WATSON BIRD TRAILS LAUNCHED

Two new Glenkens walking routes are now signposted in celebration of local bird artist Donald Watson, who lived and worked in Dalry.

Both trails have their starting point at Dalry Town Hall garden, where there is a sign explaining the Watson Birds project and maps of the Walking Trail and the Art Trail

The Walking Trail around Dalry takes around two hours and follows one of the Glenkens Core Paths along the river bank. After crossing the main road by Boat Knowe, the path climbs the Mulloch Hill before meandering back into the village.

The Art Trail can be done by bicycle or car - users should allow around half a day for this route, although it's shorter in winter as the section through the Raider's Road is closed.

An app will soon be available to

accompany the trails, narrated by local bird expert Chris Rollie. This commentary aims to provide an insight into Donald's art and observational skills, as well as highlighting what you might expect to see at different times of the year. Watch this space for more on the app launch!

It is hoped that people using the trails will engage creatively in whatever way they choose - through poem, prose, music, drawing, painting or photographs - and that these will form part of an exhibition in the summer.

Wander round the back of CatStrand and gaze upon the huge 'Hope London'-inspired mural or check out the 'Youth Booth' blue phone box at New Galloway - both intergenerational

projects between CiC and CatStrand Youth Arts.

Brian and Chris were instrumental to the community during the pandemic, and determined to ensure that the CIC project provided digital online activities and events that would help the community to stay in touch.

Just to be clear, CiC hasn't ended, it's just that some of the team are moving on - the project continues to go on and will, we are sure, reach even greater heights!

The CiC legacy isn't just physical - we leave behind also many established groups and abiding memories. Glenkens Men's Shed (the first in Dumfries & Galloway), the CatStrand Uke Band with its sell-out concerts raising monies for local and national charities, photography and writing groups, Tai-Chi, yoga, IT support, Knit & Blether - the list goes on. One we are really proud of is JPFitness, supported from an ad-hoc session in the park to a thriving five times a week fitness business.

TED COWAN: 1944 - 2022

Ted Cowan died on Sunday 2 January at his home in Balmaclellan parish after a short illness. He was 77.


A Scottish historian with an international reputation, he was also a champion of the history of Galloway and an ardent promoter of the Glenkens and its story. He was emeritus professor of Scottish History and Literature at Glasgow University and had previously taught at Guelph University in Canada. He was latterly director of the Crichton University Campus in Dumfries.

A long-standing supporter of Scottish

independence, he was a leading authority on the Declaration of Arbroath but his interests were wide-ranging, from the Vikings to the story of Scottish emigration. His work was underpinned by a conviction that history was nothing without an

understanding of the role of ordinary people. His regular contributions to the *Gazette* reflected the depth, breadth and eclectic curiosity of his commitment to local history.

A larger than life character in every way, he was a redoubtable raconteur, passionate in argument, an enthusiastic contrarian and a droll and warmhearted friend. Born in Edinburgh,



he was brought up in Dumfries and always identified as a Doonhamer. His first wife, Alison, died in 1994. He is survived by their three children, Karen, Morna and David. In 2004 he married Lizanne Henderson, a fellow historian.

A full appreciation of Ted and his contribution to the life of Galloway and the Glenkens will be published in the next edition of the *Gazette*. He will be sorely missed.

GALLOWAY TOPS NATIONAL PARK POLL

Galloway has emerged as the clear winner in a vote to choose Scotland's next national park.

The on-line poll organised by the *Scots Magazine* featured seven potential locations for a proposed third park. Galloway scooped more than half the votes,

outstripping support for the other six candidates combined.

Galloway received 1250 votes, 51% of the total and well ahead of nearest rivals, Borders with 19% and Argyll on 12%. The remaining areas - Ben Nevis/ Glencoe, Glen Affric, Wester Ross and Harris each returned single figure percentages.

Rob Lucas, chairman of the Galloway National Parks Association, has welcomed the result as a clear indication of enthusiasm for Galloway's claim. The news comes ahead of a scheduled meeting with Lorna Slater, MSP, the minister responsible for recommending which area should be granted national park status.

Mr Lucas said: "We look forward to meeting the minister and making our case in the spring. There is clearly a real ground swell of support."

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Join the Community Action Plan Steering Group

You may already have heard of the Glenkens and District Community Action Plan – a set of actions that the Glenkens communities set as their priorities in 2020.

The Action Plan was commissioned by the Glenkens and District Trust (GDT) to start setting out which projects or plans local people want to see happening in our area. The overall goal of the Action Plan is that this will be a connected, resilient and carbon neutral place, where people will want to live, to work, to bring up their families and to grow old.

The next stage is to evolve the Community Action Plan Steering Group, originally set up by GDT, to sit within the community and be the custodian of the Action Plan. It will be nine people, of all life experiences and interests from across our communities, who will review progress against the Plan, suggest interventions if some actions aren't getting done, and ensure that the Action Plan remains up-to-date and relevant as our communities change.

The recent new role of GCAT Executive Manager, held by Helen Keron, includes a remit to support this group by ensuring that the actions they request are carried out, which means the group will be able to make a real difference in the area.

There are five places currently available as this group gets going, so if you have an interest in seeing stuff get done and can spare a

few hours every couple of months for pre-reading and meeting attendance, then this could be of real interest to you.

It's open to everyone from across the Glenkens and wider district, which goes down both sides of Loch Ken as far as Bridge of Dee, Corsock and Kirkpatrick Durham, and it's important that the nine members represent the geographical breadth of the area as well as a variety of life experiences and interests.

National Planning Framework Consultation Have Your Say...

The government is currently consulting on National Planning Framework 4, a long-term plan that sets out where development and infrastructure is needed in an area.

In practical terms, the document will have an influence on things like transport networks, tourism, decarbonisation, renewable energy and electricity infrastructure development, forestry, natural capital and land use change.

It will guide national planning

policies, designate national developments and highlight regional spatial priorities. The Framework will be part of the development plan, and so influence planning decisions across Scotland.

Each area of Scotland has a different spatial strategy - ours comes under the South of Scotland, broadly including Dumfries & Galloway and the Scottish Borders. In this area the plans set out ambitions to:

- create a low carbon network of towns
- support sustainable development
- innovate to sustain and enhance natural capital
- strengthen resilience and decarbonise connectivity

The draft plan was published on 10 November 2021 and is now being

followed by a public consultation which closes on 31 March 2022. Following parliamentary process and analysis of the public responses, the government hopes to adopt the plan by late summer 2022.

So now is your chance to get involved and have your say! This is really important, and the government is encouraging everyone to get involved. You can respond to the consultation by going online at www. transformingplanning.scot/national-planning-framework/get-involved

The website has lots of useful background information and resources to help you formulate a response, or you can always contact your local community councillors to discuss.

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SOME WARTIME DETECTIVES

There are a number of authors who have set, or started, their books during WWII.

Following the success of early books most have continued the chronology after 1945 and into the post-war period. The works of **Sam Eastland, Philip Kerr, John Lawton, Luke McCallin** and **Ben Pastor** are generally well-written and reasonably engrossing, demonstrate decent historical research and are


widely available still. The authors manage to give most of the leading characters some depth and a few human failings.

Sam Eastland has written seven books in the *Inspector Pekkala* series. The first, *The Eye of the Red Tsar*, is set in 1930s Stalinist Russia and provides much of the framework for the subsequent books. My personal favourite is the second, *The Red Coffin*, set amongst the development of the famous T-34 battle tank.

Philip Kerr introduces us to a private detective, Bernie Gunther,

as he tries to navigate his way through the dangerous world of Berlin in the 1930s. The first, March Violets, is followed by 13 others that take us through the war and beyond. I have enjoyed them all but found it best to leave a decent interval between them.

John Lawton, in Blackout, introduces us to Frederick Troy investigating crimes in wartime London. The subsequent books develop his career,



although not always strictly chronologically. *Second Violin* is set earliest in his career.

Ben Pastor's *Martin Bora* is a German soldier who investigates crimes during WWII across Europe. He is less than committed to the Nazi cause and the books are enjoyable. I have not read them all but the first two, *Lumen* and *Liar Moon*, were excellent, as was *The Tin Sky*. The books are not set chronologically.

Luke McCallin brings us the German soldier, Gregor Reinhardt, who is tasked with undertaking criminal investigations for the German army in WWII. There are

only a few books and one of them picks up his early life in WWI. From A Dark Horizon and The Man from Berlin are probably the best two to start with.

There are, of course, many more authors and their wartime detectives. However, the above are ones that I myself have read and enjoyed.

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
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CatStrand Highlights

GIGS

We have three big gigs coming up with **The Paul Mckenna Band** on Saturday 12 February, **Moishe's Bagel** on Monday 3 March and **Roddy Woomble** on Friday 25 March.

The New York Times described
The Paul McKenna Band as
"the best folk band to have come
out of Scotland in the last twenty
years". Paul and his band draw on
both Scottish and Irish roots in a
dynamic, full-bodied array of original
and traditional material, along with
songs by like-minded authors.

Moishe's Bagel are well-known locally so it's easy to forget their international reputation. They were aptly described by *The Scotsman* as "putting the class into unclassifiable". Their music is an intoxicating, life-affirming mix of Eastern European dance music, Middle Eastern rhythms and virtuoso performance.

Roddy Woomble is widely

regarded as one of Scotland's finest songwriters, known for his enigmatic lyrics, warm baritone voice and consummate gift for a tune. As the frontman of Idlewild, Roddy has toured the world as a headline act as well as a support act to REM, Pearl Jam and U2, amongst others.

DANCE & THEATRE

Friday 4 March sees Suzi Cunningham's double bill, Rules to Live By and Eidos, presented at CatStrand. These are stunningly visual female solo Butoh dance and physical theatre pieces, exploring idolatry and identity. Rules to Live By is a raw and riotous movement-led tribute to Mark E Smith (lead singer of The Fall). A glittery and rebellious aspiration to a hero's punk anarchy; a requiem for heroism, hedonism, rebirth, with dark disturbing humour. Eidos is a tribute to Suzi's grandmother, a punk in her own right, and Suzi's personal Vivienne Westwood.

On Friday 11 March we host a new show made for youngsters aged 10-14 years (as well as adults). Delve into the mind of a supersleuth in this new production of one of the most popular Sherlock Holmes stories. A four-strong cast present an exciting and thrilling mystery, featuring a feisty heroine overcoming a domineering presence



in her life. Sherlock Holmes: The Speckled Band by **Théâtre Sans Frontières** is a gothic world of suspense, edgy live music and melodrama.

KEN BRIDGE BI-CENTENARY EVENTS

2022 marks two hundred years since the completion of the Ken Bridge. Saturday 26 and Sunday 27 March sees the first of a programme of events taking place across the year.

On 26 March Ken Words will hold a special **Word Ceilidh** at the Ken Bridge Hotel. On 27 March, **The Glenkens Story** have arranged an afternoon of talks entitled Crossing the Ken: Bridges, Fords and Ferries, discussing the crossings of the Ken, the people who created and used them and the stories they told.

CatStrand has commissioned harpist and composer **Wendy Stewart** to write a Ken Bridge song-suite, using the river Ken, the crossing, and the life of engineer John Rennie as inspiration. On the evening of Sunday 27 March, this will be premiered at a special concert of **The Galloway Agreement** at Dalry Town Hall. Not to be missed!

PROJECT IN FOCUS

South of Scotland Tree Planting Grant Scheme

In the year of COP26 and with our everincreasing focus on reducing our carbon footprint, the new South of Scotland Tree Planting Grant scheme was introduced across Dumfries & Galloway.

Since the launch of the scheme, a

large proportion of applications for the small-scale planting of native trees has come from right here in the Glenkens.

Originally developed by the Woodland Trust, Scottish Borders Council and Tweed Forum, the scheme has been running since 2014 in the Scottish **Borders Council** area. With help from **Dumfries & Galloway** Council, a generous private donation and Lottery funding, the Galloway Glens Landscape Partnership was able to step up to extend the delivery of the scheme across the whole of the Dumfries & Galloway region.

Although we are well endowed with woodland and forestry, most of this is commercial timber. Much of the older, mature native woodland is in decline as trees succumb to age and disease and are often not replaced. The South of

is designed to encourage the creation of small areas of new native woodland and tree planting by funding the cost of trees, protective tubes/stakes and minor fencing works costing up to £1,000. Many successful grant applicants have added their own funds and resources to the grant to create new woodland, replace field boundary trees or new tree planting in existing mature woodland.

Aside from the carbon capture

Scotland Tree Planting Grant scheme (with the snappy acronym of 'SoSTPG') even bigger planting schemes to create

a wide range of individuals, farms, businesses, schools and community groups, which has resulted in over 8,000 new trees being planted across

scheme has awarded 51 grants to

the region.

local communities.

Interest has been particularly high in the Glenkens and surrounding area with over 15 grants being awarded to successful recipients so far. We are particularly excited to see applications have been received from Dalry School and other community groups.

This season's tree planting will be completed by the end of March, but we are now working hard to secure funds to repeat this offer next year.

This scheme will add to the landscape of the Glenkens in coming years and will hopefully contribute to the next generation of mature, native trees to be enjoyed by future generations.

As the saying goes, "the best time to plant a tree was 80 years ago the second best time is now..."


young people in the area. I welcome children, young people and families to contact me with their thoughts and ideas about what they would like to see on the programme.

LEARNING THROUGH PLAY

P3,4,5 have been busy investigating and exploring through their play and enquiry based learning this term.

The pupils decided they wanted to know more about Robert Burns, so we put together a mini 'When Burns was a Bairn' topic.

Take a Dip on the Wild Side

I was nervous at first of the sheer expanse of Loch Ken (and the thought of the huge pike which inhabit it), having become used to the security of urban swimming pools. However, I soon conquered those fears and am happy to say that I am smitten but never bitten, and I haven't heard of anyone suffering any ill consequences from the loch's aquatic residents. In fact,

in summer you can indulge in the equivalent of a spa treatment by lounging by the loch and having the minnows nibble your toes. This is quite a pleasant experience for

which some people pay a fortune, but here in the Glenkens it's free!

Of course, like any outdoor pursuit, the sense of freedom has to be accompanied by a sense of responsibility. You have to watch for sudden surges caused by the hydro system. And never ever go swimming by yourself.

A couple of hundred yards downstream from Dalry is the pool by a rock known as Cat Craig. On sunny summer days, the place can be alive with folks of all ages enjoying the beach and the calm waters. And not everyone gives up when the weather turns fresher. The shock of plunging into cold water can become an addictive pleasure!

In Crossmichael, a group meet regularly under the friendly, careful supervision of Jim, who takes his boat onto the loch in order to keep a watchful eye on the condition of the water and the progress and safety of swimmers. These supervised swims take place on Sundays at 10am throughout the year and also, from Easter to October, on Wednesdays at 5pm. It is best to wear a highvis item such as a fluorescent head cap or a tow-float so that you are immediately visible and can be spotted if you get into trouble. A small donation of a pound or so for the

running costs of the safety boat is the only expense.

As you swim from the pier at Crossmichael you get a stunning view of the lower loch and the gentle grassy slopes of the parish of Balmaghie. You also share the loch with wildlife so it is important to respect this and, during nesting season, to avoid approaching too close to potential waterfowl nesting sites.

Freshwater swimming has many benefits. It stimulates the release of 'happy' hormones (dopamine), leaving you energised and smiling in a post-swim 'high'. In the long run, it boosts your immune system as well as your sense of wellbeing. It improves sleep and helps lower stress levels. And, of course, there are the benefits of sharing an activity with others. I also find that being at one with nature, and

In cold water, you need to move, though; your own efforts gradually warm you from inside and the water starts to feel comfortable - you can tame the cold. And when it rains you can enjoy a frog's view of the

bouncing droplets!

Wetsuit or no wetsuit? While there are amazing individuals locally who have built up the ability to swim all year without a wetsuit, I am sadly not one of them...yet. I use a suit that is designed for this type of swimming. I have just paid £150 for a new one, the 'old' one having lasted me over two years of weekly swims. I also use swimming gloves and socks in the cooler months. If you feel ready to peel off the wetsuit and re-enter the water after some energetic strokes, the tingling sensation of the water directly on your own skin is curiously delicious!

Most importantly, keep safe. Advice is available both online, through Facebook groups such as Dumfries and Galloway Wild Swimmers, and through the local community of wild swimmers. I look forward to seeing you soon!



The Optimistic Environmentalist Water, water, everywhere..?

The majority of the earth is covered by water, but only one percent is not salty from the sea or frozen.

Of this, only a small amount is in reservoirs or wells for us to drink. What many of us use has to be cleaned for drinking water and the waste is re-cleaned to recycle again. This is expensive, time-consuming and energy intensive - Scottish Water is one of the highest-energy consumers in Scotland!

Saving water helps reduce our energy bill too. Around one fifth of the average household's heating bills goes in heating water.

Think before you throw water away - can it be used for something else?

Pets need fresh water at all times, so it's better to partly fill their bowls regularly than fill them up and throw a lot away.

Saving Water in the Kitchen

Save water and energy - only fill the kettle with the amount of water you need. Buy a kettle which lets you fill just the amount for the cupfuls you want to boil at any one time.

When you want to have fresh water in your kettle, don't

just empty it down the sink - think of something you can do with it; defrost your birdbath or use it for pot plants once cool.

Re-use water from your vegetable steamer - flush the toilet or, once cooled and filtered, put in your water butt/s outside. If you boil your veg in water, use it to make gravy so you benefit from the extra vitamins too.

A dripping tap can waste over 5,500 litres of water a year - that's enough to fill a paddling pool every week for the whole summer, or over 15 litres a day. Make sure taps are turned off properly or replace the washer, or the tap if necessary.

Wash your dishes in a basin or bowl instead of under a running tap. Dishwashers can use less water than hand washing as they spray the water to clean the pots rather than dowsing dishes in a lot of water. Wait for a full load though, and use the 'eco' setting, saving water and energy.

Did you know? A tap left running while washing dishes or fruit and vegetables for 10 minutes can use around 110 litres of water, which disappears straight down the drain!

Use a washing machine with full loads and on 'eco' settings where possible. For smaller washes, use the half load cycle; some machines measure how much water is needed for a particular load. When buying a washing machine or dishwasher, don't just look at its price, compare its water and energy usage and its 'eco' settings.

Saving Water in the Bathroom

Showers and baths use the most water in the home (30%), and make up around a fifth of the average household energy bill. Using a shower instead of a bath can save two thirds of the water. Knocking just one minute off your normal shower can save over



2,600 litres of water and 27kg of CO2 per person each year - try a shower timer. Although you need to watch out for power showers as they can use as much water as a bath!

Turning off the tap when brushing your teeth or shaving can save 5 litres a minute and over 3,700 litres a year per person. Putting the water into a mug instead means what is left can be used for other purposes, eg for cleaning the toilet.

When you buy a toilet, check how much water is used per flush. If you have an older toilet, reduce the amount of water used by putting a brick, large stone or a toilet 'hippo' (an inflated bag) into the cistern; these can be removed for a particularly large flush.

Did you know? A leaking toilet can waste between 215 and 400 litres of

water every day, and between 5% and 8% of toilets leak, most commonly dual flush toilets.

If you have easy access to your cistern, put food dye or a dye tablet in the cistern and wait 20 minutes. If the water in the toilet bowl is coloured, you have a leak.

Saving Water in the Garden

Did you know? A hosepipe can use enough water in 30 minutes to fill five baths. Use a watering can instead of a hose; it's more accurate, placing the water where it is most needed. Watering plants early in the morning or late in the evening not only stops them from being burnt by the sun, but also reduces evaporation. Fit your hose pipe with a trigger nozzle so it only runs when you need it to.

Use a water butt. Fit it with a tap; either empty into a watering can or container or fit a hosepipe. You can fit a number of permanent pipes and butts together to carry more garden

rainfall around the garden including into the greenhouse. Cover the butts in plants or decorate them.

Did you know? Rainwater contains nitrogen which helps your plants thrive.

A small Scottish roof collects over 45,000 litres of water each year, more than enough to keep your water butt topped up. Just fit a diverter on the downpipe from the roof to drain water into the butt.

Use a bucket and sponge to wash the car rather than a hose pipe. Even better, use the water out of your water butt! To water your pot plants, use water from the butt with the watering can even for your inside plants.

Leaking Pipes

It's important to get leaking pipes fixed as soon as possible. If the leaks are in your house or on your land, it will be your responsibility. Remember, not only are you wasting water but it can often end up in damaging your property, particularly when left for a while.

Make sure you and your family know where your stopcock is so when you have a water problem, you can shut it off straight-away - stopcocks are not always easily found, particularly if you are panicking.

Anniversary Fundraising for New Galloway Town Hall

A recent email from Canada triggered a look into the history of New Galloway Town Hall.

The enquirer was seeking a portrait of her great-great-grandfather. There was, unfortunately, no portrait, but we did discover something very interesting about him. Situated in the town hall is a plaque in memory of Dr Millman, the provost of the Royal Burgh of New Galloway from 1868 to 1881 and the enquirer's great-great-grandfather. Among his work as provost, Dr Millman was instrumental in raising funds in 1872 to replace the town hall clock. There is a wonderfully comprehensive minute of the meeting of the town council at

which the provost made the case for a new clock: "He had called the council together for the purpose of consulting them as

to the advisability of making an attempt to remove the stigma that had for many years adhered to the Burgh in consequence of the utterly worthless condition of the town clock as a timekeeper... The time had arrived when exertions should be made to replace it by a new clock which should not only be of use to the inhabitants, but

also an ornament to the Burgh."

The new clock was first set in motion by Mrs Maxwell of Glenlee, one minute before noon on Friday 20 September 1872. This was not quite the end of the story, however, because "in consequence of a violent storm of wind and a defect in fixing by the Mason, the West dial fell out and was destroyed on the 3 January 1873. It was replaced without delay."

Dr Millman's fundraising had been very successful. He gathered £190 with, it would appear, very strong support from the Burgh as there is a list of 290 subscribers. The first name on the list is Dr Millman himself, who donated two guineas. A guinea was one pound and one shilling. The donations ranged from five guineas to one shilling.

Now, exactly 150 years later, there is fundraising afoot once again for the Town Hall. Local Initiatives in New Galloway (LING), the charity which has been managing the hall for the last five years, has been awarded a grant of £175,000 to refurbish the hall but needs to match that by raising another £175,000 and, as you can imagine, further grants are being sought. If the total of £350,000 can be reached then LING is confident that "exertions can be made... to

and all readers are enthusiastically encouraged to please donate and share the page - every pound donated is worth two because of the matched funding, so every contribution is doubly significant.

Now it may be that following Dr Millman with two guineas is ambitious (two guineas of 1872 is equivalent to £250 today!) but one old shilling (say £6), or more if you can possibly afford it,

would be wonderfully welcome.

We know some people are already fundraising for us and will be donating larger sums. The link to the crowdfunding page is www. crowdfunder.co.uk/p/sos---save-our-space-new-galloway

Our reply to our Canadian enquirer included some photographs and

further Millman details and concluded with information on the current fundraising. The LING treasurer added that it would be remiss of him not to invite them to donate, to which they have replied positively.

GLENKENS PLACE NAMES: PART X

About 500m or so from Carsphairn and on the west side of the Water of Deugh is the site of the deserted farm of Halfmark.

This is near the confluence of the Halfmark and Garryhorn Burns. This farm is shown as Halfmark on Ainslie's map of 1797 and on the OS 1st edition 6-inch map of 1853. Published at roughly the same time, in 1858, AE Thomson's Plan of Woodhead including portions of adjacent farms calls the place Half-Mark farm of Castlemaddy. This implies that it was once part of Castlemaddy

Farm. At any rate in 1859 it comprised some 482 acreas of which only six was arable or meadow, probably the area shown as 'Croft' that occupied a bend in the Water of Deugh. Most of the former farm was described as moss and hill pasture. The site has unfortunately been obliterated by forestry operations, with the first Sitka rotation already felled and a second about halfway to maturity. The farm was evidently still occupied in 1853. Thomson's map shows that Halfmark was connected to Castlemaddy to the south by what

he calls a 'drove road'. The farm was unnamed on the second edition OS map in the 1880s but still appears to have been roofed. Upstream from the site of Halfmark farm with its garden is another area of better ground, occupying a loop in the Halfmark Burn where there is a small island indicated. This flat area was called Black Holm on Thomson's map,

'holm' being a Scots term for a flat, usually fertile area beside a river (eg Holm of Dalry). This holm has escaped afforestation in the 1970s perhaps due to its waterlogged nature after drainage stopped when

Halfmark was abandoned. Thomson also shows a few small areas of trees surviving amongst the rocky sides of the Halfmark Burn, these being almost the only trees evident in an otherwise completely bare landscape. The Cleugh of Alraith (Cleugh of Auld Raith on Thomson, 1859) refuge

for native trees still exists.

Halfmark is a Scots term indicating a farm worth in rental terms half a merk, ie 80 pence. Cleugh is a Scots word meaning a ravine and is common in the Scottish Borders and Dumfries-shire, less so in Galloway. Alraith/Auld Raith may be derived from Scots Gaelic Ail Raithe 'bracken cliff/rock' maybe referring to the steep sides of the cleugh. Alternatively the generic could be Scots Gaelic allt. 'burn' so 'bracken burn' (the Thomson form rather suggests allt). Then again the specific might refer to Scots Gaelic rath, 'fort'. For further discussion on these terms see Place-Names of the Galloway Glens website.

Whatever the meaning of the specific term here it seems that the generic element raith/rath was fossilised as

Just across the Halfmark Burn from the Black Holm is the green oasis that holds the site of the former farm called Mosspark. This was a ruin on the OS 1st edition map and on Thomson's map it is termed "Ruins of Moss-park Farm steading". Thomson lists this as a large farm of some 1,684 acres of which only some 42 were classed as arable/ meadow. Mosspark farm occupied the area between the Halfmark Burn and the Garryhorn Burn and extended all the way to the top of the ridge of the Rhinns of Kells, incorporating Craighit, from Creag a' Chait, 'wild-cat rock', Cairnsgarroch

speakers in the area?

Between Craighit and Blackcraig is a

derived from An Càrnas Gearrach, 'the

furrowed cairn-shaped hill' and Meaul

from Am Meall, 'the lump'.

very peculiar name on the former farm of Mosspark. This is Pitiffers. There is another of these odd 'pitt' names in Carsphairn, that is Petillery in the very far north of the parish. Pitiffers looks rather like Scots Gaelic Peit. 'piece of land'+ aifreann/aifrinn, `a religious mass' with English plural. However Pitiffers is quite near the lead mines at Woodhead so are we looking at some strange use of the standard English word 'pit'? There is a disused mine shaft near there shown on the OS 1:25k map.

Another possibility is that the name derives from the surname Pettifer, common in England, with many spelling variants and which seems to be mainly found in the South East Midlands. This personal name is from Norman-French pie de fer 'iron-foot', as a nickname either for someone with a prosthesis or a mighty strong walker!

A further comparator might be Gleniffer

Braes in Robertson Country Park near Paisley. This could be a lost streamname in either place, -iffer would be from early Gaelic *ibar/iubhar*. So Pittifers might be peit-iubhair, 'yew-place', either

referring directly to yews or via a streamname. If so, it is very odd that we have two place-names possibly containing Scots Gaelic peit in Carsphairn parish.

there would have been a time lag in the representation of the weakened sound in Scots spellings, since the weakening of articulation would have been progressive rather than sudden. 
