SHOP REOPENING HERALDS VILLAGE REVIVAL

There can be no more visible - and welcome - sign of the recovery of Carsphairn from the devastating floods at the end of last year than the reopening of the village shop on Wednesday, 13 July.

A preview of the new-look shop was given to local residents at a wine and hors d'oeuvres party on the eve of opening its doors for business once again.

For the preceding six months, the shop had been running a restricted service from the village hall - selling a reduced product

range and limited hot and cold takeaway food - while the shop premises were completely gutted and reinstated after the flood.

But now the remodelled premises boast extended lines ranging from the basic food necessities and fresh fruit and

vegetables to local crafts and gifts. A new addition to the choice is specialist produce from local suppliers.

"Many of the fittings in the kitchen, tearooms and shop are brand new, reflecting a fresh start to our business all over again. Our reopening marks a new dawn for the community which was so badly hit in the floods on 30 December last year."

sit and have a hearty breakfast or just a cup of tea and a cake.Lindsay went on: "The tearooms are now a much nicer place in which to enjoy a chat and coffee with friends, whether locals or tourists. It's now the community hub that has been lacking in Carsphairn since the pub closed many years ago. There's really no other place to meet up in the village."

The extended tearooms are complemented by an outdoor garden at the rear where visitors and residents can while away the hours in a picturesque setting.

"We are able to take group bookings and small coach parties and we are now planning to put on afternoon teas on Sundays," Lindsay added. "The business is already showing a vast improvement in turnover. Paul and I are thrilled.

"We would like to thank members of the past and present shop committee for their help and support during what has been a very difficult time and also the hall management committee for the use of their facilities while the shop was being refurbished."

Although there are many properties

Rare Rhinoceros Beetle Photographed in Glenkens

Local photographer Duncan McNaught caught this little critter on camera by his home in Glenlee.

He was later informed by the Dumfries & Galloway Environmental Resources Centre that this is only the fourth ever recorded in the whole of the region. "This particular day I was out with my camera looking to get some macro shots of insects and flowers, etc," said Duncan.

"Down along by my local burn at Glenlee I noticed a very tiny beetle perched on a fence post and thought I must try get a shot of it. Being so small it was not going to be easy. However, I do like a challenge when it comes to my photography! So I took several shots and then went on the hunt for more beasties."

At this point Duncan had no idea how special this little guy would turn out to be.

"I came home, processed the image and posted the shot on a local wildlife page. The lady who runs the site then contacted me and advised me that it was a very rare rhinoceros beetle and I should report it to the Dumfries & Galloway Environmental Resource centre."

An interesting fact about rhinoceros beetles is that they are apparently the strongest animals on the planet, proportionally, they can lift up to 850 times their own weight. To put this into perspective, if a human of average height and weight had the strength of the rhinoceros beetle, it would be able to lift a 65 ton object!

GALLOWAY GLENS OPPORTUNITIES

Groups and individuals in the Glenkens have until September 2 to lodge ideas for projects to be funded by the Galloway Glens Landscape Partnership scheme (GGLP).

Previous editions of the Gazette have highlighted that the GGLP has provisionally secured £2.7million from the Heritage Lottery Fund to be spent on projects from Carsphairn, through the Glenkens and down to Castle Douglas and Kirkcudbright bay. The projects must 'connect people with their heritage' and encourage sustainable communities. At a recent meeting of The Glenkens Story local history

GGLP's development officer. explained that initial development funding has been received from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) allowing a number of specialist studies to be commissioned. These include a heritage skills audit, and an exploration of ways of addressing species loss and challenges to biodiversity. Another study is exploring natural flood management opportunities in the area, "reconnecting rivers with their river beds."

These specialist studies will inform the list of projects to be supported but the GGLP is also keen to hear suggestions directly from individual and local groups. Initial ideas already received from the Glenkens include proposals to reconnect and advertise heritage footpaths, publicity initiatives to highlight what the natural landscape

has to offer and innovative uses of community buildings to display and engage visitors in the heritage of the area. McNabb made it clear that he welcomes project proposals from any individual or group, contributions to be received an a single sheet application form by September 2. The meeting identified a number of concerns. These included: who would co-ordinate numerous local proposals into a coherent plan for the Glenkens; who would administer any grant if awarded and who would supply maintenance funding for projects in the longer term. A critical

factor identified

by the meeting is the requirement that any funding from the HLF must be supported by matching funding supplied by the applicant. It is one thing for large organisations such as the Forestry Commission and the National Trust to source other funds though already some proposals depending on matching funding from EU agencies could be in doubt - but this could be a major obstacle for smaller groups. While volunteer effort could count as 'funding in kind' it was pointed out that volunteers were already in short supply in the Glenkens. McNabb has acknowledged these concerns and is keen to work with groups to overcome them, stressing that the scheme was not restricted to the more professional, national organisations.

Throughout the summer a series of free events will be held to illustrate the range of projects that could potentially be supported. These will be advertised though a number of media outlets and on the scheme's new website, www.gallowayglens.org, which also gives an overview of the background to the GGLP and what it is trying to

Planning Permission for Shop Project

Efforts to save New Galloway's last remaining general store have cleared another hurdle.

New Galloway Community Enterprises Ltd have secured planning permission for the conversion of the existing shop, house and outbuildings into the proposed community shop and self-catering tourist flats.

Meanwhile work is reaching completion on the grant application to purchase the property, complete the renovation and contribute to the first few years of operation. This will be submitted to the Big Lottery's "Growing Community Assets" fund in the course of August and a result is expected by the end of the year.

Included in the extremely detailed 90-page submission are the results of the latest survey of local opinion gathered at meetings and events throughout the village. Emma's Wild Eats

August/September

The Boletus edulis, known as the porcini mushroom in Italy and the cep in France, is more familiar to us here in the UK as the 'penny bun' - and when you see one you'll know why.

The cap is quite convincingly like a baked bun, complete with floured top. The texture of the flesh is firm and satisfying, not slimy, and the flavour is disgusting. Alright, it's delicious, but please don't pick them all!

Boletes are the group of mushrooms with pores rather than gills (the underside of the mushroom looks like a sponge), and these include a lot of really good edible species that are relatively easy to identify, none better than the 'penny bun'.

Key identifying features:

- Pale chestnut brown cap, with a fine white rim and rounded shape, matt when dry. Grow to over 20 cm diameter, but you usually find them at around 10 cm.
- Pores rather than gills, whitecream and hard when young, darkening and becoming more spongy as the mushroom ages.
- Almost white to pale tan, very rotund, bulbous stipe (stem), with

distinctive white net-like reticulation. This does not stain blue when cut as many other Boletes do, some very suddenly and quite magically.

- The overall shape is a good aid to identification as few other mushrooms are quite as sturdy.
- As usual, companion species and location are helpful. Ceps often grow in the same areas as fly agaric mushrooms (the classic red and white spotted toadstools of fairytale fame) and always around trees, often spruce.

It would be possible to confuse the bitter bolete (tylopilus felleus) with the cep, but it has a dark network on its stipe (which is more elongated) and a pink tinge to the gills. Although not poisonous, it tastes very bitter and unpleasant. If you're unsure if it's one or the other, you can taste a tiny piece of the flesh to check.

It's really worth researching the other boletes to be sure which you can eat; none are deadly but some can make you very sick. Even less perfect boletes are great dried and powdered to use as stock.

Following a couple of simple rules can ensure that you pick the right boletes:

- Don't pick it if it has bright red or yellow pores.
- Don't pick it if it stains blue when you cut the flesh.

Unfortunately this rules out quite a few edibles too, but it's a good basic guide. However, as always, don't trust just me - consult at least three guides and be 100% sure of what you pick before you eat it.

JANET'S KNITTING JOURNEY IN PRINT

Knit 1 Bike 1: 818 miles, 21 workshops and a lot of cake – and now a book...

You may recall reading about Janet's proposed Knit 1 Bike 1 project in the Spring 2015 Issue of the Gazette. In this edition, Janet gives an update, having completed her cycle journey, written a book about the experience and having also finished some of the associated art work.

So what is Knit 1 Bike 1? It is essentially an art project, which began because textile artist Janet Renouf-Miller of Create With Fibre, loves both knitting and cycling. So she set off from Dalmellington at the end of June 2015 on a tenweek cycling and knitting journey round Scotland.

She delivered 21 mini workshops on the way and cycled 818 miles, going where the workshops took her. She came home via the Glenkens and spent her final night at Hawkrigg caravan site between Dalry and Carsphairn.

Not only that, but Janet knitted and crocheted what she saw on the way. In fact she is still knitting and crocheting the things she saw and when all the work is finished, it will form an exhibition, the first showing of which will be at the Borders Textile Tower House in Hawick and it will then tour, including a visit to the Glenkens.

Janet has crocheted things like the Glenfinnan Viaduct, which was featured in the Sunday Post, the Isle of Mull Ferry,

a cooked breakfast, worms, midges and much more. She was interviewed on Radio Scotland by both the Janice Forsyth Show and the Kaye Adams Show and the story of the trip was recounted in a number of local newspapers around Scotland.

The Knit 1 Bike 1 book is a lighthearted account of the trip and

Air Crashes Around Loch Doon

Following an article last year about the air crashes on Corserine, I thought that readers might be interested in the air crashes around Loch Doon.

Although two of the three crashes in this area were wartime crashes, the third was within memory of many residents, being a fatal crash in 1975.

On 24 October 1941, Spitfire mark IIA serial P7540 left RAF Ayr (Heathfield) on a training flight. It was reported that the pilot made a low pass over Loch Doon but as he banked away, a wing caught the surface which caused the aircraft to crash into the loch. The pilot was F/O Frantisek Hekl of 312 Czech Squadron RAF. Although the RAF searched for the aircraft and pilot at the time, no trace was found. In 1977 a serious search for the aircraft began by members of the Dumfries Sub-Aqua club and other clubs working with the Dumfries & Galloway Aviation Museum. It would take five years before the aircraft was finally located and recovered by experts operating under a RAF licence. The search involved 567 dives by 109 individual divers. The aircraft


has been partially restored and is now on display together with documentation including a photograph of the pilot at the Dumfries & Galloway Aviation Museum. On 18 March 1944, Hurricane mark IV serial LD564 was on a navigation exercise (NAVEX) from RAF Ayr (Heathfield) piloted by F/O Roswell

Murray MacTavish of 439 (Tiger) Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Force. The aircraft was flying at 3,300 feet when, for reasons that have not been discovered, it descended steeply through clouds and impacted the ground, killing the pilot. F/O MacTavish was 24 years old and came from Vancouver. British Columbia. He is buried in Ayr Cemetery. Remains of the aircraft can still be seen in a firebreak in the forest.

On 28 September 1975, Piper Cherokee serial G-BATP was flying over the Glenkens with the pilot and three passengers on board. The plane was en route from Prestwick to Blackpool when it struck high ground at Bow Hill, Carsphairn, killing all on board. A plaque commemorating the crash is fixed to a rock at this very remote site.

If you visit any of these sites, please be aware of the Protection of Military Remains Act, which makes it an offence to remove any wreckage from military crash sites without a licence. The Piper Cherokee crash site is the only one with a memorial.

War Updates: June & July 1916

June 1916 was a relatively quiet month in terms of the war but we still saw the tragic death of Alex Nielson from Dalry.

Having emigrated to Canada in 1914, Nielson was serving with the Canadians at the time of his death. As his mother was living in Dalbeattie, his name appears on the Dalbeattie as well as the Dalry war memorials.

The battle of the Somme commenced on 1 July with tremendous loss of life on both sides on the first day of battle. By good fortune the men of the Glenkens all survived that first day, but their luck didn't last and deaths were reported in July from all four Glenkens parishes.

On 9 July Alfred Tait of Dalry was killed by the explosion of an enemy mine at Hulloch and is commemorated on the Loos memorial.

Joseph McCulloch of Main Street,

Dalry, was also killed in July at the age of just 19. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval memorial. It is clear from the dates he served that he lied about his age and was underage when he enlisted and also when he went overseas in January 1915.

Robert McWhirter of Old Glenlee, New Galloway, was killed on 19 July at 20 years of age. Prior to enlistment he had been a shepherd at Bennan Farm, New Galloway Station. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval memorial.

George Counter of the Salutation Hotel, Carsphairn, was another

July death with no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval memorial.

Alexander McAdam was born in Balmaclellan (the grandson of the local schoolmaster) and served his apprenticeship as a painter in Dumfries before moving to Edinburgh. He was 30 years old when he was killed on 21 July and is remembered on the Dumfries war memorial and the St Michael's church memorial in Dumfries as well as on the Balmaclellan memorial. He was also listed on the (now lost) Dumfries Painters' memorial which was unveiled in the Globe Hotel, Dumfries.

James Good of Dalry was killed on 30 July and, with no known grave, is commemorated on the Thiepval memorial. *Paul Goodwin*

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

What's in a Name?



to all of you who responded to my last contribution wherein I requested suggestions about the location of the place-name, Holm of Dawhernyn.

Although I have been up to the head of Water of Ken several times I completely forgot about the Holm of Dalquhairn. Mea culpa! Apologies to all concerned for my doititness! I should have cast my net wider, which is the

responsibility of all good historians. My search for the name was too narrow and restrictive.

A holm, as you will know, describes an extent of low ground beside a river, sometimes rendered as howm or haugh. The word derives from Old Norse holmr meaning a small island, a word that passed into Scots via Middle English, 'holme'. In the past, such sites were greatly valued by farmers. John Gillespie, minister of Kells, perceptively described the holm at the head of Loch Ken as 'perhaps one of the richest spots in Scotland', because it was inundated several times in winter and spring. 'Like the Nile it leaves behind it the salts, oils, and fat earths' carried down by the river, so that 'many acres produce 300 stone of natural hay and the arable is fertile in proportion'.

The downside was that if the

did, crops could be destroyed. In view of our own recent experiences with flooding here in Glenkens it is interesting to note that the reporters in the Old Statistical Account for the parishes of Dalry and Crossmichael stated that 'in some places, earthen banks or mounds have been erected, are erecting, or may be erected with advantage', but by whom, unfortunately, is not recorded.

There are actually two Dalquairns, Upper and Nether, doubtless at one time a ferme toun with a not insignificant population. Dalquhairn is

> locally pronounced Dawhurn, which is guite close to the sixteenth-century spelling: Dawhernyn, Dal is Gaelic for field or place, while the second element refers to the cairn, south of the farms. There are different types of cairn. Those on hilltops invite visitors to heighten them by placing a stone on the pile - "a chuckie for the cairn". Some are on the open moor as waymarkers. This cairn is a prehistoric grave, where a flat bronze axehead was found.

> Rev David Bartholomew points out that the road beyond Dalguhairn leads to Sanguhar and thus would have provided an entry to the Glenkens for The Earl of Moray in 1568, or for government dragoons hunting

seventeenth-century. He also notes the Whigs' Hole on Altry Hill, a hiding place used by the 'suffering bleeding remnant', trying to avoid state persecution.

North of Dalquhairn at the head of the glen is The Lorg: hill, burn, cottage and bridge. Could the name be associated with Gaelic lorg, which means both a shepherd's staff and a footprint? Nearby place-names provide a guide to the local fauna. Hawk's Craig, Corby (crow) Craig, two Glede (kite) Craigs, Cow Knowe, Hare Cleugh and Ewe Hill. The 'what'

> in Alwhat Hill refers to wildcats as does Dalwhat to the east.

There must be a story behind the intriguing 'Sour Snout' the nose-shaped part of Altry Hill. Back in the day the place would

not have seemed as remote as it does now since it linked Nithsdale and the Glenkens. Now, when the glen feels like a place of the past, it is salutary to note the presence of the wind farm on Windy Standard, surely a current (and contentious) symbol of modernity. At the south end of the glen the Forestry Commission recently spent £1.2 million pioneering a new method of strengthening the road for previously destructive timber traffic.

THE SHOW DAY

I jumped out of bed and throwing the skylight wide I could hear the bleating and braying of the animals as they were herded into their pens in the park and the back park.

The show day had already begun! As an only child growing up in New Galloway, I loved the day of the Glenkens Show when it seemed to me that the whole place came alive with farmers and friends meeting and greeting, laughing, chatting and

shaking hands.

After breakfast I ran to the park to meet my friends and admire the animals, spruced and groomed by their owners in the hope of a prized rosette.

The air was filled with the country smells of horses, cattle, sheep, straw and sawdust as the judges poked and prodded the creatures checking for the qualities required for a champion beast. The

horses were my personal favourites. My Mum made a huge pot of broth in case of visitors and filled the tins

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BATTLE OF THE SOMME CENTENARY

In line with other events nationally on 1 July, acts of remembrance were held at the War Memorials in Balmaclellan, Dalry and New Galloway to commemorate the first day of the Battle of the Somme in 1916.

At 7.30am on July 1, 1916 the battle was launched with three blows

on a whistle. The fighting continued for five months with over 1 million soldiers from both sides killed. Exactly 100 years later, at 7.30am, the local men who died in the battle were remembered with thoughts and prayers. One of those attending reported that: "the dead were remembered, albeit in a very quiet way which perhaps they would have preferred to the noise and horror of the Somme".

Remembered in the Glenkens

Scotland's only civic memorial to ordinary soldiers who died in the Crimean War was the first stop on the latest history field trip undertaken by The Glenkens Story project.

A tour of the war memorials in two of the Glenkens parishes started at Balmaclellan where the party were shown the simple red sandstone monument to five local men who died in the 19th century conflict with Russia, immortalised in The Charge of the Light Brigade. Paul Goodwin of the Scottish Military History Group, who led the trip, explained that sometimes family memorials recorded officers lost in the war (there is one at Balmaclellan) and there were regimental memorials around the

country, but Balmaclellan was one of only five communities in Britain which had marked the loss of their own ordinary soldiers.

Members of the field trip saw no fewer than 18 memorials at six locations across the parishes of Kells and Balmaclellan. The visit included St Margaret's Church in New Galloway which houses numerous memorials including the plaque commemorating James Faed, the 15-year-old midshipman (and son of the landscape artist) who died after the sinking of HMS Goliath at Gallipoli. A relative of the dead sailor still sometimes attends the church on Armistice Sunday.

The New Galloway civic memorial includes the names of the four McCheyne brothers, a rare but far from unique instance of such a loss in one family. It also, unusually for a First World War memorial, includes the name of a nurse, Jane Nodwell, who died from illness acquired while

nursing wounded soldiers. Paul explained that each locality made up its own rules on who could be included. In some places such a case would have been excluded. Kells parish obviously displayed a more inclusive spirit, as did Balmaclellan where the memorial bears the name of one soldier who died from his injuries five years after the First World War ended.

Some of the participants were viewing the names of their own relatives. Avril Bridgeman of New Galloway told the group about her two great uncles, the McGaw brothers, whose name appears on the Kells memorial. The Glenkens Story is an informal group of local history enthusiasts. Our next Field Trip will be a full-day event on Saturday 3 September when Dr David Bartholomew will lead a tour of Covenanting sites in the Glenkens. 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business can inevitably be a bit 'dry', but usually there are interesting and worthy projects desperately in need of volunteer support like community resilience. Ultimately it is all about making your community a better place to live, work and play.
