FILM STAR COMES TO DALRY

Dalry is in for a feast of cinema and music on Saturday 8 February when accordionist Neil Sutcliffe, star of *Dirt Road to Lafayette*, will be present at a local showing of the film.

The film will be shown in Dalry Town Hall followed by a ceilidh where he will be performing with his mother, Jo Miller, who grew up in Dalry, and his father, Steve Sutcliffe.

Dirt Road to Lafayette also stars Scottish actor David Hayman and was scripted by Booker Prize winner James Kelman. After his mother's death teenager Murdo (played by Neil) travels to Alabama with his grieving dad. Though an accomplished accordion player, Murdo

has rejected music since the death while his father is buried in grief and has turned away from his son. However, a chance encounter by Murdo with a new form of music eventually heals the family's wounds.

Andrew Mellor, who has seen Neil perform recently, said: "I was astounded...if I hadn't seen his fingers moving with my own eyes I would have

thought that there was some sort of trick photography involved!"

Neil (20) is already an accomplished musician and studies at the Glasgow Conservatoire. Jo says that they will be playing some traditional Scottish tunes at the ceilidh and there will also be an American influence, reflecting the film's setting. Jo will guide dancers through the intricacies of the Cajun Two Step.

Jim Reid of the the Dalry Film Club adds that this is an evening not to be missed: "We are enormously pleased to have been selected by Cinema For All to show this film, particularly with the local connection of its lead actor and family. Neil will also be available to answer audience questions about his film-making experiences.

"The ceilidh afterwards will bring together three of the stars of the Dalry Hogmanay Ceilidh for an encore performance which will set the Town Hall ablaze with dance once again".

Life Membership for Brass Bandsman

Carsphairn resident
Nigel Martin has
been awarded a Life
Membership medal by
the Scottish Brass Band
Association (SBBA)
for almost 60 years of
service to banding.

Nigel, who plays cornet and flugelhorn with Kilmarnock Concert Brass, first picked up a cornet at the age of 11 at school in Bury, Lancashire. He joined the Besses o' th' Barn Boys Band in Whitefield, Manchester, in 1964 before returning to join his hometown band, Irwell Forge, three years later where he progressed to become the band's principal cornet.

In 1987 Nigel relinquished the 'top man' position to take up flugelhorn, an instrument with which he has since had a long association.

Moving house to the Rossendale Valley in 1992, he joined the Goodshaw Band and then the Haslingden and Helmshore Band, helping it to move up from Fourth to First Section in the contesting ranks.

Nigel and his wife Kath frequently holidayed in the south-west of Scotland and often went along to Dumfries Town Band rehearsals and engagements. Eventually the lure became too strong and they moved to Carsphairn, soon becoming involved at Dunaskin Doon Band in Ayr.

Following a short illness in 2018, Nigel moved to Kilmarnock Concert Brass and he continues to help bands all over the country, offering his time and expertise.

Nigel said: "The medal means so much to me and I shall wear it with pride at every brass event I attend in the future. I acknowledge that most of my banding career has been in England but since my arrival in Scotland 11 years ago, my enjoyment of banding has

been heightened by the friendliness and camaraderie of the Scottish brass community.

"I still thoroughly relish putting my experience to good use in helping and encouraging younger and less able players to achieve their potential."

CatStrand Youth Players Spring Programme

The Youth Players will once again be entering the Scottish Community Drama Association 'One Act Festival', this year with *Selfie* by Canadian playwright Bradley Hayward.

The group staged the play before in 2014 at CatStrand soon after it was written. As it was the first time it had been staged outside Canada - that performance was the official UK Premiere of the play! This time around, the current senior group will perform the play at The Fullarton in Castle Douglas as part of the Stewartry District Youth Festival and will be competing against five other entries to earn the right to represent the Stewartry District at the West of Scotland Youth Final in Dunoon in April.

Selfie is a contemporary play, very relevant to teenage life today. It is senior year for the eight characters featured and problems are mounting for them as they prepare for the future. As they document their year, one click at a time, they come to realise that life is not about what other people see – it is about the pictures they have of themselves.

Zoe Kirkpatrick and Eilidh Thomson are our longest serving and most experienced members, having been taking part in our plays and pantomimes since they were both 10 years old! They no longer qualify as 'youths' and this time will enter the Open Festival, competing against three other adult teams all hoping to secure a place at the next round in Greenock. They will star in a two-hander called Henna Night by Amy Rosenthal. A cleverly written dark comedy, it tells the story of Judith who has left her exboyfriend a desperate message on his answerphone saying that she is not coping with their break-up.

She has bought some razor blades and some henna to either slash her wrists or dye her hair...However, it is the new girlfriend, Ros, who hears the message and rushes to Judith's bedsit.

Both of these plays will be on stage at The Fullarton on Friday 6 March and they will be performed again at CatStrand on the evening of Friday 20 March.

On the same bill at CatStrand will be a third play from the younger Youth Players group. Ernie's Incredible Illucinations is a bright comedy by the famous playwright Alan Ayckbourn. Ernie is a dreamer with a vivid imagination and extraordinary powers, his thoughts have the disconcerting habit of turning into reality with hilarious and unlikely consequences.

(SWANC) is a wonderful
local group which hosts
interesting discussions
on nature, wildlife and
the environment.

Talks are held at the Ken Bridge Hotel with the option of a relaxed pre-talk dinner. Speakers are excellent, and it's well worth popping along if you spot a topic of interest to you.

On Thursday 20 February the discussion will be titled What Can I Do About the Climate Emergency? Garry Charnock will be there to talk about how a village in Cheshire set out to become England's first carbon-neutral village. Still on that journey after ten years, Ashton Hayes now connects like-minded communities around the world. Residents saved an average of 24% on their energy use, with some saving 50%. Emissions from air travel and car use reduced by at least 35%. And in addition to the carbon savings, the community started a woodland, a

community shop, a playground and a community energy company that makes the primary school carbon-negative in summer. Sounds like some really valid potentials for the Glenkens in there... Also, Garry will discuss how best to heat your house without using fossil fuel, with an audience discussion on what techniques have worked for different people.

Next, on Thursday 19 March, the topic will be Wonderful Places for Wildlife. Lee Schofield from RSPB's Haweswater Reserve will show us that it's not just far-away places -Knepp estate (Sussex) and Glen Feshie (Perthshire) - who are pioneering new ways to care for the land, but there are some interesting examples right on our doorstep. There are a lot of conservation terms banded about at the moment - 'wilding', 'rewilding', 'ecosystem service provision', 'saltus' (letting land lie fallow for a generation)... we hear lots of talk about public goods and how farming might change, but here's a chance to hear from landholders who have prioritised public water supplies, flooding and wildlife alongside (or ahead) of livestock production. Lee will



explain how the RSPB has altered their management at Haweswater, and what has happened since.

Talks start 7.30pm, followed by discussion and debate, at the Ken Bridge Hotel - everyone is welcome, and the entry cost is £2. Or why not come along at 6pm and join members of SWANC, other audience members and the speaker for a pub supper?

SWANC (South West Association of Nature Conservationists) was once part of the British ANC), but is now a less organised, informal rural network. There is no formal membership, but if you want to join the e-group, please send email addresses to mas@craigfarm.co.uk. New talk organisers/suggestions always welcome.



We are looking for a volunteer to travel round the loch, identify stopping places and record the signage there, compiling this into a single document to allow the Trust to start planning the next steps.


Any volunteer would be supported by members of the **Loch Ken Trust** in this task and all expenses would be paid.

Salmon Study on the River Dee

Covering an area of 1050 km2, the River Dee is one of the largest river systems in the Solway and has a rich variety of habitats and species including some of Scotland's best known.




Under water, there cannot be a more a more iconic species than the Atlantic salmon, a colonising fish that will have entered the river during the start of the current inter glacial period. Atlantic salmon, salmo salar, (and sea trout, salmo trutta) colonised all northern Europe, taking advantage of the relative safety of freshwater for rearing their young before

taking the gamble of descending into the food-rich but predator abundant sea. The abundance of these fish was truly amazing with millions of fish arriving at British coasts year after year. This abundance did not go without notice and early human settlers will have harvested the fish in huge numbers, an annual bonanza that was probably enjoyed by brown bear, wolf and other long-gone British wildlife. As we settled into farming this bonanza continued to remain important and on the Dee, like any other watercourse on these islands, the now pastoral community will have fished the river with traps and nets to get a harvest of fish, probably salted and smoked for use after the salmon run had passed. Salmon were and are an

> incredibly resilient species but when we industrialised, they were unable to cope with the resultant pollution and barriers in many rivers and soon disappeared.

> Salmon remained abundant on the River Dee until the arrival of the Galloway hydro scheme. Planning and regulation for such structures was often very poor, the drive for industry was all important and we did not realise what we were losing. Fish passage was provided but with little understanding of how this worked

Vaki Riverwatcher Annual Salmon Up Counts





often it provided poor performance. Over time it has been recognised that the hydro-scheme needs to change some of its practices and a very good working relationship has been created with local fishery interests. Initiatives have been put in place to help salmon over the last few years with significant investment from the power companies. Counters on the river indicated that we had a reasonably stable population and work was apace to find ways of increasing the population over time.

Despite this good work other factors around the whole of the country have put even more pressure on this population. Around Scotland, salmon numbers are so low in many areas that fisheries are no longer either viable or desirable. The annual run of fish into the Dee has collapsed from around a thousand fish to less than one hundred. This puts the species on a collision course for extinction.

At the Galloway Glens Scheme, we are committed to helping our partners at the Galloway Fishery Trust find where the remaining fish are and to introduce programmes to help bolster their numbers. It is true that many of the issues may well be out of local control but by identifying where the best habitat is, where the habitat can be improved, and what that improvement is we will try and reverse this trend. It will be a long time before we have a viable salmon fishery in the river but we must try everything to make sure we do not lose the king of fish from our waters. Nick Chisholm

THE GARDEN SPOT

Pears are normally thought of as being from warmer climes but there are a few tried and tested Scottish varieties.

Why not plant a couple of trees? You will need two compatible varieties for pollination so how about 'Green Pear of Yair' and 'Fair Maid'? An old gardener I once knew (long since gone to a larger garden) once said to me that "optimists plant pears, you plant them for the next generation". You may have heard a version of this "Walnuts and pears, you plant for your heirs".

In contrast, how about a much faster maturing crop. I am thinking of shallots. A more subtle taste than onions, easier to grow and they preserve well as pickled onions. March is the perfect time to plant sets (small bulbs) but April is not too late. Then do nothing to them except keep them free of weeds and perhaps water them if we have a drought (what? - in the Glenkens!). They will be ready to harvest in July or possibly early August, whenever the top growth turns yellow and falls over.

But, back to the present, apart from the usual tidying in the garden, make sure that your Wisteria is pruned back to two or three buds on all of last year's growth, don't prune them back to the main stem because those 2 or 3 buds are where your flowers come from. And if you have any restorative pruning to be done to hedges etc, now is the perfect time – before the birds start to nest; cut back one side of the hedge (and the top) as hard as you like, but leave the other side until next year.

If your garden is lacking colour, at any time of year, then - at the time it needs colour, go around to nearby private or public gardens, see what looks good, find out what it is and vow to add that to your own garden for next year. As a starting point, try Daffodil 'February Gold' to have daffs in flower before anyone else or, Japanese Anemone or Chrysanthemum if you need something in flower in October. To get earlier flowers than usual, plant in a sheltered spot - for example, I have snowdrops under a hedge that were showing white buds on

11 January, much earlier than others nearby.

And what am I doing in the garden at the moment? Well, the weather is foul so I am sowing chilli seeds in the warm to grow on the kitchen windowsill and ordering bedding plants for a summer display.

A final tip? If you grow fruit or vegetables and have limited space don't waste time growing things that you can buy in the supermarket but instead grow varieties that money just can't buy, such as: potatoes 'pink fir apple', any variety of fresh runner bean, cos lettuce, strawberry 'Cambridge Favourite' and any thin skinned variety of tomato such as `Sungold'. 

Youth Transport Initiative

'Get On It' is a transport initiative project designed to look at potential solutions for the youth of the area to be more mobile.

Young people have said that this is the biggest aspect of living here that they wish they could change, adding to isolation & mental health issues, impacting employment, learning and socialising and preventing young people in the area from feeling like they can make a success of their lives in the area.

Funded by Big Lottery Year of Young People funding & The Holywood Trust for young people in the Stewartry area of D&G, the initiative has brought together young people from the Glenkens, Kirkcudbright, Castle Douglas and Gatehouse of Fleet to dig deeper into the issues around transport for them and to design a pilot service that aims to address some of these issues.

After numerous consultations and lots of planning, they have decided to run two return bus routes on a Sunday, since there is a lack of public provision on this day. The first bus goes from Dalry to Kirkcudbright via New Galloway, Crossmichael, Clarebrand and Castle Douglas. The second route is a loop from Castle Douglas which stops at Gelston, Rhonehouse, Bridge of Dee, Twynholm, Gatehouse of Fleet, Borgue and Kirkcudbright. Both buses will run until 23 February, after which we will break and evaluate

the services before launching our second pilot a few weeks later. At the end of this project, young people will report their findings to local council representatives and transport providers in order to impact decision making.

The buses offer a free route for young people aged 12+. More information on using the bus and booking seats can be found on www.catstrandyouth.co.uk/getonit.


The show was a great success with glowing reviews from the audiences, thanks to everyone who came along to support us once again.

Landscape Partnership

As the days start to lengthen, our thoughts turn to Galloway Glens plans for 2020. Many of our projects are well underway now, and hopefully you've had chance to join in some of them and make some new connections with our amazing local heritage.

We're approaching the end of Year 2 of Delivery, so there's just over 3 years to go, and already some of our projects have made a very real difference to the Glenkens area. The GCAT Smiddy in Balmaclellan opened its doors last year, as did the Crossmichael Heritage Hub – both great new additions to our community infrastructure. The Carsphairn Heritage Group have made amazing progress in archiving their records, and the archive is already being accessed by people from as far afield as Canada. You can access it here: carsphairn.org/CarsphairnArchive – hop over and have a browse!

The Glenkens Mens' Shed in Balmaclellan has a fantastic new cold-metal working department – there's so much to do and see there, it's well worth a visit too. Coming along this year will be the upgrades to the Dalry Town Hall, allowing some of their wonderful heritage to be put on display and explained.

We have been working hard on upgrading The Pack Road from Carsphairn to Polmaddy and we will be finishing this and adding some fascinating interpretation of the route's history this year, including an explanation of the place names that are found along its route. When the weather improves, why not plan a walking day out?!

After the great success of our Outdoor Education weeks last summer, Go Wild will be back for 2020 – P6 and P7 pupils should look out for that in the spring.

We are also extending this through a pilot scheme of Outdoor Learning in Kells School, New Galloway, where the children will get to experience more of our amazing natural and cultural heritage. LING has been a great partner in this, from sessions on local history in New Galloway Town Hall to monthly visits to the walled garden at Garroch.

Business Academy is also continuing, but with a different focus this year – the 2020 programme will offer 5-session training courses to small and medium-sized local businesses who are interested in growing their social media presence. Ken Words also continues to go from strength to strength – you'll have seen their Crossing Words section in here, and the regular Writers Café in The Smiddy in Balmaclellan is booming. GALLOWAY GLENS LOOKS FORWARD

Can You Dig It, our community archaeology project, had a great 2019 investigating local sites and sharing new skills. We will show off all our findings on a free bus tour of the Galloway Glens in April, which should be a great day out – contact us if you'd like to book a seat. And then in 2020, the programme continues with more digs and explorations, and an extra focus on transferring technical archaeological skills to volunteers so that they feel able to continue their research and practical work on their own into the future.

We have made great strides in understanding and improving our natural heritage during 2019, and during 2020 the program will accelerate further. Our partnership work with RSPB will continue with black grouse surveys, habitat creation, goose monitoring and tracking and investigations into the habitats of our elusive willow tit population. Goose News! was a social media phenomenon in 2019 that will only be boosted by the Wetlands and Wildlife Trust's plans to put satellite collars on a further four geese this year.

We are working closely with Galloway Fisheries
Trust on a number of projects around the Glenkens,
including understanding and improving the dynamics
of the Loch Ken fishery and looking for the hidden
salmon populations in the Upper Ken. They are also
looking at the prevalence of invasive plant species
in the catchment and there will be a training session
for all at the Smiddy in late Spring with a focus on
American skunk cabbage. Contact us to book your
free place.

NTS Threave Garden and Estate has been a great partner in 2019 and our involvement with them is going to step up hugely in 2020 with the start of one of the most ambitious conservation projects the south of Scotland has ever seen - the restoration of the Threave Estate into a wild place, part of a 100 year plan.

Our Small Grants scheme continues in 2020 – we have given away £35,000 in 3 rounds so far, but there are still grants of up to £5,000 available for community groups who have heritage-related projects. Round 4 closed in November and the applications are currently being assessed; Round 5 will open again in the Spring, so look out for that!

You can find details of these and all our projects, plus how to contact us on www.gallowayglens.org. We will be at the Summer Shows again this year, and hope to meet many of you there, if not before.

Thanks to all our volunteers and external staff who deliver these projects with us – we couldn't do it without you. So here's to an excellent 2020!


Well, sod this for a game of soldiers. I've had enough of being laughed at in this godsforsaken frigidarium.

THE NEXT PHASE FOR WINDY RIG WIND FARM



Statkraft has announced that it has reached the next phase on Windy Rig wind farm, with a view to becoming operational in 2021.

Statkraft, Europe's largest producer of renewable energy, acquired the Windy Rig wind farm from Element Power in September 2018. It will be Statkraft's first project to operate subsidy-free.

The Statkraft construction team will be onsite and will provide regular updates to the community through The Glenkens Gazette as well as on www.statkraft.co.uk. The team will continue to meet with the Community Councils that are members of the Community Liaison Group to maintain communication during construction. The most recent meeting was held in mid-January.

Doug Wilson, Project Communications at Statkraft said: "After six years in the pipeline, it's great to get the project underway. We commit to working with local communities to achieve a smooth construction process and will be keeping everyone updated with progress through The Glenkens Gazette."

The project will deliver a fund of approximately £216,000 per year for community groups and initiatives, and discussions around how this will be managed are also underway.

The Glenkens & District Trust

Following on from the first round of awards for Blackcraig Wind Farm, the trustees have been looking to the future and taking steps to arrange the next round of grantmaking and to finalise a Community Action Plan for the area.

Some of us met Sebastian Watson of Blackcraig Wind Farm (Scotland) Ltd in early December, for a review meeting, which went well. The company are happy with the approach we took to the awards and are pleased that money had now been released to community groups. They are planning to organise an Open Day at Blackcraig in late spring to allow local people to visit the site and we will let you know as soon as a date has been confirmed.

Sebastian Watson also confirmed that payment of the next tranche of community benefit funds would be made in May. The Community Councils in our area will receive the same lump sum as in the previous round, with the majority of the balance going into the main fund for distribution.

As reported in the last Glenkens Gazette we are developing a Community Action Plan (CAP). We have commissioned independent consultants, Community Enterprise, to carry out this work and they held a workshop with representatives of community groups and other service providers in early December which was well supported with over 35 people in attendance.

Two community engagement events are scheduled for 6 February at The Smiddy in Balmaclellan, at 3-5pm and then 7-9pm. The objective of this work is to produce a concise document that sets out a clear vision for the wider area with priorities, either projects or service provision, that are supported by local people and a timeline for achieving them. This document will be backed up by a detailed report giving the underlying data and evidence for these priorities, which should be aspirational but also deliverable.

This report will be available for community groups across the area

to use to support funding applications, either to the Blackcraig fund or to other funding bodies. In addition, we in the Glenkens & District Trust will also use the output of the CAP to enable us to review our fund strategy and identify priorities to enable us to allocate money as effectively as possible in the longterm interests of the community and to meet identified community needs.

The emerging themes so far are:

- isolated groups need to work together more effectively
- Developing community assets and spaces, and our wider environment
- Economic regeneration, jobs, tourism and local wealth creation

- Addressing climate change
- Sustainability, local energy and improving transport and housing

We want to discuss these themes and agree specific fundable projects which could potentially address them.

TECHNOLOGY EXPLAINED: TELEVISION

For this article, I thought that I would tackle the subject of Television (or TV).

Years ago, when things were still analogue, this was very simple; you had a TV set and an aerial on the roof and that was it. Then it all went digital.

Nowadays, to get basic free-to-view TV service (conveniently called 'Freeview') you either need a newer TV with its own digital tuner or, if you still have one of the older TVs, you will need a digital decoder (aka set-top-box) but in both cases you will need to connect to a rooftop TV aerial. Freeview generally provides about 70 channels but unfortunately, in the Glenkens, we have a limited service from a relay transmitter so you may only get about 20 channels.

Cable TV is not available in the area so I won't cover that further.

Satellite TV is the next obvious alternative. You will need a satellite dish and in the centre of it is the LNB (I'll come back to that later). There are two main flavours of satellite TV, Freesat or Sky. With Freesat you will need to buy a set top decoder (unless your TV has one built-in). Decoder boxes come with or without a built-in recorder – but they can all be a bit fiddly. With Sky you will also need one of their decoders (these are simpler) and, generally speaking, you will need to pay a subscription but you will be able to record programmes as well and, of course,

you get far more channels. There is also a non-subscription (ie free) service from Sky, confusingly called 'Freesat from Sky'; you will need to provide your own Sky box (you can buy these cheaply on eBay) but Sky disables the recorder if you don't pay a subscription so you will only be able to watch live programs.

The latest generation of Sky boxes is called Sky Q (subscription only) and this is far more capable, you can record up to six programs at the same time and there is a multi-room option where you can connect several TVs in your house to watch different programs at the same time. Sky Q uses a completely different type of LNB which is not compatible with previous Sky boxes or Freesat. If you already have Freesat or any version of Sky before Sky Q, check your LNB. If you have one with only one or two outputs, a quick cheap upgrade is to swap it for a quad LNB (four sockets), you can then run additional cables from the other sockets to an additional Freesat or Freesat from Sky box to connect to a second TV with no additional subscription to pay.

Finally, there are a whole host of internet-based TV services, some are free but most are subscription; they include Netflix, Amazon Prime, Now TV, BBC iPlayer and YouTube. You can watch these directly on your computer or tablet but modern smart TVs can often run the App you need,

or you may be able to connect to any one of the available devices such as a Roku box, Google Chromecast or PlayStation 4. If you have a computer or tablet with an HDMI socket and your TV also has such a socket, you can connect the two via a cable, select what you want to watch on your device and watch it on the big screen. For any of these internet services you will need a minimum 3MB of available broadband to watch in Standard Definition, 5MB to watch in HD and 25MB for the latest 4K sets. See previous article for info on Broadband.

Finally, please remember, that if you watch live TV, however you receive it, you will need a TV licence.

SCOTLAND'S WORDS OF FREEDOM

One of the most famous documents in Scottish history, *The Declaration of Arbroath*, will be the subject of the next Glenkens Story lecture.

The Declaration of Arbroath: 700
Years On will be the title of a lecture
by Professor Ted Cowan during which
he will describe how this document,
dating from the Scottish Wars of
Independence, has influenced the
history of many nations. He says:
"This famous text of 1320 has been
called the Scottish Declaration of
Independence but is surely much
more. It continues to radiate
universal ideas about freedom and
constitutionalism shared in countries
worldwide which revere democracy.
It is as profound as it is unique."

Many Americans, for example, believe

their Declaration of Independence was based upon that of Arbroath. Both the US and Canada now annually commemorate 'Tartan Day' on 6 April, the date of the document.

The lecture will address how such sophisticated ideas, for example, the sovereignty of the people, were

confidently articulated so early in such an allegedly remote and apparently insignificant little country as Scotland.

Ted Cowan has lectured on the Declaration in New Zealand, Australia, Canada and the United States. He is the author of For Freedom Alone, a fourth

edition of which will appear in 2020 published by Birlinn.

GLENKENS PLACE NAMES: PART TWO

This is the second instalment of a Gazette series by Michael Ansell, from New Galloway, looking at Glenkens placenames and their history.

As mentioned in the first article on Glenkens place-names, I will use the restricted definition of the Glenkens, the parishes of Carsphairn, Dalry, Kells and Balmaclellan.

This edition will focus on what

the parish names and that of the Glenkens overall might signify. Let's take the name of the valley, 'The Glenkens' first. In early records it appears as Glenken, the terminal 's' representing a later Scots plural, probably reflecting that the area is made up of several parishes. This would stand for Gaelic Gleann a' Chean, valley of the river Ken, a river name that potentially pre-dates the arrival of Gaelic to the district. River names tend to be very conservative and can survive several language changes relatively unscathed. If so what might 'Ken' mean? Gilbert Márkus (Galloway Glens placenames project) suggests a Brittonic origin from can, 'bright, shining, white' or cant, 'boundary, border, edge'. Alternatively Alan James has suggested that it might be connected with Gaelic ceann, 'head,

end' as in Ceann Mòr, 'big head', perhaps referring to the prominent mound the castle is built on.

Dalry (in 1276, Dalri) is most likely derived from Gaelic Dail Righ, 'king's field or holm' This would presumably refer originally to what is now called the Holm of Dalry. When I was growing up in the Glenkens, Dalry was frequently simply referred to as The Clachan, from Gaelic clachan, 'kirktoun'. It might be interesting to speculate as to who the 'king' was that gave rise to the name Dail Righ.

It is intriguing that there are possible elements of a 'royal' inaugural assemblage in and around Dalry which tends to support the place-name derivation mentioned above. Firstly there is Dalry Motte which may have been the seat of a native Gaelic chieftan, following the architectural style of the Norman motte. Then there is the font or possible bullaun stone in the kirkyaird and possibly the most interesting component, the rough seat known as St John's Chair. This seat, which looks like it is composed of waterwashed stone from the River Ken is somewhat similar in appearance to royal inaugural seats in Ireland such as that of the O Neill at Castlereagh in Ulster. These inauguration seats were normally situated on small mounds and perhaps the Dalry one originally sat on Knockensee, Gaelic Cnocan suidhe, 'small seat-mound' just across the river on Waterside farm. Is this the Glenkens' own Lia Fàil, or Stone of Destiny?

Balmaclellan is on record from 1380 and is derived from Gaelic Baile Mhic Gill' Fhaolain, 'settlement of the son of the devotee of St. Fillan'. MacGill' Fhaolain gave rise to the surname MacLellan, common in Galloway. The saint's name itself means 'wolf-cub' and cults relating to Faolan existed in several parts of Scotland as well as Galloway,

notably Glen Dochart.

The parish name Kells is a tricky one but perhaps the most likely derivation is from Gaelic Coille, 'woodland' plus as suffix, meaning 'place of', thus 'place of woods'.

Carsphairn is from Gaelic Cars Feàrna, 'alder haugh'. Cars is an element borrowed into Galloway Gaelic from Scots carse and is the generic place-name element in many local place-names such as Carsfad or 'long haugh'. For the avoidance of doubt, Carsphairn has nothing at all to do with the place-name Keresban recorded in the Melrose Charters in the 12th Century. This matter has confused numerous academics over the years including Professor Geoffrey Barrow. Keresban was near Polnessan, near present day Patna in East Ayrshire. Carsphairn is of course mentioned (as was Dalry and other Glenkens places) in the Gaelic song Òran Bagraidh, 'a song of defiance' supposedly the only surviving piece of Galloway Gaelic literature. The jury is still very much out on its authenticity however.

LOCAL HISTORY with TED COWAN

Loch Doon Castle

The importance of the route through Glenkens in medieval times is highlighted by the presence of Threave Castle to the south and Loch Doon Castle just over the Ayrshire border.

Thus the glen was protected by formidable defensive structures at each end. It is thought that it was

built by Robert Bruce or his father in the thirteenth century when it was known as Balloch Castle, an interesting name since in Gaelic a balloch is a pass, often where the

waters of a loch flow into a river or stream as in Balloch Loch Lomond and Balloch Loch Tay.

Loch Doon came to mind recently when a newspaper cutting fell out of one of my books. It was from The Evening Times, Saturday 29 July, 1939, written by someone who called himself 'Wayfarer', which means one who travels on foot. He failed to mention that the Countess of Carrick is said to have abducted Bruce Senior, forcing him to marry her, an interesting reversal of the more familiar tales concerning male kidnappers.

One of their sons was King Robert,

about whom we will be hearing a great deal this year as it marks the seven-hundredth anniversary of a document known as The Declaration of Arbroath, dated 6 April 1320, an emotive appeal to freedom and independence which is now admired worldwide. It also introduced the idea of the sovereignty of the people with the full support of the king. From Doon, King Robert could easily reach the main Bruce headquarters at Turnberry while preserving access to the Clyde, Stirling and beyond. The castle was subsequently in the hands of Gille Brighde of Carrick, the Doon now run in two directions, north

down picturesque Ness Glen and south towards Carsphairn. The scenery around the loch is stunning, especially towards the Galloway Hills. The burns in this part of Scotland are called 'lanes', Gala Lane, Carrick Lane and Elgin Lane. Places with such names as 'Wee Hill of Craigmulloch' demand to be conquered! The Hydro introduced elaborate salmon ladders on Doon, based on a system of ascending spirals like those on

the Dee at Tongland.
Another attraction is provided by the Ospreys.
When Wayfarer wrote in 1939 he was fully aware that

a number of military installations were introduced to the loch during the First World War but it also experienced activity when the Second War broke out. Roswell MacTavish of the Royal Canadian Airforce was killed when he crashed in the woods near the loch. In 1941 Frantisek Heki of 312 (Czechoslovak) Squadron RAF was killed on a training flight when his Spitfire hit the loch. The plane was not recovered until 1982; it was restored and is on display at Dumfries and Galloway Aviation Museum, Heathhall. A welcome addition is the Scottish Dark Sky Observatory. Ted Cowan

Kennedies, the MacLellans and the Douglases but it was suppressed by James V.

In 1935, ahead of the raising of the loch level 27 feet for hydro storage purposes, the structure on Castle Island was moved to the lochside. Wayfarer was rather taken with a camper's information that the result was two castles – the reerected structure that is the one now accessible to the public and the sadly diminished ruins on the island, but it was an enlightened initiative for its time.

The new scheme was duly completed so that the waters of
