ROAD CLOSURE THREAT TO CARSPHAIRN SHOP

The A713 main road through the Glenkens is a vital artery along the Gretna to Ayr Tourist Route for caravanners, motorists and lorry drivers alike.

But to one couple in Carsphairn, it is more than a road – it is a crucial part of their livelihood.

Paul Smith and Lindsay Duncan run the village shop and so news of the proposed road closure by the Ayrshire Roads Alliance for five successive weekends from the end of May for resurfacing work to the south of Dalmellington came as a complete bombshell.

They are concerned that the prolonged closures will have a devastating effect on their business.

"We only took over the shop last September and we were looking forward to our first busy summer period, but the road closures will kill our passing trade for up to six weeks," said Lindsay.

Organisation Set Up to Advance Shop Bid

A well-attended meeting of local residents in late March set up the New Galloway Development Association 2015, a necessary step towards securing funding to buy the New Galloway shop for the community.

The association, a constituted unincorporated group, has a nine-strong committee which is preparing an application for initial project funding. This will allow us to present a

professional bid for the grants needed to buy the property.

This stage requires further evidence of community support and how people feel about the local economy generally. We carried out a further survey which has been well supported, with a response rate of over 75%. The results are still being analysed but there is overwhelming agreement on the importance of continuing to have a shop. Many thanks to all those who responded very quickly to the questionnaire. We expect to have the grant application in by the end of June and to hear back by the end of September at the latest.

We are continuing to visit other community shops and ventures to learn more and several of us went to Witherslack community shop in Cumbria in April to hear about their experiences. This trip was sponsored by the Plunkett Foundation who provide support to most of the community shops in the UK. They have allocated us a mentor to help us with our business plan and grant application. We learnt some great lessons from the trip and the clear message that community shops can work and make a huge difference to village life. CATSTRAND WELL ON THE ROAD TO RECOVERY

After what has perhaps seemed like a slow few months from the outside, the CatStrand is well on the way towards its planned reopening in the summer. Enormous amounts of work have been going on behind the scenes by staff and board members to get back open as soon as possible. Having been thoroughly stripped back, the building is now officially dry, and as we go to press, tenders have been received to start the reinstatement work at the end of May. This work is fully covered by the insurance, so the CatStrand will be as good as new by the summer!

Of critical importance, of course, is the need to ensure that the building does not flood again. A comprehensive Flood Risk Assessment has been completed by Flooding Risk Assessment Ltd, a local firm, which has quantified the problem and provided the scenarios that any solution must be able to cope with. The next steps are to commission this

design solution, and implement any works before the winter.

To help fund this next stage of design, which is not covered by the insurance, the Catstrand held a very successful fundraising dinner in New Galloway town hall at the end of May.

Margaret and Louise did a fantastic job of decorating the hall, five gallant hosts provided a three-course meal for their tables, Sam and Wendy did an excellent Saroc demonstration that got everyone up on to the dance floor, and many generous souls donated auction and raffle prizes to generate more funds. Thanks to everyone who contributed and attended, the event raised almost £6000, which is a critical boost to the CatStrand's efforts to get back on its feet at this time.

The board of the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust and the staff of CatStrand would like to say again how very much they appreciate the moral and actual support from the community at this difficult time. We look forward to joining you in celebrating our re-opening within the next few months.

CARSPHAIRN ROAD CLOSURE

"We rely very heavily on people travelling through the village who stop off at our tea rooms – that's the major part of our business. Tourists and especially bikers, who arrive in groups of ten or more, make a point of calling in for a cup of tea or lunch," said Lindsay.

"Without this trade, we are going to suffer dreadfully."

Lindsay added: "If I could, I would move those road signs that will take people away from Carsphairn."

Chair of Carsphairn Community Council, Andrew Metcalf, said: "There has been no account taken of important local events; some fairly minor adjustments made but still major disruption and inconvenience for locals and businesses. They refuse to consider night time closures as is the case in Ayr where alternative routes do not require such a long detour; there will be a major blow to local businesses during the tourist season."

Ayrshire Roads Alliance have amended their total road closure plans for the weekends in the face of mounting pressure from various groups and individuals including the organisers of the Carsphairn and Straiton shows.

Although the A713 will be closed to traffic from 8.30am to 5pm on the Saturday and Sunday, it is proposed to reopen it for one hour at midday to allow vehicles through under convoy.

From 5pm, all traffic will be convoyed through the site overnight until 8.30am the next day.

"Éven with these concessions, there is going to be a lot of confusion for motorists because the road signs are not at all clear," said Paul. "They just tell travellers to seek alternative routes, but to where? The whole thing has not been well planned at all.

"The loss to our business will be massive. I just hope we can survive until the end of June without this vital passing trade. It could close us down."

SOUTH WEST ASSOCIATION FOR NATURE **CONSERVATIONISTS (SWANC) VISIT TO CREE VALLEY COMMUNITY WOODLAND**

Community Woodland Trust (CVCWT)

An Update from Watson Birds

Our Watson Raptor Science Prize was taken to the Scottish Nature Fair at Musselburgh.

The 2015 runner-up, Dr Julien Terraube-Monich from the Department of Biology, University of Turku, Finland, spoke on 'Patterns and implications of individual diet specialisation in a generalist predator'.

The session talk was chaired by Roger Crofts, director of Watson Birds, and the discussion session by Prof Des Thompson, Chair of the Watson Raptor Science Prize Selection Panel.

Dr Terraube-Monich and his colleagues studied whether individual variations in the diet of radio-tracked male Montagu's harriers were associated with patterns of foraging habitat

selection and foraging success during the breeding period. They concluded that individual diet specialisation has a knock-on effect on foraging efficiency in this wide-ranging raptor, highlighting "the role of individual behaviour as a driving force of intra-population niche variation".

In the autumn we are planning a full session on presentations by all prize-winners and runners-up who have not yet had the opportunity to speak about their work. Please join us for a Watson Birds sponsored debate about the future of our land - Looking After Our Land: New Approaches Lead To New Horizons - as part of the Crichton Conservations series.

Given the poor attendance of previous events and continuing financial loss, it has been decided not to hold a Watson Birds Festival this year.



The Bath

Before we had our bath Urg and I had poached eggs (green, organic) on toast for lunch. With ground flax seed. I'm hoping the flax will help with Urg's moodiness. A sort of unipedal valium.

I don't have a TV, which I don't regret. Urg, however, is a different kettle of fish. He likes a smog of sound in the background while he revels in his inertia. So I leave the radio on all day.

Last night a voice announced: "I'm Paul Kennedy....and this....is Ideeers". Urg was snoring before he got to 'i-deeers'. (It's really weird having a lump on the end of your leg which snores).

Most of the time Urg just lies there and lets radio's blur wash over him, but there are some who make him twitch: "Hello. I'm Barbara Bud..." "...and I'm Carol Off, and we're funny aren't we Barbara?" "Yes we are. And this is 'As It Happens'".

Urg complains intensely when

they start up. "As what happens?" he snarls. One evening they talked to an English copper about a large rabbit he'd caught. The pain was excruciating. That certainly happened.

Anyway, 'The Debaters' has just come on. I think we'll have our bath now.

That was a lark. While getting undressed I tried to take Urg off as though he were a sock. I had to remind myself that he was coming into the bath with me.

Actually getting in was interesting. I couldn't step in because Urg refused outright to get wet or bear my weight. So I sat on the toilet seat, put my good leg in, stood up carefully (Urg well raised), did a pas de une (I love ballet) so that I was facing the taps, then lowered myself into the water while Urg stood propped in the corner. UPDATES ON THE WAR

100 years on... April 1915 was a relatively quiet month with only one death reported amongst the men of the Glenkens serving at the front.

George Lavender Bell was killed on 25 April at the age of 29 whilst serving with the Australian Forces in the first day of the Gallipoli campaign. That day would later be commemorated as Anzac day. George had immigrated to Australia before the war and had been one of the first to enlist. His mother still lived at Brighouse Farm, Corsock and his name appears on the Corsock and Balmaclellan war memorials. David Paterson of Cubbox, Balmaclellan had been also been serving with the Australians when he was killed on 8 May, also at Gallipoli at the age of 25. He had been working as a butcher in Australia when he enlisted. He was declared missing in action and is commemorated

on the Helles Memorial and on the Balmaclellan war memorial.

James Gordon of the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders was only 23 years old when he was declared missing just the day after David Paterson. Born on the Isle of Bute, he had been a gamekeeper on the Garroch Estate before enlisting and is commemorated on the Le Touret Memorial, France. He is commemorated on the Kells war memorial and on the Kingarth Parish war memorial, Isle of Bute.

William Stewart of the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders was 30 years old when he died of wounds in France on 13 May. Reported to be the first man from New Galloway to enlist, he had been promoted to Sergeant and was the son of James and Janet Stewart of Meadow View, New Galloway. William is buried at Le Touquet, Paris and is commemorated on the Kells war memorial.

The final death, also on 13 May, was that of James Faed of The

Bungalow, New Galloway. James was a midshipman in the Royal Navy and a member of a famous family of artists; a large painting by



James Faed, only 15 when he died.

his father (also James) can be seen upstairs in New Galloway Town Hall. James was buried at sea at the Dardenelles (Gallipoli) after his ship HMS Goliath was torpedoed. He is commemorated on the Chatham Naval Memorial, Kent, and on the Kells war memorial and the St Margaret's Church war memorial and also has a plaque in his name in St Margaret's Church, New Galloway. James was just 15 when he was killed and had been in the Royal Navy since the age of 13. There was no age bar to Midshipmen (trainee officers) serving on ships in zones of war at the time.

Carsphairn Kirk: a Church in the Heart of the Hills

Carsphairn Kirk: A
Church in the Heart of
the Hills is the subject of
the Carsphairn Heritage
Group's 2015 exhibition

but delves further back in history to the beginnings of the church in the area, the turbulent Covenanting times and the structure of the pre 1815 church building.

Through his research Dr
Bartholomew has discovered more
about the central communion table,
the only one still being used in
the South of Scotland. Committee
members of the group have
researched into church life since 1815
and the exhibition is a rich gathering

of articles, artefacts and wonderful photographs portraying the life and importance of a church in an upland community throughout the last four hundred years.

The central communion table will be used for the Communion service on 5 July (see p22). There will also be a soup and sweet lunch served in Lagwyne Hall between 1pm and 2.30pm that day; all are welcome to come along before the service which is at 3pm.

MORE ON *OLD MORTALITY*

In the last issue of the Glenkens Gazette Ted Cowan, in his article on *Old Mortality*, asked if anyone could confirm where the statue had come from previous to its current location by Balmaclellan church. We have had two people respond to this query, so here is a little more about the *Old Mortality* statue.

Professor Ted Cowan, in his informative article on Old Mortality, referred to the statue built into the Balmaclellan kirkyard wall, and sought confirmation that it had been rescued from a sorry state in the grounds of The Holme about a mile out of the village.

This is indeed correct. There are two seperate statues forming an ensemble – one of Old Mortality recumbent on a gravestone and the other of his horse standing by. They had stood for a century or more in woodland at The Holme, and are marked on the 1909 edition of the OS map. In the course of that time the figure of Old Mortality had suffered severe damage, with the head and legs broken off. When

the decision was made at the time of the millenium to display them more fittingly, the statues were removed and taken to the workshop of Martin Holden at Dalshangan for the very considerable restoration necessary, before transfer to Balmaclellan and mounting on the prepared kirkyard site.

Some confusion may arise from the fact that there had

been a statue of Old Mortality in Balmaclellan before this, which some people will remember. It was brought to the village in the 1960s by 'Achie' Corrie, the smith at the time and a descendant of John Corrie, the sculptor of all four existing statues of Old Mortality. It was installed on the small green in the centre of the village, near where petrol pumps later stood, and remained there until about 1987, when it was handed over to the Newton Steward Museum, where it can still be seen. It is partnered by the figure of a watchful Cameronian, a member of the group who strove to maintain Covenanting principles even when the main struggle was over.

With thanks to Tom Corrie for jogging my memory on the facts.

Dear Glenkens Gazette,
After reading the Article about
Old Mortality I contacted a former
neighbour, Peter McNicol (formerly of
Walkerhill, Balmaclellan), as I recalled
him and my late father, George
Lothian, moving the Statue at the
Holm. Undernoted is an extract from
his reply. I do hope that this will be of
interest and help to you.

"With reference to the Article on Old Mortality he was definitely down at the Holm big house. I used to rent the fields off Lord Templeton and Old Mortality was on the banks of the Garple burn down in the front of the Holm House. It was in a sorry state in those days in the 60s and 70s. The hand was broken off and the ears of the horse were also missing; also the foot of Old Mortality was missing. The Statue was moved from down at the front of the Holm House by myself (Peter McNicol), Joe Corrie (Blacksmith), Gordon Wallace (Estate Manager at the Holm) and George Lothian (Bogue Toll) with George's Tractor and Buck Rake and a lot of ropes. It was moved to the Holm Farm home of Lord & Lady Templeton. It was later moved to the Village under the care of Joe Corrie and was placed at the Petrol pumps near to the Smiddy. It was later moved to the Churchyard".

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

THE KILLING OF THE CURATE OF CARSPHAIRN

The Carsphairn Heritage Group has imaginatively staged an exhibition to mark the 200th anniversary of their church, which is famous for preserving the most unique communion table in Scotland.

Visit, and check out the photographs of the last two beadles of the kirk who look as if they had just stepped out of the pages of a Crockett novel.

In darker times Carsphairn was noted for a shocking episode, which took place in November 1684, namely the murder of Peter Peirson, the local minister, or more accurately, curate, since he was of the Episcopalian persuasion. Two contemporary accounts of the affair have survived though neither seems entirely clear about exactly what happened. Further distortion occurs because of the light of the latest and the latest and the latest area of the latest area.

distortion occurs because of the bias of the authors who in the heated atmosphere of 'The Killing Times' or the 'good ill times of persecution', of covenanting legend, were motivated as much by propaganda as they were by perspicacity.

Following the rescue of covenanting prisoners at Enterkin Pass in July of 1684 the Scottish government intensified its pursuit of the righteous. A dragoon was killed by 'Black' James McMichael, the fowler or gamekeeper of Maxwelton, from the Clachan of Dalry. As legislation became harsher and more repressive the covenanters retaliated with declarations; 'We utterly detest and abhor that hellish principle of killing all who differ in judgement or persuasion from us, it having no bottom upon the word

of God'. However any opposing the Covenanted Work of Reformation would be appropriately punished.

Robert Wodrow, historian of the persecutions, recounts the story of a 73 year old woman from Carsphairn who was arrested because her son attended a conventicle. When she refused to swear that she would never again see, or shelter, the offender, she was scourged through the streets of Dumfries.

Two of the most vicious pursuers of covenanters were John Graham of Claverhouse, based for some time at Kenmure Castle, and the notorious Robert Grierson of Lag who had an estate at Garryhorn, Carsphairn.

> There Lag regularly held courts, often assisted by Peter Peirson who informed on parishioners who would later be interrogated and fined, or worse. Those 'about the head of the Water of Ken' were particularly noted. Peirson was described as unmarried, violent, surly-natured, horridly severe, blustering and bold, openly provoking some of his flock by stating, 'he feared none of the whigs, nor anything else but rats or mice'. Nonetheless he seems to have kept a small armoury in the manse. Some locals decided to attempt to reason with him. A group headed by James McMichael met at Muirbroke [Marbrack?] 'three miles from the kirk of Carsphairn'. Learning that Peirson was at home they decided to visit him. Accounts vary. One states that two of them, announcing



they were friends of the curate, went to his door, putting Peirson in a rage, threatening to unleash broadsword and pistol.

They called for help and another two of the company, McMichael and Roger Padzen from Sanguhar approached. The other version has McMichael knocking on the door to be met by the well armed clergyman whom he shot in the chest in selfdefence. Wodrow, like some of those present, thoroughly condemned the episode though he compared it to the assassination of Archbishop Sharp in Magus Muir near St Andrews in 1679, in providing evidence to opponents that the covenanters were guilty of 'the hellish and Jesuitical principle of asassination'. He possibly exaggerated, however, in asserting

that Peirson was an open defender of popery, alleging that on a visit to James McVirk [MacTurk?] at Holm of Dalquhairn, he spoke in favour of purgatory. The extreme covenanters branded him 'a man of death, both by the law of God and man', but they expelled the perpetrators of the crime, condemning

'the fact not material murder'. Black McMichael was killed within the year. Others were later known to be 'flies' (spies) prompting suggestions that the murder was the action of agents provocateurs.

But spare a thought for the victim! The recent General Election has once again demonstrated how easily and misleadingly one side can disgracefully demonise the other. Peter Peirson might have been just as zealous and convinced of his own righteousness as the covenanters were of theirs. In flushing out rebels he behaved as a good citizen. No one likes informers but should a man be vilified because of his loyalty to the state and thus willing to expose miscreants and wrongdoers?
