# **Local environmental** trust breaks new grou

he Upper Urr Environmental Trust (UUET) has signed a first-of-its-



kind public benefit agreement with a commercial planting scheme.

In September the trust put pen to paper on a groundbreaking lease agreement, looking to add community and biodiversity value to a commercial planting scheme near Corsock.

The Upper Barr site was planted up earlier in the year by owners Foresight Sustainable Forestry Company (FSF). The agreement refers to

the unplanted sections of the site, including a designated community lease area and the wider partnership area.

The agreement gives UUET a 20-year lease of land for public amenity and environmental purposes, including plans for a dedicated community woodland area, footpath creation, riparian broadleaf tree planting, habitat improvements and peatland restoration work.

# Greener travel across the Glenkens with the new GCT eBus

Galloway Community Transport (GCT) has received a massive boost in its ongoing aim of decarbonising its fleet, in the shape of a 16-seater electric bus.

This vehicle is brand new and has been funded by the Energy Savings Trust's 'Plugged in Communities' fund, which supports community transport initiatives in adding carbon neutral vehicles to their fleet.

GCT are currently training drivers in the use of this new bus (the controls are more space age!) and will have the vehicle available for regular hire in the New Year via the GCT Membership scheme (www. gallowaycommunitytransport.org/hire).

Once registered as a community group member, you can hire any of our buses or the eCar for very competitive rates, either with a paid driver or your own MIDAS-trained driver.

# Funding secured for supporting Local Place Plans

Thanks to funding from NatureScot and South of Scotland Enterprise (SOSE), a new project has been created by Dalry Community Council and the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust (GCAT) supporting Local Place Planning and land use in the Glenkens.

Building on work already carried out within communities to create the Glenkens & District Community Action Plan and recent Glenkens Land Use Vision addendum, as well as extensive work this summer by Dalry CC on Local Place Planning, the

project will generate three complementary feasibility studies by March 2024:

- 1. Place Planning and Land Use in the Glenkens
- 2. Participatory Monitoring of Land Use in the Glenkens
- 3. A Land Use Forum in the Glenkens

Local Place Plans were introduced in the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019, and provide a new opportunity for communities to contribute to the Local Development Plan at a truly local level. To achieve the first outcome above, the scope of the Glenkens Community Spaces Network has been extended to work with Dalry Community Council to develop a toolkit for Local Place Planning in the Glenkens, with the aim of making it easier for the Community



Councils of the Glenkens to carry out the Local Place Planning process in their own communities.

At a joint meeting of the Community Councils in August, representatives indicated that they would appreciate the joint coordination of Local Place Planning, and so GCAT and Dalry CC have sourced this funding to support that.

The second and third reports will build on the work on Land Use in the Glenkens to date, to see what further steps are required to allow effective

monitoring of landscape change over time from a community perspective, and to create a Glenkens Land Use Forum. This last one will explore what challenges which are faced in trying to set such a Forum up, what it will do, who will be involved and how to make it effective.

# A name changer for the Glenkens Food Hub



The Glenkens Food Hub are excited to announce our new name - the Galloway Food Hub!

As we expand, we wanted to update our name to better reflect the area we serve. Here's a little bit about how we have evolved.

The Glenkens Food Hub was born from the Glenkens Community Action Plan and Propagate's further work to investigate what the community wanted in terms of local food. One of the things the community said they would like was better access to good, local food, especially vegetables. So, a hyper-local, online food hub was trialled in Dalry, and funding to run a larger pilot project was received from Blackcraig Wind Farm, via Foundation Scotland, on behalf of the Glenkens and District Trust.

Initially, our intention was to stay hyperlocal, as we wanted to reduce food miles, sell lower carbon emitting produce, and increase market access for local food producers. However, we wanted others across Dumfries and Galloway to benefit from similar Food Hubs, and we soon realised that multiple hubs were unlikely to be a viable answer in very large and vast region. Food hubs take a lot of administration behind the scenes, and replicating this many times over would require regular funding, with the likelihood that they would never be financially viable.

It soon emerged that a hub and spoke model, with one central packing point and multiple collection points run by wonderful volunteers, was the most feasible option. The locations of these points were driven by volunteers appearing from these locations wanting to take produce back for themselves and their friends. This turned out to be a workable scenario, enabling us to serve more people in the wider community.

At the start, we had collections available in Dalry only, and delivery within the

Glenkens. Our next two first collection points of Gatehouse of Fleet and Low Auldgirth were trialled successfully. Recently, we have reached ten locations outside the Glenkens. Whilst we do have 4 - 5 very local producers in the Glenkens, most are based within the wider community of D&G, within a 30-mile radius of Dalry.



To keep our customers interested, and through asking them what they would like to see for sale on the hub, we continue to expand our range a little outside this 30-mile area and supplement with other ethical and sustainable produce which fits our 'Good Food' criteria, such as coffee, chocolate, and staple vegetables. We continue to speak with and listen to our customers, and explore ways to expand our product range, in alignment with their needs.

Now seems like the right time to change our name from the Glenkens Food Hub to the Galloway Food Hub. Whilst our heart, our packing place at the Glenkens Community Centre and half of our customers are still within the Glenkens, we have a valued and growing customer base and producer network across Dumfries and Galloway. The Glenkens is situated at the heart of Galloway, and we find this

location to suit us right now with the links we have established.

We hope that becoming the Galloway Food Hub allows more people and producers to access and benefit from Galloway's local climate and nature-friendly, online good food marketplace. We are extremely grateful to our fabulous customers who offer kind words of encouragement that they love what we do, and value the produce that we offer. Our local producers are fantastic, often growing, farming, and making unique food under difficult circumstances, to make a difference to the health of our community and our planet and are the foundation on which the Food Hub is built. A very big thank you goes to all who have volunteered with us since we began. We couldn't do this without you. Please spread the word if you value this

# New Galloway Town Hall grand reopening: A Time and a Place

esidents of New **K**Galloway, with guests from across the Glenkens and beyond, celebrated the grand reopening of the Town Hall in October with a once-in-a-generation concert titled A Time and a Place.

Aiming to capture past and present in a space that is a source of real pride to the local community, the centrepiece of the event was the Town Hall Time Capsule, which is to be sealed behind a false wall under the stairs. It contains writings, photographs, mementos, special edition memorabilia and historic artefacts, which together create a picture of 21st century life in Scotland's smallest Royal Burgh.

The programme for A Time and a Place featured the CatStrand Singers with selections from Singing the Galloway Glens, the song cycle put together by the late Nicola Black, who is still so sadly missed. This included the haunting Moorbrock Memories and Galloway Lullaby and, for a bit of light relief, A Conversation of Geese. The CD of Singing the Galloway Glens together with its beautifully illustrated companion publication was placed in the time capsule by Carol Salsbury to the accompaniment of a drum roll and cymbal crash - provided for every item by the inimitable Ian Wemyss.

The contributions from the Cubs pack and primary school were particularly interesting, with children wondering how life might be different in 50 years' time. Will toilets still be

same?' was one stand-out question. Rose Ardron placed the Writedown anthology of local writings from Covid lockdown days, while Barbara Barker and Avril Bridgeman provided an excellent canter through New Galloway's past 50 years up to and including the latest local news - submitting several copies of the Glenkens Gazette.

The concert ended with everyone joining in an unforgettable rendition of E Malala - a Hawaiian Earth Blessing - the words translating as "Earth and Sky, Sea and Stone, Hold this land in sacredness". Joyous, but also heartbreakingly apt.

#### A Just-in-Time Renovation

The asset transfer of the 19th century B-Listed Town Hall

destined to be boarded up. Having faced down multiple challenges during the last fifteen months (including the colourful flowering of dry rot), the Town Hall has been sympathetically restored, bringing to life unique features like the Victorian Moral Maxims painted around the Upper Hall walls. The exterior rendering has been repaired and painted to a high standard, the distinctive tower has been renovated, and the 150-year-old clock

has had a thorough MOT. The building has been brought into the modern age with the installation of the lift and accessible toilets, alongside carbon and energy saving measures that include secondary glazing and an air source heat pump.

The building's reopening marked the relaunch of the Town Hall's programme of classes, activities and social events. Martial arts, Tai Chi, indoor bowling and the popular LING Lunches are already in train as the building returns to its historic position as New Galloway's community hub. LING Trustees are keen to spread the word that the Town Hall is a venue that belongs to the community, with potential to reduce isolation, improve wellbeing, and build on the connectedness of rural life.

#### So many to thank

Volunteers were the backbone of what New Galloway has achieved, in particular those who help with LING Lunches, the Town Hall's flagship offering. They create the atmosphere of welcome that infuses and permeates the building. Others run the weekly sports evening year in year out, quietly making all

> comers feel at home and able to enjoy a friendly game of carpet bowls or table tennis.

Many in the community made themselves available at the drop of a hat to help. Vicky of Dynamic Domestic brought her team to help with cleaning up as renovation work was drawing to an end. Jim Ranyard set up lights and an excellent sound system for A Time and a Place.

Heather Mackintosh put an incredible amount of work into helping the Cubs to compile their contribution for the Time Capsule, as did Margaret Heuchan with the school children from Kells.

LING had superb support from Ronnie Bradford as Project Officer overseeing the renovations. Jackie Wells, New Galloway's brilliant Community Inclusion Worker, adeptly juggled balls and spun plates. And LING's newest recruit, Bianca Leder, hit the ground running by setting up and running popular Thursday Hubbub sessions. The LING team have been lucky also to recruit an excellent new cleaner in Susan Howarth.

Of course without a roster of encouraging funders none of the renovations would have happened at all. Glenkens and District Trust were the first to launch the project on its way with a promise of £25K from Blackcraig Windfarm towards installation of the lift. D&G Council were generous in supporting interior repairs, and October 2021 saw the

offer of £175K from the Community Ownership Fund, a game changer that required match funding, which LING managed to achieve. With significant last-minute help from South of Scotland Enterprise and a major uplift from Scotland's Lets Do Net Zero Fund, LING can account for having raised £450K.

Chair of LING, Barbara Barker, said: "From start to finish New Galloway's Town Hall project has been community-led and supported by an incredible diversity of partners and funders. Starting with LING's membership, 133 people - about 40% of the local community - are members of LING, and 65 are 'Friends of the Town Hall' who pay a monthly small subscription to support the work. Over 40 people came to our February AGM and when we held a fundraiser for

the renovations, £5,000 was raised. The support from so many who enthuse, attend, and help in so many ways to build a network of friendships is quite phenomenal."

The last item to be placed in the Time Capsule, before Ros Hill was called upon to close it for posterity, was a report of the renovation process itself – the whole story of the asset transfer and the fundraising success.

# Local historian Paul Goodwin features on ITV Border Life

ocal military historian Paul Goodwin has highlighted the importance of war memorials in an episode of ITV's *Border Life*.

As a founding member of the charity The Scottish Military Research Group, Paul's research has shown there are over 550 war memorials in the region, most of which were not on record when he began his research in 2006.

Paul believes war memorials are vital not only for education and family history researchers but in order to ensure younger generations remember this vital part of our history. Paul said: "It should be remembered, and commemorated, if for no other reason than to remember that war is a bad thing and we need to do all we can to avoid it.

"All these lives cut short, all these people who never married, never had children,

the people who were never born, the generations that were never born, so it continues to have an impact.

"In this area, people went away to war and never came back...the whole community changed as a direct result of the first world war."

Paul has created a list of people commemorated on the main war memorials of the Glenkens, and the list itself is now a registered war memorial. His other work includes the recent Galloway Glens Last Flights booklet, as well as many Glenkens Gazette articles over the years.



# Local governance and our communities... ...how it works and how to get involved How do community councils work?

Community Councils were first established in Scotland following the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1973.

Thereafter, the Local Government etc (Scotland) Act, 1994, which produced the current system of unitary Local Authorities, made provision for the continuation of community councils.

Under the legislation, every local community in Scotland is entitled to petition their local authority to establish a community council in their area. Although they are elected bodies, Community Councils do not have the status of local authorities, nor are they part of local authorities. Community Councils are a congretal local authority.

separate legal entity with their own rights and responsibilities created and sustained by the said Acts of 1973 and 1994 to be run in accordance with the approved Scheme. In Dumfries

and Galloway there are currently 88 Community Councils across the region.

The Amended 2018 Scheme for Community Councils in Dumfries and Galloway ('The Scheme') was agreed by Dumfries and Galloway Council (DGC) on 25 September 2018. Its purpose is to enable the establishment of community councils within Dumfries and Galloway and to provide a common minimum basic framework governing their creation and operation. All Community Councils within

Dumfries and Galloway are required to adhere to its terms. The Scheme supports the operation of Community Councils and is viewed by DGC as the Community Council's Constitution to encourage and maintain consistency across for all Community Councils. It sets out the basic role and purpose of Community Councils and the basic rules that are expected to be complied with, including in relation to complaints and the conduct of members.

The statutory purposes of Community Councils established under the Scheme are set out in Section 51(2) of the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1973 as follows: "In addition to any other purpose which a Community Council may pursue, the general purpose of a Community

This will involve Community Councils articulating the views and concerns of local people in their area on a wide range of issues of public concern and make representations to DGC, other public sector bodies and private agencies on matters within their area of interest. Community Councils have a statutory right to be consulted on planning applications and may from time to time be consulted on issues such as licensing, matters affecting the local community and interface with the Scottish Government.

Members of a Community Council are required to be aged 16 years or over; reside within the Community Council area; and be named on the current

> register of electors for that area on the date of being proposed for membership. Dumfries and Galloway Council provide a consistent level of support to Community

Councils across the region and arrange elections, including ordinary elections held every five years, by-elections and casual vacancy elections.

Amidst intense competition, Brian emerged as the well-deserved winner due to his diligent efforts within the community. His involvement in various local committees and groups reflects a lifetime commitment to community service, showcasing his leadership and dedication to the betterment of the Glenkens area.

Brian's extensive community engagement includes roles in committees such as the New Galloway & Kells Community Council, where he served for almost 30 years, six of them as Provost. He has also been a key figure on the Scottish Alternative Games Committee since 2001, contributing to the organisation and providing commentary at the ever-popular event.

Brian joined the board of New Galloway Community Enterprises Ltd in 2021, bringing his wealth of experience to help promote sustainable community development. This was first apparent in his role as one of the founding Trustees of the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust, for whom he has volunteered and worked tirelessly for 22 years now, presently as the CatStrand Enterprise and Facilities Manager.

His contributions to education have been notable too, having been a member of the Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and School Board at Kells School at various times between 1991 and 2002. Brian's commitment to youth development also extends to football, where he earned the Scottish Football Association Youth Coaching Certificate in 1996 and coached the Kells School Football Team for 12 years. He also assisted with coaching the youth teams at Fleet Star FC for several years.

In the realm of amateur drama Brian was a steadfast member of Glenkens '73 Club, making his acting debut in the pantomime Cinderella in 1974. Over the years, he has participated in numerous one-act plays and pantomimes, eventually taking over as the panto dame from his father, Tommy Edgar. Brian then went on to found CatStrand Youth Players in 2008 and now enjoys directing the annual pantomime and one-act plays.

The D&G Life award put a particular spotlight on his exceptional work with the Youth Players group, highlighting Brian's pivotal role in creating a haven for young individuals in a rural area, providing them with unique opportunities to immerse themselves in the world of drama. In a community where access to cultural and artistic activities would otherwise be limited, Brian's commitment to CatStrand as a whole and the CatStrand Youth Players in particular stands out as a beacon of creativity and inclusivity. Through his leadership, the group has become a transformative space for young talents in the Glenkens area.

Since its formation in 2008, more than 200 young people aged 10 to 18 have benefited from the CatStrand Youth Players, with some going on to pursue drama at the college level and even achieving professional acting careers. The group, consisting of approximately 18 members, stages an annual pantomime that has become a local favourite and has also achieved considerable success in Scottish Community Drama Association Festivals over the years, regularly representing Stewartry District at West of Scotland Finals and also going on to finish in second place at the Scottish Final last year.

Away from his commitment to his work and community volunteering, Brian enjoys spending quality time with his family, including his beloved dog Roxy and enjoys socialising with friends, sometimes with a pint of Best! He has been a dedicated supporter of Queen of the South FC for



over 50 years, rarely missing a home game in that time.

Accompanied by his wife Eileen and some of the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust team members, Brian accepted the Volunteer of the Year award at the Dumfries & Galloway Life Awards Ceremony in November. His humility was evident as he acknowledged the collaborative efforts of the entire community, emphasising that all of his achievements are part of a team effort.

CatStrand Young Creatives, another GCAT project, were also finalists at the Awards in the Culture Champion category, recognising the work of Cat Campbell the Project Lead and all the Young Creatives team. They didn't win on this occasion but surely their time will come soon!

The Dumfries and Galloway Life Awards celebrate outstanding contributions to the community, and Brian Edgar's recognition as Volunteer of the Year is a testament to his exceptional dedication and positive impact on the Glenkens communities. Cook-confectioner is my main profession, and I really like to cook. I found you don't just have to use local businesses for activities, you can also go out into the amazing landscape.

Not only Dumfries and Galloway, but the whole of Scotland has amazing

landscapes and countryside. I have gone out for a drive with my family, to look around and found I have discovered places I have never been before, this may be because I am still fairly new to Scotland. However it could also be because Dumfries

The management plan for the site is currently being drafted, with any input or suggestions welcomed. Joe Seed, Chairman of **Upper Urr Environment** Trust, said: "Balancing

commercial forestry and environmental issues is a difficult task in these times of unprecedented biodiversity loss. We welcome this opportunity to work with FSF to safeguard and restore an ecologically important area within the

Galloway Landscape. We would encourage others to engage with developments in their area as it only takes a few individuals to make a difference."

In May 2023, the proposed site was visited by a delegation of Scottish Land Commissioners to listen to the proposals and offer input. Scottish Land Commission Chief Executive Hamish Trench commented:

"It is encouraging to hear this collaboration is progressing. We see big potential to develop this kind of approach further so that investment in land use change also increases the

ability of local communities to deliver their priorities. # Launch of the Dumfries & Galloway Woodlands initiative

The Gazette has carried many articles over the years about our changing land use, including the arrival of things like carbon accounting, 'natural capital', and the implications for the Glenkens.

As we start to get our heads round what these ideas mean, the changes in nature and the climate continue to loom larger in our lives, with impacts expected and already being felt. We have no time to spare. With society scrambling to invent new mechanisms to respond to these challenges, Dumfries & Galloway can be on the front line of our response.

The Dumfries & Galloway Woodlands initiative has been established to work on tangible projects that RESPOND to these twin challenges, delivering maximum benefit for our region in the process. Supported by partners including The Woodland Trust, Borders Forest Trust and Dumfries & Galloway Council's Environment Team, the initiative is perfectly placed to draw best practice experience from regional and

national partners into our region. We are used to looking with admiration at projects like Carrifran or the Eddleston Water project. Those projects are now being harnessed to drive economic activity for their surrounding areas. A truly 'Nature-led economy' includes agriculture, silviculture, and related industries.

McNabb Laurie, Dumfries & Galloway Woodlands Officer, started in post in October 2023 and is already involved in a number of local proposals across the region – from innovative land owner/community relationships that add public amenity and biodiversity value, through to targeting national support streams into Dumfries & Galloway.

This can feel like an era of mass-commodification of our natural resources. The Scottish Government are seeking a 'just transition'. At times it can feel the biodiversity and climate changes are beyond our influence, but Dumfries & Galloway has a really important role to play on the national stage, and we can be part of the solution.

Woodlands is set up on a proactive

basis to seek to support habitat improvements and to respond to emerging opportunities amidst the challenges. The South of Scotland Tree Planting Grant Scheme – administered by Dumfries & Galloway Woodlands - is a perfect example of how local people can deliver biodiversity and landscape benefits that will benefit future generations.

Dark Art Distillery has recently launched its new Understory gin, or pick up some gifts from Gallovidia Books. If you're looking for fresh, seasonal produce for the festive period, try Barnbarroch Organic, Deer Manor Mushrooms, Glenguicken Farm and Low Auldgirth Steading; all have been awarded the Biosphere



Certification Mark for sustainability and are available through the Glenkens Food Hub.

Looking ahead to Day One of 2024...one of the most rewarding New Year's resolutions that can be made is to spend more time outdoors. Connecting with nature is good for physical and mental health, and there's plenty to see in the GSA Biosphere during winter.

In the Glenkens we're lucky enough to have the Ken-Dee Marshes Nature Reserve on our doorstep, a haven for birders as one of the few mainland sites in Scotland where Greenland white-fronted geese overwinter.

Raiders' Road is open to walkers

and cyclists only (no cars) during winter; the otter pools are a fantastic place for a cold-weather picnic - bring a flask of hot chocolate and wrap up warm! And finally, the longer nights afford more opportunity to experience the region's dark skies. Home to the UK's first International Dark Sky Park, the UNESO Biosphere region has some of the best overhead



views, with thousands of stars visible to the naked eye on a clear night. Biosphere Guides and Dark Sky Rangers can help you navigate the night sky and experience the science, myths and legends of the stars, while Kirkcudbright is home to the Dark Space Planetarium – a brilliant day out in inclement weather.

# Reflections on an eventful year

As the 2023 draws to a close, it's time to reflect on a remarkable year for the Loch Ken Trust, which has made significant progress towards its overall mission to become the first future-ready community.

The Loch Ken Ranger Service, led by Head Ranger Leanne Pumpr, has grown from strength to strength and is now firmly embedded within the communities around Loch Ken, paving the way as one of the first community-led Ranger Services in Scotland.

The Ranger Service has attended over 100 incidents this year, including wildlife crime, fly tipping and dirty camping, and has ensured the Loch and surrounding areas are well looked after. Over 300 patrols have been carried out this year both on land and water.

Thanks to generous funding from Blackcraig Windfarm Fund, through Glenkens and District Trust, the Ranger Service now has three years' security and can now make plans for the future.

Leanne Pumpr said, "It has been an exciting, busy season packed with both land and boat patrols, and a range of educational events. It's been fabulous to meet so many returning and new visitors, and being able to share knowledge with visitors and locals."

The Trust is grateful to Drax Group plc, owners of the Galloway Hydro Scheme, for supporting office staff, enabling them to continue to work towards their ambitious aims. The work of the trust follows the Loch Ken Plan, a guide to achieving all 17 of the Global Goals by 2030.



2023 has been filled with a host of projects including a successful Summer Education Programme and the start of a Baseline Ecosystem Assessment.

Thanks to funding from Drax Group UK, the trust was able to bring six of our local schools to the banks of Loch Ken and educate the next generation on caring for our wonderful environment.

This year a funded project enabled Loch Ken Trust to buy a stock of children's waterproofs and footwear so that all young people are properly equipped for their visits to Loch Ken, and there are no barriers to children experiencing all Loch Ken has to offer.

Over the course of the last year 25 sessions have been delivered, the Trust and Ranger Service engaging with almost 500 people of all ages.

Great progress has been made on the Baseline Ecosystem Assessment, which began with the first ever Loch Ken Water Quality Study, carried out by Galloway Fisheries Trust. The study, the first of its kind on Loch Ken, also included a Community Water Sampling Event and can now be accessed online.

It is fantastic to have this baseline data to

compare any future studies to.

Other environmental events included a Community Bat Walk and Talk. The Trust has great plans for next year for a whole host of studies to help understand the health of our ecosystem and what we can best do to protect it

Water Safety is a top priority for Loch Ken Trust. Manager Barney Fryer said, "To support activities to promote water safety, we have joined Loch Ken Trust up as a member of Water Safety Scotland. This has led to us joining a national working group on water safety in open water environments. We have also received funding from the Holywood Trust to deliver water safety training sessions to 13-25 year olds in our region."

To date, over fifty young people have achieved their water safety awareness completion certificates, and the programme will be continuing into Spring 2024.

A Family Water Safety Day was held in the summer, in partnership with local and national emergency services to highlight water safety on and around Loch Ken.

Over the winter the Trust has secured funding from the National Centre for Resilience to deliver a pilot research project on how the Loch Ken Ranger Service can assist with building resilience capacity in our remote rural communities. This project will be delivered in partnership with Glenkens Community and Arts Trust, and will assist community councils and community spaces with preparation for extreme weather events.

Loch Ken Trust would like to thank the community for their support and looks forward to continuing to make more progress in the coming years to realise their purpose of supporting sustainable communities around Loch Ken.

# Stewartry Birdwatchers winter programme

At the October meeting of the Stewartry Birdwatchers, Ronnie Graham spoke about his study of Dumfriesshire Goshawks.

He has been monitoring a specific area for the past 35 years and had a couple of interesting snippets for attendees; the eye colour of the nestlings is a steely grey-blue which turns yellow as they reach adulthood and as the birds age the eye colour of the male becomes orange-red and in the female orange-yellow. The pellets of the Goshawk show that

their prey can include Grey Squirrels, Jays, Barn Owls and even Sparrowhawks.

The next talk was 'Where East meets Africa - birding in Oman' with speaker Jeremy Brock, and was based on his three-week visit there in April 2013. Oman is the easternmost country on the Arabian Peninsula and is an interesting but little visited birdwatching destination. It is ideally suited for getting a mix of African, oriental and palearctic birds. Amongst the spectacular birds were little green bee-eaters, African paradise flycatchers and Indian rollers. With so few birdwatchers visiting Oman it is not really surprising that as recently as 2013 a

new species to science was discovered - the Omani owl, deep in the Al Hajjar Mountains.

On Thursday 11 January the Dumfries naturalist and author, Barbara Mearns, will give a talk entitled 'Birds, Butterflies and Moths - the hunters and the hunted'. Barbara will discuss the local bird species that eat butterflies and moths. Then on Thursday 15 February Stan Da Prato will help those present to identify warblers by sight and sound. The call of the chiffchaff

is unmistakeable but what about the difference between the songs of the garden warbler and the blackcap?" Joan Howie, joanospreys1@btinternet.com



## What sound is left when all trees are felled?

n October, a three-day exhibition by Corriedoo's Helmut Lemke entitled 'deliberately inconclusive investigations into absence' gave a sound artist's interpretation of forest management practices common across the region.

Ranging through the two exhibition spaces in 'The Byre,' visitors were treated to installations and drawings that highlighted the sounds collected around forestry management techniques - and the lack of sound they can leave in their wake, as illustrated through relentlessly running empty tape spools.

Helmut said: "When we bought our new home in a managed forest, I thought I was aware of what forest management means, how it is done, and what impact it has. How wrong was I. I have now experienced up close how the 'value' of nature is reduced to monetary measures and how our environment is forced to be productive.

"Responding to the clear felling and connected works in the forest where I live, I recorded what I saw, heard, smelled, and felt through drawing, sound recording, writing and performance; a visceral reaction underpinned through ongoing research into the UK's forest management methods and the alternatives practiced in other European countries."

Three works were exhibited at 'The Byre @ Corriedoo': deliberately inconclusive investigations into absence': an installation created from clear fell debris and empty audio tapes running through the dead branches; a series of sound drawings 'a wind wind in...' and 'sounding poems'; and a live

performance on the closing night.

'The Byre @ Corriedoo' is the studio and workshop of artists Helmut Lemke and Kerry Morrison. In 2024, they hope to host more events exploring local landscape issues and concerns through contemporary art approaches and performative acts.



# Celebrating music in the Glenkens

Music making in the Glenkens was celebrated in a weekend of activities in October starting with 'A' the Way to Galloway', a concert by Jo Miller and friends performing music from their new album.

An exhibition of musical images, programmes and other memorabilia was launched in the CatStrand, and some 40 youngsters took part in 'A Wee Hooley', an afternoon of song, story and dance.

The weekend concluded with a concert 'Gaither roon folks an this story I'll tell' in Dalry Town Hall celebrating current music-

Historian and singer Lizanne Henderson will chair a discussion on preserving our musical heritage. Presentations will be accompanied by live and recorded music, video and pictures.

## Tough times ahead at CatStrand

The CatStrand and all the Glenkens Community & Arts Trust (GCAT) projects have been around for so long, it's easy to forget that our continuing existence is sadly not a certainty.

Our survival relies on a huge amount of hard work, not only in delivering projects but also in finding funding to support all our work. Because our communities are so spread out, projects that might be commercially viable in a town never will be in our remote rural location. GCAT, like many of the other Glenkens charities, has historically had a good track record of making this case to funders for essential overheads (like heating, lighting and staffing our venues) - but this is becoming ever harder.

We know that many *Gazette* readers really value what we offer, so in the light of this, we are reinvigorating our Friends of CatStrand scheme. The Friends scheme demonstrates to potential funders how much our communities value what we do, as well as providing muchneeded funds to keep us going.

#### What does next year look like?

We expect to spend £600,000 across all our GCAT projects. Nearly two-thirds of this will be spent directly in the Glenkens and nearly 90% in Dumfries & Galloway, providing a valuable boost to local businesses. We have 16 employees, and commission many more artists, freelancers and activity deliverers. Of course, we generate what we can from venue hire, ticket sales and café and shop income,

but all the rest must come from grant funders or individual supporters. Last year, we made a significant loss which was funded from our reserves. Our 2023/24 budget also shows a significant projected shortfall, due in part to massively increased energy costs and also to the costs of essential staff. GCAT and the CatStrand simply can't stay open without these overheads being covered.

In the last few months, we have been unsuccessful in two major funding applications for overheads. In addition, Creative Scotland awarded us 50% of the requested level of funds for our amazing Arts programme, despite their assessors judging us to be "highly recommended for full funding". There just isn't enough money to go around. Worse still, regional funders continue to concentrate on new project delivery, which is frustrating for established organisations with a proven track record of success in their communities. While we were over the moon to get the funding from the 'Plugged in Communities' national fund for our new electric bus, this did bring into sharp focus the fact that finding funding for purchases is easier than funding to keep the lights on.

#### What can we do about it?

We're not at crisis level yet, but tough times are ahead at the CatStrand. Part of the reason we are shutting on Sundays and Mondays through the winter is to save on energy costs – our electricity bill nearly trebled last month as we came out of a fixed term contract. You'll also see that the printed events programme is much smaller, as we look to cut costs without reducing activities.

We know we're not alone in this – every single

employer and community building in the Glenkens will be facing the same challenges. So if you can shop local, attend events or donate to your preferred charity, please doit all makes such a difference.

#### Will you support the CatStrand?

To help secure GCAT's future, we've refreshed our Friends scheme as an easy way for people to show their support for all we do. ## Local artists study the elusive nightjar

Earlier in the year, the *Gazette* brought you news of the Artful Migration art residency by Ted Leeming and Morag Paterson.

We checked in to hear how the conference and exhibition went and their reflections on the project. Morag said: "It has been an incredible few months. It is one of the most challenging residencies we have undertaken artistically, but it is also one of the most rewarding."

Ted explained: "Research was an essential element of the project, and I was immediately drawn by the fact that the presence, or not, of nightjars (and many other species, for that matter) is essentially down to the availability of suitable habitat for nesting, together with the availability of food at any given location, along with favourable climatic conditions during migration.

"We discovered that in just 270 years, less than 3% of the original deep peat area of the Lochar Mosses remains intact, with the remainder having been drained for agriculture, forestry and the development of infrastructure, housing and industrial parks as the population and needs of Dumfries and the surrounding area have grown. In another example, 97% of hay meadows have disappeared in the UK since 1930.

"Habitat loss is a significant contributing factor to insect populations (nightjar food) having reduced by 60-75%

across Europe since 1950, which in turn is one of the reasons, together with generational land use change, that has led to the number of birds migrating between Europe and Africa halving from 4.2 to 2.1 billion birds in just a few decades. The numbers were genuinely numbing and profoundly concerning for me and formed a major part of my thinking as we started to produce work for the exhibition.

"But we also found evidence that some landowners are implementing incredible nature-based solutions to help address such declines. On the Lochar Mosses, for example, which formed the focus of our residency, Forest and Land Scotland is reverting several hundred hectares of conifer plantation to lowland blanket bog over 25 years. Exemplary projects like this help engage new, positive thinking that will create generational change, and we are seeing an increasing number of inspirational projects of this type across the region."

From Morag's point of view, the long, quiet evenings spent waiting for the birds were one of the highlights of the project: "Initially, I was quite worried about what impact the 'night shifts' would have on my ability to function during the day, but I quickly realised that settling into a seated position to watch the sunset, contemplating clear-fell and bog, was both mesmerising and relaxing. I watched backlit bog cotton dancing in the breeze and listened to daytime birds transitioning to night-time



birds - nothing to do but wait. Better still, once night fell it was important not to use lights, which ruled out phone use, and we couldn't talk either - an enforced silent vigil.

"As soon as the eerie nightjar call (churring) commenced, you could expect a brief fly-by, but would have no idea where the bird would appear or be flying to. Of course, this made filming and photography very tricky, but this turned into a positive aspect that pushed us toward eclectic lines of enquiry."

Ted continues: "The conference itself was fascinating and drew a varied audience including scientists, academics, community and artists into a discussion of what we can take forward to increase people's engagement with nature and how artists - and imaginative processes - can take an active role in co-designing and delivering projects across a broad spectrum.

"Following a well-attended opening event, over 800 people

visited the exhibition in just a few weeks - some folks went three times! We've had some touching feedback, which is always lovely.

"We must say a big thank you to everyone who made it possible, without whom we could not have delivered to the extent we were able.

"It was a privilege to spend many nights exploring their little-known world, including sharing it with the incredible volunteers who spend summer evenings ringing and geotagging the birds so that we might all better understand population and species changes over time."

# From the Bookroom

In 'From the Bookroom' Glenkens-based author of the novel *The Road From Damascus* and co-author of *Burning Country: Syrians in Revolution and War*, Robin Yassin-Kassab, takes readers through some of his favourite books. In this edition Robin speaks about author Khaled Khalifa, friendship and the festive season.

## or me, the festive season has nothing much to do with Christianity.

I don't celebrate Christmas religiously – though I send my very best wishes to those who do – but I do celebrate the mid winter feast. In northern Europe, and particularly in Scotland, which can be very dark and gloomy as well as cold, it's very important, for body, mind and soul, to gather with friends and relatives in a bright and cosy space, to stoke the fire, and to eat and drink the finest fare.

It's a time to celebrate what we've got – relationships more than possessions. It's a time to remember our loved ones, present and absent. This year I'm remembering in particular a good friend, and a great writer – Khaled Khalifa. Khaled wasn't a Christian (or a believing Muslim either), but there was something of Father Christmas about him. He was plump and warm with fluffy white hair, full of compassion and good cheer.

He was a screenwriter, a poet, and Syria's greatest contemporary novelist. Four of his novels are available in English, and I recommend them very highly.

"In Praise of Hatred", like all of his work, is set in Aleppo and its surrounding villages. The novel illustrates the mutual intolerance of the Baathist regime and violent Islamists as they warred in the 1980s.

"No Knives in the Kitchens of This City" extends the time scale, from the multicultural 1920s to the 2003 Iraq war, and it shows the steady disintegration of society under totalitarian dictatorship.

The key event of "Nobody Prayed Over Their Graves" is the overnight destruction of a village by flood. Khaled wrote this book during Syria's counterrevolutionary war, and the flood serves as a metaphor for the sudden loss of life and home suffered by contemporary Syrians.

His final novel, "Death is Hard Work" – with a nod to Faulkner's "As I Lay Dying" – describes a family taking their father home for burial. The journey should take a few hours, but in war conditions, given endless checkpoints and harassments, it stretches

on interminably, as the corpse begins to rot.

I strongly recommend these books, though they're not particularly easy reading. They contain complicated plots and even more complex inter-relations between enormous casts of characters. The complexity reflects the layered density of Syrian social life as Khaled saw it. He emphasised the necessity of tolerance within a democratic framework precisely because of this vision.

Khaled was only 59 when he died. Probably he ate too much, drank too much, and smoked too much. Probably you could

also say that he was too committed to his country, too stubborn or full of love to abandon it. Because he stayed in Damascus all through the revolution and the war, though he was well enough known internationally to gain a visa if he'd wanted to, though most of his friends, if they weren't killed or imprisoned, managed to flee to safety.

I remember Khaled's laughter, his love of festivity and friendship, and I wish him – and all of you – a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

# WINDY STANDARD LOOKING FORWARD TO 2024





# This winter at the CatStrand

t's been a an exceptionally busy year this year for CatStrand Arts and we do hope you've enjoyed it!

We've definitely bounced back from Covid, seeing our highest audiences on record this year. We've averaged two events per week, selling over 4,000 tickets over the year (not including the Young Creatives - see update on that on p23). Some highlights of our Creative Scotland-funded programme this year were:

- Storming gigs by HENGE, Samson Sounds, Blue Giant Orkestar & Pictish Trail.
- Sell-out shows by international-quality audiences like Kris Drever, Martin Simpson, Kiki Dee, FARA, Ross Ainslie, Ali Hutton & Jenn Butterworth.
- D&G-based artists rightly forming a central part of the programme including The Village & The Road, Sanchez & Rigg, Gavin Marwick & Friends, and slow tours

by A The Way to Galloway & The Bookshop Band.

- Some ridiculously funny evenings with George Egg & Patrick Monahan.
- A Dark Sky Jazz weekend of unforgettable musicianship.

Theatre and Dance remained a strong part of our programme this year of course. We benefitted from being included on tours supported by Creative Scotland's Touring Fund and through DG Arts Festival. Hightlights included Battery Park, Women Walking, Help! I think I'm a Nationalist, 4 Go Wild In Wellies, Make Up & Pibroch - all of them amazing to watch.

Locally-driven projects form a significant part of our work, supported through our Cultural Communities programme. Talented individuals and groups bring their significant expertise and enthusiasm to deliver a programme of events that is of an extremely high standard and firmly rooted in the Glenkens. The Cultural Communities

programme this year included Ken Words, Write On, Clachan Folk Sessions, CatStrand Singers, the SongWave Choir, Watson Birds, a rolling exhibition in partnership with South West Scotland Print Makers, and of course the very popular Glenkens history events.

Despite all of this, pressure on arts funding nationally does leave us in a somewhat precarious position (please see article on p24 for more on this, and how you can support the CatStrand).

It is clear that we have something very special and valuable in the CatStrand. Its intimate hall allows a real connection and warmth between the artists and audiences. Although there are many small community venues,






CatStrand is one of a very small number sustaining a regular programme of touring arts.
