# FUNDING BID TO SAVE NEW GALLOWAY SHOP

A bid has been made to the Big Lottery Growing Community Assets fund to buy the Hopkins shop in New Galloway which is facing closure.

The detailed funding application, submitted at the end of June, seeks funds to buy the shop and house and meet the cost of renovations and some of the initial operating

costs. As well as a community shop it is intended to create two self-catering flats and workshop space available for rent. Competition for this fund is extremely strong, with a 30% success rate. A response is expected by the end of August.

The bid has been made by New Galloway Community Enterprises (NGCE) Ltd, a community benefit society formed in June 2015. A community benefit society can trade commercially but all profits must be re-

invested in the community. A brief recruiting drive has already resulted in 75 members and the membership drive will continue if the application is successful.

The NGCE management committee - Helen Keron (chair) Sarah Parry (vice-chair) Margaret Watson (secretary) Jean Marsden (treasurer) David Briggs, Mike Brown, Emma Curtis and Dawn Spernagel - would like to thank everyone for their support, including Jim and Margaret Hopkins.

# Your Chance to Become a Community Councillor

In October 2015 communities in Dumfries and Galloway will have the opportunity to elect new members for their Community Council.

Community Councillors are local people elected by members of their community to represent their views on a wide variety of subjects such as planning applications, public transport, the environment, conservation and licensing matters.

Community Councils may be

involved with local projects and events, and many are in receipt of community windfarm benefits which are used to benefit their communities.

There are currently over 80 active Community Councils in Dumfries and Galloway and members for them must be nominated by the public. Anyone age 16 years or over, living in the Community Council area and registered to vote in local government elections, can be nominated for their Community Council and, if elected, training will be provided to enable people to fulfil their role.

There are some areas of the

region where there are no active Community Councils, but if there are sufficient people in one of those areas who are interested in developing one, support can be provided to set up a new Community Council.

The deadline for nominations is Friday 25 September and information about how to nominate people is on Dumfries & Galloway Council's website.

Advice and support to reestablish Community Councils will be provided by local Area Framework teams who may be contacted via the Council Contact Centre on 030 33 33 3000.

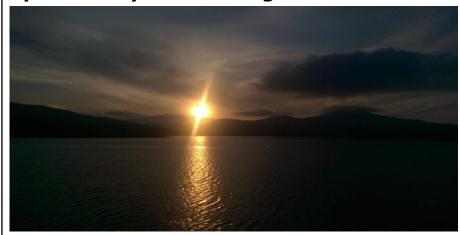
She has seen major changes over the years: the arrival of

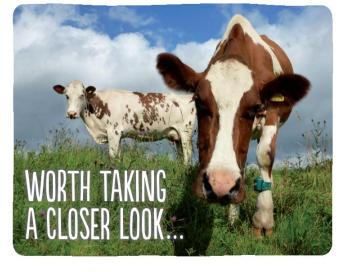
Community groups or businesses that are located

We are currently developing an interactive map on the Biosphere website which will have hyperlinks to supporters' websites and, for community groups, a link to a dedicated page. ## CatStrand Update

The essential repairs to the CatStrand building have proved to be more extensive than first anticipated as several further issues have been discovered as the work progressed.

However, everyone is working very hard to complete the reinstatement programme to allow CatStrand to re-open as soon as possible. At the moment we anticipate being able to open again by mid-September and are planning an exciting 'Welcome Back' Festival Weekend of events in October to celebrate being back home in our newly refurbished venue again. Please look out for details being announced on the website and in local media in due course.

We appreciate that the work has taken longer than initially hoped due to various circumstances beyond our control and we are working hard to minimise any further delay and we look forward to welcoming our many patrons and friends back to the building soon. In the meantime, we are extremely grateful to all of the other local venues for helping us to continue with most of our planned events and activities throughout this difficult period. To allow the staff to fully concentrate on planning the re-opening as effectively as possible, we have not arranged many events during August and September other than the regular classes and activities.

The repairs are progressing well and after the lengthy stripping-out and drying-out phase from January through to April, the re- plastering has now been completed and the toilets have been refitted. The

next stage will see the wooden floors re-laid, the kitchen installed and then the remaining floor coverings can be laid and decorating completed. A great deal of thought has gone into the planning of the re-fit and the opportunity has been seized to make some improvements to the fixtures and the layout where possible within the parameters allowed by our insurance company. We

hope you will agree that the 2015 version of CatStrand will be even better than the original!

In relation to the flooding problem, we instructed an independent Flood Risk Assessment and have also been working closely with Dumfries & Galloway Council and The Scottish

Flood Agency to find the best possible solution to prevent any future recurrence. A Caro flood barrier system is to be fitted to all of the vulnerable external doors around the building. In addition, as a result of the Flood Risk Assessment, various further preventative measures are being considered in relation to the Cat Strand burn itself. Our Flood Appeal has helped to meet some of the additional costs

not covered by insurance and we are extremely grateful to all who have contributed to the fund so far.

Everyone at CatStrand greatly appreciates the tremendous support and understanding shown since January and now at long last we can see the light at the end of the tunnel. We hope to see you in CatStrand soon!

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#### STRESS RELIEF THE **`SNOOPY** Never stress on what you can't control and

The American creator of the *Peanuts* comic strip, in which 'good ole' Charlie Brown and his philosophical pet beagle, Snoopy, starred, held the unique philosophy of "I am only going to dread one day at a time".

Despite his ability to produce comforting, feel-good cartoons, Schultz had regular panic attacks and would

often descend suddenly into a feeling

of 'impending doom.' Dread, panic attacks and doom can all be descriptions of what can be described in today's parlance as symptoms of stress.

Stress is the feeling of being under too much mental or emotional pressure. When you are up against something you find threatening, your body produces chemicals which enable you to become stronger and more alert - the so-called 'fight or flight' response. These were historically to survive physical threats, such as a stampede of wooly mammoths.

Our stress now is usually in response to something which negatively triggers our emotions and we don't know what to do. Maybe your manager is giving you a hard

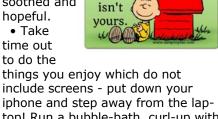
time at work or you really want to be able to say 'No' to someone, but every time you see them, you end up saying 'Yes'. If this keeps happening with no rest or relaxation, we start to experience the physical and emotional effects of stress.

Examples of these are headaches, stomach upsets, loss of libido, feeling overwhelmed, becoming moody and agitated, and avoiding people and situations.

The way we speak to ourselves greatly affects how we can deal with our responses. Research shows that if we are able to talk kindly and encouragingly to ourselves, our stress levels will reduce. Examples of such positive self-talk could be 'I can handle this' and 'I am doing

endorphins to help us feel calm, soothed and hopeful.

 Take time out to do the



include screens - put down your iphone and step away from the laptop! Run a bubble-bath, curl-up with a good book, day-dream out of the window, paint a picture; silence can really help.

- Drink more water: stay hydrated. For every cup of tea and coffee you have, drink half a cup to a cup of water. Cut down on the red wine!
- Get connected with others; join a group, catch-up with a friend, have a good belly laugh, volunteer. Find a way of being with others in a shared way.
- Take Snoopy's advice and accept the things you cannot control. Read *Peanuts* for more canine-inspired wisdom.

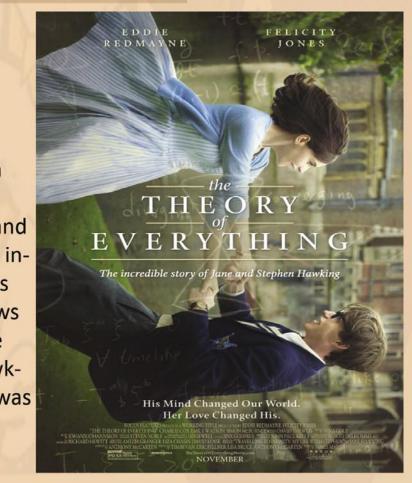

### **GLENKENS CAMP RESILIENCE**

The experience of camping outdoors has been linked with success and, throughout the Glenkens schools this year, we have been working at improving the outdoor experiences our young people have.

The primary schools have been working with the Ranger service and independently in a variety of outdoor learning locations - and responsible metal detecting at Carsphairn was a new venture. In the secondary school, we have been building confidence through a residential experience at the outdoor centre of Stronord. For young people transferring into Dalry's S1 there was camping on the school field, followed by a camp near Auchencairn and building towards expedition work for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

Not always warm and comfortable, but our young people have learnt that they are more resilient than they thought, that 3am is a cold time of night, that wood fires keep the midges off and that carrying a fully laden rucksack is hard work. The staff have been impressed by the enthusiasm and 'stickability' of young people.

Now we are starting younger, logically students should be more ambitious and we are excited to see how far they can get in the time they are with us.

**Life Savers:** Literacy, numeracy, health and wellbeing are the

cornerstones of young peoples' success and anything family, friends and schools can do to encourage them is priceless in the development of our young people. Reading to children of every age is so important in developing a community that reads. Let us take every opportunity for counting games, estimating and playing with numbers. Eating well, sleeping soundly and good exercise levels keep us well in mind and body - something we all need to aim for.

Young people are taught about these things in school but good habits are 'caught' not taught and so, as adults in the community, we must each play our part and try to give that good example.

However, things do go wrong and the secondary pupils have been finding out what to do when someone becomes unresponsive with no breathing or pulse. As part of the final days activities in school, the British Heart Foundation training manikins were used to make sure students and staff

have the basic skills for saving a life.

With the defibrillator installed at the Dalry Primary entrance for emergency use, what we need now is for every member of the community to be confident that they could step in and preserve life until the defibrillator is applied.

The best way to learn something is to teach it, so if any family would like their young person to bring home one of the training dummies, they should phone the school office and we will arrange for one to go home with them for a few nights. In this way we hope young people will reinforce their learning and develop a community skill that can help save lives until the emergency services can reach us.

In the interim, we hope everyone has a good and safe summer.

Senor Bladder woke us early this morning.

We had hobbled downstairs by 6.30am, glaring at the frost, the compacted frozen snow (which my rubber-tipped crutches easily slip upon) and snarling at the radio.

Later we sat with our coffee and waited. Not for anything in particular.

We just waited. This happens sometimes. Maybe we'll read a little, write a little, but generally just wait.

Yesterday I took Urg to the hospital. He had to get a change of clothes. A melodramatic technician removed his slab and replaced it with a sparkling green cast. Hard as nails and rather slippery.

The technician's first comment was that Urg had not been kept raised enough. He knew this because Urg's toes were still bruised; ("I told you so", said Urg).

Then the technician asked if I had hardwood floors or lino. "Yes", I answered. "When this dries", he said,

peering intently, even excitedly, into my eyes, "it will be very slippery!". I think he was smiling. "I guarantee," he continued, "absolutely guarantee!" (his eyes were widening gleefully), "that if you fall down you will break your leg right there!" He tapped my thigh. "Right there!" he repeated. "Really?" I answered. "'Oh, yes! Oh, yes!" he replied. But he wasn't done

yet; "Now..." (he was just finishing up the cast) "you cannot" – he stressed the word dramatically – "get this wet!" "No?" I enquired innocently. "No! If you get this wet you have five hours to get to the hospital!". "I do?" Said I. "Yes!" He replied fanatically, beginning to froth at the mouth. "If you don't, then the water will start a chemical reaction with the cast and it will ROT YOUR FLESH!" Holy

suffering zombies Batpiddle! This was crazy stuff! The consultant's eyes were bulging with excitement - he looked like Ben in the TV series *Lost*.

Urg and I fled the hospital in a state of nervous exhaustion, but at least it wasn't raining.

This morning we had a bath. Masochism, you say. Well, not quite. But very tense. A tense bath. After I'd run the water I dried the entire bathroom. Then we gingerly stepped in. Urg was way up there.

It's surprising how difficult it is to

bathe without splashing once, but I managed it. Then came the exit. Standing up I quickly dried my leg above the cast. I didn't want any water running down my body and onto the cast that way. I dried the rest of me and sat down.

Then it hit me! What if I sweat? Oh my God, no! Does this mean I'll have to give up my threesomes with the girls from the grocery store? What will we do for six days of the week? (We take Sundays off for tea). Urg and I had better go now. I think we are hallucinating. Perhaps I got water on the cast after all, and this is the first stage – HELP!!

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## **AIR CRASHES ON CORSERINE**

Corserine will be well known to most readers. Lying in Kells Parish, it is the highest hill of the Rhinns of Kells at a height of 814 metres or 2,670 feet if you prefer.

In a little over eight years, five separate aircraft crashed on this hill resulting in a loss of 16 lives.

On 9 January 1939, Avro Anson serial L9153 left Prestwick on a Navigation Exercise (Navex) flight when it crashed into the Western Slope of Corserine near Downies Burn killing Flying Officer Iain Shields, Mr Norman Duff, Leading Aircraftman Gordon Betts and Leading Aircraftman Henry Briggs. The wreckage was found still smouldering the next day by shepherd William McCubbin. Meanwhile, Tiger Moth serial L6932 had set out from Prestwick to find the crashed Anson and, in poor weather, it crashed very close to the original crash site. However pilot Pete Barrow and his photographer escaped uninjured (this was on 10 January). Various pieces of wreckage remain at the crash sites.

23 October 1942 saw another Anson crash, this time just 150 metres North West of the summit of Corserine, Anson Serial DG787 was on a night Navex from Jurby on the Isle of Man when it failed to return. Two days later a Home Guard unit in the area notified RAF Wigtown of a crashed aircraft and a search and rescue team from Wigtown recovered the bodies of: Sergeant Joseph Millinger, Sergeant Charles Lunny, Sergeant Petr Haas (Czech) and Flight Lieutenant Vaclav Jelinek (Czech). The site was cleared of all large wreckage but some small burnt fragments can still be found.

On 20 January 1944, Mosquito serial DD795 was on a cross country training exercise from RAF High Ercall in Shropshire when it flew into high ground on the South Eastern side of Corserine near Scar of the Folk. Flight Sergeant Kenneth Mitchell and Flight Sergeant John Aylott were both killed. The Mosquito was known as the wooden wonder and most of the aircraft burnt in the crash, leaving very little remains. Immediately following the crash, the wreckage was covered with snow and despite four other aircraft searching for it along its route, it was not found until 11 February, some three weeks later. This wreckage was

also found by shepherd William McCubbin, who found the first crash five years earlier.

On 10 April 1947, a Belgian Air Force C47 (military version of the DC3 airliner) was on a ferry flight from Belgium to Prestwick with three passengers and a crew of three when it became lost in poor conditions and crashed just to the North of Corserine on Carlins Cairn. The men who died were Capt Roger Loyen, Adj Andre Dierickx, Adj Felix Curtis, Capt

Olivier Lejeune, Adj Michel Cardon and Adj Andre Rodrique. Little if any wreckage is to be found at the crash site although, like the other crash sites, the scar is still visible.

If you visit any of these sites, please be aware of the Protection of Military Remains Act, which makes it an offence to remove any wreckage from military crash sites without a licence. There are no local memorials to any of these crashes.

# Special Places around Balmaclellan

### THE HOLY LINN - Garple Burn

The Holy Linn is a natural and very beautiful amphitheatre with lovely flat rock underfoot and ledges and rocks to sit on in a semicircle facing the waterfall. It is surrounded by trees and in particular the oak trees which it is believed the early pre-Christian people revered. One can easily imagine their high priest beside the waterfall addressing the tribe. The Holy Linn is so unique and special these earlier peoples may have travelled many miles to attend.

#### ST JOHN'S CHAIR

St John's Chair is a river stone probably taken from the Garple Burn or the River Ken. Today sited at the top of Dalry, it may also have initially been used by pre-Christian priests at the Holy Linn in Balmaclellan, and certainly if he wished, a high priest would have ordered it moved for his use. The Novantae lived in this area for hundreds or possibly thousands of years and had control of all the resources of the land, long before any Romans and later Normans arrived.

#### THE HOLY CROFT

One day a few years ago I followed the Garple Burn, just a

little further on from the Holy Linn. I walked into a little sheltered holm, beside the Garple with sharply rising ground on the South West side, and which probably had trees growing on it in Covenanting times. I was very struck by the sense of hallowed peace there and felt a great reluctance to leave. I did not know about this place until I researched it afterwards. It is known as the Holy Croft and is shown on the first ordnance map survey of 1854.

#### **COVENANTING TIMES**

Sometime during the mid 17th Century a number of baptisms were taking place at the Holy Linn when the people were all dispersed by the dragoons. It was agreed to meet again a few days later at the shepherd's cottage at a certain time in the Holy Croft. An account of this happening is given in Pages 282-283, Lights and Shadows by John Barbour of Bogue, 1824; a very rare book. I feel sure this lovely place must also have been used by the earlier Celts for some of their own festivals and meetings.

#### RING CAIRNS OF THE EARLY PEOPLE ON GAVELS MOOR

On Thorniehill Farm near Balmaclellan there is a small field of ring cairns. They are between 3000 and 4000 years old. Ring Cairns are found on old uncultivated land always with the same shape and dimensions a ring of stones covered with grass with a stone-filled hollow at the centre of the ring. The hollow was probably used for a burial. The rings measure 25ft across and is 1ft high. These ring cairns were very well made, with care, and are proof of the existence of the early people in the area. Bill Blyth,

## **UPDATES ON TWO WARS**

#### Waterloo

Two hundred years ago, details were still arriving in the Glenkens of the great Battle at Waterloo, in present-day Belgium, which was fought on 18th June 1815. This was the last great battle before the advent of photography; news was slow to arrive because telephones, radio,

TV and telegraph had all yet to be invented, so all news had to be carried by messengers. This meant that reports of the battle travelled at the speed of a man on horseback at best.

History has not recorded the names of all those who fought nor even those who were killed but a few local connections include a gravestone in Crossmichael to

John Halliday, Sergeant in the 52nd Regiment of Foot who died in France in 1817 and therefore would have served at Waterloo. Captain Alexander Clark Kennedy of Knockgray (Carsphairn) was instrumental in the capture of the French eagle of the 105th Regiment at Waterloo. A little further afield a significant monument to the battle stands on a hill above New Abbey and a recent TV programme about the monument contains contributions by myself and

Margaret Heuchan

(former teacher at Dalry and Carsphairn schools and now Head Teacher at New Abbey). The programme is available online so use your favourite search engine to look for 'Border Life' and choose episode 69.

#### The Great War

The months of June, July and August 1915 saw one death reported from the Glenkens. Private James McLeod of the machine gun section, 6th Batallion Kings Own Scottish Borderers was killed on 10 July and is buried in Le Touret cemetery on the Western Front. He was born in Old Monkland, Lanark, and was the son of the late Mr W McLeod, Calder, Coatbridge, and the late Mrs McLeod of Kirkland Street, Dalry. Sadly he now seems to be unknown in the village and no photograph of him appears to have survived. He was just 22 years old when he was killed and his effects were sent to his brother William.

James is listed in the Stewartry Roll of Honour and on war memorials in Dalry and Dunscore. His death was reported in the Dumfries Standard of 21 July. ## ROBERT HERON: THOUGHTS ON EDUCATION



It is remarkable that very often, when reading literature from the past, a passage leaps out which could have been written yesterday.

By one such I was struck quite recently: "It is very surprising that the greater number of our young folk, after all the solicitude which is expressed about their education from the time when they enter the nursery, till they are dismissed from the

university, come out at last into the world, unable to speak their native language with any moderate copiousness of phraseology, or to write it with any tolerable share of correctness."

The writer was Robert Heron of New Galloway (1764-1807)

some 220 years ago. He blamed the phenomenon of educational failure on teaching methods, an excuse that is still current, at least among politicians, but now reinforced by the welter of electronic technology available to us kids of all ages.

Heron was born in New Galloway and educated at home. At age 11 he became a pupil-teacher and three years later he taught at Kelton school where he was said to have been too hard on his charges. In time he progressed to Edinburgh University where he studied for the Kirk but, having fallen in love with literature, he opted to earn his living by his pen. He wrote on many subjects including Scottish history and topography, poetry, politics, and geography, often translating works in other languages into English. Notoriously he was the author of the first Memorial of Robert Burns.

He contributed articles to the third edition of Encyclopaedia Britannica, a work conceived and published in Edinburgh. He believed that he published a wider range of articles in the periodical press than anyone else. His flaw was that whenever he made money he squandered it. The first volume of his massive Scottish History was written in debtors' prison and he died a pauper in London. I am currently engaged in a rehabilitation of this remarkable and undeservedly neglected individual, having just published the first modern reassessment of this son of the

Glenkens in the journal Review of Scottish Culture.

There can be little doubt that the Scottish Enlightenment, the great eighteenth century explosion of learning and enquiry of which Heron was a product, owed much to Scottish education, particularly as represented in the parish schools. The matter is controversial but education seems to explain how so many Scottish children from quite humble backgrounds became figures of national and international importance. Heron had interesting ideas on the subject, claiming that for twenty years he 'taught and assisted young persons, at all periods, in the course of education, from the alphabet to the highest branches of science and literature'. He believed that schoolchildren were bombarded with too many abstract ideas before they were able to understand them. He argued that the young should be encouraged

to describe some of the 'simple visible objects' that surround them. Having mastered such objects as flowers or trees they should then move to more complex items such as a herd of animals or a field which require more complex and inventive language. Such oral exercises would inform their literary skills as they learned to write. The big idea was to encourage the study of 'things' rather than words, visible objects rather than abstract relations and 'sentiments that cannot be represented before the eyes'.

To advance his theories he published almost one thousand pages

in two volumes entitled Elegant Extracts of Natural History in 1792 comprising selections of good literature by a wide range of distinguished authorities, describing the Earth, the Human Species, quadrupeds, birds, fish, insects, vegetables and fossils. He thought

that such topics might appeal in particular to pupils in country schools on the principle that learning is about moving from the known to the novel. He expressed the hope that boys of all ages, 'who read with a view to amusement and instruction, without aspiring to extensive science or profound erudition would find the extracts useful'. He presumably did not endear himself to feminists of a future age when he added that he would indeed recommend his work even to ladies 'did I not bethink me, how brutish it would be, to suppose, that ladies should read anything, save billets doux (love letters) and novels'!
