseas.

The local Territorial Battalion (5th Bn Kings Own Scottish Borderers) were in training near Stirling at this time in preparation for service overseas at Gallipoli. Paul Goodwin

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

OLD MORTALITY

Balmaclellan must be one of the least known villages in Scotland. Nestling into the side of its hill it is easily missed from the Corsock road and the road to Boque Toll.

Delivery people regularly appear at our door asking the whereabouts of Balmaclellan almost as if it were a sister community to Brigadoon or Glocca Morra. Few see the sculpture

built in to the wall of the kirkyard when approaching the village from the west. There, reclining on a tombstone, is Old Mortality, his ancient horse standing beside him. The sculptor was John Corrie who produced his work in 1840, a copy of which now stands at Dumfries Museum. There is a more ambitious piece by James Thom in which Sir Walter

Scott sits on an upright gravestone talking to the man and the horse in the Laurel Hill Cemetery, Philadelphia. The information board here notes that 'it was due to the efforts of Balmaclellan Community Council and local people that these statues have been restored, brought back to the village and re-sited in September 2000'. I believe that the statues were brought from the Holm where they were in a sad state of disrepair; perhaps someone can confirm this?

Old Mortality, who inspired the title of Scott's novel of the same name, was a real person, Robert Paterson (1716-1801). He was a stonemason who worked at Corncockle Quarry, Lochmaben. He married Elizabeth Gray from Closeburn and through the good offices of the local Kirkpatrick laird he obtained the lease of a quarry at Gatelawbrig, Morton. His house was ruined and he was captured by

Highlanders retreating from Derby in 1746. Thereafter he joined the Cameronians who still adhered to the covenants. He began to transport slabs from his quarry to place on the unmarked graves of covenanting martyrs. One commentator suggests that he may have suffered from religious mania. Soon he was spending all his time repairing memorials of covenanters who perished during the 'Killing Times', the martyrs of the suffering bleeding remnant. For 40 years, known variously as the 'Hewer', the 'Letterer' or the 'Headstoneman' and eventually as 'Old Mortality',

he followed his calling, allegedly refusing charity. His wife established a school at Balmaclellan to earn a family income, which Paterson so conspicuously failed to provide. She died in 1785. Old Mortality joined his major clients when he died in 1801 and was buried at Caerlayerock.

Scott met Paterson at Dunnottar in 1793, an encounter described, more or less accurately we assume, in Chapter One of Old Mortality. The stonemason spoke as if he was a contemporary of the covenanters 'so much had he identified his feelings and opinions with theirs, and so

the circumstantiality of an eyewitness'. Scott had first been told about Paterson by Joseph Train, an exciseman with antiquarian interests based at Newton Stewart. Train was so smitten by Scott that he presented him with various artifacts for his private museum. He was, however, stopped from handing over St John's Chair by the irate inhabitants of Dalry. It remains in the village, as it should.

Scott had no sympathy with the covenanters whom he detested

as repugnant anachronisms. Whenever he wrote about them his works were greeted with howls of outraged anguish from the devout, notably the minister and biographer, Thomas McCrie, who could not understand how a person of judgement

and candour found it possible to condemn the covenanters, men 'who had been betrayed, insulted, harassed, pillaged and treated in every way like beasts, rather than reasonable creatures by a perfidious, profane, profligate junto of atheists and debauchees'.

Paterson's grandson Nathaniel was born at Achie, Kells to become in time a successful minister On a visit home in later life he wrote: 'I rode over to Kells and could have wept at the changes I saw – trees cut down and the house razed; but let this remind us of the grand change coming – "the house not made with

hands" (2 Corinthians 5.1.)
He invented a type of lifeboat
and when the Free Church was
built at Bogue Toll he preached
the first sermon. His four sons,
all successful men, emigrated
to New Zealand, Australia and
Canada. The Balmaclellanites
are to be congratulated on
keeping alive the memory of
Old Mortality. Ted Cowan


