


78 milestone locations surveyed

18 still standing

Five of these are marked on the 1<sup>st</sup>
Edition Ordnance
Survey maps - meaning that they've been standing in those locations for at least 170 years!





No longer there







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MS12 (NX 64209 77640) sits along the A713 giving a distance to Dalry of 3 miles and to Parton Station at 6 miles. Lesson learned at this one – worth double checking a location during the winter months. The vegetation along many road verges will be thickest during the summer so you might need the leaves to fall before spotting any milestones hiding in their midst.



### Did you know?

There is a **Milestone Society**. A charity dedicated to "identify, record, research, conserve and interpret for public benefit the milestones and other waymarkers of the British Isles". It was set up in 2001 and since then its members have recorded over 31,000 milestones, other waymarkers and tollhouses. You can find out a lot of information about milestones on their website at


The chunky-looking MS14 (NX 65480 74863) also sits along the A713. It was found by David just to the south of the turn-off for the 'Hidden Road'. The stone gives a distance of 5 miles to Dalry and 4 miles to Parton Station.

MS13 (NX 64601 76181) sits along the A713 giving a distance to Dalry of 4 miles and to Parton Station at 5 miles. Discovered by Elliot who thought that they looked 'similar to milestones guiding the way to Killywhan Station from New Abbey' so perhaps commissioned by the railway company.






You might well spot MS18 (NX 69145 70126) as you drive along the A713 through Parton – it sits along the tidy grass verge to your left as you come into the village from the north. A simple '7' represents 7 miles to Castle Douglas.

## Did you know?

Before the days of trains and cars, the 400-mile journey between Edinburgh and London would have taken 16 days!







A slightly tricky one – MS27 (NX 55041 76117) sits along the A712 near Clatteringshaws. Mapping shows its location at a layby further down the road from this spot and a slab sitting flush to the ground there might represent its original site. Eagle-eyed Keith spotted this stone at the coach layby for the visitor centre though, which looks like it could be a good contender!



Located in a slightly more rugged setting, David recorded MS30 (NX 59350 77430) along the A712 which leads to Clatteringshaws Loch – a position that it appears to have held for at least 170 years! It has a '27' for 27 miles to Dumfries.

**MS33** 



Sitting at the top end of New Galloway, MS33 (NX 63431 77803) displays either a '24' or '29'. No name is shown but Keith observed that it's likely to be Dumfries, so probably 24.

Also in New Galloway, MS36 (NX 63406 77674) sits on the pavement just in front of The Smithy displaying 'Dalry 3¾' and 'NG Stn 5'. Keith noted that: 'NG Stn appears to have been New Galloway railway station, which was located to the south in the village of Mossdale! Much of the original station can still be seen, including the platform and original station building, now a private dwelling. The station and line were closed in 1965.'

### Did you know?

From 1706 to the 1840s, Turnpike Trusts were set up to raise money for building stretches of road. They introduced tolls for using the roads, something which had been free until this point, which led to anti-turnpike riots across Britain.

In Wales, these became known as the 'Rebecca Riots' where male rioters would dress up as women and tear down the tollgates.



MS37 (NX 63347 76090), MS38 (NX 64096 74691) and MS39 (NX 65042 73421) all sit along the A762 between New Galloway and Mossdale. They continue the run of milestones down to where the railway station was located at Mossdale.

MS39 was a little hard to find at first but Peter was determined and finally spotted it as having been knocked over. As proof of how solid they are though, it's still in good condition!

Sent in by Jo, MS40 (NX 65437 71947) sits along the A762 and is the last in the run towards New Galloway Station that once sat 1 mile to the south. Jo spotted though that the milestone appears to have been moved to the opposite side of the road from where it was originally located, likely due to the construction of the cottages close to the roadside in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century.





Marking the 2 miles to Castle Douglas, MS56 (NX 76663 65919) has moved a few metres back from the roadside to become a beautiful addition to the border of a raised flower bed! It's been well taken care of though and you can still see it from the road.



MS76 (NX 68282 51064) doesn't actually appear on the older mapping so its existence was brought to our attention by our surveyors. Keith took these images — it sits just against the wall to the south of Greyfriars Church, right at the centre of Kirkcudbright.

The '27' seems to represent the distance to Dumfries. This must have been obvious enough not to label it at the time!







We didn't originally have MS77 (NX 76338 62218) on our map, but Claire spotted it set into the wall of the Douglas Arms Hotel in Castle Douglas.

Cast iron, it has an inscription at the base – 'J.Affleck Founder Dumfries 1827', presumably the same J. Affleck who created the plates on MS25, also in Castle Douglas.

So 1827 makes MS25 and MS77 nearly 200 years old – looking not bad for their age!

# Did you know?

Many milestones were removed or defaced in World War II to baffle potential German invaders and it is thought that only 9,000 of them still survive today across the whole of Britain.
